From gentle, sweet sounds to captivating colors and design, ukuleles are loved by people all over the world. Their sound is bound to put a smile on your face and learning the various chords and rhythms truly lets your creative juices flow. The "Northern California Ukulele Festival" is dedicated to promoting ukulele music and culture and to inspire youth to keep the traditions and music alive.

The late Hollis Baker and John Ogao founded the ukulele festival in March 1994 with their vision to provide a venue touched by the Spirit of Aloha for everyone to share ukulele talent. The founders were well-known musicians from San Francisco Bay Area's Polynesian community. Ogao was also a ukulele luthier, a builder and repairer of the instrument, while Baker taught a ukulele class called Kaleponi Strings. Due to their dedication to ukulele culture and their constant display of compassion and grace, the embodiment of Aloha Spirit, they are respected musicians and entertainers of all generations.

The ukulele is a portable instrument, and thus enthusiasts have traveled to far destinations to play as a solo act, with another musician, or with a group. Throughout its 25 years, this local event has attracted ukulele enthusiasts throughout California and has spread to the East Coast, Canada, and islands of Hawaii.

On Sunday, April 28, the Northern California Ukulele Festival will celebrate its 25th year, featuring a wide range of talent, from beginners to professionals, from the Bay Area, Southern California, North Carolina, and Hawaii. The theme for this year's performance is "Ohana," meaning family.

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Mark Hsu, MD, Joins Washington Township Medical Foundation

Washington Township Medical Foundation (WTMF) proudly welcomes Mark Hsu, MD, a Stanford-trained urologist who has joined the team of physicians.


A Bay Area native, Dr. Hsu grew up in Saratoga before attending Stanford University as an undergraduate and continuing with his medical school training at Stanford University School of Medicine. He was inspired from childhood to become a doctor when his grandfather, with whom he was very close, passed away from prostate cancer. "Losing my grandfather sparked my drive to pursue a career caring for people, helping them find relief from their pain and suffering," he said.

Dr. Hsu specializes in diagnosing and treating conditions of the urinary tract and the male reproductive system. Some common disorders he treats include cancers of the kidneys, prostate, bladder, and testes; kidney stones; urinary incontinence; urinary tract infections; erectile dysfunction; infertility; and benign prostatic hyperplasia (enlargement of the prostate gland).

Dr. Hsu's personal experience with cancer led him to conduct oncology research during his college and medical school years at Stanford University. He was awarded a one-year research fellowship from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute to conduct research on molecular profiling, an important element of the future personalized medicine movement. This approach allows doctors to choose patient-specific treatments based on the patient's characteristics.

He also was awarded a Urology Care Foundation research award grant during his residency at Stanford Hospital & Clinics to conduct research on fluorescent molecular markers that can be used to definitively identify bladder cancer tumors during resection. These types of research hold future promise for both diagnosis and treatment of several diseases.

Urologists often develop long-standing relationships with their patients since urologic ailments tend to be longer lasting conditions. "In addition to my grandfather's

experience, I chose to become a urologist because it's a field of medicine that offers physicians the ability to work closely with people across the medical and surgical spectrum," said Dr. Hsu. "This was a good fit for me, as I enjoy working with my patients and colleagues and staying current with innovations in medicine and surgery."

Dr. Hsu is trained in the most current minimally invasive urological procedures. Some are done in the office, while more complex surgeries are performed in the operating room. "The trend in urology is moving toward minimally invasive over traditional open surgeries because they result in less blood loss, a quicker recovery time and overall higher patient satisfaction," he said.

"The thing I like most about my job is being with patients," said Dr. Hsu. "There's a story behind every patient who walks into the clinic, and I enjoy hearing about their lives and what brought them to us. It's rewarding to help my patients through their health issues and be an integral part of their recovery process."

For the past two and a half years, Dr. Hsu had a busy urologic practice in the growing market of Modesto, California. He was attracted to Washington Hospital because he prefers the intimate community health care setting over the larger corporate entities. "I appreciate the opportunity to provide excellent patient care here in the diverse and growing Southern Alameda County where the need for urologic care is increasing. And working in a smaller hospital that's focused on high-quality health care allows me to collaborate more easily with my fellow physicians and the administrators," he said.

A resident of Fremont, Dr. Hsu enjoys an active lifestyle playing tennis and golf as well as cycling in his free time. He enjoys traveling and scouting out new restaurants as a self-admitted foodie.

"I bring a patient-centered focus to the job," explained Dr. Hsu. "There are many different treatment options available when it comes to urologic care. I believe in educating my patients on the different paths we can take for their treatment and empowering them to decide which is best for them."

Does Your Stomach Hurt?

Abdominal Discomfort Could be a Sign of Serious Disease

Do you suffer from frequent stomachaches? Do you often feel bloated or constipated? You could have one of many gastrointestinal disorders.

"Gastrointestinal disorders, like irritable bowel syndrome and diverticulitis, can cause pain and discomfort," said Arun Srivatsa, MD, a local gastroenterologist and member of Washington Township Medical Foundation. "But there are many reasons why your stomach might hurt. It can be hard to distinguish common symptoms from serious conditions. It's important to know if there is something serious going on so you can get it treated before it gets worse."

Dr. Srivatsa will present a free seminar to help people understand some of the signs and symptoms of more serious conditions. Gastrointestinal Disorders is scheduled for

Tuesday, May 7, from 1 to 3 p.m., in the Conrad E. Anderson, MD, Auditorium, located at 2500 Mowry Ave. (Washington West) in Fremont. You can register online at www.whhs.com/events or call (800) 963-7070 for more information.

The gastrointestinal tract is part of the digestive system, which processes the food you eat, extracts the nutrients, and then moves the waste material through your body. It includes the esophagus, stomach, small intestine, large intestine and anus. The liver, pancreas, and gallbladder are also part of the digestive system.

"Any symptoms in the abdomen, from beneath the ribs to the pelvis, are considered gastrointestinal," Dr. Srivatsa explained. "This will be a general talk that will cover a range of

gastrointestinal disorders, their signs and symptoms, and treatment options. I'll also talk very briefly about how food can affect some of these disorders."

Digestive Diseases are Common

Digestive diseases affect up to 70 million people in the U.S., according to the National Institutes of Health. Two of the most common are chronic constipation and irritable bowel syndrome (IBS).

"I see a lot of stress-related stomach problems that can be classified as irritable bowel syndrome," Dr. Srivatsa said. "IBS can be caused by a genetic predisposition or it might be the result of not dealing with stress in a healthy way, and internalizing it."

At this seminar, Dr. Srivatsa will explain each area of the

abdomen and describe what can cause pain or discomfort in that area. For example, pain in the left lower quadrant could be diverticulitis or a hernia. Pain in the left upper quadrant could be acute pancreatitis or a gastric ulcer. He will touch on a number of conditions in his talk.

Dr. Srivatsa will also help participants learn how to distinguish between different types of pain. For example, is it a sharp pain or a chronic dull pain? Is it persistent, or does it come and go? Other symptoms related to the pain can also help

determine the cause. For example, do you also feel nauseated or dizzy?

"The seminar will be interactive with time for questions," he added. "I encourage people to come and get their questions answered."

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



AN OPEN LETTER TO SHEENA CHANG, FREMONT MISSION HILLS, LLC

Why are you killing the Mission Hills Athletic Club?

The club manager you installed from your corporate office appears to be doing everything in his power to drive away members. A quick look at the recent 1-star Yelp reviews (https://www.yelp.com/biz/mission-hills-athletic-club-fremont-2) tells the story of his hostility to members and guests, even brandishing a screw driver to chase people off the property. The change in reviews from 2016 to those in 2018 is telling.

The planned district proposal you presented to the city council years ago showed walking paths through the open space for the neighbors to enjoy. It included a community center for neighborhood gatherings and meetings. Instead the manager chases away anyone walking through the parking lot, even club members. He has put up a

fence to close off a footpath that has been in use for decades, forcing members to walk in traffic to reach the club. He forced USTA league tennis out of the club, causing a large number of tennis members to quit. The women's shower was closed for two months after the toilets were repaired. The manager appears to be at war with the neighbors and his own club members. The facilities are crumbling from lack of maintenance. And, due to it all, the membership is dwindling.

Many of us are left wondering if this is intentional. Is the goal to drive the business into bankruptcy so you can return to the city and try once again to petition for a zoning change to allow you to develop the property? We never really expected the grandiose club expansion you pushed through

the city council would be completed. (Though we thought it might at least be started) But that isn't necessary. Just a few modest improvements and, more importantly, management that cares about its customers would breathe new life into the club. That happened during the first year the club reopened. A dedicated manager made customers feel welcome and built the membership. The current management is the polar opposite.

I don't expect to ever see the glory days again when families had barbeques around the pool, the frond desk had a bowl of dog treats for people walking their dogs, and the club fielded championship tennis teams. But I will be sad to see the club die.

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

and strength, reduced pain and stiffness, better sleep and an improved immune system with minimal risk to the participant.

Qigong—pronounced "chee gong"—is an even more ancient traditional Chinese wellness practice that has been referred to as meditative movement. One unique feature of Qigong is the training of the mind to direct the body's energy, or chi, to any part of the body, thus improving focus, circulation, relieving stress and pain, and restoring health. Tai Chi is encompassed in Qigong. Tai Chi is considered "soft" Qigong practice. Qigong is commonly thought of as easier than Tai Chi.

Master May Chen has been teaching and developing the Tai Chi and Qigong program at Ohlone College since 2008. She is also the Ohlone College Tai Chi Qigong Competition Team coach and faculty adviser to the Ohlone College Tai Chi Qigong Club. Master Chen teaches the popular Saturday morning Ohlone College Community Ed Tai Chi Qigong Basics class.

Master Chen was awarded Tai Chi Master of the Year 2010 by

the World Qigong Congress. She received her MA in Gerontology from USC in 2015. Her unique teaching style facilitates a Tai Chi and Qigong based lifelong fitness and leisure pursuit through understanding and incorporating the inherent theoretical, philosophical and physical foundations of self-defense, fitness, and meditation. Along with emphasizing contemporary health sciences perspectives—the regard for the physicality, range of motion, safety in motion; essential theories and principles in complementary East West health practices —she actively seeks to perpetuate the beauty and wisdom of the classic forms with today's mindset and lifestyle. Chen published her first textbook "Qigong, Meditation, and Tai Chi: Your Pathway to Health and Longevity" in 2017 through Kendall Hunt Publishers. A second edition is currently in progress.

The Ohlone College Tai Chi Qigong program includes Beginning and Intermediate Tai Chi and Qigong, Qigong Meditation and Walking Meditation, all with university transferable units.

Master May credits Grandmaster Wang Xian, ChenJiaGo, China, for fostering and mentoring a personal passion into a lifelong sharing process, through teaching while addressing continual refinement in practice and appreciation for healthy longevity.

Chen will lead the opening community exercise and the closing meditation sessions. All aspects of the day's events are carefully orchestrated to share and highlight the changing attitudes and practices regarding healthy mind, body, and spirit within our community and throughout the world.





California issued 23,500 tax returns without verification

The California board that processes tax returns says it issued 23,500 refunds without verifying whether people had entered accurate wage information.

The Franchise Tax Board will begin notifying people on Monday if they owe more to the government than they paid or if a bigger refund check is coming. Most people in that pool will see no changes to their returns at all, said Denise Azimi, spokeswoman for the board.

The error occurred over three days in March because of a technology glitch that has been fixed, she said. The glitch allowed the returns to be sent before the state could verify that people had reported their withholdings correctly. Anyone who entered their information correctly should see no change.

Azimi could not provide an exact number of incorrect returns.

The error didn't reveal other vulnerabilities in the state's system. Only returns filed between March 8 and March 11 were affected.

The board announced the error on its website Tuesday.

Centerville Paid Parking Program

In early 2018, the City of Fremont announced a paid

Hayward selects operator for Housing Navigation Center

The City of Hayward announced on April 16 that it has selected nonprofit agency Bay Area Community Services (BACS) to operate a planned Navigation Center to provide people living on the streets a pathway to permanent housing. The new Hayward Housing Navigation Center is modeled on a BACS-run City of Berkeley program called STAIR, which provides service-rich transitional shelter for homeless people for up to six months and is successfully moving participants into permanent housing. STAIR is an acronym drawn from "stability, navigation and respite." A community meeting is scheduled on Wednesday, April 24 to give the public an opportunity to hear first-hand from City of Hayward and BACS representatives and ask questions.

The Hayward Navigation Center is expected to open this winter on city property at Depot Road and Whitesell Street. It will provide short-term shelter for 45 individuals at a time, intensive case management, and housing-placement services focused on individuals living on the streets, in encampments or illegally inhabiting vacant buildings. The center will contain showers, laundry facilities, a place to eat and gather, and dormitory housing units with twin beds and movable privacy screens. Participants will be provided with one meal per day. The center will not accept walk-ins; all participants will be selected by an outreach team and go through an intake process. 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Walmart buys ad tech startup

Walmart says it's buying San Francisco-based ad tech startup Polymorph Labs as it looks to better compete with rival online juggernaut Amazon in targeting shoppers online.

The world's largest retailer has been quietly building its own advertising business with a unit called Walmart Media Group, though that business is still smaller than Amazon's.

Amazon's total ad revenue in the U.S. was \$3.3 billion, or nearly 4% of the total digital ad spending pie in 2017, according to research firm eMarketer. The firm expects Amazon's ad revenue to hit \$19.2 billion, or 11.2%, by 2021. No numbers are available for Walmart.

Walmart Inc. said Thursday Polymorph's technology will make advertising with the discounter easier for thousands of brands while delivering more relevant digital ads to consumers

Terms of the deal weren't disclosed.

Polymorph's technology platform, which includes a high-speed ad server, will enable Walmart advertisers to quickly select audience segments based

on shopping behavior. For example, brands that advertise could quickly identify cat food buyers versus dog food buyers, and then measure whether their ads influenced a sale.

"We can help brands understand if someone saw their ad on Walmart's platform or across the internet, and then purchased the product in-store or online," wrote Stefanie Jay, vice president and general manager of Walmart Media Group, in a corporate blog post. "No one else can do this at scale like Walmart."

LETTER TO THE EDITOR Morrison Canyon community meeting is important

Single-lane Morrison Canyon Road carves through a steep, wooded canyon, and people enjoy walking on the peaceful path. But the road is narrow (nine-feet wide), and has two-way traffic with few turnouts. The road dates back to the late 1800s, designed for horse-drawn wagons. In the second half of the 20th century, it was paved for motor vehicles, though it was never designed to be a road.

Two residents of Vargas Plateau filed suit against the park district in 2008, citing the "narrow, dangerous and substandard" roads. They claimed that the city is liable for the condition of the roads. The city agreed, and closed Morrison Canyon Rd in November 2018. But the city wants to have the state legislate a "recreational trail" exemption, allowing residents of Vargas Plateau and their invited guests to have access to the road without the city incurring liability for injuries.

A microbrewery ordinance to promote agri-tourism, wineries and microbreweries was proposed in 2016. After alterations, it passed the first reading in early April 2019. However, the County Supervisor for District One [Scott Haggerty] deleted a key provision for road safety at the last minute, with no notice to the community, the city of Fremont, or other interested parties. The Mayor of Fremont and the General Manager of East Bay Regional Park District both supported the (now-deleted) provision:

"At a minimum, access roads shall have a dimension of no less than 24 feet, with the minimum paved width of 20 feet in width to accommodate two passing vehicles along its entire length." (draft ordinance 17.06.030 E.)

The ordinance will soon come up for its final reading, but the city has not formally responded to the deletion. The Supervisor appears to be deaf to Fremont's concerns about public safety. Tell the city and the county that the Microbrewery Ordinance should disallow facilities where the roads are narrow.

A large structure permitted for "utility storage" was constructed on Vargas Plateau, without environmental review and without evaluating the traffic impact. This and related zoning issues are presently the subject of litigation. The owner is planting a vineyard, and said he could open a winery and tasting room. With an occupancy certification of 400 persons (and 50-100 parking spaces), the facility would generate traffic for assemblies and gatherings. If Morrison Canyon Road is re-opened, cars and pickups would be back on the road in late 2019. This would endanger pedestrians and bicyclists, and more trash would be dumped in the creek. Tell city officials that you want to dedicate the pathway for pedestrians and bicyclists—no cars on the closed section.

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



Don't throw it away Grow it today!

The question if Bill Gates dropped a \$100 bill, would he be wasting his time picking it up? has actually been answered. The answer is yes, because the average rate of return that he gets on his worth earns him over \$100 dollars per second. He would still probably pick up the note because nobody likes knowingly wasting money. However, there are occasions when people waste money without knowing it. One of those times for anyone who eats certain vegetables is when they discard the inedible crowns instead of re-growing them.

A lot of resources go into growing a single vegetable from seed and getting it to the dinner table. Growing a head of lettuce will have used fuel to get the seed to the farm, for transportation on the farm, to get it to a distribution center, and then to market. Energy will be used by anyone that drives to the market to purchase the lettuce. Although a head of lettuce is not shipped by itself, it still contributes to the overall expenditure of energy that it takes to eventually get it home. The energy expended for purchasing one or two heads per week can have a negative impact on the environment over the long run. Replanting the crown and growing more lettuce leaves from what would have been discarded will benefit the environment.

That same grocery store lettuce also needed water to be produced just as ones grown at home will. It takes three gallons of water to produce one cup of iceberg lettuce. A single medium head of iceberg lettuce can yield up to eight cups, thus taking 24 gallons of water to produce it. Re-sprouting the crown can produce more lettuce leaves using far less water than if a new plant was started. Reusing the crown also means less lettuce will need to be purchased, thus saving money.

Not all fruit or vegetable food scraps have the possibility of resprouting. There are three types of kitchen scraps that can be used to grow a clone or new plant.

Seeds are the most obvious candidate for growing a new plant but often end up in the green bin with all the other kitchen waste. Although it might be easier to drop \$4 on a seed packet, saving seeds instead of discarding them is comparable to picking up that \$4. Nonorganic fruits and vegetables might have seeds that have been genetically modified to be sterile, so it is best to always

grow seeds from organic sources. Different plants' seeds have different shelf lives as well. Onions have about a 10-month window while a tomato seed has been germinated after 22 years. Most tomato seeds are good for seven to 10 years. There is a comprehensive seed viability chart at www.johnnyseeds.com to help planting be successful.

Many plants, including some vegetables, can be re-grown from their crowns. A plant's crown is where the stem and the roots come together. It is also the part that is usually disposed of when preparing a vegetable for a meal. Bok choy, celery, leeks, lettuces,

lemongrass, carrots, onions, garlic, chives, pineapple, beets, turnips, radishes, and many other root vegetables can regrow from their severed crown. The crowns of some plants such as lemongrass will grow back to their original size. Others, such as celery crowns will produce stalks about half their mature size, and some, like beet crowns, will yield smaller vegetables but produce tender edible foliage and/or seeds for planting.

A kitchen scrap will have been cut either below the crown if working with a turnip, or above it as in the case of a leek. The stem sides in both cases should be placed upright in a shallow dish

of moist sand or water that does not submerge the top of the crown and placed on a bright window sill. The water should be changed every other day. A small stem or stems and possibly some roots down below will begin to appear within two to three weeks. The plant can then be transplanted into a vegetable bed or container and grown until it is ready to be harvested.

Ginger, turmeric, horseradish, and Jerusalem artichoke are examples of edible rhizomes that are used in many different cuisines. Most need to be peeled and inevitably the small, hard to peel pieces get thrown out. These little portions can be planted in a

small pot after the sliced side has dried out for a few days. The plants can be placed or transplanted outside in the spring. When properly cared for they will produce a never-ending supply of these root-based spices.

There is often unknown value in some of the things that get thrown away. Using food scraps to grow more vegetables might only save a little bit of money but will provide a harvest rich in flavor and delight.





"Get pre-approved, start deciding what your wants and needs are, because they are not necessarily the same thing, and begin narrowing down where you want to live. In choosing a REALTOR® make sure it is someone you are comfortable with and have the confidence they will be able to successfully guide you through the buying process.

Allen emphasized that in addition to being prepared, there are things a first-time buyer should not do, "Don't expect to find a property that is perfect. You can always change a wall color or flooring. Figure that you're going to stay in your first home for a few years and can take your time making it reflect your own style."

"Once you are pre-approved for your loan, you don't want to go out and buy new furniture, a new washer and dryer or a new car, because if there is one thing that is going to derail the process it will be when your lender says, 'I'm sorry you no

longer qualify for this house."

Unlike purchasing a car, a home purchase is a longer, more complicated experience. Asked how long the home buying process can take, Allen said, "It's really going to depend on what they're looking for, how much competition there is and what strategies they have, to get the house they want. Once you're in contract, the process should take 30 to 40 days but it's finding the house and getting your offer accepted that's the big first step."

Allen offered tips on coping with first-time home buyer stress, "Patience is definitely going to be part of the process as well as really listening to your REALTOR® because they've been

through these many times before. It's going to feel very overwhelming with all the paper work, inspections and reports to review. But there is also a lot of emotion involved, and it can feel scary. Take it one step at a time."

With sales prices at historically high levels, some buyers may question the feasibility of purchasing their first home in the Bay Area. Allen said, "There are so many loan programs available to first-time buyers. Don't think you have to wait until you have a 20 percent down payment to start looking for your home. Talk to a lender and see what loan options work best for you. Typically, in spring we see more properties coming on the market. This should be a great time to go out and start looking for your first home."

Uber rolls out feature urging riders to 'check your ride'

Uber said Thursday it would send a push notification to riders reminding them to check the driver and vehicle. The push alert will include the driver's name, photo,

license plate number and vehicle make and model.

The ride-hailing giant is rolling out the feature first in Columbia, South Carolina and later nationwide.

Uber is also sending emails to every rider to outline the steps to make sure they're getting into the right car.

FESCO SHUFFLE aims to end Family Homelessness

After a long day of work, school, or other daily tasks, many are eager to go home, relax, and perhaps enjoy a meal. However, even after they leave," Miller says. FESCO has several housing projects, such as the Les Marquis House, Banyan House, and Third Street Apartments, all located in Hayward.

The Les Marquis House is FESCO's first original shelter.

With 22 beds that can house up to eight families for 60 to 90 days, this housing unit is open 24/7. Not only is shelter and food provided, but life skills classes, children's activities, employment training, and several other aids. The Banyan House is

that families crave stability and therefore emphasize the importance that homelessness is not the end of everything. Miller says, "We actually just had a family leave one of our transitional units and find permanent housing. The family consisted of two parents and eight children, so they were a large family. The father had difficulty finding a job. They lived in their car for six months. We were able to help them and now they have their own home, and we couldn't be happier."

Along with FESCO's services are their inspiring events, such as the upcoming 22nd annual "FESCO Shuffle" on Saturday, May 4. The one-mile walk is a community event at San Leandro Marina Park and welcomes

FESCO members and other dignitaries, followed by the walk at 10 a.m. Walkers make one loop around the park and are cheered on by the beat of taiko drummers. Lunch and refreshments are available, and participants can receive a FESCO Shuffle T-shirt.

The Shuffle is also an opportunity to educate the community. Vendor booths are present to spread knowledge about the availability of different resources for shelter, health, and other possible needs within communities. "We love the positive community vibe that it brings," Miller states. Attendees are also free to enjoy live musical entertainment, participate in a fun raffle with prizes such as restaurant gift cards, as well as



for families on the verge of homelessness, keeping a home is a difficult reality to maintain. Thankfully, the non-profit organization Family Emergency Shelter Coalition (FESCO) has played an integral role in helping families recoup.

Founded in 1986 by an alliance of churches and community members in mid-Alameda County, FESCO ensures that families struggling to find shelter, food, and other resources receive them. Not only are low-income homeless families provided with such support but are encouraged to regain stability in self-sufficiency and permanent housing. FESCO Development Associate Stephanie Miller states, "What many don't realize is that homeless people can also be single-parents working double jobs while having children to take care of and are still not meeting income needs. Homeless people are literally people who are stuck in a domino effect of losing money, food, and other resources because, at this point, it is difficult to maintain employment."

FESCO has assisted roughly 300 families a year, including single fathers, families with teenage boys, or families with members who may have mental health issues and physical disabilities. Depending on each family's personal situation, FESCO helps accommodate them with transitional housing. "Transitional housing is a stepping stone. It's an opportunity for individuals or families to financially save up and learn life skills so that when they re-enter the rental market, they can stand on their feet. We want to help them in any way we can,

the next step for families who may need further time to acquire employment or continue attending school/vocational training. They are provided with the same services as the Les Marquis House, with the incorporation of private bathrooms, community dining space, a computer room, and a children's playground. In order to help families save up financially, only 30 percent of their income is required for rent. Third Street Apartments is currently a full four-unit permanent housing project that provides low-cost rental housing and supportive services, particularly for people with physical disabilities.

Along with transitional housing, FESCO offers mental health counseling, homeless prevention and alumni services, and even educational resources such as homework club and collegial aid. FESCO understands

roughly 150 to 300 attendees each year. Longtime FESCO Executive Director Nancy Schluntz created the celebration in hopes of showcasing FESCO's mission while simultaneously gathering the community together for an important cause. Schluntz recently passed away, therefore this year's walk will hold a special tribute in her honor. Last year, the event raised \$57,000, with this year's donation goal being \$62,000. Proceeds raised go to FESCO and its family/children's services.

All are welcome to attend, including dogs. Attendees can register and make donations at the event itself, however for those who wish to raise money beforehand, teams can be formed on the FESCO website, along with the creation of team fundraising pages. The event begins with an opening ceremony of speeches from

The devotion and passion within FESCO are certain to motivate its members, along with the community, to lift up families who may have otherwise lost hope in finding a home. This organization's determination in acknowledging homelessness and creating a safe space for such serious and sensitive issues to be discussed has and surely will continue to help hundreds of parents and children.

Swalwell leads 96 house members in urging increased funding for transit security

Rep. Eric Swalwell (CA-15) led 96 House Members in urging rejection of President Donald Trump's proposal to slash funding for transit security that is crucial to protecting American lives.

"I have no greater priority in Congress than the safety of the American people," said Swalwell. "The President's plan to gut funding for transit security puts American lives at risk. In Brussels, Madrid, and London, terrorists have targeted mass transit to carry out deadly attacks. To ensure an American city is not next, we must invest in the security of our public transit systems. No one should feel unsafe riding our rails, buses, and ferries."

The Trump Administration proposes cutting funding for the Department of Homeland Security's Transit Security Grant Program (TSGP) by almost two thirds, from \$100 million to only \$36.4 million in fiscal year (FY) 2020. It further proposes a 25 percent non-federal cost share requirement that will make it more expensive for agencies to accept TSGP awards.

Americans made almost 10.1 billion passenger trips on mass transit in 2017, according to the American Public Transportation Association. The sheer number of people taking these trips, the ease with which anyone can enter and exit public transit systems, and their location mostly in urban areas make them prime targets for attacks.

TSGP is a competitive grant program administrated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency through which eligible public transit agencies operating bus, rail, and ferry systems can get money for measures including operational activities like surveillance or asset protection like tunnel hardening.

Swalwell led lawmakers in sending a letter to the House Appropriations Homeland Security Subcommittee's bipartisan leaders, urging them to reject the President's proposed cuts. In the letter, lawmakers also request an increase in FY 2020 funding from \$100 million to at least \$105 million as well as a rejection of the suggestion for a non-federal cost share requirement.

"While we recognize that the current budget climate makes funding choices difficult, we urge you to keep in mind the consequences of failing to commit sufficient resources to protect mass transit systems used daily by millions of Americans," the members wrote. "The small amount of money spent now could be dwarfed by the savings in lives and damage by preventing a horrific attack."

T.S. Eliot's poems are easily read but complex, distinguished by insight and whimsy. One of his most famous collections is Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats, published in 1939. Currently, its appearance as the Andrew Lloyd Webber musical hit, Cats, is a worldwide phenomenon. Following its debut in 1981, Cats remains a theatre favorite with a wide range of audiences; it has also been adapted to a film version with an expected release at the end of this year.

Among the cats portrayed by
Old Possum (Eliot), is a cat named
Macavity whose proclivity for crime is
well-known. However, as the opening of
Macavity's poetic biography states:

Macavity's a Mystery Cat: he's called the Hidden Paw—
For he's the master criminal who can defy the Law.

Not only is Macavity suspected of all manner of wrongdoing, but his prowess is so monumental that he is able to "break the law of gravity."

No matter how long dedicated and savvy detectives may search the scene of a crime, the devious Macavity is simply "not there!" His stealthy manner is a wonder to behold, yet the havoc wreaked can be devastating. Others may be apprehended, but behind it all is Macavity, "the Napoleon of crime" who, if so inclined:

Macarity

"You'll be sure to find him resting, or a-licking of his thumbs,

Or engaged in doing complicated long-division sums."

Macavity is mysterious, fascinating and often malevolent, but in a sly and stealthy manner. His effectiveness is achieved using benign context, although belied by a sinister appearance. Actions are clouded by subterfuge that is difficult to discern.

All of us may recognize a bit of Macavity in our own personality, but choose to maneuver toward more benevolent, altruistic and moral behavior and actions. The Macavity factor can be tempting for everyone, but especially when power, position and wealth is at stake. A political environment is fertile ground for Macavity. His influence isn't always apparent and can insinuate good intentions but as he gains ground, responsible governance may prove to be simply a thin veneer of civility.

Macavity's influence can even be found at the local level of government. In the past, there have been many examples of his malevolent behavior, but at the April 16 meeting of Fremont City Council, Macavity tendencies surfaced in discussion of proposed "emergency actions" for a Housing Navigation Center (HNC). Although a site has not been finalized, concerns from residents of District 4 about plans and negotiations for a location in Niles were heard. It appeared from these comments and plan documents that site selection has progressed well beyond the exploratory phase.

Addressing these concerns, assurances were made that site selection was not part of the proposal that evening, rather to enable use of State funds and continue a rapid process toward a facility somewhere in Fremont. However, pre-selection without community

participation is a concern. Although there is a January 1, 2020 deadline to obligate 50% of \$2,000,000 State funds and completely expend the funds by June, 2021, there is time to do this with adequate community participation.

Council authorization to "issue public works contracts for site preparation and building procurement" and select a "service provider to operate the HNC" may be an attempt to put the cart before the horse. Even though approval by council of a preferred site and budget will be required to finalize any decisions, community input of possible sites is best for those involved in finding remedies for the admittedly profound problem of homelessness. Addressing the community and council with a fait accompli under the guise of an emergency declaration without proper attribution and consultation will lead to harsh feelings and unnecessary delays. Careful preparation and consultation can be a keystone to a smooth and welcome addition to a collective community problem. Without it, the work of Macavity may create dissention and discord.

As "Old Possum" cautions:

Macavity, Macavity, there's no one like Macavity,

There never was a Cat of such deceitfulness and suavity.

He always has an alibi, and one or two to spaer:

At whatever time the deed took place - MACAVITY WASN'T THERE!





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

\$5M reserved for fighting sexual assault, domestic violence and human trafficking

At a special meeting to address incidents of sexual assault, domestic violence and human trafficking in Santa Clara County, a committee of the Board of Supervisors approved setting aside \$5 million in a reserve for strengthening the fight against gender-based violent crimes and improving services for survivors. The meeting brought together the County Board of Supervisors' Children, Seniors and Families Committee and the San Jose City Council's Public Safety, Finance and

Strategic Support Committee to hear from experts in the field of sexual crimes and from survivors who provided personal testimony.

"It's been clear to me for some time that this is one of the most severely underfunded categories in our County mission," said Supervisor Dave Cortese. "Five million is a good start, but we're going to have to keep feeding the bucket, and those who come after us will have to do the same thing."

The action followed presentations from three panels with members who represented law enforcement,

investigators and prosecutors, medical professionals, behavioral health, education, survivor services and prevention programs. The city councilmembers, county supervisors and audience listened to recommendations from panelists on how current policies and protocols could be improved. The county staff and city committees will review recommendations at their meetings. The \$5 million in reserve would be available to implement some of the recommendations.

New student placement process coming to Ohlone College

Officials from the Ohlone Community College District recently announced that a new placement process will soon start will let students enroll in transfer-level English and math courses during their first term. The new policy will go into effect for students enrolled during the summer/fall 2019 semester.

"We are looking forward to the positive impact these new changes will have on our students," says Dr. Eva Margarita Munguía, Dean of Counseling and Student Success Programs at Ohlone. "With this new system, we will be able to have a better understanding of what our student's strengths truly are and to be able to create a pathway for their success."

Under the newly re-designed self-guided placement system students will select their first math and English course without a placement test. The web-based system uses high school grades in English and math, along with the students' high school grade point average to provide placement advice that is most appropriate to a students' educational pathway at Ohlone College and beyond.

The following course suggestions are now being made for Ohlone's math and English students:

- The required English sequence now begins ENGL-101A (Reading and Written Composition Students who feel the need for more support before taking ENGL-101A should consider taking ENGL 151RW (Intro to College Reading and Writing).
- The sequence of math courses has changed. For students in science, engineering, math, and business, the new sequence starts at MATH-186 (Precalculus I). For students in the liberal arts, the new sequence starts with MATH-156 (Math for Liberal Arts) or MATH-159 (Statistics).

The new placement system will also help students save time and money. By being placed directly in to a transfer-level course, students will transfer to a four-year institution and/or find a job at a much more efficient rate. Alameda County Water District receives upgraded credit rating

The Alameda County Water District announced an upgraded credit rating from Aa2 to Aa1 on April 9 from Moody's Investors Service, affecting \$80 million in outstanding revenue bonds. Moody's considered several factors to determine the upgrade, including the District's healthy debt service coverage, robust liquidity, diverse water supply with ample storage, and effective management team as credit strengths. ACWD's 25-year capital improvement program (CIP) with annual updates, a low debt burden and a financial planning model attribute to prudent fiscal management, additional credit strengths noted by Moody's.

"This bump up in our credit rating affirms our responsible fiscal management and ongoing obligation to act in the best interest of our customers," said ACWD Board President James Gunther.

With the Hayward Fault running through the service area and the threat of seismic events, Moody's decision considered ACWD's long-term CIP planning, which includes seismic retrofits and upgrades, and the replacement of aging water mains.

ACWD's water main renewal program identifies and prioritizes the upgrade or replacement of aging pipelines. With nearly 900 miles of water mains in the Tri-Cities, the program slates \$10 million per year toward improvements.

Santa Clara County urged to explore establishing a public bank

Supervisors Dave Cortese and Cindy Chavez will request on April 23, 2019, that Santa Clara County explore Municipal Public Banking, an initiative proposed in State Assembly Bill 857 by Assemblymembers Miguel Santiago of Los Angeles and David Chiu of San Francisco. The legislation would allow local jurisdictions like the County to create charters that would allow them to form their own local or regional public banks.

The idea is for local governments to collect the benefits and earnings on large municipal accounts that now go to Wall Street. Unlike private banks that make shareholders' returns the priority, a public bank could consider community needs in its decisions, according to the bill's authors and supporters.

Concerned about school funding, class sizes or campus safety? Join our Bus Trip for Education

Charter schools, teacher salaries, class sizes, campus safety and per-student funding are among the top issues facing education in California. You have a chance to learn more about them and voice your concerns to the people who make the decisions about these and other issues. Our state legislators will meet with us on Wednesday, May 15 in Sacramento during our 17th annual free Bus Trip for Education, a daylong event that has grown from a van-full of concerned parents to four buses full of community members, teachers, elected officials and students.

While the challenges that schools face have changed over the years, the need for our legislators to hear from us has not. Please join me and my staff to hear what our Santa Clara County delegation is working on, their updates on bills and, most important, their answers to our questions. There will also be a tour of the Capitol Building. The event has always been focused on education, but you can also ask questions of our legislators about other current topics, such as housing and healthcare.

We'll provide information you can read on the bus to help prepare you for the Q&A's with legislators, including assemblymembers Evan Low, Ash Kalra and Mark Berman, as well as senators Jim Beall, Jerry Hill and Bob Wieckowski. We hope to also be joined by representatives from the State Board of Education and the Controller's Office.

In January, Governor Gavin Newsom proposed a record \$80.7 billion in the state budget for K-12 education and he also added funding for a second year of free community college for full-time students. His budget also includes money for expanding preschool education and \$750 million to fund more all-day kindergarten programs. The Local Control Funding Formula will get most of the K-12 funds - \$2 billion, and there is an increase in special education funding of \$576 million. But teacher salaries are still a big issue considering the teachers' strikes across the state, often because many are not paid enough to meet the high cost of housing. So, there will be a lot to discuss with our legislators. I hope you will join us.

We'll gather Wednesday, May 15 at 6 a.m., and the buses will leave at 6:30 a.m. from the VTA Transit Center at Eastridge Mall, 2200 Eastridge Loop, San Jose, and return to the same location around 5 p.m. A light breakfast and lunch will be provided.
