Internationally recognized guest conductor Michael Morgan leads Fremont Symphony's "West Meets East" concert at the Smith Center at Ohlone College on Saturday, April 11. To honor Fremont's Indian community, the program presents both western orchestral works, such as Beethoven's "Egmont" overture and Chopin's "Piano Concerto in E minor," together with music and dance from the subcontinent.

Featured works are Indian-American composer Juhi Bansal's "Where Shadow Chases Light," which had its world premiere last year with Oakland East Bay Symphony under Morgan's baton; and music by legendary composer and Sarode master Ustad Ali Akbar Khan for symphony orchestra and traditional Indian instruments played by his two sons, Alam and Manik Khan.

# World-famous Saxophonists Highlight Jazz Festival

California State University East Bay celebrates 30 years of jazz on the hill with its annual "CSU East Bay Jazz Festival" April 16 through 18. Two world-famous saxophonists highlight the program: Bob Mintzer, a Grammy award-winning artist, and Tia Fuller, who performs with Beyonce.

The festival began as a way to support the university's jazz program, giving young musicians exposure to professors and the campus. This year, twenty-two bands from California middle schools, high schools, and colleges have signed to participate, coming from as far away as Lake County and as close as Hayward. The non-competitive festival gives bands an opportunity to perform for 20 minutes and receive about 25 minutes of feedback from professional judges. Event adjudicators include CSUEB professors who regularly perform as well as teach: saxophonist Daniel Zinn, saxophonist Mike Zilber, jazz drummer Alan Hall, and bass player Pat Kolbas. They will listen to bands perform three selections then work with them on stage to fine-tune performances.

## Celebrate Thai New Year at Songkran Festival

Please join Wat Buddhanusorn and Thai Cultural Council of Fremont for the annual Thai traditional New Year festival or Songkran Day on Saturday, April 11th and Sunday, April 12th.

"Songkran" is considered the traditional New Year of Thailand. The Temple celebrates this day with many traditional activities and beautiful ceremonies. The day will begin with community members making offerings in the Main Buddha Hall (Sanghadana), followed by the monks walking on a ceremonial alms round in the central courtyard of the temple.

Students of Wat Buddhanusorn Sunday School will showcase Thai culture with traditional classical dance and music performances. There will also be the traditional "watering" of Buddha images, monks, and elders as a way to show respect, express gratitude and receive their blessings.

Wat Buddhanusorn, "temple for the dedication of the Buddha," was founded in 1983 and, in keeping with Thai Theravadan Buddhist tradition, has always relied on donations and volunteer work for its support. The main objectives of the temple community are propagating the Buddha's teachings and practice, to teach and promote Thai art, language, and culture to all those who are interested, and to serve as a pillar of the Thai community.

Besides the activities of the temple itself, monks and supporters are involved in the greater community of Fremont and abroad. They work with the Tri-Cities Ministerial Association, donate food and supplies to local and national charities and homeless shelters, provide scholarships and meal funds for students in Thai villages, support traditional Thai

## Restore Lifestyle Balance

#### **To Tune Up for Summer**

ew Year's Resolutions are far behind and summer is just around the corner. The time in between —

Spring Break as it were — is a great time to tune up one's health and wellness routine.

"Restoring Balance," a new Lifestyle Management program offered by the Washington Hospital Women's Center, will jumpstart the transition into summer, according to Dr. Victoria Leiphart, a gynecologist and Lifestyle Medicine physician.

Emphasizing stress management, along with nutrition and exercise, "Restoring Balance" will provide practical information on how participants can develop individual lifestyle management initiatives that will help them feel better, be more energetic and less stressed.

The four-week program will be held from 7 to 8:30 p.m. on successive Mondays, beginning April 27, at the Washington Hospital Women's Center, 2500 Mowry Avenue (Washington West), Suite 145, in Fremont. Fee for the series is \$75 and is limited to 20 persons to provide for individualized attention. Please call (510) 608-1301 to enroll.

With a focus on stress management, Dr. Leiphart will share strategies and instructions for meditation and mindfulness along with a discussion of the science that supports these practices. "We all live crazy

lives and we seldom take the downtime we need to recharge our batteries — an essential step to staying well over the long term," she says.

Stress management is key to a healthy life, Dr. Leiphart adds. Along with meditation and mindfulness she recommends a variety of activities for stress management which can include prayer, knitting, yoga, and/or spending time with women friends on a regular basis.

"I see many mature women in my practice," Dr. Leiphart says. "The ones who are energetic, vital and engaged have three things in common: they exercise, watch what they eat, and manage the stress in their lives."

She keeps the class size small so she can adjust the discussions to meet the needs and interests of the individual participants. In addition to class discussions, participants will receive supplemental informational and reference materials to take home.

Two-thirds of American women are overweight or obese, and for middle-aged and older women, the number is even higher. "One in three meals is eaten outside the home; we spend three-to-four hours a day in front of the television or computer screen; our lives are filled with stress from having too many balls in the air: aging parents, children, work, civic engagement, household responsibilities."

The Restoring Balance four-week series, beginning April 27, will help with stress management by focusing on nutrition, exercise and overall lifestyle management. Classes are held from 7 to 8:30 p.m. on successive Mondays at the Washington Hospital Women's Center, 2500 Mowry Avenue, Suite 145 in Fremont. Fee for the series is \$75 and is limited to 20 persons. To register, call (510) 608-1301.



Research continues to demonstrate that illness and disease can be treated and even prevented with lifestyle management, Dr. Leiphart adds. Various studies have shown that spending just a half-hour each day exercising (walking, biking, yoga, aerobic dancing, among other activities) reduces knee arthritis pain by 47 percent in adults of all ages studied.

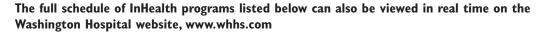
Exercise is the single most important action a person can take to improve one's

health, she adds, and "you don't have to spend hours at the gym to see improvements."

The key is taking small sustainable steps: walking 10 minutes a day at the start (five minutes out the door, turn around, five minutes back). Increase the time gradually and steadily and soon its 20 minutes, 30 minutes, and so on. The greatest improvement in cardiovascular

# Unsung Medical Specialty Offers Less Invasive Alternatives to Surgery for Growing List of Conditions

At Washington Hospital, community physicians and specialists team up to offer lower risk, image-guided treatment

For many years, patients and the medical community have looked to surgery as the best way to treat many medical conditions. For example, surgery has often been the treatment of choice for spinal compression fractures, uterine fibroids, varicose veins, aneurysms, blood clots in the lungs and legs, some cancers, and many other problems.

In some cases, traditional surgery continues to be the treatment of choice. However, since the 1960s, a little-known, innovative medical specialty called Interventional Radiology (IR) has evolved as an alternative to open surgery. A less invasive treatment approach than traditional surgery, IR offers other distinct benefits, including lower risk, less pain and a shorter recovery time.

Today, some IR-pioneered procedures, such as angioplasty and stenting to open clogged arteries, have become well known and have been adopted by other specialties as the standard of care for some conditions. Many other leading edge IR treatments are also available, with more being developed every year.

At Washington Hospital, the growing Interventional Radiology Program has evolved with the help of modern technologies. The Hospital now offers many minimally invasive interventions that once required open surgery.

To perform a procedure, the IR specialist gains access to the target organ by inserting a tiny catheter or miniature instruments through the skin without making an incision. Using x-ray or ultrasound imaging guidance, the physician can then reach the internal site of a problem with these small devices and deliver the necessary targeted therapies.

"IR is 'cutting edge' medicine without the cutting," said Washington Hospital board-certified interventional radiologist Bruce Lin, MD. "Many of these diagnostic and therapeutic procedures are now considered first-line treatments for specific conditions. They often result in improved outcomes, less discomfort, lower complication rates, and faster recovery and are usually more cost effective. In today's health care, these are important options for doctors and patients to consider."

Interventional Radiology is a recognized medical specialty by the American Board of Medical Specialties. Interventional radiologists are board-certified physicians with additional advanced training in a broad spectrum of minimally invasive procedures in multiple organ systems.

"Because interventional radiologists are first trained in diagnostic radiology, they use imaging to understand, visualize and diagnose the full scope of the disease's pathology and to map out the procedure tailored to the individual patient," says the website of the Society of Interventional Radiology (SIR). "Then during the procedure, they image as they go, literally watching and guiding their catheter to the site of the problem."

"At Washington Hospital, we work with community physicians to improve patient care and outcomes," explained Dr. Lin. "Interventional radiologists offer in-depth knowledge of the least invasive treatments available and are experts at providing advanced imaging. They use their diagnostic expertise to plan and develop optimal interventional treatment strategies."

When doctors partner with IR specialists at Washington Hospital, patient care is streamlined through a faster, more efficient

image evaluation and targeted treatment process. Areas of IR treatment performed include problems with arteries, veins and cancer or cancer-related conditions, as well as spine or pain management, women's health, kidney dialysis access, and gastrointestinal, genitourinary or liver-related conditions

According to SIR, the concept of IR was first used in the 1960s to open a blocked artery in an 82-year-old woman, saving her gangrenous left foot. Later, IR procedures were developed that revolutionized the practice of cardiology.

## Some more recent advancements in IR include:

• Treatments for back pain, vein problems and uterine fibroids

- Nonsurgical destruction of a tumor or tumors without harming surrounding tissue
- Blocking a blood vessel to stop hemorrhaging or cut off the blood supply to a tumor
- Dissolving dangerous clots in blood vessels
- Widening or opening blocked or partially blocked arteries supplying blood to the head and neck to prevent stroke.

# Statin Medications and Peripheral Neuropathy and Blood Thinners for Atrial Fibrillation

Dear Doctor,

Can statin medications cause peripheral neuropathy?

Dear Reader,

About 26% of individuals taking statin medications (prescribed by doctors to help lower cholesterol) will develop a peripheral neuropathy. Simply stopping the medicine will alleviate the problem in most cases, although it can take time to resolve. However, other more common causes of peripheral neuropathy, such as diabetes, should be investigated.

#### Dear Doctor,

I was recently told I would have to take blood thinners indefinitely for my atrial fibrillation. Is this true?

Dear Reader,

Yes, it is true that blood-thinning medicine is recommended in patients that have an irregular heartbeat, or atrial fibrillation. The medicine helps prevent the formation of blood clots in the heart, which are known to occur in atrial fibrillation. There are many blood thinners available and you should talk to your doctor about which one is best for you.

## Youthsava Celebrates Indian Culture through Dance




India Community Center in Milpitas is once again hosting the 13th annual "Youthsava Dance Competition," a signature contest that showcases the

health is with individuals who go from no exercise to one hour a week, over time, Dr. Leiphart says.

Once a person has begun to exercise and feel the benefits in energy and vitality, that person is much more likely to eat healthier, according to Dr. Leiphart. The program will share simple keys to portion control and healthier food choices.

In addition to Lifestyle Management programs, the Washington Women's Center offers a variety of gentle exercise programs including Tai Chi, Zumba Gold, Yoga and Keep It Moving classes.

## Historical Lecture

Gerald S. Henig, Cal State University East Bay (CSUEB) emeritus professor of history, will present "Lincoln's Successor, Andrew Johnson: States Rights' Advocate or White Supremacist?" on Monday, April 13, in the University library.

The talk coincides with the 150th anniversary of Lincoln's assassination on April 14, 1865, and kicks off the library's National Library Week events.

Henig asserts that in the immediate months after the Confederacy surrendered at Appomattox, Va., Lincoln's successor, Andrew Johnson, had a golden opportunity to advance racial justice in America. Instead of attempting to extend Lincoln's legacy, though, Johnson did just the opposite.

In his talk, Henig will explore Johnson's early background, his political philosophy, and his racial views to explain why America's 17th president did everything in his power to block congressional efforts to transform the South into a more equitable society for blacks.

Henig, who taught at CSUEB for 40 years, remains one of the university's most honored professors. He received the Outstanding Professor Award and was a four-time winner of the Pi Kappa Delta Best Lecturer Award.

Henig earned his bachelor's degree from Brooklyn College, his master's degree from the University of Wisconsin, and his doctorate in American history from The Graduate Center, City University of New York (CUNY). The Graduate Center, CUNY, also honored Henig with its Annual Alumni Achievement Award in 2008.

#### **Counseling Corner**

#### How to Ace Your Job Performance Review

ost people look forward to their annual performance reviews with as much enthusiasm as they would a root canal. Or maybe you would welcome a root canal more than your performance review because the dentist at least offers painkillers with the procedure. As a career counselor, I have heard woeful tales from employees who felt slammed at their job reviews, and so I wrote this article to help people cope with this much dreaded annual work ritual. Let's start with an easy question:

#### When is the best time to prepare for your annual performance review?

A) An hour or so before the meeting

B) A few weeks before the meeting

C) What's the point of preparing? I'm just a sitting duck.

If you answered "C," I can understand how you feel and I've certainly felt like a helpless duck in some of my previous performance reviews. However, if you are unprepared for your job review, you almost certainly will feel like a sitting duck. You have basically given your boss the upper hand by being unprepared for his or her critique. Keep in mind that the job review does not have to be a one-way conversation in which your boss does all the talking and takes pot shots at you. You can and should contribute your thoughts and feedback during your review. Your annual review does not have to be a faultfinding mission, but can be a venue for you to showcase your enthusiasm and commitment to your job. The review process can even be an enjoyable one if you take the necessary steps to make it so.

Any amount of preparation is better than no preparation, and the more preparation you've done, the more you've increased your chances of having a pleasant and fair review. So I would not only recommend Choice A and Choice B, but I would go much further and recommend that you prepare for your performance review every single day you are on the job. If this sounds extreme, take a moment to consider this - your review encompasses your job performance for the entire year.

Wouldn't it make sense for you to prepare for your review all year round, instead of waiting last minute to recall what you accomplished?

People often secretly hope that their performance review will be a smooth conversation about what a great employee they've been and how the company will reward them with a bonus and a promotion. Of course it's always helpful to have a positive attitude but this mindset alone will not prepare you adequately for your review. When getting ready to be reviewed, don't focus on the question "What can the company do for me?" Instead, flip the question around and have this question in mind: "What have I done for the company and for my boss this year?"

It's also worthwhile to remember that only you know all the minutiae of what you've contributed to the job and to the company. Your boss might be supervising dozens of people and he or she cannot take note of every single one of your accomplishments and contributions. Further, your boss is under a tight deadline to turn in job reviews for multiple people and will not have the time or energy to reflect on how you've been a stellar employee. You can make it easy for him or her as well as for yourself by noting the things you've done over the course of the year.

To help ensure a fair, pleasant, and even fun review, be sure to keep a record of all that you've accomplished since your last review. Maintain both an electronic record as well as a physical file folder. In the electronic record, write down every single accomplishment and contribution that you've done for your boss, for the job, for the team, and for the corporation. Examples of noteworthy contributions include: the times you stayed late to accomplish something, how you went over and beyond to help your boss, the team, or the company, and how you performed exceptional quality work. Be sure to include details such as dates, names, people involved, the effort it took, and the results.

Other things to document are your teamwork and interpersonal skills. These might sometimes be overlooked in a performance review, so be sure to bring your boss's attention to your contributions in this area. Be sure to note

the different things you do to contribute to a safe, respectful, pleasant, productive, and efficient work environment.

Be sure to keep track of all the compliments you received throughout the year, whether they are from your boss, co-workers, senior management, or customers. Whenever possible, have these documented in written or email form so you can have a paper copy to show to your boss at performance review time. Collect these in your file folder so you can retrieve them easily when you are called for your review.

If this is your first job, maintain this note-taking habit as soon as you start the job - Day One is not too early to begin preparing for your annual review. Get a copy of your job responsibilities, the company objectives, and the company's mission statement from Human Resources and go over each of these with your boss. Schedule a time with your boss to ask how he or she evaluates the successful completion of these job responsibilities. For extra points, ask your boss what you can do to go above and beyond your job responsibilities. Take extensive notes during this conversation and track how you've followed your boss's guidelines in executing your job responsibilities.

These action steps will help ensure a smooth, productive, and even satisfying conversation with your boss about your job performance. However, if you have an irrational, hostile, or (fill-inthe-blank) jerk of a boss, you will have to do all of the above as well as take a few extra steps to safeguard yourself during the process. One such step could be to consult with HR before the review; another could be to request an HR representative to sit in during the review. Since each difficult boss is unique, special and careful consideration should be given for your particular situation.

#### Remember:

You, not your boss, are responsible for building the best case for yourself during a performance review. So do the work to present yourself in the best possible light!

The handsome wood grain dash top dips in the middle for storage. Behind it is a charcoalcolored panel that looks like the industrial surface you'd find on the back of a speaker cabinet. It's partially recycled, as is 25% of the plastic in the car. The wool cloth and golden brown leather in my test car added a Danish Modern flavor to the "cars of the future" theme.

The i3 is no sports car, but its

(120 - household current) or level 2 (240 – your dryer or a charging station). It also offers quick charging, but there's a catch. Like the fight over movie cassette formats, there are multiple standards for DC quick chargers. BMW uses the SAE Combo system, but the charger I intended to use one Saturday afternoon had the more widely used CHAdeMO system, so I was out of luck.

The main issue with electrics is still range, even with extenders available. And, prices are a bit steep, but there are significant rebates available. The i3 without any extras or range extender retails at \$42,300. For the range ex-



erful supercar, but the i3 competes with more mainstream offerings, although it is priced and equipped a bit higher than a Nissan Leaf or Chevrolet Volt.

The i3 comes as a pure batterypowered car or you can get it with a "range extender," which turns on and charges the battery when it runs down. This is different from the Volt, which delivers about 38 miles of electricity before switching on the charge engine, and can go for hundreds of miles on that. The i3 with the range extender has a longer electric range—officially 72 miles—but a total range of just 150 miles. My personal numbers showed an estimated range of 78 miles for the battery and 60 miles

The EPA rates the i3 at 117 MPGe. Use this figure to compare with other electric vehicles. With gasoline only, it's just 39 mpg. EPA Green numbers are 5 for Smog but a 10 for Greenhouse Gas.

The i3 is not pretty. Perhaps BMW doesn't want anyone to confuse this new car with the familiar and beloved 3, 5, or 7 series sport sedans. Up front, there's a twin kidney grille, but from there back, it's a new world. The most unusual feature is the flow of the side windows, which start out "normal" in the front doors but bulge oddly in the rearhinged "suicide doors" and then taper down to a narrow band in the rear pillar. The tail is flat, black and shiny, and the Ushaped taillamps sit flush against the surface, like icons on an iPad.

The i3 is just 157 inches long, but it stands 62.1 inches tall and is 69.9 inches wide, so you won't feel claustrophobic inside. The interior stylists created a futuristic and fascinating dashboard that curls up at the ends. A pod reaches out from the right to hold one of two flat tablet-like screens. The doors feature a clever ribbon that wraps down to provide a grip and then folds on itself to create a

The i3 uses the standard SAE 1772 plug for charging at level 1 tender, add \$3,850. My Capparis White tester, with some extras, including quite flashy 20-inch rims, came to \$51,200 (all prices include shipping).

The i3 is different, and quite enjoyable to drive. It's small, but as a hatchback, very practical. It may look odd, but it feels and drives like a BMW. One day, at a red light, a guy in a Chevy Tahoe told me, "Looks better than those other electric cars." BMW can only hope other folks feel the



## Jos. A. Bank laying off 122 after Men's Wearhouse merger

HAMPSTEAD, Md. (AP), Retailer Jos. A. Bank Clothiers says it's laying off 122 workers at its Hampstead headquarters nearly one year after announcing its acquisition by Men's Wearhouse.

The company revealed the plan Monday in a filing with the Maryland Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation. The cuts amount to about 15 percent of the company's employment in Carroll County.

The company says it will make the cuts between the end of May and the end of the year.

A spokesman says some workers also will be transferred to offices in New York City and the Men's Wearhouse headquarters in Fremont, California. That will leave about 450 workers in Carroll County, down from about 780 currently.

The \$1.8 billion takeover was completed in June.

#### **Rocky Mountain snow** offers scant encouragement to **California**

DENVER (AP), Drought-weary Californians can't expect much encouragement from mountains elsewhere in the West: Snow that fills the Colorado River is lagging, too, officials said Friday.

The snowpack in the Colorado and Wyoming valleys where the river originates now ranges from 51 to 79 percent of normal, said Brian Domonkos, Colorado supervisor of the U.S. Department of Agriculture snow survey, which monitors snowfall and water availability.

The Colorado River supplies water to about 40 million people and 6,300 square miles of farmland in seven states, including California.

The Rocky Mountain snow that melts into the river doesn't flow directly to California and other downstream users.

Instead, it's held in a series of reservoirs that release enough water to fulfill the legal allotments to southwestern states under a series of agreements and court rulings.

The reservoirs have sufficient water to provide California and other downstream states with their full shares this year and for the foreseeable future, said Matthew Allen, a spokesman for the federal Bureau of Reclamation, which manages the reservoir system.

California also gets water from the Sierra Nevada range, where the snow cover was the lowest it has ever been in 65 years of record-keeping as of Wednesday.

Warm temperatures and scarce snowfall in early March caused the snowpack in Colorado to shrink significantly.

"To see the decline that we saw at the beginning of March, that is abnormal," Domonkos said. "And to see it continue almost unabated, almost to now, that's quite abnormal."

A storm brought up to 11 inches of snow on Thursday and Friday to parts of the Colorado mountains and footbills, but much of it fell east of the Continental Divide and will eventually melt into the South Platte and Arkansas rivers.

Preliminary readings showed the snowpack on Friday in the South Platte basin was 87 percent of normal and 79 percent of normal in the Arkansas basin.

The U.S. Drought Monitor says 40 percent of California is in an exceptional drought, the most severe category, and another 25 percent is in an extreme drought, the second-most severe.

Gov. Jerry Brown ordered mandatory, statewide water cutbacks by cities and towns, aiming for a 25 percent cut in water use.

Extreme drought conditions also spread into Nevada and southern Oregon, along with smaller pockets in Utah and Arizona.

Milder drought conditions extend across the rest of the West, except for most of Montana and Wyoming.

Other states served by the Colorado River are Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Nevada.

#### Court won't reconsider decision on Wall St. insider trading

NEW YORK (AP), A federal appeals court refused Friday to reconsider a ruling that dealt a blow to U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara and the prosecution of insider trading on Wall Street.

The 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued a one-paragraph ruling turning down a petition from Bharara's office. It said neither the threejudge panel that made the ruling in December nor the entire court would rehear the case.

The original ruling in December reversed two convictions and appeared to narrow the definition of insider trading. It said the defendants involved - portfolio managers Anthony Chiasson of New York and Todd Newman of Needham, Massachusetts - were too far removed from the source of inside information to be prosecuted.

The court said the government's flurry of prosecutions, which produced more than 80 convictions since 2008, was "increasingly targeted at remote tippees many levels removed from corporate insiders." Prior cases generally involved defendants directly participating in the passing of secrets, the court said.

At the time, Bharara issued a statement saying the ruling `interprets the securities laws in a way that will limit the ability to prosecute people who trade on leaked inside information." His office made the same argument in its petition.

The court's ruling Friday did not say why it turned down the petition.

Bharara's office said it had no new comment on the ruling or on whether he would appeal it to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Chiasson, who co-founded Greenwich, Connecticut-based Level Global Investors, had been sentenced to 6 1/2 years in prison. Newman, who worked for Diamondback Capital Management, was sentenced to 4 1/2 years.

#### Thousands more bikes could hit San Francisco Bay Area roads **AP WIRE SERVICE**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP), San Francisco Bay Area riders could have thousands more bicycles to share.

City leaders hope to expand the Bay Area Bike Share program from 700 to 7,000 rental bikes, including new bikes in Berkeley, Oakland and Emeryville by 2017.

The number of bikes in San Francisco would jump from 328 to 4,500. San Jose would go from 129 bikes

Riders pay a membership fee to check out bikes for short rides, returning the bikes to self-locking kiosks. Trips longer than 30 minutes incur overtime charges. Washington, D.C., and New York City also have bike share programs.

The bay area bike pilot program launched in 2013. The Metropolitan Transportation Commission could approve the contract later this spring.

## **IQ Mutual Fund Review:** Nearly everything was a winner

NEW YORK (AP), Sometimes, nearly everyone wins.

Last quarter was a winner for the vast majority of mutual-fund investors as 87 percent of all funds delivered gains. Rising stock markets around the world and a drop in interest rates drove the returns, continuing a yearslong run for funds.

To be sure, the gains were typically smaller than what investors enjoyed earlier in this bull market. But they were widespread. Of the 95 different fund categories that Morningstar tracks, 84 logged gains on average. Those with losses were often in niche areas, such as Latin American stock funds or emerging-market bond funds, and likely play only a supporting role in portfolios.

Consider the mutual fund that's a centerpiece of many retirement accounts: Vanguard's Total Stock Market Index fund. It's the largest fund by assets, nearly double the size of the No. 2 fund, and it delivered its 10th quarter of gains in the last 11 despite starting the year slowly.

It was down more than 3 percent in mid-January, hurt by worries about plunging profits for energy companies. The fund tracks the performance of the broad U.S. stock market, and 7 percent of its portfolio is in the oil and gas industry.

But stocks recovered as the quarter progressed, and the fund ended up returning 1.8 percent. It got a particular boost from smaller companies in its portfolio. It owns everything from Tel-Instrument Electronics, which has a market value of about \$20 million, to Apple, which is more than 30,000 times larger.

Tel-Instrument Electronics stock jumped 20 percent last quarter, more than Apple or the large-cap Standard & Poor's 500 index. It was a similar trend across the market, and small-cap stock funds generally beat their large-cap rivals.

The average small-cap growth stock fund returned 5.8 percent, versus 3.5 percent for the average large-cap growth stock fund. That's a turnaround from last year, when small-cap stocks were generally listless due to worries that they'd become too expensive relative to their earnings.

The surging dollar helped fuel demand for small-cap stocks. The dollar jumped to its highest level against the euro in more than a decade, and it also set multi-year highs against the Japanese yen, Canadian dollar and other currencies.

That hurts U.S. companies that do lots of business abroad because sales made in euros or yen are worth fewer dollars than a year ago. Such companies are typically big, while small-cap stocks generally do more of their business in the United States, so their

revenue isn't as affected.

A look at some of the other trends that drove fund performance last quarter:

 FOREIGN STOCK FUNDS LED THE WAY.

Central banks in Europe and Japan are pushing big stimulus programs for their economies, sending their stock markets higher. Japanese stock funds returned an average of 10.9 percent last quarter, the best performance of any fund category. European stock funds returned an average

Funds that "hedge" to negate the effect of shifting currency values had even higher returns. While the falling euro helps revenues for European exporters, it also erodes returns of European stocks when translated into dollars.

– HEALTH CARE STOCK FUNDS ARE STILL HOT.

Health care stock funds have been some of the best not only over the last quarter but also over the last year. They returned an average of 10.7 percent from January through March, second-best among 95 fund categories. Over the last year, they've returned 32.4 percent, also good for second place.

Earnings for health care companies are growing faster than for the rest of the market, attracting investors. But stock prices have shot up so quickly that worries are rising they've become too expensive.



## IQ Mutual Fund Review: Nearly everything was a winner

Even the Federal Reserve has made some noise. Nearly a year ago, in July 2014, it said that valuations "appear to be stretched" in biotechnology. The Nasdaq Biotechnology index has surged about 35 percent since then.

– BOND FUNDS ARE DE-FYING EXPECTATIONS.

Rising rates are one of the biggest fears for bond-fund investors. They can cause losses by knocking down the price of existing bonds.

Coming into the year, much of Wall Street projected that in-

terest rates would rise. The economy was strengthening, and the Federal Reserve was expected to raise its key short-term interest rate for the first time since 2006.

But the Federal Reserve last month indicated that it may move slower in increasing rates than many expected. Several economic reports also came in weaker than expected, and interest rates dropped during the first quarter. That drove most bond funds to gains last quarter, with long-term bond funds delivering the biggest returns.

– INDEX FUNDS ARE STILL THE TOP CHOICE FOR INVESTORS.

Investors continued their march into index funds last quarter, and out of funds run by stock pickers. Nearly \$23 billion flowed out of actively managed U.S. stock funds in the year's first two months, while \$12 billion went into their index-fund rivals.

Index funds offer lower expenses than actively managed ones. And over the last 10 years, they've also offered better performance.

he concept of family has evolved over the course of human history. The iconic, heteronormative image of the nuclear family has given way to the idea that family comes in all shapes and sizes. Rather than simply blood and DNA, love is the glue that creates a family. It is this concept that motivates those who open their homes and lives to care for foster children.

The choice to become a foster parent is not an easy one. There are many questions to ask before

taking on this tremendous responsibility: Do we have enough resources for our family? Is there space in my home to provide for a child? Do we have the mental and emotional strength to parent a child who may have emotional, developmental, or physical challenges? How will we feel about having to send the child back to his or her family of origin?

Children are placed in foster homes for several reasons: The family of origin has become unable to care for the children, or the home environment is unsafe, and the State has determined that the children need to be cared for elsewhere. Oftentimes, this relocation is temporary. The Department of Children

and Family Services has as its goal the reunification of the children with their parents or other relatives. Many children are returned to their families after it is safe to do so. In the interim, foster care provides a sense of home and family for these children. In some cases, the foster family becomes the child's forever home upon adoption.

The Alameda County Social Services Agency, Department of Children and Family Services, seeks to educate the public about this process. They call foster care "A Pathway to Home" and hold twice monthly orientation meetings for families and individuals interested in opening their homes to foster youth. On the first and third Thursdays of every month, prospective foster parents can learn about the foster home licensing process. Meetings are held in Oakland at the Social Services building on the first Thursday, and at Glad Tidings Church in Hayward on the third Thursday. Drop-ins are welcome; no pre-registration is needed.

Requirements for licensing are discussed, as well as obstacles to becoming a foster parent, and what challenges foster children face. Upon hearing the realities of foster care, some prospective parents may be discouraged. Others are renewed in their desire to provide for the needs of these children and choose to continue with the application process.

Attending an orientation meeting is the first step. After this, prospective foster (or adoptive) parents must attend several training classes, complete a background check, have a home visit with a Social Services worker, and be approved for a foster care license. Parents who

hope to adopt a foster child must also complete an adoption homestudy.

Foster care, like any parent-child relationship, can be rewarding and challenging. Fortunately, there are many support groups available throughout the Bay Area for foster parents. One such group is the Alameda County Foster Parent Association (ACFPA). Gwen McWilliams is the president of the ACFPA, as well as a foster parent and adoptive mom. She has fostered 60 children in her time as a foster parent and adopted three children as well. McWilliams says, "People come [to foster care] with different motivations. Some do it because they want to give back, some have had family in foster care, some use it as a route to adopt." She feels that the focus should be how foster parents can help children. McWilliams is especially happy to participate in

reuniting foster children with their families of origin. She says that there are a lot of resources available for foster families seeking support.

Foster care is a big responsibility and should be given careful consideration. It is a wonderful way to give back to the community by providing a loving home for children in need. ## Shape Our Fremont

Where Fremont residents can learn about shaping proposed housing developments



## The Latest Proposals for

#### **3-Story Townhouses**

There are 94 more 3-story townhouses that have just been proposed for four more developments around Fremont. Twelve old homes, many that are now affordable to those with a medium income, will be replaced with luxury townhouses that may well sell for close to the million-dollar range.

The landscape of Fremont's major streets is changing. Every available lot is being filled with tall, densely packed townhouses. Many have four or five bedrooms.

#### **Preliminary Review Procedure (PRP)**

Developers can submit early plans to the Planning Department for a Preliminary Review Procedure (PRP). The Planning Department reviews the project from several different aspects and prepares a report of issues it finds with the preliminary plans. Larger projects may also be reviewed by Caltrans or the water district.

Developers use information from the PRP report to decide whether to go forward with the project and/or to help them shape their formal development application. Interior streets,



building design, density, open space, etc. may change.

Residents may view the preliminary plans at the Planning Department. Contact the Planning Department and/or the City Staff Project Planner assigned to the project. Letting the city know your concerns regarding these early plans may help shape the result.

There are now a total of 1685 housing units in 13 proposed developments that are undergoing a Preliminary Review Procedure. Here are the latest four:

#### **Centerville Town Center**

PERALTA BLVD TOWN-HOMES PRP (PLN2015-00176): Seven lots from 3590 to 3498 Peralta Blvd. plus 3678 Parish Ave. This is on the south side of Peralta Blvd. between Parish Ave. and Sequoia Rd.

A total of 9 small old homes would be torn down. Many of the houses are more than 50 years old and may require a historical evaluation. There is also a small commercial center opposite Sequoia Rd. that would be removed.

A developer plans to build 54 townhouses in twelve 3-story buildings on 2.67 acres. There will be 24 townhouses in four tall

buildings with flat-faced front facades lining Peralta Blvd. This contrasts to the townhouses across the street in Sequoia Crossings which have individualized fronts with stone pillars.

The preliminary plans do not include floor plans. Each townhouse has either a side-by-side or tandem 2-car garage. There are also 16 on-site and 11 on-street guest parking spaces. Vehicular access into the development is off both Peralta Blvd. and Parish Ave.

#### Centerville Adjacent to Glenmoor Gardens

CENTRAL AVENUE TOWNHOMES PRP (PLN2015-00197): 4467 Central Ave. This is on Central Ave. near the end of where Logan Dr. comes out of Glenmoor Gardens.

The Grupe Company plans to build 10 townhouses in two 3story buildings on 0.50 acres. The two 5-plexes are parallel to Central Ave.

The units have three bedrooms with an optional fourth



bedroom on the first floor. Each townhouse has a side-by-side 2-car garage. There are also five uncovered guest parking spaces on the site. Vehicular access into the development will use the existing access off Central Ave. to the Ladera project behind the property.

#### **North Fremont**

The Grupe Company plans to build 12 residential condominiums in four 3-story buildings on 0.58 acres.

Eight townhouses have three bedrooms with an optional fourth bedroom on the first floor. The other four are two-bedroom "stacked flats" with the living space for each unit all on one floor. Each condominium has a side-by-side or tandem 2-car garage. There are also



six uncovered guest parking spaces on the site.

Fifteen units have three bedrooms and an office space. Three smaller units have two bedrooms. Each townhouse has a side-byside or tandem 2-car garage. There are also nine uncovered parking spaces on the site.

This parcel had been part of the city-funded acquisition of land for affordable housing. It was not needed for the Laguna Commons project and was sold.

## Void Area 3 & 4 Project Approval Prevent a Disaster

On March 26, 2015, Newark's City Council approved the Recirculated Final Environmental Impact Report (RFEIR) and Specific Plan for the Area 3 & 4 Development to build 1,200 homes, a golf course or recreational facility on a 950 acre site behind the Silliman Center.

I support development of Area 3. But, I oppose the development of Area 4, which contains invaluable and irreplaceable wetlands, marshlands, and uplands.

Assistant City Manager Terrence Grindall stated at the March 12, 2015 Planning Commission hearing that: "landfill from this project would not increase the risk of flooding in any part of Newark". I am concerned at the continued failure by the City to properly and candidly disclose the dangers of this project even after a lawsuit criticized the City for doing the same with its prior EIR.

Imagine all the 559 acres of wetlands, uplands, and marshlands as a giant sponge. By developing half of the lands to place in-fill, cement, and homes; this will cut this imaginary sponge in half. A sponge that remains intact, not the one cut in half and has cement, is more effective at absorbing water. Thus, despite any deceptive claims otherwise, developing these lands will increase the risk of flooding to future and current residents of Newark.

Likewise, several regulatory agencies like US Fish and Wildlife Service, San Francisco Bay Area Conservation and Development Commission and San Francisco Water Board have all repeatedly expressed their disapproval for the project.

On page 159 of the RFEIR, The Regional Water Board indicated that "no commenting federal or State agency with jurisdiction over waters and wetlands has indicated approval of the proposed mitigation measures". Despite any mitigations suggested, Area 4 cannot be developed without damaging it permanently and forever.

Developing a golf course when golf courses around the nation and the Bay Area are closing down from lack of demand and drought conditions is not considering the future well-being of the city. Constructing another recreational facility when our City must subsidize the Silliman Center \$3 million every year and can only have our Community Center open twice a week is not considering the future well-being of the City. Building entire neighborhoods that require up to 2.1 million cubic yards of in-fill and will forever be vulnerable to liquefaction is not considering the future well-being of the City. Destroying the City's natural flood protections, which are better and cheaper than any artificial levees or barriers, is not considering the future well-being of the city.

Alternative 3 identified in the RFEIR is the best option going forward. Development would only occur on Area 3, not Area 4. The City gets housing and space for a school. The marshlands can become a unique bayside destination that adds to our City's pride and can become a real research site to our Ohlone College, Newark campus. Newark citizens benefit by not creating a waterwasting expensive golf course, more recreational facilities that cannot pay for themselves and homes that will forever be at-risk of liquefaction or flooding.

## World-famous Saxophonists Highlight Jazz Festival



Bob Mintzer and Tia Fuller will be featured artists in evening concerts on April 16 and 17. Mintzer performs on Thursday, April 16 with the CSUEB Latin Jazz Combo and the Jazz Orchestra to offer contemporary Latin jazz and a big band sound. A performer, composer, and teacher, Mintzer has played saxophone for the Grammy award-winning Yellow Jackets for 20 years and traveled the globe performing with quartets.

Touring performer, composer, and full-time professor, Fuller brings contemporary jazz to the forefront, performing with jazz vocalists, CSUEB Jazz Ensemble and CSUEB Jazz Orchestra. ## Spring into action and donate blood with the Red Cross

The American Red Cross encourages eligible blood donors to make a difference in the lives of patients this spring by giving blood.

Donated blood is perishable and must be constantly replenished to keep up with the demand. Red blood cells, with a shelf life of only 42 days, are the most frequently transfused blood component, and are always needed by hospitals.

Eligible donors can give red cells through either a regular whole blood donation or a double red cell donation, where available. Double red cell donations yield twice the usual amount of red cells in a single appointment and are accepted at select donation locations. Double red cell donors must meet additional eligibility criteria, which will be determined at the donation appointment.

Donors with all blood types are needed, especially those with types O negative, A negative and B negative. Whole blood can be donated every 56 days, and double red cells may be donated every 112 days, up to three times per year.

## Hazward Fault Line: Overdue


s Californians, we know that our beautiful state isn't just surfing and golden poppies. We may not have hurricanes or destructive tornadoes, but the probability of an earthquake is inevitable. An earthquake is the release of energy from two tectonic plates called a fault. Prior to an earthquake, tectonic forces result in a gradual buildup of strain energy stored on either side of the fault. When the stress along the fault becomes too large, the fault slips suddenly and releases stored energy. Rupture on the fault plane is called the focus and projection of this point on the ground surface is called the epicenter.

The longest fault line in California is the San Andreas, which runs about 810 miles vertically through coastal California. The Hayward Fault is a part of the San Andreas Fault system, measuring 40 miles long and eight miles deep. It runs through Richmond, El Cerrito, Berkeley, Oakland, San Leandro, Hayward, Union City, Fremont, and San Jose.

"The Fremont fault line [Hayward] is rated at 78 percent, and we are overdue on a historical average of 42 years and counting," said John Lord, President/CEO of Lord Consulting in Fremont. Lord is almost done completing the FEMA(Federal Emergency Management Agency) online courses, all Red Cross courses, US Coast Guard Auxiliary courses, Citizen's Academy, PEP/CERT (Personal Emergency Preparedness, Community Emergency Response Training) fire department preparedness training, HAZMAT (hazardous materials), as well as many other courses in ham radio, meteorology, and geology. He predicts flooding, landslides, home and building damage and liquefaction in the event of an earthquake on the Hayward Fault, much like the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake.

The Loma Prieta earthquake occurred on October 17 along the San Andreas Fault near Loma Prieta peak in the Santa Cruz Mountains. With a maximum Modified Mercalli Scale, which uses a twelve-point Roman numeral scale to describe damage, of IX (Violent), and a Richter scale, which measures the magnitude on a logarithmic scale, of 6.9, the shock caused 63 deaths and 3,757 injuries.

The highest number of fatalities, 42, occurred in Oakland because of the Cypress Street Viaduct collapse on Interstate 880, where the upper level of a doubledeck portion of the freeway collapsed, crushing the cars on the lower deck. Rebuilding the freeway took 11 years. One 50-foot section of the Bay Bridge also collapsed, causing one death. Three people were killed in the collapse of buildings along the Pacific Garden Mall in Santa Cruz, and five people were killed in the collapse of a brick wall on Bluxome Street in San Francisco. In the Marina District of San Francisco four people died, four buildings were destroyed by fire, and



seven buildings collapsed. 12,000 homes and 2,600 businesses were damaged. 4,000 landslides occurred in the Santa Cruz Mountains, one of which caused Highway 17 to be closed for about a month.

Also in Santa Cruz, 40 buildings collapsed, killing six people. There were structural failures of twin bridges across Struve Slough near Watsonville. In Moss Landing, the liquefaction destroyed the causeway that carried the Moss Beach access road across tidewater basin. An estimated 1.4 million people lost power following the quake, mainly due to damaged electrical substations. San Francisco Municipal Railway (Muni) lost all power to electric transit systems when the quake hit, but suffered little damage and no injuries to operators or riders.

The last large earthquake to occur on the Hayward Fault was on October 21, 1868. According to the Math Science Nucleus in Fremont, its epicenter was likely located near Hayward, and its magnitude is estimated to have been 6.8 to 7.0 on the Richter scale, resulting in 30 deaths. At the surface, ground rupture was traced for 20 miles, from San Leandro to Fremont. The Alameda County Courthouse in San Leandro and the adobe chapel of Mission San Jose were destroyed, among many other buildings.

"Fremont dangers are probably less than most cities, said Joyce R. Blueford, Ph.D., Board President of the Math Science Nucleus. "Most of Fremont has ranch-style houses with wood framing, perfect for earthquake country. All the infrastructure, water and gas, have been going through extensive retrofitting over the last 10 years and is almost

"The Calaveras Dam is being retrofitted to handle a 6.2 earthquake, with more dam buttressing of an earth and rock dam emplacement," said Lord. "The cost is \$200 million in two year's construction period. They found that the eastern edge of the dam had been built on an ancient landslide, where they are now digging and finding dinosaur fossils. Another \$200 million and two years are needed to buttress, dig out, and reinstall the eastern edge of the dam, for it to be considered retrofitted."

According to Lord, in 2012 the Alameda County CERT group held a meeting in San Lorenzo with the UC Berkeley geology department, who estimated the next earthquake in Fremont to be a 6.2 to 6.5 magnitude.

Meeting the daily recommendation of fruit and vegetables to maintain good health can be a struggle, even when we live or work near a grocery store or market that provides a reliable selection of fresh produce. But what if we live in a neighborhood that lacks that basic consumer good? Addressing a creative solution to that problem is the subject of "The Apple Pushers" (applepushers.com/), a powerful documentary film that follows the stories of five immigrant pushcart vendors who joined a New York City initiative to increase the availability of fresh fruits and vegetables in inner-city neighborhoods identified as "food deserts," where finding a fresh red ripe apple and other fresh produce can be a serious challenge.

Hayward Public Library and Project EAT of the Alameda County Office of Education invite community members to a free public showing of "The Apple Pushers" on Saturday, April 11. High school students and panelists will use the film as a launching point for discussion of the film's themes that community members are grappling with locally, including food access, obesity, immigration, and entry-level entrepreneurship.

Watch the film and discuss current efforts to increase the availability of fresh, locally grown fruits and vegetables in the Hayward area through community gardens, community-supported agriculture, and the borrowing and exchanging of seeds at the Hayward Seed Lending Library.

Hayward and San Lorenzo high school students will share information about their work to expand healthy choices on their

school campuses. Students have identified issues ranging from a lack of variety of fruit and vegetables in school lunches to a lack of sheltered spaces to eat on school campuses. They will report on the results of focus groups, surveys, and photographs that reveal the need for healthy changes at their schools.

Panelists will include Sandy Frost of the Hayward Food Access Committee and Ashland/Cherryland Food Policy Council, which addresses urban agriculture policy to promote economic development; and Mt. Eden High School teacher Matthew Amaral, who directs a classroom project and student research aimed at providing an alternative to fast food culture and food deserts.

Quickly and efficiently, crews respond to citywide blight issues such as litter, graffiti and illegal dumping and dispatch them in short order. But thanks to Hayward residents and their support of Measure C last June, the department is now even more formidable. With five new staff members joining the ranks, the team is now taking the fight to the source, actively targeting problem areas and wiping out litter and graffiti proactively.

Since the new staffers began three weeks ago, crews have picked up 63 cubic yards – 252 trash bags – of loose litter on main thoroughfares, painted more than 2,140 square feet of graffiti and removed 26 cubic yards of large scale illegal dumping. And they're just getting started...

## Students prepare for cultural exchange

This summer, a group of 12 students and two teachers will be visiting Germany as part of an ambitious cultural exchange program. This program began five years ago under the auspices of the Fulbright Kommission. The Fulbright Kommission was established by treaty following World War II to use surplus war property to fund the "promotion of international good will through the exchange of students in the fields of education, culture, and science." In the summer of 2010, Ms. Risha Krishna, Ethnic Studies teacher at Fremont's Mission San Jose High School, visited Germany on a Fulbright scholarship in order to experience the school system and build a program to connect high school students across the globe. She created the German Cultural Exchange Program, for the purpose of enhancing diplomatic relations among students at an early age.

At the heart of the program is the immersion of students from two schools across the globe in each other's cultures – Mission High in Fremont, and Otto-Hahn Gymnasium, in Gottingen, Germany. Both are high-performing schools with similar demographics and longstanding reputations for academic excellence. The emphasis in this program is not on academics, however. Rather, students are en-

couraged to interact and learn about daily etiquette, humanizing teenagers in ways that cannot be learned from a distance. The goal and hope of the German Cultural Exchange Program is that personal ties and mutual understanding, once firmly established in a core group of young people, will seed a growing branch work of diplomatic ties rooted in the exchange of persons, compassions, and skills.

Each student will live with a family of his/her German partner in the cozy but globally signifi-

cant town of Gottingen. Gottingen, perhaps the most famous town most
Americans have never heard of, is academically centered, takes pride in its emphasis on education, and is home to the prestigious Gottingen University. To an historian, it's a quaint intellectual haven with ancient roots, graciously spared by the Allied bombers. To an engineer, it is Silicon Valley meets Measurement Valley. It is likely that Gottingen counts more Nobel Laureates per capita than any other town or city in the world.



Twelve students have been selected to represent Mission High, led by Ms. Krishna and Dr. Brucker, Math and Computer Science teacher at Mission High. They will have virtually no contact with their home families short of sending occasional photos. In addition to sampling school life in a German classroom, American students will visit Berlin, Dresden, Heidelberg and other historic sites. German students from Otto-Hahn school will make a reciprocal visit to Mission High and the Bay Area community in 2016.

In preparations for the travels, the Mission High students are holding monthly bonding sessions, engaging in socially themed events of the students' making. They're learning how much work it takes to form and sustain a team, as well as honing their German phrases. Already, they are online with their host German partners and are coming to understand each other on a personal level by sharing hobbies, music, classes, and family life. And, shortly, they will come to realize how illusory a "connected" world is in the absence of direct human contact.



#### First positive birds signal West Nile Virus season in Santa Clara County

The Santa Clara County Vector Control District (SCCVCD) has confirmed that three dead American Crows have tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV) in the South Bay. The birds were found on March 19 and 20 in San Jose (zips 95124 and 95123), and on March 20 in Cupertino (zip 95014).

While human infections normally do not occur until summer, residents can start now to play a strategic role in reducing the spread of West Nile Virus.

A single poorly maintained pool in the back yard can produce millions of mosquitoes. Delivery of mosquito-eating fish for pools, ponds, horse troughs, and other closed water containers can be requested by calling (408-918-4770) or e-mailing (vectorinfo@deh.sccgov.org) the Vector Control District.

It is also important for all residents to take the following precautions against mosquito bites:

Protect yourself if you are outside when mosquitoes are most active, especially at dawn and the first two hours after sunset.

When outdoors, wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts. Apply insect repellent containing DEET, oil of lemon eucalyptus, IR3535, or picaridin according to label instructions.

Make sure that doors and windows have tight-fitting screens. Repair or replace screens that have tears or holes.

Contact the Vector Control District if you are being bothered by mosquitoes or know of a potential mosquito-breeding source.

Dead birds act as an early warning system for West Nile Virus. A bird that tests positive for WNV alerts health officials that the virus is active in an area. Santa Clara County residents are requested to report dead birds online at www.westnile.ca.gov. The District will pick up and test dead crows, ravens, jays and magpies that have been dead for less than 48 hours.

Transmitted by mosquito bites, WNV causes mild to severe flu-like symptoms such as fever, headache, body aches and, in severe cases, significant neurological symptoms or even death. The elderly and those with compromised immune systems are most susceptible to serious infection.

t begins with a legislative "fix" that will address a perceived problem... past, present or future. A rule, ordinance or law is created to solve and clarify acceptable behavior. As time passes however, unforeseen complications are repeatedly fixed by modifications to the first rule. Fast forward to the future when many adjustments often obscure the intent of the first fix. By this time, there may be economic consequences of starting over. For instance, although our current tax system is incomprehensible and heavily flawed, can you imagine implementation of an understandable and simple tax code? Those that profit through tax season would be in tatters; many seasonal and annual tax practitioners would desperately be looking for customers.

Mandates and special interests are often behind compartmentalization of funds in public coffers. This is by design and may serve a good purpose, but is a double-edged sword when control is wrested from the recipient. Often legislative mandates come from those who have little or no responsibility to fulfill them. For example, gas tax funds are relegated to specific uses and now are reduced by hybrid and electric vehicles that use less or no gasoline, reducing the income for road maintenance. The same goes for budgeted capital expenditures such as parks when there is no provision for maintenance funds when constructed. In service charge increase will be held at

## The bureaucratic burden

Fremont, funds are available to build parks but where is the money for maintenance?

An example of mandatory compliance and little outside funding is the requirement for Alameda Creek Water District (ACWD) to comply with the Endangered Species Act. While reintroduction and preservation of native migratory fish is a commendable goal, who pays the millions of dollars for fish ladders and fish screens - an estimated \$25 million? Here again, those who mandate such measures are often absent when funds are necessary for implementation. The common good is a laudable goal, but when agencies are required to implement and fund such projects, one way or another, the money required comes out of our pockets. It is all part of an infrastructure necessary to comply with the wishes of not only constituents, but special interests as well. Our cities, schools and public agencies are faced with a multitude of demands, not only from their customers, but satisfying legislative needs as well.

As budgets are reviewed, finalized and developed for our cities, requirements of staff and elected officials are not always by their design. Mandates and regulations can act as safeguards to allow close inspection and protection of our environment, but the costs, direct or indirect, are borne by all of us. In the current drought, for instance, the juxtaposition of conservation and cost seems unreasonable. Creation of higher fees while conserving seems counterintuitive; but infrastructure costs are not a function of drought conditions. Some aspects of the cost of delivering water such as staff costs, infrastructure and delivery fees of the ACWD budget can be debated, but others are mandated and inflexible.

A public hearing to discuss a proposed

ACWD Headquarters on April 14, 2015 at 6 p.m. The debate should center on the value of a resource and the cost of continued delivery in a safe and reasonable manner. For most single family residential customers, this would result in a bimonthly bill increase of approximately 8%. This increase proposed should be debated on its merits, not personalities. This is your chance to give direct testimony on pricing of a commodity that is indispensible and irreplaceable for all of us. Your fellow citizens, sitting as board members, are holding this hearing to explain the bureaucratic burden of efficient delivery of safe water and listen to constructive comments, not personal attacks.

## Apps Challenge

Alameda County will continue its push for greater community participation and government transparency on Saturday, April 25, at the Alameda County Apps Challenge 2015.1, a unique day-long event in Union City, designed to challenge the public to create web and mobile applications using Alameda County open data sets.

This is the fourth community hackathon sponsored by Alameda County in its effort to increase citizen engagement and broaden public understanding of local government by opening access to data created and kept by County agencies and departments. The Union City event is expected to bring together more than 120 software developers, community members, activists and entrepreneurs for a full day of creativity, collaboration and innovation.

The Challenge is being cohosted by the offices of Alameda County Administrator Susan S. Muranishi and County Supervisor Richard Valle, whose district includes Union City. The event is being produced and managed by Alameda County's Information Technology Department.

A Grand Prize of \$3,000 will be awarded to the most inventive and user-friendly app or concept that benefits Alameda County residents, businesses and visitors. A second prize of \$1,500, a third prize of \$500, and honorable mentions will also be awarded.

The Apps Challenge is part of a nation-wide movement stemming in part from President Obama's Open Government Initiative, which directed government agencies to increase transparency and implement open data policies. Alameda County launched its series of community Apps Challenges in 2012 and was one of the first counties in California to host its own hackathons to promote its open data offerings.

Alameda County invites participation from residents of all skill levels and age groups: professional and novice developers, high school and college students, seniors, and residents with no technical background but a passion for civic engagement. Each team at the hackathon will include a mixture of coders and "idea" people working together to create functional apps or develop app concepts.

Participants in the April 25 event will have access to the nearly 180 data sets available through the Alameda County Data Sharing Initiative at http://data.acgov.org.

## Robert N. Creveling



## **CSUEB** Hall of Fame Coach Bob McGuire Dies at 87



Longtime Pioneer cross country and track & field coach Bob McGuire passed away March 24, 2015 at the age of 87 after a brief illness.

A resident of Pleasant Hill, McGuire was inducted in the Cal State East Bay Athletics Hall of Fame in 1996. He was the head coach for women's cross country and track & field at East Bay (then known as Cal State Hayward) from 1978-92. Prior to that, McGuire coached at Pleasant Hill High School from 1956-78.

McGuire guided the Pioneers to the NCAA Division II Track and Field national championship in 1981. His cross country teams captured back-to-back AIAW Division II national titles in 1979 and 1980.

He coached numerous All-Americans during his 14-year tenure in Hayward and was named Northern California Athletic Conference Coach of the Year six times. In addition, 10 of McGuire's former student-athletes have been inducted into the Pioneer Hall of Fame.

## artist Ming-Chien Liang - Beyond Words

Ming-Chien Liang's work in brush painting combines the "traditional spontaneous" style with a direct study of nature. While striving for the ideal of Chinese brush painting to say the most with the least, often she feels the need to break free from rules and uses a detailed, layered approach.

When modern life is wrought with overwhelming complexity, Ming-Chien chooses a style that is relatively direct and representational. Her subjects are mostly about nature which never fails to inspire with billowing clouds, forbidden mountains, mysterious moon and stars, or even a tiny wildflower that breathes its humble breath.

Her portraits focus on the gaze that bespeaks the mood, the upheavals, fleeting, unquiet moments beyond words and appearances.

Ming-Chien was born into a family of artists; her art experiences were initiated by her mother Dan-Fong Liang and sister Ming-Yi Liang. #### Fremont Fire hosts 41st California Fire **Explorer Academy**

The Fremont Fire Department, in coordination with Camp Parks RFTA and the California Fire Exploring Association, will be hosting the 41st Annual California Fire Exploring Academy. This event delivers intense firefighting training to 160 youth ranging from 15-21 years of age. The fire explorers attending this academy will represent over 40 different fire departments from throughout the state of California and Nevada. This week long training event will provide valuable "hands-on" instruction in the areas of Auto Extrication, FF Survival, Forcible Entry, Rescue Systems, Structural and Wildland Firefighting.

Four individual training sites have been established to deliver the five manipulative disciplines. Two sites in the City of Fremont: Fremont Tactical Training Center (7200 Stevenson Blvd) and Insurance Auto Auction Inc. (6700 Stevenson Blvd). These two sites will deliver the auto extrication, rescue systems, and FF survival training. The wildland and structural firefighting training will be delivered at the Camp Parks RFTA. Students will also be housed, fed, and attend nightly lectures on the installation.

The California Fire Exploring Association (CFEA) has dedicated itself to training the "future of the fire service" for the past 41 years. It takes upwards of 100 professional firefighters to deliver this training safely. Many of these firefighters were once participants of this event and have returned to volunteer their time to provide the same incredible training for these cadets.

A public hearing on the replenishment assessment for Fiscal Year (FY) 2015/16 will be held at 6:00 P.M. on Tuesday, April 14, 2015, in the Board Room at the Alameda County Water District (ACWD) Headquarters, 43885 South Grimmer Boulevard,

ACWD staff is proposing an 8.6% increase in the replenishment assessment rate for groundwater pumped or extracted for purposes other than agricultural and municipal recreation, effective July 1, 2015. This would change the rate from \$313 to \$340 per acre-foot of groundwater extracted. Only property owners with a well, well owners, and operators of wells (or other groundwater extraction facilities) within the ACWD-managed Niles Cone Groundwater Basin would be affected by this proposed rate increase. It does not apply to the rates and charges for water served to residences and businesses by ACWD's distribution system. The basis for the proposed 8.6% increase is set forth in the 2015 Survey Report on Groundwater Conditions (Survey Report) and Resolution 15-007, which are available for review at the ACWD Headquarters. 



#### Revoke FAME's Charter

The Alameda County Board of Education will soon make an important decision regarding the educational future of hundreds of students. The decision to not-renew a school's charter - in essence closing the school – cannot be easy; but in this instance, is the correct one to make and is in the very best interest of students and their families.

For the past 10 years, the Fremont Unified School District (FUSD) has provided classrooms for a charter school - The Families of Alameda for Multi-Cultural/Multi-Lingual Education (FAME). FAME is a taxpayer-funded, charter school providing K-12 education that operates as an independent school dis-

Unfortunately, this autonomy has resulted in numerous instances of financial impropriety and mismanagement. A 2008 audit revealed that compensation for FAME's CEO/Founder was 'excessive for a public school administrator.' In 2010, the Alameda County Grand Jury expressed concerns about the number of Independent Study students enrolled at FAME who study from home. While these students (32% of the student body) do not attend school, FAME receives full taxpayer funding for each, allowing revenue to be diverted to other areas. The Grand Jury also questioned FAME's financial viability, sizeable legal fees, high-interest loans and delinquent payments for rent and to vendors. Just last month, FAME borrowed money at 17.5% interest to pay employees and keep its doors open.

In terms of management, FAME has demonstrated little stability or reliability. The relationship between FAME's former CEO and its Board was toxic, resulting in lengthy litigation and a 2014 jury verdict of wrongful termination and malice against the current CEO. FAME continues to show a dearth of leadership, lack of transparency and the inability to pay bills and meet legal deadlines.

Financial and management issues aside, the most important question the County must ask is whether FAME serves the educational needs of students? The charter renewal process requires determination of whether student achievement at FAME is "at least equal" to that of

schools the student would otherwise attend. In comparison to FUSD:

- FAME's four-year cohort high school graduation rate of 73%. FUSD's is 83%.
- FAME met 15 Adequate Yearly Progress criteria. FUSD met 30.
- FAME's Academic Performance Index in 2013 - 781. FUSD's is 891.

Charter school law allows independent charter schools to function outside the control of school districts and school board management - with fewer rules but increased accountability. Charter school boards are public trustees, spending the taxpayer's money as incubators for local education reform - with expectations that their performance should exceed the local schools and their best practices will be shared with other public schools. We see no practices we'd like to emulate.

While the promise of charter law is to allow parents to select the best school for their students, it should not allow poor choices just for the sake of choice. Based on comparisons of student achievement, FAME is far underperforming local schools and is not meeting the academic needs of students. The needs of both high-performing and struggling students are not being addressed. A 27% dropout rate is unacceptable for any educational institution - public or charter. Students deserve better.

Citing "poor management, unsophisticated financial controls, and a broken governance model," the Alameda County Grand Jury concluded that FAME's charter should be revoked. On behalf of students throughout our community, we support this recommendation and urge the County Board of Education to make the right decision for students.

#### **Open letter to Superintendent Marken** and Newark Board of Education

In recent weeks, there has been some confusion circulating around the Newark community regarding the Ruschin School property. While the Alameda County Office of Education (ACOE) does provide fiscal oversight for the 18 districts in Alameda County, we are not involved in the day-to-day operations of the schools. Five dedicated people serve on the Board of Education work tirelessly to ensure Newark schools are a great place to work and educate our youth. The same goes for Dr. Marken, an experienced educator with a track record of success throughout his long career in

As your elected representative it is my responsibility to ensure everyone understands the quality education ACOE provides for students we serve directly. One of the programs we operate for the benefit of all school districts in the County is court school for incarcerated youth at the Juvenile Justice Center and Camp Sweeny in San Leandro. In addition, we operate two community schools for teen mothers at Burke Academy in Hayward and Fruitvale Academy in Oakland, and another community school, Hayward Community School, open to all students. While our students are considered to be at-risk due to life circumstances, they continue to pursue an education and value the support of ACOE teachers and staff as well as the surrounding community. We have wonderful teachers and support staff who have expertise working with this at-risk population. Students are often more successful in this environment due to targeted instruction and the intervention supports they receive to get them back on track.

Further, let us be clear that ACOE has no intention of locating a school in Newark at this time. The majority of students we educate at our Hayward campus are from Hayward and Union City. There are rarely students from Newark or Fremont enrolled as these two districts either have no students in need of this alternative educational path or are capably serving these students' needs within their own districts.

I look forward to continuing our respectful work together toward our common mission and am available to you by phone or email at any time. Our new Superintendent Karen Monroe is committed to working closely with students in the communities we serve throughout Alameda County and looks forward to addressing the Board and Newark Community on April 21st to add clarity and invite collaboration.
