The Mineral and Gem Society of Castro Valley (MGSCV) will be presenting its annual three-day show and sale on March 6, 7 and 8 at Newark Pavilion. Anything and everything that has to do with rocks – fossils, gemstones, jewelry and more – will be displayed for all to admire and purchase.

Some highlights of the event include ongoing demonstrations of lapidary skills by club members, and over 40 display cases containing everything from carved turquoise to intarsia to petrified wood. GIA gem identification will be available in Halls 1 and 4 and the NoCAL Geologic Society

will be on hand for rock identification.

Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month:

Early Detection Is Key to Effective Treatment

According to the American Cancer Society (ACS), colorectal cancer is the third most commonly diagnosed form of cancer among American men and women. The ACS estimates that approximately 132,700 cases will be diagnosed in 2015, and as many as 49,700 people will die of the disease this year. Yet the death rate from colorectal cancer has been dropping in both men and women for more than 20 years, in large part because effective screenings are allowing more pre-cancerous polyps and colorectal cancers to be found early, when the disease is easier to cure.

“The key to successfully treating colorectal cancer is early detection,” says Dr. Arun Srivatsa, a gastroenterologist on the medical staff at Washington Hospital. “Cancer in the colon or rectum nearly always starts with an abnormal growth of tissue called a polyp. Finding and removing polyps early may prevent them from becoming cancerous. Even if cancer is found, screenings can detect many cancers early, improving the chances of successful treatment.”

Early colorectal cancer often causes no symptoms, which is why screenings are so important. Generally, anyone aged 50 or older should be screened for colon cancer, since 90 percent of

cases are diagnosed in people older than 50. Because symptoms of colorectal cancer typically occur only when the cancer is more advanced, the absence of symptoms should not be a reason to delay or ignore cancer testing.

Anyone who has the following symptoms – especially if they are over age 40 – should consult a physician:

- A change in bowel habits, such as diarrhea or constipation, that lasts for more than a few days.
- Bleeding from the rectum or in the stool.
- Stools that are narrower than usual.
- Unexpected weight loss with no known reason.
- Cramping or gnawing stomach pain.
- Decreased appetite.
- Weakness and fatigue.
- Jaundice (yellowish color of the skin and the whites of the eyes).

Presence of these symptoms does not necessarily mean you have cancer, but it's best to check with your doctor and to find out if you need to schedule a screening.

“There are various screening tests for colorectal cancer, but the best, most comprehensive screening is a colonoscopy,” says Dr. Srivatsa. “With a colonoscopy, we can detect pre-cancerous polyps –

growths on the wall of the large intestine – and also remove them at the same time. This prevents them from turning into cancer in the future. Tests that only detect cancer, such as the fecal occult blood test that measures blood in the stool, or barium-enema x-rays, don't allow for removing polyps.”

In a colonoscopy, a thin, flexible tube with a miniature camera is inserted through the rectum into the colon, allowing the doctor to look at the inside of the large intestine. During the procedure, the patient is under moderate sedation – a type of anesthesia – and is un-

aware of what's happening. Flexible sigmoidoscopy is a similar procedure that allows doctors to view and remove polyps, but it only views about the first half of the colon, instead of the entire colon. Plus, anesthesia is generally not used for sigmoidoscopy, so there may be some discomfort during the procedure.

“In my opinion, doing a sigmoidoscopy is a bit like doing a mammogram only on one side and not the other,” Dr. Srivatsa explains. “The worst part of either a colonoscopy or sigmoidoscopy usually is preparing for it, because you have to take medication the night before to clean out the colon and you may need an enema that morning. Since you have to do the same preparation for either procedure, you might as well have the doctor view the entire colon.”

Why Wait? March Is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month!

The risk of developing colorectal cancer increases as you age. And, unfortunately, colorectal cancer generally does not produce any symptoms until the disease is fairly advanced. That's why the ACS and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) both recommend colonoscopy screenings at least every 10 years for people over age

50. It is considered a preventive exam that is covered by most insurance providers.

“People who are at a higher risk for colorectal cancer should be screened at an earlier age and be screened more often,” Dr. Srivatsa advises. “You also should be aware of various risk factors that can increase your risk of developing colorectal cancer, including a personal or family history of colon cancer, intestinal polyps, inflammatory bowel disease or ulcerative colitis.”

- Some other risk factors for colorectal cancer include:
- Lack of regular physical activity.
 - Smoking.
 - Obesity.
 - Excessive alcohol consumption.
 - A diet made up mostly of high-fat foods such as red meat or processed meats and lacking in fruits, vegetables and whole grains.

“People who have a family history of colorectal cancer, with either a parent or a sibling who has been diagnosed, should be screened every three to five years,” says Dr. Srivatsa. “Plus, they should start screenings 10 years before the age of onset in their parent or sibling, or at age 40 – whichever is earlier.

Ceremonial Groundbreaking for Washington Hospital's Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion

More than 300 people turned out last week to celebrate the groundbreaking for the new Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion at Washington Hospital.

"Today, we are making history," Nancy Farber, Washington Hospital Healthcare System Chief Executive Officer told the enthusiastic crowd. "This is the largest public works project in the

history of the Washington Township Health Care District."

And, she added, "as with the original hospital building which opened in 1958, this new building is being built with funds the residents of Washington Township have provided."

Named for the founder of Fremont Bank, the new building will house a new and expanded emergency department, a state-

of-the-art intensive care unit and an advanced coronary care unit.

The new emergency department will be approximately four times the size of the current facility, which was built more than 50 years ago and intended to serve 16,000 patients a year. Currently, more than 50,000 patients annually go to the emergency room, second only to Highland Hospital in Oakland in terms of volume in Alameda County.

"With the new, larger emergency department, we will be able to apply to become a Regional Trauma Center," Farber said. "This means that residents who require trauma-level care will receive their care right here at our hospital and not have to leave the community."

The new building will have three floors, providing more space for the new intensive care and critical care units. The new units will house 48 beds as compared to the current 28-bed capacity. All the rooms will be private and larger in size.

The building also will provide space for an additional 68 private medical/surgical beds and adjacent support space. With the additional beds, the hospital will be able to convert many of the dual-occupancy rooms in the existing hospital to private rooms.

The pavilion will meet California's stringent (unfunded) seismic safety mandate. It will be supported by a sophisticated "base isolation" structural system that will allow the building, in an earthquake, to move horizontally and/or allow for some vertical building displacement. The "base isolation" system is designed to allow the pavilion to continue to operate during and after an earthquake — essential for a hospital.

Mobility for Child with Broken Leg and Preventing Stomach Flu While on Vacation

Dear Doctor,
My 4-year-old son broke his leg and we are having trouble finding ways to help him be mobile without carrying him. Do you have any suggestions?

Dear Reader,
At this age it can be difficult to find the perfect solution. Crutches are challenging but I would start there. With some practice he is likely to master the skill. A wagon is helpful as is a Step2 Push Around Buggy that he can push along with his good leg. A small rolling stool with bottom tray is good as long as it offers some support for his injured leg. The best mode of transport would be a jogging stroller with footrest although small wheelchairs are also an option.

Dear Doctor,
It seems as though every time we go on vacation one of my children gets the stomach flu and passes it along to other family members. Can you suggest ways to prevent this?

Dear Reader,
There are no scientific methods to prevent the stomach flu, but some ideas that may help if you have little ones include: covering their hands with mittens so items on dirty floors aren't picked up and placed into the mouth, paying attention that siblings aren't sharing food or drink, using hand wipes or antiseptic gel before and after every meal and bathroom stop, and cleaning toys and books often. There are also a variety of probiotics that promote intestinal immunity. A dose a day for a few days in advance of and during the trip may also help to ward off the evil bugs.

Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month:

Early Detection Is Key to Effective Treatment

“People who exhibit possible symptoms of colorectal cancer should not hesitate to request a screening right away,” he adds. “I have seen several young patients with normal risk factors who sought screenings because of unusual symptoms. One young man in his mid-20s had rectal bleeding. A colonoscopy discovered five pre-cancerous polyps. A young mother who was experiencing lower abdominal pain and alternating constipation and diarrhea also had pre-cancerous polyps that were discovered via colonoscopy.”

Dr. Srivatsa notes that colorectal cancer affects women as often as men, but he has noticed that some women, as well as a few men, seem hesitant to go for colonoscopy screenings because they fear embarrassment.

“At Washington Hospital, we try to make the colonoscopy experience comfortable and as pleasant as possible,” he says. “Women should know that we always have a female nurse present

during the procedure. You should expect to be treated well and have your concerns taken seriously. Of course, the bowel cleansing preparation ahead of time may not be a pleasant prospect, but the actual colonoscopy is not unpleasant. I had one patient tell me, ‘If I had known it was going to be this easy, I wouldn’t have hesitated.’ This truly is a test that can save your life.”

Cortese has served on the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors since 2008, and in January of this year, was elected to serve as the 2015 Board President. He also chairs the Board's housing, land use, environment and transportation committee.

MTC's Commission also serves as the governing board of the Bay Area Toll Authority and the Service Authority for Freeways and Expressways, and Commissioner Cortese will chair those as well.

Subaru Legacy: Building Long Term Relationships

The Legacy has been Subaru's midsize sedan offering for decades, and the redesigned 2015 model is the most competitive one ever. It brims with

averages a significant 7 mpg better Combined fuel economy. The 2.5i rates 26 City, 36 Highway and 30 Combined per the EPA. I averaged 25.3 mpg. The 3.6R's numbers are 20, 29 and 23 respectively.



practical, efficient, and unpretentious design and features that have made Subaru's range of sedans, wagons and crossovers successful over the years.

The largest Legacy ever, it's marginally more spacious inside than the competition, which includes the Honda Accord and Toyota Camry. All of these cars have grown over the years to become the roomy family sedans of today. At 104.6 cubic feet, the Legacy feels cavernous, especially with its horizontally themed design.

Despite being brand new, there's a sense of tradition and solidity to its no-nonsense interior. There's more padding, stitching here and there, and nice accents that render it the most luxurious feeling Legacy ever.

As usual, you can choose a four- or six-cylinder engine, both of the boxer variety. That means they are flat, with horizontally-opposed pistons and are in neither an inline nor a V configuration, like other cars. This gives them a slightly different sound, but otherwise, you'll never know or care.

Both engines use Subaru's Lineartronic continuously-variable automatic transmission. I noticed that Drive sometimes took a second to engage after I backed out of my driveway, but it was otherwise unobtrusive. Power goes to the front wheels, but the standard Active Torque Split Symmetrical all-wheel-drive system routes power to the rear wheels when it detects slippage, for extra safety and security. Every Subaru, except for the rear-wheel-drive BRZ sports car (co-developed with Toyota), comes with all-wheel drive standard.

The 2.5-liter four-cylinder, as in my Twilight Blue Metallic 2.5i test car, puts out 175 horsepower and 174 lb.-ft. of torque, which seems sufficient for a 3,455-pound vehicle. The 3.6R model dishes out 256 horsepower and 247 lb.-ft. of torque. Drive both to see if you need the extra power, because the four-cylinder

The four-cylinder models come in plain 2.5i, 2.5i Premium, or 2.5i Limited. My tester



was a 2.5i Premium model, with nice items like a 10-way power driver's seat; dual-zone climate control; heated seats, mirrors and windshield de-icer; an upgraded audio system; air filtration; a leather-wrapped steering wheel; and fog lights.

The Limited model adds even more—in fact, it's the fanciest Legacy ever. You get perforated leather seating with two-position driver's seat memory, heated rear seats, rear air conditioning vents and a super Harman/kardon surround sound stereo system. The audio in my 2.5i Premium tester wasn't bad either, although I found an odd quirk that when I used the volume knob on the left, I sometimes bumped the smooth touch screen behind it and changed stations unintentionally.

As part of its overall upgrade for 2015, the Legacy gets better noise reduction and sound isolation. They added a new acoustic windshield, liquid-filled engine mounts, thicker panels in some locations, and more foam insulation and floor damping materials.

Subaru has always offered some things that no-one else thought to provide. There's a PIN access (like an ATM) which lets you lock your keys in the car—intentionally—in cases where you want to, say, go out for a jog and not carry them along. And as before, Subaru gives you its traditional hill holder, which keeps

you from rolling back when stopped on a hill, and also Incline Start Assist.

New cars are filled with high-tech features for efficiency, enjoy-

ment, and safety. Subaru offers the EyeSight driver-assist system in Premium and Limited trims. It uses stereo camera technology to combine adaptive cruise control, pre-collision braking and vehicle lane departure warning systems. With EyeSight, you also get Steering-Responsive Fog Lights. When the headlamps are set to Auto and the fog lights are off, the car automatically switches on the left or right light when you're turning at night, to illuminate the way.

With all of its content, the Legacy seems like a bargain, with pricing starting at \$22,490 for the four-cylinder 2.5i model. The 2.5i Limited starts at \$27,290, with the 3.6R Limited six-cylinder topping out at \$30,390. All prices include delivery.

Subaru has had remarkable success, weathering the economic crisis better than other brands, and it continues to flourish today. Rather than dazzling car shoppers with flash and trendiness, Subaru does it with solid quality, stylish but not overwrought designs, comprehensive safety features, affordable pricing, and a consistent identity throughout its lineup. Built in Lafayette, Indiana, the new Legacy has traditional Japanese build quality (and engine/transmission), but a feel for American tastes and needs. Their advertising talks about love; they are referring to long-term relationships, not infatuation.

For the eighth year in a row, students from Hopkins Junior High School in Fremont, Calif., will represent California at the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE's) National Science Bowl in Washington, D.C. The team won the Sandia National Laboratories Regional Middle School Science Bowl at Las Positas College on Saturday, Feb. 21. "I am very proud of our team," said Hopkins coach Anja Crickmore. "They did a great job coming from behind and winning tough matches to win the competition."

The Hopkins Junior High School team will receive an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., to compete against top teams across the nation at the DOE National Science Bowl in late April. The school has won the DOE National Science Bowl two times – in 2009 and 2012. In 2010, 2011, and 2013, Hopkins finished in third place.

DOE created the National Science Bowl in 1991 to encourage students to excel in math and science and pursue careers in related fields. More than 200,000 students have participated in the National Science Bowl since its inception. Dollar Drag: surging buck hits US corporate earnings

NEW YORK (AP) — The biggest obstacle for Coca-Cola and Pepsi these days isn't tied to taste tests, the declining popularity of sugary drinks or even their century-long rivalry. It's the surging U.S. dollar.

The two soda giants rely on overseas customers for roughly half of their revenue. When they turned in their quarterly results last week, both reported a drop in sales. The strong dollar made all the difference: strip it out and shrinking sales suddenly rise.

The dollar has been a source of constant complaint this earnings season. Global corporations from Avon Products to Yum Brands have said their quarterly results would have been much better if it hadn't been for the rising dollar. For some, the currency's strength has meant the difference between a profit and a loss.

"It has really hit earnings," said Jack Ablin, chief investment officer at BMO Private Bank.

Over the past year, the dollar has climbed 18 percent against major currencies. The surging dollar and plunging oil prices are the main reasons analysts keep cutting their forecasts for corporate profits even though economists expect the U.S. economy to pick up speed.

Back in October, analysts estimated that companies in the Standard & Poor's 500 index would post profit growth of 11 percent for the final three months of 2014. That forecast now looks overly optimistic. With only a handful of companies left to report, corporate profits are on track to rise more than 7 percent, according to S&P Capital IQ.

Forecasts for this year have taken a much bigger hit. In December, for example, analysts projected that profits would increase 9 percent in the first quarter. Today, they expect them to shrink more than 2 percent over that same period.

A strong U.S. dollar might seem like a badge of honor, a reflection of U.S. economic power in the global economy, but for much

of Corporate America, it's bad for business. Almost half of all revenue for companies in the S&P 500 comes from outside the United States, mainly Europe and Asia. So when the dollar rises against the euro, it hurts in two ways: Prices of American-made goods become more expensive to customers in Europe, and goods that move off foreign shelves translate into fewer dollars, showing up as lower revenues and earnings on quarterly financial reports.

Take Avon Products, a company that depends on customers in Latin America for nearly half of its sales. Last week, the cosmetics company reported that its revenue fell 12 percent and adjusted earnings sank 41 percent. Erase the dollar's move against foreign currencies and the picture looks entirely different. Revenue would have climbed 5 percent, and adjusted earnings would have soared 29 percent.

At Procter & Gamble, revenue fell 4 percent in the quarter but would have increased 2 percent if the dollar had stayed put. And the maker of Tide detergent and Pampers diapers doesn't think the drag from the dollar is over yet. It estimates that the currency's rise will shave \$1.4 billion from its profit over the course of the full year.

"This is the most significant fiscal year currency impact we have ever incurred," said P&G's chief financial officer, Jon Moeller, in a conference call discussing the latest results.

The list of companies complaining of currency swings includes nearly every major industry. Microsoft, Google and other tech giants have taken a hit along with Bristol Myers Squibb, Pfizer and other drugmakers. Even Apple, which turned in a record profit of \$18 billion in its latest quarter, said the rising dollar cost the company \$2 billion in sales. Electric-car maker Tesla, the hotel chain Hilton, and the navigation device maker Garmin have joined the ranks of the dollar debilitated. On Thursday, Wal-Mart slashed its sales forecast for the rest of the year in half, largely because of the dollar.

"A lot of the companies I follow have cut their earnings guidance for the year, and it was all a result of FX," said Bill Stone, chief investment strategist at PNC Asset Management, using Wall Street's shorthand for currency moves — foreign exchange. "It wasn't their underlying business that was the problem. It was just FX."

Overseas sales used to provide a boost to U.S. companies. When the economy floundered during the Great Recession, firms expanded their businesses abroad, harnessing faster growth across Asia and South America.

What once looked like a prudent move, however, has come back to bite them. U.S. economic growth is outpacing Europe and Japan, and growth in China and other emerging giants has cooled off. The result: a rising U.S. currency and falling revenue for U.S. companies.

Most analysts on Wall Street believe the dollar will continue gaining against the euro and Japanese yen. Jim Paulsen, chief investment strategist at Wells Capital Management, said those expectations are based on the idea that Europe will continue to struggle. What if Europe's recent efforts to revive its economy work? Paulsen said it could knock the dollar down, easing the burden for big U.S. companies.

Last month, the European Central Bank launched a stimulus effort that sent the euro to record lows against major currencies. That might sound like a bad thing, but it could actually turn things around. The euro's drop means that European goods are cheaper for overseas buyers. That could give a boost to countries with big export industries, such as Germany and Italy, and help pull the region out of its long slump. If that happens, the euro should start recovering, sapping strength from the U.S. dollar.

"Everybody right now seems convinced that the dollar is going to stay strong," Paulsen said. "But I think that a weaker dollar is the story this year. That will be the real surprise."

New group will focus on homeless

The Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors unanimously created a Task Force charged with focusing on solutions to the immediate housing needs of the more than 7,000 homeless families and individuals across Santa Clara County. The action was taken at the February 24 Board meeting.

Co-Chaired by Matthew Mahood, President and CEO of the San Jose Silicon Valley Chamber of Commerce, and Ben Field, Executive Officer of the South Bay Labor Council, the Housing Task Force will include Supervisors Mike Wasserman and Cindy Chavez, a representative from the City of San Jose chosen by the Mayor, a member of the Cities Association of Santa Clara County, a member of a State Legislative delegation, a representative of the Santa Clara County Housing Authority, a representative of the Housing Trust Silicon Valley and a representative from the Santa Clara Valley Water District.

But just as important, the Task Force will reach out to people who are homeless or have been homeless, service providers who care for the homeless and other stakeholders so they can contribute their expertise and experience to the Task Force mission during the 10-month process.

The Housing Task Force will identify the area's most critical needs and feasible solutions that can be launched in the short term, with particular attention to homeless military veterans, children and foster youth. The members will be guided by the Community Plan to End Homelessness, which was recently approved by the Board of Supervisors.

The Task Force will meet monthly, with a report due to the Board of Supervisors by December 31.

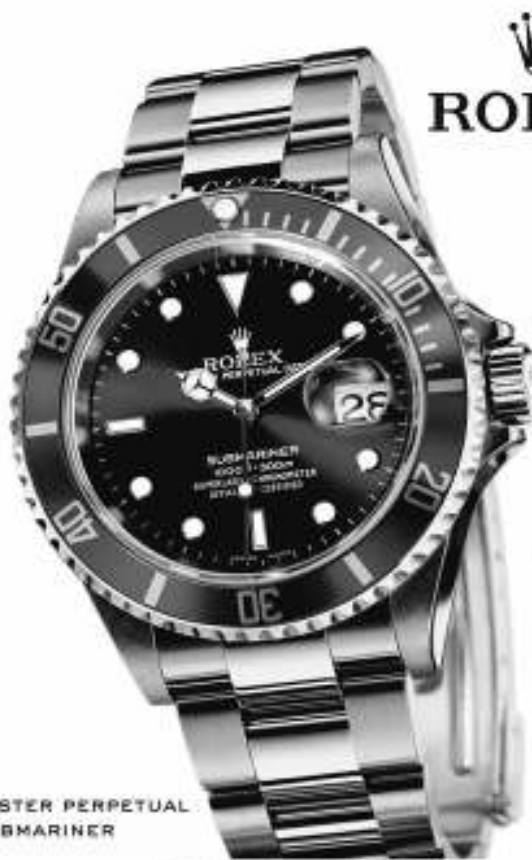

Tech stocks soaring again, but with stronger wings this time

NEW YORK (AP)—Whenever you hear, “this time is different,” the wise move is usually to ignore it.

But when it comes to technology stocks, which are flying at levels unseen since the dot-com boom was about to go bust, mutual-fund managers are insisting that this time really is different. And they're largely right.

The Nasdaq composite index is trading near its record level set in 2000, but the lofty level is better supported this time. Tech companies are more profitable, and they're paying dividends. Analysts are judging them based on how much cash they generate rather than how many eyeballs they attract on the Internet. And investors are now only mildly interested in tech funds, instead of clamoring for them.

That means fund managers don't expect a repeat of what happened the last time the Nasdaq was this high, when the index went on to plunge nearly 80 percent in less than three years. And strategists along Wall Street, from Goldman Sachs to Deutsche Bank, say technology remains one of the more attractive sectors of the market.

To be sure, warning signs are flashing that the overall stock market may be too

expensive. The Standard & Poor's 500 index is trading at close to its highest level in a decade relative to its earnings. And particularly high valuations for pockets of the tech sector are making bargain-hunting investors wince, such as the hot social-media and big-data arenas. But fund managers say big, well-established tech stocks still look ready to deliver more gains.

Consider Paul Meeks, who may have more reason than anyone to steer clear. In 2000 he was running the Merrill Lynch Internet Strategies fund, which launched the same month that the Nasdaq peaked. The fund started with more than \$1 billion in assets but lasted less than two years before it merged with another fund as the dot-com bubble deflated.

“I learned from the lashes on my back, from making mistakes,” Meeks says.

He's now portfolio manager of the Sextant Growth fund, which can invest in stocks from any sector, not just Internet-related companies, and can sell stocks and move into cash if things look too expensive. But Meeks still keeps a big chunk of his fund in technology stocks, about 25 percent at the end of last year. Some of his biggest holdings include Apple and Facebook. The fund ranked in the top 17 percent of its category in 2014, Meeks' first full year at the helm.

Among the reasons managers say tech is much better positioned now than in 2000:

— PROFITS ARE BIGGER.

Tech companies slashed costs to improve profitability after the dot-com bubble burst. “Tech spent the better part of the last decade in its own private recession,” says Josh Spencer, portfolio manager of the T. Rowe Price Global Technology fund. “Tech frankly kind of grew up while nobody was looking at it.” The sector is reaping the benefits. Tech companies kept about 18 cents of every \$1 in revenue as operating profit last year, more than any other sector and nearly double the average for the S&P 500.

— VALUATIONS ARE BETTER.

The price of a stock generally depends on how much profit a company generates and how much investors will pay for it. Because tech companies are earning much more than in 2000, their price-earnings ratios look much more reasonable. Cisco Systems, for example, trades at 18 times its earnings per share over the last 12 months, versus 270 times in March 2000. As a group, technology stocks are among the least expensive in the market. Only the telecom and financial sectors have lower prices relative to their expected earnings.

— DIVIDENDS EXIST.

In 2000 dividends were seen as a sign of weakness. Investors wanted all available cash to fund more growth. Perceptions have changed. Technology is now the biggest dividend payer of the 10 sectors that make up the S&P 500 and has a yield of 1.5 percent.

— INVESTORS ARE MORE SKEPTICAL.

In 2000 investors scrambled into tech stock funds, and the demand pushed valuations ever higher. Investors are now more circumspect. They put a net \$1.8 billion into tech mutual funds and exchange-traded funds over the last year, according to Morningstar. That's less than went into such niche categories as global real estate or gold mining stocks.

Of course, the growth potential that technology stocks offer also comes with big price swings. New technologies are constantly making older ones obsolete, leading to more volatility.

During the dot-com bubble, people were too exposed to something that should have been a sideline to the portfolio rather than the core, says Meeks, who says he too lost money when the Merrill Lynch Internet Strategies fund fell.

That's why managers suggest keeping tech stocks as only a portion of a diversified portfolio, not as its centerpiece.

Some California farmers to go without federal water

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—For a second straight year, the federal government said Friday it won't send any of its reservoir water to the Central Valley, forcing farmers in California's agricultural heartland to again scramble for other sources or leave fields unplanted.

Many farmers had been bracing for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation's announcement as California's drought enters its fourth year. Some farms are exempt from complete cuts under California's antiquated water rights system dating to Gold Rush-era days.

But many farmers are running out of short-term options such as uprooting orchards and tapping groundwater wells to deal with water shortages.

“They were able to Band-Aid things together last year just to keep their trees alive,” said Ryan Jacobson, executive director of the Fresno County Farm Bureau. “The first aid kit we had last year is really not available this year.”

The Central Valley Project conveys water through a system of dams and reservoirs and 500 miles of canals. The agency says it can irrigate up to a third of California's agricultural land when water is flowing.

When planning deliveries, the federal government has mandatory obligations to farms and communities holding senior water rights, including the city of Sacramento, and wildlife refuges protected by federal law to restore fish habitats, said Ron Milligan, a Central Valley Project operations manager.

Agriculture ends up bearing much of federal water cuts during dry periods. Farmers in the San Joaquin Valley only received 10 percent of their requested amounts in 2009 and 20 percent in 2013. Two consecutive years of no allocations is unprecedented.

Farmers are instead turning to storage supplies and pumping from largely unregulated groundwater wells that are quickly being depleted.

Paul Betancourt spent \$40,000 to renovate wells on his 765-acre west Fresno County farm, where his family grows cotton, almonds, wheat and onions. He can keep watering his crops this year but says groundwater isn't a long-term solution.

“We are draining a finite supply of water,” he said. “It was ugly last year, and it's going to get uglier this year.”

California has a separate state-operated system of reservoirs and canals with fewer mandatory obligations that increased distribution this year. The State Water Project announced last month that it could provide local agencies and farmers 15 percent of the water they requested, up from 5 percent last year.

Some communities and endangered wildlife that rely on federal water will receive some water but still suffer cuts. Urban areas, including the San Francisco Bay Area and Sacramento area, will receive a quarter of typical water allotments but could receive more if public health is threatened.

The water in the snowpack, California's primary water source, is at a fifth of its normal level, according to state officials. Federal officials said they don't expect a snow survey next week to show improved conditions.

Paul Wegner, president of the California Farm Bureau Federation, said the federal government's announcement is another sign California needs to speed up construction of water storage projects and reform laws requiring the government to prioritize water to preserve fish species and the environment.

“It's maddening because California still struggles to manage water wisely and flexibly, especially in dry years,” he said in a news release.

Motorola aims new phone at first-time smartphone buyers

NEW YORK (AP)—Motorola is updating its low-cost smartphone, the Moto E, as it targets first-time smartphone buyers worldwide.

Among the improvements over last year's model: The camera now has auto-focusing, whereas the older model had a fixed-focus lens that didn't compensate for how far away the subject was. The new Moto E will also have a front-facing camera for selfies, though images won't be as sharp as the 5 megapixels on the rear. There's also a model with 4G cellular connectivity. Last year's model was available only for slower, 3G networks.

In the U.S., Motorola will target prepaid customers, as well as those looking to buy children their first smartphones. The 4G model will cost \$150 in the U.S., while the 3G will go for \$120, both without contract requirements. The screen measures 4.5 inches diagonally, slightly larger than before.

Motorola, which Lenovo Group bought from Google Inc. in October, has been trying to set itself apart from other phone makers by selling cheaper phones that have some features found in higher-end products. For instance, all of its phones use Corning's Gorilla Glass for durability.

“Even in developed markets, a large percentage of the population isn't on a smartphone,” Rick Osterloh, Motorola's CEO, said in an interview. “This category represents the biggest growth area.”

Motorola, which is headquartered in Chicago, announced its new phone Wednesday ahead of next week's Mobile World Congress in Barcelona, Spain. Samsung, HTC and others are expected to unveil their spring lineups at the show. Sony also announced a budget phone this week for 129 euros (\$146), though there's no plan to sell it in the U.S. LG announced four mid-range smartphones. Details on prices and U.S. availability weren't immediately revealed.

Giving blood can help save donors

Everyone knows giving blood can help save patients' lives, but sometimes it can help save donors' lives too. Hayward resident, Dorothy Schmitt, is one such donor.

Schmitt confesses she did not donate blood very often, although she meant to give more frequently. A few years ago, she received a call from American Red Cross asking her to donate as blood was especially needed at the time. For some reason, she had a feeling that she should donate and Schmitt made an appointment to give at the American Red Cross Fremont-Newark Blood Donation Center.

Before giving blood, health historians make sure that it will be safe for the potential donor to make a donation through a screening process, which includes something akin to a mini-physical – checking temperature, blood pressure and hemoglobin level. During her health history to determine that it was safe to give, Schmitt's blood pressure was very low. The abnormally low blood pressure meant that Schmitt couldn't donate that day and Red Cross staff recommended that she see a doctor soon.

Schmitt's doctor sent her to a cardiovascular to have an echocardiogram. Schmitt still felt fine and was not given any restrictions. When she returned from an out-of-town trip, there were multiple messages on her answering machine telling her that she had a life-threatening condition and should go to the hospital immediately.

After checking into Oakland's Summit Medical Center, Schmitt was diagnosed with an aortic aneurysm, a swelling of the largest blood vessel in the body, which brings oxygen from the heart to the rest of the body. It is a very serious condition because an aneurysm can rupture without notice, causing sudden death. Schmitt's aneurysm was already 30 percent larger than the point when doctors would recommend operating. She had surgery immediately and has made a full recovery.

What could have happened if Schmitt hadn't decided to donate blood? She ponders, "If they hadn't caught that...I shudder to think..." before trailing off. Fortunately, she did decide to donate blood, and her condition was caught and remedied.

Espaliers

Practical and Artistic

An espalier can be either a work of landscape art or a very practical method of growing fruit trees in a narrow space. Many homes have long narrow planters next to fences or structure walls, which are ideal places to grow an espalier. If the fence or wall faces the south or west and absorbs a lot of solar radiation, that's ideal for heat loving varieties of plants.

Camellia sansanqua, Saucer or Star Magnolias, Japanese Maple, Flowering Quince or Crabapple, and Hibiscus.

Many fruit trees can be trained as espaliers, however, the most common ones are apples and pears. Other varieties, such as figs, peaches, plums, apricots, and citrus, may be successful, but require more training, or be better suited to a less rigorous



Espalier is an ancient form of pruning trees in a two-dimensional plane against a flat surface, like a wall or fence. The name is derived from the Italian word "Spalliera" and dates back to the Roman Empire. The practice became popular in medieval Europe as a means of growing heat-loving fruit in marginal climates. The reflected heat from the south or west facing wall highly encourages fruit production, and also provides some frost protection.

Many types of shrubs and trees can be trained into espaliers, using simple cordons to form a hedge or wall covering. They can also be trained into the form of a candelabra or intricate designs, such as a Belgian Weave. Almost any kind of deciduous tree can be espaliered. You might want to consider a plant that produces attractive flowers. Often used plants include

style of pruning. Espaliered fruit trees are more productive than other forms that occupy the same space. There is a botanical reason for this: branches that are growing horizontally are more likely to produce fruiting spurs than branches that are growing vertically. Vertical branches are more naturally inclined to produce leaves and stem shoots.

Start with semi-dwarf nursery trees. Inexpensive bare-root trees sold in winter work very well. Plant them several feet apart in a straight line. The exact spacing is not critical, but commonly it is six to 10 feet apart. If you are planting several trees, try to find varieties that fruit at different times of the year; for example apples: Gala – early, Golden Delicious – mid-season, and Fuji – late. The Sunset Western Garden Book is a good source of information in choosing the right varieties for you.

Espaliers can be trained on a trellis, but they are also commonly trained on wires. Some people attach screw eyes or bolts directly to the wall or fence. If you do so, choose hardware that is long enough to keep the branches six inches away from the structure. Those who are squeamish about attaching things to their house walls can install a free-standing support system. Two or more 4 x 4 posts, redwood or pressure-treated fir, are installed vertically, then a wire is strung between them (also using screw eyes or bolts). Tension can later be added to the wire by installing small turnbuckles, readily available at all hardware stores.

The horizontally trained branches are called "cordons." The number and heights of the horizontal cordons are up to you. A single cordon system

might be only two feet tall. A double could be four feet tall, and a triple six feet tall. Remember the taller the system the more securely the posts need to be anchored to the ground. For a single cordon you can use a four foot post, one and a half feet buried and two and a half feet above ground. For a double cordon use a six foot post, two feet buried and four feet above ground. For a triple use a six foot post, two feet buried and six feet above ground.

Taller cordons will probably need to have concrete poured around the posts in order to securely anchor them to the ground. There is an old farm method that makes this easier than it sounds. Bury the bottom six to 12 inches of the post with dirt. Pour a half sack of dry

fence post concrete mix in the hole around the post, add water, and keep the post propped up plumb for several days while the water is absorbed and the concrete sets. That is much easier than mixing concrete.

It takes about three years to train an espalier, so consider this an on-going hobby. After the third year, you will need to remove the new growth annually. Although you might not enjoy the fruits of your labor for three or four years, you will have the satisfaction that

you have created a horticultural work of art.

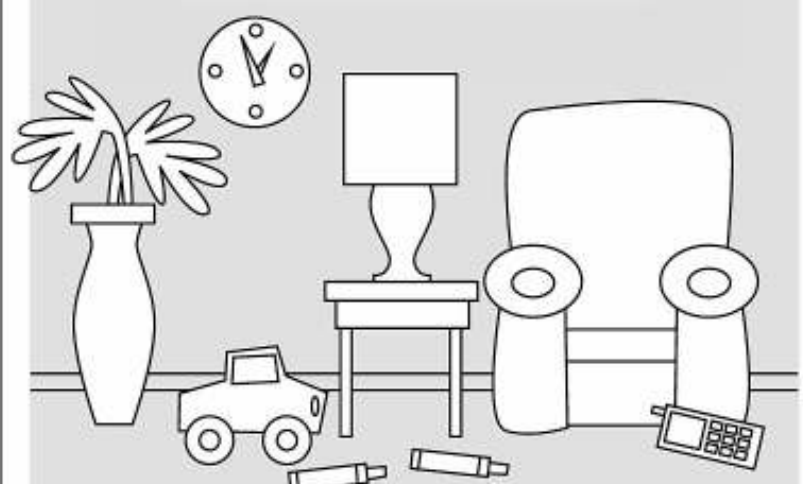

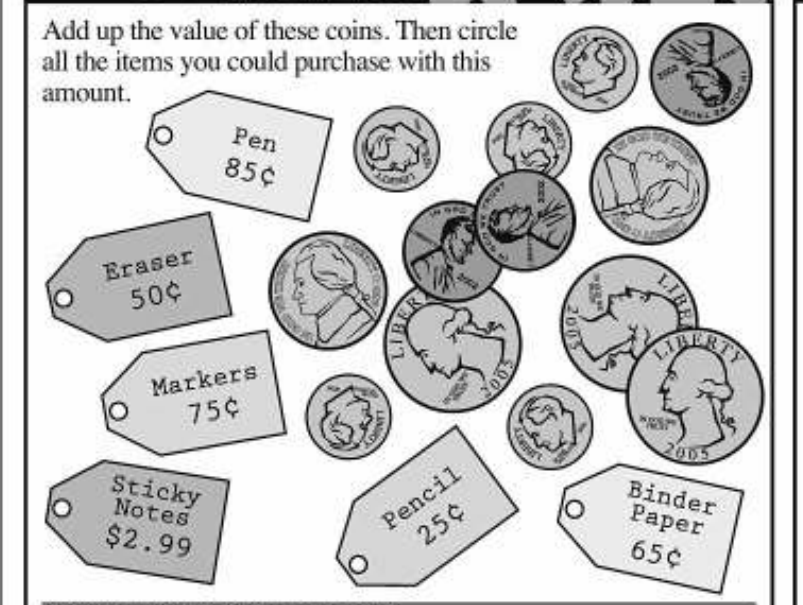

Ruschin housing development is not the Newark Way

I live in front of the 77-unit Ruschin housing development, which was approved by Newark's City Council on February 12, 2015.

At the City Council hearing, Newark Assistant City Manager Terrence Grindall claimed that the project began with 138 units. Hence, supporters of the project argued that compromise was getting from 138 to 77 units. Classic Communities developer, Jim Pollart didn't tell City Council that he only presented two proposals to the community: 85 units and 77 units. He proposed a second plan because fire trucks could not drive through the development at 85 units. In other words, neither 85 nor 138 units were feasible projects. Additionally, Mr. Pollart had submitted both of his plans to the City before the two community meetings. Therefore, his actions did not reflect a candid willingness to negotiate with the neighborhood.

At the City Council hearing, Mr. Pollart explicitly stated rescinding his offer if any units were removed. Similarly, at the first community meeting, he threatened retracting his offer if he had to "remove even one

house" from his 85 unit plan. Likewise, Newark Unified School District Superintendent Dave Marken told Ruschin area residents at the second community meeting, we accept the project or a school for "handcuffed students." Threats do not encourage cooperation and genuine neighborhood involvement.

In the past 50 years, the "Newark way" has been upheld by elected officials. This meant rejecting any project absent agreement from the surrounding neighbors. However, Newark's City Council authorization for the project meant ignoring the 234 signatures from Ruschin residents asking to not approve the project.

Instead, City Council listened to supporters of the project, parents and district employees, who don't even live in the Ruschin area. These supporters suggested that our neighborhood needed rejuvenation due to excessive burglaries, meth addicts, and squatters. Regrettably, none of their claims were true. Nevertheless, overstating crime in the area was a distraction from the real issue: the project's lack of merits. There was little discussion about most of the proposed lots being

half the size of those surrounding it and how Newark residents who move into those lots won't have anywhere to store their garbage cans. It is unfortunate that parents and district employees innocently made distracting and false claims to the City Council.

I offered City Council a plausible compromise. In 2005, and any time before that, the school board publically considered selling the property at most 46 units for \$10 million, which respects the current neighborhood and does not create permanent quality of life issues. Now they are selling the property for 77 units at \$19 million. A real compromise will be in the exact middle: 60 units for \$15 million. The goal was never stopping the development of the site, rather it was for the neighborhood to actually be involved in the process. Delaying the sale will uphold the importance of people's voices and quality of life, preserve the 50 years old "Newark way", and establish that compromise is not deceiving and intimidating Newark residents.

Joined by his 11-year-old half-brother, Nathaniel, 18-year-old Johnny began his journey and headed west. Two years later, he continued the journey alone, as he did for the rest of his life. Although he was best known to spread apple seeds everywhere he went, Johnny actually created nurseries in carefully selected spots and built fences to protect

them. He also spent part of his life as a missionary, preaching the Gospel during his travels. He lived a modest life and truly inspired many through his perseverance and acts of kindness.

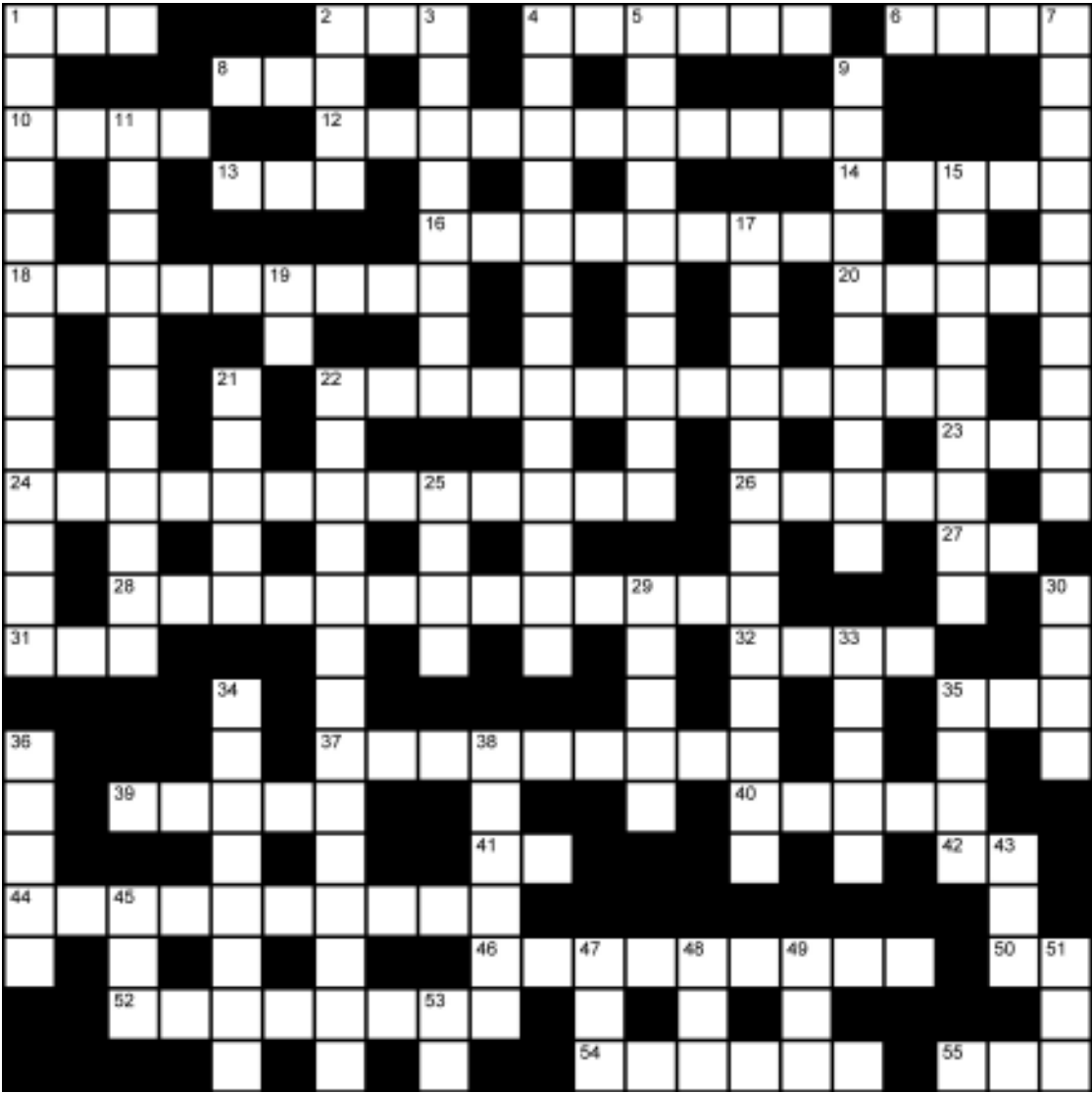

Gemstones, Fossils and Jewelry Wow at Annual Show

throughout the United States in the 1940s. This band of boys, ranging in age from seven to thirteen, unearthed one of the best preserved Ice Age fossil sites in North America. Fossils from the Irvington District created such an international event that a section of geologic time was honored as the Irvingtonian Stage within the Pleistocene Era. A beautiful Opal pendant created by Ed Rigor and valued at \$2,200 will be this year’s raffle prize, and the popular auction of members’ lapidary and jewelry creations will be held on Saturday at 2 p.m. But for many of the attendees, most of whom return year after year, the main attraction is the 40

dealers selling an incredible array of lapidary and earth science items. Finished unique and custom jewelry, faceted stones and settings, beads and supplies, cabochons and rough slabs, minerals, fossils, petrified wood, crystals, opals and much more will be on sale. The ever popular donated book sale is also back. Established in 1948, the Mineral and Gem Society of Castro Valley has since become one of the most successful nonprofit organizations of its kind in Northern California. MGSCV runs a well-equipped lapidary shop in Hayward where it holds educational workshops on lapidary techniques and jewelry arts for members of all ages and walks of



life. In addition, club members have access to a library containing resources such as books, videotapes, and DVDs that illustrate lapidary techniques and give access to gem and mineral-related research. As a non-profit educational corporation, MGSCV and its 171 members are active participants in the community and local schools, helping to increase the knowledge and understanding of the sciences pertaining to minerals, gems, fossils, geology, and related subject matter. Year-round

MGSCV club members volunteer in school to teach children about geology and rocks. Classes on a field trip with their teachers are treated to free tours at the show’s Friday session (March 6). Samina Sundas receives Courageous Love Award

On February 15, Mission Peak Unitarian Universalist Congregation honored Samina Sundas, founder of the American Muslim Voice Foundation, with a Courageous Love Award. The award was given in conjunction with the national Standing on the Side of Love campaign, which promotes equality for marginalized communities.

The Courageous Love Award, sponsored each year by the Social Justice Committee at Mission Peak Unitarian Universalist Congregation, is for individuals or organizations that have exhibited courageous love and touched hearts.

This year’s awardee works through the American Muslim Voice Foundation, an organization she founded after the attacks of 9/11, to foster friendships among all Americans by bridging cultural and religious gaps. They also work toward protecting and preserving civil liberties and constitutional rights for all. Inclusiveness in the local community led her to a committee of local stakeholders, created in 2003, to advise the Newark school district on implementing curriculum for diversity education and bullying prevention. She worked enthusiastically to identify model curricula for each grade, and help district personnel become more sensitive to the needs of religious minorities.

She then joined efforts with the Fremont Alliance for a Hate Free Community to address issues

of bullying in the schools, police treatment of minorities, neighborhood safety, stigma around mental health issues, and the like. During that time, Sundas was also an active participant in an ad-hoc committee of interested parties that advised the Fremont Human Relations Commission and put together several “Tri-City Anti-Hate Forums.” These forums were intended to inform students, parents, and educators of harassment faced primarily by Muslims and Sikhs in the Tri-Cities, post 9/11, and to arm them with tools for fostering tolerance.

Mission Peak member, Paul Clifford, who nominated Sundas says, “She has worked for the past 13 years that I’ve known her to bring together the Muslim and mainstream American communities — or as she puts it, ‘to build a community culture of hope, inclusion and peace, and to move people from fear to friendship.’ ”

Rev. Jeremy D. Nickel of Mission Peak UU says, “The Tri-Cities is a beautiful expression of the American dream. We are a diverse group of people who live and work together, and the promise of our country is on display every day here, where over one-hundred and sixty languages are spoken. Samina Sundas is one of the most important bridges among people in our area, helping us find our way forward, together. I am honored to be the Minister of a Congregation that wishes to honor Sundas’ essential community leadership.”

James Logan High School's freshman, Aaron Perez, highlighted the night at the North Coast Section's (NCS) Boys Wrestling Championships on Saturday, February 28th. Perez not only defeated De La Salle's Senior, Edward Bond, who was seeded #1 at the two day championship tournament and ranked #20 in the State, but by pin fall at 4:00. The crowd was on their feet as the second generation and home grown Union City wrestler won the 106 pound Championship at Logan who hasn't hosted the event in almost 20 years.

Aaron Perez dominated the 106 pound, 40 wrestler bracket, winning each of his matches against respected wrestlers representing five different conferences and leagues. Perez pinned Harry Bruno from Cardinal Newman High (North Bay League) at fall 3:07; Damon Eggel from Fortuna High (Humboldt-Del Norte League) at fall :57; Seed #7 Evan Santos from American High (Mission Valley Athletic League) at fall 3:20; and, Seed #6 Tony Margiotta from Los Lomas High (Diablo-Foothill Athletic League) at fall 3:48. No other wrestler in Logan history has earned this extraordinary feat of five consecutive pins according to NCS Championship records since 1991.

Perez's hard work and ambition started at a very young age of 4. The passion of wrestling was introduced to him and his brother, Eric Perez, by their father, Jacob Perez, James Logan's first State placer and James Logan Wrestling Hall of Famer. Aaron Perez competed in both elementary and middle school before he entered his father and mother's, Kim Perez, alma mater, James Logan High School. He grew up surrounded by great Union City wrestlers and coaches who helped Perez get to the level he is at today. "Aaron has been around Logan Wrestling for quite some time now. He has modeled the example set by some of the sport's best. The Logan family is extremely proud of our latest Section Champion and look forward to his performance this coming weekend at the State meet," says his father, Jacob Perez.

His first high school season is very impressive. His regular season record of 35-10 included placing 4th at the Curt Mettler Tournament, 1st at the Mat Classic Tournament, 3rd at the Tim Brown Tournament and 5th at the Mission San Jose Invitational. As NCS Champion, Aaron Perez earned a spot at the covered 43rd Annual California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Boys Wrestling Championship this Friday and Saturday, March 6-7, in Bakersfield, California.

Vallejo Sports Hall of Fame inducts CSD coach

There is so much to say about the incredible Debbie Ayers, but her own words bear repeating first: “When I heard that the California Sports & Recreation – Sports Hall of Fame in Vallejo (VHF) was inducting me, my first reac-



tion was, ‘Why me? I’m not a professional athlete like so many of the male inductees...’”

As Ayers shared her history with basketball and some hard truths began to emerge, it became very clear why she deserved to be recognized in VHF. When Ayers grew up, there was no ABL (American Basketball League) or WNBA (Women’s National Basketball Association). Her high school didn’t even have a basketball team for girls until her senior year in 1976, even though President Nixon signed Title IX in 1972 which prohibited discrimination on the basis of sex in federally funded education programs or activities.

Ayers’ idol when growing up was the TV star Mary Tyler Moore, because she had a job at a television station, her own apartment, and could “turn the world on with her smile.” There were no professional female athletes or coaches as role models for Ayers. She looked up to Debbie Myers, an Olympic swimmer, and Pat Summitt, a college basketball coach.

Ayers then brought up her determination to “work for the best basketball coach in America, maybe the world.” Pat Summitt became her coaching role model. Summitt holds the record for the most NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) wins in basketball history of either a men’s or women’s team, of any division. Ayers wrote to Summitt every year for three consecutive years asking for a job. “I was determined to

learn from her and to be the best coach that I could be.” Summitt politely turned Ayers down for two years, then finally called and hired her after the third letter. “I learned the game from Pat and various male coaches around the country,” stated Ayers.

When asked about how important that successful role model was to her, Ayers said, “I think it is critical that females have more role models as players, coaches, officials, and administrators. Once the coaching of women began paying the same as coaching men, men jumped into the coaching arena for women. Women aren’t allowed the same privilege... to coach men’s teams. It is my hope that



young female athletes grow-up with more role models and the dream of coaching.”

It’s been a long and well-traveled road for Ayers to become head coach at Fremont’s California School for the Deaf (CSD). Born in Sacramento, she attended school there and still has family and friends in that area. When she coached Division I college basketball, Ayers worked in Iowa, Tennessee, California, and New York. Coaching at the Division I college level often entails willingness to move from place to place. “The job and pressure is intense. You work 24/7 and there is not much job stability. You have to win,” Ayers said. Even her retirement pensions were in different states. She added, “I missed home.”

After serving as head basketball coach at Cal State Fullerton, Ayers began to think about the next phase of her life. “I remembered when the CSD moved from Berkeley to Fremont in 1980,” said

Ayers. “The controversial story was on TV and I thought to myself, I want to work there someday.” Recalling that story, Ayers wrote to the Director of Instruction, Ron Stern, expressing her interest. He noticed that she had worked for Pat Summitt and called her for an interview; she was hired to help the high school varsity girls’ basketball team. “Together,” said Ayers, “we built a winning program.” After winning at the high school level, Ayers was twice selected to coach the Deaf Women’s National Team in the World Games for the Deaf (2002 Greece, 2010 Poland).

Ayers said, “Working at the California School for the Deaf and with the Deaf National Team have been some of the best experiences of my life.” She pointed out, “Prior to my involvement with them, I had valuable basketball coaching experience and knowledge to share, but I had to learn a new language and all I could about a dif-

ferent culture; in order to achieve our mutual goals. In the end,” queried Ayers, “who learned more, the players or the coach?”

Debbie Ayers will be inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame in Vallejo on Saturday March 7. Tickets are \$40 per person and \$25 for those under 17. Energy. Innovation. We’re There.

Earlier this month, at the U.S. Department of Energy’s arpa-e Energy Innovation Summit (www.arpae-summit.com), more than 2,000 technologists, entrepreneurs, investors, industry experts, and government thought leaders gathered to discuss America’s most pressing energy issues. The end goal is to move promising new energy technologies out of the lab and into the market.

Speakers like Ratan Tata, Janet Napolitano, and Bill Gates provided their viewpoints on the future of energy and on what they are doing as leaders to promote innovation in this sector. Under a general umbrella of renewed optimism for clean energy, themes that floated to the surface included the market adoption of a maturing energy storage sector, increased innovation in clean-tech financing, and the growing phenomenon of democratizing energy.

This year, I was particularly struck by the prominence of several Fremont companies at the event. These companies span the smart grid value chain (EVs, LEDs, power generation, and energy storage) and illustrate the ongoing importance of arpa-e as a funding and collaboration resource related to scaling for future growth.

Cogenra

Cogenra Solar designs, manufactures, and delivers high-reliability solar systems at the lowest cost for large commercial and utility-scale applications. Working with the University of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Cogenra received an arpa-e grant to work on a full-scale concentrator system based on its T14 product, which incorporates field-tested active-cooling technology and low concentration optics for the lowest-cost PV system available today.

FreeWire Technologies

In partnership with the Pew Charitable Trust’s Clean Energy Initiative, FreeWire Technologies

showcased its mobile electric vehicle (EV) charging and energy storage units at the summit. Each Mobi™ carries 48 kWh of second-life EV batteries, is capable of Level 2 or Level 3 Fast Charging, and is linked to a full-featured software platform. This mobility, along with a companion app, allows customers to avoid high infrastructure costs and underutilization that plague traditional fixed charging stations while also delivering a cost-effective solution to quickly scale up capacity. In addition, FreeWire is using second-life EV batteries, saving them from disposal and encouraging greater EV adoption with the additional charging capacity. FreeWire’s Mobis™ and software platform can also be used for pure energy storage applications, including commercial energy management, storage of renewables, backup power, and disaster recovery.

Soraa Inc.

As Fremont’s largest LED company, Soraa Inc., has received two arpa-e awards and was displaying its winning projects at the summit’s technology showcase. Both projects address a new cost-effective, scalable technique for manufacturing gallium nitride (GaN) substrates for power electronics and LEDs. These substrates enable improved LED and power electronics applications that represent markets of more than \$30 billion per year and could reduce electricity consumption by 30 percent.

Solar City & Silevo

The summit concluded with a fireside chat between Lyndon Rive, CEO of Solar City, and Nancy Pfund of DBL Investors. This was particularly interesting and timely for Fremont given the recent announcement that Solar City has leased a facility in Fremont to house its Silevo R&D operations. Rive explained that its acquisition of Fremont-based Silevo offered one of the only domestic opportunities to invest in second-generation panel technology, which will dramatically reduce cost of the entire balance of system.

Gasoline excise tax rate lowered

Members of the California State Board of Equalization (BOE) today voted to lower the excise tax rate for gasoline by \$0.06 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-16 during their February meeting.
Since 2010, the “fuel tax swap” law has required the Board to adjust this tax rate by March 1 of each year. With this action, the excise tax rate on gasoline will be \$0.30 per gallon from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016. The current excise tax rate of \$0.36 is in effect through June 30, 2015.
Drivers pay two types of state taxes on gasoline — sales tax and a per gallon excise tax. Before the “fuel tax swap” took effect, drivers paid the full sales tax rate (then 8.25 percent), and an excise tax of \$0.18 per gallon.
The excise tax on gasoline pays for public road improvements and mass transit. In FY 2013-14, the BOE collected nearly \$5.8 billion for the Motor Vehicle Fuel Account, Transportation Tax Fund. The sales tax on gasoline primarily funds local government programs.
The “fuel tax swap” lowers the sales tax rate to 2.25 percent on gasoline and requires the BOE to set the per gallon excise tax rate, so drivers pay the same amount of state taxes on gasoline as they would have paid under the prior tax structure.
In addition to projecting sales tax revenue that would have been generated under the old tax structure, the law also requires the BOE to review the actual excise tax revenue generated in the prior fiscal year and subtract that from projected revenue for the coming fiscal year. This calculation determines the coming fiscal year’s excise tax rate. For more information, visit www.taxes.ca.gov.

Traveling through

Pipelines, rails, flight paths and wires are also a part of our infrastructure but not always immediately tied to our daily lives. Air travel, fuel, freight and power move above our heads, at eye level and hidden below our feet, only attracting attention when the intricate choreography of extension, replacement and repair intrude on our consciousness. One of these important elements is about to change; the extension of BART through rather than to Fremont. Other communities have experienced the consequences of being mid-line instead of terminus. Some have simply become bedroom communities that provide workers for other cities. As the South Fremont/Warm Springs stations nears completion and connects with Milpitas and San Jose, the City of Fremont is faced with the challenge of whether Fremont becomes just another stop on the rails between San Jose, Oakland and San Francisco or a destination.

Grappling with housing and employment opportunities in the Warm Springs area, it is easy to gravitate toward one interest group or another, but in the long run, the decisions made now will determine just what the Greater Tri-City area represents. If housing becomes the primary focus, the station – and others nearby – will become simply a way station to somewhere else. The Warm Springs BART development is often re-

ferred to as employment focused, encouraging job creation. Housing – affordable and market rate – is extremely important to the process, but cannot drive vital economic development aspects of a work related hub. In a recent presentation by those entrusted with development of the immediate station area, high rise office buildings were mentioned but appeared to be less important than housing. Pads to allow space for office buildings were proposed but construction was considered secondary to housing. In a chicken and egg scenario, it can be argued that either will follow the other, but when developing a job creation paradigm, the economic engines of work related structures must come first.

It is too important for the future of the Greater Tri-City area to allow rivers of commerce and economic development to simply run through our cities and travel on to other destinations. Traveling through the Greater Tri-City area should be the exception, not the rule.

The term is used to define a series of elements that help bind our communities together. Physical and virtual communication as well as supporting structures that provide structure for basic life... housing, power, water, food, waste disposal, etc. Much of this infrastructure, such as the roads we use, is visible every day; some components are only visible when a public utility uncovers pipelines that service our homes. However there is another stratum of infrastructure that travels above, at eye level and below our feet traveling through rather than pausing for any length of time, or at all, within our communities.

Measure “E” Citizens’ Bond Oversight Committee update

In order to better understand the importance of the four Series A Priority 1 Bond Measure “E” technology infrastructure projects, and what it will mean for students and teachers, the Citizens’ Bond Oversight Committee (CBOC) held its February meeting in the library at John F. Kennedy High School. The technology infrastructure project at Kennedy, built in 1964, was designated high priority, along with three Fremont Unified School District elementary schools (Ar-

denwood, Brookvale and Vallejo Mill). Upgrades include removing old and non-confirming data cabling, backbone infrastructure and switches and replacing them with new cabling and infrastructure for desktop Internet and video as well as increasing data drops and wireless access points to cover the entire school campus. How critical is this project? The Committee had a brief taste of what schools, teachers, and students go through when the evening kicked off with unplanned technical difficulty to ac-

cess the internet for a presentation scheduled later in the meeting; luckily, the equipment finally booted up. According to Principal Velez, new demands of the online Common Core State Standards (CCSS) assessments will put a huge strain on the system. “We haven’t been able to establish a connection for two classrooms,” he said. He spoke of lost time in the classroom, students not being able to do their work, lesson plans revised on the fly. “This is about equitable access for our students.”

In addition to the importance of equitable access, Principal Velez spoke about the importance of tools that work. “The heartbeat of the new curriculum is infrastructure,” he pointed to the many computers filling the library. “Our arteries are failing us.” With a project budget of approximately \$2.2 million, the Kennedy High School Technology Infrastructure Project is the most extensive. Brookvale Elementary’s project budget is \$826,350, Ardenwood Elementary is \$628,950, and Vallejo Mill is \$684,600. All four projects are

currently underway and scheduled to be completed by April 30—just in time for the CCSS Smarter Balanced assessment required by the state. To learn more, please visit the district website at www.fremont.k12.ca.us and click on Measure “E” Bond Update.

Niles Boulevard Bridge Replacement Project begins

The Niles Boulevard Bridge spans over Union Pacific Railroad and BART rail lines, connecting the City of Fremont and Union City. Constructed by BART in the 1970s, the existing bridge is being replaced with a new cast-in-place, pre-stressed concrete box girder bridge to meet current seismic and design standards. The new bridge will be built next to the existing bridge, allowing it to remain open during construction. Before new bridge construction begins, a number of trees and shrubs within City of Fremont and City of Union City right of way along Niles Boulevard—between Fox Road and Linda Drive—need to be removed. Workers will begin tree and shrub removal on Monday, March 2 and take approximately 12 days to complete once they begin. Traffic control measures will be in place along Niles Boulevard during removal work as needed. Portions of this area will be re-landscaped with new trees and shrubs after construction of the new bridge is complete.

BART to develop innovative trackside safety technology

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) has awarded to BART a \$5 million grant to develop a new technology to protect trackside workers. The concept is to develop a system that goes far beyond existing trackside alarm technology – a device that would automatically stop an approaching train.

"We have high hopes for this project," said BART Board President Tom Blalock. "Not only could it save lives here at BART, but we believe it can also protect track workers at any rail system nationwide once we have successfully demonstrated this technology."

The two-year project is scheduled to start with system development and to end with a final demonstration. The idea is to link trackside workers' warning devices with trains and the BART Operations Control Center. If a worker does not actively acknowledge a device's warning, the safety system would automatically stop an approaching train before it can enter the worker's safety zone.

BART sought the federal grant as part of its ongoing commitment to safety. The transit agency's efforts received strong support from U.S. Representative Barbara Lee (D-13th District), U.S. Rep. Eric Swalwell (D-15th District) and U.S. Rep. Mike Honda (D-17th District).

To date, no other safety system BART has examined provides failsafe protection of trackside workers.

Install a carbon monoxide alarm in your home

With colder temperatures and increased use of heating devices, CAL FIRE is warning of the threat of carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning. CO is a colorless, odorless gas created when fuels, such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane, burn incompletely. Now is the time to

make sure all homes have a working carbon monoxide alarm to protect residents.

According to the American Medical Association, CO poisoning is the leading cause of accidental poisoning deaths in the United States. Low levels of CO poisoning can cause shortness of breath, mild headaches, nausea, and fainting. CO is called the invisible killer because the gas cannot be seen or smelled. CO alarms are de-

signed to alert residents before exposure to CO causes a health hazard.

Take action to stay safe from CO poisoning:

Install a CO alarm outside of each sleeping area and on every level of the home.

Follow the instructions on the package to properly install the CO alarm, and test them once a month.

If the battery is low, replace it. The alarm will make a different sound if the battery is low.

If the CO alarm sounds, you must get fresh air. Get everyone out of the house and call 911.

To avoid CO poisoning here are some safety tips to remember:

Never use your oven, stove, gas or charcoal grills to heat your home; they can create CO. Only use them outside!

When warming up a vehicle, move it out of the garage. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not blocked as CO can result from the backup.

Have heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year.

During and after a snowstorm, ensure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up as well as debris.

A generator should be used outdoors only! Use in a well-ventilated area away from windows, doors, and vent openings.

Domestic battery suspect arrested

On Tuesday, February 24, 2015 at approximately 3:47 P.M., the victim called 9-1-1 to report the father of her child, Geronimo Gomez Gutierrez, had struck her and was trying to take their daughter from the home. The victim said Gutierrez was last seen outside of their home and he was in possession of a knife. Within minutes, Milpitas Police officers arrived on scene and started to search for Gutierrez in the area.

An officer located Gutierrez on the 1300 block of Edsel Drive in Milpitas. The officer exited his patrol car to contact Gutierrez, who at the time was holding a knife. Gutierrez refused to comply with the officer's directives to drop his knife and Gutierrez was eventually contained to a driveway in the 300 block of Carnegie Drive. Gutierrez produced a second knife, held both knives to his throat, and threatened to hurt himself.

Several Milpitas Police officers responded to the 300 block of Carnegie Drive and a Crisis Negotiator spoke with Gutierrez for approximately one hour. As negotiations deteriorated, officers implemented a plan to disarm Gutierrez and arrested him. Nearby homes were evacuated and the evacuated residents were allowed to return home shortly after the conclusion of this incident.

Gutierrez was booked into the Santa Clara County Main Jail for domestic battery.

The suspect said he had a winning lottery ticket, but could not redeem it because he is an illegal immigrant. Another suspect also approached and asked the victim to help them, to which he agreed. One of the suspects used his cell phone to call an unknown phone number; the answering party said she was a state lottery attorney, and the lottery ticket was worth \$1 million. The woman on the phone said the suspect would need to provide her with \$25,000 as a "good faith" deposit. The suspect said he didn't have that much money. He asked the victim to provide \$20,000, and the suspect would give him \$50,000 when he redeemed the lottery ticket. The victim agreed. The suspects drove him to a bank, where he withdrew \$20,000 and gave it to them. Shortly after receiving the money, the suspects left the area and were not seen again. Detectives are exhausting all leads in this felony theft case.

The first suspect was described as a Hispanic male, 25-35 years old with medium length black hair. The second suspect was described as a short Hispanic male, 55-65 years old. Their vehicle was described as a light blue van.

The largest Asteroid doesn’t quite cut it as a Planet

From a distance, Ceres might look a bit like any other planet you might see. It’s spherical, after all, and that’s one of the biggest requirements of planethood. But put it next to any other planet and you would quickly see that it is seriously tiny. It’s not even 1/5th the size of Mercury, the tiniest planet in the Solar System. This small size is one of the reasons why Ceres is classified as a dwarf planet.

Its location, floating amongst thousands of bits of other space rock in the Asteroid Belt, is another clue that it hasn’t reached full planethood. For a space object to be honored with the title ‘planet,’ it has to have enough gravity to clear away all the junk around it. But, alas, poor Ceres can’t muster that kind of gravitational strength.

Still, amongst the other asteroids, Ceres is a giant. Because of this, it is considered both a dwarf planet and the largest asteroid—the only dwarf planet/asteroid in our solar system. It is also the closest dwarf planet to Earth. The others, including famed Pluto, are all near or beyond the orbit of Neptune.

But it’s really hard to see. It’s tiny, after all, and it’s also not especially bright. We haven’t really had a chance to take a close look. That is about to change!

After over seven years of travel, a trusty spacecraft named Dawn is fast approaching Ceres. It has already begun to take pictures. As it gets closer and closer, those pictures will become clearer and clearer. It has already revealed a cratered surface. By March, it will enter into orbit around Ceres, giving us all kinds of new information about this mysterious little world.

When it does that, it will become the first spacecraft ever to visit a dwarf planet! Learn more about asteroids and other tiny worlds with a factsheet from NASA’s Space Place! <http://spaceplace.nasa.gov/posters/en/#solarsystem>.

Boy finds gun in bushes

San Leandro Police detectives have arrested a 25-year old San Leandro gang member for allegedly shooting a handgun outside of a Washington Manor neighborhood bar, where California Highway Patrol officers were conducting an enforcement stop on a suspected DUI driver.

On Thursday, February 12th at 1:35 am, two uniformed CHP officers in a marked patrol car conducted an enforcement stop on a suspected DUI driver in the parking lot of Shilo’s Bar, located at the corner of Manor Blvd. and Zelma St. in San Leandro. While conducting their investigation, the CHP officers heard 3-4 gunshots coming from inside of or near the bar. They immediately called for assistance, which resulted in a large scale response of officers from both the CHP and San Leandro Police.

About 20 patrons were inside of the bar at the time, and were ordered outside for their safety. Officers searched the bar, but did not locate any victims or evidence that a shooting had taken

place inside. The patrons were interviewed by police and released.

The following morning, at 7:20 a.m., an 11 year old boy was walking to Washington Manor Middle School, when he saw the handle of a gun in the bushes adjacent to the bar. The boy believed that the gun was a toy, and picked it up, finding that it was a real handgun. He phoned his parents, who came to his assistance, secured the firearm and called police.

San Leandro officers arrived and determined that the firearm was loaded. They also discovered that it had been reported stolen to the Alameda County Sheriff’s Office in August 2014. Police have since collected the gun as evidence and will perform additional laboratory tests on it to see if it has been used in other shootings.

Detectives continued their investigation and developed information that a known gang member from San Leandro was responsible for the shooting. The 25 year old man, who is currently on probation for firearm-related offenses, was one of the patrons contacted by police inside of the bar, after the shooting had occurred in front of the CHP officers.

Undercover officers from the SLPD’s Crime Suppression Unit located the suspect on Thursday night and arrested him on suspicion of negligent discharge of a firearm in public for the purposes of further promoting his gang. He was found to be in possession of narcotics and has also been booked on that charge, as well as violating the terms and conditions of his probation.

Police do not have a motive for the shooting and do not know if the suspect fired in the air, towards the CHP officers or at someone or something else.

“We commend the 11 year old boy for immediately calling his parents to report that he found the gun. This easily could have ended in tragedy – both when the shooting occurred and when the boy found the gun,” said Lt. Robert McManus.

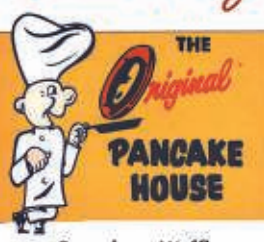
