## Environmental nonprofit hopes to restore biodiversity in the Bay Area



Founded by Washington High School Juniors, Beyond Terra seeks to address environmental problems in the Bay Area. The 501(c)(3) non-profit focuses on environmental conservation and is fully led and directed by students. Beyond Terra is split into four branches—Finance, Environmental, Engineering, and Operations—in order to create the biggest impact. Since the beginning, founders Kiran Pothana and Rishi Gurjar have focused on restoring and preserving biodiversity, creating

opportunities for students to participate in biodiversity activities and leading 29 high schoolers in tackling niche problems ranging from soil degradation to fire prevention.

In the past year, Beyond Terra has worked on two primary initiatives, Monarch Restoration and Awareness Campaigns. The monarch butterfly is a well-known symbol in the Bay Area, and is a pollinator, making up a large part of habitat and environment balance in sustainable ecosystems. However,

any women experience at least some level of pain with menstruation. Intense and chronic menstrual pain, however, especially if it is accompanied by heavy bleeding or various other symptoms, may be a sign of a progressive condition called endometriosis.

"Throughout the ages, women have been told that menstrual pain is just a fact of life, and they simply have to endure it," says Jenny-Hanh Tran, DO. "Endometriosis, however, is not just 'pain in your head.' It is a true medical condition, and it can become more serious over time, perhaps even resulting in infertility or chronic pelvic and abdominal problems."

Dr. Tran is a board-certified obstetrics/gynecology (OB/GYN) specialist with Washington Women's Health Specialists, which is part of Washington Township Medical Foundation (WTMF). She notes that endometriosis is very commonly seen in their clinic.

"Endometriosis occurs when tissue that is similar to the lining of the uterus, called the endometrium, grows outside the uterus," she explains. "These tissues are sensitive to hormones, just like the lining of the uterus, so they will swell prior to menstruation, and then break down and bleed with each menstrual cycle, causing

pain over time. Endometriosis generally stays in the pelvic area, and it usually involves the ovaries, fallopian tubes and tissues lining the pelvis. In more severe cases, though, the tissues can sometimes grow in other areas, such as the bladder, bowels and other parts of the abdomen, causing adhesions and scarring that increases over time."

According to the Endometriosis Foundation of America (EndoFound),

endometriosis affects about 1 in 10 women in America, and approximately 200 million women worldwide. First established in March 1993, Endometriosis Awareness Month is now observed throughout the world to promote greater education and understanding of this condition, which is believed to be the foremost cause of infertility in women.

EndoFound cites a number of symptoms that may be signs of

endometriosis, including but not limited to:

- Abnormal periods with heavy bleeding or that extend beyond the normal time frame of three to five days.
- Painful menstrual cramps that last for more than a day and may begin prior to menstruation or continue even after the period is over.
- Bowel and urinary disorders, such as diarrhea, painful urination or bowel movements, blood in the urine or a frequent urge to urinate.
- Pain in the lower extremities resulting from pelvic tissue pressing on nerves that lead to the legs.
- Pain during or following sexual intercourse.
- Fatigue due to chronic pain and not finding a proper diagnosis and treatment.
- Infertility resulting from the buildup of scarring and adhesions, with an increased risk as the condition continues to go untreated.

"Anywhere from 30 to 50 percent of infertility cases in women may be due at least in part to endometriosis that causes scarring of the fallopian tubes and ovaries," Dr. Tran says. "In addition, patients with confirmed endometriosis may have a slight increased lifetime risk of ovarian cancer."

## **Swollen or Painful Legs** May Benefit from Interventional Radiology

## Free Online Seminar With IR Specialist

Legs and ankles that swell or leg pain that develops when you walk are issues that are often caused by problems with the arteries and veins in your legs. This may include blood clots, varicose veins and other blood circulation issues.

Treatment for those and other vascular disease problems has become much less invasive with the use of interventional radiology (IR), according to Dr. Amrit Hansra, an interventional radiologist at Washington Hospital.

Armed with state-of-art technology and miniature devices, interventional radiologists can reach deep structures of the body through a small puncture or tiny incision using small catheters and wires. This reduces risks, pain and recovery time compared to "open" operations, Dr. Hansra explains. Real-time imaging visualization allows precision guidance to the target, making the treatment procedure or diagnosis more accurate.

Dr. Hansra will present, "Interventional Radiology (IR) for Vascular Disease," on Facebook and YouTube live on Tuesday, April 27, at 6:30 p.m. There will be an opportunity for the audience to ask questions on Facebook. Participants can also submit questions in advance by emailing them to CommunityOutreach@whhs.com.

During the seminar, Dr. Hansra will explain the various vascular disease issues treated by IR, including blood clots that cause pain and swelling in the legs and arms, mechanical issues in the veins that contribute to swelling, and lower limb issues such as varicose veins. He will detail the different treatments using IR to dissolve and remove blood clots from the veins. Additionally, Dr. Hansra will discuss treatment of narrowed arteries throughout the vascular system caused by calcification and fat deposits.

The specialized imaging techniques employed by IR allow detailed mapping of the arteries and veins anywhere in the body to study the blocked vessels or bleeding sites. IR procedures can then reach the affected vessel via a small puncture to treat it with various techniques and devices.

Last August, Dr. Hansra joined the Hospital's Interventional Radiology Clinic, established in 2014 by Dr. Bruce Lin. A native of Sacramento, Dr. Hansra completed his radiology training at UCLA, and then moved to Fremont to be near his

family. "IR has become one of the most competitive medical specialties because it combines both diagnostic and treatment expertise," he says.

Dr. Hansra joins Dr. Lin and Dr. Lauren Chan at the IR Clinic. The three physicians treat Washington Hospital patients each day as well as providing outpatient medical consulting at the clinic, which is located in the Washington West building at 2500 Mowry Ave. For more information, call 510.818.7362.

Although researchers are not certain of the exact causes of endometriosis, according to Dr. Tran, the most common explanation is "retrograde menstruation," in which some menstrual blood with endometrial cells flows back into the fallopian tubes and pelvis, instead of out of the vagina and body.

Dr. Tran notes that another possible cause might be endometrial tissues traveling through the blood or lymphatic systems. There also might be a hereditary component, in which there is a predisposition to endometriosis in closely related female family members, including mothers, sisters, grandmothers or maternal aunts.

Because pelvic pain can be the result of several different conditions, Dr. Tran recommends a thorough medical exam by a gynecologist.

"Endometriosis diagnosis is sometimes delayed or misdiagnosed," she says. "It is often diagnosed in women in their 20s and 30s. There could be other causes of pelvic pain, such as uterine fibroids, ovarian cysts or a pelvic mass that need to be considered and ruled out. A pelvic ultrasound may help with the diagnosis. The definitive way to confirm a diagnosis of endometriosis, however, is to perform a laparoscopy of the pelvis to visualize endometriotic lesions or obtain biopsies."

When endometriosis is suspected or has been diagnosed, there are a number of treatment options, most of which involve hormonal regulation. "Endometriosis is an estrogen-loving condition," Dr. Tran explains. "That is why the simplest course of treatment for women who want symptomatic control is to use birth control pills to help minimize endometrial

growth. Most patients will benefit with progesterone-only treatment, because it is the main hormone responsible for stabilizing and minimizing endometrial lining."

She notes that for some more difficult cases, treatment to regulate gonadotropin-releasing hormone (GnRH), which is produced in the brain, can be used to put the patient into a temporary medical menopause and help with the cyclic pain. There are other treatment options that may benefit some patients, but they are not frequently used.

"Laparoscopic surgery to remove lesions caused by endometriosis might be considered as an option in other more difficult cases," she says. "As a last resort for some patients, a hysterectomy and removal of the ovaries might be a radical treatment option. Because that leads to

'surgical menopause,' it should be considered only by women who definitely do not want to carry any more children.

"The earlier you seek treatment and help for endometriosis, the more we can do to slow the process, alleviate your pain and help maintain fertility," she emphasizes. "Patients sometimes tell me they have not felt 'heard.' Part of my job is to educate women so they understand what is going on with their bodies, are aware of the treatment options and come up with a treatment plan together to better deal with this lifelong condition."

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
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# Pesach with

Passover (Pesach) commemorates the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt. Pesach is observed by avoiding leaven, and highlighted by the Seder meals that include four cups of wine, eating matzah and bitter herbs, and retelling the story of the Exodus.

In 2021 Pesach takes place from Saturday, March 27 to Sunday, April 4.

#### **History** Matters

By March 22, 1765, the British--short on funds to absorb the costs of their military presence in the colonies-unloaded the Stamp Act on the overburdened citizenry. Already, they were anteing up for the sugar tax on imported goods, paying an assessment for paper money, and a quartering fee for the housing and food costs of

The Stamp Tax levied a charge on everything from newspapers, and pamphlets, to playing cards, but that offense kicked off outrage and defiance. According to History.com, "They raised the issue of taxation without representation and formed societies throughout the colonies to rally against the British government and nobles who sought to exploit the colonies as a source of revenue and raw materials. By October of that year, nine of the 13 colonies sent representatives to the Stamp Act Congress, at which the colonists drafted the 'Declaration of Rights and Grievances,' a document that railed against the autocratic policies of the mercantilist British empire."

Although it was eventually rescinded, the public's pique

unified the colonists, suffused them with nationalism, andslowly-- activated America's war of independence.

The Grateful American Book Prize recommends The Stamp Act Crisis: Prologue to Revolution by Edmund S. Morgan and Helen M. Morgan.

Did you know that the United States does not have an official language? The Constitution does not specify one, nor is there a law which mandates the country to speak English; most Americans have accepted it as their "mother tongue," but adapting it in a very un-British way.

Take the distinctly American "okay," which started out as an abbreviation: "OK." It was common in the mid-19th century for younger, educated men and women to deliberately misspell words for amusement. For example, the slang for "all correct" became "oll korrect" or OK—and was sopped up in the American lexicon when the editor of the March 23, 1839 edition of the Boston Morning Post, tagged it "OK" to denote that the copy was "all correct" or--"oll korrect."

Other newspapers replicated the abbreviation; it diffused all over the world and morphed into "the most frequently spoken word on the planet."

The Grateful American Book Prize recommends OK: The Improbable Story of America's Greatest Word, by Allan Metcalf.

March Madness is overwhelming the nation. It has been that way since March 27, 1939, when the University of Oregon beat Ohio State University 46-33 in the final game of the very first NCAA men's basketball tournament.

If the Super Bowl causes the nation to stop and focus on football for one day, the annual NCAA basketball tournament holds the attention of the nation about three weeks. It starts mid-month when the "first four" -- or first round games--are played, and last until the "final four" games culminate with the selection of the two teams that will compete in the championship.

In the beginning, eight schools were invited to participate; this year, 68 will face off in the men's competition.

The inaugural women's NCAA tournament of 1982 had representation from 32 schools; the 2021 line-up will be generated from sixty-four.

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# Incredible Edible Plant Sale

Whatever your reason to plant this season, be it a victory garden, a project with children, growing your own herbs to brew tea, or growing peppers and pumpkins to decorate your porch, the Incredible Edible Plant Sale by The Master Gardener Program of Alameda County will get you started on your plans!

The University of California Master Gardener Program of Alameda County (MGAC) is a volunteer-run public service and outreach program that provides research-based information about home horticulture and pest management. While it is a statewide organization, each county needs to secure funds to support the work they do. One fundraising effort is the upcoming online plant sale - The Incredible Edible Plant Sale at http://www.incredibleedibleplantsale.com.

Proceeds from this plant sale will support MGAC's community education efforts like talks and demonstrations, plant clinics, help desk, training at community gardens, supporting school garden programs, and staffing information tables at farmers markets and nurseries. And of course the customers will be buying locally and lovingly grown plants for their home gardens!

The plant sale will offer a wide selection of tomatoes including heirloom, cherry, and container, and varieties of herbs, peppers, squash, zucchini, pumpkins. Online sale begins Monday, March 28 with plant order pickups in early April from Alviso Adobe Park in Pleasanton. MGAC volunteers are very excited about the upcoming sale and are following all public health guidelines to bring it all together.

With the funds, MGAC will be able to reach the local community and expand their efforts, especially since backyard gardening is on the rise during this pandemic. In fiscal year 2020, the MGAC help desk responded to 47.6% more queries compared to the previous year, and 89% of respondents in a survey of participants in MGAC programs said they are starting to or are improving growing edible plants, resulting in a more secure food system. A significant proportion of the respondents also indicated improved use of green bins and reduced food waste.

MGACs supported 35 Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) Learning Gardens in Title 1 schools, and mentored 25 Food Corps interns and Garden Stewards to manage school gardens. They also donated 4,000+ vegetable seedlings and compost to OUSD school gardens and to families at school food distribution sites.

Following COVID-19 regulations, Master Gardeners kept the demonstration gardens thriving, and delivered 30 free talks and presentations via Zoom instead of in person due to COVID-19.

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

The Hayward Fire Department is preparing an important new education, assistance and prevention program to improve wildfire safety in upland areas of Hayward, Fairview and the Five Canyons communities ahead of the 2021 wildfire season.

A wildfire-safe Hayward, Fairview and Five Canyons—the areas served by the Hayward Fire Department—is the ultimate long-term goal of the initiative, which will entail online community instruction on vegetation management and related topics, a demonstration project, financial support for property owners in need, free chipping services and evacuation drills.

#### **Buyers Cope with Few Choices**

Real estate activity has been strong during the first two months of 2021, but there is still one thing holding back homebuyers: low inventory.

Comparing February 2021 with February 2020, buyers had far fewer choices. There were 48 single-family detached homes listed for sale in Fremont during February 2021 compared with 73 last February. In Newark, there were 10 compared with 22 the prior year; in Union City, 7 for sale this February compared with 11 during February 2020.

Fewer options were available for buyers compared with last February, and the number of homes for sale during January and February was also at a five-year low.

While new residential development is underway in each of the Tri-Cities communities, it is simply not keeping pace with demand. As a result, competition for the few homes on the market has reach a fever pitch.

"It's not even multiple offers, it's mega-multiple offers, 20 to 30 offers and it's rare for sellers to be making counteroffers," said June Burckhardt, a Fremont-

based REALTOR® and member of the Bay East Association of REALTORS® Board of Directors. "Buyers need to be ready to make offers well over the asking price and modify their price range and comfort level."

Removing contingencies from a purchase offer could be a source of buyer discomfort. Burckhardt indicated it also may be the difference in making a successful offer

"Contingent offers are almost unheard of these days and an appraisal contingency just isn't realistic if buyers want an offer accepted," Burckhardt said. "I don't like recommending it, it's just a reality right now."

Real estate experts agree that current market conditions mean buyers need to have their purchase financing secured before making an offer and be prepared to act quickly. Burckhardt said, "If a house goes on the market today, you have to be ready to make an offer immediately, with laser focus, and you may not have a day to think about it."

Flexibility is another survival technique for homebuyers. "Be ready to compromise," Burckhardt said. "Buyers may need to be ready to look at other neighborhoods or a smaller or different floorplan."

# Disneyland will reopen in California on April 30

Disney will reopen its theme parks in California at the end of April after remaining closed for more than a year due to the coronavirus pandemic. Disneyland announced Wednesday that Disneyland and Disney California Adventure will reopen on April 30 with limited capacity. Under current state guidelines, only California residents can attend the parks.

"The day all of us have long been waiting for is almost here," Ken Potrock, president of the Disneyland Resort, said in a statement. "We're excited to have more than 10,000 cast members returning to work as we get ready to welcome our guests back to this happy place."

#### Tax deadline for individuals postponed to May 17

Franchise Tax Board (FTB) has announced that, consistent with the Internal Revenue Service, it has postponed the state tax filing and payment deadline for individual taxpayers to May 17.

"We recognize what a challenging year this has been for Californians statewide," said State Controller Betty T. Yee, who serves as chair of FTB. "I am pleased we are able to postpone tax filing and payment deadlines for all individual taxpayers in California to May 17. Hopefully, this small measure of relief will continue to allow people to focus on their health and safety and navigate the complexities caused by the pandemic."

This postponement applies to individual filers whose 2020 tax returns and payments were originally due on April 15. Taxpayers do not need to claim any special treatment or call FTB to qualify for this postponement.

FTB will waive any interest and late payment penalties that would otherwise apply if the returns

are filed and the payments are made by May 17. The postponement only applies to individual taxpayers, and it does not apply to estimated tax payments, which are still due on April 15.

During this public health emergency, FTB continues to process tax returns, issue refunds, and provide phone and live chat service to taxpayers needing assistance. If possible, taxpayers should continue to file tax returns as soon as possible to get fast refunds and to claim any applicable credits, including the California Earned Income Tax Credit (CalEITC) and the Young Child Tax Credit.

Those receiving CalEITC, and others who file with an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) and had \$75,000 or less in income last year, may be eligible for a Golden Gate Stimulus payment of \$600 or \$1,200, upon filing their 2020 tax return.

#### Fremont City Council Approves City Priorities for 2021



On March 9, 2021, during the regularly scheduled Council meeting, Fremont City Council members accepted the January 2021 Council Retreat report which sets forth City priorities for the calendar year.

On January 26, 2021, the City of Fremont held a virtual City Council retreat to identify Council priorities for 2021, develop norms and protocols between the Councilmembers and executive staff, and maintain a strong dynamic of Council-staff teamwork. In addition to Mayor Lily Mei, Vice Mayor Yang Shao and Councilmembers Teresa Keng, Rick Jones, Jenny Kassan, Raj Salwan and Teresa Cox, City Manager Mark Danaj and the members of the City's Leadership Team were in attendance. Jan Perkins, Vice President with Management Partners and former Fremont City Manager, facilitated the one-day virtual discussion and developed the 2021 Council Retreat report that was accepted by Council

The primary objective of the retreat was to establish the priorities on which to focus City resources in 2021. Through pre-retreat interviews many priorities were brought up for consideration. After receiving information from City Leadership, Council further discussed and identified its four highest priorities through a virtual voting exercise. The priorities identified were:

- 1) Budget, Financial Health, Increased Tax Base
- 2) Continued Response to COVID-19
- 3) Continue to Address Homelessness 4) Neighborhood Improvement

While Council has continued to prioritize addressing homelessness, and neighborhood improvement in recent years, this year's discussion focused heavily on the COVID-19 Pandemic with an emphasis of providing support to residents and businesses who have been affected. The Council's priorities will be incorporated into the upcoming budget process and staff work plan.

Following the prioritization session, the Council referral process was also discussed and there was a conversation about Council Norms and Protocols. Specifically, the Council discussed the norms and protocols related to the issuance of proclamations and resolutions, Council attended meetings and conferences, the use of City property for foreign dignitary visits, support of council decisions once made, and the overall agreement to govern citywide. Upon approval of the City Council Retreat Report, the Council Handbook will be updated to reflect the norms and protocols discussed at



## Environmental nonprofit hopes to restore biodiversity in the Bay Area



their populations have declined greatly in recent years. Pothana and Gurjar have created Monarch Waystations to further conservation in environments that have suffered from lack of monarchs.

To do so, they've released

Seedballs, which are small balls of soil with seeds, in order to plant milkweed that monarchs will then be attracted to. "It's basically where we use the balls to create a monarch waystation with tons of trees. Right now, we're doing coffeeberry milkweed and white hero, and we're having students help out as well," said founder Kiran Pothana. By utilizing the Seedballs, along with raising monarch awareness through partnerships with local elementary schools, Beyond Terra has not only actively made an effort to increase biodiversity, but also prepared students in the future to continue doing so as well. At Ardenwood Elementary School, Beyond Terra has provided interactive presentations to talk about the impact of pollution on the monarch, and given Seedballs to demonstrate how to help. In addition, they've worked with other environmental organizations such as Sailors Learning, American High School's Science and Ecology Club, Carlmont Green Team, The Firefly Initiative, and more.

Aside from their partnerships and current initiatives, Beyond Terra has focused on three projects featuring innovative and inexpensive ideas to promote biodiversity and mitigate pollution. Beyond Terra has recognized that the Bay Area

has a high concentration of microplastic pollution, and to prevent that, they've utilized The Green Sock, a filter that attaches at the end of drains in order to prevent man-made waste leaks. The Sock has a unique failsafe release mechanism embedded into netting, which can be easily controlled and maintained using vacuums or a crane. The sock net is able to capture any excess litter and vegetation waste, as well as prevent waste leak as a short-term inexpensive solution. Each Green Sock can last seven to 10 years.

Beyond Terra has implemented their Seedball project locally, but hopes to create a bigger impact using Seedball drones. The remotecontrolled drones are able to deploy the Seedballs at a higher rate and quantity. Each drone can hold around 100 Seedballs, and deposit them in areas that were previously inaccessible. "Our seed drones are powered by AI, and they basically autonomously get deployed and drop seed balls in batches of 100 in massive areas of land, which allows us to bring back biodiversity and restore habitat loss, very easily and very fast," said Founder Rishi Gurjar. Beyond Terra hopes to complete research and development for these drones in late February, and begin engineering the drone by March, and finally implement them into the greater Bay Area by June.

# Keep plants hydrated with self-watering tools

Soon people will start traveling again. Pet-sitters or pet hotels to take care of animals, landscape irrigation to keep the garden alive, and automated timers to turn lights on and off all ease a person's mind while traveling.

Another issue to address before traveling is taking care of indoor plants. Sales of indoor plants have skyrocketed during the pandemic. Keeping them watered while away is a real concern. Soaking interior plants does not work for those that prefer drier conditions or those that need water every couple of days and will not stay damp long enough. A better option is to use a self-watering device.

Before addressing indoor watering concerns while on vacation, there are some indoor watering tools that will make the day-to-day watering of house plants easier and more enjoyable. Plants have been grown indoors for thousands of years. People struggled to water them using large, rimmed pots. It was not until 1886 that John Haws patented the Haws watering can. The invention made watering easier and cleaner. Many of today's indoor watering cans use the same concepts. Indoor watering cans are small, lightweight, and easy to carry from room to room and to maneuver. They also have a long-curved spout for precision pouring.

Owning a well-made mister is important as well as having a proper watering can. Many indoor plants come from tropical and sub-tropical regions that are more humid than the inside of a


house. Grouping plants together as well as regularly misting them will raise the humidity, which will help them to stay healthy and thrive. Inexpensive plastic spray bottles can be unreliable over the long term and are not attractive. Purchasing one of the different types of glass misters with a brass or other type of metal spray head will last longer and will itself be something to admire.

Gardener's Supply Company, www.gardeners.com, sells the Mini Coil Indoor Garden Hose with a sprayer. It connects directly to a kitchen or bathroom faucet. It weighs about 2 pounds, has a 1/4 inch diameter, is 50 feet long, and comes with a 24-inch wand that adjusts from a solid stream to a fine mist. This hose makes the normal indoor watering routine convenient. It also makes it quick and easy for someone else to water house plants while you might be away, especially if the plants are all temporarily grouped together in the kitchen or bathroom.

Explore the idea of getting a self-watering device(s) to keep the house plants hydrated while you are away. A few options are given below:

Self-watering bottle adapters are ceramic or terracotta spikes that connect to the mouth of a bottle. When turned over with the spike placed in the soil and the bottle upside down, water slowly penetrates the wall of the spike and gets absorbed into the soil. Wine or spirit bottles are nicer looking than plastic water or soda bottles if they are going to be used when you're not on vacation. However, a 2-liter plastic soda bottle can provide water for 10 days using a bottle





adapter. Blumat bottle adapters are available online and are well regarded.

Blumat also sells its "Classic Self-watering Stakes" that draw water from a free-standing container through a small thin tube and into a ceramic spike placed in the soil. One container can feed multiple spikes. The bigger the reservoir the longer they will deliver moisture.

Self-watering bulbs are another useful tool that differ from self-watering spikes because the reservoir and spike are one piece. They slowly allow gravity to deliver water the same way as a spike connected to a bottle does. Alotm makes a clear PVC bulb that is always high on the list of best performing self-watering bulbs.

Various companies make attractive hand-blown glass bulbs, Wyndham House Watering Globes being one of the most elegant and reliable. Sucole creates colorful glass self-watering mushrooms, and Winemana offers an attractive clear handblown glass bird and mushroom self-watering globe two-pack.

Although outside plants are not usually a concern for people while on vacation as irrigation systems are so common, there are instances some plants in the ground need to be self-watered. Most of the self-watering devices above can also water outside.

Another option is to use an olla. An olla is a terracotta jar or pot that is buried in the soil of a pot or the ground and is then filled with water and covered. Water slowly seeps through the clay pores and into the ground. An olla can be a valuable tool for keeping a treasured outdoor plant alive while on vacation.

There were many things that helped people get through stressful times during the pandemic. Enjoying plants around the house was one of them. Continuing to care for these plants while at home or away will extend this enjoyment long after COVID-19 is in the rearview mirror.



## Holi: shades that never fade

Two traditional folk tales illustrate the origin of Holi, a festival of fire and color.

#### Fire:

Once upon a time there lived a demonic king named Hiranyakashipu. With a lust for power, control, and desire to become God, he wanted everybody in his kingdom to worship only him. However, his

own son Prahlada, God's true devotee, refused to worship him. Outraged with anger and driven to insanity at the disobedience of his son, Hiranyakashipu tried killing Prahalad without success. Maddened by his failure, he reached out to his sister Holika who possessed a special power that protected her from fire. He asked Holika to enter a pyre along with Prahlada, with the intention to kill him. However, upon entering the fire, she was

burned but the fire did nothing to Prahalad. Fire vanquished the evil while protecting the good!

#### **Color:**

When Lord Krishna was a baby, his maternal uncle Kans sent an ogress called Putna to kill him by nursing him with poisoned milk. Krishna survived, as he was an avatar of a god, but ended up acquiring a deep blue color due to ingesting poisoned milk. The fear of rejection due to colored skin used to bother him. He thought his beloved Radha, who was fair, would not like him. His mother Yashodha could not see her darling son in distress and asked him to color Radha's face any color he liked. When Krishna splashed color on Radha's face they united. The metaphor in the mythology reminds us of the prejudices that are caused when we see differences. And that is probably the relevance of indulging in color on Holi.

Holi, often known as festival of colors, is an occasion in India to remember and to celebrate these legends. Falling on the full moon of the Hindu calendar month Phalgun, the two-day Holi celebration involves Holika Dahan (Burning Holika) and Holi or Phag (Color Splash). This year, Holi falls on March 28 and March 29.

On the first day, Holika Dahan, people gather around a pyre to perform prayer as a symbol of the triumph of good over evil. The next day of Holi (or Phag) is the day when people apply color to one another in celebration of love and rejoice. The word Phag comes from the



word Phalgun, which means spring. People play with color powders called "gulal" and water guns called "pichkaris" creating a fun-filled atmosphere to celebrate the day.

While a two-day celebration is more common for Holi, a region in Uttar Pradesh called Braj celebrates Holi over a span of a week or longer. Celebration here takes many forms from playing with flower petals, events in temples, to city processions. Another kind of celebration, Lathmaar Holi, involves women hitting men with sticks called laths. Holi enactments can also be seen in classical Indian dance recitals depicting Radha and Krishna playing Holi.

Gujiya, a special sweet, and Thandai, a special drink, are synonymous with Holi celebration. Different kinds of chaat, a mouth-watering spicy assortment of snacks, are also on the menu. Numerous upbeat Holi songs in Bollywood movies are sure to get everyone dancing to the beat! Along with many folk songs, the song "Rang Barse" from the Bollywood movie "Silsila" has become the Holi anthem.

The splash of color that Holi creates touches upon something timeless. The color of love and devotion can overcome all stains and tarnish of power, poison, and prejudice. Humility, equality, and justice are priceless values to be forever cherished and celebrated.

## Socially-distanced Immersive Van Gogh comes to San Francisco

Immersive Van Gogh is more like an IMAX movie than a conventional museum exhibit. Background detail about the artist's life is available on the website and the entrance to the exhibit, but the main room is more like a show where you absorb the music and visuals. Overall, the feeling created is that you've stepped inside a series of Van Gogh paintings.

Those who want to know more about the thought process behind the exhibit, or whose knowledge of Van Gogh is limited, should listen to the explanation voiced by Colm Feore at www.vangoghsf.com/about. Not only does the piece give an overview of the artist's life and some notable works featured in the exhibit, it explains some other visual elements such as candles and insects.

The exhibit is a single open room, where visitors can either walk around to catch different parts of the projections as they change or sit down on benches to enjoy the atmosphere (circles on the floor help people maintain six feet of separation). Or you can climb a platform in the middle of the room for a 360-degree view.

During the 35-minute program, there are flickering/shifting lights and occasional loud music – staff can provide earplugs if needed.



# Tri-City History Queries No. 3

By 1887, Palmdale Winery was the largest and best-equipped in Alameda County. That same year, the Oakland

#### Q: What are those old brick structures over at Washington Boulevard and Osgood Road in Fremont?


**A:** Those "old bricks" are ruins of a massive winery building that once stood here... in Irvington of all places.

Today, a passing pedestrian or auto traveler can gaze down at counterforts and historic trees, all that remains of this long-gone piece of history. It may seem like they've just recently appeared, but in truth, the old place has simply been thrust back into the sunlight, as the City of Fremont and Bay Area Rapid Transit are working to prep the area for near-future development.

Completed in 1885, the Palmdale Winery building stood a little over three stories tall, 240 feet wide and 110 feet deep. Built of stone hauled from the hills behind Mission San Jose, as well as brick, the sizable structure was intentionally built abutting the hillside where grapes extended from the slopes of Irvington to Mission San Jose. That's two miles of growth from west to east and 600 acres of vines!

By 1887, Palmdale Winery was the County. That same year, the Oakland Tribune described it as "Irvington's pride.' The building was a masterpiece in both looks and utility. Don Juan Gallegos, owner of the winery, used gravity to his advantage. The grapes were delivered by wagonload to the third (top) floor, processed into liquid on the second (middle) floor, and stored in massive storage vats on the first (bottom) floor. The building had the capacity to hold up to 400,000 gallons of wine at once. When the wine was ready for bottling, it was ideally situated for transport via railcar to San Francisco and markets of the east, as the tracks were located just outside the

The tracks no longer run right through the grounds, but they are still located nearby. Just across Osgood Road, the railroad runs night and day, and so does BART. Soon, a new Irvington station will be built near these "old bricks." BART plans to integrate the Gallegos Winery site into the design of the new station. According to the BART website, the idea is to "pay homage to the past by stabilizing, preserving, interpreting and enhancing pedestrian and bike access to and within



the site of the historic Gallegos Winery ruins." The plan is to retain what's left from 115 years ago (when the building suffered great damage from the 1906 earthquake and had to be leveled) and turn it into a park. Let's hope for a strong follow through and a great *new* showpiece of our rich, local history.

There is so much more to share when it comes to this story. Juan Gallegos was an interesting person in his own right. He was a well-off man from Costa Rica who married the daughter of that country's third president. He was head of a famed family here in Mission San Jose—a hospitable, welcoming, generous group of people. There's the tale of the family mansion, which was moved in 1974 from Mission Boulevard up to Witherly Lane

(by Ohlone College) where it still sits today. The home was completely rehabilitated by locals Robert and Priscilla Tavares and aptly named "The Old Lady." What about Palmdale Gardens, that beautiful patch of land in Mission San Jose that is now a garden conservancy? How about the exhumation of the body of Dr. Jose Maria Montealegre, Gallegos' father-in-law, in 1978, when his remains were returned to Costa Rica for reburial? The history is vast and interesting, but alas, these are all tales for another day.

# Arrest in January shooting linked to recent homicide scene

On Wednesday, March 10, a fatal shooting occurred at the Mosaic Apartments located in the 39000 block of Fremont Blvd. when a group of armed suspects attempted to force entry into an apartment unit. A resident inside the apartment responded by discharging a firearm into the group, and fatally striking one of them. Detectives from the Fremont Police Department (FPD) believe that at

least one of the suspects also fired rounds at the resident. They are continuing to try and identify the other home invasion robbery suspects.

Meanwhile, detectives with the Major Crimes Task Force (MCTF) were already investigating one of the residents in the same apartment unit for a separate shooting incident that occurred on January 24 at Grimmer Boulevard and Blacow Road where a suspect in a vehicle fired one round from a handgun either at or near a pedestrian. The victim never came forward to report the incident, however witnesses and video of the shooting were found by MCTF. Detectives identified a potential suspect in February and began surveillance operations on him and his residence, which is the same unit at the Mosaic Apartments complex where the March 10 shooting occurred.

After the March 10 shooting, detectives were able to gather enough evidence to arrest one of the apartment unit residents for "willfully discharging a firearm in a grossly negligent manner" in the January 24 shooting. The suspect, identified by police as Brian Robles, 23, of Fremont, was not the same person who discharged a firearm at the home invasion robbery suspects on March 10. Robles was booked at Santa Rita Jail with a \$50,000 bail which he posted shortly after. He has since been released from custody and given a court date on May 13.

Detectives are investigating if the January 24 and March 10 shootings are connected. Anyone with information about either shooting incident is asked to contact the Investigations Unit at (510) 790-6900 or Major Crimes Task Force at (510) 790-6660.

#### Park It

As the spring wildflower season begins, there is some good news on the fire recovery front. The SCU Lightning Complex Fire of 2020 burned almost 400,000 acres within five regional parks: Mission Peak, Morgan Territory, Ohlone Wilderness, Round Valley, and Sunol Wilderness. It burned more than four million acres in total. All five parks have now reopened.

Destructive though it was, firefighting agencies have determined that the SCU fire was "best case" in terms of intensity. Although the fire was high-intensity in some locations, it burned less hot in many. This allowed wildlife time to burrow or escape to safer areas, and let seedlings survive for future regrowth.

Grazing practices and effectively managed fire roads likely reduced the intensity of the SCU fire in many areas. In some places it burned itself out at fire roads or slowed down in grazed

If winter rain totals are adequate, grasslands may experience an exceptional wildflower bloom. Some plants associated with chaparral actually require fire or smoke to germinate. They only bloom briefly, then disappear until the next fire. District staff will look for and record these species this year. We may see more animal activity, too. Animals that took refuge in areas not affected by the fires will likely venture out in search of new homes.

The park district has established a Post Fire Monitoring Task Force within its Stewardship Department to track the recovery of vegetation and

wildlife and to help coordinate management needs for the burned areas. The burned area has many protected species such as golden eagles, which nest high up in the trees. It's not known whether they will re-nest in the area if the fire destroyed their original nests.

If you are willing to put in the work, Ohlone Wilderness is usually one of the best places in the regional parks to see wildflower displays. The Ohlone Wilderness Trail goes for 30 miles or so, connecting Del Valle, Ohlone, Sunol, and Mission Peak regional parklands in southern Alameda County.

In springtime, wildflowers abound along the way. But you do not have to hike the entire trail. Start at the Lichen Bark picnic area at Del Valle Regional Park south of Livermore. From there it's a 2-mile climb up the Sailor Camp Trail and Ohlone Wilderness Trail to Rocky Ridge, whose rocky soil stimulates wildflower growth. Not to mention the views, which are spectacular. After lunch it's downhill almost all the way back to Lichen Bark.

Hiking the trail requires a permit. It costs \$2 and is good for a year. Permits can be obtained at the Del Valle and Sunol entrance kiosks, when staff is present.

While you are at Del Valle, check out the newly redesigned Rocky Ridge Visitor Center, which is near the Lichen Bark picnic area. It is the district's first bilingual visitor center (English and Spanish), featuring interactive and state-of-the-art exhibits telling the story of Del Valle's cultural and natural history. The center will open as soon as the COVID-19 pandemic permits.

## HELP THE PLANET WITH PROJECT GREENIFY!



In these tough times, many projects and businesses have to overcome hurdles to stay afloat in 2021. Despite this, some have managed to persevere. Student-run non-profit Project Greenify, spearheaded by high school seniors Andrew Gao and

"During a Sunday stroll, I remember walking to a beautiful garden at the top of a hill only to find it littered with cigarette butts, empty soda cans, plastic grocery bags, and empty spray paint cans," co-founder Andrew Gao states, reminiscing on an experience that kick-started his passion for environmental health. Once his childhood friend and fellow co-founder Ishant Goel got word of the non-profit organization Samarpana through his relatives, the two friends supported their efforts-helping underprivileged children in India obtain school supplies by repurposing unused binder paper into new notebooks. Eventually, Project Greenify was created around January 2020 with the help of a small team of volunteers from Fremont's Mission San Jose High School and Hayward's Moreau Catholic High School. Together, the team helps the environment by cleaning around their respective campuses and taking on various projects such as creating bird feeders from bottles, constructing paper bags from recycled newspapers, and marimekko-inspired flower planters from aluminum cans. On their website, Project Greenify also runs a blog with articles and research papers that address environmental issues.



According to Gao, Project Greenify has not only helped their community by raising awareness of environmental health, but also boosted team member self-esteem. When Project Greenify was starting out, he admitted that it was difficult to reach out to local businesses and often got discouraged when their requests to collaborate were rejected. However, through sheer perseverance, the group eventually managed to successfully reach out to a small number of local businesses. Stores like Niles Pie Company, Royalty USA, Suju's Coffee, Phil's Coffee and Regan Nursery feature their planters and paper bags. Gao also states that this experience allowed them to further develop their public speaking and leadership

Since Gao and Goel are high school seniors who expect to graduate in 2021, the two have passed down their knowledge to their underclassmen so that Project Greenify can continue to thrive at their schools. Gao and Goel still intend to continue the project's efforts while in college

by pursuing degrees in Computer Science and Environmental Science respectively and eventually develop Project Greenify into a more serious non-profit organization.

"A girl from another high school was interested in helping with Project Greenify, and contacted us to start something similar at her school," says co-founder Gao. "It's always a pleasant surprise to always receive such notifications, especially from people who subscribed to us from different places. We hope to eventually expand soon to not only reach more schools, but also to cities and even different countries, to gather as much help as we can possibly get."

In the United States, before the establishment of public education systems, the value of a broad-based, primary compulsory system to prepare youth and adolescents for life as productive citizens was debatable. Many professions were either self-taught or learned through apprenticeships and experience - trial and error - even if disastrous for those involved in the error side of things. Those born to wealth and pleasant circumstances were granted access to education and coveted societal positions while others faced formidable obstacles to achieve similar results.

Although the need for an educated public was recognized by some, it was often limited and associated with religious and moral precepts. However,

even in 5th Century B.C.E., the Greek philosopher Plato proposed compulsory education to mold personal growth for youth and prepare rulers and citizens for life's challenges. Today, although recently interrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic, primary and secondary education either through public or private resources continues, slowly returning to a semblance of normality. This disruption has emphasized the value of a professional and dedicated workforce envisioned by education advocates throughout history.

In the fledgling United States of America, progressive ideas about education were beginning to emerge, borrowing from European practices. Horace Mann (1796-1859), considered by many to be the "Father of American Education," considered education for all as "a great equalizer," explaining that "...It does better than to disarm the poor of their hostility toward the rich; it prevents being poor." The principles he promoted remain relevant today: ignorance and freedom are antithetical; primary education should be supported by the public; all should be included in public education without regard to background; public education should be free of religious tenets; public education should promote a free society; and educators should be well-trained professionals.

Proliferation of misinformation and false narratives, including racial and societal profiling, in times of stress highlights the need for a well-educated, rational and comprehensive educational system. This allows everyone to understand not only technical STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) subjects, but promotes appreciation of art, physical fitness, basic principles and history of our society as well: How and why did our country form? How does it operate? What is a democratic republic?

Without a well-rounded education – emotional, physical, intellectual – even brilliant students can fall prey to suspect information and incomplete rationale, a path to emotional turmoil and horrific consequences for themselves and their communities. As our school systems and students struggle to recover from the consequences of a world-wide pandemic, our communities need to reaffirm their commitment to broad-based education – public and private – for everyone.

## Officer-involved shooting leaves man dead in Hayward

A motorist was fatally shot by a Hayward police officer on Tuesday, March 16 after striking several police vehicles while he trying to flee the parking lot of a Motel 6 in the 30000 block of Industrial Parkway Southwest.

The incident occurred at about 11:38 a.m. when officers were trying to detain the

occupants of a blue Volvo that matched the description of the suspect vehicle that fled officers the previous day, according to a statement by police. The Volvo was suspected as being involved in a recent robbery of an elderly woman. That investigation led officers to the Motel 6 where the shooting occurred.

Since December officers have been involved with numerous robberies involving the theft of purses from lone female victims. Many of the victims were elderly females returning to their cars after using banks or bank ATMs and several of the robberies involved physical assaults resulting in injury.

The driver of the vehicle was struck by gunfire and taken to a local hospital where he died. His identity is being withheld pending the notification of next of kin. Additionally, a Hayward police officer was taken to a local hospital and treated for non-life-threatening injuries. His identity was not released because the incident is still under investigation.

In a statement, HPD officials said they are in the process of gathering evidence and conducting interviews of witnesses as well as those involved in this incident, additionally, HPD and the Alameda County District Attorney's Office are conducting simultaneous investigations into this incident. Once these investigations are completed, the matter will be referred to the State of California Office of the Attorney General for review. #### **UA to help digitize Native American oral histories**

The University of Arizona will join six other schools to help digitize the oral histories of Native Americans collected during the 1960s and 1970s.

The Arizona Daily Star re-

ported that the project aims to make the histories more accessible to Native communities, tribal colleges, and the public.

The universities will use a \$1.35 million grant from the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation to translate and index the recordings. The foundation says the recordings and materials span 150 Indigenous cultures and include more than 6,500 recordings of people reflecting on their traditions and experiences living on reservations and attending Native American schools.

The University of Arizona's Arizona State Museum is the storehouse for more than 800 recordings made between 1938 and 1987 focusing primarily on peoples living in the Southwest U.S. and northern Mexico.

#### **Water Efficiency Master Plan Makes its Debut**

Alameda County Water District (ACWD) has been busy developing a Water Efficiency Master Plan (WEMP) to encourage water use efficiency in the Tri-Cities and ensure longterm water supply reliability for its customers. The WEMP is now complete and ready for review. It provides a roadmap for ACWD's Water Use Efficiency Program for the next five years and strategies out to 2050.

ACWD initiated the WEMP development process in 2019 after it was identified to achieve Strategic Goal 2: Sustain a reliable, high-quality water supply for District customers in ACWD's 2018 Five-Year Strategic Plan. The Strategic Plan stated that ACWD should "develop and implement a Water Efficiency Master Plan to leverage the benefits of Advanced Metering Infrastructure and address changing water use efficiency regulations," and provide baseline analysis for future water supply planning documents.

The WEMP report documents the planning process, summarizes the analysis, describes various water use efficiency strategies along with their anticipated costs, savings, and cost-effectiveness, and recommends a five-year strategy for ACWD's Water Use Efficiency Program that:

- Provides a cost-effective means to address water demands in the short term with a foundation for establishing water use efficiency goals out to 2050
- Expands existing efforts to meet state-mandated targets and aggregate water use objectives

- Improves accessibility of water use efficiency services for lower income customers in ACWD's service area
- Integrates well with ACWD's Advanced Metering Infrastructure project
- Supports customer interests and takes advantage of regional partnerships

"We want to make effective water use efficiency programs available, programs that our customers want. Increasing access to those programs helps them conserve while working toward ACWD's overall water use reduction goals," said ACWD Board President Aziz Akbari.

Once the board approves the final master plan in April, ACWD will begin implementing the recommended strategy. Over the next several years, modifications to some existing and several new water use efficiency measures will be rolled

## Ohlone athletics spring forward

Ohlone College Athletics began the practice phase of their return in mid-March after completing two weeks of oncampus conditioning. The practice phase means that teams can start sharing bats, balls, and other sports training equipment.

"It took us 11.5 months to get back to a place where students were allowed to step foot on their field and see their teammates mask-to-mask," said Chris Warden, Dean of Kinesiology, Athletics and Arts.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, intercollegiate athletics were

put on hold in March 2020 in order to devise a safe return to campus plan. Ohlone's first step was to present Site-Specific Protection Plans (SPP) for all outdoor venues. This included utilizing information provided by the Alameda County Public Health Department. The plans included clearly defined maps with directional paths as well as steps each student would need to take regarding returning to the college's hillside campus in Fremont.

Student athletes needed to complete COVID-19 safety training, verbally confirm an understanding of the COVID-



19 safety protocols to their respective AD/Athletic Trainers, and attend a first day meeting to re-confirm the processes. College officials emphasized that students understand that having teams back on campus is a privilege and something that could easily be taken away if they could

not follow strict guidelines which includes distancing and face masks.

Now, in order to resume the practice phase safely, all teams and coaches must be COVID-19 tested weekly. The first testing occurred on Friday, March 12 ahead of the practice phase beginning March 15.

## Police seek help in traffic hit and run probe

Traffic investigators with the Fremont Police Department (FPD) are asking the public for help in identifying the driver of a vehicle involved in a fatal collision with a pedestrian on March 9.

The incident occurred around 6:00 a.m. when dispatchers received a call about a person down in the 100 block of J and Second streets in the Niles area of Fremont. Police and firefighters responded, and the pedestrian, identified by police as Richard Plasch, 81, of Fremont was taken to a trauma center with major injuries; he died there March 15. Plasch was walking a dog which was safely retrieved at the scene.

Investigators determined Plasch was struck by a vehicle and reviewed video from a nearby

surveillance camera which captured a dark colored vehicle, possibly a minivan, traveling west on J Street toward Second Street. A second vehicle was seen traveling west on J Street and then possibly making a U-turn at J and Second streets. The vehicle was then seen traveling east on J Street toward Niles Boulevard where it made a right turn and was last seen traveling south on Niles Boulevard. This vehicle appears to possibly be a Light Pewter Metallic (gray) or Sunset Gold Metallic (gold), 1995 -- 1999 Chevrolet Tahoe 4-door SUV.

Investigators would like to talk with the driver or anyone who may have been in either vehicle, and may have seen Plasch walking his dog. 

A private committal service will be held at Willamette National Cemetery in Portland, OR on Friday, April 16th at 1:30pm.


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#### Edwin (Ed) Dale Clark




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It is with great sadness to announce that Eisele Dwight Williams (Boe) passed away in his home in Phoenix, Arizona on March 14, 2021.

#### Police chief announces retirement

After more than 25 years with the Fremont Police Department (FPD), Chief Kimberly Petersen announced on March 18 she will retire effective October 1, 2021. However, there won't be a long search for her successor, as City Manager Mark Danaj said he will promote Captain Sean Washington to the FPD top spot when Petersen departs.

"I am profoundly grateful for Chief Petersen's pioneering leadership during one of the most pivotal times in our nation's history. Her commitment to excellence, accountability, and transparency in policing is beyond compare; the Fremont community has benefitted enormously from her progressive ideals, Danaj said. "I am also very proud of the strong organization Chief Petersen leaves behind in the Fremont Police Department, which is well positioned to build on her legacy. "We are all thankful that Chief Petersen has provided such generous notice, which will allow ample time for a smooth transition of leadership."

Petersen started her law enforcement career with the City of Fremont in 1996 and quickly rose through the ranks, reaching the historic milestone of being

appointed as the city's first female police chief in July, 2018. Over the years, she held numerous positions including being the city's first female member of the SWAT team. She also developed the FPD's Tactical Emergency Medical Support (TEMS) team in partnership with the Fremont Fire Department, becoming an expert in Tactical Medicine and advancing the city's ability to render immediate life-saving care in an expeditious manner during critical incidents.

In 2017 Petersen expanded the department's capacity to respond to situations of acute mental illness and health crises through comprehensive crisis intervention methods and training; through the creation of a specialized Mobile Evaluation Team (MET) in partnership with the Fremont Human Services Department and Washington Hospital Health Care System. Most recently, she led the department through the unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic, while maintaining a high-level service to the community.

"It has been an honor to work alongside the men and women of the Fremont Police Department," Petersen said. "Coming here for the last 25 years never felt like work because it was such a joy to be part of this team, and because

the work is so meaningful. I will truly miss the people. I look forward to watching the department continue to advance its culture of professionalism and adaptability. I will especially miss the community events like Coffee with a Cop and the Community Academy. I know the residents of Fremont and the department will be in great hands under the leadership of Sean Washington." Following her retirement, Petersen said she plans to spend time focusing on her family which includes three children and continuing to help coach their sports.

#### **Confidence in the next** police chief

Danaj said one of the most important appointments a city manager can make is a new police chief, and he has confidence in Washington. "Sean's esteemed career with the Fremont Police Department and continual display of ethical and just

leadership have long made him an obvious choice as the department's next Chief. I look forward to working with Captain Washington and our community in this next chapter of the Fremont Police Department."

Washington joined FPD in 1997 and over the years has held a variety of roles including detective, Field Training Officer, SWAT Team Member, Arrest Control Instructor, Driving Instructor and he served as the supervisor of the School Resource Officer Unit. He was promoted to Sergeant in 2007, Lieutenant in 2011 and Captain in 2015. Over the last six years Washington has rotated as commander of the department's three divisions and has vast organizational knowledge. He currently oversees investigations, internal affairs, training and personnel.

"I am honored and thankful for the confidence and trust of

the City Manager and the City Council. I am humbled to have the opportunity to serve this fantastic community in this unique leadership role," Washington said. "I am committed to the continual advancements of the Fremont Police Department. I am also appreciative of Chief Petersen's ongoing leadership and the dedicated professional service of the men and women of FPD."

Washington earned a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from California State University, Hayward in 1997 and a master's degree in Administration of Justice from San Jose State University in 2007. #### **Arrests made in Fremont shootings**

During the late afternoon on Tuesday, March 2 a vehicle being driven near the 4100 block of Broadmoor Common was approached by a person on foot who fired multiple gunfire rounds directly into the vehicle. The occupants, an adult, a juvenile and a young child, narrowly missed being struck by multiple bullets; no one was injured in the 4:40 p.m. incident.

Detectives took over the investigation and identified a 16-year-old male as the suspect responsible for the shooting and obtained an arrest warrant. On March 4 Special Operations Detectives located the juvenile in San Leandro and arrested him. When he was arrested, the suspect was in possession of a handgun with an extended magazine. He was booked into Juvenile Hall and was charged by the District Attorney's Office for attempt murder with a firearm.

Several hours later, at 7:57 p.m. officers responded to the 4100 block of Bay St. for a report of a shooting into an apartment. A suspect forced entry into an apartment of a known associate and began yelling before

leaving. As the suspect fled the area, he fired multiple rounds from a handgun into the air nearby. No one was injured by gunfire, but several occupants in the residence were forced to flee for their safety during the shooting. A suspect, identified by police as Lucky Jessop, 19, of Fremont was located by officers from the Street Crimes Unit who also found a discarded handgun and extended magazine near his location. Jessop was arrested on suspicion of negligently discharging a firearm, vandalism, trespassing, and violation of a court order. He was booked at Santa Rita Jail with a \$50,000

bail which he posted the following day. He was then released with a May court date.

The next day, at 10:50 a.m. Wednesday, March 3, officers responded to the 5000 block of Lemke Place on the report of a shooting with a victim sustaining major injuries. Detectives from the Major Crimes Task Force (MCFT) were familiar with many of the involved parties and immediately deployed to known associated locations throughout

Detectives went to an address on Ellsworth Street as a suspect vehicle was returning from the shooting scene. A 15-year-old male suspect immediately fled from detectives but was caught after a foot pursuit. He was later identified as the suspect in the shooting and booked at Juvenile Hall. He was charged by the District Attorney's Office for attempted murder with a firearm. The victim is expected to survive despite originally suffering life-threatening injuries.

The Ellsworth Street residence was previously searched by MCTF pursuant to a search warrant in January. An adult suspect was arrested for possession of an AR pistol (converted into an assault weapon), possession of a stolen vehicle, and possession of fentanyl during the January search warrant.


