Say Happy Birthday to Ardenwood Farm

Who gets older but looks better with age? No, the answer isn't Brad Pitt, but Fremont's own Ardenwood Farm. The iconic and beloved farm and park turns thirty this year, and invites everyone to a birthday celebration this month.

Ardenwood's history began in the early 1850s when George Washington Patterson traveled to California, hoping to strike it rich during the Gold Rush. Although he never shouted "Eureka!" while looking for gold, his land purchase in 1856 in Washington Township – the early beginnings of Fremont – proved to be price-

Slither down to Sulphur Creek for the Reptile Rally

Have you ever wanted to get up close and personal with a slithery snake or a crawling lizard, or perhaps see what the differences are between a turtle and a tortoise? Everyone will get the chance to do these and more at the Bay Area Amphibian and Reptile Society's (BAARS) annual "Reptile Rally," a free event scheduled for Saturday, July 25 at the Sulphur Creek Nature Center (SCNC) in Hayward.

"BAARS will be showcasing a lot of reptiles and amphibians that their members have," said Wendy Winsted, Recreation Coordinator for Sulphur Creek Nature Center, adding, "(there will be) a variety of exotic and native snakes, lizards, turtles, and tortoises. Visitors will be

Celebrating California's Green Rush of '65

A number of requirements had to be in place when a U.S. Territory petitioned Washington for statehood. Along with an established form of government and a constitution in compliance with America's constitution, the next two most critical were a minimum population (60,000) and a reliable treasury. The Gold Rush of 1849 certainly resulted in a boom in California's population as well as a des-

perate need for civil government, but the wildly fluctuating fortunes gained and lost in the gold fields did not lead to financial stability. California became the 31st state on September 9, 1850, but its rowdy golden youth gave way only fifteen years later to spectacular financial soundness due to the establishment of the California Nursery Company (CNC) founded by John Rock in Niles in 1865.

Back to School To-Do List: Get Your Child in for a Check-Up and on the Road to Healthier Eating

This summer, your son or daughter may be required to have a physical exam before school starts. It might be needed for entry into a certain school or grade, or it might be for an activity like sports.

“There are times when a school requires children to have a check-up before school starts. But, parents should keep in mind that their child should have a physical exam every year, even when there is no school requirement,” recommends local pediatrician Bhaskari Peela, MD, who practices with Washington Township Medical Foundation.

Regular check-ups offer many benefits, like screenings to identify potential problems before they become more serious. Seeing a doctor at least once a year also gives children another caring, knowledgeable adult, besides their parents, with whom they can share their thoughts and concerns. This is especially important as your son or daughter reaches middle and high school.

"Kids are busy and involved in many things, and they are not always comfortable talking it over with their mom or dad," Dr. Peela explained. "Children can be faced with good and bad choices, and a doctor can offer guidance."

When your daughter or son has regular check-ups, it gives the doctor an opportunity to assess many aspects of their life. The doctor can make recommendations about lifestyle and behavioral issues that

may affect the child's health, such as TV and monitor time or good nutrition. Sometimes, young people are more willing to comply with advice that comes from their doctor rather than mom or dad.

Limit screen time

“Besides hours spent on computers for school and studying, kids today tend to spend a lot of their free time in front of a TV or monitor, playing video games and using mobile phones or exploring the internet,” commented Dr. Peela. “Parents should try to limit their child’s time in front of a screen for this purpose to no more than two hours a day. This can be broken up into shorter increments.”

To help parents monitor their child's screen time, she recommended computers and other devices be kept in a communal area of the house and not in a child's bedroom.

“Too much screen time beginning at a very young age can affect a child’s ability to pay attention,” Dr. Peela explained. “But I have noticed that, when parents limit screen time for kids even as young as 4 to 6, it makes a difference in their ability to concentrate.”

It's also important to make sure your child's mobile phone and other devices that have access to the internet are protected.

"It's amazing what kids are exposed to online these days," she stated. "When it

comes to photos, most youngsters don't understand that images sent on the internet go everywhere and can be seen by anyone."

Eating healthy makes a difference

Getting ready for back-to-school is also a good opportunity to assess your child's eating habits and get them on the road to a healthier lifestyle that supports better performance in the classroom. One of the most important things kids can do is to eat breakfast.

“Children can get into the habit of skipping breakfast, especially once they are in high school and parents have less influence over their meals. Kids should start the day eating something healthy, even if it’s just a small piece of whole wheat toast or an egg,” stated Dr. Peela. “Besides providing fuel to begin the day, eating breakfast helps maintain a healthy body weight.”

One thing parents can do to encourage children to eat healthier is to involve them in meal planning. Ask your child what they would like to eat for breakfast or dinner and then work together to come up with a nutritious, appealing menu. Encourage them to explore and experiment with different foods and tastes.

In general, the best way to help your child eat a healthier diet is to make small changes over a longer period of time. And, remember that you, as a parent, are a role model for your child's eating habits.

History and Accomplishments of the Washington Hospital Service League

In 1955, three years before Washington Hospital opened its doors, a group of civic-minded local women met to consider how they could help in the effort to bring a community hospital to Washington Township Health Care District, in southern Alameda County.

By 1958, this small group of volunteers had raised \$15,000 for the hospital effort. In organizing and energizing a group of community volunteers, those few women gave birth to a major institution: the Washington Hospital Service League, still active today — 60 years later — with more than 500 men and women, including high school and college students, supporting the Hospital in numerous ways from fundraising to greeting patients and visitors.

The committed volunteers of the Washington Hospital Service League will be honored at a special 60th Anniversary Luncheon on Tuesday, October 13. All past and current Service League volunteers are encouraged to attend and to celebrate the impressive accomplishments of these past 60 years. Special guests will include former Service League presidents.

Service League President Debbie Jackson urges all present and past volunteers to join in the luncheon celebration.

“This event is a tribute to the past 60 years of volunteers who have given of themselves to our community while enhancing the lives of our patients, their families and friends,” she added. “The luncheon is an opportunity to walk down memory lane and reunite with old friends as well as make new ones.”

The celebration will be held in The Tent at Washington West, 2500 Mowry

Avenue, Fremont, with a reception from 11 a.m. to noon and the luncheon and program from noon to 2 p.m. Complimentary valet parking will be provided.

Service League volunteers provide thousands of hours of assistance to the Hospital each year. With almost 2 million hours of volunteer service logged during the past 60 years, the Service League also has raised and donated more than \$2.4 million for various Hospital needs, and over \$300,000

in student scholarships for those pursuing health careers.

In the beginning, Service League volunteers, known as “pink ladies” for the pink uniforms they wore, operated the lobby desk and gift shop. They ran a rummage shop and more recently were the first group to support the Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion, which is currently under construction, with a donation of \$300,000.

Service League volunteers can be found wherever one looks in the Hospital. Their duties and responsibilities range far and wide. In addition to raising funds and operating the gift shop, volunteers help discharge patients, keep concerned friends and family of patients updated on the condition of loved ones, provide emotional support to patients and assist staff with feeding some pa-

tients. Volunteers cuddle newborns in the Special Care Nursery and staff the Community Health Resource Library.

Sun Protection and Preventing Food Poisoning

Dear Doctor,
What advice do you have for sun protection this summer?

Dear Reader,

Sunburn is not only unpleasant but can also lead to skin cancer, including melanoma. To protect yourself from the harmful effects of the sun, be sure your sunscreen protects against both UVA and UVB rays. Remember to apply sunscreen to all parts of the exposed body even if shielded from the sun. Reapply every 2 hours and if you are in the water, reapply more frequently. Wear long-sleeved shirts and cover your face with a wide-brimmed hat.

In the event that sunburn does occur, remedies include: Tylenol and/or Benadryl and soothing topical creams such as aloe vera. In the case of blistering, use an antibiotic cream. With that said, do everything you can to prevent sunburn so that you don't have to worry about treatment or the long-term impact of sun damage.

Dear Doctor,
I think I got food poisoning after a barbecue last summer. What should I do differently this year to prevent it from happening again?

Dear Reader,

Spoiled foods at outdoor events like barbecues and picnics commonly cause upset stomach and diarrhea. To avoid this, be sure that meats are cooked thoroughly on the inside (chicken to 165°F, pork to 160°F, and beef to 145°F). Avoid bringing perishables, but if you can't, bring extra ice to place perishable items in. To avoid spoiling food in the cooler, pack in layers of ice so that the foods in the middle and bottom are less affected by the hot air rushing in.

Most food poisoning will go away after 24 hours. Follow a bland BRAT (banana, rice, applesauce, toast) diet until your symptoms resolve. If your symptoms last longer than a day, you should seek medical attention.

able to get face-to-face with reptiles and amphibians!”

People of all ages are invited to check out the event and even make a day of it by enjoying the beautiful SCNC, which Winsted describes as one of Hayward’s hidden gems. “It’s like walking down into a little oasis,” she explained, adding that people are encouraged to pack a picnic and spend some time in the park itself. The annual event is designed for visitors to easily and casually drop in and see the reptiles and amphibians on display. There will be face painting for the kids as well and volunteers on hand to answer questions about the animals.

Sulphur Creek Nature Center, managed by the Hayward Area

Recreation & Park District, is no stranger to wildlife. SCNC’s mission is “(to bring) people and animals closer together through wildlife rehabilitation and education.” If an animal is reported as ill (or otherwise injured) or abandoned, SCNC will accept the animal into its facility and do its best to rehabilitate it. “Often, we get to keep the animals. We have all this wildlife on display,” Winsted said of the Center, which is free to visit and open seven days a week. According to their website, SCNC treats an average of 900 wild animals a year. Wildlife educational outreach is also a part of SCNC’s mission. “We go out to schools all over the Bay Area, and reach out to 30,000 students a



year,” explained Winsted. They even attend birthday parties!

With all this wildlife outreach, it makes sense that BAARS

would find a home for the Reptile Rally at SCNC. Now over three decades old, BAARS is an organization of herpetology enthusiasts who have bonded over their love of all things reptile and amphibian. They volunteer to stage events like the Reptile Rally to educate the public on conservation and the lives of herptiles (reptiles or amphibians).

Guidelines that may help your child eat healthier also include:

- Make the food on the plate colorful—with greens, purples and reds.
- Encourage less white food and more brown—such as whole grain rice and whole wheat bread.
- Give middle and high schoolers the extra calcium and protein they need—like beans, chicken, turkey and egg whites.

Other examples of healthy foods that are quick, easy and appealing to kids are low fat string cheese, tofu, quinoa, Greek yogurt and lentils.

Trekking with your Pooch

If you're thinking of exploring the great outdoors with pooch in tow, remember a hike is often more than a casual stroll around the block. Keeping your canine buddy healthy and comfortable needs to be a primary consideration.

With their keen senses, dogs' appreciation of nature's sights, smells and sounds is an amazing trait, yet it can be hazardous. While you're both out traipsing through spectacular woods and valleys of our area it's important to remember to stay safe while you're having fun.

Be informed before taking off, proper gear and preparation are indispensable parts of a well-planned trek. Most dogs are ready for action—but they're not invulnerable to dangers in the great outdoors.

You've heard sad tales of dogs taking off after a rabbit or other critter only to disappear forever. Wild areas carry hazards that you can only try to predict and if you take your dog off-leash hopefully you've worked on a firm recall. Plus don't forget IDs - ever! Always make sure that your current contact information, including your cell phone number, is attached to your dog's collar or body harness. A microchip is added insurance to help bring him home safely.

It's important to have your veterinarian check your dog before hitting the trails to ensure that he or she is in shape for the adventure. Vaccines, especially rabies need to be current. Flat-muzzled dogs like Pugs have difficulty breathing in warm weather, and older, over-weight, or heavy coated dogs are more subject to heat exhaustion. Don't set out on a long hike if your dog isn't physically able to handle the distance – work up to longer walks.

Out of loyalty, dogs will over-extend themselves to keep up with their human so it's up to you to give careful consideration to their well-being. Don't be so taken with the scenery that you forget that half your journey is the trip back

and it's going to be hotter.

The most common hazards your dog, and in some cases you share, are often due to inattention to environmental factors.

Foxtails - Many people are unfamiliar with hazards to their dog from these opportunistic seeds. But if you've ever hiked during the dry season months, you've probably pulled a few of these sharp awns from your socks. They are the wheat-like seeds of the drying or dried grasses that detach from the plant and stick to clothing or an animal's coat. They can quickly become lodged in between a dog's toes, in his ears, and in his eyes. Since the seeds or awns are barbed, they can be very difficult to remove. They can swiftly travel through a body causing severe pain, infection and abscesses, even puncturing an eye or ear drum and must be removed ASAP by a veterinarian.

Symptoms can include persistent sneezing or coughing, head-shaking, or compulsive licking and biting at a paw or around the groin or tail area or whining and crying with no obvious or acute injury. Depending on where a foxtail seed has traveled inside a dog, it can even be life threatening, requiring surgery.

Stream water hazards - Giardia can infect a dog that drinks from a stream where feces from cattle or wild animals have come to drink. A dog becomes infected by eating or drinking the cyst form of the parasite. In the small intestine, the cyst opens and releases an active form that attaches itself to the intestinal wall and reproduces by dividing and is passed in the feces. The Giardia in the feces can contaminate the environment and water and infect other animals and people.

It may cause acute diarrhea or be chronic. Usually the infected animal will not lose their appetite, but they may lose weight. Giardia prevents proper absorption of nutrients, damages the delicate intestinal lining, and interferes with digestion. Prevention is the best medicine, carry bottled water for you...and your dog.

Blood suckers - Ticks must be one of Nature's bad jokes. They are disease carrying parasites that hide out in grass and attach themselves to the unsuspecting passerby. Crawling up to bare skin or digging for it, if on a dog, the tick will bury its head under the skin layer and proceed to drink all the blood it can get.

A thorough body check after a walk is essential. Rub your hands all over your dog's body, and your fingers through her coat, applying pressure so you can feel abnormalities in the skin. If you feel a small lump, pull the fur apart to investigate it further. An embedded tick will look like a small black or brown pimple, sometimes flattish, depending on location, sometimes legs are visible... Be sure to check in skin folds and orifices including the mouth.

Check with your veterinarian on the safe method of removal before venturing into wooded or grassy areas. It's good to check yourself out too; ticks carry Lyme disease, a very serious disease that can infect dogs and humans alike.

Weather dangers - Consider the temperature before you set out. A warm morning means that it will be a trek back in the hotter part of the day. Never walk or hike with your dog mid-day when the weather is warm, keep to early morning. Carry enough fresh water, rest frequently, and make sure there is shade along the way for a rest stop.

Sunburn can happen to white and lightly colored animals from too much exposure to the sun, long-term sun exposure can lead to skin damage and in some cases skin cancer. Unprotected ears are a primary location for sun damage. There are sun blocks that are suitable for animals but check the labels carefully.

Many of our parks have cattle/wildlife grazing. For the safety of your dog and out of respect for farmed animals and wildlife – leash your dog when you encounter them. You are a visitor in their home.

Recycling is now the law for all Newark businesses

Effective July 1, 2015, all businesses in Newark will be required to provide adequate onsite collection service for the amount of recyclable materials they produce. The new requirements are part of the second phase of Alameda County Waste Management Authority's Mandatory Recycling Ordinance 2012-01, which first took effect in July of 2012. Previously, only businesses generating four or more cubic yards of garbage per week and multi-family properties with five or more units were required to participate. Phase 2 of the ordinance extends these requirements to all businesses in Newark.

In order to comply, all businesses in Newark must:

Provide containers and service of sufficient number, size and frequency for recyclable materials.

Recycle all recyclable covered materials: cardboard, newspaper, mixed recyclable paper, recyclable glass food and beverage containers, metal (aluminum and steel) food and beverage containers, Polyethylene terephthalate (PET #1) and high-density polyethylene (HDPE #2) plastic bottles.

Ensure recycling containers are contamination free and contain only recyclable materials.

Provide information at least annually to employees, tenants and contractors describing how to properly use the recycling and garbage containers. This information must also be provided to each tenant during unit turnover no later than 14 days after move-in and no less than 14 days prior to move out.

The purpose of this ordinance is to reduce the amount of easily recyclable and compostable materials deposited in landfills. It was designed to help Alameda County Waste Management Authority reach its long-term waste reduction goals — specifically to ensure that less than 10 percent of the waste sent to landfills by 2020 is easily recyclable or compostable material.

Under Alameda County Waste Management Authority Ordinance 2012-01, Newark businesses that were not previously covered under the law have until the end of the year to complete the steps necessary to comply with the ordinance. Assistance and resources are available to help with compliance. No fines will be issued before January 1, 2016.

Ordinance requirements differ by jurisdiction. Some Alameda County jurisdictions, including Newark, have postponed certain requirements of Phase 2 of the ordinance. In jurisdictions that have fully opted in on the normal schedule, Phase 2 added new requirements to separate organics (food scraps and food-soiled paper) for all businesses and multi-family properties with five or more units as of July 1, 2014. Organics collection requirements in Newark are expected to be effective July 1, 2017.

Businesses and property managers are encouraged to check www.RecyclingRulesAC.org for details about Newark's requirements, as well as an overview of the services and support materials available to them. To start recycling service, businesses should contact Republic Services at (510) 657-3500. For additional information about the ordinance, including details about who is affected, how to comply and to request assistance, please call (510) 891-6575.

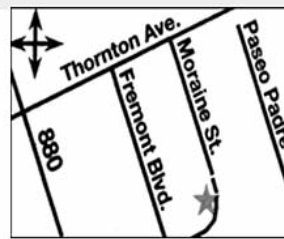

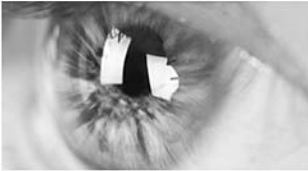

Tri-Cities Historical Societies Voting on Merger

Will Durant, an American writer and historian, once said, "Most of us spend too much time on the last twenty-four hours and too little on the last six thousand years." In today's culture of instant messages, constant Facebook news feeds, and ever-changing trends, what place does history hold? I don't mean your browser history. Real history is the story of humankind—our story.

The story of Fremont, California, begins long before the explorer John Charles Fremont arrived on the scene. First there were the native peoples. Then came the Spanish missionaries. Finally, gold was discovered and everyone headed west. Cities sprouted up as people from all around the world settled throughout California. The San Francisco Bay Area was an especially desirable location, and continues to be to this day.

Who were all of these people who faced hardship, lost loved ones, and fought to make a new life in this unfamiliar land? What were their stories? What legacy did they leave behind? And how can we pass this on to future generations? These are the kinds of questions that fuel the passion of local historical societies.

The Tri-City area has several historical societies: the Mission Peak Heritage Foundation, the Museum of Local History Guild, and the Washington Township Historical Society. Each group has its own niche in the region. The Mission Peak Heritage Foundation was founded in 1962 and is primarily responsible for the preservation of the Shinn Historical Park and Arboretum. They

give tours, hold special events throughout the year, and share the history of the Shinn family with visitors. The Washington Township Historical Society partners with the Mission Peak Heritage Foundation to maintain the Museum of Local History, located in the old Mission District firehouse at 190 Anza Street, across from Ohlone College.

Lately, the leadership among the groups has thinned a little. Many board members serve more than one society. Members of one society are often members of the other societies as well. For these reasons, and because there is "power in unity and power in numbers," it makes sense for the separate groups to merge into one historical society representing the Tri-City area.

Each group has met and discussed the pros and cons of a merger, and the overwhelming majority favor unification of the individual historical societies. Joan Serafino, President of the Mission Peak Heritage Foundation, says, "If we combine, we will join forces with members and staff. We'll have more clout." With a unified historical society, the group would have a greater voice in the Tri-Cities. Another benefit is that the city of Fremont has offered land at the California Nursery for the potential new society to build a 9,000 square foot museum, which is much better suited to this sizable region. The society would have to raise the funds to build the museum, but the gift of the land is a significant gesture on the part of the city.

The decision to merge came about in the fall of 2014. Lila Bringhurst, Vice President of the Museum of Local History Guild,

is credited with suggesting the merger. The proposed merger is still in the works at this time. The three societies continue to hold separate meetings while the new bylaws are being drawn up. Once the bylaws have been approved, each group will put the merger to a vote. The tentative name for the new organization is The Historical Society of Fremont, Newark, and Union City.

On Monday, July 27, the Washington Township Historical Society will be holding its bi-monthly meeting at the Museum of Local History. Frank Borghi, Jr., one of the presidents of the Alameda County Water District, was scheduled to speak, but is unfortunately facing some health issues. In his place, Jim Griffin will be the guest speaker. Griffin descends from Timothy Rix, an early settler of Fremont.

The preservation of local history is vital in passing on our story to future generations. The face of Fremont and the surrounding area is changing rapidly. By participating in historical societies, we can save a piece of our treasured past as an inheritance for those who come after us.

Hayward to break ground on 9/11 Memorial

Like most Americans, Hayward resident Michael L. Emerson was deeply shaken by the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. But as our collective confusion, anger and grief receded into history, Emerson discovered his passion: developing public memorials to preserve and honor the memory of the fallen.

On Friday, July 24 at 2 p.m., Emerson will break ground on his latest project, the Hayward 9/11 Memorial adjacent the historic old City Hall building on Mission Blvd. The memorial will honor both those lost in the 2001 attacks as well as Hayward police and fire personnel who have fallen in the line of duty throughout the City's history.

"Already, we have young men and women in high school who do not remember 9/11," said Emerson. "I'm hopeful that this memorial will educate and inspire generations to come."

The memorial, to be built on ground donated by the City, will feature a series of four sculpted granite monoliths representing each of the planes involved in the 9/11 attacks. "Most 9/11 memorials look at 9/11 as the three different locations: the World Trade Center, the Pentagon and Shanksville, PA," explained Emerson. "This monument is about the four different planes, those on board the planes and

those who were killed and affected by each."

Emerson, a U.S. Marine Corps. Desert Storm veteran and graduate of CSU East Bay, has developed a reputation for producing public memorials. He is responsible for the Flight 93 Memorial in Union City, the Veterans Memorial in Castro Valley and has helped to build the Cold War National Memorial in Las Vegas and the American Veterans Disabled for Life Memorial in Washington D.C. He was also tapped by the National Park Service to help produce the Flight 93 National Memorial in Shanksville, Pa.

"All the credit for this project goes to Mr. Emerson," said City spokesperson Frank Holland. "They don't call him 'The Monument Man' for nothing; his resolve, determination and relentless drive to realize his vision are exceptional."

Emerson estimates that construction will be completed in a matter of months, setting the stage for an official dedication later this fall.

The public and media are warmly welcomed to attend the groundbreaking ceremony and learn more about the memorial.

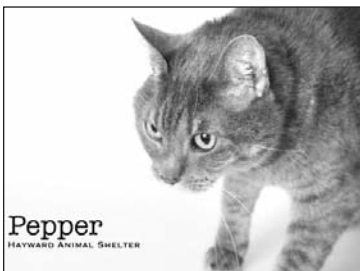

Uber vs. de Blasio in fight over access to NYC streets

NEW YORK (AP)—A dispute is simmering between the ride-booking service Uber and Mayor Bill de Blasio's City Hall, an increasingly pitched disagreement playing out on smartphones, over the airwaves and in the press over a fundamental question: Who controls access to the streets of the nation's largest city?

By the day, more and more Uber cars have taken to Manhattan's streets, summoned by smartphone apps to pick up passengers who enjoy their convenience and consent to pay additional surge pricing during peak hours.

The de Blasio administration is attempting to put the brakes on the robust expansion, saying that the flood of new cars could further ensnarl Manhattan's clogged streets and arguing that the Uber system isn't equitable for drivers and residents. Uber, however, accuses the mayor of being in the back pocket of the yellow taxi industry, attempting to stifle free enterprise and innovation while hurting the low-income neighborhoods that make up the core of his political support.

A pivotal moment in the feud could come as early as next week, as the City Council considers legislation that would put a cap on Uber's growth.

"We cannot afford to have unlimited, unregulated growth of Uber," said First Deputy Mayor Tony Shorris. "We have real concerns about congestion."

"We are already seeing traffic speeds in Manhattan falling," said Shorris. "That is already having an impact on the city's economy, on air quality and potentially an impact on public safety. And at least one reason why that might be true is the enormous growth of Uber."

The company has spread across the globe and become wildly successful, worth an estimated \$40 billion, while dispatching 25,000 cars on New York's streets, as opposed to 13,000 yellow taxis. It's also

become a political flashpoint, as Republican presidential candidates hail it as a model of the free market while some Democrats — including de Blasio — have expressed reservations.

San Francisco-based Uber has howled at the de Blasio administration's attempts to slow its growth. Its leaders, including chief adviser David Plouffe, met with Shorris on Monday but, after the meeting failed to yield a resolution, the company sharpened its attacks.

It debuted a "de Blasio" mode on its app that projects increased wait time if a cap is instituted. And on Friday, it aired a TV commercial that claimed the cap would hardest hit minorities in outer-borough neighborhoods who sometimes have trouble getting yellow taxis.

"Mayor de Blasio's plan to stop Uber will cost 10,000 jobs, hurt undeserved areas and make wait times for Uber cars skyrocket," Plouffe said this week. "It's not progressive and not right."

Uber claimed that City Hall is acting under pressure from yellow cab operators who are worried about falling taxi medallion values — and who are significant donors to de Blasio and some council members.

The administration scoffed at the idea, noting that Uber has sparked unrest and litigation in London, Paris and California. Shorris also noted that Uber cars are not as accessible to disabled riders as yellow taxis and do not have a surcharge that helps fund the region's transit network.

"I don't think we need to take any lectures about concern from people in the outer boroughs from this \$40 billion California-based company and its lobbyists," Shorris said.

The City Council plan, which has the administration's support, proposes limiting Uber's growth for a year while a study is conducting the impact the service has on the city's traffic. Uber, which opposes all limits to its growth, is against the measure.

A vote on the legislation in the City Council could happen as early as next week.

Mid to Late Summer Vegetable Gardening

By now you may already be harvesting yummy goodies from your garden. But it is surely not too late to fill in the empty spaces with more goodies that you can harvest in fall.

Green Beans

There is still time to plant one more crop of green beans. Choose

and kale. However, you can plant Swiss chard or lettuce now. Lettuce is prone to bolting to seed in warm weather, but you can minimize this problem by planting it in the shadiest part of your garden or providing some artificial shade. Also choose the loose leaf varieties rather than the head

an early bush variety that matures in 50 to 60 days, such as Early Contender or Early Italian Bush. It is also a good idea to soak the seeds overnight before planting to speed up germinations.

Root Crops

It is too early to plant most root crops other than carrots and



onions. You will have to plant your onions from seeds, since the bulbs won't be available until fall.

Leaf Crops

It is better to hold off planting most leafy vegetables for a couple of more months, especially those in the cabbage family, including broccoli, cauliflower,

varieties. The more heat tolerant types of lettuce are butterhead/bibb, romaine, and red leaf varieties, and Black Seeded Simpson.

Herbs

There are several types of herbs that are successfully planted later in summer. The common perennial varieties such as oregano, sage, parsley, tarragon, mint, and thyme can be planted now.

Tomatoes

It is best to plant tomatoes in late spring. By now you should be concerned with staking your indeterminate type tomatoes. Determinate types, such as Roma do not need to be staked or kept off the ground. The label on seedlings or the information on the seed packet should tell you whether the tomato variety is determinate or indeterminate. If you haven't planted them yet, look for the largest plants you can find, preferably in gallon nursery cans. If you want tomatoes that last a little later into fall, try some of the paste varieties, such as Roma. I have enjoyed Roma



tomatoes fresh from the vine as late as mid-December. Plant your tomatoes in the warmest, sunniest part of your garden. They require at least eight hours of direct sunlight a day. If you have a spot which gets plenty of reflected heat, such as a south facing wall

them if you can rake up their leaves. It's hard to say no to an offer like that. Newspapers and brown cardboard also work well. You can try sheet mulching, spreading your newspaper or cardboard and covering it with the leaves that you have col-

lected, then poke holes in the mulch to plant your seedlings.

Drip irrigation is commonly accepted as the most efficient and thrifty way to irrigate. If your drip system is attached to a hose bib, consider adding a battery operated timer. Then you don't have to worry about forgetting to turn it off. Watering the old fashioned way with a hose or a watering can is also a good way to water your vegetable garden. Although it is a bit more time consuming, using a watering can is good way to make sure every drop of water goes exactly where you need it without wasting. If you make a small watering basin around each plant, you'll be sure not waste any. Hose watering your vegetable garden is more efficient if you use a water wand with a shut off valve. The less water you splash on pathways and other areas the more water is saved and the fewer weeds you will have.

One last tip – water early in the day. You want to give your plants a chance to take up the water you've given them before the sun quickly dries the soil.



or fence, that is the ideal place to plant your tomatoes.

The current drought should be considered in all landscape and vegetable gardening decisions. Some plants, such as corn, are notorious water hogs, and should be avoided. You shouldn't feel guilty about planting a vegetable garden. With the proper mulching and irrigation techniques, your vegetable garden will use only a small fraction of the water a traditional lawn would use.

Mulch will shade the soil, cool the root zone, and retard evaporation. You don't have to spend a lot of money for commercial mulch; if it is possible, use free mulch from a nearby source. If you want to make friends with your neighbors, ask

less. Construction of the first incarnation of the Patterson House began in 1857.

At first, Ardenwood was primarily a grain farm, like most other farms in the area. Patterson grew oats, wheat, and barley, selling the oats to Europe, hay to San Francisco, and barley to San Jose, Oakland, and San Francisco for beer. Eventually the farm transitioned from grain to low crops, growing cauliflower, broccoli, and lettuce. These same vegetables and more are still grown on 75 acres in Ardenwood by local and family-run J.E. Perry farm, that sells produce at the park entrance as well as select supermarkets in the area. Twenty-five acres are used to grow crops for the park’s educational program.

Patterson House and Ardenwood Farm passed down through



are still George and Clara Patterson descendants living in the Bay Area today.

Ardenwood was turned over to the City of Fremont in 1978. “It was really saved as a park by some forward-thinking members of the community,” said Ira Bletz, Regional Interpretive and Recre-

preschoolers to seniors. “We were trying to find a way to tell Ardenwood’s story in a fun and interesting way, to get them to come back,” explained Bletz.

And did they ever. A destination for those from the Bay Area and beyond, Ardenwood Farm has proven to be one of a kind. “It’s amazing that there are a lot of historical farms in California, but Ardenwood is the only farm that [actually] farms as part of an educational program. It’s a powerful story to tell,” said Bletz.

From sheep shearing to baling hay and husking corn, Ardenwood provides a plethora of activities for the whole family that are not only fun but educational. Where else can you literally pitchfork some hay while learning about early 20th century farming? Moreover, Ardenwood is home to a host of farm animals – pigs, turkeys, sheep, rabbits, chickens, goats, cows, and a draft horse – as well as a horse-drawn train and, of course, the beautiful Patterson House, a Victorian-era Queen Anne mansion worthy of many visits. To top it off, Arden-

wood staff wears traditional Victorian-era clothing, truly transporting visitors back to the farm’s early days.

Since Ardenwood is a working farm, no two visits are exactly the same – with the seasons come new activities and sights. Ardenwood is gifted in even having active winters, when farms are usually quiet: Monarch butterflies migrate to Ardenwood’s plentiful eucalyptus and milkweed. The farm also hosts numerous annual events, such as the Tartan Day Scottish Festival, Old-Fashioned Independence Day, Harvest Festival, Halloween Train and Christmas festivities.

Celebrate thirty years of amazing Ardenwood on July 25. Admission and parking are free; the day-long celebration will include family-friendly farmyard activities. Attendees will get the chance to meet the folks who made Ardenwood Farm what it is today, and view historic photographs of Patterson House and the farm. The train will be running, and birthday cake will also be served. This is a birthday no one should miss!

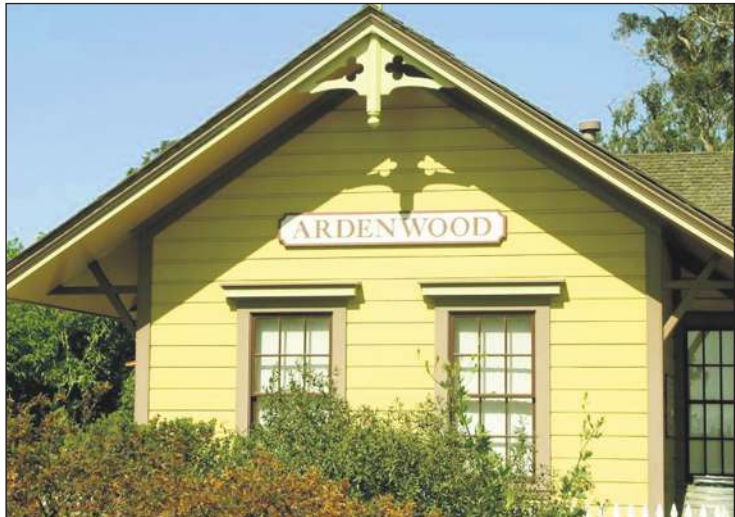

Big League All Stars fall short at state tournament

Little League Baseball's California Division II (Northern California State) Big League All Star Tournament opened on July 8 at San Leandro Ball Park featuring six of Northern California's Big League Section Champions. Northern California's Section 3 Champion, California District 14 (Fremont/Newark), in the tournament for the third year in row, received a bye for the first round. Opening round tournament action saw California District 59 (Milpitas/San Jose), the Section 5 Champion, come from behind to beat California District 53 (Benicia), the Section 1 Champion, 8-7 in the bottom of the 7th inning, sending Section 5 / D59 to face Section 3 / D14 the following day.

Section 3 / D14, led by manager Mike Arnold, took a solid 7-0 lead after only two at bats. David Shan started off the first inning with a hard hit double, followed by a single by Adriano Arroyo. After Nick Maldonado got hit by a pitch, the hitting fest continued over two innings, with Billy Damon, Ryan Gibson and Aaron Havard collecting singles. With two walks plus two additional hits by Arroyo and Damon, Section 3 / D14 was

in the bottom of the 2nd inning by scoring four runs on a hit by pitch, walk, error and two singles. Then the Section 5 champs followed in the 3rd inning with two unearned runs to close in, 7-6. After that, Section 3 / D14 was shut down for the rest of the game with no hits or scoring, while Section 5 / D59 was able to capitalize on three walks, a hit by pitch and a single to score and slip ahead of Section 3 / D14 and come out on top 8-7. The loss sent Section 3 / D14 to the Elimination Bracket of the tournament, hosted by California District 45 (Hayward/Union City/San Lorenzo/Castro Valley).

Section 3 / D14, facing elimination, met Section 6 Champion, California District 8 (Stockton) in their second game and it was all D14. Pouring on the hits and runs coupled with strong pitching, Section 3 / D14 put up a convincing 12-0 win. Mitchell Broadwin opened up on the mound for D14, pitching two complete innings giving up only two hits and one walk while striking out four. Corey Amezquita took over, and six batters went down 1-2-3 in two innings. Next, Jordan Terbeek took to the mound for D14 in the 5th inning, and walked two and struck out three without giving up a hit. Eswar Vinnakota finished off the last scoreless inning with a strong performance.

home and putting Section 3 / D14 on the board.

But, two more errors by D14 in the top of the 4th inning led to two more unearned runs to score for Section 1 / D53. Then D53 held D14 scoreless in the bottom of the 4th, while D14 returned the favor in the top of the 5th, holding D53 scoreless. The game looked to turn in the bottom of the 5th, when D14 battled back and loaded the bases. But the Section 3 / D14 bats went cold and D59 pitching held on, while D14 stranded all three runners. In the top of the sixth, D53 put a runner on. The next batter hit a drooping fly ball that Arroyo caught on the run in centerfield, and then threw out the retreating runner for the double play. D14 then struck out the next batter to close the inning. Trailing 5-1 in the bottom of the 6th, D14 could not capitalize on their hits and was held scoreless one more time. Now in the driver's seat, D53 pushed across one more run in the top of the 7th to go ahead 6-1. But D14 scrapped together one last effort and put two runs across in the bottom of the 7th to get within three. Then D14 put two more runners on base with two outs. But, with the tying run at the plate in the bottom of the 7th, D14 could not push across any more runs and the three-time Section 3 Champions were eliminated from the tournament with the 6-3 loss to Section 1 / D53 (Benicia).

The Section 5 Champion, California District 59 (Milpitas/San Jose), eventually captured the 2015 Big League California Division II Championship defeating Section 4 Champion, California District 5 (Sacramento). D59 now heads up to Bremerton, Washington, for Little League Baseball's Western Region Big League Tournament as the Northern California representative. The winner of the Regional Tournament moves on to Easley, South Carolina for the Big League World Series.

Although the team did not advance out of the State tournament, the 2015 California District 14 Big League All-Star team delivered a third consecutive Section 3 title, a feat no other team or division has ever done in the District's 21 year history. California District 14 Administrator, Reggie Torres, commented, "I am proud of our players and how they represented the District, not only with their play, but with their sportsmanship as well."

Big League baseball is a full-fledged Little League program for players 15 to 18. It offers players a competitive game played on a 90' diamond using traditional baseball rules. California District 14 covers the Southern Alameda County cities of Fremont - which has six Little Leagues - and Newark - which has two Little Leagues. The District 14 Big League All-Stars come from four of the eight member leagues in the District. Nearly 3000 children participate in District 14 Little Leagues in baseball programs for ages 4 to 18 years old.

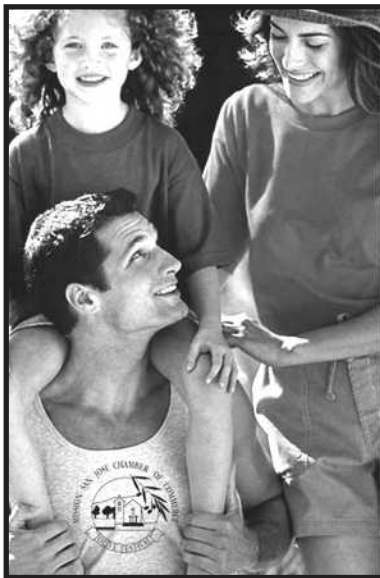

CSUEB’s Brown named All-American Scholar

Cal State University East Bay (CSUEB) senior Linda Brown has been named a 2014-15 All-American Scholar, as announced recently by the Women’s Golf Coaches Association (WGCA). Brown is one of 758 collegiate golfers across all divisions to be honored with this year’s prestigious award. The WGCA Scholar All-American criteria are among the most stringent in all of college athletics, requiring a 3.5 cumulative grade point average.

Brown recently completed a remarkable four-year career as the most decorated golfer in the program’s young history. She was also an outstanding student as a kinesiology major, capturing the women’s golf team’s Scholar-Athlete award three times. On the golf course, Brown led the Pioneers in scoring average four straight years and claimed seven individual tournament titles. She was consistently one of the top players in the nation on and around the green.

Brown’s junior season was particularly impressive, as she posted eight top-10 finishes and four victories, highlighted by a co-championship at the 2013-14 NCAA Division II West Super Regionals in Texas. She became the first Pioneer women ever to compete at the NCAA Division II National Championships, placing 23rd in the nation. She was subsequently named All-West Region and All-America by the WGCA, and she was voted CSUEB’s Co-Female Athlete of the Year.

The San Leandro native wrapped up her career in 2014-15 by qualifying for NCAA Regionals for the second straight year and ranking among the top 50 golfers in the nation. Now she becomes the first East Bay woman ever to claim WGCA Scholar All-American honors.

For years, the streetscape in Centerville has featured a potpourri of enterprises including vacant storefronts and businesses that hang on in search of a focus. Emblematic of the disjointed effort to revitalize the historic district is a 6.58 acre vacant parcel called the Unified Site by the City or “the dirt” and other colorful names by citizens. Once a collection of small businesses, all were razed many years ago by the now defunct Redevelopment Agency and designated at various times as the site of a supermarket, commercial complex, mixed use and now euphemistically called mixed use but primarily residential (185 units) with commercial frontage (28,641 square feet) along Fremont Boulevard.

Tagged as “Artist Walk,” the development will front along a segment of Fremont Boulevard that has, for too long, been designated as a section of State Highway 84. The highway splits Centerville since its path travels from Peralta Boulevard’s intersection with Fremont Boulevard to Decoto Road although the heart of

Hope for Centerville and historic districts

Centerville extends in the opposite direction as well. City efforts cannot control the entire segment of Fremont Boulevard in Centerville due to this impediment; with the dubious honor of recognition as a state highway, come restrictions and oversight by Caltrans. State highway focus is not in sync with a city street and dreams of a cohesive and vibrant streetscape along a commercial core. The historic district has languished, partly due to this enigma.

It is now possible with a new development, City actions to engage Caltrans and interest of property owners to revive interest in a coordinated and cohesive strategy for revitalization. Using the catalyst of Artist Walk, a unified streetscape and a renewed focus on use of the Center Theater and vacant fire station, Centerville can be transformed from a neglected shadow of its past to a vibrant hub of commercial activity. Some property owners have neglected their commitment to the district, electing to allow vacant storefronts to dominate Centerville’s commercial district. They will have little excuse for such behavior if streetscape and investment in renewal projects come to fruition. The City of Fremont now has access to Measure BB funds for infrastructure improvements. Centerville is a good start to demonstrate the City’s goodwill. With these efforts, Irvington and other historic districts can and should demand action to strengthen their presence, resisting City efforts to prune their commercial life out of existence.

It’s time to dust off past studies of Fremont Boulevard and district specific plans to recharge our districts. With passage of Measure BB, there is much to do and funds are available. Although the historic

Warm Springs District has now evaporated to become the “Innovative District,” remaining historic districts of Niles, Centerville, Irvington and Mission San Jose should share the top of the list with BART Warm Springs and Civic Center. In addition, celebration of the California Nursery participation in the 1915 Panama Pacific International Exposition (PPIE) should be regarded as important event and resource of our area. Let’s see if the council can concentrate their improvement efforts on the entire City of Fremont by exerting pressure on planning and public works departments to share attention and funding with our historic districts.

The current movement to coordinate historic societies of Fremont is a welcome step toward strengthening and consolidating our heritage. Hopefully, this will lead to additional communication and community resolve to preserve, maintain and increase interest in Greater Tri-City history through preservation and respect for documents and artifacts that have survived over the years. Respect for the past is a portal to a sense of the present and vision of the future. Living in the present is simply a bridge between what was, what is and what will be. Too much reliance on any one aspect of our cities can result in lack of perspective and balance.

California home sales surge in June on strong economy

SAN DIEGO (AP), California home sales surged in June on a strong economy and low interest rates as prices reached seven-year highs, a research firm reported Friday.

The median sales price for new and existing houses and condominiums hit \$417,000, up 3 percent from \$405,000 in May and up 6.9 percent from \$390,000 during the same period last year, according to CoreLogic Inc.

It was the highest median price posted since October 2007.

Sales rose from a year earlier for the fourth straight month to an estimated 46,095 homes despite unusually tight supplies. It marked an increase of 10.8 percent from 41,612 sales in May and 16.8 percent from 39,460 sales a year earlier.

“The economy is clearly in a much better place than it was a year ago,” said Stuart Gabriel, director of the UCLA Ziman Center

for Real Estate. “The (economic) fundamentals clearly support what we’re seeing in the housing market.”

Buyers may also be trying to get ahead of an anticipated increase in interest rates by the Federal Reserve, Gabriel said.

The San Francisco Bay Area notched its highest sales tally since August 2006, while the median sales price neared its peak during the boom in the previous decade.

The median price in the city of San Francisco topped \$1.1 million.

The median price in the nine-county Bay Area hit \$660,000, up 6.8 percent from \$618,000 a year earlier, CoreLogic said. It peaked during the last cycle at \$665,000 in the summer of 2007.

Sales were particularly strong in suburbs, climbing 27 percent from a year earlier in Contra Costa County and 30 percent in Solano County.

“Those areas are starting to attract more commuters as prices reach unaffordable lev-

els,” said Jeffrey Michael, director of the Center for Business Policy and Research at University of the Pacific in Stockton. “The economy is strong and the jobs are there.”

Mike Fracisco, a Bay Area broker in Alameda and Contra Costa counties, said his buyers are increasingly high-paid employees at San Francisco technology companies.

“It’s surprising to see the income levels of these homeowners coming in, much higher than what we’ve seen during the last seven years,” said Fracisco, who had multiple offers within days on each of three homes he listed the first week of July between \$500,000 and \$800,000.

Gains extended throughout the state.

Southern California also posted its highest monthly sales since August 2006, according to CoreLogic. The median sales price in the six-county region was \$442,000, up 5.7 percent from \$418,000 a year earlier.

Celebrating California's Green Rush of '65

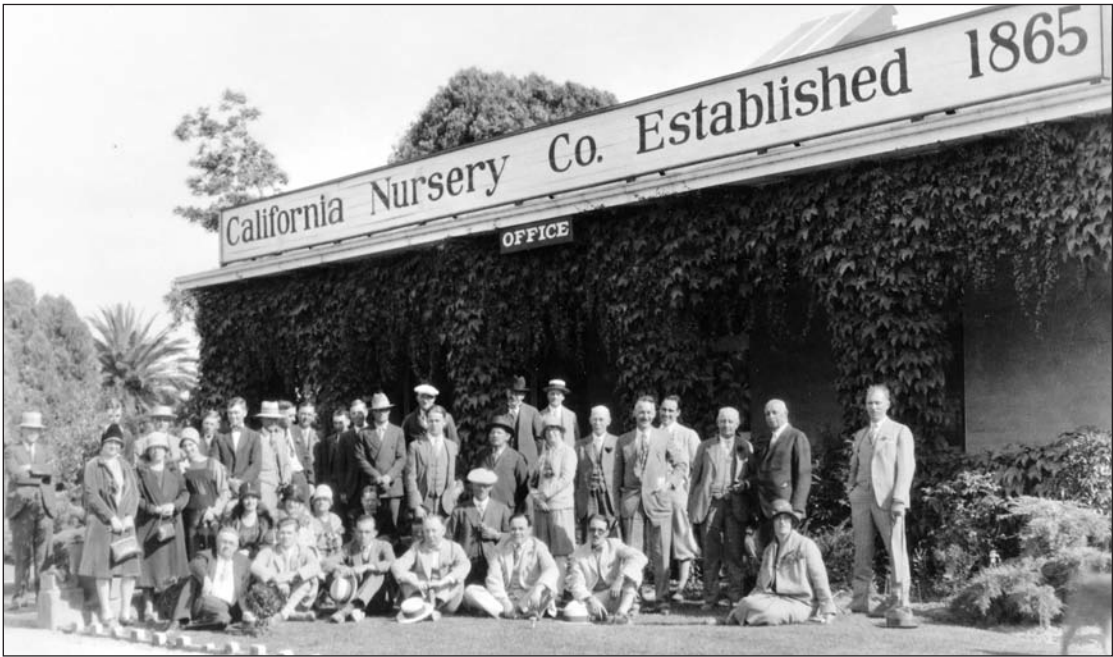
Rock was the beginning of a line-up of horticultural visionaries that led to the solid foundation of nurserymen anchored by Bruce Roeding and George Roeding III. Johann Fels, a German immigrant to America, studied plants and horticulture from his early youth into adulthood. He moved from Germany to New York in 1852, changed his name to John Rock and fought on the Union side in the American Civil War. After heroic military service to his adopted country, he moved to California in 1863 and set up his own nursery business in San Jose at Wayne Station, a 48-acre site. Rock's nursery quickly became successful. When landscape gardener Rudolph Ulrich needed plants for the Leland Stanford estate in Palo Alto, he purchased them at Rock's Nursery, which by that time was one of the best-known in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Rock's nursery ran out of space so he and a group of investment partners bought 463 acres in Niles from Jonas G. Clark, a wealthy San Francisco furniture merchant who owned over 11,148 acres in Niles where climate, soil, and available water were perfect for Rock's purposes. They called the new company the California Nursery Company and established it as an

experimental station for plants from back East and around the world. Rock worked closely with Luther Burbank of Santa Rosa, the best known botanist and horticultural expert in American history. Together they specialized in hybridizing plants and produced hundreds of varieties for market. Burbank was president of the Board of Directors of CNC for a time. The CNC catalog printed in 1888 offered 500 varieties of fruit trees, 700 different ornamental shrubs, and 273 varieties of roses.

Rock managed the nursery so successfully it was worth \$150,000, with 60 employees on a \$30,000 payroll and had established strong connections with other horticulturalists throughout the state. He introduced more new plants into California than any other nurseryman, and his contributions to the state in terms of fruit cultivation were unequalled. Before Rock died in 1904, William J. Landers, one of the original investors who bought the nursery site from Clark together with Rock, became president of CNC and purchased the company.

CNC was 50 years old and a horticultural phenomenon in 1915 when the Panama Pacific International Exposition (PPIE) decided to show the world that



San Francisco and the surrounding area had risen, phoenix-like, from the ashes of the devastating 1906 earthquake and fires. The United States was booming and still growing. The Panama Canal had just opened bringing goods and people to the Golden State. What a great time to have a World's Exposition and identify California as a leader not only in manufacturing, but as a supplier of the world's agricultural and horticultural products.

CNC received a large contract from PPIE to supply mature trees and palms to the exposition. The movement of these trees was an awesome feat; George C. Roeding Sr. of Fresno was part of the organizing committee that made the undertaking possible. Roeding was an up-and-coming star in California's agricultural boom,

working, as Rock had, with Luther Burbank, to popularize the new fruit that Burbank invented. Roeding later purchased CNC and ensured that his family would continue to own the influential nursery to this day. Roeding saw the fair as CNC's "coming of age" in the agricultural business.

Now, the City of Fremont, through Math Science Nucleus (MSN) in conjunction with CNC Legacy Council is preparing to celebrate the 100 anniversary of CNC's involvement in the historic PPIE and the 150th Anniversary of CNC, which still exists today with Bruce Roeding as owner.

MSN and CNC have begun to work with the Roeding family to catalogue and archive their nursery artifacts, so that one day the history of this amazing family, nursery, and their contribution to horticulture can be viewed by all. Historical photos, letters, journals, artifacts, and videos have been uncovered that will bring this history back to life. CNC Legacy Council is also sharing their materials to create a history on the web to educate and inspire children and adults alike. "Until now, the Roeding family's influence on the history of agriculture in California has been hidden and very nearly lost," says Joyce Blueford of MSN. "By attending the upcoming joint CNC/MSN gala, our community will be able to contribute to making that history available to the general public."

The gala will bring back the highlights of the 1915 event; attendees will visit an exhibit showing how the large palms were moved from the nursery to the PPIE via rail and ferry, then returned to the nursery. Tours of the Avenue of Palms will be open where one may learn why Fremont is noted for its palms and the role that CNC played. The Vallejo Adobe will also be open. Travel back in time to the large Vallejo Rancho that this area was part of at the beginning of the 1800s.

State Senator Bob Wieckowski will be the Master of Ceremonies; honored guests include Bruce Roeding and George Roeding III. Funds generated by the gala will help in the preservation of the park's buildings, trees, and artifacts.

Local students stand out at California Connections

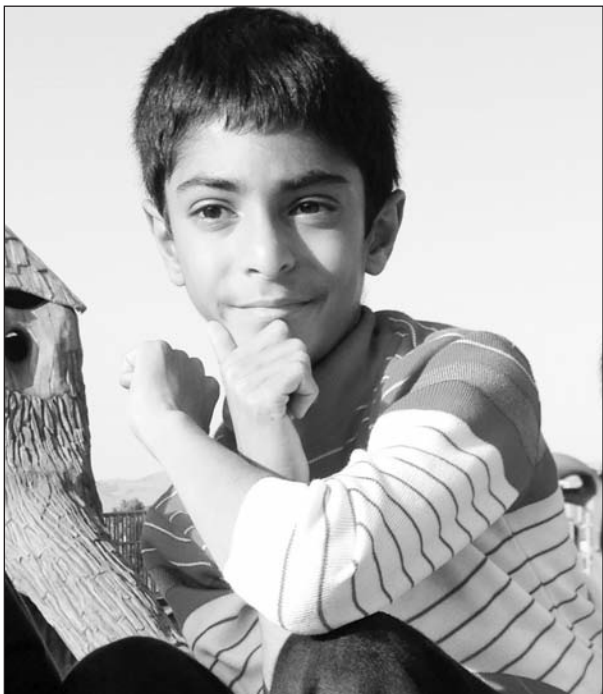

AC Transit to display "Real Time" bus data

Google Maps (www.google.com/maps) has long offered transit trip planning, and with full knowledge of AC Transit's routes and schedules helps many of the 200,000 daily riders use public transit. Now, with the addition of "real time" location data from every bus in the District's fleet, customers will know if the next bus due at their stop is on time. And with service alerts imported straight from AC Transit's website, riders will have descriptions of construction or special event detours and other temporary impacts on particular routes.

AC Transit bus riders can start planning a trip right from the home page of the District's web-

site, www.actransit.org, with the option to plan travel using either Google Maps or the Bay Area's 511.org transit trip planner.

The District adheres to industry "open data" standards by sending this new real time data in compact form to Google via the General Transit Feed Specification-realtime (GTFS-RT).

A complementary new application programming interface (API) allows application developers easy and free access to the same data with additional filtering options. The District's goal is to encourage app developers to build tools that better serve current riders and that attract new people to try public transit. The new API is available via the District's Data Resource Center page, www.actransit.org/planning-focus/data-resource-center/.

West Nile Virus activity increases throughout California

California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Director and State Health Officer Dr. Karen Smith recently announced that the level of West Nile virus (WNV) activity is on the rise throughout the state.

"While there have been no human cases of West Nile virus reported so far this year, it is only a matter of time before we see the first case," Dr. Smith said. "As people go outdoors to enjoy the warm weather we've been experiencing, we'd like them to be safe and know how to protect themselves against West Nile virus."

Thirty-one California counties have reported WNV activity so far this year, 10 more than this time last year and above the five-year average of 18. To date, 240 mosquito samples have tested positive for WNV, six more than last year at this time.

WNV is influenced by many factors such as climate, the number and types of birds and mosquitoes in an area, and the level of immunity in birds to WNV. It is possible that the drought has contributed to West Nile virus amplification by reducing sources of water for birds and mosquitoes. As birds and mosquitoes seek water, they are coming into closer contact and amplifying the transmission of the virus.

CDPH recommends that individuals prevent exposure to mosquito bites and WNV by practicing the "Three Ds:"

1. DEET – Apply insect repellent containing DEET, picaradin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR3535 according to label instructions. Repellents keep the mosquitoes from biting you. DEET can be used safely on infants and children two months of age and older.

2. DAWN AND DUSK – Mosquitoes bite in the early morning and evening so it is important to wear proper clothing and repellent if outside during these times. Make sure that your doors and windows have tight-fitting screens to keep out mosquitoes. Repair or replace screens with tears or holes.

3. DRAIN – Mosquitoes lay their eggs on standing water. Eliminate all sources of standing water on your property, by emptying flower pots, old car tires, and buckets. If you know of a swimming pool that is not being properly maintained, please contact your local mosquito and vector control agency.

WNV is transmitted to humans and animals by the bite of an infected mosquito. The risk of serious illness to most people is low. However, some individuals – less than one percent – can develop a serious neurologic illness such as encephalitis or meningitis. People 50 years of age and older have a higher chance of getting sick and are more likely to develop complications. Studies also indicate that those with diabetes and/or hypertension are at greatest risk for serious illness.

StarStruck Theatre presents ‘Mary Poppins’ in Dublin

Last fall Lori Stokes had a dilemma.
The founder and artistic director of Fremont's StarStruck Theatre was looking forward to celebrating the youth musical theatre company's 20th anniversary season at the performing arts center at Ohlone College, StarStruck's home stage for the past 10 years. But construction plans at the Fremont campus meant relocating the company's summer 2015 mainstage show.
Luckily, the state-of-the-art Dublin Center for the Performing Arts and Education had just been completed at Dublin High School, and was available. The 500-seat

Travers and the classic Walt Disney film, Disney and Cameron Mackintosh's "Mary Poppins" delighted Broadway audiences for over 2,500 performances and received nominations for nine Olivier and seven Tony Awards, including Best Musical. With music and lyrics by Oscar-winning Sherman Brothers Robert and Richard, and script by Julian Fellowes (of Downton Abbey fame), this Broadway version incorporates new songs by George Stiles and Anthony Drewe, and new scenes that blend so seamlessly audiences often do not realize they were not part of the Disney movie.
Bert (played by Tim Sanders, 16), the jack-of-all trades, introduces us to England in 1910 and the troubled Banks family. Young Jane (Allayna Slate, 8) and



house was comparable in size and feel to Ohlone's 405-seat Jackson Theatre. Most importantly, it could accommodate the extravagant sets and special effects of the magical, musical, Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious "Mary Poppins," to which Stokes had acquired the rights. The show will go on, from Saturday, July 25 through Sunday, August 9.
"When I first saw "Mary Poppins" on Broadway, I was simply dazzled," said Stokes. "To achieve that sense of wonder for our audience, we worked through tremendous technical challenges to pull off the magic effects, perfect the unusual musical instrumentation, and teach our young cast members a wide range of difficult and complex dances—all within a few months. This is our most ambitious production yet, and I can't wait to amaze our local communities with the results!"



Michael (Gabriel Lew, 10) have sent many a nanny packing before Mary Poppins (Callie Garrett, 21) arrives on their doorstep. Using a combination of magic and common sense, she must teach the family how to value each other again. Mary Poppins takes the children on many magical and memorable adventures, but Jane and Michael aren't the only ones she has a profound effect upon. Even grown-ups can learn a lesson or two from the nanny who advises that "Anything can happen if you let it."
StarStruck's cast of 43 youths will be tap dancing on rooftops, flying, and bringing toys and ancient statues to life. "All of the songs in this show are so full of life and meaning," said

StarStruck associate director and choreographer Jeanne Batacan Harper. "Our talented young artists have worked hard to tell the "Mary Poppins" story through movement and dance. They have mastered vastly different styles from ballet, to clogging, Broadway style jazz, and movement with cheer-like precision. This being based on a Disney classic, audiences will expect magic—and we must bring it!"
Live music led by StarStruck music director Nancy Godfrey comes from a 15-piece orchestra. The fresh, vibrant, British music hall sound is achieved through some unusual instrumentation. For example, "The drum set is only used part of the time, not continuously as in most musical scores. Instead, the rhythm is often alternately kept by the bass or the keyboard, freeing both percussion players to play a wide variety of other percussion instruments to add color, texture, and special effects," said Godfrey. "Another somewhat unusual feature is that there are no violin parts. Cello, double bass, and guitar provide the string sounds for the show. And there are almost twice as many brass parts as usual—two trumpets, two trombones, and two French horns. The three reed books feature flute, piccolo, oboe, English horn, clarinets (including the rather uncommon E flat clarinet), and bass clarinet, but no saxophones.
"Each instrument voicing in the pit orchestra have been selected as carefully as the words in the songs and the script," said Godfrey. "It's challenging, refreshingly different, and a lovely complement to the wonderful

singing and dancing on stage."

The Fremont Fire Department responded to multiple reports of two
structures on fire after a loud explosion at 37063 and 37075 Towers Way in

homes. The first arriving engine company called for a second alarm and initi-
ated fire attack operations. Two full alarm assignments responded to the scene
and aggressively attacked the fire in all three structures. Containment and
extinguishment occurred after approximately 35 minutes.

The fire remains under investigation. Two families were displaced as a
result of the fire; Red Cross was summoned to the scene to assist the fami-
lies. There is an estimated dollar loss to both structures of \$800,000 and

Union City to launch Casa Verde Park improvements

After a competitive grant process, Union City is preparing to officially kick off construction for the Casa Verde Park Trail and Playgrounds Improvement Project. On the evening of July 14, 2015, City Council awarded a contract to begin the first phase of the project, which will include an upgrade to three playgrounds at the park. After completion of this phase, City staff anticipates moving into phase two, which will focus on repaving park path-

ways, resurfacing the park's basketball court and installing new basketball hoops.

The improvements to Casa Verde Park are made possible due to a \$250,000 grant awarded to the City through the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund. City staff looks forward to providing the public with an enhanced scenic and recreational experience by the time the entire project is completed tentatively by the end of the year. The park will remain open during construction with restricted access only to construction zones.

Public Notice Union Sanitary District

On July 13, 2015, the Union Sanitary District Board adopted Ordinance No. 31.38, which codifies rate changes for Sewer Service Charges for Fiscal Year 2016. The following is a summary of the rate changes in Ordinance No. 31.38:

The Sewer Service Charge for all customer categories will increase an average of 5.7%. This will increase the Single Family Dwelling rate to \$377 per year, and the Multi-Family Dwelling rate to \$326. Commercial and industrial unit rates, calculated per 1,000 gallons discharged, will increase approximately 5.7% as well.

This rate increase is part of a 3-year rate increase approved by the Board of Directors at a public hearing on June 24th, 2013. All property owners in the Tri-City area were informed by mail of the rate increase and public hearing in April 2013. These rates were discussed and approved by resolution and ordinance following a noticed public hearing held at the Union Sanitary District Board meeting of June 13, 2015. Structure Fires in Fremont

On July 17, 2015 at 3:18 p.m. Fremont Fire Department responded to 35521 Cabrillo for a report of an alarm sounding and smoke coming from the window of a portable classroom at Patterson Elementary School. First fire crews on scene discovered that a portable classroom at the back of the school was on fire. In order to attack and extinguish the fire crews had to drive to the rear of the school near the baseball field to gain access.

Once there they had to forcibly open the doors to the portable classroom and a ventilation hole was cut in the roof. Initially, firefighters thought there were three rooms involved due to smoke coming from all three doors, but quickly realized it was all one large classroom. Four hose lines were deployed by four en-

gine companies who encountered tremendous heat and smoke. The main fire was emanating from a back office and was spreading along the back wall when crews were able to extinguish it.

It took crews about 30 minutes to control the blaze and several hours to overhaul and investigate the cause. Fire investigators were able to determine the cause to be an electrical outlet in the office where the bulk of the fire was and it appears to be accidental in nature. Damage to the structure was estimated at \$100,000 with another \$25,000 of damage to the contents. The building was being leased to a day care business by the school district and they were closed for the summer. There were no injuries to the public or firefighters from this fire. 4 Engines, 1 Truck, 2 BCs and 1 staff Captain responded with a total of 18 firefighters.

On July 17 2015, at 7:26 pm fire crews responded a report of a

vehicle on fire at 4250 Central Avenue. The initial report was for a vehicle on fire on the street, but the first crews on scene found a fully involved vehicle burning under a car port that had spread to three additional cars. Fire crews had to deploy a supply line from a hydrant across Central Ave, which closed the busy street for about two hours Friday evening. Once crews connected to the hydrant and there was ample water to supply the attack lines the fire was quickly extinguished, but not before putting up a large column of black smoke. The cause of this fire is still under investigation, but appears to have started in one of the parked vehicles. All four cars were completely destroyed as was most of the carport. There is no damage estimate at this time. 4 Engines, 1 Truck, 2 BCs and 1 staff Captain responded with a total of 18 firefighters.
