
KW21222 celebrates family, community, and culture

Kwanzaa is an African American celebration that embraces African American heritage and a strong sense of human values. It is not a religious holiday, nor does it replace Christmas. The word "Kwanzaa" means "first fruit of the harvest" in Swahili. Swahili is used because it is one of the easiest languages spoken in West Africa for English speakers to learn. West Africa was chosen because it is where slaves were taken from.

Kwanzaa was created by Dr. Karenga of California State University in Long Beach in 1965

Find Your Joy with a Fresh Approach to Life and Health

Joy can be like a bubbling underground spring that wells up within us, but joy also can be an attitude, a choice. Like a muscle, joy needs to be exercised to remain vibrant and healthy.

"Life can be stressful for many of us," says Victoria Leiphart, MD, a gynecologist with Washington Township Medical Foundation who frequently gives lectures on inspirational topics. "Our lives aren't necessarily the idyllic images we see in a Norman Rockwell painting or a Hallmark movie. It's not unusual for people to feel 'let down' due to big changes in their lives such as the loss of a loved one, a job change or a divorce."

In addition to the complicated emotions arising from major life changes, Dr. Leiphart notes that financial stress, political turmoil or poor health can sometimes take the joy out of your everyday life.

So what steps can you take to find and exercise your sense of joy? Sometimes, finding joy can be as simple as wearing clothes that make you feel happy and comfortable.

"No one else should be judging what you're wearing, whether it's the style or fit or color," she insists. "Women, in particular, get messages as to what is acceptable for us to wear, including our shoes. It's hard to be joyful when you're walking around in uncomfortable clothing or shoes!"

Dr. Leiphart also encourages people to focus on spending time with friends and family who bring out the best in you. "Of course, there are occasions when you may have to spend time with people whom you may find difficult," she admits. "In those cases, try to find areas of agreement or seek out distractions that will bring harmony such as participating in an outdoor event, going through family photos or discussing recent noncontroversial books you have read."

To minimize financial stress, Dr. Leiphart suggests being mindful about your spending habits and focusing on things in life that bring you inner joy, rather than on material objects.

"Pick and choose the things in life that truly are important to you, such as family and friends. Recognize that having more 'stuff' does not really give you true happiness,"

Dr. Leiphart says. "Practice gratitude for what you already have – another sweater or bottle of perfume is not the key to your joy. Try to manage your finances wisely by avoiding the temptation to go shopping at the mall for the latest sale. Instead of spending more money than you should, create new memorable experiences with friends and family by going on a hike, playing a game or attending a free concert. The Bay Area offers a multitude of beautiful locations and free entertainment choices for people of all ages and recreational

If you find yourself becoming overwhelmed by stress from financial concerns, issues at work or family pressures, Dr. Leiphart suggests taking time out for yourself.

"Take a walk in the woods, put together that jigsaw puzzle you got as a holiday gift, or curl up with a good book—anything that gives you joy," she says. "You also should be sure to get enough sleep. Otherwise you can end up physically exhausted, as well as financially and psychologically stressed."

Struggles with food or alcohol also can interfere with maintaining your health and a joyful mood. "Be picky about where you get your calories," Dr. Leiphart advises. "Alcoholic beverages are loaded with empty calories from sugar, and alcohol is known to be a mood depressant. Also, don't eat mindlessly. Healthier foods, such

as fruits and vegetables, are generally lower in calories and saturated fats than heavy meals consisting of red meat, potatoes and gravy. That doesn't mean you can't have an occasional food 'treat,' but the key word here is occasional. Savor those treats that you get only once in awhile, eating them slowly and enjoying each bite. If you are at a social gathering and other people urge you to eat or drink more than you want, just say, 'No, thank you. I've had enough. If I want more, I'll get more later.' No one should make you feel guilty for not consuming more than you want to eat or drink."

Throughout the year (even in winter months) Dr. Leiphart recommends getting plenty of exercise to maintain your physical

and mental health. "Just because it's colder outside doesn't mean you should slack off on exercise," she emphasizes. Going outside and taking a walk through the trees will improve your mood as well as your health. If the weather is really too awful to be outdoors, you may find that exercising at a local inexpensive recreation center with friends or neighbors can contribute to your health and inner joy.

"It all boils down to the basic notion of picking and choosing the lifestyle and activities that are important to you, that give you a sense of joy," she adds. "Find what makes you joyful, and make those things part of a fresh start in life as you step joyfully into the coming year.



Whether it's being outside or listening to a favorite song, joy can be cultivated in many ways.





spark interest in local Ice Age artifacts

Everyone talks about climate change, but few understand how scientists develop evidence. Paleontology plays an important part in understanding the story of how organisms live and die over time. Fossils in the San Francisco Bay area reveal a complex change from marine conditions to land as the California coastline started to emerge. The interaction of land and water allows paleontologists to look at these climate changes over time.

In the Fremont area, Ice Age Fossils reveal a megafauna that roamed and lived in the area. The Irvingtonian time (mid Pleistocene of ,24-1,8 million years ago) showed a warm and wet time, with lush vegetation to support the mammoths, mastodons, sabertooth cats, camels, horses, sloths, short faced bear, pronghorn antelopes, and more.

The City of Fremont and Math Science Nucleus have been working over the last 15 years to preserve the area where they were excavated (area between Osgood and Mission area along Sabercat Historical Park), The City has done extensive environmental restoration of the creek and trail while the Math Science Nucleus with the help of the Gordon Family have preserved the fossils at the Children's Natural History Museum. A bold new plan to

School conversion project extended one year

At its December 12 meeting the Fremont Unified School District (FUSD) Board of Trustees voted to extend the timetable for the conversion of Horner Middle School by one year to the fall of 2020. The remaining schedule for the conversion of the other four FUSD junior high schools to middle schools is unchanged.

"We believe this proactive decision by the Board at this time is in the best interest of students and their families as they can adequately plan for the schools they will attend next year," said Dr. Kim Wallace, Superintendent. "It also benefits teachers and staff as we plan for the shifts in personnel necessary to support the middle school conversion."

During the meeting, board members received a presentation on the status of the new construction and modernization project at Horner Middle School, which is located on Chapel Way in the Irvington district. Despite a sixth-month setback in starting the project due to delayed approval from the Division of the State Architect, Phase 1 of construction is on track to be completed by next fall but the compressed schedule meant that any unforeseen delays could have caused disruptions to the opening of Horner.

The district has mitigation strategies in place to deal with common delays, such as a set number of rain days. However, the unpredictable delays resulting from extended bad weather, shortages of raw materials and labor from natural disasters, delays in utility connections and a highly competitive construction market increase that risk. Board members cited optimized student safety, the number of other construction projects, and ample time remaining to inform parents and adjust staffing needs accordingly as reasons to modify the Horner conversion timetable now.

Construction is continuing but with a less aggressive schedule. The alternate plan will allow for some project costs to be credited back to the school district, the substantial completion of all core facilities and a safer transition because construction will be minimized around the student population.

East Bay Chinese community raises funds for fire victims

Greater Shanghai Alliance, a non-profit organization devoted to promoting culture exchange between China and the United States along with JD McCallum Inc. and the International Culture Exchange Alliance, recently organized a fundraising dinner and charity show to help with the rebuilding of Paradise, California after the deadly Camp Fire. The song's lyrics asked the community to take action in preventing future fires. "Will we change our ways," Long wrote, "Or remain

the same and let it all burn up in flames?" Other local officials attending the event included Sarabjit Cheema, the New Haven Unified School District Board of Education President and Board Members of Trustees for Ohlone Community College District. Entertainment during the program included a Kung Fu show, dance performances, Sichuan Opera, Peking Opera, and traditional cheongsam show.



Recycled Material Standards

Recycling provides raw materials to manufacture new products that are consumed every day. Paper, plastic bottles, jars, and metal cans placed in recycling bins are sorted and shipped to manufacturers in the U.S. and around the world. But the task of washing recyclable material is up to each household and business rather than a local recycling center. Only clean recyclables meet strict new standards and have a chance to be used to create new products.

What can you do to help sustain a healthy recycling system in your community?

Keep items clean and dry. Materials soiled by liquids or food are not acceptable for making new products. Because recyclables are mixed into one bin, it's important for cans and food containers to be rinsed and free of residue in order to keep the paper products clean. Any remaining food on containers can become moldy and rancid, creating an unhealthy environment for the recycling workers who handle the materials. Items that are not rinsed cannot be recycled.

Recyclables should be placed loose in household recycling carts – neither bagged materials nor plastic bags of any type belong in the carts. Bags of recycling must be

opened by hand and often appear to be bags of garbage to the recycling workers, increasing the chance that they could end up in the landfill. Also, torn or loose bags get tangled in the equipment at the recycling facility, creating maintenance delays that slow the process and make recycling more expensive. Plastic bags can generally be returned to the grocery store for recycling. Oregon and California crabbers sue fossil fuel companies

Commercial crabbers in Oregon and California are suing 30 fossil fuel companies, claiming they are to blame for climate change, which has hurt their industry.

The Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations filed the lawsuit last week in California State Superior Court in San Francisco against companies including Chevron and Exxon Mobil, news outlets reported.

"The scientific linkage between the combustion of fossil fuels and ocean warming, which leads to domoic acid impacts in our fisheries, is clear," Noah Oppenheim, executive director of the Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations, told the San Francisco Chronicle. "We know it, and it's time to hold that industry accountable for the damage they've caused."

West Coast crabbers experienced significant losses starting in the 2015-16 season when massive algal blooms caused by warm ocean temperatures resulted in a domoic acid outbreak that reduced the length of the crabbing season.

The season was cut short again in 2016-2017 for the same reason.

In California, Dungeness crab brought in over \$47 million in 2017 and \$83 million in 2016; the amount was down to \$17 million in 2015, during the industry's first major problem with domoic acid.

Crab is the most valuable single species commercial fishery in Oregon, with an average harvest of 16 million pounds per season, the Statesman Journal in Salem, Oregon, reported.

There are nearly 1,000 Dungeness crab permit holders in California and Oregon.

Scott J. Silvestri, corporate media relations manager of Exxon Mobil Corp., said in an email to the Chronicle that reducing greenhouse gas emissions is a global issue and requires global participation and actions.

"Lawsuits like this – filed by trial attorneys against an industry that provides products we all rely upon to power the economy and enable our domestic life – simply do not do that," he said.

In California, the cities of San Francisco and Oakland also filed lawsuits against five oil companies earlier this year, seeking to recoup the cost of paying for seawalls to fend off sea-level rise. A federal judge tossed those lawsuits in June, saying courts couldn't decide who should be held accountable for an issue as big as climate change.

In October, the Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations successfully sued the U.S. Environmental Protection Association to protect salmon and steelhead trout populations in the Columbia River basin from warm water temperatures caused by dams and climate change.

Antora Energy selected for Shell GameChanger Cleantech Accelerator

Antora Energy is an early-stage startup on a mission to move electricity grids worldwide away from fossil fuels and toward clean renewable energy by developing inexpensive, reliable energy storage. As a benefit of participation in the invitation-only program, Antora Energy will receive up to \$250,000 in non-dilutive funding to test, validate and advance its technologies with a network of experts from the U.S.

Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) and Shell's GameChanger program. The assistance is designed to help companies de-risk technology development while accelerating their path to market.

"We're excited to be working with NREL and Shell to tackle some of the biggest risks we face," said Antora CEO Andrew Ponec.

Launched in September 2018, GCxN is a multimillion-dollar, multiyear program that facilitates the commercialization and adoption of clean energy technologies. Unlike most accelerators, companies cannot simply apply to GCxN. Instead, companies must be recommended by a member of the Channel Partners network

(cleantech incubators, accelerators and universities), with finalists selected after review by technology experts at NREL and Shell. Antora Energy was successfully nominated by Cyclotron Road.

"We are very excited to begin work with this first round of GCxN companies," said GCxN Program co-directors Haibin Xu (Shell) and Adam Duran (NREL). "It is our goal to fill this program with game-changing ideas, and our first cohort of startup companies meets that goal and shows real promise to enable the grid of the future through their unique technologies."

Facebook-Local News - With an eye on past problems, Facebook expands local feature

Facebook is cautiously expanding a feature that shows people local news and information, including missing-person alerts, road closures, crime reports and school announcements.

Called "Today In," the service shows people information from their towns and cities from such sources as news outlets, government entities and community groups. Facebook launched the service in January with six cities and expanded that to 25, then more. On Wednesday, "Today In" is expanding to 400 cities in the U.S. – and a few others in Australia.

The move comes as Facebook tries to shake off its reputation as a hotbed for misinformation and elections-meddling and rather a place for communities and people to come together and stay informed.

Here are some things to know about this effort, and why it matters:

THE BIG PICTURE

It's something users have asked for, the company says. Think of it as an evolution of a "trending" feature the company dropped earlier this year. That feature, which showed news articles that were popular among users, but was rife with such problems as fake news and accusations of bias.

Anthea Watson Strong, product manager for local news and community information, said her team learned from the problems with that feature.

"We feel deeply the mistakes of our foremothers and forefathers," she said.

This time around, Facebook employees went to some of the cities they were launching in and met with users. They tried to predict problems by doing "pre-mortem" assessments, she said. That is, instead of a "post-mortem" where engineers dissect what went wrong after the fact, they tried to anticipate how people might misuse a feature – for financial gain, for example.

Facebook isn't saying how long it has been taking this "pre-mortem" approach, though the practice isn't unique to the company. Nonetheless, it's a significant step given that many of Facebook's current problems stem from its failure to foresee how bad actors might co-opt the service.

Facebook also hopes the feature's slow rollout will prevent problems.

HOW IT WORKS

To find out if "Today In" is available in your city or town, tap the "menu" icon with the three horizontal lines. Then scroll down until you see it. If you want, you can choose to see the local updates directly in your news feed.

For now, the company is offering this only in small and mid-sized cities such as Conroe, Texas, Morgantown, West Virginia, and Santa Fe, New Mexico. Large cities such as New York or Los Angeles have added challenges, such as an abundance of news and information, and may need to be broken up into smaller neighborhoods.

The posts in "Today In" are curated by artificial intelligence; there is no human involvement. The service aggregates posts from the Facebook pages for news organizations, government agencies and community groups like dog shelters. For this reason, a kid couldn't declare a snow day, because "Today In" relies on the school's official page. Discussion posts from local Facebook groups may also be included.

For now, the information is tailored only by geography, but this might change. A person with no kids, for example, might not want to see updates from schools.

SAFEGUARDS?

Facebook uses software filters to weed out objectionable content, just as it does on people's regular news feed. But the filters are turned up for "Today In." If a good friend posts something a bit objectionable, you are still likely to see it because Facebook takes your friendship into account. But "Today In" posts aren't coming from your friends, so Facebook is more likely to keep it out.

Elon Musk to unveil underground tunnel, transport cars

Tech entrepreneur Elon Musk is set to unveil an underground transportation tunnel on Tuesday that could move people faster than subways.

Musk also plans to show off the autonomous cars that will carry people through the test tunnel, which runs about 2 miles (3.2 kilometers) under the streets of Hawthorne, California, Musk's SpaceX headquarters. He's also planning to unveil elevators he says will bring users' own cars from street level to the tunnel.

Tuesday's reveal comes almost two years to the day since Musk announced on Twitter that "traffic is driving me nuts" and he was "going to build a tunnel boring machine and just start digging."

"I am actually going to do this," he added in response to initial skepticism.

So, began The Boring Company, tongue in cheek intentional. Since the announcement, Musk has revealed a handful of photos and videos of the tunnel's progress.

The tunnel, meant to be a "proof of concept," is being used to help Musk and The Boring Company conduct research and development for a broader system in traffic-plagued Los Angeles and beyond.

One, known as the Dugout Loop, would take Los Angeles baseball fans to Dodger Stadium from one of three subway stations. Another would take travelers from downtown Chicago to O'Hare International Airport. Both projects are in the environmental review phase.

The Boring Company canceled its plans for another test tunnel on Los Angeles' west side last month after a neighborhood coalition filed a lawsuit expressing concerns about traffic and disruptions from trucks hauling out dirt during the boring process.

Musk has described a system in which vehicles would descend via elevators into tunnels and move on electrically powered platforms called skates. Up to 16 pedestrians and bicyclists could

board autonomous vehicles also traveling on the skates as fast as 150 mph (240 kph).

"Once fully operational (demo system rides will be free), the system will always give priority to pods for pedestrians & cyclists for less than the cost of a bus ticket," Musk tweeted in May.

For the privately funded test tunnel, Musk acquired a tunnel-boring machine that had

been used in a San Francisco Bay Area project and put it down a shaft in a parking lot at the SpaceX headquarters.

Musk's vision for the underground tunnels, known as loop, is not the same as another of his transportation concepts known as hyperloop. That would involve a network of nearly airless tubes that would speed special capsules over long distances at up to 750 mph (1,200) kph), using a thin cushion of air, magnetism and solar power.

The loop system is designed for shorter routes that wouldn't require the elimination of air friction, according to The Boring Company.

The company says on its website that the reason such a system hasn't been done before is that tunnels can be as expensive as \$1 billion a mile to dig. But by using the skates to transport cars, which reduces the size of the tunnels needed by about half, thus reducing the cost to build them by up to four times, the company says.

As San Francisco changed, Gump's mostly stayed the same. Earlier this year Gump's filed for bankruptcy. Its final day of business is Sunday.



Dear Earth Talk: It seems to me the single biggest potential "environmental" problem we could face — even bigger than global warming or a nuclear war — is a comet or asteroid striking the Earth. Do we currently track these space rocks and if so, how? And do we have any hope of deflecting them if they are headed right for us?


Environmental advocates don't normally consider interstellar rocks to be their discipline, per se, but it is true that such an event could cause considerable environmental damage and even threaten the very existence of life on Earth. Indeed, when a 10-kilometer-wide asteroid struck the Earth some 66 million years ago, it wiped out three-quarters of the planet's plant and animal species (including the dinosaurs) and caused damage to the environment that lasted centuries.

Humans weren't around to witness the effects of that cataclysm, of course, but we do know that a large impact today could trigger massive firestorms, mudflows, earthquakes and tsunamis as well as acid rain, ozone depletion and rapid greenhouse warming - not to mention an "impact winter" whereby pulverized rock dust and other debris would blanket the skies and block the transmission of sunlight, effectively stopping photosynthesis around the globe. A big enough strike could effectively wipe out life on Earth.

NASA's Planetary Defense Coordination Office (PDCO) is charged with providing timely

and accurate communications on these threatening space rocks including issuing warnings about potential impacts — and leading the coordination of federal response planning. Currently PDCO uses a combination of existing satellite and telescope technologies to track comets and asteroids but is currently developing a new space-based infrared telescope dubbed "NEOCam" (short for Near-Earth Object Camera) specifically for the purpose of surveying the solar system for large space rocks (larger than 140 meters across). But the project is far from a front-burner concern for NASA right now, and proponents are hoping Congress will earmark funds specifically to complete its development in the short term.



"The real gap is the 100 times as many asteroids smaller than 140 meters but still large enough to destroy things on the ground," reports Ed Lu, the co-founder of B612. His team is currently working on a network of five to 10 telescope-equipped satellites to track these smaller space rocks and provide early warning services.

But just because we're able to detect and track asteroids doesn't mean we can deflect them. According to expert witness testimony at a 2013 Congressional hearing on the topic, NASA would need five years' lead time — and a commitment of hundreds of millions of dollars to be able to intercept an asteroid.

intervening years. A June 2018 report from the Cabinet-level National Science and Technology Council warns that America remains unprepared for an asteroid impact event and urges the federal government to fund efforts to get ready for what astronomers say is inevitable at some point in the future. That said, unlike other environmental problems besetting us, there isn't anything individuals can do to protect the planet from asteroid or comet strikes - except to urge their representatives in Congress to support legislation that funds programs and technologies designed to detect and deflect those incoming civilization

Canine adventures await at Workindoggz

Daycare runs six days a week with two large areas dedicated to their canine guests, divided by size and energy level. On the small dog/lower energy side, up to 20 dogs can enjoy the day socializing, sleeping, or playing on the camp-themed platforms. The large dog/high energy side, also able to host about 20 dogs, is set up in a similar fashion, with access to Erwinn's Lodge, the boarding room designed to look and feel like a typical living room. Daycare costs \$40 a day and \$35 for additional family dogs.

Workindoggz offers two types of hikes: regular and adventure hikes. The regular hikes cover about two miles and usually take about half an hour. The Workindoggz rangers utilize positive reinforcement and consistent training while hiking along the East Bay's greatest trails, from Green Bel Park, to Garin Regional Park and Lake Chabot Regional Park; just a few of the places Workindoggz frequents. These hikes cost \$20, with a \$15 charge for additional family dogs. Adventure hikes, like their name implies, are more challenging in nature. These hikes cover anywhere from three to five miles and are only recommended for larger breeds,

as the fast pace will tucker out smaller breeds. Adventure hikes cost \$35, with a \$30 charge for additional family dogs.

Workindoggz also offers boarding service in its open space boarding areas, also themed in the campground style. Dogs can stay in the play area overnight, in Erwinn's Lodge, or in one of five kennels. Workindoggz has two kennel rooms, known as campgrounds: Ceaser's and Hampton's, with Hampton's currently under construction. Though not as busy as daycare, boarding is still a crucial part of their operations. "We're doing the same level of boarding as we did at our old facility in Castro Valley," Cody said. Boarding runs \$60 a night and \$55 for additional family dogs.

The staff's dedication to its guests is evident in each of the services they provide. Food is complimentary, as is the administration of medications as needed. Of course, if a dog requires a special diet, the owner may bring in food and it will be served to them. All dogs are also required to pass an evaluation to make sure they are a proper fit with the other guests and that they are not aggressive towards humans. "We never try to make ourselves the only option, we always offer to find other options if dogs don't fit with us," Cody explained. Marie added, "There are still a lot of home-based daycares. We want to network with them because it's all about the dogs."

Workindoggz grew out of Cody's passion for four-legged friends. "It all started as a personal passion," Marie noted. "Cody and his dad love to hike," she added. "It's a mixed bag of things," Cody said of his experience with dogs, continuing, "We had a Malamute that was a hyper aggressive dog, which took eight years to get a



handle on. When she passed, we had our Lab and a really nice kennel. My Lab was very friendly, and we had a knowledge of trails." Soon, Cody and his family were

providing daycare services and hikes for a small amount of dog guests. "We wanted to fix problem dogs and thought we could do so through exercise," he explained.

Alongside his Chocolate Labrador Ceaser, who is also Workindoggz's mascot, Cody embarked on a journey that has led them to where they are today. 



Pakistani American Community Center

PACC has been at the Turquoise Street location for about a year; they were previously on South Main Street and Montague Expressway in Milpitas for about five years after moving from Brokaw and Oakland Road in San Jose.

PACC offers Urdu classes to kids who are in preschool, kindergarten, and early elementary school grades. Class size is usually about 10 kids. But they also recognized a need for seniors in the Pakistani community to get together. "Retired people wanted to get together with friends and play cards," Khan said. "That's when we did a fundraising event and introduced the community to the idea of a community center with children, classes, and activities."

Their first fundraising event was in March 2007; they registered as a non-profit organization the following June. From then on, PACC became more than a center for social gatherings and language learning. Adil shared how the original mission was to promote culture, history, and language. "Originally PACC was a Pakistani American Culture Center," Adil said. "But then we realized, 'Ok, we're doing a lot more than that.' And so we expanded our mission and

we became 'community center' instead of just 'cultural center.'" That change was made in 2017.

Programs and activities range from social gatherings to educational events. They have a monthly poetry and karaoke dinner event for seniors who want to share poetry, sing, or play an instrument. PACC also hosts monthly social gatherings featuring a variety of guest speakers. One past guest is a traveler who documented his journey from San Francisco to Pakistan via motorcycle. Other guests have included a Pakistan Consulate Ambassador and a staff member from the Milpitas Board of Education doing a presentation for high school students on

college applications.


Other organizations that serve the Pakistani community in the Bay Area and in Pakistan come visit to share their cause. "We bring awareness to that as well, so the community can also participate and can help out," Adil said.

32417 Westport Court

PACC holds four annual events, three of which are celebrated in Pakistan: Pakistan Day, the Basant Kite Festival, Pakistan Independence Day, and Urdu Day. "Our biggest program is the kite festival; we've been trying to do that here every year," Adil said. Around 3,000 people have attended the kite festival in past years.

Pakistan Day is a national holiday in Pakistan recognizing a historic political document called the Lahore Resolution, passed in March 23, 1940. PACC celebrates this day by bringing awareness to organizations who help the local community and people in Pakistan. They also mark






Pakistan's Independence Day, August 14, through a flag ceremony at Milpitas City Hall.

PACC is funded through donations, grants, and membership fees. The organization currently has over 1,000 members. A single membership is \$25 a year. Families that include a couple and up to four children under 18 years old can buy a membership package at \$100 a year. One doesn't have to become a member to participate in events, but Adil said there are benefits to becoming

a member. Members get to attend Pakistani movie nights for free, receive discounts on events, and a discount if renting space for special occasions. Sole patron member fees are \$250 a year. Patron members enjoy additional opportunities and recognition.

- All Community Centers and Recreation buildings will be closed Dec. 24, 25, and 31, 2018, and Jan. 1, 2019.
- Human Services will provide limited services for Youth & Family Services, Family Resource Center, and Healthy Start Program.
- Life Eldercare will provide limited services. Clients should contact 510-574-2090 for additional information.
- Afghan Elderly Association will provide limited services. Clients should contact their caseworker for additional information.
- The Fremont Police Department and Fremont Fire Department will continue to provide public safety services.

Fremont Appoints New Community Development Director

Fremont City Manager Mark Danaj announced the appointment of Dan Schoenholz as Community Development Director for the City of Fremont. Schoenholz has been serving as Fremont's Interim Community Development Director since May 2018, when Community Development Director Jeff Schwob retired.

Schoenholz's career with the City of Fremont began October 1, 1998 in the City Manager's Office where he started as an administrative analyst. He then joined the Human Services Department where he rose to the position of deputy director. In 2006 Schoenholz joined the Community Development Department as a special project manager leading the City's General Plan update effort before promoting to deputy director of community development in 2011. Recent notable projects he oversaw included the installation of 1.5 MW (megawatts) of solar carports at City facilities and a \$9.1 million energy and water efficiency upgrade on City facilities. He has also led the City's creation of several hundred units of affordable housing. Prior to coming to Fremont, Schoenholz was an environmental scientist with the US Environmental Protection Agency and the Port of Oakland.

"Dan is the consummate City of Fremont manager, having worked in various leadership roles over the last 20 years in Fremont," said City Manager



Mark Danaj. "Dan has demonstrated that he has the skill set, attitude, and keen understanding of the City's direction and values necessary to succeed in this important role. I am confident Dan will continue his track record of exceptional service to the City of Fremont."

Schoenholz earned both a Bachelor of Science degree and a Master's degree in Public Policy from the University of California, Berkeley where he graduated with honors. As Fremont's community development director, Schoenholz oversees the Planning, Building, Housing, Environmental Sustainability, and Code Enforcement divisions.

Christmas Tree Composting Guidelines

Every year, thousands of Christmas trees end up in landfills because they are not properly composted. The negative environmental impacts of the holiday season can be reduced by planting a living tree, purchasing a reusable tree, and/or ensuring proper disposal of live Christmas trees. Trees are only compostable if they are free of all decorations, tinsel, nails, and tree stands (including wooden stands that are nailed to the bottom of the trunk). Additionally, any tree that is flocked with artificial snow contains fire retardant and cannot be composted. Trees that have decorations or tinsel cannot be composted and will be disposed of in the landfill.

The various ways to properly dispose of a Christmas tree in Fremont are listed below:

Gutter (Single-family homes only)

- Republic Services curbside collection from December 31, 2018 to January 11, 2019.
- If your tree is less than 6 feet in length, place the whole tree in the gutter on your collection day.
- If your tree is over 6 feet in length, cut the tree in half and place both halves in the gutter on your collection day.
- Make sure your tree is in the gutter, not on the sidewalk.
- Check that your tree is free of all decorations when placed in the gutter to keep our storm drains litter-free.

Green **Organics Cart**

- Cut the compostable tree so that pieces fit loosely in your organics cart with the lid closed.
- Place the cart at the curb on your scheduled collection day.

Garbage Cart

- Please use this option as your last resort; compost your tree first, if possible.
- Cut up your tree containing flocking or decorations so that pieces fit loosely in your garbage cart with the lid closed.
- Place the blue or black garbage cart at the curb on your scheduled collection day.

Drop-off at Republic Services

• Between December 26, 2018 and January 11, 2019 take your Christmas tree to the Republic Services customer center located at 42600 Boyce Rd. in Fremont (Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.). Compostable trees may be dropped off for free. Non-compostable trees may be dropped off at a \$5 charge.

If you live in a multifamily complex, please contact your property manager to learn how your tree can be properly composted.







and first celebrated in 1966 in Los Angeles. Today, with traditional African harvest rituals in mind, many African Americans observe this unique holiday season that pays homage to our age-old legacy of humanistic ethics.

The celebration takes place from December 26 through January 1, one day for each of the Seven Principles: Umoja (Unity), Kujichagulia (Self-determination), Ujima (Collective work and responsibility), Ujamaa (Cooperative economics), Nia (Purpose), Kuumba (Creativity), and Imani (Faith).

Held since 1980, AACHS's Kwanzaa celebration first started in a home and as it grew, moved to various locations in the community until it was hosted at Palma Ceia about five years ago and has remained there since. At this location, Program Coordinator Suzie Smith says, "We can reach more kids so they can have a full understanding of what Kwanzaa's all about; it keeps the tradition alive."

The free event includes saxophone music, gospel singing, original poetry readings and display tables on basket weaving with sweetgrass baskets courtesy of the Mazyzk, Freeman, and Smith families. Information about Colonel Allensworth State Historic Park in Earlimart, California, a town founded in 1908 by former slave Allen Allensworth for African Americans to live, free from oppression will be available. Hungry? Try delicious Soul food such as fried chicken, jambalaya, and sweet tea during the festivities. Attendees are encouraged to wear African attire and "celebrate our color in red, black, and green" said Smith.

Begun in 1974 by Jean Ficklin, the mission of AACHS is to provide a vehicle for Black Americans in the area to share our history through educational and cultural activities and network in harmony, friendship, and kinship with multiethnic groups throughout our community.

We believe that disseminating information and sharing promotes understanding the values, customs, and beliefs of our multiethnic community. This awareness enhances respect of diversity, bringing about more unity. We honor the ties that bind us all together.

It's one of the great mysteries of life. Without it, our world order would be unimaginable but with it, our lives move in a seemingly linear progression. Once it is used there is no amount of money or influence that, so far, can reverse it. Even though Einstein developed a theory of relativity that describes a space-time dimension that is flexible, in our day-to-day lives, once used, time cannot be recaptured. Stephen Hawking also theorized that time can be bent and manipulated, but in our current reality, seconds, minutes and hours are precious commodities; waste of it is not recyclable.

Infatuation with time is rampant in all facets of our lives. Music tends to reflect the variety of emotions that accompany life; time is at the center of it all. From Frank Sinatra, Shirley Bassey, Chet Baker, Pink, Electric Light Orchestra, Cyndi Lauper and many others, the theme and rhythm of "Time After Time" is ubiquitous. A lament of lost time, loves and choices haunts our memories and serves as a reminder to use the present to our advantage without unnecessary waste.

Time after time

What has this to do with our political scene? Plenty. Just as personal lives can degenerate into a wasteland of regrets without concerted effort to value and enjoy the present, so too can our political environment. Skirmishes and salvos of dissent without coherence is counterproductive and relegates our lives to the mundane. In a new year, fraught with troubling signs of economic and social upheaval, local civic response can do much to alleviate confusion and anxiety, substituting purpose and design in the place of petty infighting. As new members of councils, boards and commissions take their place, hopefully Father Time, with his scythe and hourglass, will be indicative of a smooth transition without rancor or dishonest dissent.

As with many city councils,
Fremont bid adieu to some
councilmembers while welcoming
new faces to the dais. "Newbies" are often
reticent at first to express themselves
although it doesn't take long for
their true personalities to be revealed.
This is similar to the quip by Mark Twain
about understanding the wisdom of those
with some experience under their belt:

"When I was a boy of 14, my father was so ignorant I could hardly stand to have the old man around. But when I got to be 21, I was astonished at how much the old man had learned in seven years." - Mark Twain

The importance of using time wisely has always been a challenge for

politicians. A dangerous specter over council meetings is the tendency toward lengthy oratory with little substance even as Father Time inexorably treads his path. William Penn noted, "Time is what we want most, but... what we use worst." Referred to as life's "coin" or most valuable commodity, Carl Sandberg warned, "Time is the coin of your life. It is the only coin you have, and only you can determine how it will be spent. Be careful lest you let other people spend it for you."

While it is incumbent on our elected representatives to study, understand and debate issues that fall within their realm, it should also be evident that preparedness can and should result in clarity of purpose and, usually, brevity. One of the most succinct cautions to our elected representatives buried in mountains of detail, who may be inclined to flaunt their knowledge or, unfortunately, display their ignorance, is a quip from a well-known source:

"How did it get so late so soon?"

California is first state to mandate zero-emission bus fleet

California moved Friday to eliminate climate-changing fossil fuels from its fleet of 12,000 transit buses, enacting a first-in-the-nation mandate that will vastly increase the number of electric buses on the road.

The California Air Resources Board voted unanimously to require that all new buses be carbon-free by 2029. Environmental advocates project that the last buses emitting greenhouse gases will be phased out by 2040.

While clean buses cost more than the diesel and natural gas vehicles they will replace, say they have lower maintenance and fuel costs. Supporters hope creating demand for thousands of clean buses will bring down their price and eventually other heavy-duty vehicles like trucks.

California has 153 zero-emission buses on the road now with hundreds more on

order. Most of them are electric, though technology also exists for buses powered by hydrogen fuel cells.

"Every state could do a strategy like this," said Adrian Martinez, an attorney for Earthjustice, an environmental legal group that supports the rule. "This is something that California did first because we have major air quality and pollution problems, but this is something other states could pursue."

Existing state and federal subsidies are available to help transit agencies absorb some of the higher costs of carbon-free buses, along with money from the state's settlement with Volkswagen over the German automaker's emission-cheating software.

In approving the mandate, air board members cited both a reduction in greenhouse gas emissions and improved air quality along heavily trafficked transit corridors in smog-polluted cities.

The transportation sector accounts for 40 percent of California's greenhouse gases, and those emissions are rising even as electrical emissions have fallen substantially.

California needs to drastically reduce transportation emissions to meet its aggressive climate change goals.

The California Transit Association, a lobbying group, does not oppose electrifying the fleet but is concerned that zero-emission buses can't match the performance of the existing fleet and that there isn't enough money available for the transition, said Michael Pimentel, who is leading the organization's work on the issue.

"We do want to work alongside the Air Resources Board and our partners at the state and federal level to address these concerns and to ultimately achieve the goal of fully electrified fleets by 2040," Pimentel said.



Wieckowski bills take effect Jan. 1

Sen. Bob Wieckowski (D-Fremont) has authored the following bills that go into effect on January 1, 2019:

•SB 1333 – Ensures charter cities comply with state laws regarding their specific plans and affordable housing needs, as general law cities are already required to do.

•SB 1244 – Protects people seeking public records by prohibiting the government from collecting attorneys' fees from public records requestors.

•SB 989 – Transfers ownership of a section of Highway 84, between 880 and 238, from the California Transportation Commission to the City of Fremont to allow the city to construct a multi-modal "complete streets" design along the heavily-travelled corridor.

•SB 954 – Requires attorneys to provide their clients with a written disclosure informing them of the confidentiality restrictions in mediation.

•SB 904 – Extends the authorization of the Bureau of Security and Investigative Services to issue an alarm company operator license to a limited liability company until Jan. 1, 2024.

•SB 881 – Provides state funding for the Bay Area's South Bay Shoreline Project to restore wetlands, construct levees, improve recreation and better prepare the region for the impacts of climate change.

Sen. Wieckowski represents the 10th District, which includes southern Alameda County and northeast Santa Clara County.



The incident occurred when patrol officers responded the 34000 Block of Torrington Court at about 11:18 p.m. December 4 on the report of gunshots heard and a vehicle colliding into a fence. Arriving officers found a 17-year-old male, later identified by local media as Damani Chadly, suffering multiple gunshot wounds and critically injured in the passenger seat of a car that had crashed into the side of a house at Chaucer Drive and Torrington Court. Fremont Fire Paramedics arrived, but Chadly was pronounced dead at 11:35 p.m.

Around 11:50 p.m. witnessed reported a 19-year-old male running from the scene. Officers

found him nearby suffering from non-life threatening gunshot wounds; preliminary information indicated he was the driver of the crashed vehicle. He was taken to a hospital for treatment. Crimes Against Persons Detectives investigators determined the shooting occurred during the commission of a transaction involving the sale of marijuana. The suspect, Kelling, reportedly was selling marijuana to the deceased male and the injured victim. A dispute occurred, prompting Kelling to fire several rounds into the victim's vehicle as it fled, striking both victims multiple times. During a search of the victim's vehicle, marijuana packaged for sales was located.

A search of the Fremont's Community Cameras eight minutes after the shooting showed a 2013 Honda Civic associated to Kelling traveling northbound on Fremont Boulevard at Enea Court. During their investigation, detectives determined that Kelling fled to Texas. Meanwhile, a warrant for Kelling's arrest was issued. With the help of the Lone Star US Marshal Apprehension Unit, Kelling was found and taken into custody. On Wednesday, December 18 Kelling was charged with homicide and attempted homicide in Alameda County; he is expected to be transported to California soon for arraignment.

'Teddy Bear Bandit' arrested

After two months at large, a suspect dubbed by San Leandro Police as the "teddy bear bandit" was arrested in Oakland on Friday, December 14 on a burglary warrant issued by an Alameda County judge.

The suspect got his name after he reportedly burglarized the East Bay Flower Shop at 1200 E 14th. St., San Leandro at 1200 E 14th. St. in October. This incident occurred around 2:00 am as the thief used a BB style handgun to shoot out the front glass windows to the business. After shattering the glass, the burglar entered the store and stole numerous flowers and stuffed animals. The entire incident was captured on the store's video surveillance system.

San Leandro Policed Detectives began working the case and received a lead from another police agency that led them to the identity of the suspect, Andre Benny Murphy, 46, of Oakland. During the investigation, some of the stuffed teddy bears were found at a female's home in Alameda. A warrant was issued for Murphy's arrest. It turned out that several other law enforcement agencies are also investigating Murphy for similar style burglaries.

"The case is an example of how law enforcement agencies network together, sharing information to solve cases," said San Leandro Police Lieutenant Isaac Benabou. "We know that the suspect had given the stolen flowers and stuffed animals to a female friend. Now, the teddy bear bandit will have to find other ways to show his affection."

Murphy remains in custody at Santa Rita Jail in Dublin.

Bridge tolls set to rise with new year

Officials from the Bay Area Toll Authority (BATA) are reminding drivers that several important changes will become effective starting January 1 at the region's seven state-owned toll bridges. These include the first of the \$1 toll increases approved last year through state Senate Bill 595 and by voters through Regional Measure 3 in June 2018. This will mark the first toll hike at the state-owned toll bridges since 2010. Additional \$1 increases will go into effect on New Year's Day.

Regular tolls for two-axle cars and trucks (as well as for motorcycles) at the Dumbarton, San Mateo-Hayward, Antioch, Benicia-Martinez, Carquinez, and Richmond-San Rafael bridges will rise to \$6 from the current \$5.

Meanwhile, at the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge, regular tolls will climb to \$7 from the current \$6 on weekdays from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. During weekday off-peak hours from 12:00 midnight to 5:00 a.m., from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., and from 7:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight, Bay Bridge tolls will rise from \$4 to \$5; and on Saturdays and Sundays, Bay Bridge

tolls will increase to \$6 from the current \$5.

Tolls for vehicles with three or more axles also will rise by \$1 on all seven of the state-owned toll bridges: to \$16 for three axles, \$21 for four-axles, \$26 for five axles, \$31 for six axles, and \$36 for combinations with seven or more axles.

Senate Bill 595 and Regional Measure 3 continue the peak-period toll discount for motorcycles, carpools and qualifying clean-air vehicles crossing any of the state-owned toll bridges on weekdays from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. The discounted toll is scheduled to increase to \$3 on January 1 from the current \$2.50. To qualify for this discount, carpoolers, motorcyclists and drivers of qualifying clean-air vehicles must use FasTrak to pay their tolls electronically and must use a designated carpool lane at each toll plaza.

The legislation also established a 50-cent toll discount for two-axle vehicles crossing more than one of the state-owned toll bridges during weekday commute hours of 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. To be eligible for the toll discount, which is to be applied to the second toll crossing of the day, motorists must pay their tolls electronically with FasTrak. Carpools, motorcycles and

qualifying clean-air vehicles making a second peak-period toll crossing in a single day will qualify for an additional 25-cent discount off the already-discounted carpool toll. The two-bridge discount will not be available to drivers who use cash to pay their tolls.

New FasTrak customers can obtain toll tags at most Walgreens and Costco stores around the Bay Area. A complete list of participating locations – along with an online enrollment and registration feature — is available by visiting the FasTrak website at www.bayareafastrak.org.

Customers also may enroll in the FasTrak program by phone at 1 (877) 229-8655; by calling 511 and asking for "FasTrak" at the first prompt; or in person at the FasTrak customer service center at 375 Beale Street in San Francisco. Operating hours are Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and Saturdays, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. FasTrak can be used in all lanes at all Bay Area toll plazas.

Meanwhile, a pair of lawsuits challenging Senate Bill 595 and Regional Measure 3 are pending in the Superior Court in the City and County of San Francisco. The toll increases, when collected, will be placed into an escrow account managed by an independent trustee. Following a process similar to

voter-approved sales tax measures that face legal challenge, these funds will be transferred at least once each week from BATA to a Union Bank (Mitsubishi United Financial Group - MUFG) trust account, where the funds will be managed by a bank trust officer until final resolution of all litigation. Once the BATA legal team certifies there is a final resolution, the Authority will be asked to release the escrow. If BATA prevails in the litigation, the funds will be applied to BATA-approved programs. If BATA should lose the litigation, the funds will be reimbursed to toll payers.

BATA, which is directed by the same policy board as the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), administers toll revenues from the Bay Area's seven state-owned toll bridges. Toll revenues from the Golden Gate Bridge are administered by the Golden Gate Bridge, Highway and Transportation District, which joined with BATA to operate a single regional FasTrak customer service center in San Francisco. MTC is the transportation planning, financing and coordinating agency for the nine-county San Francisco Bay Area.


The Hayward Unified School District (HUSD) has begun construction of solar panel projects at several school sites and a few district sites as part its new solar energy program. Over the next 10 to 12 months, solar arrays will be installed at a total of

31 district sites. The installations will take the form of parking canopies, ground-mounted structures, and playground canopy structures with mounted solar panels. For the project, the district is partnering with Engie – global energy and services group focused on low-carbon power generation.

The program will generate substantial savings for the district's general fund, provide project-based learning opportunities for students, reduce the district's carbon footprint, and create local green jobs. HUSD is set to open STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) buildings at all three of its high school campuses. The solar energy program will allow for access to lesson plans and customized sessions for teachers across the district.
