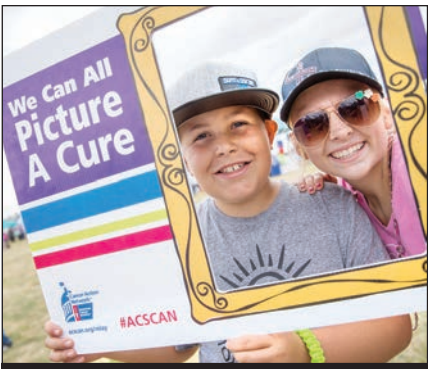

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Breastfeeding Awareness Week Begins August 1

Washington Hospital Supports Breastfeeding for Optimum Health for Moms and Babies

World Breastfeeding Awareness Week is celebrated August 1-7 each year. Established in 1992, the purpose of this celebration is to encourage breastfeeding to improve the health of babies and mothers around the globe.

Here in Fremont, Washington Hospital nurses and lactation consultants encourage, educate and support moms in breastfeeding their newborns. “Breastfeeding is the best start in life for babies,” says Victoria Mayer, a lactation consultant in the Maternal Child Education Center. Washington Hospital has earned the prestigious Baby-Friendly designation from the World Health Organization and UNICEF, widely considered the gold standard of care.

Many medical experts, including the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, strongly recommend breastfeeding exclusively (no formula, juice or water) for the first six months. Breast milk provides the ideal nutrition

for infants, including vitamins, protein and fats, all of which babies need to grow. Just as important, it contains antibodies that help infants fight off a multitude of illnesses. “Babies are less likely to succumb to many illnesses, including colds, ear infections, even childhood cancers and diabetes,” explains Mayer.

“Breastfeeding is the foundation of good health for moms and babies throughout their lives, and we help them feel confident and successful,” says Dorothy Scull, the Hospital’s nurse manager of Maternal Child Health. She adds that in addition to the Hospital’s nurses and lactation consultants, moms are counseled about breastfeeding by their obstetricians during their prenatal care appointments; during their pre-admit interview at the Hospital; and, once the baby is born, during visits with their pediatricians.

“It’s a team effort,” says Mayer. “We all strive to do our part to connect new moms with as much information and

support as possible.” Mayer adds that in addition to offering many health benefits for babies, there are numerous benefits for moms. “Breastfeeding burns calories, so it can help moms lose pregnancy weight faster, and it lowers mothers’ risk of breast and ovarian cancer,” she explains.

Choosing whether to breastfeed is a highly personal decision. Some moms may not be able to breastfeed or may choose not to do so. Mayer notes, “Moms who cannot, or choose not to breastfeed are offered information on the benefits, but we support them in whatever method they choose. The ultimate goal is a healthy baby.”

While in the Hospital, moms have access not only to lactation support, but

also to advice and resources for an array of newborn issues, such as coping techniques, information about normal newborn behavior, best methods to care for a newborn, and resources to call for follow-up consultation and appointments.

The support doesn't stop once a mom and newborn leave the Hospital. Once home, moms can call a free advice line for information or to schedule private visits.

Volunteers Provide Companionship and Comfort to Patients

Washington Hospital Offers Wide Range of Volunteer Opportunities

When the light goes on outside a patient's room, Jim Santos knows it's time to serve. Whether it's holding someone's hand or getting them a glass of water, he believes service to others comes from the heart.

Santos is a volunteer for the Nurse Unit Assist Program at Washington Hospital. He is so good at what he does, he now trains new volunteers entering the program, many of whom are college students who plan to work in the medical field.

"Your heart has to talk to you," Santos said. "You have to give the best you can to the person in the bed."

Washington Hospital started the Nurse Unit Assist Program last summer to provide support to nurses in the medical, surgical and critical care units during busy times. Volunteers provide nonclinical support such as getting patients water, helping them use the TV remote, retrieving fresh linens, or simply talking with them and providing comfort and support.

"Volunteers can handle some of the nonclinical needs patients have so nurses can stay focused on the critical work they do caring for patients," said Jeannie Yee, president of the Washington Hospital Service League. "Sometimes patients just need companionship. Quite often, they are lonely or scared and just need someone to spend some unhurried time with them. Volunteers have that luxury of time to share, listen, laugh, empathize or encourage. For those few moments, patients often find they have a break from pain and stress, which can hasten their recovery."

Nurse Unit Assist volunteers are specially trained to help the nursing staff by promptly answering call lights, relaying clinical needs to the patient's nurse, and handling any other issues without interrupting staff, Yee said. Volunteers know what questions to ask patients to determine whether they can accommodate their request or if they need to get their nurse.

Santos added, "We're trained to assist the nurses, but also to stay out of their way so they can do what needs to be done."

A Calling

Santos said he was called to volunteer at Washington Hospital. Having been a Fremont resident for 40 years, Santos had been to Washington Hospital many times. Though new to



Sometimes a person to hold a hand and visit for a while is what a patient wants most.

Washington Hospital, Santos was an active volunteer in previous years, earning Fremont's Volunteer of the Year award in 1996. In 2004, his wife was diagnosed with cancer and he stopped volunteering and retired so he could care for his wife; she passed away in 2013.

"After she passed, I did a lot of work on my house that I had been neglecting. My wife was important; she came first. After that, I went to Israel with the church I attend."

Last year, Santos realized he had some time on his hands. One night he dreamed about Washington Hospital. The next day he went shopping and when he got back to his car, a brochure about volunteering at the Hospital was on the ground next to it. At that moment, he knew what the dream meant.

Santos started volunteering at the Hospital last summer and was immediately recruited into the Nurse Unit Assist Program. Now he serves every Tuesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. On Fridays, he delivers scarves to patients who have lost their hair due to medical treatments.

Santos tells a story about seeing four men in the hallway, waiting outside their loved one's critical care room. The patient did not have much time to live. "I gave my condolences and said I know they have a long road ahead and asked if I could get them anything. They wanted water. There were 10 of them, so I got some pitchers of water and some cups. Their loved one passed an hour later, and do you know those 10 people sought me

Manheim Auto Auction offers automotive solutions

Imagine a vast parking lot filled with cars as far as the eye can see. Now picture a long, narrow building in the middle, with 12 openings on either side. Looking down from above, long lines of cars slowly move through each opening, like marching ants, then drive out the other side.

A closer look inside reveals more sights and sounds. Overlooking each bay is an auctioneer, rambling away on a microphone to a small crowd, many with phones glued to their ears. As each car drives in and stops, a video screen overhead lists information. A few from the crowd converge on the vehicle, peering in through the windows, checking the tires.

The action is loud and fast as the auctioneers' voices compete with the sounds of idling engines, all magnified in this enclosed



customers and don't have the time or resources to spend preparing vehicles for sale, Manheim Hayward, with 180 employees, can now act as a one-stop shop. They are also targeting companies like Uber and Lyft. Manheim also offers mobile auctions throughout the year, traveling to dealer sites. This, along with advances in mobile technology, has Manheim saying they can do auctions "anywhere, anytime."

space. Less than a minute later, the car has been sold and drives off, to be instantly replaced with another, and the bidding process starts all over again.

This is the Manheim Auto Auction in Hayward, a 72-acre site that sits at the corner of Industrial Parkway and I-880. Established in 1987, it is but one cog in the great wheel that is Manheim, the largest used vehicle remarketing company in North America, with over 140 sites worldwide, six of them in California. Manheim is part of Cox Enterprises, a global communications, media, and automotive services company.

Every Wednesday, the Hayward site auctions over 2,500 vehicles which come from numerous sources, including automotive dealerships, banks, car rental agencies, car manufacturers and government agencies. As an example, a car dealership may take a trade-in that doesn't match their inventory, so they will turn around and sell it at an auction. Or a company may want to upgrade their fleet of vehicles, so they would sell them all at

an auction. Repossessed vehicles also end up here.

Buyers are made up of independent and franchised dealers. And thanks to cameras installed on every lane, online video feeds allow customers to bid remotely as well. Says General Manager Greg Beck, "Online sales now make up about 60 percent of our total sales. Some still come out to see the cars in person, those with the 'kick-the-tires' mentality, but there has been a definite shift in the past four to five years towards the Internet, and that trend will continue."

OVE.com is a virtual wholesale automotive marketplace where dealers can go to see listings of the vehicles that will be going to auction, including photos and detailed condition reports. Manheim offers other services as well, including mechanical inspections, arbitration by a neutral party in case of disputes, title transfers, payment processing, vehicle transportation, and advertising.

In 2015, Manheim began offering reconditioning services,

which include inspections, mechanical and body reconditioning, paint, and detailing – everything needed to prepare vehicles for sale. Hayward recently became the 19th site to offer these services by opening a new, 20,000 square-foot facility near their current site. Says Beck, "We are uniquely positioned to offer end-to-end solutions to independent and franchise dealers, fleet operators, ride sharing companies, and manufacturers."

For many dealers who wish to engage more with their

Dehydration at Mission Peak

As reported by the San Francisco Chronicle in 2014, “The biggest problem at Mission Peak Regional Preserve. . .is not crowding. It's dehydration. . .park staff and Fremont paramedics respond to four to five medical calls per day on busy weekends, usually from hikers with twisted ankles or symptoms of dehydration or heatstroke.”
Despite the threat, EBRPD has restricted operating hours of the park, thus forcing visitors to start later in the morning. The temporary hours will expire in 2020, but the misguided policy by the Operations Department exposes people to the hot sun when it crests the summit. Visitors also face a gauntlet of parking restrictions on public streets and have to walk as much as a mile to the entrance. The temporary/interim parking restrictions (residential permits) are slated to expire in 2020.
Mission Peak Conservancy has long called for the installation of drinking water, to stem the flood of medical emergencies that were reported by the San Francisco Chronicle in 2014. The park district has now responded, by installing water at the Ohlone College entrance. We applaud the installation, since visitors deserve clean water at every entrance. Water is still needed at the upper restroom near the summit, where many visitors run out of water on hot days. Detailed signs should be posted at each entrance, advising visitors to carry more water (two liters per person).
Mission Peak Conservancy advocates for bike/pedestrian trails and improved park access. The city and the park district should redirect our tax dollars, away from the costly enforcement of thousands of parking tickets. They should normalize park hours. Every visitor should have a safe, enjoyable and healthful experience at our regional parks.

During his tenure in Fremont, Diaz oversaw many successful projects including the development of the Fremont Innovation District which includes the BART extension in the Warm Springs/South Fremont area. This area will help position Fremont as the capital for advanced manufacturing in Silicon Valley. Diaz also has been a driving force in the development of a downtown area in Fremont by supporting a cultivation of a social heartbeat and gathering place for the community.

Also, under Diaz’s leadership, Fremont launched a Smart City Initiative and created a Smart City Action Plan with key city staff to creatively meet the city’s big picture goals of being competitive, sustainable, and transparent.

“It is with honor and sincere appreciation for Fred Diaz’s dedicated service to the community that the Fremont City Council congratulates Fred for an exemplary and distinguished career that has dramatically shaped Fremont as a resilient, diverse, and vibrant organization,” said Mayor Lily Mei.

Animals do feel fear

In a 5/18 KGO TV news segment, Rowell Ranch Rodeo Committee president Russ Fields declared that, “Animals don’t feel fear.” Any four-year-old knows better. World-renowned animal behaviorist Dr. Temple Grandin has written that, “The single worst thing you can do to an animal emotionally is to make it feel afraid. Fear is so bad for animals I think it’s worse than pain.” Rodeo animals are “prey” animals. As such, they fear for their very lives when roped, ridden, wrestled, jumped on, dragged or otherwise handled roughly.

In a recent letter to the Castro Valley Forum, Mr. Fields claims that all rodeo events are done “every day on working ranches throughout our country.” Not true! REAL working ranch hands don’t routinely ride bulls, or wrestle steers, or ride bareback, or practice calf roping as a timed event (babies!). Ditto “wild cow milking” and “mutton busting.” Nor do they put flank straps on the animals, rake them with bruising spurs, or work them over with painful “hotshots” in the holding chutes. Some “sport”!

Rodeo is a macho exercise in domination. For most of the animals, it’s merely a detour en route to the slaughterhouse. True “sport” involves willing, equally-matched contestants. Rodeo does not qualify.

Regarding the many worthy charities supported by the Rowell Ranch and Livermore Rodeos, surely it is unethical to abuse one group of sentient beings to benefit another. “Blood money,” some would call it. Where’s the local religious community on this moral issue, pray?

The Rowell Ranch Rodeo annually costs HARD some \$20,000 of taxpayers’ monies. HARD could better serve its constituency by donating the ranch property to a non-profit, turning it into a Farm Animal Sanctuary and Education Center for Bay Area school children, perhaps with a riding stable. And the cowboys could come and teach humane ranching practices. Win/win.

"We've spent hours painting, installing new chairs, adding mood lighting, and so much more," says Taylor. "We are tired but excited. We'll continue to renovate our new home to make it the place to be in Fremont."

After their Grand Opening, MUT will present Laugh Track City on Fridays at 8 p.m. and Closing Night on Saturdays at 8 p.m. Starting in September, MUT will also showcase their Family Friendly Matinee on the first Sunday of the month at 3 p.m., which is an improv comedy show that is suitable for all ages. "We are hoping to add different types of shows to our schedule in the near future," says August. "We want to do stand-up comedy, sketch comedy, plays,

and so much more." In addition to their improv comedy shows, MUT also offers classes in improvisation throughout the year and a monthly improv jam called The Playground, which is a chance for anyone to jump on the stage and improvise.

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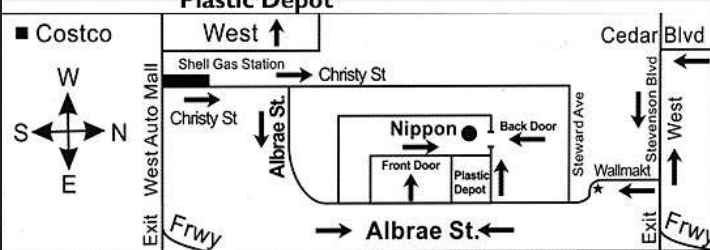

Mayor Lily Mei and the Fremont City Council announced July 30, 2018 that Mark Danaj, former Assistant City Manager/ Chief Operating Officer for the City of Fremont, has been selected as Fremont's eighth City Manager.

The City of Fremont engaged an executive recruitment firm to conduct a national search to find the right manager to succeed former City Manager Fred Diaz who retired on July 27, 2018. The City Council sought experience and vision in its ideal candidates and found both in Danaj, a seasoned executive with over 20 years of senior-government management experience and a proven track record of accomplishment.

"Mark is an exceptional choice for our next City Manager," said Mayor Mei. "The City Council was looking for a leader with vision and experience but also for someone that understands Fremont's unique challenges, opportunities, and culture. With Mark, we get the best of all worlds; great experience from other agencies and keen insights gained from his more than three years of previous service to our City."

Danaj's passion for city management revolves around modernizing local government, making it more accessible to residents, and fostering authentic civic engagement. He served as the Strategic Support City Service



Area Team Lead/Director of Human Resources for the City of San Jose for eight years before being hired as the City of Fremont's Assistant City Manager/COO in 2011. During his first tenure with the City of Fremont, Danaj led a strategic fiscal sustainability strategy to address longstanding structural budget deficits while also playing a key role in the City's many urban development initiatives. He also led Fremont's civic engagement efforts and championed an online citizen engagement platform.

In 2014, Danaj was appointed City Manager of the City of Manhattan Beach where he continued to employ a management philosophy grounded in long-term fiscal responsibility, forward-thinking economic development, and enhanced civic engagement. Since departing Manhattan Beach earlier this year, Danaj has been engaged as a special advisor with the public-sector consulting firm Management Partners, Inc.

Danaj earned a Bachelor's degree in economics and political science from Marquette University, a Master's in business administration from the University of Notre Dame Mendoza School of Business and is a graduate of Harvard University Kennedy School's Program for Senior Executives in State & Local Government. Hayward nursing home owner sued for violations in 15 California facilities; class actions filed

Garcia, Artigliere & Medby and The Arns Law Firm filed class action lawsuits against 15 skilled nursing facilities throughout the state, their management companies and principal owner Shlomo Rechnitz for Violations of the Consumer Legal Remedies Act and Violations of Resident Rights. Among the facilities listed is Hayward Healthcare & Wellness Center, Hayward [https://www.lawgarcia.com/wp-content/uploads/2018/07/Ma-sole.pdf].

It's alleged that the defendants conceived and implemented plans to understaff the facilities in violation of applicable regulations and the express promise of the admission agreements signed on behalf of each facility resident promising that the facilities would adhere to the State of California's Residents' Bill of Rights. The Complaints allege

that this violation of each resident's rights was directed and implemented at the mandate of the managers and owners of the facilities, Rockport Administrative Services and Shlomo Rechnitz, and his multiple layers of affiliated companies.

The Complaints seek to force the defendants to ensure the sufficiency of staff in their facilities by way of injunctions so as to put an end to chronic and intentional understaffing of California skilled nursing facilities of a committed effort to pocket unearned profit at the expense of the provision of the legally mandated care to be provided to elders of the state."

"The elderly and infirm are one of the most important and yet vulnerable segments of our society," said Attorney Stephen Garcia. "To knowingly understaff these facilities in violation of promised resident rights so as to unlawfully maximize profit, victimizes our

important resource of elders and needs to end. These lawsuits are an effort on behalf of these vulnerable citizens to ensure that their needs are met and services, for which operators are paid incredibly large sums mostly by us through our Government, are actually provided.

The class members were unknowledgeable and unsophisticated in the operation of skilled nursing facilities in California and relied on the facilities in which they resided to provide services as outlined in the Admission Agreement, and which they paid good money to receive. Notably, in a declaration submitted in prior Court proceedings by representatives of the State of California, at least some of these defendants were noted to have a long history of being serial violators of skilled nursing industry laws. Our efforts here reflect our ongoing commitment to put a stop to serial violations of skilled nursing industry laws."

Bank text messages may be a scam

Detectives from the Fremont Police Department are warning the public about a new scam alert involving text messages that appear to be sent from victims' personal banks.

While the text messages or alerts appear to be sent from the bank, they direct customers to contact the bank via a link or call back number included in the text or email. The scammers then prompt the customer to provide card numbers, security codes

and other personal information which is then used for fraudulent purposes.

Police are warning community members not to provide personal bank account information by email or over the phone, and to not give credit or debit card information out by email or telephone. Customers should use caution when responding to unsolicited text messages or emails regarding their bank accounts, and instead contact the bank directly to resolve any questions.

Powerful
'Hunchback'
heats up
Star Struck stage

1482. Paris's Notre Dame Cathedral rises above the city, a beacon of faith, righteousness, and sanctuary. Claude Frollo, given a home in the cathedral as an orphaned child along with his brother Jehan, now serves as Archdeacon; a pious, rigid man who can only see the criminals, foreigners, and gypsies in the streets as vermin that must be expelled.

Hidden away inside the bell tower, hunchback Quasimodo has spent his whole life ringing the bells that order city life and watching the people and activity of the world below, wishing for just one day among them. He is encouraged to leave Notre Dame by his gargoyle friends, but his uncle and "master" Frollo has taught him he is deformed and ugly and will be hated by the world.

When the annual Feast of Fools celebration arrives, Quasimodo can no longer resist, and descends into the topsy turvy festivities

where "every man's a king and every king's a clown." He finds himself in the King of Fools contest, and horrified by his appearance, the crowd attacks him, just as Frollo predicted. The beautiful gypsy Esmeralda comes to his rescue, showing him a kindness and affection he has never known. While her heritage and dancing disgust Frollo, she stirs up a powerful desire that haunts him. Frollo's Captain of the Guard, Phoebus, also falls in love with Esmeralda. Frollo's obsession with the gypsy drives him to hunt her down and offer two options: submit to him or burn at the stake.

"The Hunchback of Notre Dame" is based on the 1831 Victor Hugo novel and features the Oscar-nominated score from the 1996 Disney movie. With its themes of injustice and persecution, internal versus external beauty, love and lust, kindness and compassion, "Hunchback" is every bit as relevant today as when it first appeared. StarStruck Theatre makes a successful turn to the darker side, delivering a powerful and moving production that wows on every level. Director Lori Stokes



orchestrates a seamless, fluid story with an engaging 27-member cast that deftly pulls you into the bright and boiling world of 15th century Paris.

Nick Saud creates an endearing Quasimodo, fully expressing his ongoing battle between sorrows and hopes, bravery and duty. Saud's balance of tenderness and strength make him easy to root for, and also contributes strong vocals, with a notable number in "Out There."

Ethan Le doesn't give an inch as the self-righteous, unbending Frollo, exhibiting composure and confidence for a firm-footed performance. Among the show's many notable songs, Le's powerful and chilling "Hellfire" arguably makes the most impact, backed by the wonderful choir and ominous lighting by Ryan Willer.

Simi Kattaura makes a memorable entrance as Esmeralda in "Rhythm of the Tambourine" with an alluring song and dance. Kattaura is compelling, conveying

strength and tenderheartedness throughout, and delivers two excellent songs, "God Help the Outcasts" and "Someday." Drew Hope is entertaining and adept as fellow gypsy Clopin, the two leading a bold and entrancing gypsy world.

Matthew Locke has presence and moments of authority as Phoebus, but feels a bit disconnected from his character. And although Kattaura and Locke work well together, the romantic element between their characters is lacking.

While StarStruck always goes big, this production adds a new element, a first in the theatre's 23-year history – bringing in adult community members to serve as the choir of Notre Dame. Music director Nancy Godfrey achieves her desire for a mature sound, the 37-member choir providing a rich and beautiful accompaniment to the show.

And richness abounds in this production, from the beguiling and spirited choreography of Lillian Kautz to the vibrant,

detailed costumes of Diane Scherbarth. Stephen Wathen creates a majestic set with towering stone columns and ledges, a trio of bells, and glorious rose window, and goes from saintly to creepy with the ghoulish Court of Miracles.

Stokes and the StarStruck team never fail to impress, and "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" is a beautiful and challenging production that leaves the audience with the question: "what makes a monster and what makes a man?"

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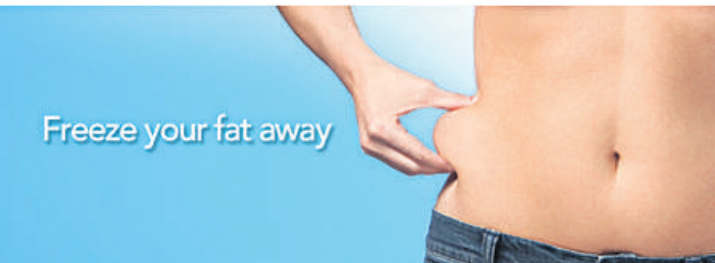
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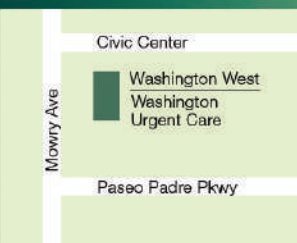

Removing a wall makes all the difference

This kitchen underwent a significant transformation, inspired by the clients' desire for an open-concept space. To accomplish their goal, they wanted to remove much of the wall separating the kitchen from the adjacent living room. In a typical design from the 1960s, the existing kitchen felt small and isolated from the rest of the home, and it simply didn't work anymore for their lifestyle. In addition, the clients were ready for an updated and upgraded, beautiful and functional new kitchen, with all the modern amenities.

Here's what we did:

1. Not only did we remove part of the wall, but we also moved the window in order to greatly expand the amount of countertop and cabinet space.
2. I placed all of the tall items —wall ovens, pantry and refrigerator —at the entry to the kitchen. This allowed for a long, uninterrupted run of counter on both sides of the kitchen.
3. The new location of the refrigerator meant losing a small window, but a new, much larger window was installed further down the wall.
4. Removing the wall between the living room and kitchen gave us space for a large breakfast bar, meaning we could sacrifice the existing eating nook and extend the cabinetry on the sink wall all the way to the corner.



This resulted in a gain of approximately eight additional linear feet of counter space and storage.

5. The cooktop actually stayed very close to its original location, but with the sleek chimney hood and the new limestone backsplash, it became a beautiful focal point. And note the abundance of counter space, especially on the left side.

6. A solar tube and new recessed lighting, plus lighting underneath the upper cabinets illuminate this kitchen very nicely. Pendant lights above the sink provide an additional layer of light, and simply look lovely.
7. To unify the two spaces even more, we extended the oak floors from the living room into the kitchen. With one type of floor throughout, both rooms

look larger, and the design is more cohesive. We also used the same wall color in both spaces.

8. For the finish materials, we kept the color scheme on the warm side, with stained cherry custom cabinets, cream-colored Silestone countertops and natural limestone backsplash tile. The window treatment adds a little splash of color to the otherwise neutral palette.

The clients are very happy with how the kitchen turned out. She said, "We all like how (the design) opened up the kitchen to the rest of the house. It feels so much bigger without adding any square footage. The counter tops are great; they never look dirty. I also love the touch faucet—a last minute suggestion from a friend at work. I never would have picked it, but it's cool!"

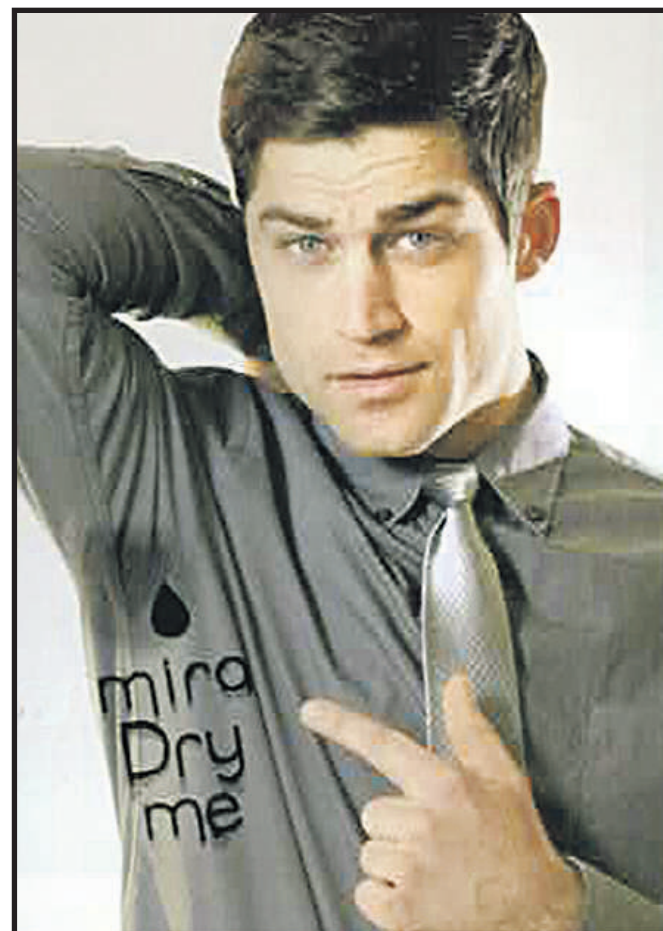

Crimes of the Heart

Shots are never fired in Crimes of the Heart, now playing at the Chanticleers Theatre in Castro Valley, but your heart may still feel a little riddled after

cope with their predicament, past resentments and disappointments bubble to the surface as the dysfunctional sisters shout, cry, and laugh their way through the afternoon and into the following morning.



experiencing this dark comedy by American playwright Beth Henley, directed by Edward Nattenberg.

It's a window into the lives of three sisters – Lenna, Meg, and Babe Magrath. Set in the southern town of Hazlehurst, Mississippi in the early '70's, the play is divided into three acts that take place over the course of two days in the kitchen of their small home.

After Babe, the youngest of the three, shoots her abusive husband, Meg and Lenna rally to her side. While trying to

Kelsey Tresemer is wonderful as the ever-pragmatic spinster, Lenna, an anchor in the midst of an emotional sea. From the opening scene, when she wishes herself a happy birthday with a candle on a cookie, we see her solitude as both her strength and her weakness. It is only poetic justice, then, that the play ends with Lenna surrounded by her sisters as they dive into a big birthday cake.

Kim Jiang plays the wild middle sister, Meg, a down and out singer whose dream of stardom is never realized. It's refreshing to see an Asian actor cast in this role, and

Jiang handles it well, like a Southern Lucy Liu. Callous and flighty, her disregard for others is well portrayed. In another poetic moment, Meg resolves to admit her failures to their dying granddaddy, only to learn it is too late as he has slipped into a coma. This brings hysterical laughter from the other two, releasing tension that has been slowly accumulating during the entire play.

Kayla Stone plays Babe perfectly with a sweet innocence and a crazy curiosity. Her onstage antics are funny and desperate, from her bad saxophone playing

to her failed suicide attempt as she tries to stick her head in the oven. She is the tender, damaged heart of the three. One moment she is playful and flirtatious, the next she is nervous and hysterical, and Stone shines in this role.

The small cast is rounded out by Becca Euchler (excellent as their prim and proper cousin, Chick Boyle), Zach Beckman as the simple Doc Porter, and Steven Baker as Babe's young lawyer, Barnette Lloyd.

The set has been wonderfully conceived by Michael J. Simons. The intimate space of the Chanticleers Theatre, with 99 seats, works to Simons' advantage as the audience feels like they are in a real, working kitchen. And Nattenberg's direction keeps the action flowing as the actors shift their positions to different areas of the stage throughout the production. Still, I found the single setting and heavy drama to be somewhat stifling at times, like a hazy and hot afternoon.

Winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1981 and nominated for Best Play at the Tony Awards in 1982, Crimes of the Heart is not for the faint of heart. While quite funny at times, it's a very long (3 hours) and dark play that deals with some heavy issues. Kudos to the cast for memorizing so many lines in such a short period of time - opening night felt well-rehearsed and polished.

The Chanticleers Theatre has been putting on plays since 1948. They have been at their current location since 1976, a small wood building next to the Castro Valley Community Park. They have about four productions every year.

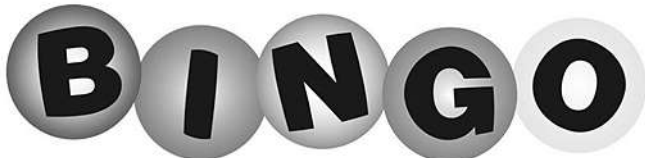

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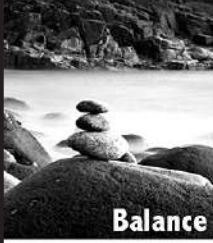

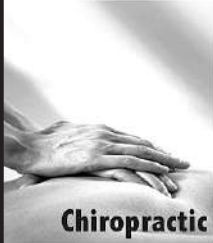

Don’t forget the water

As the dog days of summer approach, it’s worth repeating some advice: bring lots of water when you visit the regional parks and other open spaces. In the regional parks, there generally are not sources of drinking water once you have left the trailheads and picnic areas. And August heat can sneak up on you if you aren’t careful and don’t drink water often.

Those hydration packs with drinking tubes are really convenient. I never carried one until a recent trip but have found that they work well to encourage

regular water intake. Wear a wide-brimmed hat, too, and don’t forget the sunscreen.

If you’re looking for cooler places to hike on hot summer days, Point Pinole in Richmond is always a good bet, since it’s right on San Pablo Bay. Another shady place is Redwood Regional Park in Oakland. Farther inland, walk the Old Stage Road at Castle Rock and Diablo Foothills regional parklands in Walnut Creek.

Or time your hike for the morning hours before the heat of the day arrives.

Speaking of early morning activities, there’s a grunion search scheduled for 12:30 a.m. to 2:30 a.m. on Sunday morning, Aug. 12 at Crown Beach in Alameda. This is not a joke. Grunions are fish that spawn on sandy beaches during full and new moon nights.

Normally this is past park curfew on Crown Beach, but naturalist Susan Ramos will lead the search for spawning grunion. The program is free, but registration is required, and children must have adult participation.

Tule, a plant used extensively by the Ohlone Indians, is the focus of a couple of programs at Tilden Nature Area near Berkeley, both with naturalist Trail Gail Broesder. From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Sunday, Aug. 5, Gail will help participants make a berry gathering basket from tule reed, then the group will venture into the Nature Area to test how well the baskets work.

The program is for ages eight and older, there’s a fee of \$5 (\$7 for non-Park District

Then from 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. the same day, Gail will show visitors how to make a miniature tule reed boat, then go to a nearby pond to test whether it floats. This program is free of charge.

Biologist says whale protected her from shark

A marine biologist believes a humpback whale shielded her from a 15-foot tiger shark in the South Pacific. Nan Hauser said she didn’t understand the actions of the 25-ton whale that she met face-to-face in the Cook Islands.

Then she saw the shark. She’s heard on a video telling the massive mammal, “I love you!” The encounter took place in October, but Hauser didn’t upload the video until Jan. 8. It quickly spread via social media.

Hauser, president of the Center for Cetacean Research and Conservation, told the Portland Press Herald that whales are “altruistic” and often hide seals from predators, but she has never experienced or read about anything about a whale protecting a human. “If someone told me the story, I wouldn’t believe it,” she said.

The Brunswick resident said she was oblivious to the shark during the tense, 10-minute encounter. The whale started to nudge her, and appeared to push her with its head. The animal also appeared to shield her with its pectoral fin. Her research companions turned off an underwater video drone, fearing she was going to be mauled to death. But Hauser kept her video rolling.

She suffered some bruises and scratches from the encounter, but was otherwise unscathed. She said that after she swam back to her boat, the whale surfaced nearby as if to check on her. While Hauser credits the whale for protecting her, she acknowledges she can’t know what the whale was thinking.

James Sulikowski, a marine biologist and professor at the University of New England who has studied tiger sharks, said he’s not convinced that the whale saved her life. “The shark could have just been hanging around,” he said. “There’s really no way of knowing the whale’s motivation.”

TAKES FROM SILICON VALLEY EAST

“This is a Crazy Way to Make a Living” and other parting thoughts from a career city manager

It’s impossible to describe the role of City Manager. The breadth of issues encountered within a city organization defies categorization. One minute you are knee-deep in budget planning and the next, you are confronted with a public safety issue that is literally life or death.

Over the course of 31 years, the last 14 in Fremont, several themes have emerged that have kept me and the city organization on an even keel. Some are lessons that I’ve learned the hard way, and others have developed as a management style over time. In all cases, the themes reflect the complexities of the issues, people, and places that I have been fortunate to be enmeshed with over the last three decades - from Azusa to Indio, and Tracy to Fremont.

Take Action

When Fremont was reeling from the closure of the NUMMI auto factory, the City Council challenged staff to make something happen — to rise to the occasion for the good of the community. At the time, none of us really knew what that meant. But there was passion around seizing the opportunity for economic development in Warm Springs. My job was to steer the culture of the organization from one suspicious of development, and over-regulation, to one that valued economic development as part of a solution to financial strife.

Be Opportunistic

Sometimes things do fall out of the sky, and when they do, you have to be ready to leverage the opportunity. Our organization didn’t set out to recruit Tesla, but when Fremont emerged as a front-runner to house the manufacturing operation for the groundbreaking Model S, the city was all-hands-on-deck to be a partner in their growth and development.

Housing the Oakland Athletics stadium was another such opportunity, and while this one didn’t pan out, our organization did its best work on this project. The A’s made us strive. It was a crash course on thinking big — if the A’s were interested, who else might be interested? This aspiration transferred to other opportunities, and Fremont’s entrepreneurial spirit was born.

Seize the Crisis

When the A’s decided not to come to Fremont, we were disappointed, but as it



turned out, we laid the groundwork for even more important work ahead with development of Pacific Commons, and later, the Warm Springs Innovation District.

It’s hard to believe now, but it wasn’t that long ago that Warm Springs was the “forgotten district.” The NUMMI closure was a profound reminder that the community should transcend differences and focus on a common purpose. This is harder and harder to do because people are most concerned about what affects them most directly. Absent a tragedy, it’s a hard mentality to transcend. Common purpose provides a rallying effect and is ultimately more powerful.

Prioritize Fiscal Sustainability

My first five years in Fremont focused on fiscal health; there was a strong sense of urgency in rebuilding operations for long-term sustainability. Without developing this certainty around future budgets, we would not have been able to work on more aspirational goals.

And, while other cities were occupied in unwinding their Redevelopment Agencies (RDA), Fremont was among the first cities to close its RDA. Because our RDA footprint was small and uncomplicated, Fremont had the freedom and time to pursue other projects. This gave us an early start to pursue different and creative funding mechanisms.

Balance New Jobs and District Development

Cities function best when there is balance between housing and jobs. Nurturing new employment opportunities — and the accompanying tax base — has to be a top priority. Balancing the needs of different districts is more challenging. As is often the case, your greatest attributes can also stand in the way of progress. I’m proud that Fremont has found ways to celebrate and invest in its unique and vibrant historic districts while also

developing a new Downtown that will bring the entire community together.

Pick the Right People

I have passion for picking the right people. If you assemble a strong group of talented staff with common purpose and consistency in messaging, they can articulate goals that speak to macro-relevance and achieve almost anything. There is no use in running a tight ship if it is headed for an iceberg! I’ve always demanded loyalty, honesty, and the best work from my team. I’ve relied on intuition and timing to know when to push, and when to nurture, and how to identify good fits for the organization. You have to trust your instincts, but also listen to those around you.

Embrace Risk

In pursuing the development of a new Downtown, I was secure in taking a risk because previous City Councils were aspirational, and willing to experiment. The desire to pursue a central identity was embraced by political leaders who allowed City Staff the creative freedom to take the organization to the next level.

In the case of NUMMI, it was a crucial moment. When you have nothing to lose, you possess the ultimate freedom. The stakes were high, but the opportunity was immense. Fremont’s back was against the wall, and it was up to Staff and the City Council to see beyond the current horizon.

Be Tenacious

You can’t see yourself as an extension of the current will. Instead, you have to balance current needs and strive in the face of controversy. Our approach has been one of relentless cultivation, and the courage to redefine ourselves. I’ve learned when to be diplomatic, and when to apply more pressure.

Think Big

I’m proud of taking Fremont’s economic development efforts to the next level – think line chef to gourmet! As a City, we doubled down on marketing and saw the value of leveraging our strengths, which garnered national and international interest. There was a lot of sophistication behind the scenes as well as the ability to zero in on what’s most important.

Be Resilient

When a crisis hits, you need the confidence to not panic. You may not know the outcome, but if you surround yourself with good people, and have faith that the professionals around you will help you tackle a grave issue, something good will eventually evolve. It’s a simple formula: tune out the chatter; bring people together; talk things through.

Short-term rentals temporarily blocked

In a special meeting on July 23 San Leandro City Council members unanimously passed a temporary 45-day moratorium on non-hosted short-term rentals in the city. After the initial 45-day period, the council will consider an extension of the moratorium, which could be up to one year.

The vote was in response to increasing residential complaints about short-term rentals in San Leandro, the commercialization of single-family homes in residential areas and problems identified with short-term online listings.

The moratorium prohibits the short-term rental of homes to paid guests when a host or owner is not present during their stay. A short-term rental is defined as the rental of any residence to paid guests for fewer than 30 days. This interim ordinance is effective immediately while the city council discusses further short-term rental policies for San Leandro.

Swalwell introduces domestic violence protection bill

Rep. Eric Swalwell (CA-15) introduced a bill on July 26, 2018 to help protect domestic violence victims from being murdered with guns. The No Guns for Abusers Act would require the National Institute of Justice (NIJ) to report to Congress on the best practices that jurisdictions should use to require anyone charged with or convicted of a domestic violence crime, or subject to a domestic violence protective order, to relinquish all their firearms.

“Every day in America, on average, a woman is killed by an abuser’s gun. That’s appalling,” Swalwell said. “Congress must act to make sure domestic abusers don’t have firearms.”

One academic study found women’s risk of homicide by an abuser increases by a factor of five if the abuser has access to a firearm. Federal law bars domestic abusers from buying and possessing firearms; this includes those convicted for any felony, convicted of a domestic violence misdemeanor, or subject to a protective order with respect to an intimate relation or child. Some states have similar laws.

But while background checks can prevent prohibited persons from buying firearms, they do not address weapons those people already have. Some states have tried to address this by creating processes by which all domestic abusers must relinquish their guns, but many have not – notable examples of states without such laws include Alaska, Arkansas, Georgia, Idaho, Kansas, Kentucky, Mississippi, Missouri, Ohio, Oklahoma, and Wyoming. The federal government also lacks relinquishment policies

for domestic abusers convicted at the federal level.

The No Guns for Abusers Act would require the NIJ to make a report to Congress on the best approaches for relinquishment statutes, rules, policies, and practices, with input from academics and stakeholders, including 18 specified aspects of the firearm relinquishment process. It also would require the NIJ to contract with third parties to study the relative success of different relinquishment programs, and then to use that information to update its initial report. The Attorney General would be authorized to award grants to jurisdictions which already have or adopt programs substantially similar to the best practices identified in the NIJ report. And the bill would require the Attorney General to propose federal legislation and adopt rules, policies, and practices consistent with those best practices.

“We can have responsible gun ownership in America and protect domestic violence victims from abusers,” Swalwell said.

The No Guns for Abusers Act’s original cosponsors include House Judiciary Committee Ranking Member Jerrold Nadler, D-N.Y., and Judiciary Committee members Steve Cohen, D-Tenn., and Jamie Raskin, D-Md., as well as Reps. Anthony Brown, D-Md.; Katherine Clark, D-Mass.; Joe Kennedy III, D-Mass.; Brenda Lawrence, D-Mich.; Jim McGovern, D-Mass.; Jerry McNerney, D-Calif.; Grace Napolitano, D-Calif.; Eleanor Holmes Norton, D-D.C.; Dina Titus, D-Nev.; and Bonnie Watson Coleman, D-N.J. The bill is supported by Everytown for Gun Safety, the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, and the National Network to End Domestic Violence.

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Thanks to the voters

Many thanks to voters in the East Bay Regional Park District, who helped pass statewide Proposition 68 on the June ballot. The measure passed with 70 percent in Alameda County and 60 percent in Contra Costa. It provides for sale of more than \$4 billion in bonds for a variety of purposes, including \$2.83 billion statewide for parks and natural resources, \$720 million for water resources, \$550 million for flood protection, and \$200 million for local parks throughout California, to be distributed on a per capita basis.

East Bay Regional Park District is eligible for a variety of grant opportunities created by the bond. Potential projects include Hayward Shoreline restoration and Lake Chabot improvements. Thanks also to State Senator Steve Glazer and Assemblywoman Catherine Baker, who have announced a separate \$5 million grant to East Bay Regional Park District from the state’s general fund for improvements to Del Valle Regional Park south of Livermore. The park has a five-mile reservoir with boating and swimming, picnicking and campgrounds, and miles of trails leading into unspoiled backcountry. The grant will be used to transform a former concession stand into a new visitor center, overhaul the park’s water treatment system, and refurbish the bathrooms and

campground showers. Construction will start this fall. And congratulations to Save the Redwoods League, celebrating its 100th anniversary this year. Since 1918, the League has engaged in innovative, science-based forest restoration work, educated thousands of students about redwoods, improved access to parklands and helped to preserve the trees through establishment of parks and reserves. East Bay Regional Park District partners with the League to offer educational programs at Redwood Regional Park in Oakland – the largest stand of redwoods in the East Bay. You can learn more about Save the Redwoods League by visiting StandForTheRedwoods.org. The website lists upcoming events, history, and ways to celebrate the trees during the centennial.

Speaking of websites, East Bay Regional Park District has redesigned its own to be more friendly to mobile devices. Visit www.ebparks.org for a full range of information about the District. You can download maps and brochures for regional parks, find out about special events, check the calendar for naturalist programs, get the latest park-related news, and much more. It’s your window to all kinds of outdoor recreation and adventure. Vargas Plateau Regional Park in the Fremont hills is one of the newer parks in the District. The city of Fremont is taking steps to close to vehicle traffic a one-mile middle section of Morrison Canyon Road, which leads up to Vargas Road and the park. Practically speaking, the closure shouldn’t have much effect on access to Vargas Plateau, because the Park District already

discourages use of Morrison Canyon Road to get there. The reason is that Morrison Canyon Road is winding and in places only nine feet wide, with few turnouts. Yet it is used as a two-way street, and has become popular with motorists seeking a shortcut to reach Interstate 680. It’s dangerous. The Park District’s map states that Vargas Plateau is accessible only from the Vargas Road exit on I-680. The section of Morrison Canyon Road that Fremont envisions closing has no homes on it. The road would remain open to bicyclists, pedestrians and emergency vehicles. Closure will require environmental review and a public hearing, so it wouldn’t take place until September at the earliest. Meanwhile, because of the danger, we urge visitors to Vargas Plateau to access the park only from I-680 via Vargas Road.

Supportive Housing Development breaks ground

The County of Santa Clara has broken ground and begun construction of Villas on the Park, a 100% permanent supportive housing development for people exiting homelessness. The County of Santa Clara approved \$7.2 million in funding for the construction of this complex which will provide housing for 83 formerly homeless individuals and one on-site manager in downtown San Jose. The 6-story LEEDs Gold Standard project located one block from Saint James Park on the east side of North 2nd Street, is expected to be completed in December 2019. “We are committed to extend the support our residents may need to remain stably housed and contribute to the community,” said County of Santa Clara Supervisor Dave Cortese, Chair of the Board of Supervisors Housing, Land Use, Environment and Transportation Committee. “With funding through the Housing Bond, we plan to construct more than 100 similar developments over the next 10 years.” “The heavy rent burden on so many people in Santa Clara County just got a little lighter with the construction of Villas on the Park,” said Supervisor Cindy Chavez representing Central, East and South San Jose. “This groundbreaking comes just one year after the Board of Supervisors approved the first six housing projects paid for by the \$950-million-dollar housing bond passed by Santa Clara County voters. There will be a third set of housing projects approved by September.” The Villas on the Park development will offer individualized services to improve housing stability for its residents who have experienced homelessness and will include a street level parking garage, outdoor landscaped courtyard, and a roof-top deck with a resident gardening area and view of the St. James Park. People Assisting the Homeless (PATH), a state-wide agency assisting people to find permanent housing and providing case management, will help new residents transition

to living in a supportive community by providing on-site services such as resident engagement activities, orientation and needs assessment, behavioral health services, and life skills education. “We have very effective City and County administrations working with outstanding community organizations that will provide the necessary services to make this housing development a success and something we can all be proud of,” said Ky Le, Director of the Office of Supportive Housing. The Complex will have an on-site property manager, laundry facilities on each floor, space for visiting medical staff to provide health services, and a dedicated community room. Since County voters approved the Housing Bond, \$111 million in funding has been approved for 10 housing developments in six cities within the county. Increased funding and support for permanent supportive housing for people experiencing chronic homelessness has led to an 18%reduction in this population from 2011 to 2017. “Villas on the Park is now under construction with the support of numerous individuals and design professionals. We look forward to the completion of this innovative community,” said Jim Silverwood, President and CEO of Affirmed Housing, the developer of the complex. Community cameras aid police in arrest of auto burglary suspect

A 21-year-old Hayward man suspected in several auto burglaries was recently arrested by police in Fremont after they were able to identify him from video surveillance cameras in the community.

The case started on July 9 when multiple units collaborated to identify and arrest a suspect involved in committing auto burglaries in our community. At 6:42 a.m. a Community Service Officer responded to the parking lot of City Sports, in the 39100 block of Farwell Place. to investigate two auto burglaries that had just occurred.

The CSO got video surveillance from the business, which showed a grey Volvo S60

or S80 4-door, with an unknown license plate. The vehicle backed into a parking stall and a male got out and broke the windows of two vehicles and removed items from them, including a wallet, bank cards and a laptop computer.

When detectives took over the investigation, they checked a state database to try and match license plate reader data associated to a Volvo that was seen entering Interstate 880 northbound from a City of Fremont community camera system on Mowry Avenue. A detective located the license plate for a Volvo S80 and found the registered owner's address in Hayward. Upon further review, the registered owner was found to be on active probation, with a search clause for carrying a concealed firearm.

The Volvo S80, along with an Infiniti was located at the registered owner's address and the suspect was eventually identified as Armani Phillips, 21, of Hayward. Police were able to get an arrest warrant for Phillips and a search warrant for his residence.

Because of Phillips' pending assault with a firearms case, the Fremont Police SWAT Team was activated for the warrant service, and on July 20 they contacted him inside his Infiniti sedan parked near his house in Hayward. After initially resisting, Phillips was safely taken into custody. Inside Phillips' vehicle, police found a loaded pistol on the floorboard which was later determined to have been stolen out of a parked vehicle.

During a search of the Phillips' residence, multiple

items of stolen property were located. Detectives have been able to associate Phillips with five auto burglaries in Fremont and believe he may have committed additional crimes in the area.

“If it weren't for the Department's use of automated license plate reader cameras, we would not have been able to solve this case. This is a great example of how our private-community video partnership is working to solve crimes involving prolific offenders in our City,” said Detective Sergeant Jason Lambert.

Phillips was booked into the Fremont jail on several counts including suspicion of being a felon in possession of a firearm, receiving stolen property, committing a felony while out on bail, burglary. He also had a warrant for auto burglary and identity theft.

California law expands treatment for mentally ill suspects

California prosecutors are negotiating with Gov. Jerry Brown's administration to narrow a new law they say dangerously expands a program that allows judges to send criminal suspects to mental health treatment programs.

The law Brown signed last month allows judges to divert suspects to treatment and later dismiss criminal charges if the judge decides that mental illness played a significant role in the crime.

The measure is intended to reduce the backlog of suspects sent to mental hospitals because they are judged incompetent to stand trial. State law already allows diversion programs for offenders with certain mental health problems.

The prosecutors say the new law allows the diversion of those charged with serious crimes, with few safeguards.

Supporters oppose narrowing the provisions before lawmakers adjourn at the end of August.

Arrest made in deadly weapon attack

A 33-year-old Fremont man was arrested July 25 by Milpitas Police in connection with an assault with a deadly weapon attack on another man at a Milpitas gas station.

The case began at about 3:07 a.m. Tuesday, July 3 when officers responded to a report about a man screaming and bleeding from a head injury at a 75 Union gas station at 27 S. Park Victoria Drive. The 43-year-old Milpitas man told officers he was involved in a verbal dispute with a Hispanic

male when the man suddenly attacked him with an edged weapon. The victim was taken to an area hospital for medical treatment.

Investigation officers were able to identify the suspect as Luis Edward Sanchez, 33, of Fremont who is on Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) probation out of Santa Clara County for domestic violence and battery. Officers searched the area for Sanchez, but they could not locate him.

About three weeks later at about 12:15 p.m. on July 25, Milpitas Police detectives located Sanchez in San Jose and arrested him without incident. After an interview with

detectives, Sanchez was booked into the Santa Clara County Jail on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon.

Los Vaqueros Reservoir expansion Project gets Prop. 1 funds

On July 24, the California Water

Commission announced that \$459 million of Proposition 1 funding will be slated for expanding Los Vaqueros Reservoir in eastern Contra Costa County near Brentwood. With 15 agencies interested in potentially being part of the expansion, Los Vaqueros would expand in size and operations with broader reaching benefits.

After a multi-year process, the California Water Commission announced funding decisions for the \$2.7 billion in Proposition 1 for water storage. Through the Water Storage Investment Program, agencies statewide applied for voter approved funds for water storage projects that provide public benefits.

Los Vaqueros Reservoir Expansion was one of the projects that qualified for state funding with benefits including water to wildlife refuges for environmental purposes and water to cities and farms for human consumption and food production. Currently owned and operated by Contra Costa Water District, an expanded reservoir would provide benefits to additional partners, while maintaining the existing benefits for CCWD customers.

Board President of the Alameda County Water District Paul Sethy commented, “It’s a project with so many wonderful facets—including improved reliability and preparedness elements that will benefit the entire bay region.”

Santa Clara Valley Water District Board Chair Richard P. Santos agreed, saying, “Both the Los Vaqueros and Pacheco reservoir expansion projects could provide significant benefits to the Bay Area and beyond. Part of the proposed Los Vaqueros project is a new pipeline to connect the reservoir to the South Bay Aqueduct, which would give us more flexibility in moving water to where it’s needed.”

Next steps will include finalizing design, permitting and local agreements, as well as commitments from local agency partners, with phased construction starting as early as 2020. More information about the project is available at www.ccwater.com/lvstudies.

Einstein's theory of relativity passes yet another test

More than a century after Albert Einstein proposed it, his theory of general relativity has passed another test.

With giant telescopes pointed at the center of our galaxy, a team of European researchers observed a fast-moving star that got close to a monstrous black hole. They saw that the black hole distorted the light waves from the star in a way that agrees with Einstein's theory. The result was reported July 26 in the journal *Astronomy & Astrophysics*.

Einstein's theory says the fabric of the universe is not simply space, but a more complex entity called space-time, which is warped by the presence of heavy objects. Black holes offer a good opportunity to test that idea. The one that lies at the heart of the Milky Way is 4 million times as massive as our sun.

“I, just like every physicist in the world, would have loved to finally see a crack in Einstein's relativity,” said Ohio State

University astrophysicist Paul Sutter. “But he’s outsmarted us.” But confirming Einstein's work — again, “feels like we’re kind of beating a dead horse,” said Sutter, who wasn’t part of the research team led by Reinhard Genzel of the Max Planck Institute for Extraterrestrial Physics in Garching, Germany.

Scientists know that the theory still doesn’t explain everything about the universe. So, they keep testing it time and again. So far, nobody has been able to overthrow it.

Although the effects of general relativity have been seen before, this was the first detection made by observing the motion of a star near a supermassive black hole. “To me, that’s what makes this so cool,” said Clifford Will, a University of Florida physicist who did not participate in the research.

Will hopes his colleagues will be able to discover stars even closer to the black hole, where the effects of relativity would be stronger. This finding “is really the opening episode,” he said. “The future, I think, is going to be very exciting.”

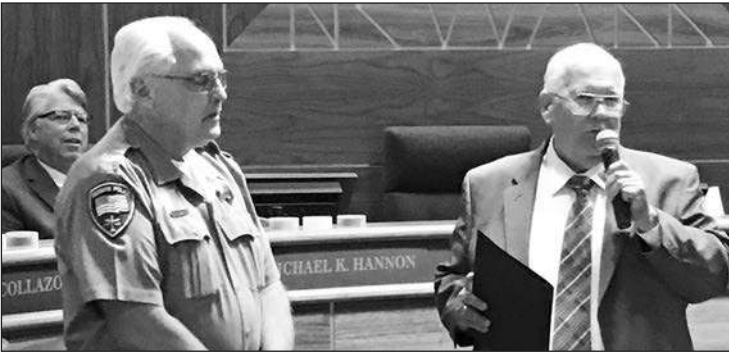

Lick Observatory anniversary

As part of a South Bay legislative delegation State Sen. Bob Wieckowski (D-Fremont) presented a state resolution to regional officials to honor the 130th anniversary of Lick Observatory. The resolution was presented to University of California, Santa Cruz Chancellor George Blumenthal and staff, faculty and community leaders during a ceremony on July 23 at the observatory’s 36-inch Great Refractor telescope atop Mt. Hamilton, east of San Jose.

“Human progress does not end with us looking up at the stars, but rather challenging ourselves to define what the next frontier will be,” said Wieckowski, the chair of the Senate Environmental Quality Committee. “We are here to recognize Lick for being a resource for our state for more than a century, and we are grateful to the team who continues to maintain this observatory. The research and educational programs here not only broaden our horizons, they inspire students who will become the next generation of astronomers.”

Lick serves astronomers from all eight University of California astronomy campuses, as well as Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory and Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory. The University of California owns and operates the facility. It began operations in 1888 and was founded by a bequest from James Lick. The gift was the largest philanthropic gift in the history of science.

Lick Observatory’s users range in age from undergraduates to the most senior astronomers in the UC system, according to Lick’s website. More than 100 observers are pursuing science programs at Lick at any given time. It is also the UC’s chief site for testing new technologies and instruments for optical astronomy.

The observatory is also open to the public and is visited annually by about 35,000 children and adults. Wieckowski represents the 10th District, which includes parts of Santa Clara County and southern Alameda County.

Howard Lung designed and

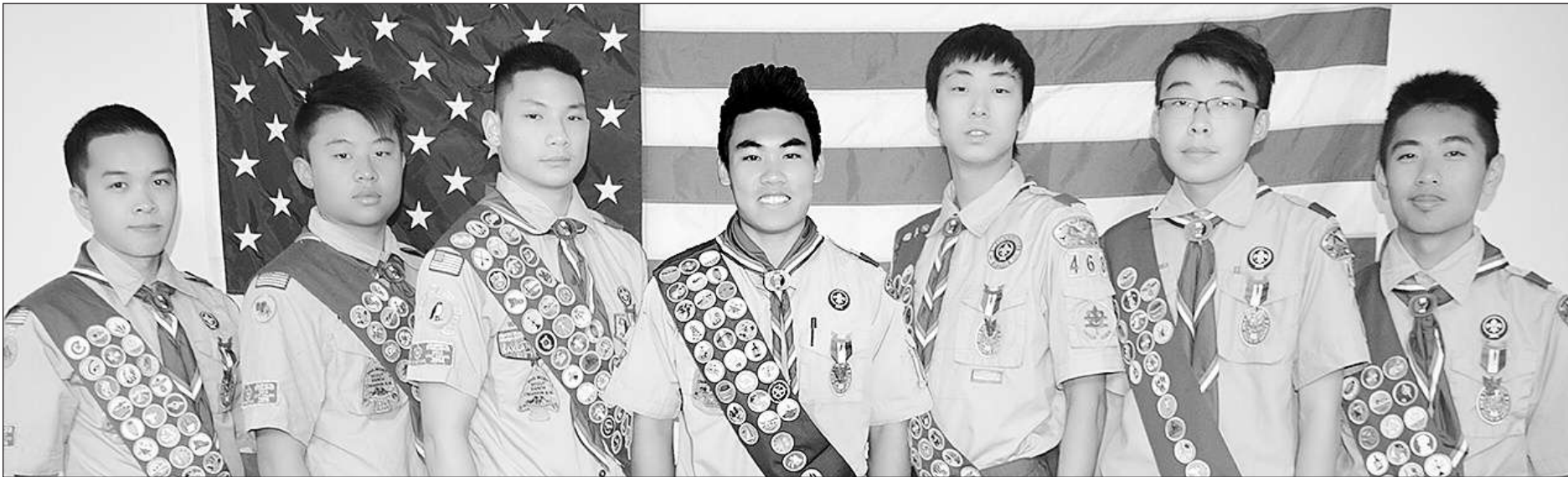
built shelves and a mist system for the greenhouse at the Nature Learning Center located in Central Park, Fremont.

• Appoint Sarah Dalton-Erickson for the Citizen-at-large position for the city’s Public Art Board. The board advises the city council and staff on potential public art installations. They are currently collaborating with city staff on

City Reports:

• Add the Cannabis Business License Tax to the city-wide November 6, 2018 ballot. Cannabis businesses would be taxed for cultivation, manufacturing, retail, distribution, and testing. The tax is not a sales tax and won’t be used on consumers. Public comments were made by potential cannabis businesses supporting the proposed taxes. The revenue would

be put into the city’s general fund and be used for police, fire, and code enforcement services.

• Put the proposed City Charter and property transfer tax on the November 6, 2018 ballot. Charter cities are allowed to make their own rules when it comes to municipal affairs, including the real property transfer tax (RPTT). The proposed property transfer tax rate would be \$10 per \$1,000 of the cost of the home. The tax is only applied to the seller and the buyer when the home is sold.

Local Control and Essential Services Measures put on Ballot

On July 24, City Council voted to place two measures for voter consideration on the November ballot to maintain essential services and enhance local control.

The first measure is a cannabis business tax that, if approved by voters, would apply only to Union City cannabis businesses to ensure they pay their fair share to maintain Union City’s quality of life and public safety, to include:

- 911 dispatch, neighborhood police patrols
- Emergency response times
- After-school programs for children and teens
- Keeping fire stations open full time
- Possible funding towards community youth education programs
- Possible funding towards

enforcement to prevent the illegal black market of cannabis

The measure would include strict accountability requirements, including independent audits and yearly reports to the community to ensure funds are spent efficiently and effectively.

A second measure, if approved by voters, would establish Union City as a Charter City with a city charter, which would operate as Union City’s constitution over local matters, giving residents a greater voice and enhancing local control over local revenue. If enacted, Union City would become a Charter City with an enhanced Real Property Transfer Tax paid when property is transferred from seller to buyer, with much of the revenue coming from corporate and commercial real estate owners.

Citizenship and Assimilation Grant Opportunities

These competitive grant opportunities are for organizations that prepare lawful permanent residents for naturalization and promote civic assimilation through increased knowledge of English, U.S. history and civics. USCIS seeks to expand availability of high-quality citizenship preparation services throughout the country with these two grant opportunities:

- Citizenship Instruction and Naturalization Application Services. This grant opportunity will fund up to 36 organizations that offer both citizenship instruction and naturalization application services to lawful permanent residents. Applications are due by Aug. 8, 2018.
- The Refugee and Asylee Assimilation Program. This grant opportunity will fund up to four organizations to provide individualized services to lawful permanent residents who entered the United States under the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program or were granted asylum. These services will help them to obtain the skills and knowledge required for successful citizenship and to foster a sense of belonging and attachment to the United States. This grant strives to promote long term civic assimilation of those lawful permanent residents who have identified naturalization as a goal, yet may need additional information, instruction and services to attain it. Applications are due by Aug. 15, 2018.

USCIS will take into account various program and organizational factors, including past grantee performance and whether an applicant and any sub-awardees are enrolled in E-Verify, when making final award decisions.

USCIS expects to announce award recipients in September.

Since 2009, USCIS has awarded approximately \$73 million through 353 grants to immigrant-serving organizations. The funding of these grant opportunities is supported by fee funds.
