has been defined by contemporary audience tastes, with Broadway singers in the fall, ballerinas dancing during the winter show, and an entire concert dedicated to the music of Sinatra in the summer. "We are at the forefront of creating a new experience... of a relationship with a symphony," said Pak as he reflected about the recent changes. Though the "Love Notes" concert is a return to historic musical masterpieces, the audience experience still takes center stage.

Pak built the Love Notes program around Shakespeare's classic love story, with selections

from Tchaikovsky's "Romeo and Juliet" and Bernstein's "West Side Story," as well as Rota's "A Time for Us" (from the 1968 film of "Romeo and Juliet") played back to back to create instant comparison. "I try to choose exceptionally beautiful music that takes audiences back to a moment, an event that they remember," said Pak.

Several contemporary pieces have been added to the concert because of their resonance with love and the imagination. Pak enjoys mixing musical genres in concert. "It shows that beautiful music is beautiful music, no matter how it's used."

Audiences will hear an example of genre mixing during Borodin's Polovtsian Dances from "Prince Igor," though the music will likely spark memories of Tony Benner's famous cover of "Stranger in Paradise." The concert will finish with Rachmaninoff's "Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini." For this famously emotional piano solo, Lisa Smirnova is flying in from Austria to join the Fremont Symphony as their special guest.

Smirnova made her professional debut over 20 years ago at Carnegie Hall and has been a featured pianist with

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When it Comes to X-rays and CT Scans, Sometimes Less is More

New technology at Washington Hospital provides clear images with less radiation exposure

Patients at Washington Hospital who require CT scans or X-rays are experiencing a 40 percent reduction in the radiation required to achieve a clear picture as a result of new technology and equipment recently installed at the Hospital.

According to Raju Thiara, manager of Medical Imaging at Washington Hospital, the new ASiR (adaptive statistical iterative reconstruction) technology has advanced noise reduction software which provides clear, readable results while using a much lower level of radiation.

Medical Director of Medical Imaging, Jason Cheng MD, explained, “Our goal always is to provide the highest quality patient care at Washington Hospital. One way to do this is to achieve the clearest possible image using the lowest level of radiation to the patient. ASiR technology has made a significant difference in our ability to achieve that goal.”

There is a nationwide concern that we are all being exposed to too much radiation, Dr. Cheng added. Generally, for patients, the exposure is short term and not frequent enough to be of concern, he said. “But the goal of our radiation safety committee is always ALARA — as low as reasonably achievable.”

The change in X-ray and CT scan technology has been significant over the past 10 to 15 years, Thiara said. As recently as 10 years ago, film was the preferred medium for X-rays. Having the

film developed took time and delayed diagnosis. The next improvement was the use of computed radiography which used phosphor plates rather than film cassette, cutting the development time and reducing the use of radiation by 20 to 25 percent. With digital radiography, the system now in use at Washington Hospital, radiation is cut by another 40 percent.

“A lower radiation dose is always better for the patient, but we wanted to make sure that we were not compromising image quality and that we did not miss anything,” Thiara added. “With ASiR, we get to keep the same image quality while lowering the dose to the patient.”

Washington Hospital’s new Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion is completely digital and the CT scanner

has the ASiR technology. The Hospital’s outpatient CT scanner will have the ASiR technology by late March. Ultrasound and MRI imaging does not use radiation.

Pain Relief—And a New Lease on Life—Local Resident's Successful Surgery



With help from his daughter, Robin Boggs, RN, Ted Dedmon found the right physician for his spinal surgery and can now enjoy life's simple pleasures, like taking a walk with Teegan.

Ted Dedmon endured serious back pain for two years. The pain was so intense, it severely limited his ability to care for himself. "I was facing having to live the rest of my life in a long-term care facility," he says, adding that the thought of back surgery was frightening. His wife, Ursula, adds, "The pain was so unbearable, he couldn't even get out of a chair or off the couch. It's difficult to see the one you love be in so much pain and to feel helpless."

Today, Ted says his life has changed dramatically due to Sandeep Kunwar, MD, a board-certified neurosurgeon with Washington Township Medical Foundation (WTMF) who is nationally and internationally recognized for his innovative and pioneering work in minimally invasive cranial and spinal surgery. "I'm now walking upright, and I can bend and stretch," says Ted. "It feels absolutely wonderful."

After searching for alternatives—including trying pain medications and steroid injections, none of which relieved his pain—he finally met Dr. Kunwar in July 2018 through his daughter, Robin Boggs, a nurse with Washington Outpatient Surgery Center who promised her father she would find the perfect doctor for him. And it seems she did just that.

"The first time I met with Dr. Kunwar, we connected right away. He explained in detail what would be involved in the surgery, including what was ahead and

what would come later," Ted explains. "He is the absolute best in his field. I felt he was the only doctor who could perform this surgery on me."

Ted and Ursula were not only impressed with Dr. Kunwar's extensive knowledge and experience (he has performed more than 3,500 minimally invasive operations), they also appreciated the way he explained the procedure, including showing them images and X-rays to help them visualize the process. "He is very articulate, and he uses plain English, so you don't have to consult a medical dictionary to understand him," says Ted. "He was easy to talk to," Ursula agreed. "He's so full of knowledge; we were trying to get every word he said."

The nine-hour procedure involved making several small incisions to enable microscopic surgery. Dr. Kunwar inserted a titanium brace that would support three of Ted's lumbar discs. Ted also had four bulging discs, a large hernia and two broken bones in his spine. After the surgery, he spent several days recovering in the Hospital, then was transferred to a rehabilitation facility where he began his physical therapy regimen.

He is home now and continues to improve steadily with physical therapy, while attending follow-up appointments with Dr. Kunwar.

Despite the severity of his condition and the intricacy of the procedure, Ted is

amazed that he hasn't had to take any pain medications—and that by all accounts, his recovery has been remarkable. "Right now, I feel like I'm fully recovered. I'm thrilled to be normal again," he says, adding that he has the best posture he's ever had.

Speaking of posture, Ted had lost an inch of height due to his back problems. Ursula recalls their first meeting with Dr. Kunwar. "He said, 'I will give you your

inch back,' and he did! It was incredible," she says. "If it wasn't for him, I don't know where we'd be today."

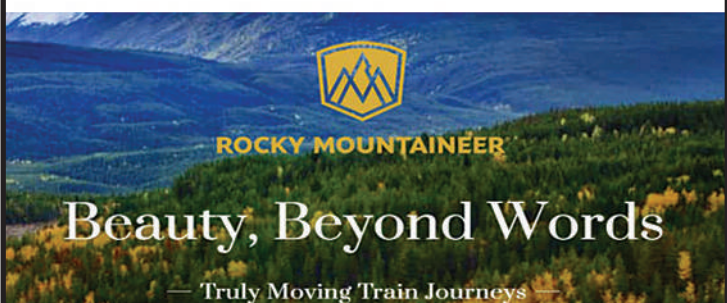

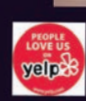
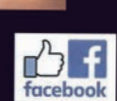

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Free transportation service and supportive companionship for ambulatory cancer patients, from suspicious findings through completion of treatments, is the focus of Drivers For Survivors (DFS), a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Ambulatory cancer patients living in Fremont, Newark, Union City, Hayward, San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Castro Valley, Ashland, and Cherryland are faced with a daunting set of challenges including transportation to oncology-related medical appointments and emotional support. DFS is ready to help within a 60-mile radius of ZIP code 94538, allowing clients to focus on their health and essential treatment.

Since its founding in 2012, DFS expanded its service to central Alameda County, providing over 17,000 rides for over 500 ambulatory cancer patients. Service expansion in July 2017 was made possible by the funding assistance by the Alameda County Transportation Commission, through Measure B and Measure BB tax dollars; Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310; and charitable individuals, organizations, and businesses within the communities served and beyond.

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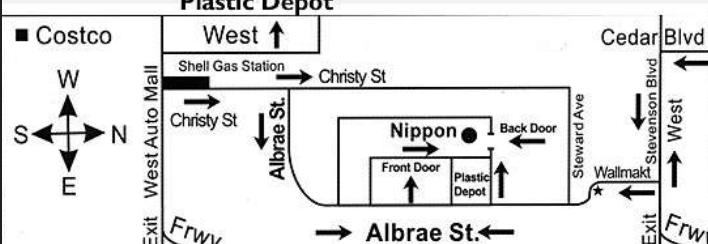
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Broadway and the Movies

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Retired Fremont fire chief and planning commissioner passes away at 77

On March 18, retired Fremont Fire Chief and Planning Commissioner Daniel T. Lydon passed away at his home in Fremont. Lydon was born on October 30, 1941 in Oakland. He attended grammar school at Sacred Heart Elementary in Oakland and St. Mary's High School in Berkeley before being hired by the Oakland Tribune. Lydon then joined the Fremont Fire Department as a firefighter on March 15, 1963. His leadership was evident from the start as he was instrumental in the establishment of the Labor Union, Fremont Firefighters Local 1689 and would later serve as its president.

Lydon held the ranks of firefighter, inspector, lieutenant, captain and battalion chief, before being promoted to fire chief on March 16, 1987. During his administration, the department expanded adding four new fire stations, placed paramedics on fire engines that improved patient outcomes, and he was a key figure in the voter-approved bond measure, "Measure R" that ensured all Fremont fire stations were built or retrofitted to meet earthquake safety standards.

Upon retirement from the Fire Department, Lydon continued his life of public service and was appointed to the Fremont Planning Commission. He helped direct the growth of Fremont in



accordance with the Fremont General Plan; many of Fremont's newer developments and some currently under construction were approved during his tenure.

Lydon is survived by his wife of 53-years Patricia Lydon, his children Bridget McGrath, Daniel Lydon, Kevin Lydon, Margaret Lydon, Michael Lydon, and five grandchildren.

Lyft opens its IPO road show, to offer more than 30M shares

Lyft officially kicked off the road show for its initial public offering with more than 30 million shares expected to sell for between \$62 and \$68 per share. That would raise more than \$2 billion for the San Francisco ride-hailing company, which could be valued between \$20 billion and \$25 billion eventually. Lyft has been in a race with Uber to be first to offer its stock to the public. Lyft released financial details for the first time this month, reporting \$2.2 billion in revenue but \$911 million in losses. Lyft executives warned that the company could struggle to turn a profit. The company has lost nearly \$3 billion since 2012 but has brought in more than \$5 billion in venture capital.

Goodbye console? Google launches game-streaming platform

Google on Tuesday unveiled a video-game streaming platform called Stadia, positioning itself to take on the traditional video-game business. The platform will store a game-playing session in the cloud and lets players jump across devices operating on Google’s Chrome browser and Chrome OS, such as Pixel phones and Chromebooks. Google made the announcement at the Game Developers Conference in San Francisco. Some industry watchers were expecting a streaming console, but Google’s platform centers squarely on the company’s cloud infrastructure. “The new generation of gaming is not a box,” said Google Vice President Phil Harrison. “The data center is your platform.” Much like movies and music, the traditional video-game industry has been shifting from physical hardware and games to digital downloads and streaming. Video-game streaming typically requires a strong connection and more computing power than simply streaming video, since there is real-time interaction between player and game. Google says it is leveraging its data centers to power the system. Alphabet Inc.’s Google said playing video games will be as simple as pressing a “Play Now” button, with nothing to download or install. An optional dedicated Stadia controller will be available. The Wi-Fi-enabled controller has a button that lets players launch a microphone and use Google Assistant to ask questions about the games being played. Another button lets users share gameplay directly to Google’s video streaming service, YouTube. CFRA Research analyst Scott Kessler said Google’s approach that ties YouTube sharing and video-game playing is unique.

“It is not necessarily at this point the easiest thing for people to livestream their games and now you can do it with the push of a button,” he said. “What they’ve done with Stadia is to connect and unify both the gaming platform and the streaming platform which obviously is new.” No launch date or pricing was announced but the company said Stadia will be available in 2019 in the U.S., Canada, the U.K. and parts of Europe. The company showed demos of “Assassin’s Creed Odyssey” and “Doom Eternal.” More information about games is due this summer. The U.S. video game industry raked in revenue of \$43.4 billion in 2018, up 18 percent from 2017, according to research firm NPD Group. BTIG Managing Director Brandon Ross said Stadia will be a positive for game publishers “assuming that it works and works at scale, which is a big assumption.” That’s because the platform could bring in players not willing to spend the money upfront for a gaming PC or a console. “What they’re presenting is a feasible way to play videogames in the cloud, and utilizing the cloud so you can play anytime, anyplace and anywhere,” he said. “There’s no friction, including the friction of upfront hardware costs.” Ross added that Google’s platform could set up a distribution battle between Microsoft, which owns the Xbox, Sony, which owns the PlayStation, Google and perhaps Amazon, which reportedly is working on its own video-game service, as they race to lock down distribution of the most in-demand games. To that end, Google launched Stadia Games and Entertainment which will develop Stadia-exclusive games. “The differentiator for any of the distributors on a console or in the cloud is going to be available content,” he said.

Facebook left millions of passwords readable by employees

Facebook left millions of user passwords readable by its employees for years, the company acknowledged Thursday after a security researcher exposed the lapse. By storing passwords in readable plain text, Facebook violated fundamental computer-security practices. Those call for organizations and websites to save passwords in a scrambled form that makes it almost impossible to recover the original text. “There is no valid reason why anyone in an organization, especially the size of Facebook, needs to have access to users’ passwords in plain text,” said cybersecurity expert Andrei Barysevich of Recorded Future. Facebook said there is no evidence its employees abused access to this data. But thousands of employees could have searched them. The company said the passwords were stored on internal company servers, where no outsiders could access them. The incident reveals yet another huge and basic oversight at a company that insists it is a responsible guardian for the personal data of its 2.2 billion users worldwide. The security blog KrebsOnSecurity said Facebook may have left the passwords of some 600 million Facebook users vulnerable. In a blog post, Facebook said it will likely notify “hundreds of millions” of Facebook Lite users, millions of Facebook users and tens of thousands of Instagram users that their passwords were stored in plain text. Facebook Lite is a version designed for people with older phones or low-speed internet connections. It is used primarily in developing countries. Last week, Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg touted a new “privacy-focused vision “ for the social network that would emphasize private communication over public sharing. The company wants to encourage small groups of people to carry on encrypted conversations that neither Facebook nor any other outsider can read. The fact that the company couldn’t manage to do something as simple as encrypting passwords, however, raises

questions about its ability to manage more complex encryption issues – such in messaging – flawlessly. Facebook said it discovered the problem in January. But security researcher Brian Krebs wrote that in some cases the passwords had been stored in plain text since 2012. Facebook Lite launched in 2015 and Facebook bought Instagram in 2012. Recorded Future’s Barysevich said he could not recall any major company caught leaving so many passwords exposed internally. He said he’s seen a number of instances where much smaller organizations made such information readily available – not just to programmers but also to customer support teams. Security analyst Troy Hunt, who runs the “haveibeenpwned.com” data breach website, said that the situation is embarrassing for Facebook, but that there’s no serious, practical impact unless an adversary gained access to the passwords. But Facebook has had major breaches, most recently in September when attackers accessed some 29 million accounts.

Jake Williams, president of Rendition Infosec, said storing passwords in plain text is “unfortunately more common than most of the industry talks about” and tends to happen when developers are trying to rid a system of bugs. He said the Facebook blog post suggests storing passwords in plain text may have been “a sanctioned practice,” although he said it’s also possible a “rogue development team” was to blame. Hunt and Krebs both likened Facebook’s failure to similar stumbles last year on a far smaller scale at Twitter and Github; the latter is a site where developers store code and track projects. In those cases, software bugs were blamed for accidentally storing plaintext passwords in internal logs. Facebook’s normal procedure for passwords is to store them encoded, the company noted Thursday in its blog post. That’s good to know, although Facebook engineers apparently added code that defeated the safeguard, said security researcher Rob Graham. “They have all the proper locks on the doors, but somebody left the window open,” he said. *Bajak reported from Boston.*

Tesla unveils Model Y SUV, expanding into popular segment

Tesla unveiled a new all-electric SUV on Thursday night that the automaker hopes will win over consumers looking for an all-electric alternative in the most popular segment of the auto market. Cheers from a hangar-packed crowd of Tesla customers, employees and members of the media welcomed a blue Model Y as it rolled out onto a stage next to the automaker’s other models. “It has the functionality of an SUV, but it will ride like a sports car,” CEO Elon Musk told the crowd. “This thing will be really tight on corners and we expect it will be the safest midsize SUV in the world by far.” The Model Y seats seven and has a panoramic glass roof and a 15-inch (38-centimeter) touchscreen interface for accessing all the car’s controls. The all-electric, mid-size SUV will start at \$39,000 for the standard range version, which the company said can go 230 miles (370 kilometers) on a single charge. The long-range model, which starts at \$47,000, has a

range of up to 300 miles (483 kilometers) on a single charge – less range than the Model 3. A dual-motor, all-wheel drive version of the Model Y starts at \$51,000 while the performance version of the car, which boasts acceleration of 0-60 mph (97 kph) in as little as 3.5 seconds and a top speed of up to 150 mph (241 kph), starts at \$60,000. The Model Y may be Tesla’s most important product yet as it attempts to expand into the mainstream and generate enough cash to repay massive debts that threaten to topple the Palo Alto, California, company. Tesla got a huge boost toward ensuring its survival with the 2017 debut of its Model 3 sedan, but an SUV could have even more mass appeal, given how popular SUVs have become in the U.S., Europe and Canada. The U.S. market share for SUVs, crossovers, vans and pickup trucks stood at 69 percent in January, up from just 48.5 percent a decade ago, according to the research firm IHS Markit. But most SUVs still run on gasoline, leaving Tesla to cater to consumers looking for an all-electric alternative. The Model Y’s main competition in

this still-nascent market is likely to be the Mercedes-Benz EQC, and to a lesser extent, the Jaguar I-Pace, according to the research firm LMC Automotive. “This could be Tesla’s most profitable vehicle, with the giant asterisk that the company doesn’t do some of the dumb things it has in the past,” said Gartner analyst Mike Ramsey. Many of Tesla’s past follies have been tied to Musk’s penchants for making grandiose promises that the company hasn’t been able to keep in terms of production, delivery and execution. Production of the Model 3 quickly fell behind schedule as Tesla struggled to come up with adequate manufacturing capacity and it took much longer than anticipated to lower the sedan’s starting price to the \$35,000 level that Musk had been promoting. Instead, the lowest priced version of the Model 3 had been selling for \$43,000 until a couple weeks ago when Tesla reached the promised price point by laying off thousands of workers and imposing other cost-cutting measures. Overseeing the ramp-up of Model 3’s production nearly drove Musk to exhaustion last year, a factor that may have contributed

to a mystifying pattern of behavior that included tweeting about having lined up the financing for a potential buyout of Tesla. That misleading statement jeopardized his job and resulted in a \$40 million settlement with stock market regulators. Tesla expects to deliver the performance, long range, rear-wheel drive and dual-motor, all-wheel drive versions of the Model Y in the fall of 2020. The standard version of the Model Y is expected to roll out in the spring of 2021. As with all electric vehicles, the distance that the Model Y can cover on a fully charged battery is likely to be one of its key selling points – or downsides. Tesla pegged the Model Y’s range at up to 300 miles compared to 325 miles for the Model 3. Tesla is hoping there will pent-up demand for the Model Y, nearly four years after Musk first began touting the company’s plans to make an SUV. Bringing in early down payments for the vehicles would help Tesla generate the cash it needs to repay nearly \$1.7 billion in loans that come due within the next 16 months. The company began the year with about \$11 billion in debt and

\$3.7 billion in cash, but those figures presumably fell recently when it repaid about \$920 million in bonds. Another \$566 million in notes are scheduled to be repaid this November followed a \$1.1 billion credit line in June 2020. Consumers who plop down their deposits for the Model Y may have to cross their fingers for their vehicles to be delivered on schedule. Tesla’s recurring production and delivery problems have resulted in consumers having to wait longer than they were originally told. Musk now says Tesla has worked out those issues. Ramsey, though, remains skeptical about whether the company will have adequate manufacturing capacity for the Model Y. He expects the Model Y’s journey to the mass market to provide another wild ride for the company, its investors and customers. “Until Elon is gone, Tesla is going to be a crazy company that occasionally makes breathtaking products,” Ramsey predicted. 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Apple refreshes iPad lineup, with larger entry-level model

Apple has unveiled a new iPad that's thinner and slightly larger than its current entry-level tablet.

The new iPad Air will cost \$499 and sport a screen that measures 10.5 inches diagonally. That compares with the standard, 9.7-inch iPad, which Apple will still sell for \$329.

Apple has higher-end Pro models starting at \$999. The new iPad Air has several features found in older Pro models, but not the latest. For instance, the iPad Air has a home button with a fingerprint

sensor, while the latest Pro ditches that to make more room for the screen.

Apple is also refreshing its 7.9-inch iPad Mini for the first time in more than three years.

In the past, Apple has sometimes used older chips in the Mini, saving the latest technology for the larger models instead. This time, the Mini will have the same chip as the Air, along with support for the Apple Pencil stylus. But the Mini won't have an optional keyboard attachment, unlike the new Air and Pro models.

The Mini will cost \$399, more expensive than the larger, but older 9.7-inch iPad.

For over 2500 years, the Chinese have observed Ching Ming (Qingming), also known as Tomb-Sweeping Day. The event is held on the 106th day after winter solstice and usually occurs on April 4 or April 5, with today's world of working families typically celebrating the weekend before. This ancient tradition is alive and well the Chapel of the Chimes Hayward, where families are invited to a Ching Ming event on Saturday, March 30 to clean gravesites, pray, and make ritual offerings of oranges, tea, dumplings and other food, as well as burn paper joss and incense.



As part of the Ching Ming event, the chapel will hold chanting and blessing; dragon dancers will wind their way around the grounds, occasionally tossing firecrackers to drive away evil spirits; monks will be driven in an open air truck, along with drummers; and complimentary lunch for families. 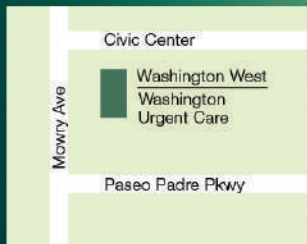

These clients love the ocean. It’s where they choose to spend their precious free time, and what they told me they wanted for their master bath makeover. Inspired by glass tile featuring a variety of beachy colors, they now have a bath that transports them to their favorite place. I created a little taste of the ocean in their suburban home.

The gorgeous greens and aqua blues present in the tile set the stage for the transformation. While the rugged California coastline is beautiful and inspiring, when I found the tile, it immediately made me think of a tropical oasis, which is the idea I chose to develop. I designed a “waterfall” of sorts, with the wide vertical stripe in the shower. I repeated the glass tile in the backsplash, to distribute the color to the other side of the

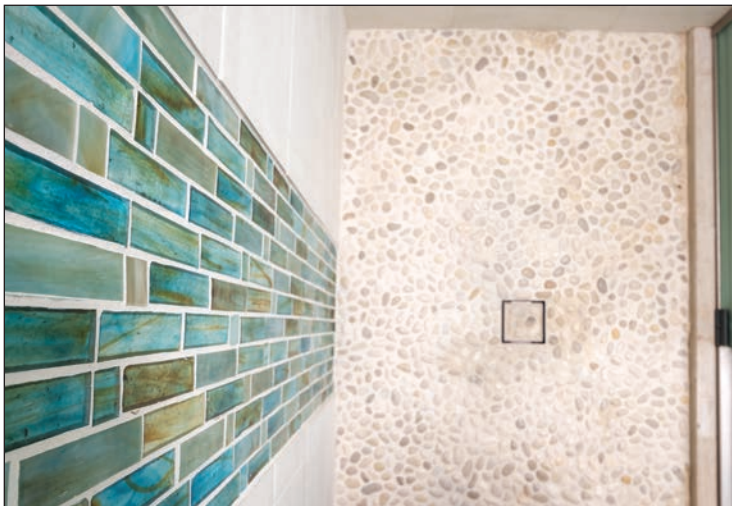

Not only does it successfully store their toiletries, but it also looks beautiful and unique. The cabinet knobs are made of blue-green glass. 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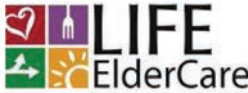


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Free Spring Concert showcases variety of music

Real Estate Notebook

What a difference a year makes.

The experience of buying and selling a home has changed in significant and surprising ways: buyers have more choices and time to decide and sellers need to be patient.

“If a buyer stepped out of the market sometime mid last year, stepping back in right now is going to look really different,” said Nancie Allen 2019, President of the Bay East Association of REALTORS® and Fremont resident.

The number of single-family detached homes listed for sale in the communities along the 880-corridor increased almost 60% in February 2019 compared with the same period last year. Last February there were 63 homes listed for sale in Fremont. That number increased to 107 this year. Newark jumped from 8 to 51 and Union City rose from 9 to 36.

Allen explained, “There are a lot more homes on the market. Buyers have many more choices and homes are staying on the market longer; something totally new to them if they were just doing this last year.”

Asked if these significant increases in homes for sale are driving down prices, Allen said, “Prices have dropped some but not an enormous amount.” She said more supply means more time for buyers to shop: “They are going to be able to take their time a bit more and look around and make an informed choice without the big rush we saw last year.”

Sellers expecting to get all they want may be in for a surprise. “If sellers are looking back to May or June of last year and thinking that’s where we’re at now, they are going to be a little disappointed,” Allen said. “We are not seeing the big rush to buy properties, so sellers need to be listening and working with their REALTORS®, to price their properties to get the most buyers through,” Allen said.

On average, a home for sale along the 880-corridor last February was on the market for 21 days. This February it was up to 29 days. While the number of sales in the region was virtually unchanged, prices dropped. The median sales price for a single-family home was down eight percent compared with last February.

Allen explained the impact sales prices have on how long a home is on the market. “If a seller prices their home too high, it’s going to sit on the market because nobody is going to look. The trend we see now is that if it’s priced too high, in two or three weeks we’re probably going to see a price reduction.”

Dramatic price increases and homes flying off the market have characterized local real estate markets for the last several years. A final difference the last year has made is an equally dramatic market condition because it’s so rare: balance.

Allen explained, “We’re in a market now where there is more inventory than last year but there’s still a lot of buyers out there. While homes may be sitting on the market for three or four weeks as opposed to three or four days, the properties are still selling for a good price. It’s still a healthy price for the seller, but not quite as high as it was before; buyers have a better chance of getting in at a price they can actually afford.”

Sarmiento. “It’s helped me so much in becoming a more independent student, prepared me for the realities of college, and I’ve made a lot of close friends.”

The College Connection program is open to high school seniors at any public high school in the Fremont and Newark Unified School Districts. Students must be in good academic standing and meet the program’s minimum GPA and academic requirements.

Trails Challenge – East Bay Regional Park District’s free, self-guided program to encourage exploring your regional parklands, is now well under way in its 27th year. Here’s how it works – download the Trails Challenge guidebook from the Park District website at www.ebparks.org or you can pick it up at a regional park visitor center, where you can also obtain a free Trails Challenge T-shirt while supplies last. With the help of guidebook, hike, bike or ride any five of the 20 listed trails, or complete 26.2 miles of trails. Then submit your trail log online or by mail by December 1 to receive a commemorative pin, again while supplies last.

Trails described in the guidebook are designed for all levels of fitness, from easy strolls to more challenging adventures. Many are disabled accessible. 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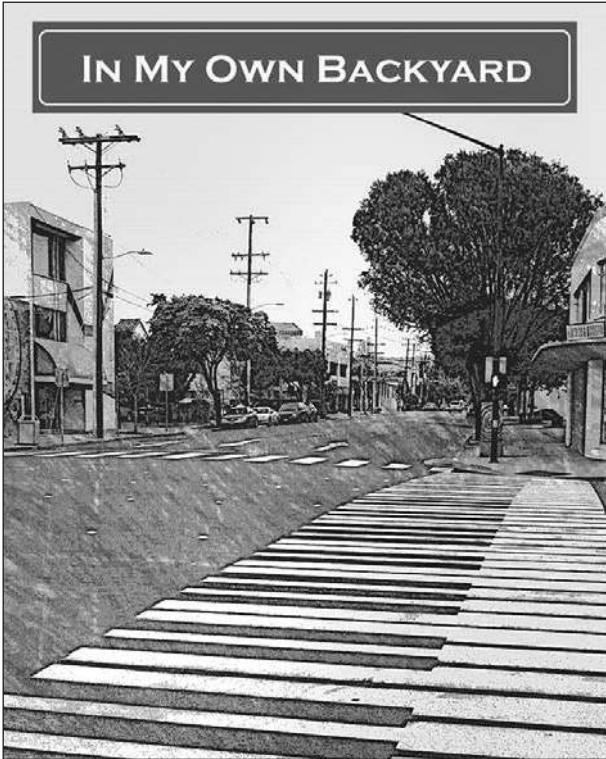
**New art gallery

The Hayward Arts Council (HAC) has expanded its influence into yet another gallery in Hayward. The 808 A Street Apartments is a new senior living complex filled with new residents and located right across from the Lucky supermarket at the corner of A Street and Mission Boulevard. Included in the lovely structure is a light-filled gallery space now curated by HAC.

The honor of being the first artists to display there has gone to digital artist Jeanne Bertolina, and wood sculptor Ken Bertelson.

Bertolina starts her pieces with photographs, then takes them into Photoshop on her computer to turn them into interesting compositions that elevate their subject matter. Her current show, "In My Own Backyard - Images of Hayward," features compositions made from photos of familiar landmarks all around town—from our three city

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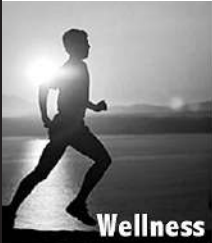

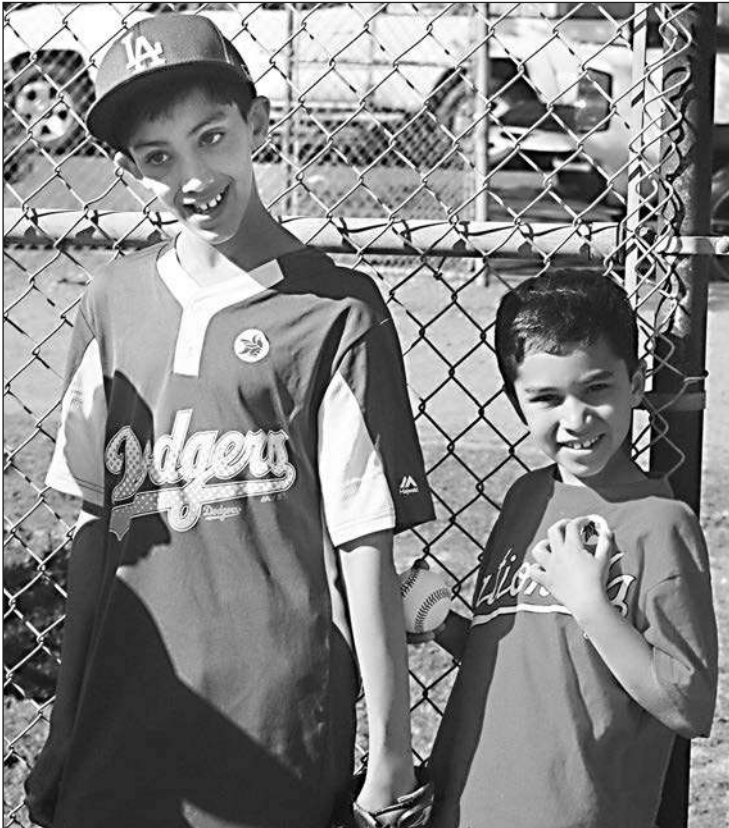

Friday, July 27, 2019 was a fateful day. We checked out of our accommodations in Zadar, Croatia and walked to the car to put our things away, planning to walk around a bit. About 20-30 minutes prior, Dilan, Jalen and I enjoyed chocolate croissants. My wife, Anu, and Dilan are allergic to tree nuts (strangely okay with peanuts), but at no time anything close to a serious reaction to them.

Unbeknownst to me, Dilan had complained to Anu that he was having difficulty breathing, saying that smoke was bothering him. She gave him his inhaler, but that didn't seem to work. Anu waived to me for help and I noticed that Dilan was partially slumped. As I tried to support him, I could feel his legs weaken and began looking for someone to get us to a hospital; Dilan's lips were turning blue; the situation was desperate.

After what felt like 10 years, but probably 5-10 minutes, the paramedics came and rushed him to the hospital. Zadar's Old Town, built in the 1400's with tiny streets, is not conducive to automobiles. Since we were on the edge of the town, the ambulance arrived quickly and, in another stroke of "luck", the hospital was only 1/2 mile away. I jumped into the ambulance with Dilan and we completed the short journey quickly.

Anu and Dilan's brother Jalen were given a ride to the hospital by a Good Samaritan. Before they arrived, one of the doctors pulled



me aside and cautioned, "you have to understand that he has no pulse and he is not breathing". Five or more minutes go by, not sure exactly how long, but I walked out and saw that they were cleaning up the room that he was in, and so I ask where is the boy that was in there; I'm asking people who don't speak any English. Finally, a doctor comes over. "So, you got his heart beating then?" Yes, they did. I wouldn't learn until later that they were successful in getting it beating, only to have it stop again, requiring a second resuscitation.

Dilan was put into a medical coma to help his body recover. After much debate, the medical professionals decided Dilan was stable enough to transfer to a children's hospital in Split, considered one of the best hospitals in the country. On Monday, they decided to extubate him and wake him. Within a few hours of his being extubated, he was breathing on his own without any supplementary oxygen, his heart was strong and his circulation was good.

Tuesday, they did an EEG and found, not surprisingly, a very low signal. Dilan appeared to nod to a couple of questions and try to move his fingers after I asked him to squeeze my hand. We still don't know if those actions occurred or it was wishful thinking. On Wednesday, they took an MRI of his brain and it showed quite a bit of damage throughout the

brain, consistent with an anoxic condition (total depletion of oxygen). The implication was that Dilan would remain in a persistent vegetative state.

Anu and I both agreed that we would talk to Dilan as if he could hear and understand every word that we said. On Thursday morning, I walked in while Anu was talking to multiple doctors, and began speaking to Dilan; he appeared to move his head and make contact with me. Over the course of the next couple of days, Dilan would give us small moments in which one of us would ask the other if they saw it as well. I told him a couple of really corny jokes and he laughed. We played videos of the kids and coaches on a team Dilan was going to be playing on wishing him well; Dilan smiled as he watched the video.

On Friday, Dilan was cleared to be transported home by air; he and Anu were scheduled to travel home on Monday, the tenth day after the medical emergency. Then, on Sunday, the nurses asked us to leave the room so that they could treat him for a minute. One of them came running out and blurted, "He said 'hi' and then a couple of more words." The nurses and doctors cried because they didn't believe it to be possible.

I am told that 100% recovery is still in the realm of possibility, but it is unknown. This will be a long hard road for him, and for us.

Ground broken for long-awaited LAX people mover system

It’s been talked about for years, and now construction is underway on a people mover to carry travelers in and out of Los Angeles International Airport.

City officials broke ground Thursday on the project which will finally give passengers an alternative to cars, shuttles and buses that now jam the upper and lower ring roads within the central terminal area.

Mayor Eric Garcetti called it historic, saying LAX travelers should have modern, reliable and timely public transportation.

The 21/4-mile (3.6-kilometer) system of automated trains will connect passengers to the terminals, external pick-up and drop-off locations and at long last the Los Angeles County Metro light rail system.

Developer LINXS will build and run the system under a 30-year, \$4.9 billion contract, the largest ever awarded by the city.

Santa Clara County supports bill requiring suicide prevention plans

The Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors is supporting a State Senate Bill that would require counties across California to develop a suicide prevention strategy focused on children age 18 and under. The board voted unanimously at the March 19 meeting to send a letter of support for State Senate Bill 331 introduced by Senator Melissa Hurtado and sponsored by Senator Jim Beall and Assemblymember Marc Levine. Only six other counties have adopted suicide prevention plans: Contra Costa, Fresno, San Diego, San Mateo, Solano and Tuolumne.

“We’ve seen the success of Santa Clara County’s suicide prevention plan, and we want to send the message that all counties need to be following our lead,” said Supervisor Dave Cortese.

“Suicide prevention doesn’t just happen,” Vic Ojakian, co-chairman of Santa Clara County Suicide Prevention Advisory

- Committee, said in an interview. “And it’s a public safety issue as much as it is a public health issue. We all need to be involved. There needs to be a concerted effort by many people, especially our government.”
- Features of Santa Clara County’s plan include:**
- Running crisis intervention services, such as the Suicide and Crisis Hotline.
 - Running public education and outreach campaigns to encourage people to seek help when they need it.
 - Promoting safe and effective messaging and reporting in the media.
 - Training community members to identify and support others who are in crisis.
 - Working with County schools to strengthen suicide crisis response and prevention.
 - Implementing policies that are supportive of suicide prevention.
 - Collecting data and evaluating activities to monitor and strengthen program efforts.

Asked to perform endlessly without reward, her frank and direct criticism is easily translatable to many tasks done under extreme stress or poor work conditions. Lili complains to an understanding audience of cowboys...

I'm tired
Tired of playing the game
Ain't it a crying shame
I'm so tired

Tired people do not always make good decisions. There are professions - elite combat units, police, fire, trauma specialists, hostage negotiators, etc. - that demand decisive action in abnormal circumstances. Those expected to perform under brutal conditions are typically trained to endure and respond in a controlled, rational manner even as chaos reigns around them. Few, if any candidates for these professions, unable to contain erratic behavior under such trying circumstances, are allowed to continue training regimens. Even highly skilled individuals with extraordinary personal reserves can make mistakes when pushed beyond their physical and/or psychological limit. The rest of us, including city councilmembers, probably have a much lower tolerance.

In the Fremont City Council meeting of March 19, 2019, the primary public controversy on the agenda was consideration of a mixed-use project

proposed by Silicon Sage for a significant portion of the Centerville District. Arguments initially centered on a split decision about retention of the old firehouse on Fremont Boulevard. The Historical Architectural Review Board voted to keep the structure while Planning Commissioners voted to allow demolition.

With a large crowd and 60 speakers, the meeting, preceded by an earlier council work session on the Capital Improvement Program, was lengthy. A group of residents patiently waited to discuss a paving/restriping controversy on Rancho Arroyo Parkway. Following almost three hours of the regular council meeting, the developer and public speakers - pro and con – had spoken. It was time to hear councilmember comments. Council chambers were tense as a decision was nearing on this significant development. Valid arguments had been presented for both sides of the controversy surrounding the firehouse and questions about the composition and location of design elements surfaced as well. Concessions were made to include streetscape improvements and memorializing recently deceased former Fremont Fire Chief and Planning Commissioner Daniel Lydon. The impact of train whistle sounds would also emerge as a consideration.

However, through all of the earnest debate, a statement by Councilmember Vinnie Bacon as the regular council meeting closed in on three hours (four hours if the work session time is included) was a definite indication of frayed edges. Prefacing his comments by saying, "There is no easy way for me to say this," a tirade followed castigating the developer who "has gone to our youth and said we must destroy history in order for you to have a place to hang out." The implication was clear that the councilmember was convinced that youth who came to the council meeting on a

school night were unable to form their own opinions and had been misled "to speak like this... I am appalled!"

Both implied and explicit in his following statement, Bacon said that students had been coerced to support demolition of the firehouse. He admonished the developer saying, "Don't make them say we must destroy history to get there." It is interesting that the same admonition was not directed to adults in the audience even though there were many speakers who expressed the same opinion. Why are our youth, who take time to attend a council session late on a school night, to express an opinion, not worthy of the same deference accorded to others?

Resident involvement, no matter what age, in issues of civic responsibility should be applauded and encouraged. Honest disagreement can be debated and a lesson learned about the value of reasonable discourse and convincing through logic rather than moral outrage when someone does not agree with you. Although it may be impossible to accurately predict the length of council meetings when a "hot" topic arises, long meetings are inevitable. However, important decisions and dialogue depend on clear, rational thought and action. Not only does this apply to city council meetings, but other managing boards as well (school boards, are you listening?). Is it better to reach a decision in the fog of fatigue or examine time management practices and reserve judgement for another session with alert, informed council/board members?

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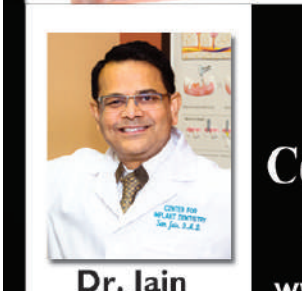
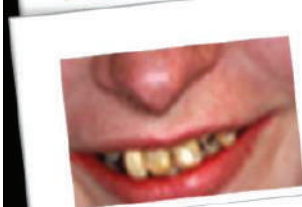

Felon with assault rifle nabbed by police

A call to police from a downtown San Leandro business about a customer attempting to use a fraudulent credit card turned out to be a bigger case than police initially anticipated.

During the afternoon of Monday, March 18 officers arrived at the paint store and began talking to a woman that employees

suspected of trying to use a fraudulent credit. Also present was the woman's boyfriend, later identified by police as Daniel Lamar, 30, of Oakland.

A check by officers showed that Lamar was on probation for a previous firearm violation. During the investigation, officers searched Lamar's vehicle and found a loaded subcompact assault rifle with a "banana" style high capacity magazine. The weapon was loaded with 39 rounds of ammunition.

Lamar is a convicted felon with a criminal history in four counties that include Los Angeles, Stanislaus, Sacramento, and Alameda. Lamar is currently on probation for a weapons-related arrest last year in Alameda County.

"The weapon that was located by our officers is capable of causing serious harm," said San Leandro Police Lieutenant Isaac Benabou. "This is a weapon designed for war, but yet found in the possession of a convicted felon in our community. Thankfully it has been taken out of the hands of a dangerous individual."

The Alameda County District Attorney charged Daniel Lamar with three felony crimes and one enhancement charge. Lamar remains in custody at Santa Rita Jail in Dublin. The woman involved in the case was not arrested as the business declined to press charges.

He showed signs of intoxication and was arrested on various charges including felony hit and run with injury and DUI. Murder charges were later filed by the Alameda County District Attorney. Martinez remains in custody and an investigation is continuing.

• At 8:23 p.m. officers were dispatched to a fight and injury collision on Mission Boulevard, near Nursery Avenue in the Niles Area. Several callers reported an argument and fight involving three people in the roadway. Arriving officers found a large collision scene and a badly beaten and unconscious male lying on the sidewalk. The man was taken to a trauma center with visible head injuries. Officers learned the drivers of two vehicles became involved in a road rage incident and two vehicles crashed. After stopping, two men (a father and son) exited their vehicle and beat the driver of the other vehicle. The two men, ages 52 and 21, were both arrested and booked at Santa Rita jail on suspicion of felony assault.

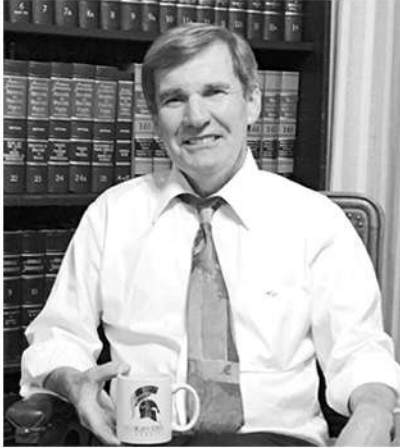

Police chief responds to report about purged records

Following recent media reports that the Fremont Police Department purged confidential records before a new law making them open to public scrutiny went into effect, Police Chief Kimberly Petersen issued a public response on March 20 clarifying how the department manages its records.

The law, Senate Bill 1421, allows public access to previously confidential police use-of force records or cases of sexual assault or dishonesty by officers. The measure was signed by Governor Brown in September 2018 and went into effect on Jan. 1, 2019

Here is the chief's response:

Earlier this week, it was reported that the Fremont Police Department destroyed records in bulk dating back to the 1970s. The tone of the report represented the department as trying to “hide decades of police misconduct records.” As follow up, I'd like to provide context and clarity to our business practices regarding records management.

First and foremost, the Fremont Police Department is grateful for the partnership and trust we have with our community. For the last several years, our agency has increased

transparency through formal public information/communications and making ourselves available to our community through expanded community engagement programs.

It is standard practice for government agencies to purge records in accordance with internal policies, as well as State and Federal laws. Record retention policies are approved and set by the City Council and available to the public. As a standard business practice, our department regularly reviews and updates our records management policies and we routinely purge Police Department records based on the council approved retention schedule, including internal affairs documents.

In 2015, the department initiated a review of the records we had in our possession, including but not limited to

police reports, personnel records, digital evidence, officer involved shootings and internal affairs investigations. This was in direct response to storage and space issues and the desire to have a business model and policy consistent with state law.

Additionally, with the recent adoption of body-worn cameras, community video and new technology, we are dealing with an enormous amount of digital records, requiring costly storage. This project predated Senate Bill 1421, which was not proposed as legislation until February, 2018, and signed in September, 2018.

In 2017 and again in 2018, we recommended modifications to our retention policy using state law as a baseline to bring consistency to our records management program. These amendments affected various types of documents but did not change the retention schedule for citizen complaints or internal affairs investigations. None of the amendments made were in response to SB 1421 or any other legislative changes. All records purged before and after the amendments were approved by the city attorney and done in compliance with federal and state laws.

As reported by the media, during our clean-up we did locate a handful of old records dating back to the 70s, 80s and 90s. These cases were all adjudicated and they were not responsive to

SB 1421. In addition, purging of these records would have been compliant with policy and law prior to the 2017 and 2018 retention schedule updates.

Senate Bill 1421 requires that files be made available to the public in the following four instances:

- 1) An incident involving the discharge of a firearm at a person by a peace officer;
- 2) An incident in which the use of force by a peace officer against a person resulted in death, or in great bodily injury;
- 3) Any record relating to an incident in which a sustained finding was made that a peace officer engaged in sexual assault involving a member of the public; and
- 4) Any record relating to an incident in which a sustained finding of dishonesty by a peace officer directly relating to the reporting, investigation, or prosecution of a crime, or directly relating to the reporting of, or investigation of misconduct by, another peace officer or custodial officer, including, but not limited to, any sustained finding of perjury, false statements, filing false reports, destruction, falsifying, or concealing of evidence.

All other internal affairs investigations or personnel records remain confidential files under current law. This was not a case where decades of police officer misconduct files were all

destroyed at the same time. The vast majority of records from the 70s-90s time period were purged years ago in accordance with our retention policy.

Since learning SB 1421 and AB 748 were signed, my staff immediately began working to first identify responsive records, and second, determine the staff and technological resources required to comply with the new state law. Several measures, including a new Digital Records Unit, expansion of our public information program, and a new transparency portal on our web-site are being put into place to comply with these laws.

Since January, the city has received approximately 17 public records act requests in accordance with SB 1421. The city immediately provided preliminary information and responses to many of the requests and intends to begin to providing additional responses to these requests at the end of this week.

The new Transparency Portal (www.fremontpolice.org/transparency) on our website currently includes press releases and will soon be updated with investigative summaries, and audio/video related to officer involved shootings and incidents of public concern responsive to new legislation.

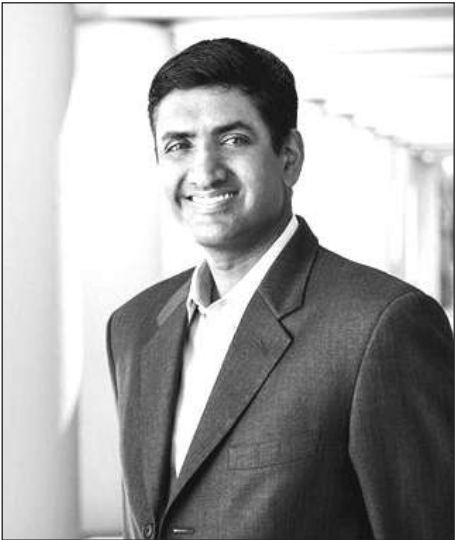

Khanna's office is one of the best in Congress,” said Bradford Fitch, President and CEO of the Congressional Management Foundation. “This designation demonstrates that Rep. Khanna has made a significant commitment to being the best public servant for his constituents in California. Rep. Khanna and his staff are to be congratulated for not only being a model for colleagues in Congress, but for helping to restore trust and faith that our democratic institutions can work,” he added.

The Office of Rep. Khanna was one of four congressional offices across both chambers of Congress to receive this honor. P.E.O.—Helping Women through Scholarships for 150 Years

Who knew about the treasure trove of funds available through an organization with two active chapters right here in Fremont?

That is P.E.O. (Philanthropic Educational Organization) International, celebrating 150 years of “women helping women reach for the stars.” Those “stars” translate into hundreds of scholarships for women every year, offered in a wide array of fields, including licensing programs from accredited institutions, and at undergraduate and graduate levels. P.E.O.’s 5,874 chapters in the U.S. and Canada raise funds through many creative means, publicizing these opportunities mainly through word of mouth.

Three major scholarships are offered at the international level, along with a 2% interest Educational Loan Fund. The international funds require recommendation from a local chapter. For most of the P.E.O. California funds, however, an applicant simply fills out a single online application at peocalifornia.org and checks off the funds for which she is applying, with no chapter recommendation required.

Reading the list of California P.E.O.’s hundreds of scholarships is like discovering a gold mine, just waiting for more of our local area women to mine the bonanza. Fremont’s two P.E.O. chapters, the daytime UF and the nighttime RJ, are eager to help more women benefit from these abundant opportunities. Rather than waiting for word of mouth, applicants may research the peocalifornia.org or peointernational.org websites on their own before taking the next step, if necessary, to contact a chapter for more information or a recommendation.

Minimum age for applying is 18, except for the very special STAR Scholarship. ALERT for 11th grade girls:

The STAR Scholarship, awarded to high school seniors, is celebrating its first decade of “Recognizing Young Women of Stellar Achievement.” In the spring, our two local chapters begin the annual search for the most promising 11th grade girl scholars from Fremont’s five public high schools. Applicants have until the end of June to prepare lists of their extracurricular and community service activities and their honors and awards, to complete an essay, and to find two mentors to write recommendations. In September, we interview the top applicants, based on the paperwork submitted, and select two girls to nominate, one from each of our respective chapters. When we have a close runner up, we find a nearby chapter to nominate that third girl. Although their online submissions are entered into a pool of thousands of girls from throughout Canada and the United States, our chapters’ candidates have won a phenomenal six scholarships in the past three years. We set the bar at a 3.5+ GPA and generally expect applicants to have completed the 40 hours of community service required for graduation.

Information will be available in all Fremont high schools’ College and Career Centers and posted on their websites on April 8. Email wordsmitt65@gmail.com for the application materials.

Mars the Wanderer

April’s skies find Mars traveling between star clusters after sunset, and a great gathering of planets just before sunrise. Mars shows stargazers exactly what the term “planet” originally meant with its rapid movement across the evening sky this month. The ancient Greeks used the term “planete,” meaning wanderer, to label the bright star-like objects that travelled between the constellations of the zodiac year after year.

You can watch Mars as it wanders through the sky throughout April, visible in the west for several hours after sunset. Mars travels past two of the most famous star clusters in our night sky: Pleiades and Hyades. Look for the red planet next to the tiny but bright Pleiades on April 1. By the second week in April, it has moved eastward in Taurus toward the larger V-shaped Hyades. Red Mars appears to the right of the slightly brighter red-orange star Aldebaran on April 11. We see only the brightest stars in these clusters with our unaided eyes; how many additional stars can you observe through binoculars?

Open clusters are made up of young stars born from the same “star nursery” of gas and dust. These two open clusters are roughly similar in size. The Pleiades appears much smaller as they are 444 light years away, roughly three times the distance of the Hyades, at 151 light years distant. Aldebaran is in the same line of sight as the Hyades but is not a member of the cluster; it shines just 65 light years away. By comparison, Mars is practically next door to us, this month just a mere 18 light minutes from Earth – that’s about almost 200 million miles. Think of the difference between how long it takes the light to travel from these bodies: 18 minutes vs. 65 years!

The rest of the bright planets rise before dawn, in a loose lineup starting from just above the eastern horizon to high above the south: Mercury, Venus, Saturn, and Jupiter. Watch April as the apparent gap widens considerably between the gas giants and terrestrial planets. Mercury hugs the horizon all month, with Venus racing down morning after morning to join its dimmer inner solar system companion right before sunrise. In contrast, the giants Jupiter and Saturn move away from the horizon and rise earlier all month long, with Jupiter rising before midnight by the end of April. The Lyrids meteor shower peaks on April 22, but sadly all but the brightest meteors will be washed out by the light of a bright gibbous Moon. Dear EarthTalk: What is a low-carbon diet and is it good for losing weight or is it only about saving the planet?

Not to be confused with a “low-carb” diet, which involves avoiding carbohydrates (bread, rice, pasta) as a way to lose weight or keep it off, a low-carbon diet — whereby you limit foods that generate a lot of carbon (CO2) emissions in their production and distribution is indeed more about reducing your carbon footprint than your waistline. That said, proponents of a low-carbon diet say that eating with reduced greenhouse gas emissions in mind is healthier for us than the typical American diet whereby carbon-intensive meat, dairy and processed foods occupy too large a share of our overall food intake.

A recent study from the University of Michigan Center for Sustainable Systems backs up these assertions. Researchers correlated data from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey — a snapshot of what 16,000 Americans consumed over one 24-hour period — with information on the nutritional value and greenhouse gas impacts of different food items, concluding that the better a diet is for the planet, the better it is for our health. Furthermore, the 20 percent of Americans who eat what researchers consider a “high-carbon” diet (rich in red meat, dairy and exotic and processed foods) are responsible for almost half of the nation’s food-related CO2 emissions. The upshot is that changing the behavior and food choices of this small segment of the population could pay big dividends for public health and for reducing our overall national carbon footprint.

The concept of a low-carbon diet was first popularized in the U.S. by Bon Appétit Management Company, which runs more than 1,000 cafés in 33 states for corporations, universities and venues. Back in 2007, the company partnered with the non-profit Ecotrust to compile and conduct Life Cycle Assessments (LCAs) — measuring the amount of CO2 emitted during a given food product’s entire life cycle — for thousands of different foods. These LCAs became the basis for the “Food Scores” section of its EatLowCarbon.org website, which provides information to help people reduce their carbon footprints through food choices.

Besides launching EatLowCarbon.org, Bon Appétit’s managers also embarked on a five-year internal campaign to ratchet down the emissions generated by the company’s own operations and offerings by 25 percent. The company stopped buying air-freighted seafood, reduced its use of tropical fruit by half, shrank beef purchases by 33 percent and cheese by 10 percent while cutting food waste by one-third. Overall these moves shaved some five million pounds of carbon emissions per month off Bon Appétit’s contribution to global warming.

The fact that food and the systems to produce and distribute it are responsible for about a third of all greenhouse gas emissions means that everyone has a lot of potential for fighting global warming through sourcing locally produced and in-season foods to minimize emissions-intensive ‘food miles’, buying only as much as we can eat to reduce waste, and minimizing consumption of red meat, dairy and processed foods. In the case of climate change, if we don’t watch what we eat, it could really come back to haunt us.
