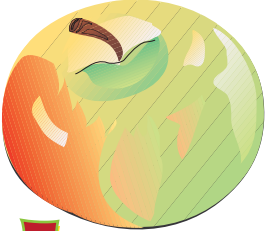

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Apple Festival

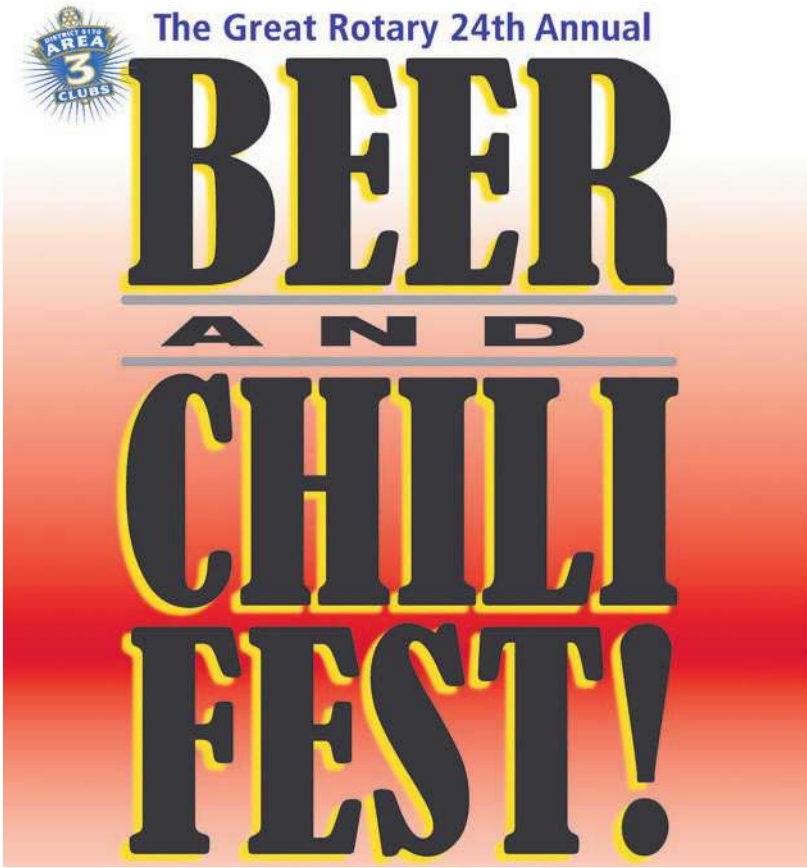

In fact, in 2013, Americans ate an average of 15.9 pounds of fresh apples and an additional 28.4 pounds in some processed form, like ciders and sauces, for a combined total of 44.3 pounds.

So where does America's love for apples have its roots? American apple history was made when the pilgrims arrived from England in 1602 and planted the first apple tree at Massachusetts Bay Colony. Today, of the 7,500 plus varieties grown worldwide, more than 2,500 are grown right here in the United States.

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Learn the Latest about Cancer Prevention and Detection for Women

At free lunchtime program, local cancer doctor will share ways to fight cancer and stay as healthy as possible

“Many cancer deaths could be prevented by making healthy choices like not smoking, staying at a healthy weight, eating right, keeping active, and getting recommended screening tests,” states the American Cancer Society (ACS) on its web site.

Over the years, we have learned there are things each of us can do to help prevent some types of cancer or detect it at an earlier stage, when treatment may be more effective.

“When it comes to cancers that occur more frequently in females, it is useful for a woman to know whether she has an average or an increased level of risk,” said medical oncologist Vandana Sharma, MD, medical director of the Washington Cancer Genetics program. “With women, we usually think of cancers of the breast, ovaries, uterus and cervix. However, today, the cancer with the greatest number deaths in women is lung cancer.”

In 2015, the ACS estimates:

- More than 105,000 American women will be newly diagnosed with lung cancer.
- More than 71,600 American women will die of lung cancer.

can take to decrease your risk of cancer, as well as specific medical interventions that may help prevent cancer. These include:

- A vaccine that can help to prevent cervical cancer
- Medications that can help to prevent breast cancer
- Surgery that can help to prevent ovarian cancer

Dr. Sharma will discuss treatment options, including diet and exercise, as well as surgery for women at high risk.

Looking ahead

“Our ability to detect and treat cancer is improving all the time and so the number of cancers per 1,000 people continues to decrease. However, the overall number of cases continues to increase,” explained Dr. Sharma. “That’s be-

cause the size of our population keeps growing. Also, cancer is generally a disease of aging and people today are living longer.”

Looking to the future, Dr. Sharma will touch on new immunotherapy treatments that stimulate a person’s immune system to help fight cancer.

“We have always thought having a healthy immune system helps to prevent cancer,” added Dr. Sharma. “But now, preliminary data is showing that a healthy immune system can also fight cancer at a more advanced stage.”

Think Pink is coming

Dr. Sharma will also be a speaker at Washington Women’s Center’s upcoming seventh annual Think Pink breast health awareness fair on Thursday, Oc-

tober 15, from 5 to 7:30 p.m. The free event will include interactive booths, informative lectures and more. For more information or to register, call (510) 608-1301.

Kids, Sports and Concussions—It's not just about football

Learn the facts about concussions at upcoming free community seminar

It's a common perception that most high school sports-related concussions happen on the football field. But, if you look more closely, you'll find your child may be at risk for concussion while playing a number of other sports, according to a 2012 study by the American Journal of Sports Medicine (AJSM). Also, that about one-third of all concussions occur in practices, not during competition.

True, of the 1,936 sports-related concussions reported in the study of 20 different sports played at American high schools between 2008 and 2010, nearly half, or 47.1 percent, were suffered by football players. Another 159—or 8.2 percent—happened in girls soccer, while 5.2 percent occurred in boys wrestling, and 5.5 percent happened in girls basketball.

"It's important to note that concussions represented more than 13 percent of all high school sports-related injuries reported during the two-year period," said Michael Goldin, MD, physical medicine and rehabilitation specialist with Washington Township Medical Foundation. "Parents should be aware that there are concussion risks associated with a number of other sports involving both boys and girls, and that con-

cussions can happen to younger children as well."

If you'd like to learn more about concussions, their signs, symptoms and proper treatment, come to a free community seminar on Tuesday, September 29 at 6 p.m. Dr. Goldin and orthopedic surgeon and sports medicine specialist Russell Nord, MD, will lead the forum entitled "Get a Heads Up on Concussions." Dr. Nord is medical director of the Washington Sports Medicine program.

Know the signs and symptoms

"There are several symptoms related to concussions, the most common being headache, dizziness and problems with concentration," explained Dr. Goldin. "At the seminar, we will talk in more detail about what parents should watch for if they suspect their son or daughter may have sustained a concussion."



Sports-related concussions happen in multiple sports and often occur in practices and not during competition. To learn more about concussion, their signs, symptoms and proper treatment, attend a free community seminar on Tuesday, September 29 at 6 p.m. Michael Goldin, MD, physical medicine and rehabilitation specialist and Russell Nord, MD, orthopedic surgeon and sports medicine specialist with Washington Township Medical Foundation will talk about concussions. In the AJSM study, high school athletes who had sustained a concussion reported having a headache in more than 94 percent of cases. More than 75 percent reported feeling dizzy, and nearly 55 percent had difficulty concentrating. Other common symptoms were confusion (45 percent), light sensitivity (36 percent), and nausea (31 percent).

What's the problem?

A major concern of coaches, parents, doctors and other experts is the effect of a concussion—and repeated concussions—on the neurological system and mental processing functions of young athletes.

"Studies have found that eye function and information processing were impaired in athletes with two or more concussions, compared children who had had one or no concussions," stated Dr. Goldin. "We'll discuss these

findings further at the upcoming seminar."

The doctors will also talk about concussion treatment options and strategies for allowing a child to begin playing again after a concussion.

Returning to the sport

Currently, one approach to getting young athletes back in the sport is to have them go through a step-by-step protocol. They play to a pre-defined level of exertion and are only allowed to go to the next level when they don't experience symptoms.

According to Dr. Goldin some studies have suggested that higher levels of physical exertion may have a negative effect on a child's ability to mentally process the following: verbal memory, visual memory and reaction time.

"Concussions are an important topic for us to address,"

said Dr. Goldin. "Many people know about the symptoms of concussion. They should also understand that, if the symptoms are not managed appropriately, a child's ability to think could be impaired."

"Managing a child's concussion takes a team approach involving the student, parents, teachers, athletic trainer, if available, coaches and a physician," he concluded.

Berlin gadget show: Tiny PCs and high-end handsets

BERLIN (AP) – Gadget makers have been showcasing their latest gear at Europe’s flagship technology show, the IFA in Berlin, this week.

With the exception of Apple, all major manufacturers have been announcing new devices in time for the holiday shopping season.

Here are five highlights and one teaser for tech enthusiasts.

PC ON A STICK

Tiny PCs powered by Google’s Android have been around for a while, but Windows is increasingly entering that market.

The ASUS VivoStick PC is among the most impressive of its kind to feature Windows 10 in a stick the size of a dongle. Plug it into any modern TV and you can use it as a computer. Aside from Wi-Fi, Bluetooth 4, 2GB of RAM and 32 GB of storage, it sports the latest Intel Cherry Trail chip, two USB ports and an audio jack.

The VivoStick will be available for \$129 when it hit stores.

WEIGHTS FOR IT

Huawei launched its Mate S, billed as the Chinese smartphone maker’s first top-range handset with prices starting at \$650 – though initially not available in the United States.

Along with some impressive specs comes an unusual feature: Huawei says the phone can be used as a scale to weigh objects.

This is made possible by the phone’s Force Touch capability, something Apple is expected to put in its next iPhone.

MODULAR COMPUTING

Acer is taking the traditional PC apart so users can put it back together again.

The Taiwanese manufacturer launched Revo Build, a module computer starting at under \$200 and shipping this quarter.

Users can add to the black base unit by attaching a dedicated graphics card, a sound block, a portable hard drive and even a power bank to wirelessly charge certain smart-phones.

Acer manager Sherlock Cheng says the idea is to provide a “mini-PC on demand.”

SONY’S FLAGSHIP

Japanese electronics giant Sony has updated its much-lauded Xperia Z line with three new models: standard, compact and premium. The latter features what Sony says is the world’s first 4K display.

All Z5 models have an impressive 23 megapixel camera with a 0.03 second autofocus so users will hardly ever miss a shot. The camera also has better low-light settings and algorithms which allow users to zoom in without losing too much picture quality.

Like the iPhone and Samsung’s latest Galaxy S handsets, the Z5 will feature a fingerprint sensor.

INSTANT PHOTOS

Polaroid is going back to basic with its latest instant camera.

By stripping away the LCD screen found in the previous models and halving the price to \$99, Polaroid hopes to boost sales of its new Snap camera in time for the holiday season.

Each click will instantly print a photo, with 50 sheets of special paper costing under \$30.

TURNTABLE TEASER

When Panasonic ditched the Technics brand in 2010, disk jockeys were aghast. Technics turntables, particularly the MK2 launched in 1979, had long been a favorite among professional DJs for their reliability and speed control.

A petition prompted Panasonic to announce last year that it would revive the brand.

At the IFA fair Panasonic teased the motor for a new Technics turntable in Berlin, but the needle is still being developed and the final product won’t be ready till next year.

Solyndra misrepresented facts to get loan guarantee

WASHINGTON (AP)—A four-year investigation has concluded that officials of the solar company Solyndra misrepresented facts and omitted key information in their efforts to get a \$535 million loan guarantee from the federal government.

Solyndra was the first company to get federal loan guarantees under a program that was created in 2005 and expanded by President Barack Obama's 2009 economic stimulus package.

The company's failure soon after receiving the loan guarantee likely will cost taxpayers more than \$500 million. Republicans and other critics cite it as an example of wasteful spending under the stimulus program.

The report by the Energy Department's inspector general was released Wednesday. It's designed to provide federal officials with lessons learned as it proceeds to grant billions of dollars in additional loan guarantees. The inspector general found fault with the department, describing its due diligence work as "less than fully effective." The report also said department employees felt tremendous pressure to process loan guarantee applications.

In the end, however, the inspector general said the actions of the Solyndra officials "were at the heart of this matter."

"In our view, the investigative record suggests that the actions of certain Solyndra officials were, at best, reckless and irresponsible or, at worst, an orchestrated effort to knowingly and intentionally deceive and mislead the department," the IG's report said.

The federal loan guarantee program for energy projects was established under President George W. Bush's administration. After it was expanded by the 2009 stimulus law, the department disbursed

more than \$500 million to Solyndra. Obama personally visited the plant in 2010 to cite it as an example of economic progress stemming from the Democratic-led stimulus bill.

But in September 2011, the company laid off 1,100 employees, ceased operations and filed for bankruptcy protection.

The IG's report did not identify by name any particular Solyndra leader who gave misleading information.

Miles Ehrlich, counsel for the company's former CEO, Chris Gronet, disputed the findings. "Solyndra executives were completely truthful and accurate in their representations during this loan process, and the DOE was never misled about Solyndra's business or prospects," Ehrlich said in a statement provided by his law office.

Ehrlich said the real cause of Solyndra's failure had nothing to do with fraud, but was caused by the unexpected dumping of solar panels subsidized by China's government.

The report notes that federal prosecutors and the Federal Bureau of Investigation also participated in the interviewing of witnesses and the examination of hundreds of thousands of documents. In early 2015, the Justice Department informed the inspector general's office that it would not pursue criminal prosecution of any Solyndra officials.

The inspector general's report said the department relied on third-party evaluations for part of its analysis of Solyndra. In one case, an engineering firm, R.W. Beck Inc., issued a report on the solar panel market relying on company representations that it had \$1.4 billion in revenue under contract through 2012. The report said Solyndra's "firm" sales contracts supported its financial model. But by the time Beck issued its final report, all four of

Solyndra's customers had been offered price concessions.

"Solyndra's failure to directly disclose these significant material changes in its contractual relationships distorted the view the department and its consultants had of the market for Solyndra's products," the inspector general said.

Solyndra was also required to hire an outside firm, Fitch Ratings Inc., to prepare a credit assessment of the project, located in Fremont, Calif. A Fitch official told investigators that he asked Solyndra if any contract customers had received price concessions and was told no. Additionally, the company's largest customer had informed the company it would not buy more panels in 2009 because Solyndra's price was too high. A Fitch official told investigators that if it had been aware of price concessions it would have assigned Solyndra a lower credit rating.

The report was less detailed about the Energy Department's shortcomings in conducting due diligence. It said the department needed to consider using "new and more intrusive validation techniques." It also said consultants the department hires must be held accountable for their work.

Solyndra's failure was the subject of numerous congressional hearings and a report from Republicans on the House Energy and Commerce Committee. The August 2012 report concluded that Solyndra was a cautionary tale on how political pressures and other factors can result in poor decision-making.

"The red flags about Solyndra's financial condition and the turbulence in the solar market were there for DOE to see when it reviewed Solyndra's application in 2009. DOE staff and (Office of Management and Budget) staff noted these concerns at the time the loan guarantee was under consideration," the congressional report concluded.

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Mission-Stevenson Development



The Project

The True Life Companies plans to build 77 townhouses on two parcels totaling 3.26 acres. This is the now-empty lot at the corner of Mission Blvd. and Stevenson Blvd. where the Nagata Brothers' fruit and vegetable stand had been located. The proposed project would have a residential density of approximately 25 dwelling units per net acre (du/ac).

They propose 14 three-story buildings with four to seven units in each building. These will be a mixture of standard townhouses and townhouse-style stacked-flats. Stacked-flats have one unit with a tandem two-car garage on the ground floor and their living space on the second floor, and the other unit with a side-by-side two-car garage on the ground floor and their living space on the third floor.

Each unit will have a two-car garage. Guest parking will be along the boundary with the railroad. Only a decorative metal mesh fence will separate the development from the railroad. No on-street parking is allowed on Mission or Stevenson. Vehicle access will be right-in/right-out driveways on Mission and on Stevenson.

The Fremont Unified School District no longer guarantees school attendance area assignments. The June 2015 tentative attendance area for the Mission-Stevenson project is Vallejo Mill Elementary and Washington High School.

The Issues

Every development affects the cumulative impact of traffic, school attendance, water supply,

etc. Beyond those concerns, this development raises several issues.

Seventeen of the townhouses will line Stevenson as close as five feet from the sidewalk. Nowhere else along Stevenson, from Mission to Paseo Padre, do existing buildings line the street creating a wall. Those other buildings are angled at an offset from the street. Even the preliminary plans for future housing across the way on Stevenson Place show buildings of varied alignment.

The City has been encouraging two-story units at the ends of long townhouse buildings. In this plan, The True Life Companies has, instead, put fourth-story false towers above the end units. The two towers at the corner of Mission and Stevenson exaggerate the height of the fortress-like wall.

The driveway exit onto Mission will come out where the right-turn lane to Stevenson begins. If the heavy morning commute traffic on Mission blocks the way across to the south-bound lanes, these residents may well have to turn onto Stevenson, cross the railroad tracks, and make a U-turn in order to finally head south on Mission.

The developer did not hold a Community Courtesy Meeting until after the final plans were submitted and the Environmental Review Initial Study was posted. Therefore, they never heard the comments about south-bound commute traffic flow. They missed a chance to place the Mission driveway further back from where the right-turn lane to Stevenson begins.

These parcels are currently zoned R-3-27 which allows a resi-

dential density range of 25 to 27 du/ac. This zoning designation is no longer permitted to be newly applied to parcels. The General Plan density designation is Medium Residential which is 14.6 to 29.9 du/ac. The City of Fremont Planning staff wrote in its Preliminary Review Process report that it would be "supportive of a reduction below this number of units if it results in a superior project design." Yet The True Life Companies insists that the City would not allow them to build less than 77 units which is 25 du/ac.

The True Life Companies is voluntarily cleaning up the site now. They are removing soil contaminated with pesticides and oil from past agricultural uses.

No Council Review

This development application does not require the approval of the City Council. It is not a Planned District and the development plans just have to conform to the existing R-3-27 zoning regulations for those parcels. The Planning Commission will be the approving body. Minor zoning variances could be approved by the Planning Commission. The development application will only go before the City Council if the Planning Commission's decision is appealed. The tentative date for the Planning Commission hearing is September 24th.

Hulu launches \$12 ad-free streaming service

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP), Video-streaming company Hulu is introducing an ad-free version of its subscription service for \$4 extra a month as competition for streaming customers heats up.

The service with ads costs \$8 and the ad-free version costs \$12. The company said customers asked for an ad-free option.

Competition is getting tougher among video-streaming services as providers seek to add more offer-

ings to attract viewers.

On Tuesday, Amazon said subscribers of its \$99 annual Prime membership program will be able to download some shows and movies to watch offline. Users will now be able to download shows like "Downton Abbey" and "The Good Wife," HBO shows including "Girls" and "Veep" and movies including "The Hunger Games: Catching Fire" and "The Wolf of Wall Street." Previously, that capability was available only on Amazon's own Fire devices.

Netflix and Hulu offer streaming content only.

Netflix is the largest streaming service, with 65.6 million subscribers worldwide. Hulu has about 9 million and Amazon doesn't disclose the number of Prime subscribers it has.

Hulu has been working to expand its content lineup. It recently signed a deal with Epix to stream films from Lionsgate, MGM and Paramount. And it lets subscribers stream Showtime content for an additional \$9 a month.

Volunteers unite for Coastal Cleanup Day

The sprawling California coast that Bay Area residents enjoy needs our constant help to stay beautiful and clean. Every year since 1985, volunteers throughout the state have dedicated one special day to visit the coast and waterways in an effort to combat trash accumulation. "Coastal Cleanup Day" is right around the corner on Saturday, September 19, and a number of events are planned right here in the East Bay.

As one of the largest volunteer events of the year, Coastal Cleanup Day brings together tens of thousands of volunteers statewide who generously donate their time and services to help clean up our coasts. Last year, the California Coastal Commission

(CCC) estimates that almost 600 tons of trash was cleaned up from California's aquatic areas — beaches, lakes, creeks, and other waterways. If that much trash can accumulate in just one year, then it'll take every volunteer possible

in order to take on the task of protecting our coasts and the marine life that thrive there.

Quite a few local cleanup events are open for registration now and are fantastic ways to get involved and contribute to the beautification of the local community. Fremont is planning to hit the ground running with massive cleanup efforts at numerous locations as well as the popular Don Edwards San Francisco Bay Wildlife Refuge. The Eden Landing Ecological Reserve in Hayward will be getting into the action one week earlier with the See Change event to clean up the salt ponds. Union City's Public Works Department is hosting a cleanup event on Sunday, September 20 at the William Cann Memorial Civic Center in conjunction with Hands-On Conservation. No matter where you live or your availability, there should be an event nearby — but be sure to register early, as most events

require registration and signed waivers in order to participate.

The CCC maintains a Top Ten list of all the most common grimy garbage collected since 1989, and it's not surprising what ranks the highest — cigarettes and cigarette filters, which according to the CCC account for a whopping 39 percent of the debris collected. Cigarette residue is followed by food wrappers and containers; beverage/container caps and lids; paper and plastic bags; utensils, plates, and cups; and other unfortunately common debris.

Besides registering and filling out a waiver, the CCC asks that volunteers bring a bucket or reusable bag, gloves, water, and lunch or snacks. By coming equipped, volunteers are helping to cut down on the trash generated during the cleanup activities. Most events run from the morning until noon or so, lasting a few hours.

The CCC, which originated the event and seeks to educate the public on all matters regarding coastal protection, marine resources, and restoration activities, is once again heading up the annual event, always on the third Saturday of September inspiring the creation of the International Coastal Cleanup movement. The event has proven so popular that it even set a record with the Guinness Book of World Records in 1993 for the largest garbage collection ever organized, with a very impressive 50,405 volunteers on hand!

Apparently one can now plant cool season, i.e. winter, vegetables. These include kale, green onions, peas, radish, garlic, spinach, carrots, broccoli, parsnip, and rhubarb. I, personally, do not like vegetables. However my children insist that I ingest some, so they bought me one of those blender things. In it, I blend kale, chard, carrots, parsley, spinach, and/or cucumbers, depending on what I have stashed in the refrigerator.

Organic sweetener is used to make the mish-mosh palatable. I drink a glass of this, ice cold, for breakfast every morning. However, my daughter, who is a vegan, keeps insisting that mashed green things taste exactly like chicken, and I should be more sensible. In her honor, this column is about Kale.

To my amazement, there are apparently at least 37 different

types of Brassica oleracea. From Italy comes "dinosaur" Nero Di Toscana, dark green leaves, "very nutritious," excellent in soups and stews, and "one of the most flavorful and beautiful" kales. From Germany came Grunkohl Lerchenzungen, with curly ruffled green leaves. It grows to about 3-feet tall, very hardy. The Gulag kale comes from a Siberian x Russian cross. It has purple leaves. Russian Red has reddish-purple tinged green leaves and overwinters easily. From Portugal came Tronchuda kale, with a flavor more like cabbage. It has prominent white ribs. Ozark Black has very dark purple leaves. Ragged Jack has dark green frilly leaves with pink-red veins and stems that turn darker as weather chills.

Those of you into kale can grow it for decoration alone, a plethora of color. Suppose you grow kale, but still don't get a thrill eating it. You can make kale

chips, which are quite expensive in the supermarket.

To do this, garner about a pound of fresh green or red kale. Tear the leaves into small pieces. Wash kale thoroughly. Dry very thoroughly. Put it, one layer sparsely, on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Now mix together two tablespoons fresh lemon juice and three tablespoons extra virgin olive oil. Spray onto kale pieces. Then sprinkle pepper, and any of your favorite spices. Bake at about 300 degrees F. for about 10 minutes. You want it to be crisp, not burnt. Salt after removing from oven if you like salty stuff.

Kale has lots of vitamin K, and is high in vitamin A and C, plus contains fiber. For how-to instructions, look at the seed packet. In case you didn't know, Kale, also spelled "Cale" in Greek mythology, means "beauty."

Fremont's Safe Routes to School Initiative



The City of Fremont Public Works Department, Transportation Division has been actively participating in multiple initiatives as part of the Safe Routes to School program for the Fremont community. From education to capital improvement projects to efforts with the Fremont Police Department, the City is involved on all fronts.

Walk audits began three years ago with help from local school officials, parents, City staff, and consultants to determine the safest routes to school for students. The program also makes recommendations for crosswalk, sidewalk, and roadway improvements to encourage students to walk and bike to class in a safe environment. So far, the City has conducted walk audits at Niles Elementary School, Parkmont Elementary School, and Irvington High School, and aims to conduct at least 25 walk audits in the next few years that will conform to Pedestrian Master Plan updates. It's clear that these walk audits are proving successful, as they have resulted in a recent Caltrans Active Transportation Program (ATP) grant application project proposal for Niles Elementary School improvements.

In terms of education, the City of Fremont has established a contract with Safe Moves to conduct 32 traffic safety workshops, 16 school rodeos, and three community rodeos annually.

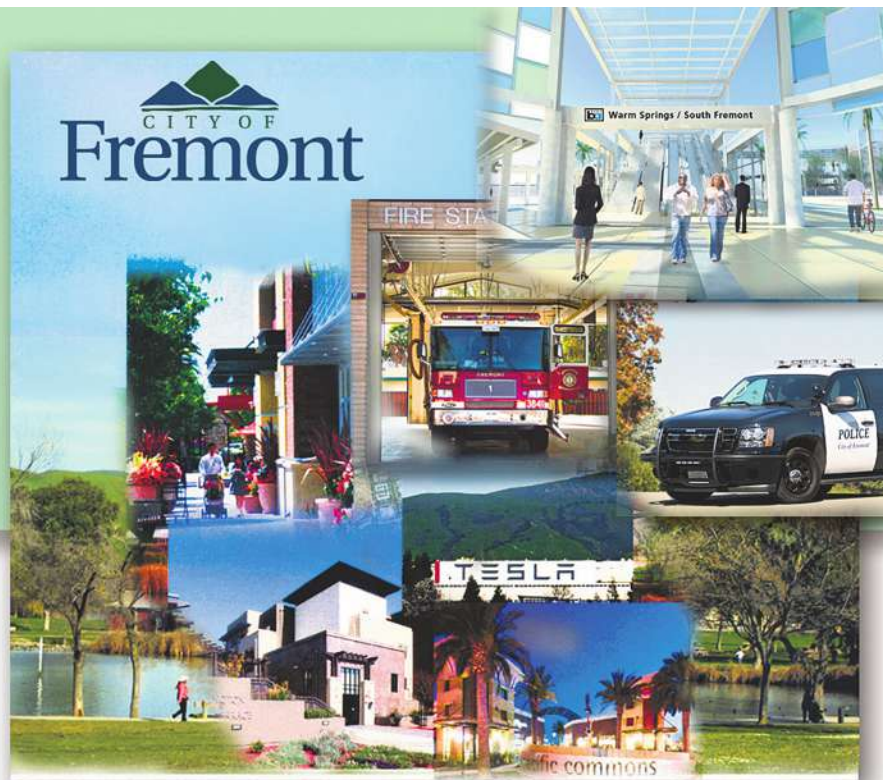
The City of Fremont has also collaborated with Transform, a nonprofit community organization to implement County Safe Routes to School Program

that is funded by Alameda County Transportation Commission (ACTC) Measure B funds. Transform has worked with Fremont schools to encourage participation in a Bike to School Day, Walk to School Day event, and the recent walk audits.

The majority of the City's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) projects within the past five to six years that use the Transportation Development Act (TDA), Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), Measure B, and Safe Routes to School (SR2S) grant funds are all considered safe routes to school related projects. These projects include the following:

- Emilia Lane Sidewalk Improvements – under construction, TDA, Measure B (Ardenwood Elementary)
- Frobisher Drive Sidewalk Improvements – under construction, Measure B (Cabrillo Elementary)
- Blacow/Grimmer Intersection Improvements – under construction, SR2S funds (Irvington High School)
- Fremont/Alder Intersection Improvements – completed 2015, HSIP (American High School)
- Fremont/Eggers Intersection Improvement – completed 2015, HSIP (Washington High School)
- Warren Avenue Sidewalk Improvements – completed 2013, Measure B (Leitch Elementary)
- Alder-Nicolet Sidewalk Improvements – completed 2013, TDA (American High School, Brookvale Elementary)
- Deep Creek Road Intersection Improvements – completed 2013, TDA, Measure B (Ardenwood Elementary)

The City of Fremont and its partners are constantly striving to create a safe and secure environment for its residents. The Safe Route to School initiative is clearly a step in the right direction toward providing children with a safe journey to the classroom.

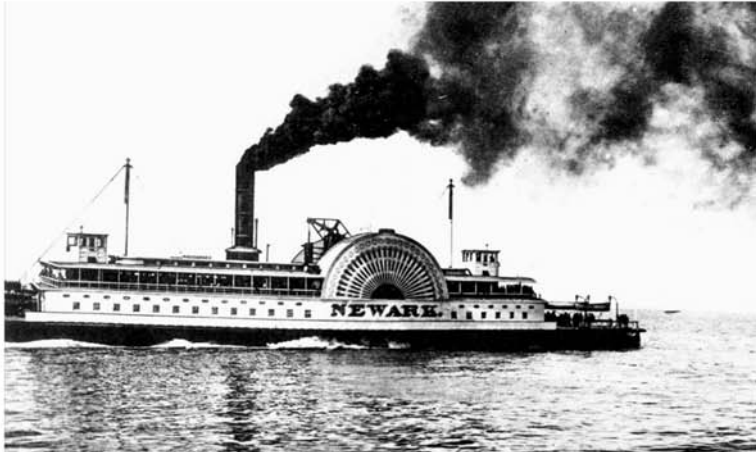

Senate shifts to outlaw microbeads in personal care items

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP). Senators voted Friday to phase out the use of microscopic beads in personal care products sold in California starting in 2020 years to protect fish and wildlife, reversing the chamber's earlier opposition.
Previous versions of the ban passed the Assembly but failed in the Senate last year and again on Thursday. Friday's approval sends the measure back to the Assembly for a final vote before lawmakers adjourn for the year next week.
Republicans said late amendments to AB888 prompted many manufacturers and other business critics to drop their opposition to California joining several other states in phasing out the so-called microbeads. The tiny exfoliating beads found in soap, toothpaste and body washes are so small that they are showing up in the bodies of fish and other wildlife after passing through water filtration systems without disintegrating.
"This is going to wrap up a three-year process of working on this legislation," said Sen. Ben Hueso,

D-San Diego, who carried AB888 in the Senate. "I think this is monumental legislation. I think once again California will lead the world in very important public policy that other communities will adopt. They will see that it works for California and they will also want to do the same in protecting their communities, the health of their constituents and the health of mother earth."
The latest measure passed, 24-14, despite continued opposition from some members of both political parties. Several said manufacturers already are developing more biodegradable products and shouldn't be punished with a deadline.
"The bottom line is we are accomplishing a very important thing here today," said Sen. Jeff Stone, R-Temecula, who switched to supporting the amended bill. "We're taking these microbeads and environmental impacts off the market... But I hope we are preserving the ingenuity, the entrepreneurship of engineers and scientists that will come up with wonderful products that can help our youth address their acne issues."



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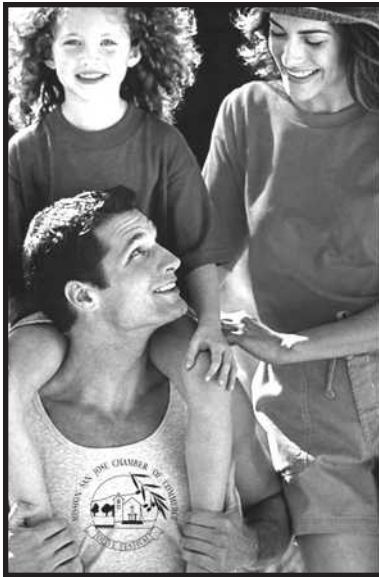

Historical Society hosts 15th annual History Awards

The Hayward Area Historical Society (HAHS) will be hosting its annual "History Awards" on Friday, September 18 at its recently opened HAHS Center for History & Culture in downtown Hayward. Nine outstanding individuals and organizations will be honored for their significant service in making history and preserving culture. Past winners have included Fred's Flowers, Ace Hardware, Lone Tree Cemetery, and Maria Ochoa for her history book of Russell City.

"When we started this it was called a Preservation Gala," says A.T. Stephens, Executive Director of HAHS. "We have since renamed it the History Awards, and we've been doing it for 15 years now." Marcess Owings, HAHS Membership and Marketing Manager, explains how the honorees are chosen: "People and organizations are nominated through an open process. Then after some research, the HAHS Board of Directors selects the winners for the year."

To be honored this year in the Historic Organization category is the Eden Rose Chapter of The Links, Inc., an international non-profit social service organization established in 1946 that is made up entirely of African-American professional women. "Every year the Historical Society and the Eden Rose Chapter of The Links, Inc. host a Black History program in February," says Stephens, "and we've been doing that for about five years now. This past year The Links, Inc. put together an exhibit on the role of African-American churches in the community, and that exhibit was featured in our Community Gallery."

The Educator Award is going to Andrew Kong Knight of Hayward High and Carrie King of Mt. Eden High, both teachers who have created many of the public murals around Hayward. "Not only do they do great work to beautify the city, but they also teach art to students," explains Stephens. There is also a History Maker Award that will be going to Fremont Bank for their Corporate Giving Foundation and Program, and a HAHS Volunteer Award that will be given to Nancy Courtney.

Among the nine honorees this year is Chris Zaballos of R. Zaballos & Sons. He will be receiving the Historic Preservation Award for his company's work on the 22425 Main Street Building in downtown Hayward. Says Stephens, "The preservation award goes to a building that is at least 50 years old that is undergoing restoration or rehabilitation or adaptive use." And the Historic Business Award will be going to The Ranch restaurant on Mission Boulevard, which was opened in 1948. "Everybody remembers it," smiles Stephens. "It's a landmark for the community and that's important."

The John Sandoval Award for outstanding service will go to Morey Greenstein, a Hayward lawyer who represents the Alden Trust. "Alden E. Oliver owned the salt farms located near the San Mateo Bridge," says Stephens. "When he passed, he gave money to the HAHS and his local church. That money's been really fortuitous for us to be able to professionalize the staff and expand the building; Morey's been working on that project for at least a dozen years now, and it's pretty important to us."

In addition to the awards ceremony, the evening will include a performance by the Mt. Eden High School Chamber Singers (the Mt. Eden High School Vocal Music Department received this year's Community Service Award). There will also be cocktails, appetizers provided by Blue Heron Catering, and a silent auction.

The mission of HAHS is to discover, preserve, and disseminate knowledge of the history of the Hayward area through exhibitions, public programs, K-12 school tours, and other activities at the new Center for History & Culture. HAHS also manages three historic properties: the McConaghy House, Meek Mansion, and the San Lorenzo Pioneer Cemetery.

Alameda County awarded grant to address childhood asthma

Alameda County was selected to receive a \$275,575 award as part of a groundbreaking funding initiative called Pay for Success. The goal of this grant is to address the problem of childhood asthma. The award will help fund a feasibility study to learn how to prevent asthma and to act quickly to address housing problems that lead to asthma in children. The funding will be provided by the California Pay for Success Initiative, a project of Non-profit Finance Fund (NFF) and The James Irvine Foundation.

In a Pay for Success project, private funders and investors pay for social services up front, working with counties, states, and service providers. In this case, the goal is to address childhood asthma. If the project succeeds, the County will pay the funders back, with a small return on their investment. If the project does not address the problem at the agreed-upon levels, the County doesn't have to pay. It is a model designed to both improve outcomes and reduce costs.

Alameda County aims to use the Pay for Success model to shift funding for social services toward prevention and early intervention activities to address childhood asthma through its Healthy Homes program. That program helps to reduce housing hazards that can lead to asthma, as well as provide education on asthma triggers and offer technical assistance to property owners.

Partners of the initiative award are the Alameda County Health Care Services Agency, Public Health Department, and the Community Development Agency's Healthy Homes Department along with its partners Impact4Health, LLC, Third Sector Capital Partners, Inc., and the University of California, Berkeley.

The award will support continued development of the Pay for Success initiative over the next 18 months. It will also set the foundation for Alameda County's pursuit of other Pay for Success initiatives to address chronic conditions such as diabetes, homelessness, and recidivism. Warning against eating cucumbers from Mexico

California Department of Public Health (CDPH) State Health Officer Dr. Karen Smith has warned people not to eat garden cucumbers imported from Mexico and distributed by Andrew & Williamson Fresh Produce because these cucumbers may be contaminated with Salmonella. CDPH is currently aware of 285 individuals in 27 states infected with Salmonella serotype Poona, with 51 of these case-patients being reported from 17 California counties, including one death. Illnesses continue to be reported.

Andrew & Williamson Fresh Produce of San Diego, initiated a voluntary recall of their garden cucumbers, after being informed of the epidemiologic association between these cucumbers and the Salmonella Poona outbreak. The recalled garden cucumbers can be identified in distribution channels as “Limited Edition” brand pole grown cucumbers. The labeling on these cases indicates the product was grown and packed by Rancho Don Juanito in Mexico. These cucumbers were distributed between August 1 – September 3.

It is unlikely that cucumbers in retail grocery stores will have any identifying brand information. CDPH recommends that consumers check with their grocer to determine if the cucumbers they purchased are impacted by this warning.

Domestically produced cucumbers are not believed to be involved in this outbreak.

Symptoms of Salmonella infection include fever, abdominal cramps, and diarrhea which may be bloody. Most infected people recover within a week. Some may develop complications that require hospitalization. Infants, the elderly, and people with weakened immune systems are at highest risk for more severe illness.

CDPH recommends consumers experiencing any ill effects after consuming cucumbers should consult their health care provider.

Wave of new
Windows 10
devices on show
at Berlin tech fair

BERLIN (AP), Computer manufacturers are unveiling the first big batch of devices running Windows 10 at the IFA home electronics show opening in Berlin on Friday.

The industry has seen sluggish sales in recent years as consumers opt to spend their money on smartphones and tablets instead, so many companies are pinning their hopes for a revival in the PC market on the latest version of Microsoft’s operating system.

Among them is Toshiba, which launched its new Satellite Radius 12 this week, priced at 1,449 euros (\$1,627) in Europe. The 12-inch laptop comes with a 4K screen designed to make the most of Windows 10’s graphics ability. It also features a special microphone and a dedicated button for Cortana – Microsoft’s voice-controlled digital assistant – as well as infrared cameras to identify users by their faces.

“We expect to see lots of new sales from October onward thanks to Windows 10,” said Tony Alderson, a senior product manager at Toshiba.

The Japanese company also launched its new Satellite Click 10, whose screen can be detached and used as a tablet. It, too, is optimized for Windows 10 and will appear on shelves next month for about 499 euros.

Experts say the bet on Windows 10 could pay off, as consumers finally loosen their purse strings.

“Last few years, many people bought Android tablets instead of buying a new computer, but that market is saturated now,” said Rudolf Aunkofer, global director IT at consumer research firm GfK. “At the same time laptops are getting quite old, so Windows 10 is likely to kick off a wave of replacements.”

Aunkofer said the drop in sales seen in recent years may have been exacerbated by Microsoft’s announcement about the new operating system, which prompted some consumers to hold back. Before that, buyers may have simply been uncon-

vinced that upgrading their devices for Windows 8 – widely seen as more of a cosmetic enhancement than a real improvement – was worthwhile.

One problem for computer manufacturers is that Windows 10 is remarkably tolerant of old hardware, and upgrades are free. Microsoft says Windows 10 has already been installed on 75 million devices since its debut at the end of July.

“Many people who have a computer that’s 1 to 3 years old will go for the free upgrade,” said Aunkofer. “But there’s a big base of machines that’s 5 to 7 years old and those will be replaced.”

The trend, he said, is toward so-called two-in-one devices which can serve as laptops or tablets, such as the Satellite Click 10, or tablets with a separate keyboard.

Microsoft is urging software designers to embrace its Universal Application Platform, so that desktop software and apps designed for other operating systems will run on Windows 10.

This strategy demonstrates one way in which Microsoft has learned from its recent missteps in the smartphone market. A lack of apps and the relative novelty of its operating system have been cited as a hurdle to consumer uptake, compared to more established smartphone systems such as Apple’s iOS and Google’s Android.

Nick Parker, vice president of Microsoft’s OEM division, said the free upgrade for older Windows computers should help stimulate interest across devices, since it’s designed to look the same on laptops, tablets and smartphones.

“Windows 10 lets you try new things and maybe accelerate purchase of new hardware,” he said.

The same might be true for one of the low-cost educational computers launched at IFA this week. Acer’s Aspire 1 Cloudbook is a fully functional PC for the price of \$169, giving Windows 10 the chance to take back market share in the sub-\$200 segment from Google’s Chromebooks.

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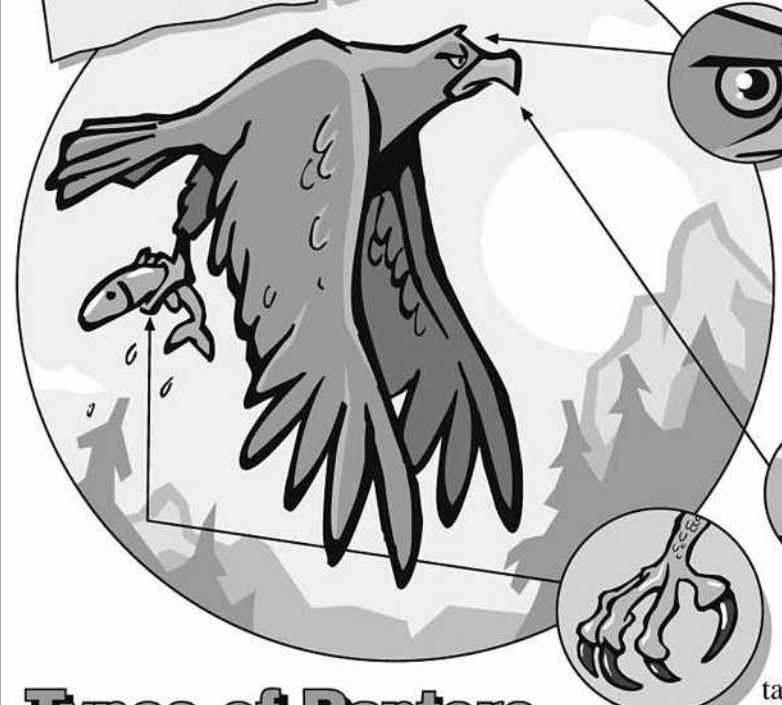
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RAPTORS!

Raptors are birds of prey, which means they are predators that hunt and eat other animals. Hawks, eagles, falcons and owls are all raptors. Discover the amazing facts about these magnificent creatures on today's Kid Scoop page.

The word raptor comes from the Latin word *rapere*, which means "to grab and carry away."



Adaptations

Raptors have three key adaptations making them excellent hunters.

EYES: Raptors have keen eyesight that helps them spot their prey from great distances. The Australian wedge-tailed eagle can spot a rabbit from about one mile (1.5 km) away. This is about three times farther than a human can see. Raptors can also see more colors than people, which helps them see camouflaged prey.

BEAK: They have a sharp, hooked beak for tearing their meat into bite-size pieces.

FEET: The sharp, powerful talons or claws of raptors are used to catch and kill prey.
