# Oakland Zoo vets treat mountain lion cub for burns

Only four to six weeks old, an orphaned mountain lion cub suffering from severe wildfire burns was discovered and rescued by a Cal Fire firefighter September 30 in an area the Zogg Wildfire that burned near Redding in the northern Central Valley.

Upon discovering and capturing the lone cub, Cal Fire contacted the Shasta County Sherriff's Department, who in turn contacted the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW). CDFW veterinarians, who are working to save the lives of many wildlife victims trapped by the recent fires throughout California, then contacted

The landscaping project will create a rock garden with drought tolerant plants. Dang planned the project to coincide with the upcoming rainy season to help the plants become wall established



# Renowned Shoulder Expert to Present Free Live Webinar

Most people don't think about their shoulders much until they feel pain when lifting, grabbing or reaching for something. Costouros, MD, FACS, FAAOS, is a board-certified, fellowship-trained, orthopedic surgeon who has devoted his career to harnessing the latest techniques from around the world to provide patients the best possible care for shoulder conditions and injuries. He has authored pioneering research, worked extensively with medical technology companies to develop shoulder implants, trained other surgeons, and he regularly speaks at medical conferences around the world.

Dr. Costouros will present "Shoulder Pain: Causes and Treatment Options," on Tuesday, Oct. 13, at 6:30 p.m. This free, live presentation can be viewed on Facebook at www.facebook.com/WashingtonHosp, or YouTube at YouTube.com/whhsInHealth. Those watching on Facebook will have the opportunity to ask questions live. If you do not have a Facebook account you can watch on YouTube, but the question and answer feature is not offered on that platform. If you cannot watch it live, a recording of the webinar will be available for viewing following the event.

In this webinar, Dr. Costouros will discuss anatomy of the shoulder and the most common shoulder conditions including rotator cuff disease, bursitis, arthritis, instability problems and frozen shoulder as well as injuries to the shoulder. "The shoulder is the most complex joint in the human body," he said. "Chronic pain,

weakness and loss of range of motion can cause problems when participating in sports, sleeping, and performing everyday activities which can severely diminish a person's quality of life."

Shoulder injuries can happen as a result of an automobile or household accident. They also occur from injury or overuse in sports, especially baseball, football, tennis, golf and swimming. Dr. Costouros treats all levels of athletes, including weekend warriors, high school and college athletes, as well as professionals on local teams like the 49ers, Warriors and Giants.

Arthritis is a common shoulder disorder that affects people as they age, causing pain, stiffness and limited range of motion. Arthritis of the shoulder can make everyday activities like combing your hair or reaching in a cabinet a challenge. If you or a loved one has shoulder pain or has experienced any of these symptoms, this webinar will be of interest.

Dr. Costouros currently practices at the Institute for Joint Restoration and Research (IJRR) at Washington Hospital, performing more than 40 types of traditional and arthroscopic surgeries including reverse total shoulder replacement, which he helped bring to the U.S. when it was first approved by the FDA in 2004.

During the webinar, Dr. Costouros will discuss the wide range of treatments

available to address shoulder issues. In addition to his extensive surgical experience and acumen, he is an expert in nonsurgical rehabilitation, from physical therapy to cortisone injections and other advanced approaches. "Treating pain and loss of function is not just about surgery. Many shoulder problems can be resolved through nonsurgical methods," he added.

#### West Coast wildfires

Dear EarthTalk: I am sickened by all the death, destruction and misery resulting from the West Coast wildfires, but aren't these blazes actually beneficial to the environment?

Some landscapes evolved with periodic wildfires as an influential force, and people have been using "prescribed burns" (the controlled application of fire under specified weather conditions) to restore health to certain types of ecosystems for millennia. But while some fires in some places might be beneficial, the wholesale torching of the forests of the American West right now is far from beneficial overall -- not to mention a sure sign that our profligate ways with carbon emissions are coming back to haunt us

On the plus side, forest fire does clear away the tinder-like overgrown understory that has resulted from years of forest management that avoided fire at all cost. Hundreds of years ago, many of the forests now on fire in California, Oregon and Washington had fewer yet larger and healthier trees. But these days, partly thanks to fire suppression regimes as well as other factors, forests are more crowded today with smaller, less healthy trees. It's also harder for those remaining mature, established trees to compete for nutrients and space with all the undergrowth that's built up in recent decades. In these situations, small manageable fires (or even better, prescribed burns) can not only be beneficial, but can help prevent larger fires down the road by clearing the weaker, smaller trees.

Another benefit of wildfire is the clearing of overgrown underbrush to make room for new grasses, herbs and regenerated shrubs that provide food and habitat for many wildlife species. Also, the removal of thick stands of shrubs increases the water supply for the remaining larger plants and trees -- and also allows streams and rivers to swell, further benefiting ever-thirsty native flora and fauna.

Yet another benefit of fire is that it kills off fungi, bacteria, viruses and insects that can decimate tree and plant communities and entire forest ecosystems. According to CalFire, California's statewide wildfire management agency, more trees die from insect infestation and disease than from wildfire; some fire actually helps keep forests devoid of such pests and healthier overall than without fire. CalFire points out that vegetation burned by wildfire provides a rich source of nutrients that nourish surviving trees and soil.

And periodic fire can be an important way to keep certain ecosystems in balance. Many trees have evolved with fire and some even require it for seed germination; a few species even sport leaves covered with flammable resins (manzanita, scrub oak, chamise) to encourage fires that help seed the next generation.

National Geographic reports that, surprisingly, wildlife casualties tend to be low during wildfire events, as animals -- especially those native to the areas on-fire and evolved to respond to the threat -either burrow in the ground or flee to safer areas instinctively. But invasive plants and animals may not fare as well given lack of genetic imprinting to be on alert for the threat.

Once the smoke clears on 2020's horrific fire season, mass human and wildlife casualties could be the new normal. Global warming certainly has thrown the fire season into overdrive this year across California, Oregon and Washington, whether or not the Trump administration cares to admit it.

## **Online instruction** to continue at **Ohlone College**

Officials from the Ohlone Community College District have confirmed that classes during the spring 2021 term will be held online as a precaution related to ongoing coronavirus COVID-19 concerns.

"The health and safety of our students, faculty, and staff are always at the forefront of all of the decisions we make, and, given the current environment, we believe this to be the best choice in safeguarding the community," said Superintendent/ President, Dr. Eric Bishop.

While most classes will be fully online, via Canvas or via ConferZoom, or labeled as hybrid, there may be some courses that will need to be conducted in-person with the strictest safety measures in place. This information will be included in the course descriptions in WebAdvisor for spring 2021.

"We realize this is a tough time for students and that it's hard to feel connected," Bishop added. "That's why we have worked hard to provide our students limited in-person student services, have provided study centers with social distancing on both campuses, and have been able to provide technology support and equipment to those students with the most need. We are doing everything we can to make sure our students know that we are here for them."

The college's Fremont campus is open 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesdays at its Newark campus to provide limited in-person student services and safe, quiet, and socially-distanced study centers with campus Wi-Fi for all students. For those students that do not need to come to campus, the majority of student services and resources are available through the college website at https://www.ohlone.edu/.

Everyone working or visiting the campus is required to wear a face mask and will be subject to a health screening upon entry. The college enforces social distancing guidelines of six-feet or more.



Paint and hazardous materials can be dropped o at Fremont Recycling and Transfer Station. Furniture and large items must be broken up. It is recommended that you recycle all items that have potential for future use to help preserve the environment.



# Teen non-profit Spreading Literacy to Children needs-your help

Do you have children's books lying around that you would like to get rid of? If so, keep reading to find out how you can play a part in bridging the gaps in literacy by donating these books locally!

Gaps in society continue to grow, causing more underprivileged children to not have access to learning material. With their entrepreneurial mindsets, Shriya Gattapally and Jheel Gandhi, of Washington High School in Fremont, were able to create SLTC. SLTC (or Spreading Literacy to Children!) is a teen-led nonprofit based in the Bay Area whose goal is to provide underprivileged children with learning resources, and to spread awareness of this need.

From research, Shriya and Jheel learned that 65% of all jobs will require post-secondary education. However, students who aren't at a proficient reading level by 4th grade aren't likely to continue their education after high school. In order to get to that goal, students need to build a strong foundation at a young age by developing their reading and writing skills. However, there are many

children without access to learning materials, or who lack the motivation to read and write. Shriya and Jheel immediately realized they needed to help bridge gaps in literacy, which is when they got the idea of starting a local nonprofit. They knew that with the help of their community, they could make a huge difference.

SLTC was officially created on March 27, 2020, and since then, they have branched out to Monterey; Stockton; Dallas, Texas; and Orlando, Florida. They also communicate with children in Morocco and Nigeria. Due to COVID-19, they have had time to reach out to many authors and ask for donations. SLTC donates books to libraries, elementary schools, hospitals, and shelters. When safe, they also want to hold workshops at local libraries where they read to children to plant a seed of interest so they're motivated to take that extra step to grab a book and read it!

Across all branches, the organization has gathered and donated 300+ books. SLTC hopes to increase this number, with the help of the people of the Bay Area! SLTC's primary branch in Fremont, California is hosting their first annual book drive (thru) on Saturday, October 24, 2020 at the Always Dream Play Park in Fremont. They are accepting any books intended for children, and any quantity! All books donated will be distributed to local elementary schools, shelters, and hospitals. Literacy is extremely important in achieving proper education and building one's future. With SLTC, you can help create a better future for us all.







# Park Business Operating Permit Program to assist fitness businesses

On September 29, Fremont City Manager Mark Danaj signed Executive Order 2020-08, establishing an emergency Park Business Operating Permit program (P-BOP). This executive order will allow commercial businesses that provide fitness classes to use the city's parks during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The program will be managed by the Community Services Department and is modeled after the city's Pop Up Patio program. The P-BOP program is specifically developed to allow commercial fitness businesses with additional capacity to serve customers by granting park space to conduct fitness classes. The program is a free streamlined process for applicants with a two-day turnaround for permit issuance.

"City of Fremont is committed to supporting Fremont businesses in their economic recovery efforts and the fitness industry in particular, has been significantly impacted by the pandemic," said Danaj. "As local county emergency regulations begin to ease, and we transition through the state's Color Coded Four Tier Blueprint for a safer economy, gyms and fitness facilities will likely be required to operate with restricted capacities. I am hopeful that fitness businesses will take advantage of our large outdoor park spaces and this program will

help provide financial relief as well as longer term sustainability."

The emergency adoption of this executive order will allow business activity and park permits to be issued for gatherings of any size, both which are currently regulated under Fremont Municipal Code (FMC) sections 12.20.060(q) (prohibits business being conducted in City parks) and 12.20.040 (requires permits be issued to gatherings of twenty-five (25) people or more).

Fremont City Council is scheduled to ratify the emergency executive order on October 6. All emergency park business operating permits will expire upon the date that the city council terminates the local emergency related to COVID-19 unless an earlier expiration date is stated in the permit.

Applicants must comply with all applicable local and state regulations and are required to hold a Fremont Business License. #### Lufthansa pulls more big jets, issues gloomy outlook

German airline Lufthansa, already bailed out by the government, says it will have to make more staff cuts and mothball more jumbo jets than originally planned because the outlook for air travel is worse than the company first predicted.

The company said Monday it would have to drop more than the already announced 22,000 full-time positions, without saying how many more. The airline will also pull its remaining eight Airbus A380 jets out of service and put them in long-term storage, along with 10 four-engine

Overall, it said that a modest rebound in air travel had petered out after the end of the summer vacation travel season. It expects to offer only 20-30% of its normal capacity in the last three months of the year, compared with the same period in pre-virus 2019.

The final number of job reductions will be negotiated with employee representatives. It said it was hoping to reduce cash burn to 400 million euros (\$470 million) a month this winter from 500 million euros a month presently. Management is staying with its prediction that it will return to positive operating cash flow sometime in 2021.

Lufthansa has secured a 9 billion euro (\$10.6 billion) bailout from the German government.

# Oakland Zoo vets treat mountain lion cub for burns



Oakland Zoo veterinarians for help in treating the cub. Receiving the urgent call by CDFW Oakland Zoo's veterinary team was standing by to receive and treat the cub, which was driven from Redding by a CDFW worker.

"We are so grateful for the Oakland Zoo's expertise, world-class facilities and willingness to step up -- on extremely short notice -- to help wildlife in need," said CDFW's senior wildlife veterinarian Dr. Deana Clifford. "Partnerships like this are absolutely critical to our state's efforts to provide emergency care. California's wildfires are erupting on a scale that we've never seen before, and we expect that we'll have more burn patients than we have the capacity to treat in our own veterinary facility. Unfortunately, a lion this size is too small to be released back into the wild, but we are hopeful that under the zoo's care, it will get a second chance as an ambassador for its species."

Oakland Zoo's Dr. Lynette Waugh, along with staff veterinary technicians immediately examined and treated the very young male cub, weighing only 3.75 pounds -- and reported he was badly burned, especially his paws. His whiskers are completely singed off, and there is severe irritation to his eyes as well.

The cub was cleaned and given antibiotics, supportive fluids, pain medication and fed milk formula for kittens through a syringe. The zoo's Dr. Alex Herman explained that the cub is currently eating on his own and acting feisty -- both promising signs for his recovery. Zoo veterinarians performed x-rays earlier to determine if there is damage to the cub's lungs from smoke inhalation and bone damage to his paws, and results were positive. Aside from severe burns to the soft tissue of the paws, there is no damage to bones or lungs.

The zoo's veterinary team is also working with UC Davis Veterinary Medicine Teaching Hospital for their expertise in providing the most advanced care in treating the cub's burn wounds.

Herman, Director of Oakland Zoo's Veterinary Hospital said "We're grateful to be part of this amazing little cub's rescue and rehabilitation. It's an amazing effort between Cal Fire, the Shasta County Sherriff's Department, and of course our partners at the California Department of Fish & Wildlife. In the past two years, this marks our 13th mountain lion cub rescue for Oakland Zoo in partnership with CDFW. We're cautiously optimistic that this cub will now survive and thrive, our dedicated team at Oakland Zoo is fully committed to do everything we can for him and for his beautiful species."

Aside from wildfires,
Mountain lions are facing
numerous threats in California;
often struck by cars and illegally
poached. These factors culminate
in the human-wildlife conflict,
putting them at odds with
humans in encroaching urban
areas and developments. Oakland
Zoo partners with conservation
organizations like the Mountain
Lion Foundation and the
Bay Area Puma Project to educate
the public on the issue and help
conserve the species in the wild.

Oakland Zoo helped found BACAT (Bay Area Cougar Action Team) in 2013, an alliance with the Bay Area Puma Project and the Mountain Lion Foundation, to help support the CDFW to save mountain lions caught in the human-wildlife conflict.

In the wild, Mountain lion cubs stay with their mothers until they are around 2-years-old in order to learn the skills to survive on their own. Because this cub is orphaned and now unable to learn how to survive in the wild, he will be placed in a suitable forever home once he's ready to leave Oakland Zoo's Veterinary Hospital.



# TOMATO TROUBLES

You waited all season for that first red ripe tomato only to discover less-than-perfect fruit. Do not worry, you can still have a great harvest and improve things for next season.

Blossom end rot is a common problem on the first set of fruit. The bottom of the tomato turns black. This is not caused by a disease but is the result of a calcium deficiency in the developing fruit. This deficiency is usually caused by fluctuations in water uptake by the plant. Fluctuating soil moisture, damage to the roots, excessive nitrogen fertilizer and high humidity can all impact water and calcium uptake and result in blossom end rot.

The first set of fruit is the most susceptible because young tomato plants are growing rapidly and require more water and

calcium. As plants mature, the problem is less common.

Avoid the problem by watering thoroughly to encourage deep roots. Mulch the soil to help conserve moisture and suppress weeds. Avoid excessive fertilization and be mindful when weeding near plants. And consider growing more blossom end rot resistant tomatoes like All-America Selections winner Early Resilience. Don't pitch blossom end rot tomatoes in the trash. Just cut off and compost the black portion and enjoy the rest.

Cracked fruit is another problem that worries gardeners. Fluctuating temperatures, moisture, high humidity, and improper fertilization result in irregular development of the fruit and cracking. These cracks often occur when heavy rains follow a dry spell. The rapid change in soil moisture causes the fruit to expand faster than the skin of the tomato. Vertical splits on the side





of the tomato are called radial cracks. These are the most serious and commonly occur during hot and humid weather. Concentric

cracking appears as rings of cracks around the fruit's stem.

When cracks appear on green tomatoes the fruit usually rots

before it ripens. Since this is not caused by a disease, the rotten fruit is safe to compost. Save affected fruit by harvesting cracked tomatoes immediately and finish ripening them inside. The flavor is not as good as tomatoes that ripened on the vine during sunny weather, but you will still be able to enjoy the harvest. If tomatoes develop a sour smell or begin to ooze, toss them in the compost pile.

Catfacing is another disorder you may discover when harvesting your tomatoes. The blossom scar on the bottom of the fruit becomes enlarged or perforated. It is not clear what causes the problem, but it appears to be more common when cold temperatures occur during flowering, there are extreme fluctuations in day and night temperatures, excessive pruning has occurred or there has been an over application of nitrogen fertilizer. If fruit is otherwise undamaged, it is safe

When these problems occur make notes to correct your garden maintenance to avoid them in the future.



As program coordinator for FCSN, Isabella and her team of FCSN directors, coordinates the "Flexible Subject Virtual Tutoring" program to provide individuals with special needs with 1:1 virtual tutoring, especially valuable during the COVID-19 pandemic. She also leads the "Starting FCSN Clubs at Your School" program to start multiple FCSN clubs at various high schools and colleges. Isabella is able, through this program, to give guidance and supervision while assisting volunteer teams to form FCSN clubs at their own school.

Individuals with special needs have incredible strengths, passions, and abilities that are immensely valuable in the workforce. Isabella hopes to use her experience in working with individuals with special needs to make SN Inclusion a truly valuable program to improve neurodiversity in the workplace.

# ally for neurodiverse people

The word "neurodiversity" usually has negative connotations such as "different" and "mentally challenged." In reality, neurodiversity is simply variation in the brain affecting sociability, attention, learning, and mood functions. People with neurodiversity can be gifted in some areas, have trouble focusing in school, over-focus on special interests, display learning differences, and have challenges in social settings or in simply making new friends. Neurodiversity advocates promote support programs that allow neuro-divergent people to live as they are, rather than being forced to adapt to accepted ideas of normality.

Meet one such advocate, Aaryan Shah of Fremont.

Since elementary school, Shah had exposure to neurodiversity and visited special education classrooms. As the neurotypical and neurodiverse students became increasingly segregated throughout Shah's elementary and middle school years, he felt a need to promote their inclusion and acceptance. This led Shah to establish the Unitopia Foundation – an international non-profit that helps neurodiverse students through peer-to-peer interaction – after graduating from 8th grade in 2018.

Unitopia began as a school-based initiative focused on interacting with neurodiverse and even physiodiverse students through fun and meaningful social interaction and forging new friendships. Over time, the organization built a strong partnership with families across the Bay Area and soon created a worldwide movement of inclusivity and empowerment. Two years later Unitopia has more than 25 volunteers helping over 60 families across eight countries. As

Unitopia continues to grow, it is partnering with organizations such as Amazon Smile and Friends of Children with Special Needs to reach out to even more neurodiverse people and create a more inclusive environment for them.

Since its inception, Unitopia has seen many of its students grow and mature from the social interaction its volunteers organized. Shah remarked, "Unitopia has played an instrumental role in my own development; not only that, but it has been a surreal experience watching the impact of myself and the entire team on students, families, and organizations across the globe." A parent of a student (Askari) with learning differences mentioned, "Aaryan's work through Unitopia has benefited Askari heavily, especially because of the one-on-one interaction that they provide to kids. It has helped Askari grow immensely, along with the ability to make new connections and friends!"

Unitopia sparked new interests for

students to explore. For example, autistic students developed new interests such as playing sports, watching new video games, improving literacy and even forging new friendships. Unitopia's arts and crafts sessions have also brought together many friends on the neurodiverse spectrum and supports lifelong bonds past adolescence. Unitopia also had a positive impact in Africa. "Unitopia has helped us serve many families here in Mbita with training guides and assistive technologies of all types," said Benson Oswago (Founder of Viagenco, Unitopia partner in Kenya).

Unitopia has displayed innovation during the COVID-19 pandemic. When one-on-one interactions between volunteers and students stopped, the organization introduced Zoom Tutorials to make sure students got the same level of interaction with high schoolers as before. For one Zoom class, kids had kits delivered free of charge so they could sculpt and paint flowers from air-dry clay with a

volunteer. So far, Unitopia had great success and interaction with new events hosted every other week.

Unitopia is funded by donations and to date, about \$19,000 has been raised with the money directed to support neurodiverse children around the world. In 1953, the Memorial Day Indianapolis 500-Mile automobile race began with the now well-known announcement by racing legend Wilbur Shaw... "Gentlemen, start your engines." Although modified to incorporate additional venues and participation by women, the phrase aptly describes the month of October in 2020.

This week, ballots are circulating for early voting; advertisements, commercials and endorsements are rising like a king high tide of historic proportions. Along with intense interest in the presidential and state elections, activity on the local scene is increasing as well.

Efforts at the local level are critical for our daily lives since they affect allocation of resources and direct action to address issues of education, traffic, development, recreation and the immediate environment. Without local staff and elected representation, decisions would be relegated to a completely different set of priorities more attuned to regional, state and national issues that, although valid, do not address the complexities and diversity of neighborhoods.

It is important for voters to understand that local representation does not automatically equate to an unregulated use of funds collected from taxpayers. Local government is responsible for fund management, but does not receive all of its

tax money without strings attached. This is, in part, due to directives from fund sources that focus on a particular need or desire such as roads, transportation, social programs or construction expenses. Although some latitude is given to local officials, primary directives must be followed and choices may be limited no matter what other needs exist. Just as a household budget has certain fixed expenses such as rent or mortgage, so do cities, districts and organizations. It may not be a matter of what funds are spent on, rather how they are allocated and dispersed. For example, use of money designated for capital expenditures such as construction is often subject to restrictions when addressing operating expenses.

Discretionary or "General" funds are in most budgets, but limited by competing priorities. Public safety is often included in this category. We all want to feel safe and secure in our homes and within the daily patterns of our lives so, as a group, codes of behavior – laws – are instituted and require some type of enforcement. The goal is the same for the vast majority of people: a desire to live in harmony with their neighbors in peaceful coexistence.

Law enforcement personnel are often faced with situations that call for a variety of skills that may or may not be in their armamentarium. The ideal circumstance would be a host of ready response teams, available at a moment's notice, to address any legal, social or diplomatic challenge. However, the ability and practical aspect of maintain and training such a force while continuing to address purely criminal activity is daunting and difficult, if not financially impossible without massive additional funding. Are we willing to pay for this?

How to achieve this outcome may be disputed and debated, but methods are tempered by resources available and a complex set of factors that can arise in a given situation. Which of these is most important? Police services, fire and paramedic services, building code enforce-

ment, environment, recreation, education, etc.? The answer lies in the situation and what assistance is necessary at any given moment. There is no perfect answer; we ask our elected leaders to make these decisions and must judge them on whether they have the mental acumen to do so in an intelligent and thoughtful manner.

Holding elected representatives accountable for the use of available resources is fair and should be questioned, but competing priorities and restricted funding can be a limiting factor. Removing or "defunding" does not eliminate the primary need but can result in addressing an established circumstance without any practical solution. When judging the actions of elected officials, total agreement with all decisions in a complicated situation is probably not realistic. Voting to retain a candidate in office or remove and replace should be based on an understanding of competing priorities, source of funds and restrictions placed on them.

This issue of Tri-City Voice has expanded to include statements of candidates for local elected office who are asking for your vote. We feel that it is our responsibility to provide information to the electorate to make rational decisions. In this issue, followed by another to present measures and propositions on the 2020 General Election ballot, an honest attempt has been made to contact all candidates and offer this opportunity at no cost to them. We hope our readers will take the time to read these statements and visit websites or other sources of information to make informed decisions. And, following election results, support those elected.

# **Fremont Housing Navigation Center Welcomes Residents**

First residents of the new Fremont Housing Navigation Center (HNC) have moved into the program and out of homelessness. The HNC, located near Fremont City Hall, is a pivotal partnership between the City of Fremont and Bay Area Community Services (BACS) to provide unhoused community members with rapid re-housing services and a path to securing permanent housing.

The program was designed for 45 people at a time, which has been temporarily limited to a reduced 25 participants to comply with COVID-19 safety guidelines. Once the pandemic ends and restrictions are lifted, BACS intends to open the program at full capacity.

"BACS is very honored to rapidly open its door to the Fremont Community and to do so with care, courage, and special attention paid to keep our community members, staff, and all of us safe during COVID,"

#### **Program Model**

This is a "low-barrier" shelter, meaning there are no curfews; people do not have to be sober to stay there, they can bring their pets, and there is storage for accumulated belongings. BACS seeks to support individuals in building and maintaining their independence, in a nurturing environment. Unlike the "shelter" model, people can sleep as long as they like, and there are no strict times people have to be on or off site. There are casual places to sit, and plants, trees, and murals. There are washers and dryers, bathrooms with showers, and a common room with a mini-kitchen.

#### Hayward officials apologize for Trump letter

In a statement issued Thursday, October 1, City of Hayward officials acknowledged that a letter included with boxes of food distributed to the needy included a political letter that may have been unlawful.

"Several hundred boxes of food distributed on Thursday, October 1 during the weekly City of Hayward No-Contact Food Distribution contained something they shouldn't have: a letter on White House stationary containing language deemed to be political propaganda and carrying the signature of President Trump. We apologize."

The boxes were provided to the City and food pantries across the country through the federal Coronavirus Food Assistance Program administered by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration."

Letters were removed from the remaining 35-pound boxes of produce, meat, eggs and other dairy products. However, approximately 700 of the boxes were distributed prior to the discovery.

It is inappropriate and a potential violation of law for public officials to use public resources for political purposes and to attempt to influence the outcome of an election. That clearly was not the intent of the City of Hayward."

The subject letters were also found at the Hayward No-Contact Food Distribution site at Chabot College.

# Hayward moratorium on commercial tenant evictions extended

The Hayward City Council has voted to extend by four months until Jan. 31, 2021, an emergency city moratorium that bars evictions of commercial tenants for nonpayment of rent due to COVID-19.

The Council action, which took place Tuesday, amends a broader city moratorium that was scheduled to end on Sept. 30 and that prohibited evictions of both residential and commercial tenants, as well as homeowners, in which COVID-19 was a factor in failure to make rent or mortgage loan payments.

The amended legislation approved by the Hayward Council on Tuesday extends until Jan. 31 the city's eviction protections for commercial tenants only. A new state law enacted on Aug. 31, called the Tenant, Homeowner and Small Landlord Relief and Stabilization Act, put in place a new statewide moratorium on residential evictions, also until Jan. 31, 2021. At the same time, the state measure precluded Hayward and other local governments from extending local moratoria on residential evictions beyond already enacted expiration dates.

The extension of the city moratorium on commercial evictions responds to the double bind faced by small businesses during the pandemic in which they've experienced a complete collapse of revenue followed by a delayed, halting and uncertain recovery, while fixed costs such as rent, insurance, healthcare, financing and taxes have largely remained unchanged.

Nothing in the city ordinance relieves commercial tenants of an obligation to pay rent, and unpaid back rent still accumulates. Rather, it bars evictions while the moratorium is in place and during a 180-day repayment period following the moratorium's expiration.

## Governor Signs Consumer Financial Protection Watchdog Legislation

Governor Gavin Newsom today signed twelve bills on September 25 to protect consumers from financial predators and abusive business practices.

Central to the package is AB 1864, a law that significantly expands the state's ability to protect Californians against abusive and predatory financial products and services. The bill establishes the Department of Financial Protection and Innovation (DFPI), adding 90 positions over the next three years to transform the agency into California's version of the federal Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, the agency championed by President Obama and Senator Warren. The DFPI will:

- Significantly expand the state's consumer protection capacity by adding dozens of investigators and attorneys to supervise financial institutions and crack down on financial predators;
- Create a team to monitor markets to proactively identify emerging risks to consumers;
- Create a team dedicated to consumer education and outreach, listening and responding to consumers in specific communities, including veterans, immigrants, and older Californians; and
- Create a new Office of Financial Technology and Innovation, which will cultivate

financial technology to serve – not exploit – consumers.

The law also expands the state's power to target unfair, deceptive and abusive acts and practices by financial service providers – such as debt collectors and emerging financial technology products. The creation of the department was a key idea in the Governor's January 2020-2021 budget proposal.

The Governor was joined at the virtual signing ceremony by Congresswoman Katie Porter, Assemblymember Monique Limón (D-Santa Barbara), Senator Holly Mitchell (D-Los Angeles), and Senator Bob Wieckowski (D-Fremont).

"While the federal government is getting out of the financial protection business, California is leaning into it," said Governor Gavin Newsom.
"It's at this moment especially – when so many Californians are strapped for cash and struggling to pay their bills – that families are likely to fall victim to predatory and abusive financial products. These bills ensure that financial predators are subjected to alert oversight and agile enforcement."

The USD Board unanimously approved the following at its regular Sept. 28, 2020 board meeting:

- The minutes of the Sept. 14 regular meeting and the Sept. 16 special meeting.
- Construction contract of the Aeration Blower No. 11 project to Western Water Constructors, Inc., in the amount of \$1,652,000. Funds for the project have been budgeted in the Capacity Fund.
- Job descriptions and salary range for Environmental Health and Safety Specialist and Senior HR Analyst; job description, salary range, and side letter agreement between the District and Service Employees International Union Local 1021 (SEIU) for Control Systems Specialist.

The Board also heard several informational reports:

# Park It

Dogs and dog-related rules are the focus of a new informational campaign just launched by the East Bay Regional Park District. Because of COVID-19, the park district has asked dog owners to keep their pets always on leash while visiting the regional parks.

However, as of Friday, October 2, the district has reverted to the normal rules. In summary, these rules require dogs to be on leash in picnic areas and other developed park sites. Dogs are also supposed to be leashed on paved inter-park trails such as the Iron Horse Regional Trail in central Contra Costa and the Alameda Creek Regional Trail in Fremont. Some areas exclude dogs altogether, such as swim

beaches (state law) and the Tilden Nature Area in Tilden Regional Park near Berkeley. Watch for signs and check information in park brochures.

Dogs are okay off leash in the backcountry away from developed areas if they are under their owner's control. This means the dog will come when called. Dogs should be back on leash when grazing cattle are nearby. They should also be leashed if they start chasing wildlife or have uninvited interaction with other park visitors.At Point Isabel Regional Shoreline in Richmond, dogs are allowed off leash throughout the park if they are under their owners' control.

The informational campaign is called "Be a Pup Pro." In a recent survey, the park district found that dog walking is the preferred activity among 39 percent of the respondents, second only to hiking.

You can follow several tips to be a

- Bag then bin your dog's waste. Please do not just bag it and leave it on the trail.
- Leash your pup in designated areas such as parking lots, trailheads, wildlife protection areas, etc.
- Keep your dog safe: leash up around

"Being out in nature with our dogs is a huge benefit, for us and for them," says Mary Barnsdale, a board member of Point Isabel Dog Owners. "It's on us to keep the parks clean, respect wildlife, and be sensitive to the needs of other park users."

As of this writing, several regional parks remain closed or limited in service, because of fire-related issues. Round Valley, Morgan Territory, Sunol, and Ohlone

Wilderness are still closed due to the impact from recent wildfires. Mission Peak reopened in mid-September. However, the Ohlone Wilderness Trail, which heads east from the summit of Mission Peak, is

The better news is that boat launching and fishing by boat are available as of October 2 at Del Valle Regional Park, Quarry Lakes, and Lake Chabot. Boat rentals are available at Del Valle and Lake Chabot. The family campgrounds are available with reduced capacity at Del Valle and Anthony Chabot, and the Sibley backpack camp is open. Del Valle is also open to day use on the lake's east side only.

## Google unveils latest Pixel phone, rolls out new TV service

Google will try to make a bigger splash in the smartphone market with a cheaper high-end model while it also aims to expand its presence on bigger screens with a new TV service.

The products unveiled Wednesday focus on two areas where Google has struggled to make significant inroads. Google also used a half-hour showcase streamed online to introduce a \$99 speaker that is says has better acoustics for playing music than the cheaper ones that it has been selling primarily as a command center for its voice-activated assistant.

Google's latest smartphone represents the fifth generation of a device that was supposed to prove the Mountain View, California, company can make hardware as well as it does software after the brand made its 2016 debut.

Although Google's software is used by billions of people on their smartphones, its Pixel phones have barely made dent in the market. Sales have been disappointing despite mostly positive reviews, especially for camera technology that has prompted Apple to introduce similar features in iPhones.

But perhaps the Pixel 5's biggest selling point will be its price - \$700, a markdown of \$100 from last year's model.

The phone, available October 15, is coming out two months after Google introduced a budget version, the Pixel 4a, that sells for \$350. Google also revealed Wednesday that it will make a 5G version of the Pixel 4a that will sell for \$500 aimed at consumers who want faster connections while they also watch their budgets during a recession brought on by the pandemic.

Google has had more success with a hardware lineup called, Chromecast, that streams online video on TVs. But Chromecast also faces a wide array of competition from similar streaming devices made by Roku, Amazon, and Apple.

In an attempt to differentiate itself from the rest of the pack, Google's next Chromecast will include a new service tying together many of its services in a way that's designed to make it easier for viewers sift through TV channels and streaming services to find something they want to watch.

The service, called ``Google TV," includes the company's other big-screen software, Android TV, as well as its industry-leading search engine, Chrome browser and YouTube TV, a bundle of programming like what cable and satellite providers have long provided. The new Chromecast, which will cost \$50, also will come with a small remote control for the first time.

Google has been trying a variety of ways to make its services more accessible and appealing on TVs for more than a decade, but so far hasn't enjoyed the same success on the biggest screens in households as it has on the personal computers and phones that have become the main vehicles for showing the digital ads that brought in \$135 billion in revenue last year.



#### **Carefully Consider Whom You Elect**

We write to urge you to carefully consider this election cycle. This city needs more parks, greater access to pedestrian and bicycle paths and a stronger vision for what our city can become. We represent citizens who rely on our parks and open spaces for exercise, access to nature and an escape from our urban environment. Park users represent all sectors of society but are overwhelmingly young, poor, and non-white. With the Covid pandemic, it has become clear how critical our parks are to our mental and physical health.

Recently the city of Fremont forced the closure of a major regional park over concerns of Covid. They then reimposed parking restrictions on weekends that serve to block access. Finally, the city increased the number and scope of parking citations imposed, further constraining access. Our city leaders provide almost no leadership in representing park users but choose to focus their attention on a small-gated community and its wealthy inhabitants. It is clear, they do not understand how important access to nature is for the well-being of all members of our community: walkers, joggers, the elderly, people with disabilities, children, and those with dogs.

We need elected leaders that listen, build consensus, and support the entire community. But unfortunately, our elected officials have a history of blocking access, using parking restrictions, reduced hours, thousands of dollars in fines and an increased police presence. These actions have cost park users hundreds of thousands of dollars in citations and prevented their enjoyment of our open spaces. They refuse to meet with members of the public in liaison meetings with EBRPD which are supposed to be held quarterly. Instead, there has been no meetings for over a year and a half.

Some politicians have no sense of the importance of balancing preservation and recreation. Their approach has been divisive and shortsighted. They oppose parking in the neighborhood but do not work with our regional Park District to build parking inside the park. We need elected politicians who serve the entire community, not robotic stand-ins who create barriers to our parks. We need unfettered access that invites everyone to experience nature, first-hand.



## **Alameda County receives nearly** \$14.5M under Homekey program

On September 28, Governor Gavin Newsom announced the third round of awards for Homekey, California's \$600-million program to purchase and rehabilitate housing - including hotels, motels, vacant apartment buildings and other properties - and convert them into permanent, long-term housing for people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.

HCD, which administers Homekey, awarded more than \$137 million for 19 projects in 15 California communities, totaling 938 units. Alameda County has been awarded nearly \$14.5 million to purchase an existing hotel and operate it as permanent supportive housing for extremely low-income individuals who have been homeless and who need support. Once purchased, repairs to common areas and vacant rooms will be completed before the end of the year.

Newsom also announced he has asked the Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) to approve his request for an additional \$200 million in Coronavirus Relief Funding for Homekey. If approved, the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) will provide funding for approximately 20 more Homekey projects now on a waitlist pending additional funds.

"Not only is Homekey unprecedented in providing capital to house people experiencing homeless, but we are moving with unprecedented speed," said Newsom. "Most of these projects will be ready to house people very soon after the acquisitions are complete, providing immediate help to our most vulnerable residents."

# Governor signs bills to expand access to quality behavioral health care

Governor Gavin Newsom signed a package of bills on September 25 that will ove access to quality mental health and substance use disorder services for all Californians, as well as measures that help homeless Californians suffering from behavioral health challenges access the help they need.

Governor Newsom devoted the entirety of his 2020 State of the State address to the interwoven challenges of homelessness, housing insecurity and behavioral health and proposed a number of specific reforms some of which he is signing into

"The bills I am signing today will help Californians access the behavioral health services they need to recover," said Governor Newsom. "Earlier this year, I pledged to put these critical services within reach of more Californians, through reforming our Mental Health Services Act and laws that allow loved ones and service providers to ask courts to compel those who need treatment into community-based outpatient care. Today, we do just that."

In his 2020 State of the State address, Governor Newsom directly called for reforms to behavioral health laws that were ahead of their time when originally implemented decades ago, but now require improvements. Specifically, the Governor stated his support for removing conditions imposed on counties trying to implement Laura's Law. AB 1976 by Assemblymember Susan Talamantes Eggman (D-Stockton), which Governor Newsom signed today, accomplishes this by

expanding county use of court-ordered outpatient treatment.

'The Assisted Outpatient Treatment demonstration project started by Laura's Law has shown for many years that we have the tools to provide effective, community-based mental health treatment to those with the greatest need. As a social worker I've long fought for the extension of these critical services, and expanding this program and finally making it permanent will ensure greater care for the people of California," said Assemblymember Eggman.

In his State of the State address, the Governor said Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) funds should be used for substance abuse treatment and not just mental health care. The Governor today signed AB 2265 by Assemblymember Sharon Quirk-Silva (D-Fullerton), which clarifies that specified MHSA funds can be used for treatment of co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders. Counties will now be able to use MHSA funds to assess and treat individuals with a co-occurring disorder, increasing access to substance use disorder treatment, improving care coordination and leading to a more integrated behavioral health

"The effects and uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, economic loss, and devastating wildfires, have brought upon a crisis of stress, depression, and anxiety to Californians. Today Governor Newsom took an important step forward by signing AB 2265, which will provide much needed clarity to existing statute in order for counties to treat those who are experiencing mental health issues in addition to substance use or alcohol

disorders," said Assemblymember Quirk-Silva.

Bills in this package will also divert, when appropriate, individuals in crisis at emergency rooms to sobering centers and mental health facilities and encourage the creation of a state office to identify and address causes of suicide.

SB 803 by Senator Jim Beall (D-San Jose) supports statewide standards for behavioral health Peer Support Specialists and adds these services as an option in Medi-Cal. Peer Support Specialists are people with lived experience with mental health and/or substance use disorders and are in a unique position to earn trust and build bridges for people on the path to recovery. Statewide standards will ensure consistency and quality of service while offering a level of validity and respect to the position, while satisfying a federal requirement to allow Medi-Cal

"Peer support services are evidence-based, and a cost-effective model of care proven to reduce cost and increase participation in treatment. Forty-eight other states have seen the benefit and value of peer support services; now it is time for California to catch up and establish a peer support specialist certification process," said Senator Beall.

In addition, the Governor signed SB 855 by Senator Scott Wiener (D-San Francisco), a long-sought reform that strengthens California's mental health parity statute by requiring commercial health plans and insurers to provide full coverage for the treatment of all mental health conditions and substance use disorders and establishes specific standards for what constitutes medically necessary

treatment and criteria for the use of clinical guidelines.

"Mental healthcare is essential to a person's overall health, and today, we reaffirmed that people must have access to care for mental health and addiction challenges. California's mental health parity law has huge loopholes — which the insurance industry has used to deny critically important care — and today that loophole was closed. SB 855 sends a powerful message to the nation that California prioritizes the mental health of its residents. I'm proud of my colleagues and the Governor for getting it and enacting this legislation into law," said Senator Wiener.

This legislation builds on Governor Newsom's efforts to improve the state's behavioral health delivery system and help better serve individuals experiencing mental illness. In January, the Governor formed a Behavioral Health Task Force to address the urgent mental health and substance use disorder needs across California. Additionally, the 2020-2021 state budget approved strategies to strengthen enforcement of behavioral health parity laws including focused investigations of commercial health plans regulated by the Department of Managed Health Care to further evaluate plan compliance with parity and assess whether enrollees have consistent access to medically necessary behavioral health care services. In his State of the State address earlier this year, Governor Newsom said Mental Health Services Act funds should be used for substance abuse treatment and not just mental health care.

# Early morning fire claims two lives

A mother and her teenage son died Saturday, September 26 in an early morning house fire in a residential area on Serra Place in Fremont south of Mowry Avenue. The Alameda County Sheriff's Office Coroner's Bureau confirmed the identity of the two victims as Feda Almaliti, 43, and her son Muhammed Almaliti, 15.

Officials from the Fremont Fire Department (FFD) said the cause of the 1:44 a.m. blaze is under investigation, but it may have started near the downstairs kitchen area. Firefighters arrived within

minutes to find the two-story residence with heavy smoke billowing out of the front door and fire showing from the rear of the property.

Prior to the arrival of firefighters, two adult females and one teenage female exited the residence. Realizing a teenage male remained inside of the house, one of the adults, later determined to be Feda Almaliti, re-entered the residence in an attempt to rescue him as flames and heavy smoke rapidly advanced from the first floor to the second floor.

Crews began an aggressive interior attack with simultaneous search and rescue efforts due to confirmed reports two people were still inside the residence. During the primary search of the home, firefighters located Feda and her son together on the second floor in a rear bedroom. Both sustained life-threatening injuries and were rescued by firefighters and taken to a nearby hospital. Despite persistent lifesaving efforts by Fremont Fire and Falck paramedics, both died.

"We are deeply saddened by this devastating incident and send our condolences to the family and friends of the Almaliti family. "This is a tragic and heartbreaking incident. Feda Almaliti courageously risked her life to save her son's," Fremont Fire Chief Curtis Jacobson said. "Her actions were selfless and valiant."

The one-alarm fire was fully contained to the building and extinguished within 25 minutes of firefighters arriving at the scene. One firefighter sustained non-life-threatening injuries and was taken to the hospital for medical evaluation and released shortly thereafter. The adult female and teenage female who exited the residence prior to the arrival of firefighters were also taken to a hospital for non-life-threatening injuries.

FFD officials said these were the first fire related deaths in Fremont since 2010.

# Residents eligible for federal aid due to SCU Fire damage

On September 29, Santa Clara County joined eight other counties in California included in a Presidential Major Disaster Declaration, opening the door to federal aid for cattle ranchers and residents who have lost an estimated \$26 million in the SCU Fire.

A Presidential Major Disaster Declaration helps people in the impacted counties through eligibility for support, including individual financial support and reimbursements, crisis counseling, housing and unemployment assistance and legal services. It also provides federal assistance to help state, tribal, and local governments fund emergency response, recovery, and protective measures. FEMA can also provide psychological counseling and resources to thousands of residents who were impacted by evacuation orders.

"I am relieved that Santa Clara County residents will have access to federal funding to help them recover from this disaster," said Supervisor David Cortese. "Although the SCU Fire area was not as populated as other fire areas, the damage is devastating to cattle ranchers who have lost grazing land, their homes, and livelihoods."



The result is tens of millions of dollars of unspent ratepayer monies going into reserve accounts that are then invested into the stock market. We need to stop this! I'm committed to revamping ACWD's engineering department, and I support outside contract engineering design efforts to help speed up projects, like seismic main renewals needed on our 900-mile aging pipeline system.

I advocate ACWD purchase this property as the singular owner. N3 Ranch can be purchased with 30-year bonds at historically low interest rates, and where ACWD has the capability to pay the annual debt service with non-water revenues (mostly property tax revenues received from the county). This is a win-win for everyone: No water bills are affected; shared equity over generations to make this investment; open space for public enjoyment: and watershed protection for hundreds of years to come. The last thing we need is for this land to be developed into another Beverly Hills of Silicon



# Organization promotes student mental health

Fremont Mental Health Organization (FMHO) was founded in 2018 to provide mental health resources to students and citizens of the community. Neha Gondra, a student at Mission San Jose High School, attends a highly competitive high school where mental health isn't really talked about or addressed. To combat these issues, she created FMHO and has built up the organization since its founding. Gondra said, "After seeing many of my peers and members of the community succumb to mental illness, I knew that I needed to take initiative to help those that need resources the most."

Since 2018, Gondra has been able to build up a team of six officers to help organize events and run day-to-day operations. Initially, the organization faced many different issues including gaining traction, establishing a larger member base, and reaching out to people in the community. Mental health discussion has a lot of stigma, and it was difficult for Gondra to publicize to the right audience. However, the once-small organization has managed to rise above and see larger overall turnout and growth.

FMHO organized a mental health awareness panel and presentation in 2018, partnering with local school counselor Wendi Bennett from Irvington High School. Since then, they've



also held a stress workshop featuring Dr. Chien Shien Yang, a board-certified Bay Area physician. Fremont Mental Health Org's latest project is a care package event at local parks in the Fremont area. Volunteers were able to donate self-care items, such as masks or toiletries, to give back to the community and help homeless populations. FMHO has also partnered with Fremont Youth and Family Services, and Mission San Jose High School's Counseling Department.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, FMHO reached out to impacted members of the community and created an informative podcast and blog to discuss mental health issues surrounding shelter in place. After the shift to distance learning, FMHO also partnered with Mission San Jose High School's counseling department to discuss how to deal with stress from the transition to online learning. In addition, on September 14, volunteers delivered over 50 care packages with Second Chance Newark, a non-profit that provides emergency shelters for families. "In response to COVID-19, our organization wanted to help the homeless and needy population that were struggling from the negative effects of the pandemic.

We led community efforts to pool food, hygiene, and Personal Protective Equipment resources," said Gondra.

As for the future, Fremont Mental Health Org intends to become a 501(c)(3) established non-profit, host more events, and gain more members, both adults and teens. They look forward to holding more community-based events and expanding past the Tri-City Area to help those facing mental health issues outside the Bay. Fremont Mental Health Organization has not only helped students across Fremont with mental health, but developing healthy habits to help their peers as well.
