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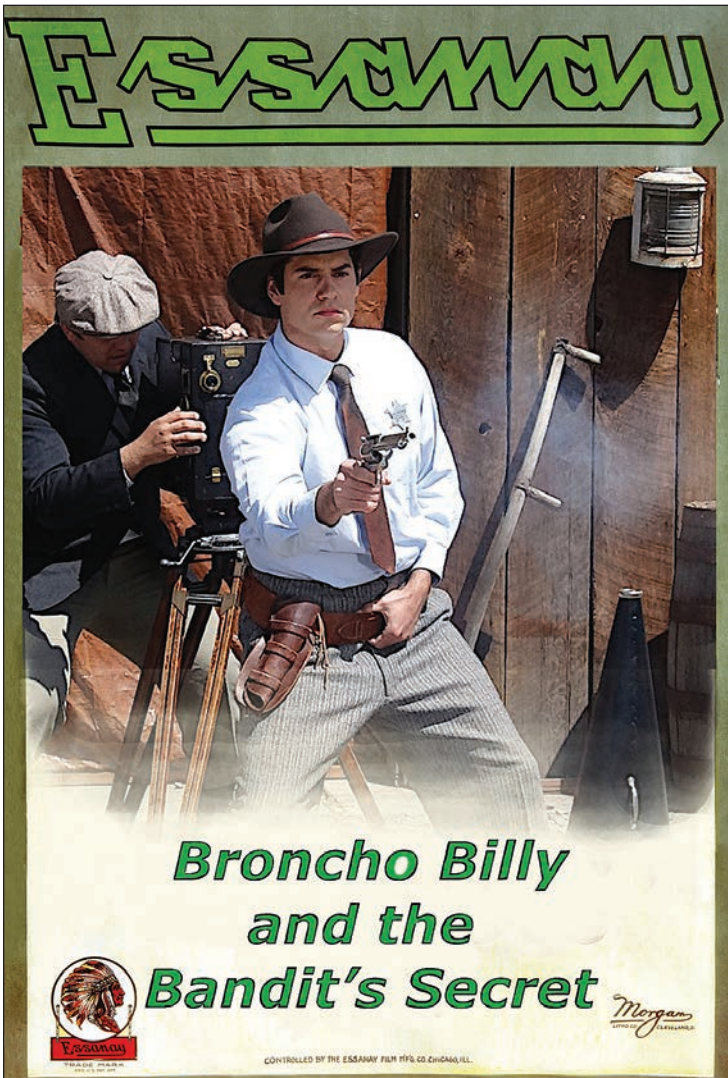

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## Rage Against the (AI) Machine and Enjoy 'Real Music' with Bay Philharmonic this Season

The Bay Philharmonic is set to kick off its 2023/24 season this October with its "Broadway Best" show. The performance is a celebration of musical theater as well as the milestones that the industry has made in incorporating diversity, as seen with racially and musically varied hits such as *Hamilton*. What makes this season special, according to composer and Artistic Director Jung-Ho Pak, will be the continuation of the Bay Philharmonic's quest to make top-tier live music accessible and appealing to all.

"The Bay Area is one of the most diverse areas in the country, but is also one with the most distractions with the rise of streaming services and artificially-produced music," says Pak. "When putting these shows together, I need to be able to get myself out of bed, which means making my audience get out of bed. When people come to our shows, I want to hold a mirror up to the broader public that celebrates our diversity in a unifying space."

Born in Burlingame, Pak was first drawn to music at age six when he played the piano, a memory he recalls as a "lonely affair." Following his family's relocation to the South Bay, Pak joined his high school marching band and he credits the public education system for reinvigorating his love for music. Pak then began composing at age 14, joined bands where he played various genres such as rock & roll and jazz, and he earned a scholarship to the San Francisco Conservatory. After leading several symphonies around the country, Pak returned to California to save the San Diego Symphony from bankruptcy when he overhauled the program and secured a \$110 million grant to ensure its survival. Since then, Pak has resumed his work in the Bay Area and has made efforts to disprove the misconceptions that classical music is reserved only for the Eurocentric elite.

"I want to make music that appeals not to the 1%, but the 99%," adds Pak. "We're living in a time of such hate and division but music is one the few

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# Slips, Trips and Falls

## How Physical Therapy Can Help Reduce the Risk

There are over 36 million reported falls by older people in the U.S. each year and many go unreported. This means at least one in four people over the age of 65 experience a fall, resulting in more than 32,000 deaths. This makes falls the leading cause of injury and injury-related death in this age group. Falling is a public health concern – so during this week every year, we observe National Fall Prevention Awareness Week.

While not all falls cause injuries, one in five results in a serious injury such as head trauma or a broken bone, like a wrist, arm, ankle or hip fracture. These injuries can have devastating consequences, like limiting a person's mobility or taking away their ability to live on their own.

"I explain to my patients that our muscles naturally get weaker and our balance and agility worsen as we age," said Larry Aseo, a physical therapist at Washington Outpatient Rehabilitation Center (WORC) with more than 35 years of experience in the field. "Oftentimes it is difficult to accept that our bodies are not the same as when we were younger, but it is an important step in preventing falls."

There are many conditions that contribute to falls, and some practical things can be done to help prevent them. These risk factors include lower body weakness; vitamin D deficiency; difficulties with walking or balance; use of certain medications; vision problems; foot pain or improper foot wear; and home hazards like broken or uneven steps and throw rugs or clutter that can cause tripping. Most falls are caused by a combination of these, and the greater the number of risk factors, the greater the chance of falling.

### Prevention is the Best Medicine

Older people should talk openly with their doctor about their risk of falling, especially those who have fallen before or feel unsteady on their feet. Physicians will likely review any medicines that may cause dizziness or sleepiness and check if older patients get lightheaded when going from sitting to standing. Schedule annual vision checks and meet with a podiatrist for any

foot issues. Around the house, get rid of trip hazards and make sure all staircases have handrails and adequate lighting.

Generally, more active older adults have a lower risk of falling than those who are sedentary. To prevent falls and improve overall health, it is recommended that people over 65 participate in regular activity like low-impact aerobics, tai chi, strength training and yoga. Benefits include improved balance, coordination and flexibility which all lead to greater stability and mobility.

"Many falls happen in the bedroom or bathroom first thing in the morning because people are still groggy or have low blood sugar before breakfast," explained Aseo. "Be aware of when and where you are most vulnerable for a fall and take precautions. Sometimes this means swallowing your pride and accepting that you need a little help, perhaps in the form of an assistance device like a cane or walker."

Physical therapists at WORC provide gait training to help people improve their ability to stand and walk, with or without the use of a cane or walker. When falls lead to injury, the specialists at WORC help patients return to their prior level of function. In addition to increasing range of motion and strength after a bone fracture, experts at the center treat vertigo and dizziness and can help patients manage the aftereffects of concussion from a head injury.

Aseo developed some basic physical tests he has patients perform to evaluate their risk of falling. These tests can also be done at home for strength training and to improve balance. Here are two that can be worked into a daily routine. Start slowly and try to increase repetitions over time, performing them one to three times a day. A cane, walker or other support should be used as needed.

• **Chair Stand Test/Exercise** (to measure or improve lower body strength): Sit in the middle of a straight-back chair (17" seat height) with your feet flat on the floor and arms crossed on your chest. Rise to a full standing position, then return to a seated position. Repeat for 30 seconds to see how many times you can stand up.

• **One Leg Balance Test/Exercise** (to measure or improve static balance, control and fall risk): Stand next to a counter or wall for safety with your arms crossed on your chest. Start a timer when you bend one leg up at the knee, heel up behind you. Timer stops when 1) raised foot touches the ground, 2) raised leg is used to support the standing leg, or 3) foot on the floor loses control. Stop test at 30 seconds and repeat with the other leg.

"If you feel unsteady on your feet, I urge you to discuss it with your physician so they can provide an order for physical therapy. We would rather see you at WORC to proactively teach you how to prevent falls than have you come to us for rehabilitation after you have been injured in a fall," concluded Aseo.

Annual October Event Offers Fun, Friendship, and the Power of Teamwork

In today's world, when you hear the term "Think Pink," you are likely to know it's not a promotion for a current popular movie but rather the well-known national call to action for breast cancer awareness and support.

And to celebrate October as National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Washington Hospital will host its annual Think Pink breast cancer awareness event from 5 to 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 19, in a tent atrium in the Washington West parking lot at 2500 Mowry Ave. in Fremont.

The free, in-person event will feature a variety of interactive information booths, activities and presentations. Think Pink focuses on the wide range of community nonprofit, medical, and emotional support available to those currently diagnosed with breast cancer as well as others who seek more information about breast cancer.

The purpose of the annual event is to raise awareness about the extensive support and treatment community available to breast cancer patients in the Tri-City Area, notes Christine Mikkelsen, RN, nurse navigator and clinical coordinator of the Washington Women's Center.

Medical and community support services at all levels of need are available right here in Fremont through the UCSF - Washington Cancer Center, Mikkelsen adds. "There's no need for our community members to leave the area for

breast cancer treatment. We offer our patients a full-service program right here."

Think Pink event activities, focused in the first hour of the event, will include craft booths to make breast cancer awareness buttons, henna tattoo artists, a photo booth, a booth by HERS (the community-based breast cancer support organization) and a drawing for gift baskets and a quilt from the Hospital's Service League, according to Kayla Gupta, the Hospital's Community Outreach manager. A free, vegetarian boxed dinner also will be provided.

During the 6 to 7 p.m. hour, a variety of experts will discuss the latest cancer treatment options available at Washington Hospital and explain how complementary therapies can help improve physical and emotional well-being during and following cancer treatment. Speakers will include Dr. William Dugoni, general surgeon and medical director of the Washington Women's Center; and Dr. Krishna Suri, osteopathic and palliative care physician.

A panel discussion, "Navigating Cancer Together," will feature key staff members

from the UCSF - Washington Cancer Center including Mikkelsen; Becky Hudson, assistant director of oncology; Monette Domingo, RN, oncology nurse navigator; Patricia Limpo, RN, and Jackie Bala, RN, oncology practice nurses; and Shari Kellen, RN, nurse manager at the Hospital's infusion center.

"Our Think Pink event energizes those who attend," Gupta notes. "It's fun and, importantly, it raises individual and community awareness. It's an empowering program where individuals with various stages of breast cancer, their families and friends, and others in the community learn about the level of medical and nonprofit program support available to all who need it."

Mikkelsen adds: "With events like Think Pink and our ongoing education and support programs, we aim to empower every affected individual, instilling hope, raising awareness and letting those diagnosed with cancer know they are not alone in their work to conquer breast cancer."

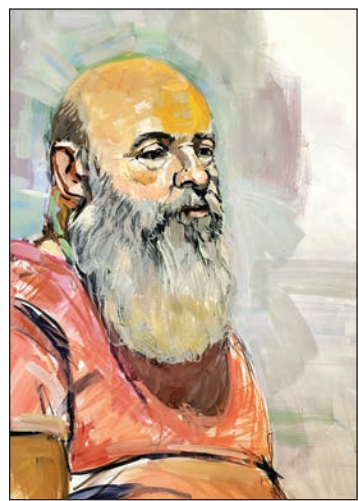

In all, \$350,000 was allocated to be made available for People's Budget projects and events across six sectors of the city—with approximately \$50,000 to \$70,000 made available per sector based on their relative population size and income level.

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# League of Women Voters of Eden Area & Fremont, Newark, and Union City

*This is part of an ongoing series on our two local Leagues of Women Voters, to run the final week of the month. This article covers the history of the League; future articles will focus on League advocacy and programs.*

The League of Women Voters of Eden Area and Fremont, Newark and Union City (LWVEA and LWVFNUC, respectively) have been defending democracy, advocating for good governance, and informing voters for decades, powered by local membership. We cover a large area of the East Bay, including Ashland, Cherryland, San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Castro Valley, Fairview, Hillcrest Knolls, Hayward, Fremont, Newark, and Union City. LWVEA also provides services to Pleasanton, Dublin, and Livermore.

Both Leagues are part of the National League (LWVUS), State League (LWVC) and the Bay Area League (LWVBA). The League of Women Voters (LWV) was founded on February 14, 1920, six months before the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote was ratified. It was founded by the leaders of the suffrage movement who wanted to empower women to be responsible citizens and informed voters. In 1974, LWV admitted men as members, but voted to keep LWV as the name, as it had become a known brand. LWV is a nonpartisan organization whose mission is to empower all voters.

LWVEA's motto could be "Small but Mighty," and LWVFNUC's motto has been "Democracy is not a Spectator Sport." We look at local, state, and national issues and base our advocacy on studies we conduct on pertinent topics, such as climate, immigration, and criminal justice. Most Leagues have an "Action Committee," or advocating arm. Observers from the Committee attend public meetings to do exactly that: Observe to understand community issues being voted on

by elected officials, a right the public has under the Brown Act. We passionately believe that "we the people" should have the ultimate say in our communities.

Our advocacy includes direct engagement with both elected officials and the community. We hold programs and workshops to educate the public and participate in community activities. One of LWVEA's most popular recent programs was "Introduction to Local Government," featuring board members and a mayor. Eden Area has sponsored a workshop "How to Run for Office," and we highlight suffragist history with videos and presentations. LWVFNUC has held a forum with three Police Chiefs (Fremont, Newark, and Union City) to discuss different aspects of policing. The forum was moderated by longtime member and former Public Defender Pauline Weaver.

We are part of the Alameda County Council of the League of Women Voters, which includes all six County Leagues. We work together to address county issues with a focused approach. All six Leagues will be

taking part in the 20th "Healthy Living Festival" in Oakland on September 28. We have participated, along with our coalition partners, in election system reform with Alameda County and the effort to establish a Sheriff Oversight body. Alameda County, which had had some challenges with its election system, recently established a newly formed elections commission. LWV has an established seat on this commission as well as others, such as the Measure A Citizens Oversight Committee.

We also conduct annual legislative interviews with elected officials. We have recently spoken with newly-elected State Senator Aisha Wahab and Assemblymember Alex Lee. We discuss with them our concerns, for example water use, affordable housing, and voter participation. These discussions are valuable and give us an avenue of input as informed citizens. Nationally, Leagues are known for presenting fair candidate forums (which we hold locally during each election cycle). Leagues also provide skilled moderators to local organizations

to assist in important community conversations.

Annually, we invite our members to join a process called Program Planning, which centers on the results of a poll taken at the Castro Valley Fall Festival for LWVEA and at a LWVFNUC meeting. The poll asked for the top three concerns for Alameda County residents. LWVFNUC has also invited non-members to provide their areas of concern. We have looked at topics such as affordable housing, climate change, criminal justice reform, fair redistricting, immigration reform, homelessness, reproductive freedom, and voters' rights. Our programs will focus on the items that our communities care about and want to learn more about.

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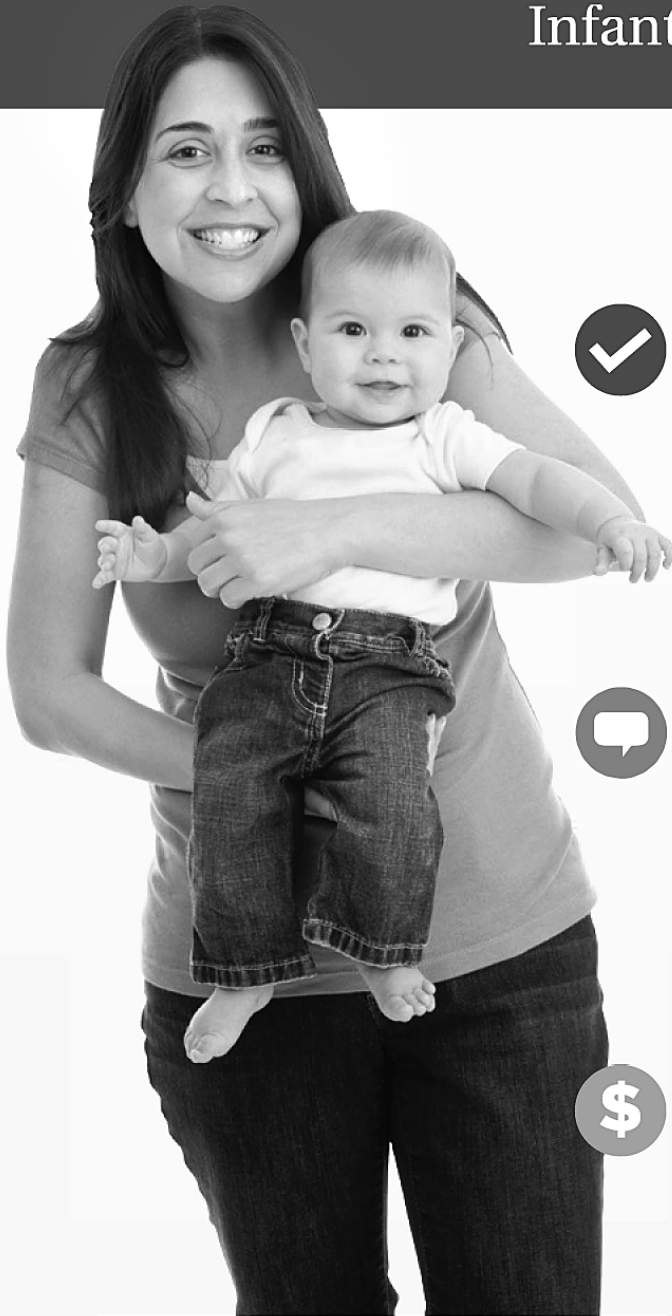

## Oakland Zoo's African Elephant moves to new home

Leaving Oakland Zoo on Monday, September 11, African elephant Donna, age 43, arrived at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday, September 13 to her new permanent home, The Elephant Sanctuary, an AZA-accredited facility in Hohenwald, Tennessee. Accompanied by her care team of five, with a carefully planned route to ensure her comfort and wellbeing, Donna had been voluntarily participating in training sessions since May to load into and familiarize herself with the specialized and fully-equipped transport trailer that brought her to the sanctuary. There, she will again enjoy the companionship of other compatible female elephants after the passings of Lisa, aged 46 and M'Dunda, aged 50 at Oakland Zoo, who passed in 2023 and 2019, respectively.

"Donna's 'trailer training' was an amazing and successful all hands-on deck effort by our entire keeper team, and the journey from Oakland to her new home was bittersweet. We will miss her dearly, but are grateful for the future years she has ahead and the continued standard of care she will receive," said Gina Kinzley, Elephant Manager at Oakland Zoo.

Prioritized and focused on the best interest of Donna, the decision to move Donna to The Elephant Sanctuary was

made thoughtfully and collaboratively by Nik Dehejia (Oakland Zoo CEO), Colleen Kinzley (VP of Animal Care Conservation & Research), Gina Kinzley (Elephant Manager), and with consideration given to input from many other key advisors and experts within AZA (Association of Zoos & Aquariums).

At The Elephant Sanctuary, Donna, now in her senior years, will have the opportunity to join a herd of three other compatible female African elephants, Flora, Tange, and Sukari, ensuring her the structure of companionship female elephants need throughout the later stages of life. With the sanctuary being AZA-accredited, Donna will continue receiving the highest standard of veterinary and animal care that she is accustomed to at Oakland Zoo.

"The decision to move her saddens us all, but it is a decision that best serves her at this later stage of her life, and her wellbeing, and that takes priority over all else," said Nik Dehejia, CEO of Oakland Zoo.

Donna came to Oakland Zoo from the Audubon Zoo in New Orleans in 1990. Upon arrival, she quickly bonded with Lisa, another female three years her senior, and the two elephants grew in their bond over the next three decades, choosing to sleep together in their barn every night. In 2013, Lisa began showing signs of progressive arthritis, and in the past year, leading up to



Lisa's declining quality of life due to compounding and worsening health conditions, Zoo veterinarians and the elephant care team began preparing for the inevitable loss of Lisa and simultaneously began planning for Donna's future without her lifelong partner.


A search to bring a new compatible female elephant companion from another AZA-accredited facility or rescue situation to Oakland Zoo for Donna was conducted and was ultimately unsuccessful. At the same time, the Zoo explored the option of a new home for Donna that would meet her social and animal care needs, finding the ideal placement at The Elephant Sanctuary.

A farewell party for Donna was arranged by her elephant care team back in June, attended by staff, volunteers, and with the public invited as well; presenting her with a large spread of treats, enrichment, and pinatas filled with her favorite fruits. Meanwhile, at The Elephant Sanctuary, preparations were being made for Donna's

upcoming arrival, including an introduction plan for her once she arrived with Flora, Tange and Sukari.

Upon arrival, the veterinary team at The Elephant Sanctuary, along with Oakland Zoo veterinarian, Dr. Ryan Sadler, conducted a health assessment before Donna was given access to explore part of her new habitat. She was introduced through a protected fence line to the first member of her new herd, Flora. Introductions are managed in a phased integration and Donna will soon have free contact (no separating fence line) with all three of her new companions at the refuge.


Located on 3,060 acres in Hohenwald, Tennessee, The Elephant Sanctuary is the nation's largest natural-habitat refuge developed specifically for Asian and African elephants. The Sanctuary has provided 32 elephants with individualized care and the opportunity to live out their lives in a safe haven dedicated to their well-being.

**Early Florida**

The British Pilgrims were not the first Europeans to settle in America. According to the Library of Congress, “when the London Company sent out its first expedition to begin colonizing Virginia on December 20, 1606, it was by no means the first European attempt to exploit North America. In 1564...French Protestants (Huguenots) built a colony near what is now Jacksonville, Florida. This intrusion did not go unnoticed by the Spanish, who had previously claimed the region...”

A year later—on September 20, 1565—Spanish forces ambushed the French near

Jacksonville, FL - then they retreated to Quebec and Nova Scotia.

**The US Supreme Court**

On September 24, 1789, Congress passed the Judiciary Act; President George Washington signed it, and the United States Supreme Court was “born.” According to History.com, “President Washington nominated John Jay [that day] to preside as chief justice, and John Rutledge, William Cushing, John Blair, Robert Harrison and James Wilson to be associate justices.”

Two days later, the Senate confirmed their appointments.

As the History website put it, the Court “grew into the most important judicial body in the world in terms of its central place in the American political order. According to the Constitution, the size of the court is set by Congress, and the number of justices varied during the 19th century before stabilizing in 1869 at nine. This number, however, can be changed at any time by Congress. In times of constitutional crisis, the nation’s highest court has always played a definitive role in resolving, for better or worse, the great issues of the time.”

The Grateful American Book Prize recommends *A People’s History of the Supreme Court: The Men and Women Whose Cases and Decisions Have Shaped Our Constitution* by Peter Irons.

**Kansas’ Famous Sheriff**

Wild Bill Hickok’s finesse with a firearm enabled his fame—and facilitated—his failure.

On September 27, 1869, Hickok—then sheriff of Ellis County, Kansas—confronted a rowdy throng in a Hays City saloon. A cowboy—Samuel Strawhun—tried to rush him, but Wild Bill drew his gun, and killed him.

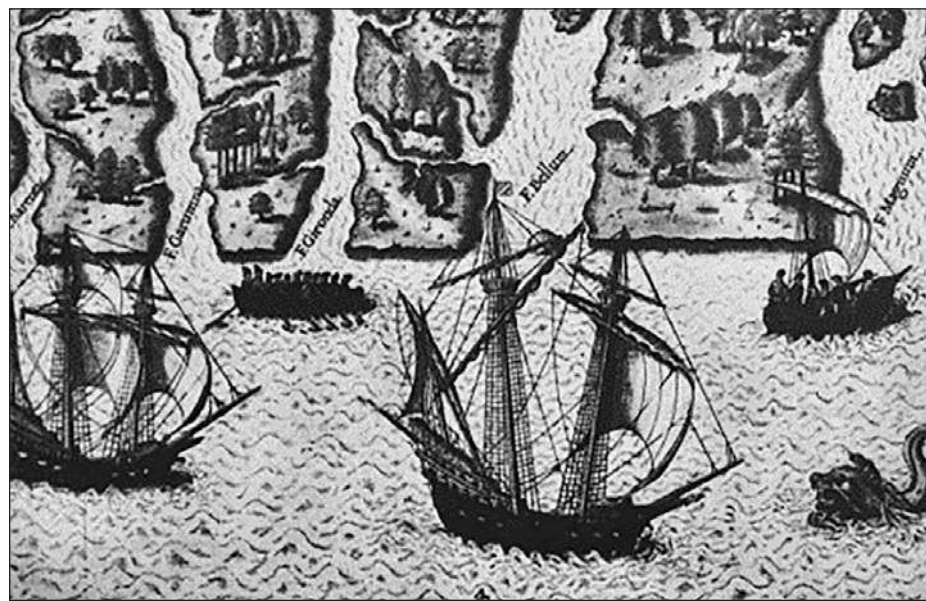
“Such were Wild Bill’s less-than-restrained law enforcement methods. Famous for his skill with a pistol and steely calm under fire, James Butler Hickok initially seemed to be the ideal man for the sheriff of

Ellis County, Kansas. The good citizens of Hays City, the county seat, were tired of the wild brawls and destructiveness of the hard-drinking buffalo hunters and soldiers who took over their town every night,” says History.com.

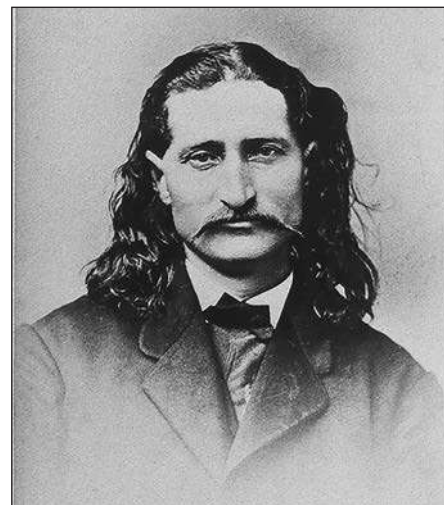
A few months after the Hays City shooting, Hickok lost his job—in the next sheriff election—to his deputy.

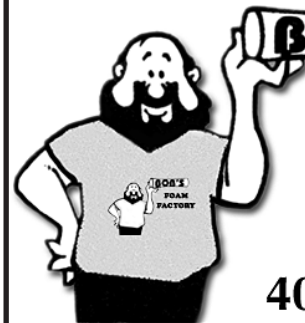

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# Climate Ready Fremont Final Plan

At the June 1, 2023 Environmental Sustainability Commission meeting, staff presented a draft of Climate Ready Fremont, the update to the city's Climate Action Plan, for the Commission's consideration. The Commission recommended that the City Council consider the Climate Ready Fremont draft and release the draft for a period of public comment. The Commission also provided comments for staff consideration in the preparation of the final plan.

On June 20, staff presented the draft plan along with a summary of the ESC's comments on the plan to City Council. Council asked clarifying questions and offered comments on the plan.

After providing comments to staff, City Council voted unanimously to release the draft Climate Ready Fremont plan for a period of public review and comment. From June 21 to July 31, 2023 the draft was made available for the public to review and provide feedback through the MyFremont community engagement platform. A total of 777 participants visited the project page, and 77 of those directly contributed in either discussion forums, polls, and/or asked questions.

Forum participants commented on the challenges of transitioning away from single occupancy vehicles and towards active transportation modes in Fremont given its size and nature of land use (i.e., suburban design). Participants also focused

on the need for more neighborhood-oriented shopping, restaurants, and services for easy access by walking or bicycle.

Some participants expressed support for actions that eliminated parking minimums in development projects; others stressed the importance of public parking availability for access to park and recreation facilities.

Participants were generally supportive of water conservation measures that focus on drought-tolerant landscaping at homes and businesses. There were also concerns regarding the cost of electrifying existing homes and businesses.

Staff prepared a revised version of Climate Ready Fremont that incorporates relevant comments and concerns from the Commission, Council, and the public as appropriate. Staff presented this revised final draft of the Climate Ready Fremont plan to the Commission for its feedback and input. The Environmental Sustainability Commission recommended the final draft of the plan for adoption by City Council.

unifiers in which we can come together despite our cultural, religious or political differences to enjoy all kinds of genre of music."

In keeping that message, the "Broadway Best" show will feature the singing talents of Broadway veterans such as *Hamilton* alum Julius Thomas III, Filipino-American *Wicked* alum Lissa deGuzman and Puerto Rican-Jewish singer/dancer Jason Gotay (known for his work in *Gossip Girl* and *Spider-Man: Turn off the Dark*). Thomas, who made history as one of the first Black actors to play the lead role in

the global phenomenon *Hamilton*, is fully prepared to show audiences how inclusive the theater and orchestra have become.

"I think when people see the diversity in Broadway and [musical theater] it will make them rethink how they see the genre," says Thomas. "It's something that has not really been done unless you come to New York, so I'm glad we're taking this to the Bay Area."

Pak also believes that the timing of Bay Philharmonic's season is crucial, especially in an age where artificial intelligence

(AI) has now impacted all arts, including musical composition.

"When you come to these shows, you'll see real people play real instruments. I don't even refer to [this genre] as 'classical' but rather I just call it 'real music.' I like to think of it as farm-to-table art because you'll get to see and hear something that isn't artificial but as real and organic as a tomato," adds Pak.

"My goal is to ultimately do for music what Steve Jobs did for technology. If I look back and know I helped make the theater a democratic place then I'll die a happy man."

## Emergency Evacuation Preparedness New Audible Warning System

### Technological Enhancements to Public Safety



### EVACUATION STATUS

The City of Fremont uses standardized evacuation terminology.

- Evacuation Order.** Immediate threat to life safety. This is a lawful order to leave the area. The area is lawfully closed to the public.
- Evacuation Warning.** Potential threat to life and/or property. People who require additional time to evacuate, and people with pets and livestock, should take immediate action and evacuate.
- Shelter-in-Place.** Go indoors. Shut and lock doors and windows. Remain indoors until further notice and/or contacted by emergency personnel for additional direction.
- Advisory.** An informational message.
- Evacuation Order Lifted.** Formal announcement that an Evacuation Order is no longer in effect.
- Normal.** There is no known threat to the area.

The City of Fremont has put into place a new Warning System for emergency evacuations through the efforts of the Office of Emergency Services (OES), a division of the Fremont Fire Department. In the event of an Evacuation Order, the City will utilize several methods to notify the public, including AC Alert and Wireless Emergency Alerts. Recently, Fremont Police patrol vehicles became equipped with a Hi-Lo audible Warning Sound system. If you hear the alternat-

ing high and low tone, it means an evacuation order is in progress. A video demonstrating the Hi-Lo warning sound can be viewed at [city.fremont.gov/evacuation](http://city.fremont.gov/evacuation).

In the event of a major emergency such as a wildfire, flood, or tsunami, Fremont residents and visitors may be ordered to evacuate. As depicted in the chart above, there are several levels of a potential evacuation. If an Evacuation Order is issued, it means there is an immediate threat to life safety – and you

must evacuate. The new Hi-Lo warning system will only be utilized in conjunction with an Evacuation Order.

Should the City have time to plan for a potential evacuation, an Evacuation Warning may be issued in advance. If an Evacuation Warning is issued, there's a potential threat to safety and property and all residents should grab essentials and be prepared to leave. Those with pets and livestock, as well as people who need more time to evacuate – such as

older adults and those with disabilities – should consider leaving the area when an Evacuation Warning is issued.

All City of Fremont evacuation information will be posted and remain updated on the City's website at [Fremont.gov](http://Fremont.gov). Additionally, City communication channels such as social media and NextDoor will be utilized in conjunction with emergency alert system to inform the community of emergencies in our area. ### Evacuation Tips for Everyone

#### During an Emergency:

- ✓ Leave the area immediately if there is an Evacuation Order.

- ✓ Carry your wallet, keys, and cell phone with you.
- ✓ Once you are safely out of the area under evacuation, check City of Fremont social for updates and tune in to KCBS 740 AM, KQED 88.5 FM, or other news sources.
- ✓ Stay with friends or relatives, or at other accommodations, if you can. The City may set up shelter for evacuees, but this may take several hours.
- ✓ The City may establish a Temporary Evacuation Point where evacuees can assemble and receive information. This provides a good place for information – and to remain temporarily until the Evacuation Order is lifted or additional temporary

services become available. A Temporary Evacuation Point is typically a parking lot or other public facility, established shortly following the evacuation.

### Evacuation Tips for Older Adults & Individuals with Access & Functional Needs

#### During an Emergency:

- ✓ If an Evacuation Order has been issued, and you cannot evacuate on your own, and no one is available to assist you, call 9-1-1.

#### Before an Emergency:

- ✓ If you are not able to evacuate on your own, arrange for help. For instance, make a list of neigh-

bors who might be able to help you in an emergency, and talk to them in advance. Make plan.

### Evacuation Tips for People with Pets or Livestock

#### During an Emergency:

- ✓ Locate your pets as soon as an Evacuation Warning is given. You may not be able to catch them if there is an advancing wildfire or other threat. Place them in carriers near the front door, with fresh water and extra food.
- ✓ Prepare horses and large animals for transport and consider moving them to a safe location as soon as an Evacuation Warning is given. Moving them to a safe location.

#### Before an Emergency:

- ✓ Be sure your pets wear tags and are registered with microchips.

## Enroll in Community Alert System - AC Alert

The City of Fremont uses a Community Alert System, AC Alert, which is provided by Everbridge. The AC Alert system is Alameda County's Emergency Notification System and is the Mass Notification System for Alameda County. AC Alert provides the ability to deliver emergency alerts and non-emergency notifications to targeted geographic areas or the entire city. AC Alert is an au-

tomated phone calling system that currently contains land-line phone numbers for most residents and businesses.

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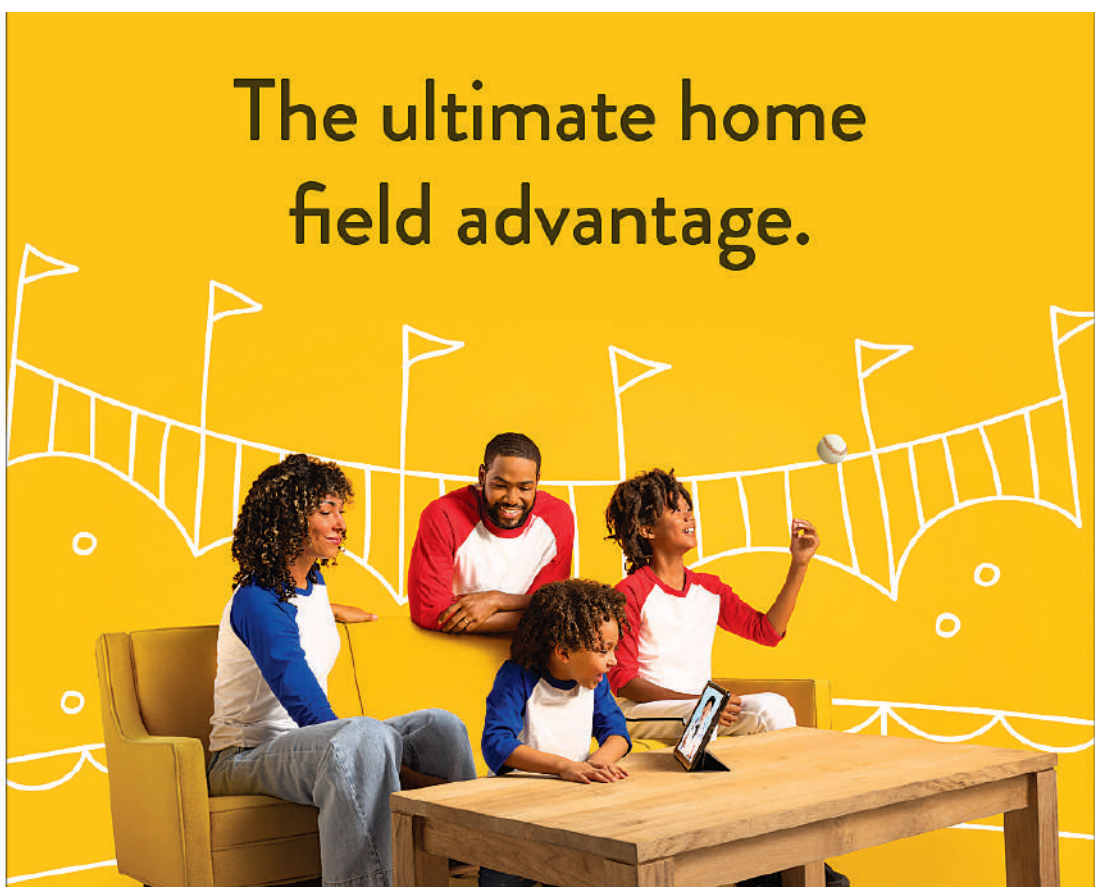

## Plant trees this fall for decades of benefits

Fall is a great time to plant trees in the landscape. The soil is warm and air temperatures are generally cooler, creating a better environment for the tree and the gardener doing the planting. Cooler temperatures promote root growth which helps the tree establish a more robust root system before new growth begins the following spring.

Proper planting as well as timing is important for growing healthy long-lived trees that provide shade, reduce energy costs, help manage storm water and more. Reduce the risk of injury, inconvenience, and expense by calling 811 at least three business days before putting the first shovel in the ground. This free service contacts all the utility companies who will mark the location of the underground utilities in your work area. Look up and avoid planting trees under overhead utilities.

Select trees suited to the growing conditions and those that will fit the available space once they reach full size. Trying to keep a 40-foot-tall tree at 15 feet negatively impacts the tree's natural beauty and requires lots of work on your part.

Once you select the right tree for the location, make sure to give it a safe ride home. Transporting the tree in a pickup truck or trailer is easier for you and better for the tree. If this is not an option, consider spending a bit more money to have the nursery safely deliver your tree.

When transporting your tree, use a tarp to cover the top of the tree to prevent wind

damage to its leaves. Protect the trunk by wrapping it with a towel where it will rest on the vehicle. Always move the tree by the root ball, not the trunk, to prevent damage to the roots.

Keep your tree in a cool, shaded location until planting. Mulch balled-and-burlapped trees with wood chips to help keep their roots moist. Water these and container-grown trees daily or as often as needed to keep roots slightly moist.

Locate the tree's root flare, also called the trunk flare. This is where the main roots angle away from the trunk. Dig the planting hole to the same depth as the distance between the root flare and the bottom of the root ball so the root flare is at or slightly above the soil surface. Digging deeper can result in the soil settling and water collecting in the depression around your tree. Make the hole at least three to five times wider than the root ball.

Roughen the sides of the planting hole to avoid glazed soil that can prevent the roots from growing into the surrounding soil. Carefully remove container-grown trees from the pot and loosen or slice pot-bound and girdling roots circling the trunk and root ball before planting.

Place the tree in the planting hole so the trunk is straight and the tree is facing the desired direction. Remove the tags and twine and cut away any wire baskets and burlap on balled and burlapped trees.

Fill the planting hole with existing soil so the roots adjust to their new environment. Avoid amending the soil, as this encourages the roots to stay in the planting hole instead of moving out into the surrounding soil.



Water thoroughly to settle the soil and moisten the root ball and surrounding soil. Spread a two- to three-inch layer of wood chips or shredded bark over the soil surface surrounding the tree. Pull the mulch back several inches from the trunk. Mulching helps conserve moisture, moderate soil temperature, reduce competition from grass, and prevent weeds. It also keeps tree-damaging mowers and weed whips away from the tree trunk while eliminating the need for you to hand trim.

Only remove broken, damaged, and rubbing branches at the time of planting. Research shows that the more leaves a tree has, the more energy it can produce, and the quicker it develops new roots and recovers from transplant shock. Begin structural pruning in a few years once the tree has adjusted to its new home.

Continue watering as needed. It takes several years for trees to develop a robust

root system that is better able to access water from a larger area. Water thoroughly when the top four to six inches of soil is crumbly and moist. Apply enough water to wet the top twelve inches of soil.

The time you invest in proper planting and care will pay off in years of enjoying the shade, beauty, and other benefits your tree provides.

# Agrihood sits on the fence between urban farming and affordable housing

On Wednesday, September 20, the Agrihood community held its grand opening. This affordable housing complex, built on a former agricultural research and development site (the Bay Area Research and Extension Center for UC Davis, or BAREC), aims to address issues such as homelessness, aging population, community third spaces, and sustainability. The real estate firm The Core Companies oversaw development, and sustainable landscaping company Farmscape manages the farm portion.

Vince Cantore, Vice President, The Core Companies, remarked, "We're incredibly proud to have seamlessly integrated homes, living space, and sustainable agriculture into a tapestry that reflects the diverse needs of our residents and the city of Santa Clara." Although he adds that issues crop up "when you try to build housing in a working farm."

The long list of offices needed to sign off on such a project is reflected in the event's speakers, including: Lisa Gillmor, Santa Clara City Mayor; Noni Ramos, CEO of Housing Trust Silicon Valley; Consuelo Hernandez, Director of Santa Clara Office of Supportive Housing; Susan Ellenberg (via video), Santa Clara County District 4 Supervisor; Preston Prince, Santa Clara County Housing Authority Executive Director; and Anthony Zeto, California Tax Credit Allocation Committee Deputy Executive Director.

Agrihood—containing low income senior and veteran housing—is one of 17 developments in construction out of a total 50 that have been approved since 2017 as part of Measure A, which allows the County to borrow up to \$950 million via bonds to be designated for affordable



housing. At Agrihood, 54 previously unhoused seniors have already moved in.

Although you'll see the words "Urban Farm" featured prominently in Agrihood marketing, and the opening itself was held next to the farm area and decorated with produce and other agriculture paraphernalia, the actual vibe is more of a housing complex with an unusually robust community garden. The 1.5 acres looks especially tiny compared to the 17 acres of farmland BAREC originally devoted to exactly the kind of urban agriculture Agrihood touts. The University of California system sold the land back to the State in 2003, and in spite of community advocacy to keep the space open as a community farm and garden, the area was turned into housing, now with the addition of Agrihood.

This is not to downplay the hard work required by sustainable landscaping company Farmscape to plan and maintain the remaining land, or the need for both accessible community gardens and affordable housing. A Farmscape representative shared that the original

plans included a larger space devoted to farming, which was downscaled in response to community requests for more event space. (Agrihood is expected to host about 50 events per year where residents and the wider community can mingle.)

There is some parking available for residents, and a VTA bus stop right in front. The complex is also walking distance from Valley Fair Mall and Santana Row. Local shopping would still be difficult to navigate for residents with limited mobility, but visitors can easily park nearby.

Some of the elderly residents were present at the ceremony, but sitting by themselves they seemed unmoored among the bustling dignitaries, business people, and reporters. This was their new home and an outdoor plaza for their thriving, but the Grand Opening wasn't set up in a way where they could easily integrate.

During closing remarks, a heckler began voicing his disagreement, and engaged in a verbal altercation with staff, communicating a general distrust of the project and his doubts that it could help him. Inevitably, a project trying to serve a

diverse community with competing interests is going to leave some unsatisfied and disgruntled.

City of Santa Clara Mayor Lisa Gillmor, traces her interest in this kind of project back to even before Measure A. "I'll never forget...there was a community member, Kirk Vartan who stopped by my office and dropped off a book talking about urban farms. I looked at the book, and I looked at the pictures, and I thought 'What is this? How can that ever happen in the City of Santa Clara?'" Vartan was also thanked at the event for his work advocating for the project.

In spite of Santa Clara's agricultural past, Gillmor's question is an apt one. In this age of giant tech companies, skyrocketing housing prices, and overdevelopment, preserving even one small garden in the heart of our cities seems to take a Herculean effort.

# A new 'image' for Fremont

Fremont Cultural Arts Council (FCAC) and City of Fremont Age Well Center at Lake Elizabeth recently unveiled a new piece of public art located at the Center. An 'art banner' measuring 20 x 6 feet with an image of our Bay Area hills and clouds, created by local photographer Ralph Cooksey-Talbott was installed on the Center's exterior wall facing Paseo Padre Parkway.

Julie Gilson, President, FCAC, said, "Increasing art in public spaces is one of the goals of the FCAC. Large format vinyl printing capabilities used to produce this piece provide a way to install art on outside surfaces with relatively low cost and installation effort. Additionally, the art is portable as it can be moved and installed in other locations to be enjoyed by different parts of the community. Finally, adding art elements to exterior surfaces improves the aesthetics of a community, which supports economic development and community mental health." Monica Gloria, Manager of the Center similarly pointed out that "The art banner generates visual interest as people drive by on Paseo Padre."

The banner project was conceived, and is owned and managed by FCAC. A generous portion of the funding was provided by a grant from the local Candle Lighters organization, with the remainder provided by FCAC. Tricia Sparling, President, The Candle Lighters, said, "We are so excited that the banner project for the FCAC is up and in our community. We are happy we

were able to help FCAC with their mission to better our community through art. Candle Lighters work hard each year to put on our Ghost House so that we will be able to fund grants for local non-profits like FCAC. We are so thankful for the community support we receive at the Ghost House each year that allows us to continue helping others."

Local photographer Ralph Cooksey-Talbott, who studied under Ansel Adams in Yosemite and specializes in large format landscape prints, provided the image and consulted on production. He said, "There are a number of different areas I work in, and I tend to think of them as photographic conversations, oftentimes with myself. One of them is the California Hill Country. The image of Garin hills that we have placed on the Age Well Center is from that conversation. My goal in any photograph is to share my visceral impressions of the scene with the viewer. While I can't cover everything, I do tend to get a fair amount in. I view a photograph as a distillation of time into this one incisive moment."

Margaret Thornberry, past president and current board member of the FCAC had this to say: "I'm so glad to see this concept finally made reality, thanks to the Candle Lighters and Monica Grace of the Age Well Center! Ever since the Fremont Bank started building their new headquarters, we have been working to take advantage of the many construction fences around town to showcase the arts in our community. I especially like the local rural scenes of local hills by Ralph Cooksey-Talbott, a

reminder that while Fremont is the 3rd largest city in the Bay Area, there is a wealth of beautiful country all around us."

Julie Gilson concluded by saying, "I am so pleased to bring a local artist's work to the community in this large way, and I hope other property managers and owners will embrace this concept. The FCAC is ready to work with properties to find creative ways to add public art.

Many of our neighboring cities have used art banners to beautify their communities—I believe this is Fremont's first of this scale. I'm grateful to the Candle Lighters, the Age Well Center, and Mr. Cooksey-Talbott for being partners in this project."

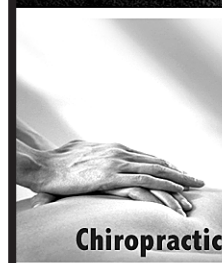
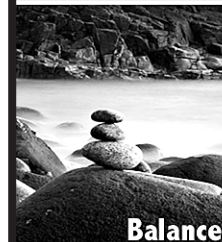

## State and Local Organics Reduction and Recycling Law

Did you know that all residents and businesses in California are required to separate compostable and recyclable materials from landfill materials? This requirement was established by California Senate Bill (SB) 1383, the State's mandatory organics reduction and recycling law, effective January 1, 2022. The law is implemented in Union City

under Municipal Code Chapter 7.24 in partnership with Republic Services, Tri-CED Community Recycling, StopWaste, and the Alameda County Environmental Health Department.

**Why Should I Compost?**

In 2018, 35 million tons of food scraps were disposed in landfills and only 2.6 million tons of food scraps were composted (source: Environmental Protection Agency). When food scraps and other compostable materials such as food-soiled paper and yard trimmings break down in landfills, they produce methane, a harmful greenhouse gas 80x more potent than carbon dioxide. When Union City residents place compostable materials in their green compost cart, they not only reduce methane emissions and address climate change, but they also create compost—a valuable soil amendment that retains moisture, conserves water, and nourishes plants and trees.

Union City residents are provided a Food Scraps Kitchen Pail to conveniently collect food scraps at no additional charge. The Kitchen Pail can be used to collect and transport food scraps and food-soiled paper to your green compost cart. Please contact Republic Services at (510) 657-3500 to request a Kitchen Pail at no additional cost. Remember that other compostable materials such as yard trimmings and untreated wood should also be placed in the compost cart.

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## My friend Dennis

When I began my role as a newspaper publisher, an acquaintance from a previous career came to visit. Dennis was an affable guy who was one of the most intelligent people I ever knew. We were instantly at ease with each other and I was always happy to see him when he would come by my office with his newest business scheme. The amazing thing about our friendship was that we disagreed on almost everything political.

Discussions revolved around how issues could be resolved, rather than whether they existed. For some reason, although both of us were passionate in defense of a position, neither raised his voice or used threatening gestures or verbiage to augment it. In fact,

there were many moments when we were able to not only understand the other's viewpoint, but accept some of its conclusions. In other cases, we agreed to disagree without rancor. At the end of all such meetings, we parted as friends with the intention of further get-togethers.

Dennis passed away many years ago but he remains firmly in my heart and I can still hear his voice asking for a chance to consider his side of political arguments as well as the sometimes silly, fanciful gag ideas. His playfulness was a counterpoint to a tumultuous childhood that helped shape his outlook on the political scene. Understanding his life story helped me to appreciate his perspective. My youth was vastly different and probably helped shape a separate perception. Neither of us was wrong, simply molded in a different way and from different material. Even with that chasm of youthful experience, there was an intrinsic fellowship and warmth that could not be denied.

When I hear comments that contradict my ideas and statements of "facts" without valid data, I thank Dennis for opening my eyes to the kaleidoscope of experiences, ideas and motivations behind them. Before dismissing such ideas out-of-hand, I need to slow down and listen carefully. When I do this, I often agree with many of the complaint and sympathize with the frustration and anger exhibited. It turns out that the goal is often

the same but the means to reach it are at odds. If agreement can be reached on at least one aspect of an argument, it forms the beginning of dialogue, even compromise and, at least, lessening of hostilities. This is the path toward civility that paves the road of meaningful political action. Well prepared arguments, bolstered by a shared set of facts may travel different routes toward a solution, yet find room for common discourse and activity. Without it, chaos reigns.

In these times of dissent and disagreement of what is fact and fiction, there are very serious issues that need to be addressed soberly, with sound logic while preserving individual rights and freedoms, devoid of hysteria. School safety, firearm controls, medical rights and costs, housing availability, climate changes, and immigration control are just a few. The only way to begin to address and solve these issues is frank and clear dialogue.

## San Leandro seeks settlement in excessive force lawsuit

On September 18, San Leandro City Council unanimously approved in closed session a settlement offer of \$201,000 for Sorrell Shiflett. Shiflett sued the city and two San Leandro police officers for excessive force during a 2019 incident.

Shiflett has been mentally disabled since a 2008 traumatic

brain injury. Shiflett was walking with his cousin to find a friend's house one evening when a local resident called the police to report the men as suspicious. When officers Anthony Pantoja and Ismael Navarro arrived and began speaking with him, Shiflett fled.

The officers pursued him, and allegedly struck him with a baton, and tased him. He

suffered brain bleeding leading to strokes and a dislocated shoulder. In this lawsuit, he claims excessive force and unlawful seizure under the Fourth Amendment and failure to reasonably accommodate his disability under Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The report of a neuropsychologist contends that Shiflett is incompetent. He was

diagnosed with major neurocognitive disorder which causes personality changes, and post-traumatic stress disorder. Kelley Davenport, Shiflett's mother, has been appointed his caregiver and guardian ad litem.

# Broncho Billy and Friends Film Festival Honors Niles and Beyond

canyon and western-looking town, films were screened again in a 1913 nickelodeon theater that had long since closed its operations. But for a day, it was alive once again.

That repeated for several years until the opportunity for the committee to turn itself into a non-profit and the now weekend-long annual festivals to make way for weekly screening ventures. Now it's been 110 years since films were made on a weekly basis. Since January of 2005 (pandemics aside), silent films with live musical accompaniment have played on virtually all Saturday nights of each year—thousands of one and two-reelers and feature films.

Charlie Chaplin is showcased with the annual Chaplin Days, and makes monthly appearances in the museum's popular Comedy Shorts Nights. Comedies are a specialty in Niles with names like Chaplin, Buster Keaton,

Harold Lloyd, and Mabel Normand. Other stars on show at the old-timey theater include Mary Pickford, Rudolph Valentino and Douglas Fairbanks, who did their share of lighthearted fare, but can turn on the drama as well.

Twenty-five years of the "Broncho Billy & Friends Silent Film Festival" capitalizes on all of these focuses. This year, throughout the weekend of September 29 through October 1, we will pay homage to the first cowboy movie star Gilbert "Broncho Billy" Anderson—who was also the "A" of Essanay (George Spoor was the "S"). The Essanay Film Manufacturing Company was based in Chicago and also established a western division in Niles from 1912 to 1916. Essanay (aka S & A) in Niles created more than 350 one and two-reel films that were seen worldwide—people across the

globe saw the images filmed right here as the representation of the Old West.

The theater hosts this annual three-day event, which will feature dramas, documentaries, actualities, comedies, all following the theme of Bay Area Filmmaking in the Silent Era. Marin, San Francisco, Pleasanton and Santa Cruz are on display as well as Niles, front and center with westerns from a century ago filmed just down the road to the east and lenticular films from the 1930s shot at the California Nursery just a few blocks to the west.

Saturday's documentary screening "Beyond the Bolex" focuses on the popular Bolex camera. Many hundreds were sold by David Kiehn when he worked as a motion picture camera technician and movie equipment salesperson at the now-defunct Gasser's Theatrical and Photography company in San Francisco. Now the Niles Essanay Silent Film Museum historian, Kiehn is also a filmmaker and writer who knew his way around a Bolex camera. Kiehn is one of the people interviewed for the documentary feature shot by the granddaughter of the camera's inventor.

Sunday's documentary "The Miles Brothers Story" focuses on the only company to have

bi-coastal movie studios in 1906, in both San Francisco and New York. This came in handy when they filmed A Trip Down Market Street unknowingly just four days before the massive quake and fire that is still discussed in detail to this day. The negative of the film (made from very volatile nitrate properties) was on its way to New York to the other office when the great disaster struck. That is the only way it survived. Many facts about the Miles Brothers, who got their start filming 45-round boxing matches in a kind of "pay per view" format, will be discussed including how Kiehn solving a mystery landed him on 60 Minutes being interviewed by newsmen Morley Safer in 2010.

There will also be steam train excursions to see the picturesque canyon where so many Essanay films were shot, and walking tours of San Francisco and Niles showcasing their silent film legacies. And of course—screenings of silent films with Broncho Billy and other old-fashioned stars. Join us in Niles as much more REEL and REAL fun will be had on this special weekend.

# NHSF & SNCCF team up to support special needs students

New Haven Schools Foundation (NHSF) and the Special Need Children's Center Foundation (SNCCF) have teamed up for the second year in a row to provide classroom grants to benefit special needs students.

Three of these programs were funded in May for implementation during the 2023-2024 school year in New Haven Unified School District. The NHSF grant program annually provides funding to teachers for innovative

classroom programs and enrichment activities that improve the academic experience for students, and in 2023, a total of \$104,000 in grant requests were funded through support from a generous community.

SNCCF plays a critical role in ensuring that grant requests to provide for special needs students are given due consideration as part of this process. "We are committed to providing special need children with the resources, environment and support they need to transition to productive, self-sufficient and fulfilling lives as adults," said Zia Oboodiyat, Founder and CEO of SNCCF.

Three projects were funded this year, including classroom furnishings to help preschool students in moderate/severe special ed classes at Alvarado-Elementary School develop the skills needed to listen and learn, as requested by teacher Gabriela McKearin. At Ithiong-Vera Cruz Middle School, teacher Briana Miller asked for athletic equipment for the Special Olympics program, including a team bench for the sidelines.

Since 2022, SNCCF has provided funding for the innovative Colt Brew coffee service, developed by teacher

Jeremy Vitug. The first grant included startup funding to purchase a coffee cart and the initial equipment to establish a vocational skills project for special needs students. Students run the business, from taking custom coffee requests, to preparing the orders, delivering them to customers, and even processing payments. The program was such a success that SNCCF provided second-year funding to replenish supplies for another school year.

"NHSF appreciates the support of community members like Oboodiyat and SNCCF who help us to fulfill unique projects

requests in our schools," said John Shockley, President of NHSF. "Together, our impact on local education is so much greater."

Deb was predeceased by her husband Roger, brother Jay and her parents. She is survived by her sisters Edna (Tedi) and Suzanne.

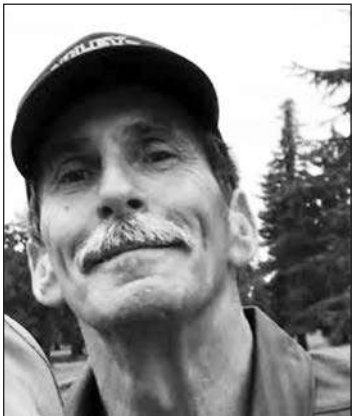

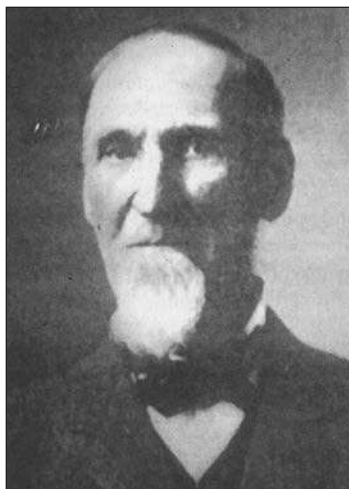
## Tri-City History - Street Names #9: Whipple Road

*Whipple Road: A street that runs west from Mission Boulevard where it transitions into Dyer Street after crossing I-880.*

Whipple Road is named for a pioneering farm family who lived in a large home on a sprawling homestead just outside of the Decoto area of Union City, technically in neighboring Alvarado. The home was located along today's Whipple Road, in what is now an industrial section of the city.

John Cleveland Whipple (born in 1820 in New York State) traveled in 1852-53 via the Panama Canal to San Francisco. He settled there and later relocated to Oakland, and still later to Point Richmond. In 1863, after a year's return to New York, J.C. Whipple returned to California, this time to Alameda County, where he established his 138-acre ranch. There he grew grain and housed a fruit orchard. John was known to be a good man; he was held in high esteem by everyone around him.



The Whipple family was large, and some of John's siblings also traveled to California to make a new life. His brother Charles Elias James Whipple came to California. He and his wife and their family of seven children lived near J.C. Whipple. Charles' son James Ray Whipple (born 1874) grew up in Washington Township



and attended Washington High School.

As happened then and still does today, marriage linked local families together, and another important Whipple came to be. Laura Thane (born 1875), herself the daughter of pioneers Joseph E. and Lida Tilden Thane, attended Washington High School alongside James Whipple. Together they graduated in 1894. They both attended the University of California at Berkeley, and married in 1898. The Whipples moved to near Juneau, Alaska where James worked in mining. In 1914, James suffered a mining injury and passed away. They had no children and Laura never remarried. She returned to Washington Township in 1916 to her childhood home in Niles, located at 38555 Overacker Avenue. The home was built in 1873, and it still stands today (and is currently on the market, for sale at \$13.5 million).

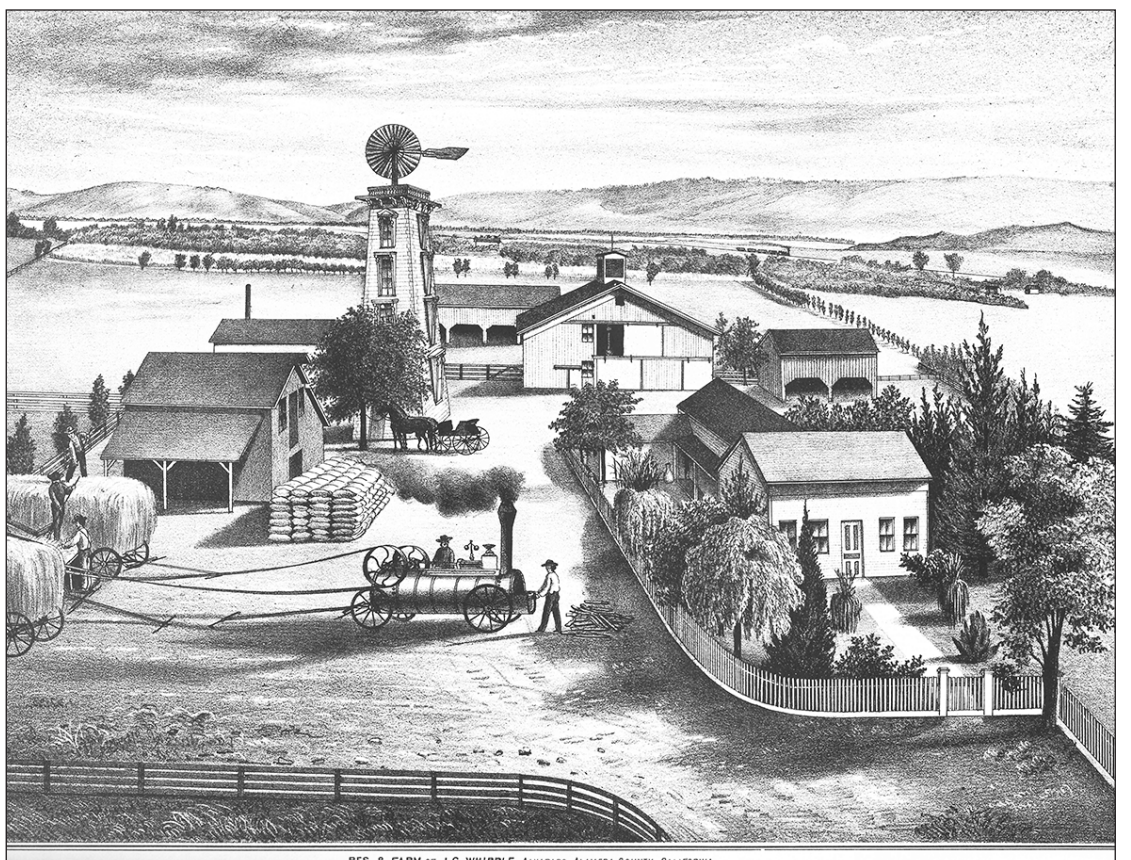
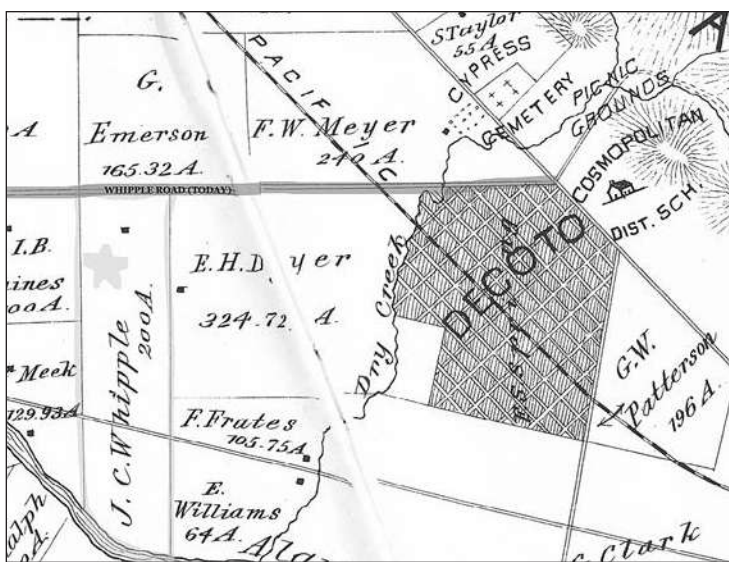
Laura remained in Niles and went on to become known as the "Grand Old Lady" of Washington Township through her many charitable works. Among her various accomplishments on this front are her founding of the local branch of the Children's Hospital

of the East Bay (1916), her fight for the re-routing of Mission Blvd /Highway 238 so that it would avoid ruining the historic foundation of the Vallejo Flour Mill located at the mouth of Niles Canyon (1936), her work on the historic Horner House located at 3073 Driscoll Road in Irvington (1941), and her chairing of the committee to write the second edition of the important local historical text "History of Washington Township" (1950).

One of her most significant contributions to our local history, however, occurred outside of Fremont, Newark and Union City. Many do not know the role she played in securing the land that became Moffett Field. Laura had long been active in local real estate, and in 1928 she heard that the Navy was looking for somewhere to "park" the USS Macon, a rigid airship that operated as a flying aircraft carrier. This American-built naval airship still holds the world record for largest helium-filled rigid airship (along with its sister ship Akron).

For three years, Laura campaigned and raised funds amounting to \$476,000 to purchase 1,000 acres. The final price for the land was \$750,000, and once the area had been purchased, it was deeded to the U.S. Navy for just \$1 in 1931. Two years later, the Macon arrived and the base was commissioned in Mountain View. In 1962, Laura was honored with her own U.S. Navy Aviator wings at a special ceremony at Moffett Field. She lived to be 91 years old.

## San Leandro places Police Chief on leave during investigation

San Leandro Police Chief Abdul Pridgen was placed on paid leave this week while an investigation is conducted into allegations regarding department policy violations. His leave went into effect on September 11, 2023.

During the investigation, Kevin Hart, a Bay Area law enforcement veteran, will serve as Interim Chief. He brings over 35 years of experience in sworn law enforcement, including 15 years in leadership roles with city and county governments and previous experience as a chief of police in two other police agencies. "His extensive background and proven

leadership skills make him an excellent candidate to lead the department while Chief Pridgen is on leave," said Fran Robustelli, San Leandro's city manager.

The investigative firm Kramer Workplace Investigations of Danville will conduct the investigation into the allegations against Chief Pridgen. It's unknown how long the process will take. The investigation will include interviews and a review of various types of documentation. State law dictates many of the next steps, and the city will observe these laws during this process.

Chief Pridgen was appointed in 2021, having served as chief in Seaside, California, and also as command staff in Fort Worth, Texas.

The incident occurred in the 16000 block of Foothill Boulevard in unincorporated San Leandro around 9:30 a.m. A suspect is in custody. This appears to be an isolated incident with no ongoing threat to public safety.

### Sunday, September 17

- ACSO detectives have negotiated the self-surrender of Keita Hasegawa, a former music teacher at Castro Valley High School (CVHS) and Creekside Middle School (prior to employment with CVHS). A bench warrant was issued by Alameda County District Attorney's Office earlier this week for charges related to multiple felony counts of child sexual abuse after ACSO detectives presented their case.

Hasegawa, accused of having an emotional and sexual relationship with a student, began abusing the victim when he was a teacher at Creekside Middle School, where

the victim was a student. The abuse continued until late March 2023 when this investigation began. The victim was attending CVHS at that time.

The investigation into Hasegawa began after CVHS's principal learned that Hasegawa was alone with the victim at her residence after hours. The principal had called Hasegawa by telephone to discuss an upcoming school event. Hasegawa disclosed he was at the victim's home to support her through a mental health crisis. The principal called 911 to report the victim was in crisis after Hasegawa failed to notify anyone of the emergency.

Hasegawa resigned during the investigation after he was placed on administrative leave by CVHS. Once detectives seized Hasegawa's cell phone and later searched it pursuant to a warrant granted, they recovered messages from Hasegawa's phone to support he had been sexually abusing the victim since she was in middle school.

After the case was presented to the District Attorney's Office, Hasegawa was charged with seven felony counts related to child sexual abuse. Hasegawa is currently in custody at Santa Rita Jail pending arraignment.
