Celebrating Scottish Heritage

Pipes, kilts, haggis and all things Scotland are here! Celebrating culture and heritage has a universal spirit to it, and Scottish heritage or not, "Tartan Day Scottish Faire" provides an opportunity to experience and appreciate the vast cultural diversity in the Bay Area. Hosted by the East Bay Scottish Association (EBSA) with the support of the East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD), Tartan Day at Ardenwood Historic Farm in Fremont is a fun-filled family event.

Tartan Day marks the declaration of Scottish independence from England during the reign of king Edward I. The Declaration of Arbroath was signed in 1320 and was submitted to Pope John XXII. It intended to confirm Scotland's status as an independent, sovereign state, defending Scotland's right to use military action when unjustly attacked.

National Tartan Day started in New York City in 1982 and is observed in the U.S. on April 6th each year. It commemorates the Scottish Declaration of Independence and recognizes contributions and achievements of Scottish Americans.

Newark was the first city in California to proclaim April 6th as Tartan Day in 1996. On April 5, 1997, EBSA, previously known as the Tri-Cities Scottish Association of California, celebrated their first Tartan Day Family Gathering at Ardenwood Historic Farm. This event was one of the first large-scale Tartan Day events in the country.

EBSA is an organization that takes pride in celebrating the rich culture of Scotland through events like Tartan Day Scottish Faire. The event on Saturday, April 6 will showcase Scottish dancing, music, historical re-enactments, bagpipes, and handmade crafts. The Highland Games season kicks off that day too. Local Scottish clans and societies will showcase their rich culture and vibrant heritage. Visitors to the faire will be enthralled with a variety of activities such as Vikings' demonstration of their weapons, learning how wool was dyed and spun into fabric, and taking a history trip to Scotland in 16th century to meet Mary, Queen of Scots, and her court.

Washington Hospital Hosts Fun-filled Educational Event

Want to know how you can improve the environment? Celebrate Earth Day this year by learning how to reduce your footprint at Washington Hospital's free, fun-filled Go Green event that includes educational activities, informational exhibits and booths, games, food and entertainment for the entire family.

Go Green will be held Saturday, April 20, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Conrad E. Anderson, MD, Auditorium, 2500 Mowry Ave. (Washington West), in Fremont. The annual Earth Day celebration is open to the entire community and is co-sponsored by the City of Fremont.

"We recognize the critical link between the health of each individual and the health of our environment," said Paul Kelley, Washington Hospital's director of Biomedical Engineering and green initiatives. "It really starts with the Hippocratic oath to do no harm. Pollutants can harm our planet and our health. We need to have a clean, healthy environment so individuals can enjoy better health."

Hands-on Activities

The day will feature a range of educational activities and interactive exhibits where participants can learn about recycling and waste reduction, home energy savings, local sustainability programs,

composting and healthy eating. There are fun activities planned for the kids, including a bike rodeo, face painting, games, and Earth Day art.

While there has been an abundance of rain this year, that's not always the case in California.

This year, the event will include information about ways to reduce water usage. Shreya Ramachandran of The Grey Water Project will be on hand to explain how you can reuse water. The 14-year-old Fremont resident was named a winner of

the 2018 Gloria Barron Prize for Young Heroes, which honors young people from across the U.S. and Canada who have made a significant impact on the environment.

The popular Mobile Climate Science Lab will be back this year. The exhibit offers activities and hands-on demonstrations for people of all ages that show the effects of climate change.

Getting out of your car and onto a bicycle is a great way to reduce your carbon footprint. Bicycle valet parking and free bike tuneups will be available, making it easier to ride your bike to the event.

"We're also excited that the Fremont Police Department will have their Tesla patrol car on display," Kelley added. "It's one of the first electric police cars in the country."

Food Trucks

If you work up an appetite, food trucks will be on-site with a variety of dining options, including Rita's frozen custard and chicken and waffles. Those

Local Sports Medicine Physician Cares for March Madness Players

As basketball fans across the nation are enthralled with March Madness, a Fremont physician plays an important role in the tournament—from a seat behind the players' bench.

Russell Nord, MD, medical director of Sports Medicine for Washington Hospital, served as one of two conference physicians for the West Coast Conference Men's and Women's NCAA Basketball Championships for the eighth consecutive year.

March Madness is far from Dr. Nord's first experience treating high-level athletes. He served as team physician for the Stanford football team while completing his fellowship in sports medicine at the university and also provided orthopedic care for the San Francisco 49ers.

Dr. Nord enjoys the excitement of high-level

athletics and the spirit of good sportsmanship that typically accompanies the competitions. "In high-level sports, the coaches, athletic trainers and players have respect for each other, even when they're opponents," he explains. As for his years working at March Madness, he describes a camaraderie among all those who care for the players. "It's a very nice dynamic that has developed over the years—the coaches, trainers, doctors (orthopedic and primary care physicians) have become friendly acquaintances. We're all rowing in the same direction; we all want to take care of the players. It's a very collegial atmosphere."

Dr. Nord explains that even when a player on the opposite team is hurt, if necessary, all medical personnel take immediate action to help

them, regardless of their team affiliation. "When someone gets hurt, everyone jumps in to assist," he notes.

As an orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Nord takes primary responsibility for athletes who didn't travel with their own team physicians. In addition, he is often called upon to confer with team physicians and give his insights from an orthopedic perspective. "I frequently lend a hand if one of the teams doesn't specifically have an orthopedic physician at the game. Even if

they do, it can sometimes be helpful to have two sets of hands available," he says.

Dr. Nord says there is a strong connection between college-level sports and high school athletics. Washington Hospital sponsors athletic trainers at several local high schools in the Tri-City Area. "We have the same sorts of discussions with the athletic trainers at high school games as at the college level. Do we take the player out of the game? Do we send him or her to the clinic or for X-rays? The

decisions, the calculus we use, are driven by the same general principles," he says. "It's all about keeping players safe, acknowledging when they need to sit out due to injury while also ensuring that they aren't excluded from play unnecessarily. In the end, that's how we keep our young athletes in the game."

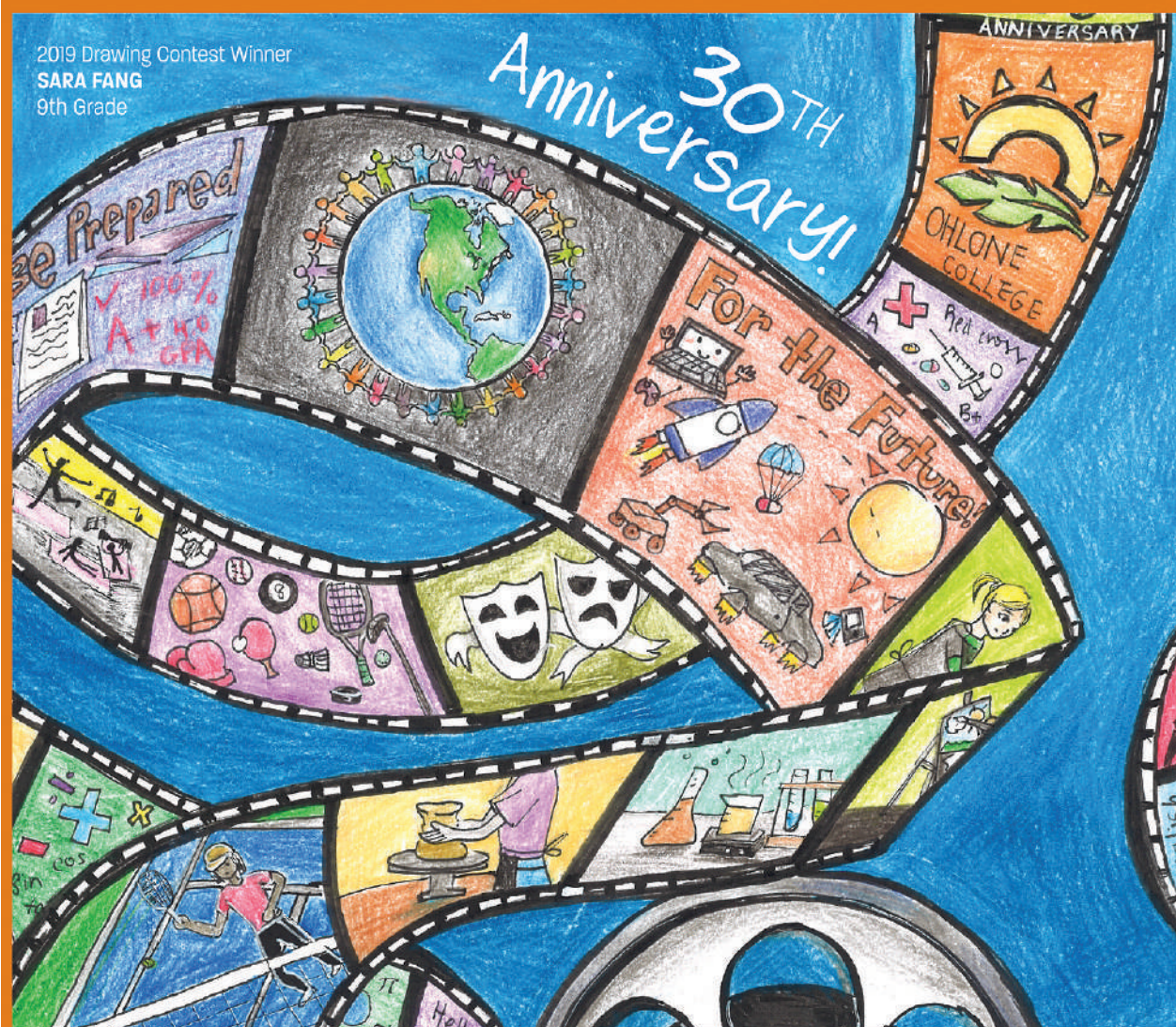

who sign up for the Bay Area Air Quality Management District's Spare the Air Program will get free chicken and waffles. Spare the Air can help you find ways to avoid driving alone to work, including carpooling and apps that get you out of your car.

You can learn more about your impact on the environment by playing an interactive Jeopardy-style game at

Washington Hospital's booth. The Hospital will also provide information about its green initiatives, as well as tips on healthy eating and food samples.

"We are always looking for ways to reduce our environmental impact at Washington Hospital," Kelley explained. "We have received several awards from Practice Greenhealth over the years, the

nation's leading organization dedicated to environmental sustainability in health care."

Free Disposal and Shredding

"Protecting the environment also means being careful how you dispose of certain items," Kelley added. "We don't want discarded medications to end up in the landfill or flushed down the toilet."

You can drop off unused and unwanted medications, used syringes and needles (in approved containers), and mercury thermometers at the Go Green event. In addition, document shredding will be provided so you can get rid of old confidential documents. If you have eyeglasses you don't need, organizers will be collecting those as well. They will be donated to the Lions Club Recycle for Sight program,

which helps prevent blindness and restore eyesight around the world.

ReCARES will also be on hand this year to provide information about getting rid of used medical equipment. The organization collects and redistributes donations of clean, gently used medical equipment and unused home health care supplies.

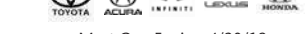

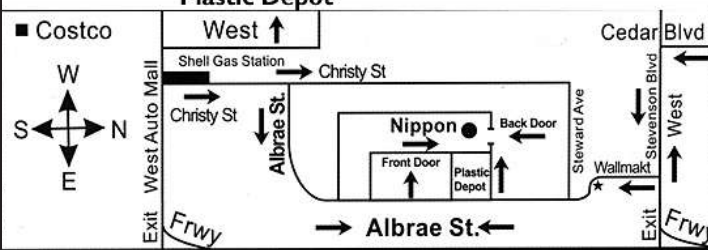

Kaiser Permanente workers eager to resume negotiations

More than 85,000 healthcare workers across the U.S. are mobilizing as contract negotiations get under way with Kaiser Permanente, after the healthcare giant recently agreed to drop a ban on employees' speaking out on patient care issues and engaging in political activity as a condition to start bargaining. Coalition of Kaiser Permanente Union (CKPU) workers from across the country are eager to resume contract negotiations.

"We are eager to continue our partnership with Kaiser Permanente to strengthen patient care at its facilities throughout the country, but not under the conditions they demanded that would have put patients and caregivers at risk," said Tamara R. Rubyn, secretary treasurer of the Coalition of Kaiser Permanente Unions. "We're thankful to have resolved this impasse and look forward to resuming

negotiations and ultimately securing a new national agreement for Kaiser workers."

Bargaining sessions will be held April 17 through April 19 between the company and the Coalition of Kaiser Permanente Unions, which comprises 11 labor unions in California, Oregon, Washington, Colorado, Hawaii, Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia. The coalition's national agreement with Kaiser Permanente expired Sept. 30, 2018.

The coalition filed a complaint in May 2018 with the National Labor Relations Board over Kaiser's refusal to bargain. Workers said that Kaiser's proposed ban on employees speaking out about patient care issues or taking action against the company through ballot initiatives, legislation or other public campaigns, violated federal law. The board issued charges against Kaiser, and a hearing on the complaint is scheduled for April 22.

Shape Our Fremont DEVELOPERS TARGET MISSION SAN JOSE

The list of developers who want to build more houses in the heart of Mission San Jose is growing larger, and so is the number of houses. At the last count, there are four proposals to add 324 new housing units in the Town Center. These units would range from apartments to custom homes in two-, three-, and even four-story buildings – all within a few hundred yards of the historic Mission.

Four Proposals

The largest proposal is from Ohlone College, which has signed a 99-year land lease with SteelWave LLC to build 275 two-story rental apartment/townhouse units and 6,500 square feet of commercial space across the frontage on Mission Boulevard. As the first step, the college has submitted a General Plan Amendment Screening Request asking Fremont to consider changing the land use designation from Public Facility to a mix of Residential and Commercial. The Fremont Planning Commission has deferred hearing that request until an independent Mission San Jose Commercial Study is complete and has been presented in May. In the meantime, residents are encouraged to email their comments on the Ohlone Frontage proposal to City Staff Planner Bill Roth at broth@fremont.gov.

The second proposal is Mission Paradise from Green Globe, which wants to build a mixed-use project with 14 townhouses, six flats, and 5,470 square feet of commercial space in several three-story buildings on the southwest corner of Washington Boulevard and Ellsworth Street. All the existing buildings on the site would be demolished. This proposal has gone through a Preliminary Review Procedure by the Fremont Planning Department and is now going through a more detailed review as a Formal Application. Public input is welcome. To express your comments and questions about the Mission Paradise proposal, email City Staff Planner Mark Hungerford at mhungerford@fremont.gov.

The third proposal is Ellsworth Villas from WRD Green Inc, which recently submitted a request to build 18 townhouses, five flats, and 3,465 square feet of commercial space in several three- and four-story buildings

on the property occupied by the vacant McIvors Hardware store on Ellsworth Street. The store and parking lots would be demolished, but the two existing properties on Mission Boulevard would remain, as would the open plaza area between them. This proposal is currently undergoing a preliminary review procedure by the Fremont Planning Department, and public input is welcome. To express your comments and questions about the Ellsworth Villas proposal, email City Staff Planner Terry Wong at twong@fremont.gov.

Finally, the smallest of the four proposals would subdivide several parcels on Witherley Lane into eight lots. Two existing houses would remain on a portion of their lots, and the remainder of the land would be divided to form six additional lots for custom single-family homes. This proposal has undergone a preliminary review procedure. Public input is still welcome. To express your comments and questions about the Wang Lot Subdivision proposal, email City Staff Planner Mark Hungerford at mhungerford@fremont.gov.

Get Involved

Before any of these proposals are presented for a final decision, Fremont residents need to get involved. Will more homes mean more benefits to the community or will they just mean more problems? What will the impact be on traffic, schools, businesses, and the quality of life in the area? Are mixed-use projects, with a little commercial space surrounded by a lot of residential space, an appropriate fit for the Mission San Jose business district? And do three- and four-story townhouses belong anywhere in the Mission San Jose Historic Overlay District?

Residents often have unique experiences and perspectives that apply to specific developments, and their comments are every bit as valuable in the decision process as those from professional consultants and staff. Individual emails on each separate proposal are the most effective way to communicate comments and concerns. All correspondence will be forwarded to the Planning Commission and City Council to consider in making their decisions. Facebook extends ban on hate speech to ‘white nationalists’

Facebook is extending its ban on hate speech to prohibit the promotion and support of white nationalism and white separatism. The company previously allowed such material even though it has long banned white supremacists. The social network said Wednesday that it didn't apply the ban previously to expressions of white nationalism because it linked such expressions with broader concepts of nationalism and separatism – such as American pride or Basque separatism (which are still allowed). But civil rights groups and academics called this view “misguided” and have long pressured the company to change its stance. Facebook said it concluded after months of “conversations” with them that white nationalism and separatism

cannot be meaningfully separated from white supremacy and organized hate groups. Critics have “raised these issues to the highest levels at Facebook (and held) a number of working meetings with their staff as we’ve tried to get them to the right place,” said Kristen Clarke, president and executive director of the Lawyers’ Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, a Washington, D.C.-based legal advocacy group. “This is long overdue as the country continues to deal with the grip of hate and the increase in violent white supremacy,” she said. “We need the tech sector to do its part to combat these efforts.” Though Facebook said it has been working on the change for three months, it comes less than two weeks after Facebook received widespread criticism after the suspect in shootings at two New Zealand mosques that killed

49 people was able to broadcast the massacre on live video on Facebook. As part of the change, people who search for terms associated with white supremacy will be directed to a group called Life After Hate, which was founded by former extremists who want to help people leave the violent far-right. Clarke called the idea that white supremacism is different than white nationalism or white separatism a misguided “distinction without a difference.” She said the New Zealand attack was a “powerful reminder about why we need the tech sector to do more to stamp out the conduct and activity of violent white supremacists.” Associated Press Writer Michael Kunzelman in College Park, Maryland, contributed to this story.

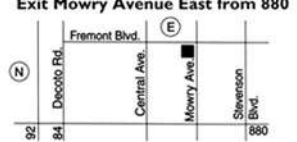

California Supreme Court justice blasts death penalty system

The death penalty system in the nation’s most populous state is dysfunctional and expensive, and a ballot measure approved by voters to speed up executions will not make it “workable,” a California Supreme Court justice said Thursday in an unusual opinion.

Associate Justice Goodwin Liu made the comments after joining the rest of the court to unanimously uphold the death sentence of Thomas Potts, who was convicted of killing an elderly couple in 1997.

But Liu wrote separately to express his concerns about the state of the death penalty system in California and Proposition 66, a 2016 ballot measure that aimed to remove regulatory hurdles to executions.

The measure, however, did not enact the “key reforms that leading authorities consider fundamental to a workable death penalty system,” Liu wrote in the opinion, which Associate Justice Mariano Florentino-Cuellar joined. Former Democratic Gov. Jerry Brown appointed both justices.

The measure did not reduce the back up of death penalty appeals at the state Supreme Court or provide additional resources to provide inmates with qualified attorneys or allow courts to expedite capital cases, Liu said.

“In these respects, Proposition 66 promised more than the system can deliver,” he said.

He later added that “the promise of justice in our death penalty system is a promise that California has been unable to keep. We are overdue for what our Chief Justice has called ‘a merit-based discussion on (the death penalty’s) effectiveness and costs.’”

The opinion comes two weeks after Gov. Gavin Newsom placed a moratorium on capital punishment in the state, which hasn’t executed anyone since 2006.

Newsom called the death penalty a failure that “has discriminated against defendants who are mentally ill, black and brown, or can’t afford expensive legal representation.” He also said innocent people have been wrongly convicted and sometimes put to death.

California has the nation’s largest death row with nearly 750 inmates. Only 13 have been executed since 1978. Currently, condemned inmates are more likely to die of old age during decades of appeals.

Digital scrapbooking site Pinterest files for IPO

Pinterest is pinning its future on Wall Street, with the digital scrapbooking site on Friday filing for an initial public offering of stock.

It follows a similar filing with securities regulators earlier this month by ride-hailing company Lyft in what is shaping up to be a busy season for technology IPOs. Also expected to sell stock to the public in the coming weeks: Lyft rival Uber and messaging app Slack.

Pinterest said in its filing that it intends to list itself on the New York Stock Exchange using the ticker symbol “PINS.” The company hasn’t yet said how many shares it’s selling in the IPO or how much money it intends to raise.

The San Francisco-based company had revenue of \$756 million last year, a 60 percent bump from 2017. It had a loss of \$63 million last year, compared to a loss of \$130 million in 2017.

Pinterest allows people to search for and “pin” images as inspiration for fashion, interior design, travel and more.

The company said it has more than 250 million users each month, and users have saved more than 175 billion pins since the site was launched.

Pinterest has raised nearly \$1.5 billion in the private markets, and was last valued at \$12.3 billion in 2017, according to PitchBook Data.

Pinterest has long shunned being labeled a social network. Because of that, it doesn’t push users to add friends or build connections. It also means it’s been able to avoid problems of its larger rivals like Facebook.

But despite the lack of friend networks, many advertisers likely still consider Pinterest to be part of their “social” budgets, said eMarketer analyst Andrew Lipsman, meaning it competes in part with Facebook, Snapchat and others.

Pinterest makes advertising revenue when businesses promote pins in users’ feeds. Pinterest has the potential to be more valuable than most digital media to advertisers, Lipsman said, because it has direct information about what a user wants.

It’s all clear in the search – if a user is searching for new floor lamps or diamond rings, there’s a decent chance they want to buy those things.

“Visual search has a much bigger impact in terms of driving desire,” Lipsman said.

Pinterest was founded in 2010 by Ben Silbermann and Evan Sharp, who still serve as CEO and chief product officer, respectively.

The company has been working on developing its artificial intelligence search, which allows people to take a photo or upload a screenshot of an item and find similar products on Pinterest.

Like many other tech companies, including Facebook and Google, Pinterest will create two classes of stock – one that will give the holder one vote per share, and another that will get 20 votes per share. Shares held by executives and board members will be converted into shares of the second, more powerful, class. Pinterest’s filing did not break down the percentage of ownership.

The Press Democrat reports Golden Gate Bridge officials voted Friday to raise tolls up to \$9.75 by 2023.

The first increase will come in July when a trip from the North Bay from San Francisco will rise from \$7 to \$7.35.

The toll hikes are expected to raise an estimated \$100 million over five years and help transportation officials buy another ferry boat to meet growing demand and add service

between Larkspur and San Francisco.

According to the California Department of Transportation, the 1.7-mile bridge sees a daily average of between 112,000 and 119,000 motorists each day.

California sells \$600M in bonds for high-speed rail project

California sold \$600 million in bonds Tuesday to help pay for its high-speed rail project even as lawmakers and Gov. Gavin Newsom acknowledge challenges to completing the line between Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The bond money is a key source of funding for the troubled project, which has been beset by cost overruns and delays. Voters approved \$10 billion in bonds in 2008 and the state routinely sells them. The entire project is estimated to cost \$77 billion.

“Today’s funding announcement is a continued sign of progress to keep our transformative high-speed rail initiative moving forward in California,” Democratic Sen. Jim Beall of San Jose said in a statement.

Wells Fargo and Jefferies, LLC, purchased the bonds, state Treasurer Fiona Ma said.

The bond sale came ahead of a Senate hearing about how the state should move forward. It was the first public hearing since Newsom signaled changes to the project. But his administration provided few new details, saying those would come in an update to the Legislature on May 1.

“Let there be no doubt, (Newsom) supports high-speed rail in California,” said Lenny Mendonca, the governor’s appointee to lead the board overseeing the project.

Newsom in his state of state speech said there wasn’t a path for the project as planned and said he will instead focus immediately on completing and expanding a line through the Central Valley, adding about 50 miles (80 kilometers) of track to a line already under construction rather than going west toward the San Francisco Bay Area.

But he also said he’d continue environmental work on the full line and seek private money to eventually build the full train. Lawmakers said they’re still seeking clarity on Newsom’s vision for the project.

The project’s funding challenges were at the center of Tuesday’s hearing.

Beyond bonds, the project gets money from the federal government and the state’s cap and trade program, which raises money through credits to emit carbon. The Trump administration recently threatened to withhold or rescind roughly \$3.5 billion in federal money, a move that would put the project further in jeopardy.

The state would need at least \$50 billion more to meet the funding plan.

“The inspiring vision of high-speed rail, replete with dramatic pictures of speeding gold and blue trains but presented in advance of a credible financing plan is now meeting reality,” said Lou Thompson, head of a peer review group. “Action by the Legislature is badly needed.”

Thompson and Helen Kerstein of the Legislative Analyst’s Office said lawmakers need to decide if they’ll provide more money or change the project, potentially by finishing the high-speed line in the Central Valley and connecting it to Los Angeles and San Francisco using existing train and commuter services.

Senators also said the high-speed rail authority hasn’t been spending money or building as fast as it needs to ahead of 2022 deadlines.

Construction slowed down through the winter months amid rain, but an uptick is expected soon, said Joe Hedges, the chief operating officer of the project.

Hedges and other rail officials said the federal government has also slowed down progress because it has not completed required environmental reviews.

California may toughen immunization rules to block measles

California may give state public health officials instead of local doctors the power to decide which children shouldn’t be vaccinated before attending school.

The legislation announced Tuesday would also let state and county health officials revoke medical exemptions granted by doctors if they are found to be fraudulent or contradict federal immunization standards.

They say the legislation is needed to crack down on a few unscrupulous

doctors who are helping parents avoid vaccinating their children.

The proposal comes amid measles outbreaks in New York, Washington and elsewhere.

Several upset parents say the measure isn’t needed because California’s immunization rate already is high.

California eliminated non-medical immunization exemptions in 2016. The lawmakers want California to now follow West Virginia’s lead in having public health officials decide who qualifies for medical exemptions.

Apple’s foray into video shows limits to tech growth

Apple’s latest move into streaming video illustrates an escalating trend: Tech’s biggest companies, faced with limits to their growth, are encroaching on each other’s turf.

Apple is taking on Netflix. Facebook is edging into Amazon’s sphere with its e-commerce plans. Google, which has already challenged Amazon and Microsoft in cloud computing, is launching an online game service that could undercut the lucrative game-console business at Microsoft and Sony.

Apple, which is also launching a gaming service and introducing its own credit card, may be veering the most outside its comfort zone, technology industry analyst Rob Enderle said.

“This is an awful lot of breadth really quickly for a company that hasn’t been known for being great at breadth,” Enderle said. “This is much more diversity than Apple’s ever had.”

Before, when the company’s product suite grew too varied, “what Steve Jobs did with Apple was, he made the company focus,” Enderle said.

These are different times, however, and Apple may have

decided that it doesn’t have much choice amid declining sales of its premier product, the iPhone.

“They have kind of bled the device market dry,” said Sally Edgar, of UK-based technology consultancy Waterstons. “Companies will increasingly be about subscription services. I think they have to do it to survive.”

Tech companies, of course, have explored new markets and fought turf battles over them for years.

Facebook and Google have long scrapped over digital ads. Google and Amazon are battling it out over voice assistants in the

home. Google and Microsoft have competing search engines. And Apple and Google have waged an epic smartphone battle for roughly a decade.

But longtime tech industry analyst Tim Bajarin sees new urgency in the latest push into streaming services and other businesses that bring in continuous flows of money – not just when consumers make big investments in new phones or other hardware.

“It’s just becoming clearer today that the only way a company is going to grow is by adding a recurring revenue model,” Bajarin said. “Apple is becoming an aggregator of content. They now

have multiple services that will help them grow their bottom line.”

Enderle said Apple is still in the “honeymoon phase” after a Monday announcement at its Cupertino, California, headquarters. Apple brought out new A-list entertainment partners such as Oprah Winfrey and Steven Spielberg and video game partners such as the creators of “SimCity” and the “Final Fantasy” series. What happens next may be harder for the company to manage.

“It always looks great on the front end and then you have to execute,” he said.

State of the City 2019: Embracing Balanced Growth and Building a Community for All

2018 was a year of historic significance for the City of Fremont and its residents: we converted our council elections from at-large voting to a district-based system last November and welcomed some talented, fresh faces to the city management team, including our new City Manager Mark Danaj and Community Development Director Dan Schoenholz, who are ready to continue Fremont’s long legacy of great leadership.

With a new council and city manager on board, we agreed upon a shared vision of three key focus areas for Fremont this year: housing, traffic congestion, and neighborhood commercial districts and businesses. These priorities, which are in line with results from our community survey (www.fremont.gov/community-survey) conducted last June, will translate to tangible actions, including the creation of new development guidelines, the implementation of innovative transportation solutions, and increased support for our businesses.

As the number of jobs has risen in the past few years, Fremont has been striving to maintain the healthy balance between housing and jobs. In fact, Fremont has accomplished a record-breaking year in terms of increasing the availability of affordable housing, for example:

- We built more units than ever before at project sites such as Stevenson Terrace, Innovia, and Central Commons.
- Additional funding has been approved for the construction of City Center Apartments, which will provide supportive housing for low-income households, including several units set aside for veterans and people with mental disabilities.
- Along with housing needs, traffic and safety are key issues for our city. The council and staff are working on delivering infrastructure projects and securing additional funding to address those concerns. Part of our strategic approach includes:
 - The Mobility Action Plan

(www.Fremont.gov/MobilityActionPlan), which includes an accompanying checklist of focused areas and projects (www.Fremont.gov/3342/Action-Agenda-Check-List), has been adopted with a goal to improve our local and regional transportation systems.

- We’ve budgeted and are on track to modernize 40 percent of our traffic signals with new hardware and software, allowing more efficient traffic flow, faster response times for emergency vehicles, better detection for bicyclists, and a battery backup system to ensure uninterrupted power. We’ll be looking for funding sources to complete the city’s network.

As we work to implement creative solutions to housing and traffic, we’ll also be focusing on neighborhoods of character and look forward to working with our historic commercial districts, small businesses, and community partners. Here are a few highlights:

- A workshop was held to provide an overview of the city’s General Plan and how it applies to the Irvington District.
- We will help facilitate a new elementary school at Centerville Community Park, as well as build two new city parks within the next four years.
- This year, the Alameda County Small Business Development Center Headquarters will move from Oakland to Ohlone College. Resources for the small business community in Fremont will continue to become more accessible with this move and through our efforts working with the Fremont Chamber of Commerce and historic districts.

Meanwhile, innovation is in our DNA, and Fremont’s long-standing leadership in advanced manufacturing is at the foundation. Fremont’s largest growth sector continues to be biotechnology, with most Fremont’s biomedical companies manufacturing here. To name a couple:

- U.K.-based Orchard Therapeutics is building a gene therapy manufacturing operation in Warm Springs.
 - We welcomed dozens of new biomedical startups last year, including PrinterPrezz.
- As Fremont continues to act to reduce the effects of climate

change, I’m very proud of our continued bold climate leadership. Here are some of our new initiatives:

- Fremont is one of the first cities in the region to adopt a new goal to align local policies with the state’s ambitious target of carbon neutrality by 2045.
 - The city welcomed a new, sustainable electricity provider, East Bay Community Energy, and passed the Solar Preservation Ordinance.
- We recognize the importance and impact that people and organizations we serve have on our city. We have been working hard to preserve this view with actions such as:
- We made strides in providing homelessness resources and services in our city by participating in the second biennial Alameda County homeless count, expanding our warming center to a winter relief shelter, and launching a new mobile hygiene unit called “Fresh Start.”
 - The groundbreaking of a new senior center in Warm Springs is anticipated this summer as a space that will offer services for older adults to continue making Fremont an age-friendly city.
 - The Fire Department has been focusing on recruiting talent from under-represented and economically-disadvantaged groups. To spark young women’s interest in fire service, the Department opened its training center to NorCal Women in the Fire Service for its inaugural NorCal First Alarm Girls Fire Camp last fall.

Additionally, I would like to congratulate the Fremont Police Department for its well-deserved honor of the Annual Chairman’s Award by the Fremont Chamber of Commerce. I agree whole-heartedly with Chamber Chairman Ken Ariathurai’s remarks, “At the heart of a successful and thriving community is the sense of security and safety for both citizens and business alike.” We are fortunate to have an engaged police force, which fosters a unifying and respectful presence in the Fremont community.

Local nonagenarian releases second collection of poetry

Raven & Wren Press is proud to announce the release of poet Florence Miller's second full-length collection of poetry, "After Rain a Little Girl Straightening Worms." To celebrate, the press is hosting a book launch on Sunday, April 7 at Mission Coffee Roasting Company in Fremont.

Miller, who lives Fremont, was born in Newark, New Jersey, in 1922. Her family moved to West Orange soon after. She loved the natural beauty and freedom she experienced as a child, climbing every tree in every park. One summer, when Miller was in sixth grade, she and her friends learned that Eleanor Roosevelt would be visiting her godparents in the gated neighborhood Llewellyn Park. The girls decided to pay the First Lady a visit. A headline in the Newark Evening News read: Six West Orange Girls Crash the Gate. This cherished experience is captured in one of Miller's poems.

Miller remembers how her mother, Jeannette Shank, recited Milton to her and her siblings when they were small children. "My mother loved poetry," Miller recalled, and attended the same high school as Allen Ginsburg's father Louis. "He was our class poet," my mother said, her voice filled with admiration for him.

One of Miller's earliest memories of poem-making happened when she was a three-year-old child twirling around the house, singing out, "Spinach and Fish! Spinach and Fish! Mixed in a dish!" That's a poem," her mother cried. "Let me get a pencil and write it down." Poetry is in Florence's DNA.

Along with her husband Don Miller, a sociology professor,



and their young son David, Miller moved to Berkeley "just in time for the sixties" — as she often likes to say. Miller's husband taught at Laney College and she taught English and creative writing at McClymonds High School in Oakland.

Miller's students are the subject of the Emmy Award winning 1972 film by Allen Willis, "Can You Hear Me? Young Black Poets from the Ghetto." (In her book, Miller has a poem, "My Student, Beaten to Death on the Street," for Robbie Bowie, whose death she learned about from his mother while paying a visit to his home to let her student know one of poems would soon be published.)

Miller also became a founding member of the writing collective, Shakespeare's Sisters, co-authored with Alexis Rotella a renga trilogy during the 1970s, and published her work in numerous magazines and anthologies.

Widowed in 1985, Miller eventually married East Coast writer Edward Wahl. She and Wahl enjoyed six years of marriage, until his death in 2006. After his death, she moved to Fremont to be closer to her son David Miller, a (retired) teacher at American High School.

Since returning to the west coast, she has co-authored (with Bay Area poets Elaine Starkman, Joseph Chaikin, Dave Holt, S. Solomon, and Mark Hofstadter) the poetry collection, "My Dreaming Waking Life" (Dog Ear Publishing, 2009) and her previous full-length collection, "Upriver" (Shakespeare's Sisters Press, 2012). Of her latest collection, Miller sums it up simply: "This book is the culmination of a lifetime of work."

Miller astounds the reader with how deftly she captures a quicksilver glimpse of beauty while simultaneously bearing witness to loss. "Florence's poetry is magical," said poet Joan Alexander. "The direct imagery hits me somewhere just below consciousness with a profound and simple beauty."

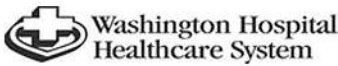

Take a Scenic Ride with the Primavera Century

The Fun Ride travels to and through scenic Coyote Hills Regional Park using parts of the Alameda Creek Trail on this mostly flat, fun, and educational ride. Then it's back to the high school for a tasty lunch at a choice of several gourmet food trucks, including vegetarian options. Lunch and goodie bags with bicycling items are included in the registration fee. Mechanical support and rest stops with water, snacks, and rest rooms are also included. The Fun Ride is perfect for new riders, those just getting back into bicycling, and families with limited experience bicycling.

The longer rides are along the most scenic of East Bay's bicycle routes: climb the challenging Calaveras Wall, then cycle the quiet road along Calaveras Reservoir. Bald eagles have been spotted again along the route, and this year the wildflowers should be stunning. Ride past Livermore vineyards and wineries and the wind turbines of Altamont Pass. After a picnic lunch at Rios Lovell winery, it's up and over the tree-shaded Palomares Road with the descent to Niles Canyon. Return to the start for a hearty meal.

All routes are fully-supported by volunteers providing hot and cold beverages, food, bathroom facilities, and bicycle repair. In addition, the Freewheelers will have drivers on all the distance routes, providing support to riders needing mechanical assistance during the ride.

The Fremont Freewheelers is the Tri-Cities' non-profit bicycle club organized for the purpose of promoting all facets of bicycling including leisure, recreational, touring and racing, always with an emphasis on bicycle safety and



education. The club hosts organized bicycle rides weekends and most weekdays. Experienced riders lead each ride, providing maps and moral support as needed. Rides are designed for all levels of cyclists and vary in terms

of distance and number of hills, so there are rides for any level of cyclist. Most rides include a "coffee" stop providing a chance to re-fuel and socialize.

Special event evening rides are usually planned for the longer

daylight days in summer. The club also holds training series every year for those interested in riding longer distances of 65 to 100 miles. Although our open series started in January and are mid-way through their programs, experienced riders comfortable with the upcoming distances are welcome. All riders must wear helmets and have bicycles in good working order.

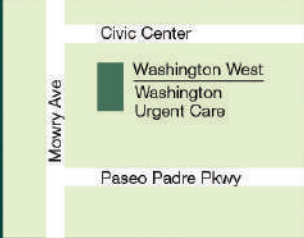

Luscious Locks and Shiny Tresses

When I was a little girl, one of my favorite “Grimm’s” Fairy Tales” was the story of Rapunzel, the girl with long hair who was locked in a tower by an evil witch until a prince came to rescue her. We all know that fairy tales aren’t true and that kissing princes has the inherent danger of ending up with a toad. These days, hipster princes have better locks than Rapunzels. But surely lovely locks need not be the stuff of fairy tales!

Prior to embarking on any healthy hair program, it is good to remember that diet and genetics are key factors. Healthy hair comes from inside and so what we eat matters. Hair needs protein, biotin, iron, iodine, vitamin B12 and omega-3 fatty acids. The roots of our hair are connected to our bloodstream. Any imbalances and toxicity can be detected through hair analysis.

Minimize heat in your hair care routine and try to air dry as much as possible; blow dryers,



flat irons, and curling irons will damage the cuticle of hair. Ditto with UV high sunlight – wear a hat when you venture out. While washing hair, make the final rinse with cold water to tighten pores and cuticles.

Stress causes hair loss, so meditate, practice self-care, and treasure your locks. They can be indicators of your physical and mental health. Hormonal imbalances can also affect the condition of our hair as does pollution and prolonged or chronic illnesses.

The jury is still out as to whether shampoos and conditioners are good for us. Most of them contain artificial fragrances and sodium lauryl sulfate to create lather. Its main purpose is to strip the oils. This isn’t necessarily a good thing, but convenience trumps natural living sometimes. It is advisable to use commercially-sold shampoos no more than twice a week.

Flaxseed Serum

Flaxseed has amazing hair benefits and is also great for growing hair. It’s chockful of omega-3 fatty acids, essential for hair and many other healthy functions. Ingesting it provides great returns but it can also be applied to hair as a serum. It strengthens hair follicles, reduces dryness, and makes hair smooth and silky. It is also anti-inflammatory when applied to an irritated scalp.

To make a simple flaxseed serum take 1/4 cup of flaxseed



and boil in four cups of water. Keep stirring or it will stick to the bottom and burn. Bring to a boil and after five minutes, it will have a gel-like consistency. It will thicken as it cools, so strain immediately once it’s off heat.

Apply to scalp and hair. Wash after one hour. This treatment can be repeated two to three times a week. It can be stored in the fridge.

Hair and Scalp Emollients

These are oils or pomades to nourish hair and scalp. These special treatments help balance the effects of environmental and internal stress on hair that causes it to be dry, frizzy, and dull. Hot oil treatments also deodorize and clean hair and scalp.

Place a small amount on fingertips and comb hair with your fingers for even distribution. Use finger tips to massage scalp or tap gently over various points in your scalp. Don’t over apply to the point of greasiness. Wash after 30 minutes or, if using minimally (four to five drops), you can leave it in.

For massage and wash treatments (one to four tablespoons depending on hair length), massage the warm oil as above and brush hair to evenly disperse from root to tip. Wrap hair and tuck under a shower cap. Place a thick towel or woolen cap over it. Relax and enjoy a cup of tea for 30 to 60 minutes.

Rosemary Hair Oil

This daily leave-in treatment cleanses and deodorizes hair, soothes itchy scalp, and increases blood circulation to scalp promoting hair growth. For one ounce of cold-pressed olive oil or jojoba oil, add 30 drops of rosemary essential oil. Set aside for two to three days. Use as needed.

Lavender Coconut Hair Pomade

For every four ounces of coconut oil, add 30 drops of

lavender oil and 30 drops of rosemary essential oil. You might have to melt the coconut oil in a double boiler. When it’s liquid, add the essential oils and mix well.

Herb-infused Hair Treatment

Mugwort, nettles, and comfrey are mostly known as weeds, but they are absolute magic and packed with hair health boosting powers. They are cleansing, anti-fungal and reparative herbs for hair. Harvest fresh mugwort, nettle leaves, and comfrey root and dry them. After they are dried, weigh and place one ounce of each in three six-ounce jars. Pour four ounces of cold-pressed olive oil in each jar and mix well. Lid them and label the jars. Solar infuse them by a window, agitating the jars every couple of days.

After three weeks minimum and six weeks maximum, strain and press them over cheese cloth. There will be about 25 percent loss of volume. You will likely have three ounces of each infused oil. Mix them together equally for hot oil treatment.

All the above treatments can be applied to men too! Male hair is a little different and can be coarser. But if the scents don’t appeal, a more masculine version of the hot oil treatment is four ounces coconut oil plus 10 drops black pepper essential oil, 10 drops sage essential oil, and 10 drops lemongrass oil.

Here’s to lovely locks and shiny, healthy tresses! While we practice self-care from the roots of your hair to the soles of your feet, we shouldn’t forget that the exterior is just a reflection of our inner selves and physical health.

Kia Niro EV: Competitive All-Electric Compact Crossover

Auto Review

The Kia Niro offers three levels of electrification: hybrid version extends the gasoline engine's range for more miles per gallon; plug-in hybrid (PHEV) enables battery power for local driving, but lets you take long trips using the gas engine; the brand-new EV moves you into a long-range, carbon-free future.

As a compact crossover, Niro EV sits in a hot market segment. It's so popular that competitor Toyota is now selling more RAV4s compact crossovers than Camry sedans. The Niro EV



earns 239 miles of range from its 64-kWh lithium ion polymer battery, cleverly one-upping its most direct competitor, Chevrolet Bolt EV (238-mile range). The Kia's electric motor, at 201 horsepower and 291 lb.-ft. of torque, is a bit torquier than the Bolt's, too. EPA numbers are 112 MPGe Combined (123 City, 102 Highway) and a pair of perfect 10's for the Green scores.

The Niro EV is a bit bigger than Bolt EV, stretching 8.2 inches longer on a 3.9-inch-longer wheelbase. However, passenger volume is only 2.2 cubic feet more. If you want a Korean-built car that matches the Bolt EV in size, choose Kia's sister division Hyundai's new Kona EV, which uses the same powertrain as the Niro EV.

In a time of fierce and overstyled models, the Niro EV looks clean and purposeful. While some EVs remove the grille entirely, the Niro simply gives it a solid texture. The front features a mirror-image opening below the closed grille; lower

corners flaunt accents with lights that look like airplanes in flight. Sides press in along the lower doors, a favorite designer technique to make the wheelwells stand out ruggedly.

The driving experience is smooth and quiet. All you'll hear is a little tire and wind noise. One other sound appears in low speed situations, though, from the Pedestrian Warning System. The company is portraying it as a cool "fantastic techy whir of a sci-fi craft," but I found it a little annoying. As more EVs penetrate the market, pedestrians will have to remember to use their eyes when stepping into the street.

Regenerative braking adds charge to an EV's batteries. For hybrids, it's the only way, while for plug-in hybrids and EVs, it's a nice boost. The Niro EV lets you select from four options –ascending levels of 0, 1, 2, or 3, using the steering wheel paddles. I like heavy regen, but the level 2 setting seems about right for most driving. Select from four Drive Modes – Normal, Sport, Eco, and Eco+. Normal, the

default, works fine; while Sport lets the motor spin freely and takes advantage of the motor's instant torque. Eco and Eco+ reduce electricity consumption for maximum efficiency. Each level has its own set level of regen, but you can adjust it.

The Niro EV comes in two levels – EX and EX Premium. The Premium adds niceties such as a sunroof, a larger 8-inch touchscreen, Harman Kardon premium sound system, heated front seats, and wireless smartphone charging. My tester, a Platinum Graphite EX Premium, felt nice enough, but didn't match luxury crossover EVs (in quality or price). Charging works in the normal way, with a standard plug at home or at charging stations.

Combined fast-charge capacity comes standard and is great for longer trips. On the Bolt EV, it's a \$750 option.

If you choose to use Level 1 household current (120V) it could take 2-1/2 days to refill an empty battery versus 9-1/2 hours for Level 2 (240V). Fast charging can refill to 80 percent in an hour. For most people, the car's 239 miles of range will be enough with regular charging at home or at work.

One area the Niro has it over Bolt, Nissan LEAF, and even sister Hyundai is in standard Advanced Smart Cruise Control and Lane Following Assist. 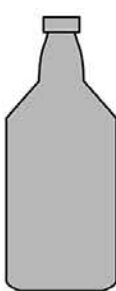

The three-story, 58,000-square foot building, designed by Noll + Tam Architects of Berkeley, is setting a new standard in environmental sustainability. In addition to being 100-percent energy self-sufficient and carbon-free, it will conserve drinking water by capturing, filtering and storing rainwater for non-potable uses such as flushing toilets and irrigation.

“This is an extraordinary building that also is extraordinarily complicated from a service, systems and materials standpoint,” said Hayward Library Director Jayanti Addleman. “We’re all eager to get in there and open the doors to the community once and for all. We can see the light at the end of the tunnel now.”

County deputy district attorney, an Alameda County Superior Court judge, an Oakland City Council member, and vice mayor of the City of Oakland.

Sutter was president and a founding member of the Citizens for Regional Recreation and Parks, known today as the Greenbelt Alliance. In 2016 he received the prestigious Honorable Cornelius Amory Pugsley Award from the American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration. He was also the earliest proponent of a park at the site of the former Oakland Army Base. In 1967, as president of the future Greenbelt Alliance, he advocated for the Association of Bay Area

Governments to designate the then-active army base as future parkland.

The Oakland Army Base was placed on the federal base closure list in 1995. Through a complicated process, 45 acres of the property were conveyed for public use. The new park will include 13 acres of upland and seven acres of submerged, all conveyed to the Park District. Additional lands in the park are owned by the City of Oakland and CalTrans. The Park District will fund, develop and maintain the park.

Part of the park is the Bridge Yard Building, a former maintenance structure redesigned as an event venue. Currently, the public has access to the building and the Bay Bridge Trail, which leads from the mainland out to Yerba Buena Island. Public access to a pier that is being constructed on former Bay Bridge footings is expected this year. The new park

name is a fitting tribute to Sutter for his many years of advocacy on behalf of public access to bay shorelines.

Many local park and recreation projects in the East Bay have benefited from Measure WW, a Park District bond issue approved in 2008 by voters in Alameda and Contra Costa Counties. Sale of \$500 million in bonds was authorized, of which \$125 million are specifically dedicated to local park and recreation projects on a per capita population basis. In the past 11 years, the Park District has approved \$118 million toward 240 projects benefiting communities in the two counties. Of those, 162 projects have been completed so far. Projects funded have included youth and senior centers, sports fields, aquatics centers, picnic areas, safe playground equipment, and park infrastructures such as bathrooms

and water fountains. For a list of projects in your community, visit www.ebparks.org/Measure WW.

This looks to be a great year for wildflowers. So be sure to check out the Spring Wildflower Festival from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, April 14 at Sunol Regional Wilderness. Wildflower hikes, arts and crafts, live entertainment, and nature-themed activities will all be part of the fun.

Parking costs \$5 per vehicle; admission to the festival is free. Sunol is at the end of Geary Road, off Calaveras Road about 5 miles south of I-680 and the town of Sunol. For information, call (510) 544-3249.

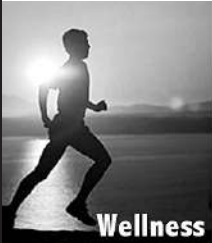

Bugs

Even though the word “bug” had been part of our vocabulary long before the incident (i.e. bugaboo, bugbear), it has rapidly become a popular noun. It also acts as a verb (“bug out” and “bug” phones); widely used in that sense as well.

In our country, a nation of immigrants, words are constantly adopted from a variety of sources including other languages and by imagination using fragments or combinations that describe a physical thing or feeling - ethereal or otherwise - untouched by traditional communication. These words carry meaning often beyond the dictionary. In recognition, many dictionaries exist and most are revised on a regular basis. The word bug is no exception.

Politics has been largely spared from the term “bug” but not its application. Personal references and diatribes have now ascended to an artform at even the most prestigious levels. While “bug” appears to be too mild for the rough and tumble political stage, it can describe a unique state that descends on many politicians. They often get a political bug and, even with a relatively altruistic entry to public “service,” are twisted and formed into a much different animus. In nature, not all who encounter harmful bugs are adversely affected, but most are not so lucky. Political bugs are no different.

Some politicians have a natural immunity to the siren song of money, power and prestige, but as ambition solidifies, so does a tendency toward corruption. Offers of career enhancement

and the fruits of an elevated position join with recognition and an aura of power; it becomes difficult to resist the tendency to overlook those voters responsible for first steps at the local level. When observing your local politicians at work during council meetings and work sessions, it is incumbent on constituents to watch for signs of the bug and help our representatives to resist, maintaining a clear sense of purpose and transparent motives for their actions. Just as some bugs are beneficial and necessary for a healthy environment, so too, can the political bug assist in developing positive and supportive policies. A healthy politician speaks succinctly and clearly without the need for threats or sanctimony. Early detection and prevention of negative political bugs is the province of constituents. Bugs can be controlled.

There are all sorts of “bugs” in this world. Before computers and the technological age, common use of the term was largely restricted to insects and odd mob characters such as Benjamin “Bugsy” Siegel, who oversaw development of the Flamengo Casino in Las Vegas during the late 1940s, the beginning of the “strip,” and the early twentieth century Chicago gangster George “Bugs” Moran. Spoofed on film and cartoons, the term has been used to indicate wacky characteristics. The 1976 film comedy, Bugsy Malone, featured a young Scott Baio and Jody Foster substituting whipped cream for bullets; the cartoon universe featured a wisecracking cartoon character, Bugs Bunny. As medicine evolved to recognize the actions of microorganisms, both beneficial and harmful, the term was expanded to include a related poor state of health: i.e. “flu bug.”

With the introduction of computers, an incident that threatened an early machine in 1947 added the term in engineering parlance to common vocabulary. Tests on a “calculator” at Harvard University were running into problems. As technicians investigated the cause, it turned out that a moth had settled on the circuit board, creating the difficulty. After “debugging” the machine, the hardware began normal operations.

California awards \$63M in grants to promote healthy forests

California forestry officials say they have awarded over \$63 million in grants to projects that promote healthy forests to help enhance carbon sequestration.

The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection announced Wednesday the grants were awarded to 16 projects covering nearly 200,000 acres of private, state, and federal forestlands in 13 counties.

Angie Lottes, CAL FIRE’s Assistant Deputy Director for Climate and Energy, says 13 of the grants will target about 150,000 acres in several ways. The projects include thinning dense and pest-impacted forests; using prescribed fire to reduce hazardous fuel loads; and planting trees in forests diminished by fire, drought, insects and disease.

The three other grants will protect more than 40,000 acres of forestland in Napa, Placer and Siskiyou counties from urban and agricultural development.

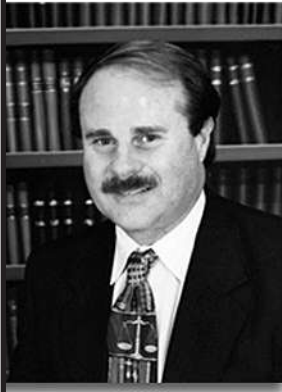

For generations, Social Security has been evolving to meet your changing needs. In April, we celebrate National Social Security Month by letting you know what you can do online with a “my Social Security” account. Replacing a lost or stolen Social Security number (SSN) card has never been easier. You can request a replacement SSN card online in most states. There’s no need to sit in traffic or visit a local office or card center. If you’re only requesting a replacement card, and no other changes, you can use our free online service from anywhere. All you need to do is log in to or create a “my Social Security” account at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

You can also get a copy of your Social Security 1099 (SSA-1099) or Benefit Statement, which is a tax form Social Security mails each year in January.

It shows the total amount of benefits you received from Social Security in the previous year, so you know how much Social Security income to report to the IRS on your tax return. If you live in the U.S. and you need a copy of your SSA-1099 or 1042S, go online and get an instant, printable replacement form with a my Social Security account at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

Another important thing you can do is check the status of your Social Security benefit application or claim. This feature can be accessed anywhere you can log in to your Social Security account. Knowing the status of your pending claim is important for several reasons, and now you can get the up-to-date status when you want it. Securing your identity and personal information is important to us. We protect your information by using strict identity verification and security features. The application process has built-in features to detect fraud and confirm your identity. Replacing documents and checking status can be time consuming, but Social Security has made it as easy as possible. Share what you can do online with friends and family with a “my Social Security” account at www.socialsecurity.gov.

Income Tax
Preparation Assistance

Low income, elderly, disabled, and limited English-speaking taxpayers in Santa Clara County can seek free tax preparation assistance through Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA), coordinated by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and United Way Bay Area. This year, VITA tax preparation services are temporarily offered at nearly 40 sites, including county library in Milpitas. Trained IRS-certified volunteers will assist in multiple languages to prepare basic forms (1040EZ, 1040A, 1040 with Schedule A, B, Limited Schedule CEZ, C and California State Income Tax Returns) and facilitate e-filing or paper returns.

“Even for English speakers it may be very confusing to keep up with ongoing changes in tax benefits, deductions, exemptions and refunds,” said County of Santa Clara Supervisor Mike Wasserman. “Many VITA sites offer tax preparation assistance services in several languages; this is especially valuable to tax payers whose first language is not English.”

To qualify for VITA assistance program, taxpayers must have a valid Social Security Number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN), and have a combined household income of \$55,000 or less.

Taxpayers need to bring the following information to VITA sites:

- A photo ID (Passport, driver’s license, State issued ID) for him or herself and his or her spouse if married
- Social Security card or ITIN for each person included in tax returns
- Proof of income: W2s, 1099s, 1098s, cash income, interest income, etc.
- Proof of expenses: childcare expense statement (with provider address and tax ID number), medical expenses, property tax bills, etc.
- A copy of last year’s federal and state returns, if available
- Bank account number with routing number for direct deposit refund
- Household health coverage information (1095-A, B or C)
- Landlord’s name, address and phone number for CA Renter’s Credit
- For married filing jointly, both spouses need to be present to sign (volunteers will not be able to prepare returns for married taxpayers filing separately)

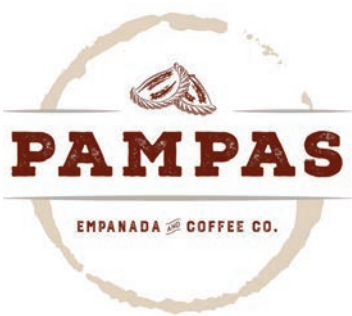

When one thinks of Argentina the first place that comes to mind is Buenos Aires; it's the country's capital and second largest city in South America. There, you can stroll through streets surrounded



important to involve the community in any way possible. The convenience of their location has not only put them in sight of many day-to-day commuters along the corner of the town's busiest intersections, but also provided a perfect stage to host live entertainment. Once a week during the spring and summer season, the café hosts live music performed by local artists. Pampas is proud to create a venue for these performers to showcase their talent.

The café also lends their hand to support other local businesses such as Four Barrel brand Coffee, a purveyor based in San Francisco whose coffee is served at Pampas every day. Along with their empanadas, an Argentine bakery called Wooden Table from Oakland also sells their alfajores cookies at Pampas.

In addition to their in-café offerings, Pablo and Shannon can

by 19th century Spanish Colonial architecture and indulge in the city's rich history. Argentina is not just a place where its name rolls off your tongue, but is known for its vibrant culture – most famous for tango and music as well as its diverse landscape.

However, one cannot truly experience the soul of any country until completely immersed in the culture and local cuisine. Can't get to Argentina? Then let Argentina come to you! Pampas Café in Castro Valley is a little taste of South America wrapped up and baked in a sweet pastry dough, where their specialties are both savory and sweet empanadas. These baked pockets of hardy ingredients are a fast food staple in Buenos Aires, made with flour-based dough and often filled with ground beef and chicken.

Pampas is named after "the flat plains," that cover

approximately 295,000 square miles of Southeastern Argentina. Pampas Café was a dream come true for Pablo Vergara and his wife, Shannon. Pablo, born in Rosario, Argentina, had always dreamt of

sharing his family recipes. Cooking empanadas for friendly gatherings, they quickly became a favorite. Friends encouraged them to start their next chapter – a family business.

The story really began in Madrid, Spain, where Pablo and Shannon met in 1998; they lived together in Argentina until 2013. Soon after, they moved to California to settle down in Castro Valley where Shannon's family resides. It was Shannon who discovered the location for their family-owned and run bakery on a busy corner of Castro Valley Boulevard. Pampas first opened its doors in November of 2016.

Open Tuesday through Sunday, the café serves traditional flavors. On their menu you'll find their bestseller, which includes ingredients such as ground beef, onion, green olives, raisin, and hard-boiled egg. Another popular item is the chorizo-filled empanada, which includes chimichurri and provolone cheese.



If you're looking for an after-dinner treat, you'll also find a sweet selection with some items such as blueberry, apple, or peach.

For the Vergaras, the day begins at 6 a.m. in their commercial kitchen. During the first few months after their grand opening, the bakery survived with just the effort of the couple themselves.



Now, with a staff of five, the café is thriving. It is not uncommon to see Thomas, the couple's oldest son, helping at the cash register and greeting customers; a true family business. With three children (Thomas 17, Mateo 14, and Pedro 11), it was a challenge to make it all work but Shannon says, "When we moved back to Castro Valley, my husband was ready to do something different ... it all just fell into place."

As a native of the city where their bakery stands, it was

Friday, March 22

- Officer Borzone and Field Training Officer Madsen responded from the family of a 29-year-old man who was acting erratically and possibly under the influence of drugs. Officers determined the man may have been under the influence of methamphetamine. He was arrested and booked at Santa Rita jail.
- During a security check at the Charter Square shopping center, Officer Cavaz located an occupied stolen vehicle. Three people were taken into custody and later indicated that there may be fentanyl inside the vehicle. Fremont Fire responded to assist with the retrieval and packaging of the suspected substance. In the end, the substance could not be identified and no officers were exposed. Two men, ages 44 and 57, and a 36-year-old woman were arrested on suspicion of possessing drugs, a stolen vehicle, and several other charges.
- K9 Officer Taylor responded to a disturbance involving a man at the 7-Eleven store on Niles Boulevard. He tried to detain the man, but he fled on foot. After a short chase, the man was caught and arrested on suspicion of obstructing/resisting an officer and booked into jail.
- Officers responded to a call about a possible shooting in the parking lot at 6000 Stevenson Boulevard. The caller reported hearing several people fighting in the parking lot and then several shots fired. Officer Carter arrived on the scene just in time to see a vehicle exiting from the parking lot. He tried to make a stop, but the vehicle took off with Carter in pursuit. After a mile, the vehicle stopped and a 20-year-old man and a juvenile were taken

into custody without incident. Multiple shell casings were found inside the vehicle. The juvenile admitted that he shot several rounds in the air during a confrontation with other people. He told officers where he discarded the firearm during the pursuit. Officers found the revolver on Stewart Avenue and determined that it was reported stolen out of Santa Clara. The older man, an East Palo Alto resident, was arrested and booked on felony evading and felony child endangerment charges. The juvenile was booked on charges of possessing a firearm and narcotics, possession of a controlled substance, negligent discharge of a firearm, and various other weapons charges.

Saturday, March 23

- Officers Degenstein and Macciola were dispatched to the 4500 block of Serra Avenue to investigate a report of a suspicious vehicle. A resident returning home noticed a strange vehicle across the street and a person ducking down away from view. Officers arrived and contacted the men inside the vehicle. The suspects were not located. The first suspect was described as a black man in his 20s, between 5-feet-6 and 5-feet-8-inches tall with a stout build, wearing a black hood, black face mask, black pants and carrying a small handgun. The second suspect was described as a black man about the same height, or a bit shorter than the first man, but with a slim build. The third man was described as being about the same height as the other suspects, but of an unknown race. Their vehicle was an older dark Ford Expedition.

- Officers responded to a report about a possible prowler at a residence on Ambar Place. The resident reported that a man was standing in the home's backyard. K9 Officer Macciola was the first on the scene and contacted a 60-year-old man, who complied with verbal commands and was detained without incident. The man was arrested and faces prowling charges.
- At 4:21 a.m. a man reported that he was watching live video surveillance of a person attempting to disable his video camera, and then accessing the work trucks parked on PG&E property near Auto Mall Parkway and Fremont Boulevard. Several officers responded to the area. Officer Macciola saw a white van pulling exiting the nearby Extreme Pita restaurant and made a traffic enforcement stop. A 30-year-old man was detained. The reporting party arrived on the scene and positively identified the man, who was also wearing a work jacket belonging to PG&E. Items taken were recovered and returned. Put down cell phones

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month and the Milpitas Police Department is joining law enforcement agencies statewide to stop drivers who violate the California handsfree cell phone law. During the month, extra officers will be patrolling Milpitas streets looking specifically for drivers holding and using cell phones.

“Cell phones remain one of the top distractions for drivers and this bad habit can have life altering consequences. A text or phone call will never be worth the loss of a life. That is why eliminating distracted driving is high on our priority list,” said Armando Corpuz, Milpitas Police Chief.

In 2018, the Milpitas Police Department issued 1,216 citations to drivers texting, calling or otherwise using their phone illegally. Distracted driving is dangerous, especially when it involves a cell phone. According to preliminary data from the California Highway Patrol, 66 people were killed and more than 6,500 were injured in

2017 from distracted driving-related crashes.

The most recent law prohibiting cell phone use when driving went into effect in 2017. The law prohibits drivers from having a phone in their hand for any reason and only allows hands-free use of a phone when driving. To satisfy the hands-free regulation, phones must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield or center console, and can only be touched once with the swipe or tap of a finger to activate or deactivate a function. First-time offenders face a citation and \$162 fine.

If a driver needs to make a call or send a text, police advise pulling over and parking at a safe location before doing so. Motorists who struggle to stay off the phone while behind the wheel are advised to put the phone in a place where it can't be reached like the back seat or in a vehicle's trunk. Or, simply turn the phone off while driving.

Funding for distracted driving enforcement operations is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

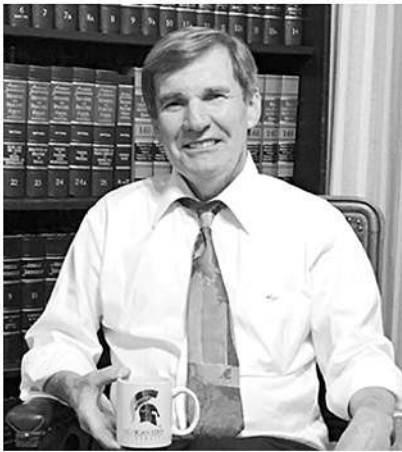

Alameda County History Day

Showcasing projects under the theme of “Triumph and Tragedy in History,” more than 180 Alameda County students participated in Alameda County History Day on Saturday, March 2 at Edna Brewer Middle School in Oakland. Students in grades 4-12 presented on a variety of topics, including Gilroy Hot Springs, Baron Von Steuben, the Black Panther Party, Korematsu v. U.S., the Partition of India, Harriet Tubman and the Chicago Garment Strike. Most students began researching their topics in September 2018, and presented their findings as

historical papers, posters, websites, documentaries, performances, and exhibits.

Submissions were judged by a panel of local educators and leaders, which selected 75 student champions to advance to the California National History Day competition. The contest is set for May 10-11 at William Jessup University in Rocklin, California; students from 30 counties across the state will compete.

Special awards were presented by the Alameda County Historical Society and the Hayward Area History Museum for projects related to Alameda County or the San Francisco Bay Area. The project awarded for a topic related to Alameda County was “War and Opportunity” by Kelsey Dougherty, Naima Rahim-Roberts and Nola Lum from Edna Brewer Middle (Oakland USD). The project awarded for a topic related to the San Francisco Bay Area was “Angel Island: A History of Chinese Immigration” by Charlotte Carmany and Leonor Garre from Ecole Bilingue de Berkeley.

Philip A. Harley Memorial Mock Trial

The Philip A. Harley Mock Trial Competition is a county-wide high school criminal trial competition designed to increase understanding of our judicial system and the processes necessary to create a just society. Teams of nine to 25 students study a hypothetical case, conduct legal research and receive individual coaching by volunteer attorneys

in trial preparation, courtroom protocol, courtroom procedure, analysis and communication. Preparation begins in the fall and culminates in competition in January and February. This year's winning team, Moreau Catholic High School from Hayward, was to represent Alameda County at the state competition in late March in Sacramento. The Amador Valley High School (Pleasanton USD) team was the second-place winner and secured a “wild card” slot to compete at the state match.

The awards ceremony for the Mock Trial Competition took place at the San Leandro Performing Arts Center on Monday, March 11.

Cal State East Bay joins single-use plastics ban

California State University (Cal State), East Bay in Hayward will join the rest of the CSU system in banning all single-use plastics on campus by 2023. The new policy, in effect immediately, establishes purchasing practices aimed at eliminating items such as plastic straws, plastic water bottles and plastic bags, giving preference to reusable products or those that are compostable or recyclable. Currently, plastic bags and straws have been

removed from the Dining Commons, Provisions on Demand (the POD) and Greens to Go. The bookstore provides paper bags and while it does have straws and sporks available, both are made from compostable materials. The push to eliminate single-use plastic items on campuses throughout California follows a national trend aimed at slowing the overwhelming number of plastics affecting oceans and other environmentally fragile areas.

“Millions of tons of plastics end up in our oceans each year, threatening marine life and creating unnecessary costs in expensive cleanup efforts,” Cal State East Bay Sustainability Director Jillian Buckholz said. “I’m proud that the CSU is banning single-use plastics across all campuses making the statement that the largest university system in the U.S. is moving toward a sustainable future.”

Women for women

“Fremont has a very high concentration of companies doing

innovative things in industry sectors such as advanced manufacturing, cleantech, and biotech,” says Tina Kapoor, Economic Development Manager for the City of Fremont. “These companies choose Fremont as their location because they are able to tap in to the rich talent that’s here. Ohlone College is a strong partner in preparing the future talent pipeline of engineers.”

Kapoor attended the event with Fremont Mayor Lily Mei who shared words of wisdom as she spoke with student attendees.

“When I was just 16 years old, I landed a job at Siemens where my manager, who was also a woman, took me under her wing and taught me how to be better organized and poised. I also learned how to negotiate, how to shake someone’s hand, and how to ask for what I wanted,” says Mayor Mei. “My manager was a mentor to me and was so critical. And that’s what I hope to see, a pipeline of future women who help one another.”

Ohlone’s engineering department focuses on providing lower-division engineering courses and pre-engineering programs that prepare students for success upon transfer to a four-year institution for a Bachelor of Science degree. Students intern at local engineering and manufacturing companies while managing their studies, gaining first-hand experience, and learning in the field.

“Women in engineering must continue to stand strong, believe in ourselves and know that we belong,” says Dr. Itua.

Ohlone College is one of the first community colleges to be a member of the Society of Women Engineers—an organization with a mission to empower women to achieve full potential in careers as engineers and leaders, expand the image of the engineering and technology professions as a positive force in improving the quality of life, and demonstrate the value of diversity and inclusion.

County of Santa Clara offers mobile app for paying property tax

Business and personal property taxpayers in Santa Clara County now have access to SCC DTAC, a new mobile app launched by the Department of Tax and Collection (DTAC) to provide convenient access to pay the second installment of annual secured property tax payments. The deadline to pay the taxes is April 10.

“There is no longer a need to spend time in traffic, finding parking or standing in line at the Department of Tax and Collections to pay property taxes in Santa Clara County,” said Margaret Olaiya, director of the Department of Tax and Collections. “People can pay on-line, and even from their phones, because we now have the DTAC App that allows you to look up your bill and pay directly from your bank account with no additional fees.”

The SCC DTAC app, available for iOS (Apple’s App

Store) and Android (Google’s Play Store) mobile devices, includes the following features:

- Pay for one or more tax bills for secured or unsecured property.
- Pay tax bills with credit/debit card, or eChecks; Payments made by eCheck are free of convenience fees.
- Make partial payments on a tax bill (Note: Currently for secured properties only).
- View list of tax bills due and/or past due, including the ability to view bill details and download bills.
- Save properties as Favorites.
- Save copies of tax bills.
- Provide feedback about the app or DTAC service overall.
- Access using multiple mobile and smart devices such as phones and tablets
- “We encourage property taxpayers to transact business with the County using the new convenient option of their mobile and smart devices,” added Olaiya.

Once the app is downloaded, property owners will be presented with two options. The first option allows a search for real property by Assessor’s Parcel Number (APN) or by property address. Real property includes homes, buildings, or land (a.k.a. secured property). The second option provides property owners of businesses, boats, airplanes, etc. (a.k.a. unsecured property) the ability to search for their property tax obligation by its assessment number or property address. Property owners can use the shopping cart feature to pay for multiple secured and/or unsecured tax bills that are available for their properties.

Fremont Holds 2019 State of the City Address

This year’s State of the City Address took place on March 22 at the Fremont Marriott Silicon Valley at an event hosted by the Fremont Chamber of Commerce. Mayor Lily Mei began by welcoming City Manager Mark Danaj and the newly elected council members to the Fremont family and outlined the city’s achievements in 2018 and its goals for the year ahead:

- Converting elections to a district-based system.
- Three focus areas: housing, traffic congestion, and neighborhood commercial districts.
- Affordable housing units such as Stevenson Terrace, Innovia, and Central Commons.
- Progress in providing homelessness services and resources.
- A Mobility Action Plan.
- Efforts to reduce residential burglaries and an expanded focus on auto burglaries.
- The Fire Department focus on recruiting talent from under-represented and economically-disadvantaged groups; an inaugural NorCal First Alarm Girls Fire Camp.
- Fremont’s business economy continues to thrive, especially in biotechnology and advanced manufacturing.
- Encourage resident participation in the upcoming 2019 Census.

Solar Renewable Microgrid Demonstration Project

Fremont’s Solar Renewable Microgrid System demonstration project was dedicated April 2 at Fremont Fire Station No. 6. “Merging Fremont’s continued bold climate leadership and dedication to supporting local entrepreneurship, this project has verified that renewable energy storage systems will aid in building a clean energy future for our community,” said Mayor Mei. “Additionally, the City of Fremont’s proactive planning in partnership with Gridscape will ensure an uninterrupted power source for our public safety responders in the case of natural disaster emergency services operations.”

Pairing solar photovoltaic (PV) carports with large battery systems, the participating fire stations can effectively and sustainably generate and store their own energy. In addition to the protection of emergency service facilities against power outages, this program will reduce city utility bills by \$214,844 over the 10-year Power Purchase Agreement term (in addition to the \$32,027 saved during the demonstration period). The project will also decrease municipal greenhouse gas emission by around 80,000 pounds of carbon dioxide per year.

City Council Work Session for Irvington BART Station

The Draft Irvington BART Station Area Plan is ready for review. The draft document is available online on the Irvington BART webpage at www.Fremont.gov/Irvington-BART. A work session has been scheduled for the Fremont City Council to receive a presentation on the Station Area Plan from city staff and the consultant team, ask questions, and provide comments. The session will take place at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 9 at City Hall in the City Council Chambers, 3300 Capitol Avenue.

The primary purpose of the Station Area Plan is to ensure successful integration and

Mixed-Use Development Coming to Fremont’s Centerville Area

At the Fremont City Council March 19 meeting, a new mixed-use development proposed by developer SiliconSage Builders was approved. The project will be located on Fremont Boulevard between Parish Avenue and Peralta Boulevard. It will feature 26,000 square feet of ground-floor commercial space with 93 rental apartment units on the upper floors along Fremont Boulevard and 72 for-ownership townhomes at the rear of the site facing Peralta Boulevard, Parish Avenue, and Jason Way. The approved project includes demolition of the former Fire Station No. 6, located on the site; and infrastructure improvements to perimeter streets, such as a new traffic signal and wider sidewalks.

The developer agreed to provide a variety of community benefits, including a community room available to the public to be named in honor of former Fremont Fire Chief Dan Lydon, historical displays documenting the former Fire Station No. 6 building, streetscape beautification, and discussions with local trade unions about providing work for the construction of the project. 5 tips on what to do with unwanted stuff

World-renowned tidying expert Marie Kondo is sparking joy among shoppers feeling the urge to clean out their homes.

But once you master the Japanese organizing expert’s novel approach to de-cluttering, what do you do with all the stuff you don’t want?

Charitable organizations like Goodwill have cited how Kondo’s popular Netflix series, “Tidying up with Marie Kondo” has led to a surge of donations. And sites like OfferUp and thredUP also note an uptick in the number of items being sent to them for sale. Kondo recommends getting rid of items that don’t spark joy, and she calls for decluttering by category, not by location.

Still, there’s a lot of angst in figuring out the right home for unwanted items.

“I think we’re living in the age where people are taking the stress out of their lives, so Marie Kondo comes at a perfect time,” said Wendy Liebmann, founder and CEO of WSL Strategic Retail. “But there’s a lot of stress in trying to find all these places that will take all these things.”

Liebmann recommends getting rid of the easiest items first. Then, deal with the harder items to give away or sell.

Here are five more rules to embrace:

– BE SMART ABOUT WHAT YOU’RE SELLING: Study a variety of sites from thredUp and Poshmark to find out what they accept, what carries the best value and any fees. Make sure to sell in-season items and only clean garments. For those who have a closet full of Chanel and Prada bags, check out luxury consignment online retailer The RealReal.com.

“This is not a way to get rich. But it is a way to clean out your closet,” said James Reinhart, co-founder and CEO of thredUP.com. At thredUP, only 40 percent of received items are accepted and sold online; the rest are donated. If interesting in selling secondhand items on thredUP, request a cleanout bag. New this year, customers can request a shipping label that can be used on any box. Many of the sites including thredUP and RealReal list recently sold items so customers will know their worth. Many sites set the pricing based on quality, style, and the available inventory. Check out selling fees, which vary. For example, for all sales under \$15, Poshmark takes

a flat commission of \$2.95. For sales of \$15 or more, Poshmark’s commission is 20 percent. The fee at selling app Mercari is 10 percent.

– CONSIDER APPS THAT HELP YOU SELL LOCALLY: Move over Craigslist. A growing number of marketplace apps like LetGo and OfferUp let you sell locally the big sofa or other large item that would be too expensive to ship across the country. EBay also allows customers to post local listings.

Many give the option to register with your Facebook account, helping to verify its members and make it a safer exchange. OfferUp says it’s the biggest mobile marketplace for local buyers and sellers. Last year, however, it began allowing sellers to ship item across the U.S., widening the market of prospective buyers, says Natalie Angelillo, vice president of community at OfferUp. OfferUp allows users to create a custom profile link and lets buyers and sellers leave reviews for a deal.

– STUDY WHAT CAN BE DONATED: You don’t want to waste time carting a big piece of furniture to only find out your local thrift store doesn’t want it. Best to call the local Salvation Army or Goodwill store to make sure they can either pick up the item or you can drop it off. Goodwill’s main website says acceptable donations include clothing, shoes, books, small appliances and small furniture. But starting Jan. 1, Goodwill Industries of Great New York and New Jersey has put a temporary hold on accepting book donations at their Goodwill stores, says Lauren Lawson-Zilai, a spokeswoman at Goodwill Industries International.

– SCRUTINIZE DONATION BINS: Heading to a local donation bin may be convenient, but unfortunately, many items wind up supporting for-profit groups. Look for signs that spell out a clear mission statement. Also, look at what percent of sales are contributed to the charitable organization. Be wary of a donation bin without a clear mission statement.

– RECYCLE ELECTRONICS: Many electronics makers and retailers offer recycling programs. Amazon allows customers to receive an Amazon.com gift card in exchange for a variety of electronic devices including Amazon devices.

And, of course, there’s always that garage sale.

“Check to see if your neighborhood or homeowner’s association has a designated garage sale date,” says Target Corp.’s home style expert Camille Styles. “If not, team up with a friend who may also be looking to sell some of their items.”

California National Guard to leave border, help stop fires

California is calling in the National Guard for the first time next month to help protect communities from devastating fires like the one that largely destroyed the city of Paradise last fall. It’s pulling the troops away from President Donald Trump’s border protection efforts and devoting them to fire protection, another area where Trump has been critical of California’s Democratic officials – even repeatedly threatening to cut off federal disaster funding.

Starting in April, 110 California National Guard troops will receive 11 days of training in using shovels, rakes and chain saws to help thin trees and brush, California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection spokesman Mike Mohler said. They will be divided into five teams that will travel around the state working on forest management projects, mainly clearing or reducing trees and vegetation in an effort to deprive flames of fuel.

“They will be boots on the ground doing fuels projects alongside CalFire crews,” Mohler said. “We’ve had them out for flood fighting, several different operations, but this would be the first time their mission would be fuels thinning and forest management.”

They have helped fight fires before, however. Former Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger was the first in recent decades to deploy California National Guard troops as firefighters. That occurred on July 4, 2008, after lightning storms sparked hundreds of fires, Guard Lt. Col. Jonathan Shiroma said.

He referred questions about the latest effort to CalFire, which is directing the Guard’s new assignment.

The training is similar for firefighting and fire protection. Mohler said the troops also will receive some training in forest management, “so they’re not just out there cutting brush” but understand why they’re doing what they’re doing.

For instance, firefighting crews generally cut fire lines down to mineral earth during active wildfires, while fuels management crews often do less-intensive thinning of trees and chaparral to slow advancing flames.

That often involves creating fuel breaks. They can range from stripping away all woody vegetation on wide strips of land to thinning larger trees and

removing shorter trees, brush and debris to discourage fires from climbing into treetops and jumping from tree to tree. Critics say the work damages forests and can be useless against wind-driven fires, like the one that jumped a river to rain embers on the Sierra Nevada foothills community of Paradise last year, killing 85 people in and around the Northern California city of 27,000 people. “CalFire is taking the Trump approach, logging the forest and weakening critical environmental protections, and that’s the exact opposite of what we need to be doing,” Center for Biological Diversity scientist Shaye Wolf said.

She said the better approach is to make homes more fire resistant while pruning vegetation immediately surrounding homes. CalFire this month listed 35 fuel-reduction projects it wants to start immediately, covering more than 140 square miles (362 square kilometers) – double the acreage in previous years. But state officials estimate 23,438 square miles (60,704 square kilometers) of California forestland need thinning or other restoration.

“It’s not a problem that’s going to get fixed overnight,” Mohler said.

Such thinning operations are getting more attention in recent years, with the U.S. Forest Service estimating last month that 18 million trees died in California over the last year.

The agency estimated that more than 147 million trees have died across nearly 15,625 square miles (40,469 square kilometers) during a drought that began in 2010, while about 1.5 million dead trees have been cut down.

Moreover, investigations have often blamed recent wildfires on utilities not doing a good enough job of clearing vegetation around power lines and equipment. Democratic state Sen. Bill Dodd of Napa has proposed legislation that would require CalFire to tell utilities which trees and brush to remove and then inspect the work.

Aside from Guard troops, CalFire also is creating 10 civilian fuels management crews this year. The 10-member crews could help with initial fire suppression if need be but will primarily reduce fuels, Mohler said.

“It’s going to be a pretty amazing sight to see as these crews get out there on the ground,” he said. “There’s hundreds of, unfortunately, Paradises across the state, (so) the public needs to understand this.”

Laundry robots could get foothold in the home for automation

Last week, attending the Our Crowd Summit, I felt engulfed by the breadth of innovation and minds gathered in Jerusalem’s International Convention Center. Jonathan Medved’s billion-dollar crowd-funding platform has launched some of Israel’s most promising mechatronic startups, including ReWalk, Intuition Robotics, Airobotics, and Argus Cyber Security. Household robotics, such as laundry robots, could yet be the next big thing.

Medved’s success is thanks to his infectious positivity and confidence that fosters collaboration across the venture ecosystem. In the words of the Summit’s concluding speaker, Nobel laureate Daniel Kahneman, “Optimism is the engine of capitalism. ... The people who make great things, if you look back, they were overconfident and optimistic — overconfident optimists.”

Following Dr. Kahneman’s remarks, I met the self-assured entrepreneur of FoldiMate, Gal Rozov. The laundry robots’ startup made headlines this past January at the Consumer Electronics Show (CES) demonstrating its novel approach to smart home automation.

This week, the founder shared with me the genesis of his idea: “I always felt that I should share the burden of the household chores, but I am the first to admit that I am not very good at chores and do not particularly enjoy them.”

Rozov confessed, “My wife didn’t approve of my laundry folding standards,” and then it hit him, “perhaps if there was a machine that could do the difficult part of the folding for me, I could help with this tiresome and hefty chore.”

He compared his invention with other household appliances: “It would do the difficult part — the folding, just as the dishwasher does the cleaning.”

It’s a curious juxtaposition as the creator of KitchenAid’s most successful

product, Josephine Cochran, unveiled the first working mechanical dishwasher at the 1893 World’s Fair in Chicago. However, it took another 65 years before consumers started to install units in their homes. Instead, KitchenAid’s customers prior to its postwar sales boom consisted of hotels and large restaurants.

Laundry robots go commercial first

The home consumer market has been the ruin of many upstarts, Rozov’s fresh perspective, perhaps inspired by Cochran’s story, provides value lessons for budding robot entrepreneurs. Rather than positioning FoldiMate as a new appliance merchandised at electronic stores next to washers and dryers, the company is tackling the commercial laundry space first.

“Based on our calculations, according to the current U.S. population, we estimate that each day in the U.S. alone, over 120 million items are being folded manually in laundromats and shared laundry rooms,” Rozov said. When asking him to quantify this amount, the executive projected that approximately 800,000 hours a day are spent folding clothes, translating to \$5.8 million of hourly payroll at the existing minimum wage of \$7.25.

According to Rozov, the billion-dollar market opportunity could be even higher. “We don’t know how many items are being folded in other businesses such as clothing stores, but it’s safe to assume that it is not less than laundromats, and probably a lot more,” he said.

“FoldiMate folds a laundry load of around 25 items in less than 5 minutes, and after recent tests where we tested humans folding alongside FoldiMate, we discovered that it folds at least twice as fast as a human,” gloated Rozov. This data translates into significant payroll savings and increased sales opportunities for clothing merchandisers, including such folding-obsessed stores as Gap Inc.

FoldiMate is not the first automatic clothing folding machine, but it is currently the only portable laundry robot priced under \$1,000. For years, garment manufacturers have used industrial folders that cost hundreds of thousands of dollars to pack apparel orders.

In 2018 at CES, Japanese startup Seven Dreamers, introduced Laundroid, a \$16,000 intelligent apparel organizer that includes folding drawers for creased laundry to be pressed and stacked elegantly onto the closer’s shelves.

Unlike FoldiMate, which uses clips to bend and tuck fabrics into crisp pleats, the Asian version utilizes robotic arms and a database of more than 250,000 images to scan, recognize, and fold into neat bundles. In reviewing Laundroid in 2018, Verge writer Dami Lee stated, “You’ll need a couple of hours for it to finish folding a load of laundry, as one T-shirt takes about 5-10 minutes to fold.”

With \$90 million of capital invested in the company and a Panasonic engineering partnership, Seven Dreamers is not deterred, as it is on track to release a less expensive, more efficient version later this year to compete directly against FoldiMate.

Another approach to laundry robots While Laundroid and FoldiMate tussle to conquer the \$40 billion laundry robot market, many roboticists are taking a different approach. In 2017, researchers at the Carlos III University of Madrid, Spain demonstrated a humanoid, named TEO, capable of handling domestic ironing jobs. The lab programmed TEO with wrinkle detection computer vision technology to quickly press out the creases.

In the words of its creator, Dr. Juan Victorres, “TEO is built to do what humans do as humans do it. We will have robots like TEO in our homes. It’s just a matter of who does it first.”

MIT gripper blooms

Dr. Victorres’ prediction of cyborg-butlers took a step closer to reality

this week with the announcement of the successful test of a new type of soft mechanical gripper at MIT’s Computer Science and Artificial Intelligence Laboratory. Prof. Daniela Rus displayed the origami end effector to the press, showing how the flower-like appendage is able to pick up heavy objects of varying sizes and depths.

“By combining this foldable skeleton with the soft exterior, we get the best of both worlds,” she explained. “I’m excited about using such a robot hand to start grasping groceries.” According to latest experiments by Dr. Rus, the usual arm is able to hoist 100 times its weight, promising to augment the heavy lifting for the world’s aging population.

While the sun is setting on the first generation of home robotics as exemplified with the shuttering of Jibo and Kuri, smart appliances are very much alive with the advancement of hardware like laundry robots and recent academic breakthroughs.

Rozov optimistically stated: “We don’t think we should compare FoldiMate to Jibo and Kuri. We feel that the world has been waiting for a viable solution to the folding problem for decades, and FoldiMate is the first natural step that solves the major part of the problem.”

His tenacity in pushing the industry forward is reminiscent of the perseverance of Cochran in the nineteenth century, who set out to free women from the bondage of dirty dishes by proclaiming, “If nobody else is going to invent a dish washing machine, I’ll do it myself!”

Even though they are separated by more than one hundred years, Cochran and Rozov fulfill Kahneman’s theory on the determination of entrepreneurs, “They take big risks because they underestimate how big the risks are.”
