Lantern Festival delivers spectacular lights and structures

Join us for a spectacular evening of dazzling lights, colors, shapes, and themes when the magnificent Chinese "Lantern Light Festival" arrives at the Alameda County Fairgrounds on Friday, November 30. Locals are looking forward to witnessing a kaleidoscope of colors for the Christmas season and beyond.

Although many people picture lanterns being released into the night sky, these lanterns stay firmly on the ground. The enormous structures are crafted around themes that include global architecture, creatures of the land and sea, holiday traditions, and mythical stories. Handmade by the world's best lantern makers, lanterns reach up to 30 feet into the sky and can be as long as 150 feet - a striking visual display.

The Lantern Light Festival is a six-week celebration of a Chinese tradition that started over 2,000 years ago. During the Eastern Han Dynasty, Emperor Han Mingdi ordered that lanterns should be lit to show respect to Buddha on the fifteenth day of the first Chinese Lunar month. The festival

Ballet Petit's The Nuteracker

Celebrating 40 years of holiday magic

Ballet Petit (BP) of Hayward will be performing its 40th anniversary production of "The Nutcracker" at Chabot College's Visual and Performing Arts Center on Saturday, December 1 and Sunday, December 2.

"The Nutcracker" is a two-act ballet originally

choreographed by Marius Petipa and Lev Ivanov, with a score composed by Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky. It premiered, unsuccessfully, in the Mariinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg, Russia, on December 18, 1892. Yet over the course of a century and several decades, "The Nutcracker" has evolved into global popularity and is now performed by a

Good Hand Hygiene Can Help You Stay Healthy

Handwashing Awareness Week Focuses on Preventing the Spread of Disease

How many times did you hear, "Wash your hands" when you were a kid? It turns out your mother was right. Washing your hands can help you stay healthy. That's because your hands are a significant source of germs with the potential to spread disease. You can help yourself stay healthy this cold and flu season - and all year long – by washing your hands frequently and keeping them away from your mouth, nose and eyes. That's the message behind Handwashing Awareness Week, Dec. 2-8.

Handwashing is one of the most important steps you can take to get rid of germs and avoid spreading disease, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Germs that cause disease can end up on people's hands and are transferred to surfaces like door handles, keyboards and shopping carts, where they are picked up by others who touch those surfaces.

"Proper handwashing can prevent the spread of disease, it's that simple," said Dr. Harman Chawla, infection control specialist at Washington Hospital. "It's absolutely critical in the hospital setting, but good hand hygiene is important for everyone."

Dr. Chawla is part of a multidisciplinary team at Washington Hospital that works to reduce the spread of infectious diseases. That includes ensuring Hospital staff follow proper handwashing guidelines. "I like the quote I've seen posted in the elevators: 'when you wash, it saves lives," he said. "Handwashing is the frontline defense against spreading germs."

Catching Them Young

Washington Hospital's Community Outreach Manager, Lucy Hernandez, provides handwashing presentations to elementary school children in first through third grades to help raise awareness and reduce the spread of infection in the local community, particularly during the cold and flu season.

"Kids like to share everything, including germs," said Hernandez. "If we can teach them early about the importance of handwashing, it will have a big impact."

The 30-minute presentation teaches children about germs and

how they are spread. Hernandez uses two books to cover the material: "The Germ Busters" by Rosemary Wells and "Those Mean Nasty Dirty Downright Disgusting But Invisible Germs" by Judith Rice.

"We review the books and talk about germs," she said. "I explain how germs are spread, which is mainly by touching things and sneezing and coughing without covering your mouth."

Hernandez teaches them how to cough and sneeze into the crook of their arms or in a tissue that is then thrown away. She explains how washing your hands can get rid of the germs.

"I show them how to wash their hands properly, making sure they get the palms, in between their fingers, and the backs of their hands," she added. "I stress how important it is to clean around the fingertips and fingernails, because a lot of germs can hide under the nails."

Proper handwashing includes wetting your hands with warm water, applying soap, and rubbing your hands together vigorously for at least 15 seconds. Then rinse hands under running water.

"I have them sing their ABCs twice so they scrub long enough," Hernandez said.

She also urges the school children to keep their hands out of their mouths. "These kids are at the age when they're losing teeth, and they love to wiggle their lose tooth with their fingers," Hernandez said. "But I remind them they are actually inviting germs into their bodies – germs that keep you sick in bed all day instead of out having fun."

Cold and Flu Season

Good hand hygiene is particularly important during cold

and flu season, when so many people around you may be sick. "The cold and flu season is here and washing your hands frequently can help you stay healthy," Dr. Chawla added. "You can also use alcohol-based hand sanitizers when it's not possible to wash your hands with soap and water."

Washington Hospital Celebrates 60 Years of Serving the Community



Sixty years ago this month, on November 24, 1958, the first patients were admitted to the newly constructed Washington Hospital, a district hospital, funded and supported by the residents of the local community.

Within three hours, the Hospital's staff welcomed its first newborn. And the demand and support for the Hospital's services have continued unabated to this day. Earlier this month, the Hospital opened its most recent addition, the Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion, a three-story, 224,800 square-foot medical facility that houses an expanded Emergency Department, Critical Care and Intensive Care Units as well as oncology, telemetry and intermediate care medical/surgical units.

It's been quite a journey since 1958, when nine doctors served a population of less than 20,000 residents in the Tri-City Area, also known as Washington Township, an area that now includes Fremont, Newark, Union City, unincorporated Sunol and the southernmost portion of Hayward. Today, nearly 600 physicians serve a much

larger community of approximately 350,000 residents.

It took 10 years of fundraising, gaining governmental approvals, and construction to provide local residents the Hospital that serves the community today with award-winning medical services and community health programs.

The discussion of building a local hospital began in 1946 as residents voiced concern about the fact the nearest hospitals were 20 miles north in Oakland, or 20 miles south in San Jose, both only accessible by two-lane country roads. The final impetus that year was when the Silva Maternity Home, located in Niles, closed its doors, ending any locally based medical care.

Organizers proposed a 50-bed hospital. They hoped two-thirds of the cost would be borne by state and federal funding and the remaining third would be financed by a local property tax.

When the prospect of government funding faded, the community didn't give up but voted, on November 4, 1952, to pass a \$1.25 million bond issue to make

up the shortfall. A 10-acre cauliflower field on Santos Road (now Mowry Ave.) was purchased from the Stivers family and construction began the following year.

However, even before they could break ground on the new hospital, community leaders realized that a 50-bed hospital could not meet the medical needs of the rapidly growing population. So, in 1956, residents approved another \$1.5 million bond issue to fund the hospital's expansion to a 150-bed hospital.

"The residents of this community, time and time again, have stepped forward to assist with the funding of the very best in medical care here in the Tri-City Area," said Washington Hospital Chief Executive Officer, Nancy Farber. "Construction of the Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion has been made possible by the strong backing of residents of our community who believe in and support a hospital whose primary mission is to serve the health care needs of their local community."

Farber added: "A key element in the Hospital's success all these years has been the dedication of our volunteers."

The Washington Hospital Service League was formed three years before the Hospital opened its doors. One of their first projects was the opening of the Cheery Budget Shop. This secondhand shop in Irvington realized profits of \$13,000 (equivalent to \$113,000 today) by the time the Hospital opened its doors.

Today more than 530 volunteers, including students and spiritual care volunteers, currently donate time to Washington Hospital. In 2017, there were 35,462 hours logged and volunteers averaged 2,500 hours each month in supporting the Hospital and its patients. Additionally, Service League volunteers have raised and donated more than \$2.4 million for various Hospital needs and more than \$300,000 in student scholarships for those pursuing careers in health care.

Farber further noted, "As we celebrate our 60th anniversary, we continue to thank our founders for their vision and hard work to follow their dream and build a local, community-focused Hospital intent on providing the highest quality care based on our Patient First Ethic."

traditionally ends the Chinese New Year period and marks the first full moon in the Chinese calendar and the return of spring. This Buddhist custom gradually became a grand celebration for the Chinese people and inspiration for the Lantern Light Festival.

Visitors to the festival will have an opportunity to try their hand at building a lantern to give them a taste of the skill involved in their construction. It takes teams of seven artisans around four weeks to complete the works of art made from hundreds of pieces of silky cloth.

As well as a chance to see gigantic Chinese lanterns, the festival promises fun for the whole family. There will be children's activities including face-painting, live music and performances, fireworks, Chinese acrobats, mini golf, a miniature train, and mining for emeralds. Souvenirs and a range of authentic Chinese and American food will also be available to purchase.


If you enjoy an evening full of festive lights and amazing sights, bring your family to the Lantern Light Festival, a rare

The long-awaited Olive Hyde Art Guild signature community event, "Holiday for the Arts" Gala, Show and Sale, is finally here! We invite you to come and explore a wealth of artistic, handmade objects over the first weekend of December. Celebrating its 36th anniversary, Holiday for the Arts offers beautiful and unique gift items created by local artisans. Every year, we sell about \$25,000 worth of high-quality artifacts, with proceeds benefitting the Olive Hyde Art Gallery and in support of visual arts programs in Fremont's schools and community.

As the number of participants continue to grow, we anticipate a much larger inventory this year from over 100 artists with a diverse array of creative items including ceramics, glass sculptures, paintings, photography, cards, jewelry, fiber arts, gourds, wood articles, holiday décor, and much more. In addition to our all-time favorites such as Kay Hille-Hatten, Akio Aochi, Denise Oyama Miller, Mary Bobik, and Adrian Dedic, there are almost 40 artists who are first time participants.

The show will open with a ticketed Gala on Friday, November 30 featuring live music by guitarist and singer-songwriter Michael Deneau. Attendees will enjoy wine and hors d'oeuvres alongside first viewing and sale of art. They will also have a chance to win an original art piece



donated by our featured artist, Jennifer Wool, who started making pots at the age of 20. A casual class in basketry got her interested in basket making and she started combining weaving with pottery. Her pieces are unique in that they incorporate baskets, pottery, gourds, and found objects such as driftwood and sticks.

The show remains open to the public, free of charge, on Saturday, December 1 and Sunday, December 2 with musical entertainment each afternoon.

Peter Denyer, Lucy Lanham, and vocalist Mark Loy of Classical Guitar & Vocal Ensemble will be performing from 1:30 p.m. –3:00 p.m. on Saturday, while Alicia Unis, Joyce Tanaka, Roberta Brokaw, and Sue Rudholm of Flute Fantasia will be playing from 2:00 p.m. – 3:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Among this year's participants is returning artist Cindy Couling whose whimsical and colorful style is expressed through celestial themes. Couling likes a lot of movement and patterns rendering her work very busy; "it's like my brain, cluttered with thoughts and ideas just trying to get out," she says. In stark contrast are Ted Nogi's creations, Nogi preferring clarity of design and form, and "strives for simplicity." After retiring from 40 years of mechanical engineering, Nogi is now focused primarily on pottery. Growing up in Japan with its long history of ceramics, has had a strong influence on his work.

Also from Japan, Chieko Shimizu combines abstract paintings with glass mosaic to make "Abstract Glass Mosaics,"

using shattered tempered glass. As light reflects from the cracked glass, it results in a unique depth and movement inside her pieces. Nancy Hom started working with glass after an introductory class in stained glass. She uses the techniques of sandblasting, fusing, slumping, and casting to bring out the beauty of the material. Yet another artist, new to the show, Mary Strack uses glass to create nightlights. She is a retired kindergarten teacher who has been exposed to art all her life and enjoys creating. She is "delighted with the transformations that occur inside the kiln."

Creative from the start, Claudia Gray loves to "take something, or a place, re-work it and make it beautiful." She will be displaying her jewelry and eco-friendly glass art at the show. Gray cares deeply about the environment and enjoys making art from recycled materials. Rajni Kavula, a yoga teacher and a healer with a degree in fine arts, believes in sustainable living. She owns a small line of hand-dyed apparel and fiber jewelry made from locally sourced textiles and fibers, created one piece at a time.

Find exquisite, memorable gifts or a personal treasure at a reasonable price. Combining her writing and painting skills to create picture books for children, Julia Cline has been attached to flora and fauna from an early age. Her work is fueled by her love of the outdoors and the beings that enrich her life, "be they feline, canine, human, domesticated or completely wild." Likewise, Meghana Mitragotri, a watercolor artist, also draws inspiration from flowers and birds. Not very fond of symmetry, her compositions are mostly fluid as she believes that "without it, nature is perfect."

Nature clearly provides inspiration for many artists. Yvonne Undeen loves the feeling of lying under a tree, gazing up into its branches, feeling both "restful and energized." She uses the organic forms of the gourds combined with color and rhythm to bring the peaceful, joyful spirit of trees to the viewer. One of our youngest participants, Mansi Khare, is a freshman in high school and a long-time member of the local 4-H club. Passionate about arts and crafts, she especially enjoys paper quilling, the art of creating decorative designs from thin coils of paper. Her entries have won several awards at the Alameda County Fair.

Reckless development

The city and Mission Clay filed a mitigated negative declaration to remediate 87 acres, 40 net acres in Niles Canyon. The former industrial site has hydrocarbon contamination requiring excavation of 150,000 cubic yards, and 2,700 truckloads to haul 20,000 cubic yards of the dirt. The zoning in the General Plan designates the area as Open Space-Hill Face and Open Space-Hillside, from two to nine units per net acre. As such, dozens of single-family luxury estates could be built. [https://www.fremont.gov/DocumentCenter/View/4665/02-Land-Use?bidId=]

The development will be half a mile from the older single-family homes on Stenhammer Drive. Access is limited, and the road is in the flood zone of a steep canyon. Recent devastating fires in the city of Paradise and in Ventura County have drawn attention to the dangers of virulent urbanization:

"Fire experts use the term [wildland] urban interface, or WUI, to refer to the area where human building meets or intermingles with undeveloped

natural land. . .'In these places, it's not if a fire is going to happen, it's when it's going to happen. . . We're basically building structures right in the path of firestorms. There's just some places a subdivison shouldn't be built.' [www.sacbee.com/news/state/california/fires/article-221385910.html (November 10, 2018)]

The Deputy Chief of the Fremont Fire Dept has warned of the risk: "...a "'raging wildfire' in Fremont's Niles Canyon would cause citizens to evacuate 'north of the canyon and on the south side of the canyon...through Niles Canyon, there is some danger there. There is potential there." While rampant development is a rallying cry in Fremont politics, Niles Canyon poses the far-worse danger of "reckless development." City planners should defer to the Fire Department and put the brakes on development in the wildland-urban interface.

New program focuses on math education for children

Low-income children in historically marginalized communities enter kindergarten as much as 20 months behind their more privileged peers when it comes to math skills and early STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education. The gap widens as the young students get older, making it less likely that they will master fractions, algebra and the higher math skills needed to succeed in college and enter well-paid, science-based professions including IT, engineering and life sciences.

This fall, funded by a \$1 million Excellence in Early STEM Education endowment from the Malavalli Family Foundation, Cal State East Bay in Hayward is leading a pilot effort seeking to break through this longstanding problem by working with the most powerful educators of children under 5 — their families. This is the first step in an ambitious family outreach campaign.


"Research shows that good math skills in kindergarten are as important a predictor of academic success — in all subjects — as literacy," said Cal State East Bay President Leroy M. Morishita. Yet we have not developed an infrastructure to bring all students the skills and confidence they need. Thanks to this endowment from the Malavalli family, we are about to launch a pilot program to help local parents make math fun, frequent and fascinating for their preschool-aged children."

The Malavalli family math project will launch at the Helen Turner Childhood Development Center in a low-income neighborhood in Hayward. Through the Institute for STEM Education, Cal State East Bay early math experts and volunteers will engage families, in English and Spanish, in activities such as measuring and counting, with games, books and other materials to take home.



The Bay Area Urban Manufacturing Initiative, a coalition of 30 cities working together to make sure manufacturing is recognized and supported as a pathway to middle class jobs. Financial restructure prompts museum sale

Officials from the Hayward Area Historical Society recently said the group is putting up for sale its Museum of History and Culture building on Foothill Boulevard as part of a financial and operational restructuring of the organization.

The Historical Society purchased its 50,000 square foot home at 22380 Foothill Blvd. in a foreclosure sale for \$1.87 million in 2010 and moved in four years later following an extensive - and still incomplete - \$5 million renovation project. Today, however, the cost of those renovations combined with the expense of operating the facility have proven far greater than originally expected. This situation threatens the solvency of the Historical Society and its ability to continue to fulfill its

important civic, cultural and educational mission.

"Now more than ever, communities need to understand their past to put the present in perspective and to chart a course forward," said Historical Society President Richard Patenaude.
"The Hayward Area Historical Society has been dedicated to preserving and interpreting our community history for more than 60 years, and the action we are taking today is essential for us to be able to continue to so for the next 60 years."

The Historical Society Board of Directors voted unanimously to sell the property in June. It took the action after accepting the resignation of former Executive Director AT Stephens in March and appointing Curator and Archivist Diane Curry as interim executive director. Curry said that in addition to shedding its property, the Historical Society is going to need to

operate as a smaller organization on a smaller budget to survive potentially in a smaller space in its Foothill Boulevard building, once sold to a new owner, or elsewhere in one or more locations.

"The main priority of the Board of Directors and staff is to maintain and protect the collection of artifacts and documents entrusted to us over the years, and to continue serving our community," Curry said. "Collection items will not be sold to cover any financial deficits."

During the transition, she said the Historical Society will continue to operate and provide access to its galleries and historical resources.

Highlights of its collections include Oakland Tribune clipping files from 1922 to 1996, Hayward Daily Review clippings from roughly 1956 to 2000, former Congressman Pete Stark's papers from 1973 to 2012, San Lorenzo Pioneer Cemetery

records, select local government documents, more than 20,000 Hayward area photos and thousands of additional artifacts illustrating the story of the area.

Curry said the Historical Society also will continue to operate the McConaghy House and Meek Mansion for the Hayward Area Recreation District, and San Lorenzo Pioneer Cemetery for Alameda County. It also will continue to serve as fiscal sponsor for local arts and cultural organizations receiving grants from the City of Hayward.

Audit cites poor decision-making for California bullet train

State auditors say flawed decision-making and poor contract management contributed to billions of dollars in cost overruns and delays in building California's bullet train between Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The audit released Thursday faults the High-Speed Rail Authority for starting limited construction in 2013 before it completed critical planning. That led to numerous contract changes, project delays and cost overruns in what is now projected to be a \$77 billion project.

It cites more than \$2 billion in contract changes in three active Central Valley projects, and delays that pushed back completion estimates from this year to 2022.

The board says it accepts auditors' recommendations.

The audit comes as Gov. Jerry Brown, a staunch supporter, prepares to give way to governor-elect Gavin Newsom, who has expressed mixed emotions.

Facebook says it's getting better at removing hate speech

Facebook said it's making progress on detecting hate speech, graphic violence and other violations of its rules, even before users see and report them.

Facebook said that during the April-to-September period, it doubled the amount of hate speech it detected proactively, compared with the previous

The findings were spelled out Thursday in Facebook's second report on enforcing community standards. The reports come as Facebook grapples with challenge after challenge, ranging from fake news to Facebook's role in elections interference, hate speech and incitement to violence in the U.S., Myanmar, India and elsewhere.

The company also said it disabled more than 1.5 billion fake accounts in the latest six-month period, compared with 1.3 billion during the previous six months. Facebook said most of the fake accounts it found were financially motivated, rather than aimed at misinformation. The company has nearly

Facebook's report comes a day after The New York Times published an extensive report on how Facebook deals with crisis after crisis over the past two years. The Times described Facebook's strategy as "delay, deny and deflect."

Facebook said Thursday it has cut times with a Washington public relations firm, Definers, which the Times said Facebook hired to discredit opponents. Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg said during a call with reporters that he learned about the company's relationship with Definers only when he read the Times report.

On community guidelines, Facebook also released metrics on issues such as child nudity and sexual exploitation, terrorist propaganda, bullying and spam. While it is publishing how many violations it is catching, the company said it can't always reliably measure how prevalent these things are on Facebook overall. For instance, while Facebook took action on 2 million instances of bullying in the July-September period, this does not mean there were only 2 million instances of bullying during this time.

Apple signs multiyear deal with film studio A24

Apple has signed a multiyear film production deal with A24, the acclaimed New York-based studio behind "Moonlight" and "Lady Bird."

People close to the deal who requested anonymity because they weren't authorized to comment confirmed the agreement Thursday.

Apple is investing in scripted content with the intention of competing with the likes of Netflix and Amazon. The deal connects Apple with one of the most respected makers of prestige and arthouse titles in film.

Neither Apple nor A24 commented Thursday. Unclear is how many films the deal includes, or if the movies will be released theatrically.

A24 was previously rumored to potentially be an acquisition target for Apple. This deal leaves the distributor of films like "The Witch," "Mid90s," "Hereditary" and "Eighth Grade" with its independence.

Is your home ready for Guests?

My husband and I recently returned from a long-awaited vacation to New Zealand to celebrate our 30-year wedding anniversary (yes—the scenery really is as spectacular as you imagine!) We stayed in four different hotels over the 12 days, and the designer in me couldn't help but notice not only the room decor, but also the amenities provided to make us feel comfortable. Many of you will be hosting guests over the upcoming holiday season, and there also may even be some of you offering rooms in your home as Airbnbs. In this column, I thought I'd share some observations and ideas to prepare your home for guests. And I've provided a few shopping links below as well.

At the bedside

USB outlets on the nightstands. A really nice touch is to provide a charging station for cell phones and tablets. In one of our hotel rooms we had a small USB powerstrip right on the nightstand so we could have our phones nearby. As an alternative, check out the table lamps that have USB ports built into the lamp base. This is a great idea, and one I've used in many bedroom design projects.

Water. Such a simple thing, but it was so nice to have a water bottle and a glass on each bedside table. It's effortless for you, but a very welcome touch for your guests.


Reading lights. This can be in the form of table lamps or wall mounted lights. In many homes I go to, there is a ceiling light in the bedroom, but no table lamps. Your guests will thank you for providing additional lighting!

In the bathroom

Inevitably, guests forget one or two toiletry items, so, besides the obvious shampoo and soap, it's nice to keep a basket or drawer in the bathroom for cotton balls, makeup remover, toothpaste, hand lotion. You might also consider a hairdryer, sunscreen, shaving cream, a few bandaids, a nail file. Guests can sometimes feel shy about asking, so think ahead about things your guests might need.









For the suitcase

Provide a bench at the end of the bed or a luggage rack for suitcases; living out of a suitcase can be uncomfortable enough, but having it on the floor and tripping over it makes it tougher. Also, make sure there are several hangers in the closet, and, ideally, a drawer or two, so guests can unpack some of their things and feel more comfortable.

Other comforts

One hotel provided robes and slippers to us. So nice!

Another hotel included an extra blanket in the closet so we didn't have to call down to the front desk.

A small thing, but I love when hotels provide a plastic bag for dirty laundry.

Offer a basket of snacks, an electric tea kettle and some tea bags, or a Keurig coffee maker, so guests can help themselves.

Of course, a comfortable bed is key! Nice linens, good quality pillows, and a pretty presentation will make for very happy guests.








multitude of ballet companies during the holiday season, including Hayward's Ballet Petit. In fact, it is the longest running "Nutcracker" show in the East Bay.

Peggy Peabody (or Miss Peggy, as she is known to everyone), Ballet Petit's Artistic Director, explained, "One thing that makes 'The Nutcracker' such a phenomenon in this country is the way dancers sort of grow up in the production. The same is true here at Ballet Petit. I love to just sit back some days and watch my staff teach or rehearse their dancers." Many of those students have themselves become BP teachers. Peabody reminisced, "It is amazing to me to look at old photos and recall that, for example, in 1984, Miss Nicole was once a very shy, little gray mouse in our show. [Years later], she was a Clara. Much later, she rounded out her performing years here as a lovely and elegant Sugar Plum Fairy. We have priceless photos of these moments in our school's lobby. [Today], she is teaching dancers how to elongate their lines, use their feet properly in pointe shoes, extend their legs higher and higher. Yet, in 1984, she was a shy little mouse. This is true for several of our staff.'

Miss Peggy takes pride in keeping in touch with many of her past and current students. Every year or two, she tries to go to New York City for what she calls eight to twelve nights of "quiet time." But during her stay, not only does she take ballet classes, attend performances, and plan future ballet events, she also sets aside time to visit with former BP students. One former student

with whom she has spent time in recent years is Yael Shrager, who has danced "The Nutcracker" roles of Clara and Sugar Plum Fairy. Miss Peggy and Shrager have attended a performance of the American Ballet Theatre at Lincoln Center and caught up on one another's lives over post-performance bowls of pasta.

Shrager and her family emigrated from Israel when she was only eight years old. Soon she became one of Ballet Petit's promising young dancers and was a committed student through her high school graduation. Miss Peggy is thrilled that Shrager will be joining her old ballet classmates Lauren Juan, Corinda Martinez, and Nicole Butner on stage at this year's performance.

Butner has been a presence at Ballet Petit since 1985. She has taken on many "Nutcracker" roles, such as a Little Gray Mouse, Clara, and the Sugar Plum Fairy. After growing up dancing at Ballet Petit, Butner is now a teacher there. Keeping it all in the family and with an intent to pass on her love for ballet to her daughter, Butner plans to enroll her daughter in BP's Twinkle Toes class soon and is

become a part of their "Nutcracker" tradition.

There is excitement for Ballet Petit's 40th anniversary production by its dancers, their teachers, and their families. Grant to help boost services for the homeless

A \$5 million grant from the Day 1 Families Fund is on its way to Abode Services, a Fremont-based non-profit that's focused on ending homelessness in the region. The funding, announced November 20, will be used to help support the organization's efforts to provide housing, wraparound services, employment and financial counseling to homeless people in Alameda, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Mateo, and Napa counties.

Abode Services is one of the first organizations to receive an investment from the Day 1 Families Fund, created by Jeff and MacKenzie Bezos to support organizations addressing family homelessness.

"The solution is within our reach," said Louis Chicoine, executive director of Abode Services. "This grant moves Abode that much closer to accomplishing its goals: providing a home to everyone who doesn't have one, and ensuring that families in need remain in stable, safe housing."

Founded in 1989, the organization has become one of the Bay Area's most effective nonprofits in ending cycles of homelessness through the "Housing First" approach, emphasizing permanent housing as the foundation of life stability. Each year, Abode reaches more than 8,000 people — including veterans, families, and youth — from all different age groups and backgrounds.

Abode Services is one of 24 nonprofits across the country to receive the first Day 1 Families Fund grants, totaling \$97.5 million. Founded by Jeff and MacKenzie Bezos, the Bezos Day One Fund consists of two programs: the Day 1 Families Fund that provides grants to nonprofit organizations fighting homelessness, and the Day 1 Academies Fund that will fund and build a network of pre-schools in low-income communities across the country.

Fremont Launches Skip the Straw Campaign

The City of Fremont is launching an awareness campaign to help reduce single-use plastic waste in the community. With the 'Skip the Straw' campaign, the City is encouraging residents to say no to plastic straws when dining out. This will help reduce plastic pollution, preserve waterways and waste streams, and create a cleaner and healthier future for Fremont.

Every day, Americans use close to 500 million disposable plastic straws—that's enough straws to circle the Earth 2.5 times! Since most plastic straws cannot be recycled and take up to 200 years to decompose, it is clear that straw consumption patterns need to be reduced. Learn more about the environmental impacts of plastic straws at www.TheLastPlasticStraw.org.

For those finding it difficult to 'Skip the Straw', an easy solution is to keep a reusable straw with you. Options include straws made out of stainless steel, bamboo, hard plastic, or even glass. Alternatives like compostable paper straws are

also available but less preferable since they are manufactured and then discarded after one use.

To address the straw pollution problem on a statewide level, Governor Jerry Brown signed AB 1884, a California bill that prohibits sit-down restaurants from offering plastic straws except upon request. The law goes into effect January 2019, which makes California the first to restrict plastic straw consumption at a statewide level.

At a local level, the City of Fremont is initiating the 'Skip the Straw' awareness campaign as a first step in addressing the issue. The City understands that change is not easy, and the magnitude of the plastics problem can be discouraging. Changing personal behavior and habits may happen gradually, getting easier over time as more community members take on the same action.


Coach Penaflor's Comments:



Milpitas Council makes up its mind about Cannabis

That the meeting of the Council of the City of Milpitas November 20, 2018 was out of the ordinary is a huge understatement. The Council Chamber was packed to capacity, with an overflow audience occupying large portions of the first and second floors of City Hall. On the evening's agenda was a Public Hearing to consider ordinances regulating commercial cannabis.

California State Proposition 64 to legalize adult use of cannabis (marijuana) was approved by voters on November 9, 2016. On January 17, 2017, the Milpitas City Council adopted an Urgency Ordinance to place a temporary moratorium on certain cannabis-related activities, giving time to decide if cannabis activities would be allowed in the city. The temporary moratorium was subsequently extended, leading up to the aforementioned Council agenda item.

Over the past two years, there has been extensive dialogue on the topic of cannabis at the City Council, Cannabis Subcommittee and Planning Commission. Two facilitated community meetings were held as well as a public survey in June 2018, generating over 500 responses. In relation to the public hearing on November 20th, hundreds of e-mails were received from members of the public, including a community-initiated petition in opposition with over 5,000 signatures, In addition, over 100 speakers voiced their opinion at the council meeting.

Following hours of public testimony, Milpitas City Council directed City Staff to prepare regulations permanently banning all commercial cannabis activity

replacing the current temporary moratorium, set to expire January 17, 2019. The motion was approved unanimously 4-0, with one recusal by Councilmember

The proposed regulations, when drafted, will be vetted through the Planning Commission; a special meeting will be scheduled in early December. Subsequent to the Planning Commission's review, the City Council could consider proposed regulations at their December 18, 2018 and January 15, 2019 meeting(s).

Attendees of the Council November 20th meeting included children who were overwhelmingly against allowing commercial cannabis activities in Milpitas. They voiced their opinions verbally in addition to carrying placards with pointed messages aimed to influence the Council. However, a small minority of speakers also voiced their opinions in favor of allowing properly regulated commercial cannabis activities. It was not clear whether the opposition actually represented overwhelming negative view of all the residents of the City, or simply were really extremely well organized. Whatever may be the case, opponents clearly carried the day and were happy with the outcome.

Just prior to the vote, Mayor Tran addressed proponents and supporters of commercial cannabis in the City of Milpitas, and encouraged them to work toward a special election. He expressed his support for the freedom of citizens to decide what they wanted to do in the privacy of their homes.

The debate around commercial cannabis in the City of Milpitas may not be over.

Anyone who has watched or read murder mysteries can recite the mantra of detectives on the case: means, motive and opportunity. These are considered essential elements of a crime and powerful attributes to determine guilt or innocence in legal proceedings. While means (tools, weapons, etc.) and opportunity (chance to take action) can often be factually established, motive may not be obvious; at times nebulous and elusive. In some instances, motive is never fully revealed.

Just as in a courtroom, when a legal case is presented and either a jury or judge decides which arguments will prevail, we also have the option to evaluate the actions of those around us. In our personal lives - if we are the instigator - there may be little private doubt about these three elements although revealing them to others can be problematic. In some cases, even though we may initiate an action, our own motivation is not entirely understood. Whether a process or a desired outcome dominates, visible actions can be confusing to everyone.

When dealing with political matters, the means and opportunity through

operational structure is obvious.

Organizations, including government, generally create formal hierarchies of responsibility, power and prestige. Elected officialdom furthers this paradigm, enforcing the status of a small group entrusted to make decisions for a much larger population. However, motive can remain elusive when evaluating performance. Often name recognition and marketing is substituted for purpose and value. When elections are complete, it is intelligence, work and ethics that will hopefully be realized in future decisions.

As we enter new political terms of office for our local representatives, some names are familiar, others not so much. This may be the result of reelection for a job well done, new entrants or the consequence of musical chairs of career politicians. While professional politicians are necessary for political parties and ideologies to feed the supply chain of regional and national politics, there are many well-meaning folks who truly want to invest time and energy into their communities. However, some are simply addicted to the power and prestige of elected office and recycled year after year. They will not abandon the limelight even if not suited for leaps from one specialized position to another. One year they can be found on a city council, the next in a school district or special district... and so on. A few will grow into their new responsibilities while others may just exist, using the means of government and opportunity

of each election without a legitimate motive. We can all hope that the number of "career" politicians without a valid cause is low and the public will be well-served by its elected officials.

New ideas and approaches to complex problems facing our society and economy are welcome. Without the influx of a myriad of strategies and innovative tactics, governmental systems can stagnate and become corrupt. It will be interesting to see whether a new political season reflects an invigorated response to our dynamic Greater Tri-City area. Each new political year brings hope of renewal of purpose and an energized focus on major issues facing all of us. As members of councils, boards and districts are sworn into office within the next few weeks, the matrix of success is possible. The opportunity and means are in place, but do we have the right people with the right motives? Let's hope so.



Understanding spouses' benefits

Marriage is a cultural institution that exists all over the world. Having a partner means sharing many things including a home and other property. Understanding how your future retirement might affect your spouse is important. When you're planning for your fun and vibrant golden years, here are a few things to remember:

If a spouse accepts reduced retirement benefits before starting spouse's benefits (his or her spouse is younger), the spouse will not receive 50 percent of the worker's benefit amount.

Your full spouse's benefit could be up to 50 percent of your spouse's full retirement age amount if you are full retirement age when you take it. If you qualify for your own retirement benefit and a spouse's benefit, we always pay your own benefit first. (For example, you are eligible for \$400 from your own retirement

and \$150 as a spouse for a total of \$550.) The reduction rates for retirement and spouse's benefits are different. If your spouse is younger, you cannot receive benefits unless he or she is receiving benefits (except for divorced spouses). If you took your reduced retirement first while waiting for your spouse to reach retirement age, when you add spouse's benefits later, your own retirement portion remains reduced which causes the total retirement and spouses benefit together to total less than 50 percent of the worker's amount. You can find out more on at www.socialsecurity.gov/OACT/q uickcalc/spouse.html.

On the other hand, if your spouse's retirement benefit is higher than your retirement benefit, and he or she chooses to take reduced benefits and dies first, your survivor benefit will be reduced, but may be higher than what your spouse received.

If the deceased worker started receiving reduced retirement

benefits before their full retirement age, a special rule called the retirement insurance benefit limit may apply to the surviving spouse. The retirement insurance benefit limit is the maximum survivor benefit you may receive. Generally, the limit is the higher of:

- The reduced monthly retirement benefit to which the deceased spouse would have been entitled if they had lived, or
- 82.5 percent of the unreduced deceased spouse's monthly benefit if they had started receiving benefits at their full retirement age (rather than choosing to receive a reduced retirement benefit early).

Butterfly Programs at Ardenwood

As I've described in a previous column, large numbers of monarch butterflies usually spend the winter months in the eucalyptus groves at Ardenwood Historic Farm in Fremont, as part of their multi-generational migratory life cycle. So far this season only a few butterflies have been spotted, but it's possible that more are on their way. Please check the park district website at www.ebparks.org, or Facebook page, or call Ardenwood at 510-544-2797, for up-to-date information.

Coyote Hills Regional Park has butterfly programs, too.
Naturalist Francis Mendoza will lead a butterfly program there from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Sunday, December 2, for ages eight and older. The group will start in the park's nectar garden, then take a moderate, 2½-mile walk in search of monarch, cabbage white and common buckeye butterflies, among other kinds. Heavy rain cancels the program.

Francis also plans a program about the Ohlone people and their culture, from 1:30 p.m. to 3 p.m. on Sundays, December 2 and 16, for ages eight and older. He'll discuss the Ohlones' intimate relationship with nature, family and ancestors, and their values of generosity and fairness. Meet at the visitor center.

Patrol officers investigate suicide

Wednesday, November 21, 2018, at 11:43 p.m., Fremont dispatchers began receiving 911 calls reporting a shooting at the Saddle Rack (42000 block of Boscell Rd). Upon the initial report, multiple patrol units immediately responded. As officers drove toward the scene, updated information from security indicated the shooting was a suicide in the south parking lot.

The first officer to arrive located a male suffering from a gunshot wound being treated by security. A handgun, later confirmed to be registered to the male, was nearby. The patrol officer immediately started CPR and field trauma care was provided until Fremont Fire arrived. The male was sadly pronounced deceased at the scene.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene, this is being investigated as a suicide. The male is in his 30's and the Alameda County Coroner will handle releasing the decedents name when determined appropriate.

The popular night club was very crowded, with estimated attendance in the hundreds, at the time of the incident. Many patrons fled to nearby businesses upon learning of the shooting and the night club shut down as a result. The 911 calls with detailed information helped our officers to very quickly determine this was an isolated incident in the parking lot. There were no other injuries reported.



A tale of two choirs

Lynée Anderson, hearing aid specialist, was in her new home in Fremont for just one week to take up a new position in the East Bay. She and her daughter Alyssa had come from Reno and were feeling like strangers in a strange place. To try and dispel that feeling of loneliness they went to a familiar place, Starbucks, and ordered two familiar coffees.

That first get-together was nerve-wracking for Ash Walker, the new choir's director. He had no idea what to expect. At 6:30 p.m., no one was there. At 6:50 p.m., eight people. At 7:00 p.m., wonder of wonders, there were 72 singers. "I couldn't believe it," Walker said. "So many eager faces ready to get started. Now three months later, some have dropped out, but we have a full choir of 50 people."

While waiting for their gourmet iced mochas, they picked up a Tri-City Voice and read an article about a new choir coming to the area. Ah, they thought, the very thing. They both love to sing; Alyssa being the more practiced singer. They counted down the days when the rehearsals would start. And when they attended that first night, it turned out to be magical. "Everyone was so warm and friendly," said Anderson. "People opened their minds and hearts to us. We knew we had found a welcoming community in this new place."

The community the Andersons joined on September 4, 2018 was the East Bay People's Choir, a new concept in group singing for the Bay Area. It welcomes members of all ages, cultures, and singing abilities. There are no fees or auditions; no need to read music.

He is thrilled with the sound the chorus has managed to achieve so quickly. At the beginning, he felt the sound was raw with the group getting to know each other and the conductor. But now, the words he uses to characterize the personality of the People's Choir are: warm, passionate, eager, excited, interested in getting it right. There's also, he said, a real sense of community. "The group is listening to each other, talking to each other and enjoying being together. It's great."

The choirmaster himself is a charismatic phenomenon. He plays the drums, the piano, sings beautifully with all his heart and soul, directs the ensemble with hand motions to keep everyone on track and makes the rehearsals so much fun. "Ash Walker is fabulous," affirmed Fremont's Sandra Edwards, a soprano. "He leads with such passion and joy."

She believes he's breaking down the myth that you have to have great talent to sing. And she loves the diversity in all things. "There's diversity in age, cultural background, there are people with disabilities. The choir is open to everyone who loves music. Even the music is diverse. We're learning African, Australian, Bob Dylan songs. It's all so warm and embracing."

The East Bay People's Choir is affiliated with the well-known and seasoned Mission Peak Chamber Singers (MPCS). They are sister choirs, and in concerts, they will sing some pieces together. The whole ensemble numbers some 100 members.

Ofer dal Lal is the artistic director of the Mission Peak Chamber Singers and champion of the People's Choir. He took the lead in bringing the new choir to the East Bay and is surprised and delighted with the results. "I'm blown away by the fact that the new choir is an overnight success. I'm impressed with how fast Ash has managed to take singers with little or no experience and make them ready for a first performance."

The difference in the two choirs has to do with repertoire. MPCS sings more complex pieces that require some musical background, while the People's Choir takes on simpler pieces learned by rote. According to Walker and dal Lal, both choirs do what they're good at and shine in their own ways.

The two choirs will perform in a Christmas concert, "Out with the Old, In with the New," on Saturday, December 1 and Sunday, December 2 at Old Mission San Jose. "At this time of year," said dal Lal, "people let go of old habits and make new resolutions. And we've translated that into compelling music." There will be many spiritual pieces and, of course, a chance for the audience to sing along.

"Both choirs," concluded dal Lal, "bring something new and wonderful to the East Bay. Come and enjoy some beautiful music to celebrate the holiday season."


