Imagine Star Wars Storm Troopers, Disney Princesses, and Stomper from the Oakland A's in one place. It's not Disneyland, it's a running event that raises money for a good cause.

"Superhero Heart Run" raises awareness and provides support for families with Congenital Heart Defects (CHDs), a birth defect that affects 1 in 100 children. The 4th Annual Superhero Heart Run on Sunday, November 3 at Quarry Lakes in Fremont was founded by Mended Little Hearts of the Bay Area.

Shannon Liu Shair, an Estate Planning Attorney and Planning Committee member of the Superhero Heart Run, has a family tie to CHD. Her 3-year-old son, Ripley, was born with the condition that required open heart surgery at 30 days old. There is no cure for CHD. Shair explained that people with CHD have to take care of their hearts like one would a car—repairs can be made, but there's a lifetime of maintenance to make sure the overall system is doing well.

"There are kids who may only need one open heart surgery through their life, but they still will receive yearly checkups to see how their heart's doing," Shair said. Some children

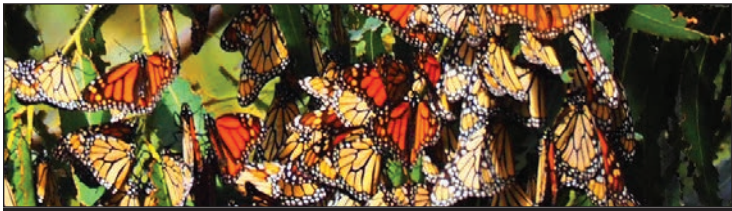
Monarchs' Return

Get the Flu Shot

Getting your annual flu vaccination is the most important health-related action you can take to protect yourself from getting sick from the flu this winter.

Flu shots are now available at the Washington Hospital Urgent Care Clinic and at many local pharmacies. Getting a flu shot is the best way to avoid being sick with the flu for two or more weeks and exposing others, including vulnerable individuals, according to Dr. Dianne Martin, a Washington Township Medical Foundation internal medicine and infectious diseases specialist.

The Centers for Disease Control and Infection recommends the flu vaccine for everyone, ages 6 months and older. The annual vaccination is particularly important for adults, ages 65 and older; children, 6 months to 8 years; anyone with a chronic illness such as cancer, heart disease or asthma; and pregnant women.

Dr. Martin notes concern among some pregnant women regarding having a flu shot, but she believes it is appropriate for most pregnant women and explains it also can protect the baby. Certain individuals identified with high-risk illnesses should not take the flu vaccine. Dr. Martin urges anyone with concerns to consult his/her primary care physician.

The flu is highly contagious and can spread though the air and by touching exposed surfaces. A person can be ill with the flu for 24 hours before symptoms occur and can inadvertently expose others. Flu symptoms include fever, chills, a sore throat, a runny or stuffy nose, body aches

and fatigue. Possible complications from the flu include secondary bacterial infections, pneumonia, lung and cardiac complications, and neuromuscular complications such as encephalitis, meningitis, or seizures, among other serious illnesses.

The flu is a virus, Dr. Martin emphasizes, and therefore cannot be treated with regular antibiotics, unless a secondary bacterial infection develops. Some specific influenza antiviral medications are available, she notes. Washington Hospital is offering a

vaccination for four current influenza strains, A and B. One of the influenza A strains is new from last year.

The Washington Hospital Urgent Care Clinic is open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily. No appointment is necessary for a flu shot. Walk-in hours are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday-Friday, and noon to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The clinic is located on the second floor at 2500 Mowry Ave. in Fremont, telephone 510.608.6174.

The flu vaccine is covered 100 percent by Medicare Part B and most health insurance programs cover the annual

vaccine. Cash discounts also are available at the Urgent Care Clinic.

Dr. Martin urges individuals to have the flu vaccine as soon as possible, as it usually takes up to two weeks for immunity to develop. However, she notes, “It’s never too late to get the flu shot. The vaccination is effective all season long.” Those who have the flu shot are generally 40 to 60 percent less likely to become seriously ill from the flu.

The vaccine is preferred to the nasal spray, Dr. Martin says, as the nasal spray has limitations and there are concerns about its effectiveness. It is limited to non-pregnant individuals ages 2 to 49, and is not recommended for individuals with compromised immune systems.

Individuals with egg allergies should not avoid the flu vaccine, but rather should discuss their situation with their physician. An alternative vaccine is available for those with egg allergies.

To protect against the flu, Dr. Martin recommends the following steps:

- Get the flu vaccine every year
- Practice good hand and personal hygiene
- Cover your mouth while sneezing/coughing and wash your hands regularly

Finally, she says, if you think you have the flu, check with your physician or go to Urgent Care. If you are sick, stay home and if your children are sick, keep them home too.

When Automatic Negative Thoughts Cause Anxiety

Free Seminar Offers Advice on Recognizing and Overcoming ANTs



Learn tips for recognizing and controlling persistent negative thoughts: free seminar, Nov. 12, 6 to 8 p.m.

It's perfectly natural to have occasional negative thoughts when something goes wrong at work or in your family or social life. Persistent, repeated negative thoughts that continuously run through your mind, however, can contribute to serious disruptions in your ability to function well.

"Many people are aware that negative thinking can be a symptom of conditions such as depression," says Seema Sehgal, MD, a psychiatrist at Washington Township Medical Foundation (WTMF). "For example, a person who is suffering from depression may repeatedly think, 'I just don't want to get up in the morning,' or 'I really don't enjoy life anymore.' Depression is not the only condition that features persistent negative thinking, though. Recurring negative thoughts can also result in debilitating anxiety."

Dr. Sehgal notes that in psychiatry, these persistent patterns of negative thinking are known as "automatic negative thoughts," or ANTs, because people sometimes are generating negative thoughts automatically, without being aware that they are doing so.

"Recurring negative thoughts for people with depression are a different variety from the ANTs experienced by people with anxiety disorders," she explains. "People with anxiety often are worriers who automatically assume the worst is going to happen. They also tend to blame themselves whenever something goes wrong, even if it is not their fault. Anxious people will have recurring thoughts such as, 'I can never do anything right,' or 'Why is everyone ignoring me today – did I do something to make them angry with me?' This is a disruptive pattern of behavior that is not based in reality."

To help people learn more about how persistent, automatic negative thoughts can become the source of an anxiety disorder, Washington Hospital is offering a free seminar featuring Dr. Sehgal on Tuesday, November 12, from 6 to 8 p.m. in the Conrad E. Anderson, MD, Auditorium located in the Washington West building at 2500 Mowry Ave. in Fremont. Dr. Sehgal also will discuss tips for recognizing negative thought patterns that are detrimental to people's emotional well-being and will explain various simple mental exercises for reducing ANTs and anxiety.

"ANTs are not dissimilar to ordinary, everyday ants," Dr. Sehgal observes. "A few ants won't ruin your picnic, but an 'army' of ants certainly will. And red ants – or ANTs not based in reality – are the most dangerous. The greater frequency of ANTs in your life correlates to greater stress and anxiety."

Dr. Sehgal asserts that awareness of disruptive ANTs begins with recognizing your thought patterns.

"It's important to differentiate between rational concerns and irrational, never-ending streams of 'what-if' scenarios," she says. "Anxiety can result from ANT behavior patterns that are learned from, or patterned by, parents or other people in your life. Learning anxious behavior as a child often can have a lasting impact on your life for years, clear into adulthood."

Overcoming ANTs and the anxiety those negative thoughts can produce may not be easy at times, but

Dr. Sehgal believes that recognizing and releasing negative thoughts can help alleviate anxiety and enable people to lead calmer, more productive lives. She will offer a variety of anxiety-reducing techniques at the seminar.

"I often tell patients to remind themselves that we all are going to have a bad experience sometimes," she says. "The key is to try to get past that experience and recognize that tomorrow is another day. Keeping a 'gratitude journal' – writing down three or more things for which you are grateful each day – can help you focus on the good parts of your life. The journal also can serve as an archive of positive thoughts to refer to from time to time, reinforcing the good aspects of your life. I also ask patients to think about how they would respond to a friend who has similar worries. If you would respond to your friend with compassion, why can't you be compassionate with yourself?"

Dr. Sehgal also will discuss how people can recognize when they need to get help and will provide a variety of resources for getting that help. "You know yourself better than anyone else," she notes. "So I believe that if you are struggling, you can learn to recognize when you feel out of control and need to seek assistance."

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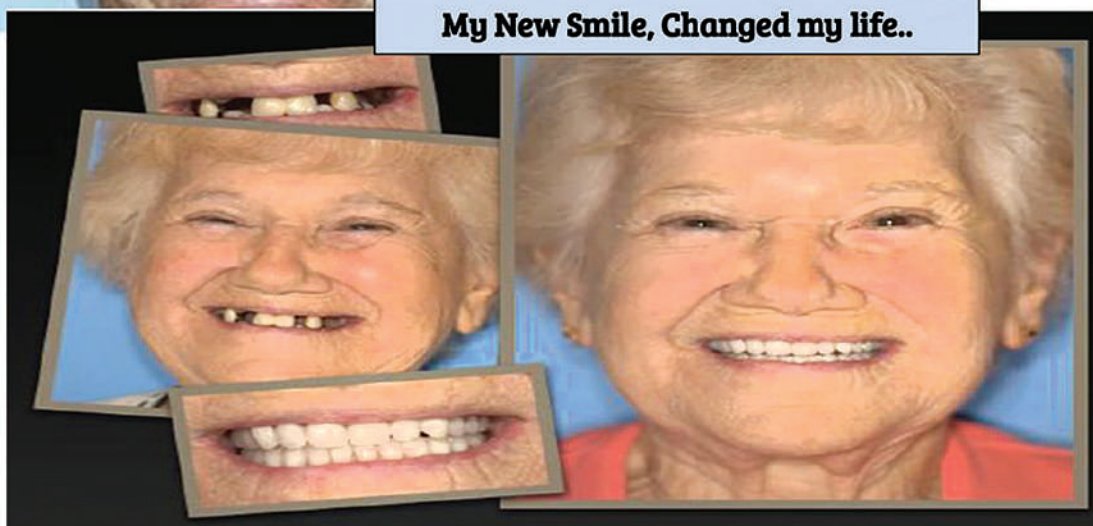
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The Science Festival at Cal State East Bay, which dates back to 1974, is now part of the larger Bay Area Science Festival, a two-week celebration of science, technology, engineering

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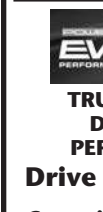
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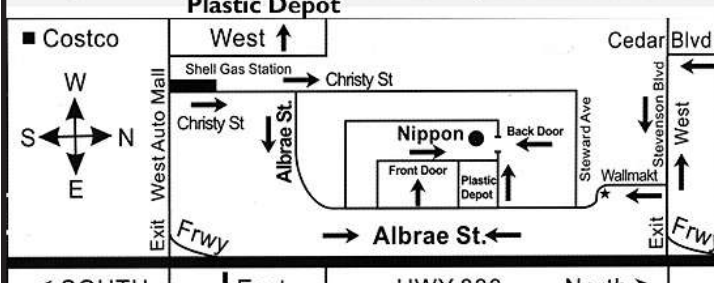

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California bans pesticide linked to brain damage in children

California environmental officials say a popular agricultural pesticide they say has been linked to brain damage in children will be banned after next year under an agreement reached with its manufacturer.

Under the deal announced Wednesday, all California sales of chlorpyrifos will end on Feb. 6, 2020.

Farmers will have until the end of 2020 to exhaust their supplies.

The pesticide is used on numerous crops in the nation's largest agriculture-producing state, including alfalfa, almonds, citrus, cotton, grapes and walnuts.

State regulators say the pesticide has been linked to health defects in children, including brain impairment.

Officials say they are budgeting \$5 million to help manufacturers develop a safer alternative.

The pesticide's manufacturer, Corteva Agriscience, says it reached the agreement "in the best interests of the affected growers."

Bay Area Circuits: A gem of local high-tech manufacturing

As electronics moved from the era of devices made with vacuum tubes and relays gave way to silicon and integrated circuits, bulky consumer devices became smaller and easier to carry around. Pressure to reduce size and costs drove manufacturers to look for better solutions. Thus, the reign of Printed Circuit Boards (PCB) began and became ubiquitous.

A PCB is sort of a layer cake or lasagna, if you will. Alternating layers of different materials laminated together with heat and adhesives result in a single object. PCBs come in various thicknesses, some hundredths of an inch. So, the manufacture of such detailed electronics is a very precise process.

A Tri-City company with a no-gimmick name, Bay Area Circuits (BAC), is a major PCB manufacturer located right at Fremont. Their name, perhaps only well known in the world of PCB users and suppliers that stretches from Silicon Valley to distant parts of the world. To provide a sense of scale, the worldwide market for PCBs exceeded \$60 billion in 2014, and is projected by some to reach \$79 billion in 2024.

Bay Area Circuits, founded in 1975, has been serving the PCB needs of high-tech electronics manufacturers,

contract assemblers, and design engineers for nearly 45 years. By focusing on quick-turn prototyping and production while leveraging innovative, high quality designs, BAC has become a premiere PCB supplier for discerning customers around the world.

Founded in a small facility in Redwood City with a focus on serving the printed circuit board production (high volume, low mix) needs of Silicon Valley companies, Bay Area Circuits relocated in 2014 to Fremont. With a new facility and recent investments in cutting edge equipment and processes, BAC has changed its business model to focus on serving the quick-turn prototype (low volume, high mix) market.

BAC occupies a 30,000sq. ft. fabrication facility and employs 45 people (15 in Administration/Engineering, and 30 in Production). They take pride in serving a variety of industries such as Automotive, Commercial, Contract Manufacturing, Education, Energy, Industrial, Medical & Technology to name a few.

Father sues Tesla after teen son killed in flaming crash

The father of an 18-year-old Florida teen killed when his speeding Tesla slammed into a wall and caught fire is suing the company, saying the crash should have been “entirely survivable.”

Police say Barrett Riley and his 18-year-old friend Edgar Monserratt died when Riley lost control of his father’s car at 116 mph (187 kph) in May 2018.

Another friend was thrown from the car and survived.

The South Florida SunSentinel reports that James B. Riley sued Wednesday in Santa Clara County, California, where Tesla is based. Monserratt’s parents filed a similar lawsuit in January. Both blame the car’s lithium-ion battery pack, which exploded when the Tesla hit a concrete wall.

A Tesla statement earlier this year said “no car could have withstood a high-speed crash of this kind.”

Juul stops funding San Francisco vaping measure

Juul Labs Inc. announced Monday that it will stop supporting a ballot measure to overturn an anti-vaping law in San Francisco, effectively killing the campaign.

The nation’s largest maker of e-cigarettes said it will end its support for Proposition C after donating nearly \$19 million. It was virtually the only financial backer of the measure.

“Based on that news, we have made the decision not to continue on with the campaign,” Yes on C said in a statement.

However, the proposition will still appear on the November ballot. Proposition C would have allowed the sale of vape products to adults, partially overturning the city’s June ordinance that as of next year would ban sales of e-cigarettes and vape products not reviewed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

The move was part of a broad review of company policies in the wake of a leadership shakeup.

“I am committed to seeing that JUUL engages productively with all stakeholders, including regulators, policymakers and our customers,” newly appointed CEO K.C. Crosthwaite said in a statement. “This decision does not change the fact that as a San Francisco-founded and headquartered company we remain committed to the city.”

However, Larry Tramutola, who directs the No on Prop C campaign, was skeptical, noting that about \$7 million in Juul’s campaign donations remain unspent.

“This could very well be yet another of a series of lies and exaggerations from Juul and Big Tobacco,” he said in a statement. “Until they return the \$7 million unspent dollars that is in their political account, until they suspend their mail, their advertising, their paid phone calls and lay off their consultants we do not believe them.” The move came as a 14th U.S. death linked to vaping was reported in Nebraska. Hundreds of people have suffered lung ailments tied to vaping, although no major e-cigarette company has been linked to them and many patients said they vaped products that included THC, the intoxicating chemical in marijuana.

Even so, critics contend that vaping products are being marketed to minors through the use of social media popular with teens and the production of candy- and fruit-flavored vaping capsules.

Michigan, New York and Rhode Island recently banned flavored vaping products. President Donald Trump has said that the federal government would act to prohibit thousands of flavors used in e-cigarettes because they appeal to underage users.

Juul has said it doesn’t market to youth and its products are meant to be an alternative to smoking. However, the company’s advertising is under federal investigation, and the company recently announced it will stop advertising its e-cigarettes in the U.S.

E-cigarettes have been largely unregulated since arriving in the U.S. in 2007. The Food and Drug Administration has set next May as a deadline for manufacturers to submit their products for review.

Health experts generally consider e-cigarettes less harmful than traditional cigarettes because they don’t contain all the cancer-causing byproducts of burning tobacco. But there’s virtually no long-term research on the health effects of the vapor produced when e-cigarettes heat a liquid with nicotine.

Uber lays off 350 employees in Eats, autonomous vehicles

Uber is laying off 350 employees from its food delivery, autonomous vehicles, safety, insurance and other teams.

The move is the latest in a string of staff reductions at the ride-hailing giant since its ill-fated initial public offering.

CEO Dara Khosrowshahi said in an email to employees Monday that it would be the last wave of the layoff process which began months ago.

Uber laid off 435 employees on its product and engineering teams in September. In July, 400 employees in the marketing department lost their jobs.

Khosrowshahi said everyone has to play a part in establishing a new normal, by identifying and eliminating duplicate work and taking actions when expectations aren’t being met.

Uber’s stock was up 4% in afternoon trading.

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Have unneeded prescription drugs? Here’s where to take them

On Saturday, October 26, numerous police departments and other agencies in the greater East Bay and South Bay will be partnering with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) on its 18th National Prescription Drug Take Back Day. The event is designed to give the public an opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs.

People are encouraged to bring their unneeded medications for disposal to their closest participating agency between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Most prescription drugs, including pills and patches, are eligible for the event; however, needles, sharps and syringes cannot be accepted. The service is free and anonymous, with no questions asked.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs.

Almost 5,000 law enforcement agencies across the nation participated in the last Prescription Drug Take Back Day held in April 2019. For more information, visit the DEA

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Juul halts sales of fruit, dessert flavors for e-cigarettes

Juul Labs will stop selling fruit and dessert flavors for its electronic cigarettes. The voluntary step announced Thursday is the company's latest concession as it tries to weather a political backlash blaming its flavored-nicotine products for hooking a generation of teenagers. The move is unlikely to satisfy the company's critics. Juul will continue selling its most popular

flavors: mint and menthol. Those products account for more than 60% of Juul's retail sales, according to analysts. They are also the most popular flavors among teens. The flavored pods affected by the announcement are mango, creme, fruit and cucumber. Those flavors account for about 10% of the company's sales and were only available on its website. Juul pulled the flavors out of stores last November.

Alameda County Water District considers acquiring N3 Cattle Ranch

The Alameda County Water District (ACWD) is facing what residents are calling a “once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.” The N3 Cattle Ranch, a 50,500 acre, mostly undeveloped property, near Livermore has been put up for sale. The owners are hoping to sell the land intact and are open to negotiating with the water district. As much of the property is located in watersheds that supply ACWD—including Lake Del Valle, Calaveras Reservoir, and Alameda Creek—the purchase could both protect the land from development and ensure the quality of water for East Bay residents. Currently the asking price for the ranch is \$72 M, but the final price is negotiable. People came from as far as San Francisco and Livermore to express support for the Water District

acquisition. Many feared that if steps are not taken to keep the land in its natural state, it would be sold in pieces and developed into McMansions. Fortunately, as the land is quite rugged with many peaks and valleys, it's unlikely to be a prime target for development at this point. At the meeting, General Manager Robert Shaver and board members discussed the logistics and finances of purchasing the land—especially how to stay within budget when there are already several big projects planned for upcoming years (fish ladders and metering system). One possibility is requesting a loan from the State Revolving Fund, which has a lower rate of interest and would be easier to pay off. Another way to offset initial and operating costs would be to purchase the land as part of a coalition with groups such as Nature Conservancy and Trust For Public Land. In most scenarios, rates would increase for ACWD users, anywhere from 1% to 8% more than currently planned. A contact with the property owners was able to conference call into the meeting to answer further questions from the board, such as whether income statements for the ranch were available and whether the ranch had seen any significant cases of wildfire or flooding during the past 10 years. At the end of the meeting, community members were given the chance to ask questions and express their concerns. Many who spoke had experienced the bike paths on the ranch firsthand and strongly preferred that the space remain untouched by development. Others praised the Water District for at least seriously considering this opportunity and acting in a timely and transparent manner.



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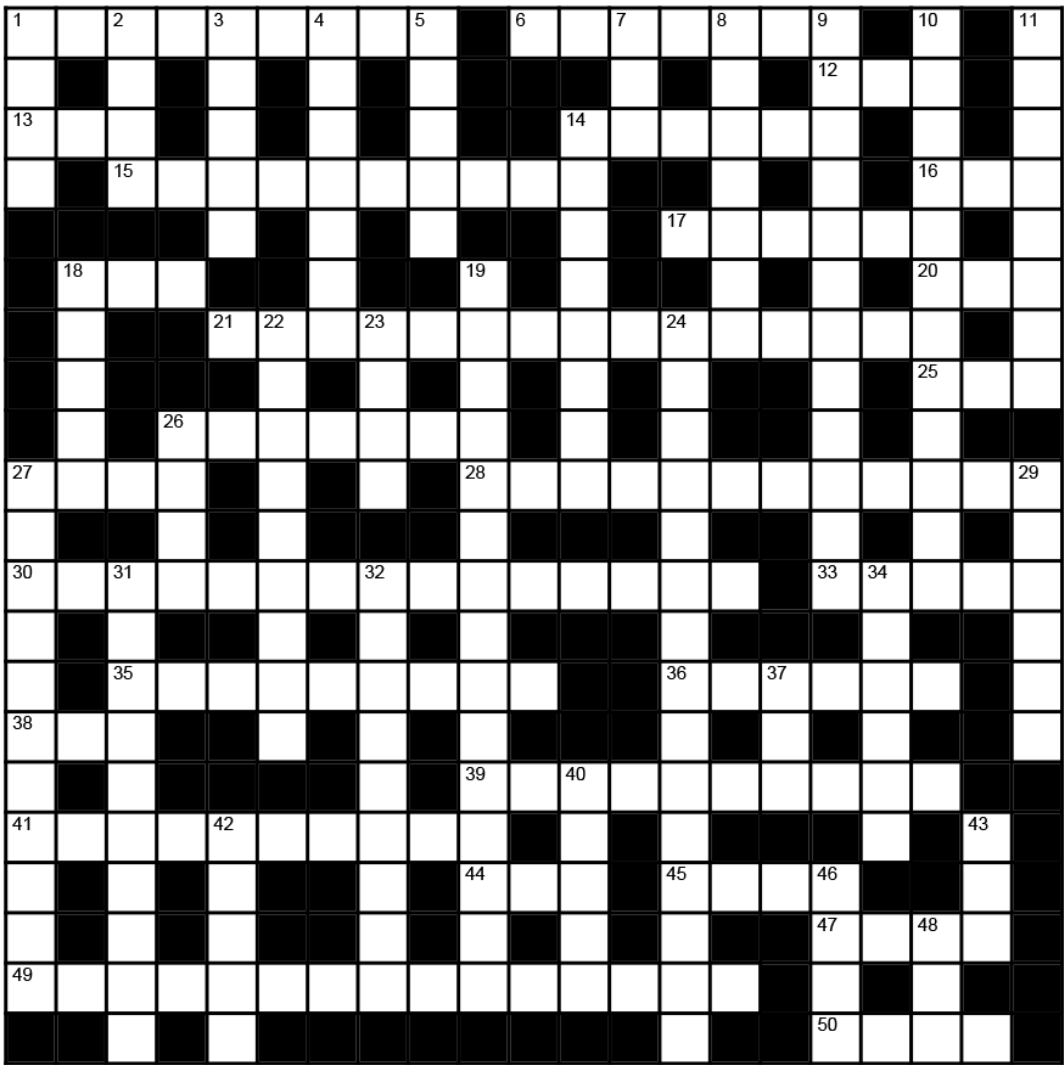

You see him everywhere during this time of the year. Jack. Jack-O-Lantern. Pumpkins seeded in summer are usually ready to be picked around fall. In America, pumpkin season was harvest season and usually the last harvest of the year. These days, pumpkins herald the fall season.

From pumpkin spice lattes to pumpkin pies to pumpkin jack-o-lanterns during Halloween to fall tablescapes during Thanksgiving, they symbolize all things autumnal.

For Halloween, you can see Jack-O-Lantern everywhere, his ghoulish smile and candle lit eye sockets at thresholds of every home. This ubiquitous decoration has its origins in Ireland, and lore abounds in many other parts of Western Europe. In American literature, pumpkins began to be associated with the harvest season in 1895. An article on Thanksgiving entertaining recommended a lit Jack-O-Lantern as part of the festivities.

Fast Forward to 2019: There are different ways to welcome autumn. For one thing, pumpkins are no longer just orange or just look like giant ghouls with a scary grin. Pumpkins can be white and yellow, red and green, speckled, and with warts. They come in different sizes, from giant pumpkins to the cute little ones you can fit in the palm of your hands. They are edible and great

for table decorations during this festive season. They are cute now.

Here are a few ideas that will elevate your pumpkin and gourd game to a whole different level. A word of caution: As many of these pumpkin crafts involve crafting materials and non-edible decorations, it is not advisable to consume any of them. Consider them as decorations only. Here are some ground rules:

- Consider the decoration non-edible unless you have used safe and consumable ingredients.
- Examples of what is inedible are glue, glitter, pins, paint, beads etc.

• If the pumpkin is pierced, it will rot and decompose quickly. Hence, it would be considered inedible and spoilt.

• Examples of decorations that will deem the pumpkin edible are fabric or paper as wrap, hemp or jute, edible flowers etc.

• You can always skip the glue and make temporary (although not fixed or stable) decorations so that the pumpkins remain edible and usable for cooking.

Here I have picked mini pumpkins; they are considered inedible tablescapes and decorations.

Succulents and pumpkins

It is the most involved of all the pumpkin decorations because we are dealing with baby succulent plants. Succulents can be easily propagated by simply rooting their stems, but here we will have to glue them to a layer of moss for a pumpkin craft, rendering propagation tricky. You can find moss in most floral supplies and craft supplies stores.



after applying hot glue to the pumpkin top. Allow to set.

• Arrange succulent cuttings in an attractive way over the moss. If they have roots, be sure to shake the dirt off. If they still have roots attached to them, you can glue the side of the succulent stem so there is no glue on the root system.

• Gently moisten the moss layer every day and perhaps you will be able to pot the attached succulents after the pumpkin has lived its best pumpkin life and starts to decompose.

What if you don't want to work with succulents? I must confess; it is not my favorite arrangement with pumpkin decoration. I am foremost a gardener, and I am reluctant to waste perfectly good succulents that I can propagate with 100% success with soil. Having said that, pumpkin crafts do appeal to me. So, I tried translating the same process to other decorations that are whimsical and yet more stable.

Here are some of my favorite alternate versions:

Dried Flowers and Leaves

Many flowers and leaves can be dehydrated to hold their shape and color beautifully. The trick is to pick unique shapes and colors at their peak and dry them in indirect sunlight.

Some flowers and leaves to dry: violas and pansies, marigold petals, strawflowers, eucalyptus "silver dollar" leaves, Japanese maple leaves, ginkgo leaves.

I like to use white pumpkins as the colors will pop. One can buy an all-in-one glue and sealer in craft stores. It goes by the name of "Mod Podge." It is an opaque white liquid that can be applied with a sponge applicator. It becomes transparent as it dries out. First coat sections of the pumpkin with Mod Podge. Then stick the leaves and petals attractively. Paint another coat of Mod Podge over your art. As it dries, it will become transparent and shiny.

Decoupage Pumpkins

The same technique as above can be used with Mod Podge and printed paper. I like to use bits and pieces of gift wrapping. Also useful are printed cocktail paper napkins. Sometimes, especially with the cocktail paper napkins, they can tear as they are too delicate, and the first layer of Mod Podge glue will make them soggy. Not to worry. Simply move them around and allow them to dry. The second sealing layer must be applied only after the first layer has dried out. This method can also be used with lacy paper doilies.

This season give old Jack a vacation and welcome your whimsy side to the autumn harvest table.

What you need

mini pumpkin + moss + succulent and cactus trimmings + moss + glue

Method

• Pick a pumpkin that is neither too big nor too small. It must be able to "sit" well on a flat surface. Baby sugar pumpkins are the best as the vibrant orange of the pumpkin will contrast well with the various hues of greens and maroons of succulent plants. Preserve the pumpkin stem and don't cut it too short. Spread a layer of moss around the stem

Home prices, leaving the area, and a possible recession are all scary for home buyers and sellers. But there are ways to face real estate fears. What scares homebuyers? The price of a home. But not the price they're paying—it's the price they may eventually sell the home for.

"For buyers, a big concern is always 'What if we buy now and property values go down?'" said Nancie Allen, 2019 president of Bay East Association of REALTORS®. Allen suggested that "real estate is cyclical—prices go up, prices go down, and if buyers stay in for the long haul their odds of gaining equity are very good."

She continued, "In the Bay Area we're still expecting to see

prices go up two to three percent a year. We're not expecting to see any big drops. Knowing you'll be in your house for a while helps mitigate some risk."

While how much they may earn on a home sale tops the scare list, what they're paying to get in is also plenty scary.

"Some buyers are afraid they can't afford to buy a home," Allen said. "The first thing they need to do is talk with a lender and find out exactly how much of a mortgage they qualify for, and that tells them what their purchasing power is."

Allen said after this conversation buyers need to, "take a step back because what they qualify for doesn't mean, necessarily, they will be comfortable mak-

ing the mortgage payment each month. Buyers need to figure out where their comfort zone is and how much of a monthly payment they can make and then they can set a realistic home purchase price range."

Real estate scares aren't limited to buyers. "Sellers are scared they missed an opportunity," Allen said. "Sellers want to know if they've missed the market and if this is still a good time to sell because we're in a changing market."

She said, "Right now sellers may not sell their property for as much as a year or 18 months ago. But if they have owned their home for a while, they are still going to have some equity. Prices went up so much during the last few years, even with the correction sellers should still see a good return."

Being asked if they are finding another home to purchase, and

where they may be moving to, scares sellers, Allen said. "Sellers have realized if they want to sell and stay in the area they're going to have to downsize considerably. They're looking at condos and townhouses, or they're looking at moving out of the area."

Allen said, "It's scary to move out of a place you've lived in for a long time but it's also exciting to start a new adventure somewhere else."

Economic uncertainty is another scary subject. Allen said, "Everywhere you go you're hearing about the possibility of a recession and that's scaring buyers and sellers. For buyers, if you're planning on staying in your home for the long term, chances are really good that you'll come out with a gain. For sellers, they're thinking about selling now because they don't know what's going to happen in

the future."

Allen said that some buyers deal with recession fears, and potentially losing money on their home, by thinking of their home as shelter first and an investment second. "There are some buyers moving into their homes now thinking this is where they want to stay, and it will be their 'forever' home. They want to stay here, live their life here and retire here."

"For sellers, once they are in a transaction, they're scared that it may not close." Allen explained this fear is because selling a home can be like a rollercoaster: "There are going to be ups and downs but eventually most end up closing. Sellers have to realize the transaction may be a little stressful along the way

Why is it important that every resident be counted in the census? What does the census have to do with funding? Does the census ask about race? Does every household get a census form? What is the controversy about adding a question about citizenship?

We all have burning questions about the upcoming census. Three speakers featured in a program entitled "We will be counted! Census 2020" will attempt to answer them and they may do it so well you will want to become a Census Ambassador and share the knowledge you've learned with others around you.

The U.S. Census, the process of counting every resident in the country, is

required under the U.S. Constitution to occur every 10 years. In 2020, for the first time ever, the Census will be primarily digitally based.

The program about the census will take place on October 28 at the Fremont Main Library and is sponsored by the League of Women Voters Fremont-Newark-Union City, the County of Alameda "Count Me in Census 2020" and the Alameda County Library. All three have an important role to play in educating the community, presenting and collecting census data and making certain the results are fair and accurate.

Keeping Fingers Crossed for Monarchs' Return

While Natural Bridges State Park in Santa Cruz and Monarch Sanctuary in Pacific Grove have gained fame as monarch wintering grounds in Northern California, Alameda County offers locals a chance to see monarchs in smaller numbers at Fremont’s Ardenwood Historic Farm and at San Leandro Monarch Bay Golf course.

Both sites offer tours and educational programs as monarchs cluster in groves during diapause—a time when butterflies suspend development during wintry weather unfavorable for their survival.

While Ardenwood saw a high of 25,000 monarchs in 1997, an El Niño year, numbers have dwindled, hovering some years at 5,000. Other years, the monarchs have not come at all, according to Christina Garcia, a naturalist with East Bay Regional Parks (EBRP) who has worked most of her 30-year career at Ardenwood Farm.

Last year offered the lowest numbers of monarchs overwintering—the term naturalists use to describe waiting out or spending winter. Garcia saw only about 200 monarchs arrive, and they did not stay. Northern California’s air quality last November was deemed the worst in the world; smoke from fires that ravaged the area drove monarchs away.

“I never know if they will come back, but I start looking in the eucalyptus groves when the weather turns cold,” says Garcia,

who sighted a few early arrivals flying around in early October. She plans to start butterfly tours at the park in December; information will be available on the EBRP website.

“It’s a magical feeling when they are back. It reminds me of a legend in Mexico where the monarchs arrive right around the Day of the Dead (November 1). The legend says [they] are the souls of the dead, returning as butterflies, reminding us of someone we love.”

Among only a few migrating insect species, monarchs fly 1,000 to 2,000 miles to reach California from Canada and states west of the Rocky Mountains with colder winter climates. Meanwhile, monarchs east of the Rockies travel up to 3,000 miles to winter in forested mountains west of Mexico City.

Adrienne DePonte, an interpretive naturalist with San Leandro Recreation and Human Services Department, is in her 19th year of conducting tours at the golf course grove, planned this year for October 26, November 2 and 17, and January 5.

“When you have this unique, distinctive natural phenomenon that occurs in our area, it makes this an exciting place to live,” says DePonte, who saw 8,000 monarchs winter in San Leandro in 2017. Last year was the lowest count she had seen, with 2,000 before the fires.

Her most memorable monarch moments over the years

have occurred when thousands of monarchs suddenly warm up and fly off in a cascade to search for nectar. (Monarchs need temperatures of at least 55 degree to fly.) “You can’t make it happen. It’s spontaneous animal behavior that you can’t plan,” explains DePonte, “but it is impressive.”

Garcia says Bay Area residents can aid monarchs by providing nectar-rich flowering plants in their yards that bloom fall, winter, and early spring when monarchs are foraging. On its website, Xerces Society offers a link to plant lists by zip code, including native milkweed plants, where monarchs lay their eggs.

Monarchs have a short lifespan, only six weeks, but

those surviving winter through diapause extend their lives five to six months, long enough to propagate the next generation. On the return flight, they lay up to 700 eggs a day, often one egg per milkweed plant. Without proper milkweed, a female monarch holds on to her eggs. When hatched, the larvae survive on milkweed. Garcia says she associates monarch mating with Valentine’s Day since it is around that time that weather warms and frost is unlikely.

Annually about 2,000 people turn out over three months to visit the monarchs at Ardenwood; San Leandro attracts about 1,000 viewers. San Leandro is in discussions for a new library to replace Mulford, near the monarch grove. Proposals put forth could draw more attention to the monarchs with a multipurpose room for butterfly education and an environmental woodland area outside the library with trails leading to San Leandro Marina and monarch tours.

Awareness is needed, because despite their dramatic decline in

numbers, monarchs have yet to make the endangered species list. However, in 1983 International Union for Conservation of Nature declared their migration an endangered phenomenon in need of protection. “Insects are a keystone species,” says DePonte. “They let us know what is going on with all types of [species]. We need to protect our pollinators because we depend on insects to pollinate our food supplies. If we are not protecting the butterflies, we are not protecting our food sources. We share a fate with them... We need to be responsible stewards,” says DePonte.

Still, DePonte makes a point of dispelling myths that monarchs are fragile, stained-glass creatures. “They are tough, flying 2,000 miles on their own, 25 miles per hour and a mile up in the air. They are hardy,” she says.

Seize the night with “Cabaret”

Lights. Cameras. Action. Nazis.

This is the tumultuous, yet electrifying world audiences are treated to in Chanticleers Theatre’s production of “Cabaret.” Based on the 1998 Broadway adaptation of the classic musical by John Kander, director John Baiocchi and his incredible ensemble of performers deliver a live theater experience that makes the price of admission worth every penny and then some.

Brace yourselves as Emcee (Johnny Orenberg) flaunts the stage in the most flamboyant and braggadocious manner possible while recalling the story of the famed *Kit Kat Klub in pre-World War II Berlin. Orenberg shines in his role as his clown-like makeup, in sync with his burlesque style of singing and dancing, perfectly captures the ostentatious feel of closeted-gay Berlin.

In addition to Orenberg’s “Emcee,” the crux of the musical lies within Melissa Momboisse’s portrayal of lead character Sally Bowles. Not since Liza Minnelli’s iconic performance of Bowles in the 1972 film adaptation has an actress channeled Bowles “hopeless romantic” energy so well. Bowles voice carries every note seamlessly and profoundly, as evidenced during songs such as “Don’t Tell Mama” and “Married.”

In the background of this team of well-choreographed singers and dancers is the impeccable orchestra led by music director Dr. Luis Zuniga. Zuniga’s percussion, wind and string ensemble’s sound can be heard especially well in the small, but rather intimate dimensions of the theater.

Backing Orenberg and Momboisse is a supporting cast comprised of veteran stage actors including C. Conrad Cady and Marsha Howard. The two expertly portray

the ultimately-doomed couple of Fraulein Schneider and Herr Schultz. Baiocchi’s decision to include Schneider and Schultz’s storyline is a refreshing theatrical decision as their storyline is often omitted in other adaptations of “Cabaret.”

Adding fire to this cast’s performance is Darrien Cabreana’s depiction of Cliff Bradshaw. Cabreana nails Bradshaw’s 1930s New Yorker accent while also proving to have fantastic on-stage chemistry with Momboisse. The two convincingly act out the relationship between Bowles and Bradshaw, which over the course of two acts, veers from the romantic to the tragic.

Audiences will also appreciate the impeccably-timed and well-orchestrated dance sets choreographed by Joe Ayers. Ayers and his team would give the likes of Bob Fosse a run for his money as a



team of dancers navigates the small stage dimensions gracefully and effortlessly. The passion and meticulous planning put into the choreography is evident with every twirl, “can-can,” pelvic thrust and

tap dance sequence. Numbers such as the Kit Kat Klub’s rendition of “Tomorrow Belongs to Me” juxtapose the hedonistic pleasures of the cabaret to the cold, unforgiving nature of the Nazi Germany in 1933.

A show that is both uplifting and heartbreaking, while also balancing opposite ideologies, John Baiocchi’s “Cabaret” is sure to please adult audiences throughout the East Bay. This show delivers on all the classic elements seen in the 1972 cinematic adaptation while providing modern dance and musical elements that make this production an unforgettable experience.

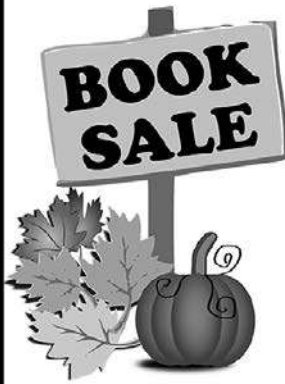

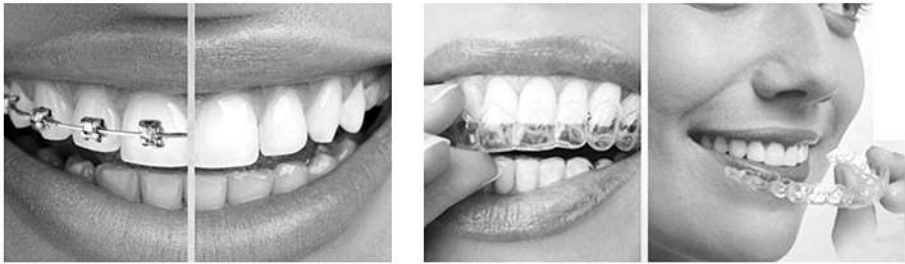

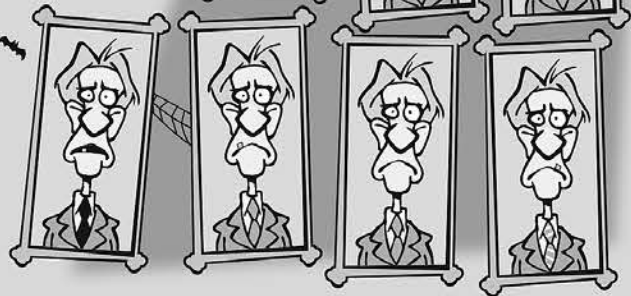

Warm Springs BART West Access Bridge and Plaza Project

The Warm Springs BART West Access Bridge and Plaza Project reached a significant milestone in late September. The truss span of the bridge, connecting directly to the Warm Springs/South Fremont BART Station, and over the Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) tracks, was installed. The pylon for the cable stay span of the bridge has also been installed along with a portion

of the cable stay bridge deck over the UPRR spur line. Both installations are now visible from surrounding streets.

This milestone was achieved after comprehensive and complex coordination efforts between the City of Fremont, BART, and UPRR, with special attention to safety, protection of the existing BART facilities and

patrons, and protection of UPRR facilities and trains. Ultimately, the bridge will provide a pedestrian/bicycle connection between the BART station and the new residences, as well as major employers in the area. Construction activities for the elevator, escalator, and staircase, as well as the overall plaza, will intensify in the next couple of months.



City of Fremont Secures \$100,843 from the California Department of Justice to Combat Illegal Tobacco Use among Minors in Fremont, California

The City of Fremont received \$100,843 in state funding to tackle the illegal sale of cigarettes and tobacco products to minors as part of the California Department of Justice’s Tobacco Grant Program. The grants were awarded to 76 local entities throughout the state to support the enforcement of state and local laws related to the illegal sales and marketing of tobacco products to minors. California Attorney General Xavier Becerra announced the recipients on October 1, 2019. With the support of the Attorney General’s office, the City of Fremont is prepared to educate and engage the families and youth of Fremont, to understand the dangers of tobacco and nicotine products and make healthy decisions.

“Tobacco is a serious threat to public health, especially to California’s youth,” said Attorney General Becerra. “These grants will support local communities in enforcing

the law and educating kids about the harms of tobacco products. My office is dedicated to ensuring the state has the resources necessary to curb the dangers of tobacco and protect the public’s well-being. Preventing or reducing illegal sales of tobacco to minors will pave the way to a healthier California—we’re committed to tackling this public health crisis head on.”

The City of Fremont will use the funding to implement and enforce a Tobacco Retail License (TRL) program, and augment student and parent education and engagement efforts already underway through the partnership between Youth and Family Services and the Fremont Police Department. In addition to supporting enforcement efforts as the new TRL program takes shapes, the City is planning to hire a Tobacco Program Youth Specialist to increase education efforts in the school district, and fund more parent education workshops

presented by the sergeant who oversees the school resource officers.

The Department of Justice’s Tobacco Grant Program is funded by Proposition 56 (commonly known as Prop. 56), the California Healthcare, Research and Prevention Tobacco Tax Act of 2016. Beginning April 2017, Prop. 56 raised the cigarette tax by \$2 per pack, with an equivalent increase on all other tobacco products. Prop. 56 also allocates millions of dollars annually to the California Department of Justice for distribution to local law enforcement agencies for the support and hiring of peace officers for various activities. These activities include investigations and compliance checks to reduce the illegal sale of tobacco products to minors.

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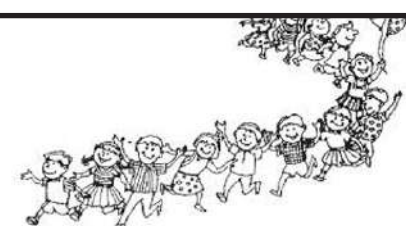

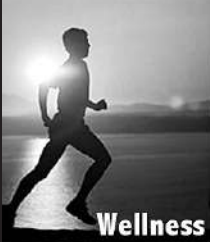

At Chabot College, the Disabled Student Programs and Services (DSPS) department/Disabled Student Resource Center (DSRC) facilitates student needs to help them achieve their dreams.

Many assume programs and services are available only to those with severe learning challenges, but any student with documented evidence of disability is eligible. For students with a variety of disabilities, arrangements can be made for extended test times or tests to be administered in a quiet room where distractions are at a minimum. Students in wheelchairs are provided with adjustable desks to fit their chair, and students with different mobility challenges have access to transportation between classes and to and from their car or ride service. Additionally, students with visual impairments can arrange for recording devices to use in class, textbooks to be converted to audio books and equipment that will enlarge text to a size they can easily read. These are just some of the many accommodations DSPS provides.

“We focus on the whole spectrum—everything from physical disability, cognitive function, communicative, psychological and learning disability—both visible and invisible,” said Chabot’s DSPS Director Nathaniel Rice. “We want to increase perception, reception, utilization and completion.”

According to Director Rice, last year Chabot’s DSPS served 1,155 students with nearly 38 percent having a learning disability and 16 percent needing accommodations from a psychological disability. However, Chabot and others colleges only document a student’s primary disability, whereas students with multiple challenges—like a recent graduate who was both visually and hearing impaired—would only be reported one way, which makes it difficult to provide an accurate number of services provided. Regardless of impairment, Chabot strives to meet the needs of any student who requires the department’s assistance and employs three counselors trained to complete student assessments and student educational plans (SEP) that allow individuals to pursue their goals. Accommodations include provisional, or short-term accommodations provided before a disability is documented; temporary, which are provided to students who may need assistance for a short period of time (for example, if they break their arm and need assistance taking a test); and permanent accommodations provided for the entire duration of a student’s time at Chabot.

“ASL Interpreting,” said Rice, “is the biggest part of our budget. Most of the programs have a cap on the number of DSPS students they will serve, but we have no cap. We could have 200 blind students through our doors next week. Providing accessibility services is an ADA mandate and the funding we get from the state is given to help cover that. If extra costs incur it would be up to the college to cover it.”

Rice encourages all students with need to take advantage of the programs and services available to them, because utilizing accommodations has proven to greatly increase student success. According to him, about 20 percent of the population has a disability of some kind, and although not all people need accommodations, those who want assistance should utilize the opportunities available to them to maximize their success in college.

Safe at Home Program

Governor Newsom recently signed Assembly Bill (AB) 800 by Assemblymember Kansen Chu (D-San Jose), which will protect the identity of survivors of domestic and other violent crimes who participate in the Secretary of State’s Safe at Home Program when filing civil court documents. The Safe at Home program allows survivors of domestic assault, sexual assault, stalking, and other specific crimes to apply for a substitute address to protect them from the perpetrators.

However, currently when a participant files civil court documents, which include their name, addresses, and other identifying information, this information is public record, revealing their location to their assailant or potential assailants. AB 800 protects participants by allowing them to use a pseudonym and closes a loophole that would have allowed

identifying information to be revealed through the court process.

“AB 800 will protect the identities of survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault and will allow them to access the civil justice system without fear of future violence,” said Chu. “Currently, there is a gap in protections because civil court filings are public records, which reveals participants’ name and identifying information to their assailants. This often means that survivors of violent crimes are too fearful to access the civil court system. The protections in AB 800 will provide many their day in court without fear that an assailant may find them through public records. I want to thank the governor, my legislative colleagues, the sponsor, and advocates for their support of this life-changing legislation.”

AB 800 is sponsored by Calegislation, which helps survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking.

A baseball game fields nine players defending a field of play against batters and baserunners of an opposite team who attempt to move from home plate through three bases and back to home plate again. A ball is thrown between a pitcher and catcher, successfully (strike) or unsuccessfully (ball), attempting to elude a batter who tries to hit the ball within field boundaries or over an ultimate boundary. A group of umpires and referees determine if play is consistent with the rules of the game. The process and eventual outcome are the result of skill and knowledge, mixed with opportunity and, to some degree, luck.

In all sports, a special group of people study the rules of a game and act as ultimate arbiters of whether they are being correctly followed. It isn't always clear when rules are broken, so if someone is asked to make a judgement call that can have extreme consequences, deciding the outcome of a contest, it is important to have a high level of confidence in the knowledge and expertise of those individuals. As the

stakes increase, outcomes become highly scrutinized and subject to interpretation. Not everyone agrees with all decisions, but it is understood that without constraints, decisions would be argued indefinitely and deferred without resolution. The result would be chaos.

Our entire system of government is based on the same principle... rules and procedures are essential. They depend on reasonable expectations observed by a majority, subject to appeal with cause and consequences if broken. From an ordinance at the municipal level through every layer of public administration, the rule of law and stated process is designed to give guidance to the general population and a sense of order; the bedrock of our society. In order to give the public confidence in the results of deliberations, a clear and understandable process is important. In order to achieve this, public meetings and hearings are held to weigh arguments of interested parties. Without adequate input, the process degenerates into ideological corridors of power.

The public has an obligation to pay attention to the issues and concerns raised by fellow citizens and deliberative bodies. It may be that some issues have little immediate direct impact on residents, but even small, indirect concerns have a way of accumulating and aggregating to become consequential. The same can be said for our politicians, especially at the local level. Along with the power to make and modify rules and regulations, our elected representatives and their staff have an obligation to

understand existing guidelines and consider requested and necessary modifications. It is incumbent on the electorate to assess the sincerity and capacity of those entrusted with this responsibility.

Recently, a special board meeting was held by the Alameda County Water District (ACWD) to consider an opportunity to purchase, singly or in partnership the 50,500-acre N3 Cattle Ranch in Livermore. Board members are being asked to consider a major purchase that can impact water supply, quality and storage. Impacts of such a transaction could have a major effect on supplies, district prioritization, rates and debt. Although currently under study, this is the type of key decision that depends on the expertise of our elected representatives and public interest to assure a rational and fiscally responsible outcome. The public is being asked to scrutinize, comment and help judge the viability and wisdom of a major decision. Although there may be no way to know whether this is a future ball or strike, it is now on our field of play.

HOA fair elections bill signed into law

A bill by Sen. Bob Wieckowski (D-Fremont) to enable better oversight of elections at California's more than 50,000 homeowner associations (HOAs) was signed into law October 12 by Gov. Gavin Newsom. SB 323 will rein in boards that have disenfranchised homeowners across the state and add other requirements to ensure fair elections.

"Millions of Californians live in homeowner associations and some of them are well run by elected boards and management firms," said Wieckowski, a member of the Senate Housing Committee. "But in far too many HOAs, the boards have disenfranchised homeowners with minor violations and disqualified others from even

running for a board seat. "The boards wield enormous power and these abuses should not be tolerated. I applaud Governor Newsom for signing SB 323 to put in place measures that will lead to fair and open elections."

The bill limits the power of incumbent boards to set arbitrary "qualifications" for homeowners wanting to run for a board seat. It requires that an inspector of elections be a neutral third party and that ballots be counted in an accessible location. It also gives guidance to the courts hearing challenges to election procedures and results.

"It is vital that association elections be governed under the democratic principles of SB 323," said Cassandra H.B. Jennings, president and CEO of the Greater Sacramento Urban League. "Too often incumbent boards have ignored, violated, or undermined the

California laws governing association elections in the same way that numerous states have undermined the Voting Rights Act of 1965. We believe SB 323 makes it harder for associations to manipulate HOA elections and goes a long way toward restoring confidence in this essential democratic process."

The measure is supported by the Center for California Homeowner Association Law, the California Alliance for Retired Americans, the Nonprofit Housing Association of Northern California, the Greater Sacramento Urban League and the American Civil Liberties Union.

Wieckowski represents the 10th District, which includes southern Alameda County and parts of northern Santa Clara County.

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Donald Burton Parkhurst

Donald Parkhurst, AKA Parky was born in Watertown, Massachusetts on 1/15/1928, during the Great Depression. He was a First Sergeant in the US Army during the Korean War. After the war he studied Theology at Walla Walla College, where he met and married his first wife Virginia Bergman, raising 4 children; Martin, Helen, Daniel and Gordon.

His early career was spent as a schoolteacher and laboratory technologist. Later he pursued his side interest as a cartoonist, becoming friends with the Greats such as Charles Schultz and Lyman Young. While living in Fremont CA he had a weekly cartoon strip called “The Yolks on Us”, as well as many other published political cartoons and articles published in the Bay Area,

Pursuit of his Master’s Degree in History with California State Hayward changed his life. His research led him to publish a book, (available on Amazon) “The Road Almost Taken” about the early movie industry in Niles California, pre-Hollywood and the Essanay motion picture company. The book was filled with original contributions and interviews with Fremont residents who lived near the old studio between 1912 and 1916 and they are named in his book. For this he was nominated

for The Ray Billington award and inducted into the Who’s Who Historical Society as an “illustrious biographer for exceptional achievement, leadership and service.” He lectured in the area and played an integral role in the restoration of Niles old trolley cars.

He married Marion Baumann and together traveled to Israel under the tutelage of the Hebrew University continuing to pursue his interest in ancient history and archaeology, running his fingers through the sands of time and excavating artifacts at his own dig at Herodias. He linked the distant past of the Roman Empire with his interest in American history, melding them together in a comic strip. During his years of travels while researching a book he was writing on the history of Islam & Mohammed, he taught school in Fiji and Cairo and sponsored several bright young Egyptian boys to the USA, as well as others from Germany and American Indians with their education.

Donald helped his wife, a survivor of the German concentration camps publish her own story in a book called “Searching Survivor” (also on Amazon) and he became an authority on the Holocaust during this process.

Donald was a history professor, archaeologist, missionary school teacher, artist, author, theologian and adventurer.

He was a loving father and survived by his five children including his step-daughter Karen Baumann, innumerable grandchildren, great- grandchil- dren, one great-great-grandson, and a large extended family. Alameda County to offer more public services

Recognizing the growing need for public services and the constraints Alameda and Santa Cruz counties were facing to meet those demands, Assemblymember Bill Quirk (D-Hayward) took the lead in making changes to how the Transactions and Use Tax Law cap is calculated.

“Cities and counties are responsible for providing a wide range of support services such as shelters for the homeless, police and fire services, and debris cleanup,” said Quirk. “Constraints from Proposition 13 have increased reliance on raising taxes to provide these needed services.”

California statute subjects cities and counties to limitations and voter approval requirements to levy transactions and use taxes. Unfortunately, with increasing demand for public services the existing amount of funding is just not enough. AB 723 will give residents in the counties and cities of Alameda and Santa Cruz the power to generate more funds for their community. AB 723 goes into effect January 1, 2020.

“With the signing of this bill, the City of Fremont will now have the needed flexibility and options to obtain additional revenue and local funding that will retain police officers and fire fighters, repair infrastructure and address traffic, help our homeless encampments and provide support to small businesses. These services are essential to our city’s success and continued ability to best serve our constituents. We are very grateful to Quirk and his strong leadership in introducing this bill,” said Lily Mei, mayor of Fremont.

“This bill will help Alameda and Santa Cruz counties provide more and better services at time when the need is ever increasing. This includes beds for the homeless and firefighters. Voters will have the opportunity to weigh in and partake in that decision making process. AB 723 would not have been signed had it not been for the collaboration of leaders in these counties, and Governor Newsom’s staff,” said Quirk.

Dear EarthTalk:
What is so-called
“Flying Shame” and
what’s the climate
connection?

“Flying shame” is one of those memic terms that has sprung up recently to describe guiltling people out of taking airplane trips given the massive carbon footprint of air travel. Some call it “The Greta Effect” in a nod to Swedish teen environmental activist Greta Thunberg, who swore off air travel given its disproportionate drag on her efforts to slash her own carbon footprint.

Of course, Thunberg isn’t alone. In fact, the original concept of flying shame (“Flygskam”) actually started in Sweden, where “flying is becoming the new tobacco” in the words of Andy Rowell of the non-profit Oil Change International (OCI). A recent survey by the World Wildlife Fund found that 23 percent of

Swedes have abstained from air travel in the past year to reduce their carbon footprints -- a jump of six percentage points from a year ago. Meanwhile, 18 percent of respondents opted to travel by train instead of airplane over the course of the year.

And the Swedes aren’t the only ones cutting back on flying. Other Europeans are following suit, which makes sense given the excellent rail and ferry systems that transect Europe as practical alternatives to flying. The concept has been slower to catch on in the U.S. given greater distances and limited passenger rail options.

Regardless, air travel is growing by leaps and bounds overall worldwide. “The problem is that, as the science demands we radically reduce carbon emissions, the number of passenger aircraft is set to double by 2035,” worries OCI’s Rowell. Meanwhile, each and every day the aviation industry consumes five million barrels of oil. In 2017 alone, the backs of airplanes emitted 859 million tons of greenhouse gas emissions. Indeed, burning jet fuel contributes roughly 2.5 percent of total carbon emissions worldwide. Analysts think this proportion could rise to 22 percent by 2050 as other sectors clean up their acts quicker.

Meanwhile, there are no truly green, practical alternatives to kerosene-based jet

fuel on the horizon. “Aircraft are becoming more fuel-efficient, but not quickly enough to offset the huge demand in growth,” reports The Conversation. “Electric planes remain decades away, weighed down by batteries that can’t deliver nearly as much power per kilo as jet fuel.”

So, what’s to be done? Swear off flying, that’s what. Flight Free USA is a grassroots campaign trying to get at least 100,000 Americans to commit to not flying at all during the calendar year 2020 in order to send a “clear signal to industry and politicians -- and also to each other -- that there are many who are willing to change their lifestyles to protect the climate.”

Yet another slice of the apple is called A Free Ride, an idea which assigns an escalating flight tax depending on how many flights you take per year. One flight per year would be free of tax, while 14 flights a year would cost a pretty penny in taxes, with the proceeds going to offsetting the jet fuel with green energy projects elsewhere.

Cinema Exchange Supports Film Collaboration

A film is the result of many people's passions and talents coming together. While a novel or a painting might be entirely one person's vision, filmmaking can't exist without collaboration. However, the expenses involved make film a difficult hobby to pursue in the Bay Area. But evolving technology and workspaces create opportunities for amateur and professional filmmakers to express themselves. One of these spaces is Cinema Exchange in Milpitas—a co-working space aimed specifically at filmmakers, and a hub of fun and educational events for the local film community.

Chris Denise, co-founder with Kevin Brown, had run studios before but struggled to keep them open in the South Bay. High rents and an emphasis on big businesses can make the San Jose area tough for filmmakers, which is why the arts scene is migrating north to East Bay and Berkeley. Around the same time, Denise was attending a lot of ribbon cuttings for the San Jose Chamber of Commerce and noticed an influx of coworking



spaces—conference rooms and workstations that people can rent for a few hours or a weekend. And he got the idea of having something similar tailored for filmmakers. Denise says, "The main reason I'd gotten this space was to be more professional with clients, to be a little more forward-facing because it's hard to do that when your office is your living room. And I realized I can't be the only filmmaker out there who's struggling with that."

A coworking space provides an in-between step for those who aren't ready to spend \$5-\$10,000 a month on studio rent.

"We're here for when you graduate from your living room to the next step up but aren't quite ready to get your own space," Denise says. In addition to the usual conference rooms, Cinema Exchange opens into a sound stage with a blank wall where people can do photoshoots or film video content. Cameras, lights, editing equipment, and more are available to rent. Clients range from amateur to higher end, which means the studio has a steady market. Denise explains, "If we can offer those tools to the higher end clients, and they like what we offer them, obviously

that's a bigger benefit to other artists we can offer things to."

In addition to providing resources, the space also opens its doors to the filmmaking community for collaboration and networking. Some events give aspiring filmmakers a chance to learn about cutting edge equipment up close. For example, in August 2019 Cinema Exchange hosted "Blackmagic Demo Day," where attendees got to learn about and try out two next generation digital cameras. The studio also hosts four short film screenings per year with different themes, featuring the work of local artists. This gives filmmakers a chance to get their work in front of an audience—and meet people to work with on their next project.

Events like this foster a spirit of openness and collaboration that is key to keeping the film industry thriving. Denise recalls some feedback he received at an event: "One of the comments from one of the older gentlemen was, 'I've been in this business for 35 years, and way back in the

80s and 90s, you couldn't get advice from the guy you were working with....we were guarded. Now if you want to know how to do something on an editing platform, you want to know how to run this camera, what does this button do, you go to Google. People are beating down the door trying to give you advice and help you out!"

Cinema Exchange's next screening, "Fight or Fright," will take place on Friday, October 25 and (appropriately to the season) showcase action and horror scenes. Past events have seen zombies, vampires, and even locally filmed car chases. As with all screenings, there may be mature themes in service of telling a compelling story and, in this case, some blood and gore. The material should be appropriate for older teens and adults, but people should exercise their judgment in bringing young children. There will be a chance to network before and after the screening, and light hors d'oeuvres will be served.

Not a filmmaker but just curious what your local artists are up to? Come anyway! After all, films are made for a general audience, not only other filmmakers. Your feedback will also be welcome. As Denise says, "You made a film, you made it for an audience." The joy of the audience is also an important part of collaboration.

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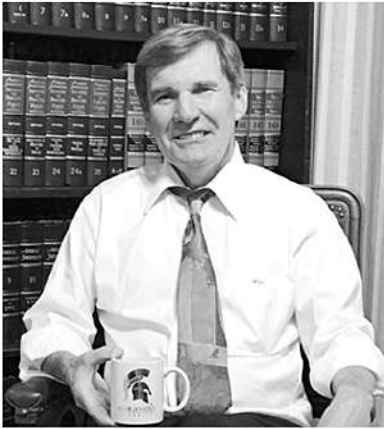

The State of California adopts a set of new construction codes every three years referred to as the California Building Standards Codes. The purpose of this public hearing is to amend the 2019 California Building Standards Codes, which automatically become effective January 1, 2020, the 2018 International Pool and Spa Safety Code, and the 2018 International Property Management Code with certain administrative and technical amendments based on Fremont's local conditions. The proposed administrative and technical changes mainly relate to soils susceptible to liquefaction, corrosive soils and to address local conditions due to the proximity of Fremont to the Hayward and Calaveras earthquake faults.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW: The proposed action is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in that it is not a Project which has the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment under Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 15061(b)(3). No further environmental review is necessary.

- bobcat hunting
- AB 1260, by Assemblymember Brian Maienschein (D-San Diego), bans import of
- certain skins (hippo, caiman, lizards)

Heartfelt thanks to all these compassionate legislators—may their tribe increase. Here’s hoping for some bills in 2020 addressing cruelty issues in rodeos and live animal food markets. Newark’s last chance to save bayfront

In 1959, the Army Corps of Engineers developed a map that would forever change the course of our region. Later entitled, “Bay or River” the map showed an image of what San Francisco Bay would look like if current development trends continued. At the time, the Bay was abused in almost every imaginable way: wetlands were turned into trash dumps, raw sewage was dumped directly into its waters, and nearly every city along the Bay had plans to fill in and develop its portion of the shoreline. By 2020, the Army Corps predicted that if current development trends continued, the Bay would be nothing more than a shipping channel.

This map sparked grassroots movements to save the bay and create the first urban national wildlife refuge. Through congressional actions and state regulations, we have largely stopped the filling of our Bay, and have instead restored tens of thousands of acres of wetlands, built dozens of parks, cleaned our waters, and reconnected millions of people with the incredible San Francisco Bay estuary we call home.

Yet, here in Newark, it is as if these past 60 years of progress never happened. For decades, developers and city leaders have worked together to advance plans to fill in Newark’s Bay shoreline—specifically the area around the former Pintail and Whistling Wings Duck Clubs, now called “Area 4.” Despite pushback from almost every major environmental group and concern from numerous regulatory agencies, the city has continued to move forward with their plan to truck in 1.67 million cubic yards of fill (more than 100,000 dump trucks of fill to

bury the shoreline) and build nearly 500 single-family houses in Area 4. It will all come to a head when the Newark Planning Commission will vote to approve the plan.

The real question is, “why?” As cities across the region are restoring their sections of the Bay—why should we in Newark be turning our back on the Bay, paving over wildlife habitat, and treating our shoreline like “quick land” for developers to make billions by building million-dollar houses?

We have another vision. Rather than paving over our Bay shoreline, let’s embrace it. Let’s protect our shoreline and restore it. “Area 4,” which is currently an undeveloped mosaic of wetlands, ponds and up-land habitat, has been prioritized by the scientific community for protection, and is already included within the expansion boundaries of the Don Edwards SF Bay National Wildlife Refuge. If restored, Area 4 can help provide flood protection for our community in the face of sea level rise, provide critical habitat for wildlife, and equally importantly, offer an opportunity to reconnect Newark residents to our Bay shoreline for the first time in decades.

We urge the Planning Commission to oppose plans to develop “Area 4;” instead, reset our city on a path of protecting our shoreline, rather than paving it over. Newark residents—and our Bay—deserve nothing less.

Prohibition of facial recognition software

California has become the largest state to ban facial recognition software in police body cameras, in a move to protect civil liberties over use of technology prone to mistakes. Governor Newsom today signed AB 1215, a proposal by Assemblymember Phil Ting (D-San Francisco) that prohibits law enforcement from equipping body cameras with facial recognition software and other biometric scanners for three years. AB 1215 will take effect on January 1, 2020 and sunset in three years, when Ting will reconsider extending the ban.

“The public wanted their officers and deputies to use body cameras to provide accountability and transparency for the community. The addition of facial recognition technology essentially turns them into 24-hour surveillance tools, giving law enforcement the ability to track our every move. We cannot become a police state,” said Ting.

To prove that facial recognition isn’t ready for prime time, the American Civil

Liberties Union (ACLU) recently put the technology to the test, running photos of all 120 members of the state Legislature through a mugshot database. It falsely matched 26 lawmakers, including Ting. More than half of those falsely identified are lawmakers of color, illustrating the biases and risks associated with the technology’s dangerous inaccuracies if allowed to subject people to perpetual police line-ups. A similar test conducted on members of Congress last year also produced 28 mismatches.

False matches led Axon, one of the largest manufacturers of police body cameras, to bar facial recognition programs in its products. Microsoft also had the same concerns, particularly the high error rate among women and people of color, when it declined to sell facial recognition software to a California law enforcement agency.

Local Bay Area cities are also troubled by the implications of this flawed technology. In May, San Francisco became the first city in the U.S. to block the use of facial recognition technology by police and other city agencies.

Fremont School Board Highlights

At its October 16 meeting, The Fremont Unified School District (FUSD) Board of Education:

- Approved Commencement of Surplus Property Disposition Process - At this time, district staff has identified at least one school campus that may no longer be needed for the district’s school purposes – Marshall Elementary School at 5203 Curtis Street. The board was asked to give district staff direction on seeking and obtaining members to establish its 7-11 Committee. Additionally, the board is asked to give direction on guidelines and timing for the Committee’s evaluation of district facilities.
- Received Revised Demographic Study on Enrollment - The district’s actual enrollment as of September 13 was 35,036. This represented a decline by 595 from the June enrollment revision. Overall, the actual enrollment represents a difference of almost 900 students from the original February enrollment forecast. When extrapolating the decline over three years, this represents a potential overestimate by thousands of students from the current forecast. Based on these factors, the district requested that the demographer revisit the enrollment projections and update the 2019-20 multi-year enrollment based on our actual CBEDS enrollment and re-projection of growth and other variables. The revisions provided in this update are of critical importance and will support a meaningful financial forecast as the district begins to develop the first interim budget update. As a result of this information, the district will be presenting a special budget update at the October 30 board meeting to show the effect of projected enrollment changes on the multi-year budget.
- Received Update on the Williamson Property – In advance of an upcoming community meeting, the board received a

presentation updating them on the conceptual drawings of the park and school site on the Williamson Property at 3350 Eggers Drive. The FUSD staff met with the City of Fremont administration to review the respective task lists for the elementary school and joint use park project at the Williamson site. The basic layout has been adapted by QKA from the design of Lila Bringhurst Elementary School and park. The date for a community meeting is at 6:30 p.m. October 24 at Washington High School.

- Received the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) Results - The CAASPP System includes the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) Summative Assessments, which were administered to Fremont Unified School District students in grades 3-8 and 11 during spring 2019. The Summative Assessments are comprehensive end of the year assessments of grade-level learning that measure progress toward college and career readiness.
- Held Public Hearing on Instructional Materials - Education Code requires governing boards to make a written determination as to whether each pupil enrolled in all core areas as well as foreign language or health courses has enough textbooks or instructional materials that are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum frameworks adopted by the State Board.
- Approved Wellness Committee Bylaws - The Wellness Committee meets several times a year to build a coordinated school health system that supports and reinforces health literacy through health education, physical education, health services, nutrition services, psychological and counseling services, health promotion for students and staff, a safe and healthy school environment, and parent/guardian and community involvement.

Relinquishment of Route 84 to Fremont

The City of Fremont has been working with the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) regarding the transfer of ownership (relinquishment) of State Route 84 (SR84) between Interstate 880 and Mission Boulevard. The route includes portions of Thornton Avenue, Fremont Boulevard, Peralta Boulevard, and Mowry Avenue.

In February 2018, Sen. Bob Wieckowski sponsored Senate Bill 989 (SB989) authorizing the relinquishment of SR84 in Fremont. On October 9, 2019, the California Transportation Commission (CTC) approved the SR84 Relinquishment giving the City of Fremont local control over this street right of way and setting the stage for a multi-year plan to upgrade the quality of the road. Construction projects are planned for Thornton Avenue and Fremont Boulevard in 2021 (Phase 1), Peralta Boulevard in 2022 (Phase 2), and Mowry Avenue in 2023 (Phase 3).

The Phase 1 project referred to as the “Centerville Complete Streets” project has been funded for design and construction through an Alameda County Transportation Commission (ACTC) grant in the amount of \$8.7 million and for pavement rehabilitation through State funds. The Centerville Complete Streets Project will repave the streets and implement “complete streets” improvements to enhance safety and mobility for all users including drivers, pedestrians, bicyclists, school children, and businesses.

New mental health services available to South Bay residents

Imagine a child with a serious emotional disturbance, or a juvenile just released from the justice system with a severe mental illness or an adult who is diagnosed with a persistent mental health condition. Where do they go for care? Until now, community-based options were limited or did not exist.

The County of Santa Clara Behavioral Health Services Department is expanding services to provide new levels of care for community members with differing needs. Some people cycle in and out of Emergency Psychiatric Services, hospital care and incarceration, which can make it difficult to connect to ongoing services.

"We need to get services to people where they live, when they need them, and in a way that promotes personal and public safety," said County Supervisor Joe Simitian, President of the Board of Supervisors and Chair of the Board's Health and Hospitals Committee. "Interrupting the downward spiral of folks

in crisis, and getting people connected to regular mental health services and care is the goal of these new programs."

Two of the programs are new to Santa Clara County: Assertive Community Treatment and Forensic Assertive Community Treatment. These two programs provide the highest level of care, are evidence-based and have been implemented across the country with consistent positive outcomes. Both programs are designed to address an array of mental health needs and to be available 24/7 should a crisis arise.

"We are working to ensure that all Santa Clara County residents have access to the appropriate level of care," said Supervisor Susan Ellenberg. "These programs provide alternatives to hospitalization and locked emergency psychiatric settings. Our priority is always to provide the highest level of care that meets what our community members need."

Here are some of the services available:

- Assertive Community Treatment. This program will provide comprehensive,

evidence-based behavioral health services to individuals diagnosed with severe and persistent mental health and/or co-occurring mental health and substance use conditions. With the highest level of outpatient services, the program will have 200 slots for adult and older adult clients.

- Forensic Assertive Community Treatment. This program will serve high risk, homeless and criminal justice-involved individuals. The program is a comprehensive, time-unlimited and evidence-based behavioral health outpatient service. There are 120 slots, of which 20 slots will be dedicated specifically for individuals deemed Incompetent to Stand Trial and granted diversion under Assembly Bill (AB) 1810.

- Intensive Full-Service Partnership. This program includes team-based comprehensive outpatient services aimed at treating and improving behavioral health symptoms and dysfunction in the least restrictive and least intrusive manner. The program will serve 600 clients including 400 adults, 100 youth (ages 6-15) and 100 transitional aged youth, ages 16-25.

- In-Home Outreach Teams. These provide intensive outreach and engagement, mental health screening, in-home intervention and family education and link individuals who are not voluntarily engaging in services to treatment. The program will serve transitional age youth, adults and older adults with serious mental illness and substance use disorders.

- Wellness and Recovery Medication Services (WARMS). This program was initially piloted in county-operated mental health clinics and is fully implemented at the Downtown Mental Health and Narvaez Clinics. WARMS supports clients in maintaining functionality with minimal intervention. For this lower level of care, clients continue to receive an annual mental health assessment, ongoing treatment planning and limited case management.

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may need 5-6 open heart surgeries or a heart transplant. “It doesn’t happen as much, but there are still children who pass away because of their CHD,” Shair said. She hopes the advancement of medical technology will change that. People with CHD have to take extra care of themselves. “If they start feeling really tired all the time, like usually they’ll be able to walk really briskly without a problem but then, all of a sudden, they’re starting to feel tired each time. Then it’s a good idea for them to see their doctor about possible changes with their exercise, their diet, or if there’s a need for medical intervention,” Shair said. Proceeds and donations towards the run go to Mended Little Hearts of the Bay Area and Heart Heroes. Heart Heroes’ primary focus is to support kids with CHD. They make personalized superhero capes for children with CHD to wear at the Superhero Heart Run... Shair’s son has one

to patients directly. “They do have to usually be the ones reaching out and that’s because we can’t ask the hospitals for their contact information,” Shair said. Everyone at the event can be a hero and dress like one, too. All attendees get a cape. “When you’re walking or running around at Quarry Lakes, it’s fun to see the capes fluttering around and people who are having fun in their Superhero outfits,” Shair said. Before the run there’s a parade for children who have CHD and experienced open-heart surgery. Another event, Heart Angel Remembrance, observes a moment of silence while participants blow bubbles for people that have passed away from CHD. “Just to remind people that they are still a part of the journey even though that family member might not be here anymore,” Shair said. The fundraising goal for Superhero Heart Run is \$45,000. According to the website, the run has already raised \$8,000 as of



too. “It has an ‘R’ on it because his name’s Ripley and there’s a lightning bolt, and he thinks it’s very cool.” Mended Little Hearts provides patient support to families who have loved ones with CHD. They give bravery bags to kids going through heart surgeries. The organization also connects families with CHD together to form groups called Heart Families. These groups give each other emotional support and meet during patient and family gatherings. “Groups like this make it easy to meet other families; getting that support is really helpful,” Shair said. She also said a great way for families to get together for events is through social media, especially since the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA) regulations prevent organizations from reaching out
