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Signs of a Stroke? Be Fast: Call 911!

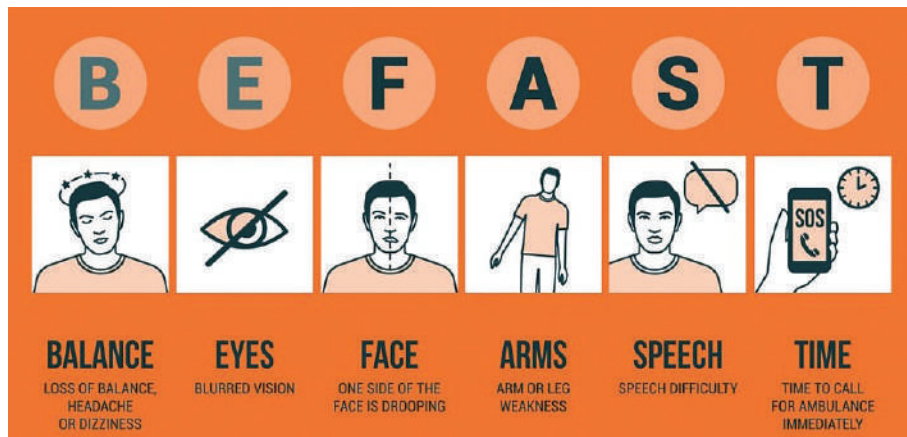
May is National Stroke Awareness Month

National Stroke Awareness Month is a good time to learn the symptoms of a stroke because calling 911 and getting fast treatment at the first signs of stroke can prevent brain damage or death. Stroke awareness takes on a whole new importance now, one year into the COVID-19 crisis. Two stroke experts offered sound advice for all adults on how to manage risk factors and mitigate the threat of stroke during the pandemic.

“We are currently seeing patients with stroke risk factors including high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and diabetes who became more sedentary during the pandemic and have avoided going to their doctor for fear of COVID-19,” said Prabhjot S. Khalsa, MD, neurologist and Washington Hospital Stroke Program medical co-director. “I encourage people with underlying stroke risk factors to visit their primary care physician to closely monitor and treat their blood pressure, diabetes, high cholesterol, and other conditions.”

Strokes, also called “brain attacks,” happen when blood flow to part of the brain is cut off due to blocked arteries or when a blood vessel bursts causing bleeding in the brain. Stroke is a leading cause of death in the U.S. and the major cause of serious long-term disability. Awareness is so important because the majority of strokes are preventable with lifestyle changes and when addressed quickly, most are treatable.

An effective way to familiarize yourself with the signs of stroke is with the acronym, BE FAST. This guideline is a reminder that



timely treatment, and more specifically calling 911, is the key to saving someone's life or reducing their disabilities from stroke.

BE FAST stands for:

Balance – Is the person experiencing a sudden loss of balance or coordination?

Eyes – Is the person having a sudden change in vision or trouble seeing?

Face – Ask the person to smile.
Does one side of the face droop?

Arms – Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

Speech – Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Is their speech slurred or strange?

Time – If you observe any of these signs, call 911 immediately.

“During the pandemic, people experiencing stroke symptoms may have been reluctant to come to the Hospital out of concern they would be isolated from

family and friends while visitation was restricted, but that is resolving now and one visitor is again being allowed,” pointed out Stroke Program medical co-director Jack Rose, MD, who is board-certified in neurocritical care. “Actually, communications between patients, clinicians and family members are enhanced now that iPads and teleconferencing have become the new normal for patients admitted to the Hospital.”

Washington Hospital is a certified Primary Stroke Center and the designated receiving center for strokes in Southern Alameda County. This means stroke patients receive the most current, high-quality care from the moment emergency medical services (EMS) responds through when they leave the Hospital and begin the recovery process. When EMS is en route to Washington Hospital with a stroke patient, they send in a 'Code Neuro' alert which sets in motion a multifunctional expert stroke response team ready to assess,

test, diagnose and treat that patient upon arrival.

Dr. Rose added, “We are as prepared and well-equipped as ever to receive patients with all levels of stroke. Members of our extensive stroke team are vaccinated and it is safe to come to the Hospital for doctor visits or emergent care.”

Both Drs. Khalsa and Rose strongly recommend all community members, aged 16 and up get vaccinated against the virus. “COVID-19 can lead to stroke, heart and kidney disease and other devastating conditions. The vaccines are safe and effective for healthy individuals as well as those with underlying conditions,” noted Dr. Khalsa.

As a Primary Stroke Center, Washington Hospital strives to educate the public through quarterly seminars and helps recovering stroke patients in monthly support groups. The next events include a free two-part Stroke Education Series that all community members are encouraged to attend. Part one: Stroke Prevention is being held on Tuesday, May 18, from 10 a.m. until noon. Part two: Life After A Stroke will be held Tuesday, May 25, from 10 a.m. until noon. These events will be held in the clinic conference room at the Washington Township Medical Foundation Danielson Clinic, 6236 Thornton Ave., Newark.

Walnuts are a type of tree nut that cause allergic reactions in some people.

Did you know just eight foods are responsible for 90% of all food allergies in this country? They include peanuts, eggs, milk, wheat, tree nuts, soy, fish and crustacean shellfish. In fact, these eight ingredients have special labeling requirements under the Food Allergen Labeling and Consumer Protection Act of 2004 because they pose such a serious risk to some people. This is Food Allergy Awareness Week (May 9-15), a good time to talk about food allergies and their impact on people’s lives.

A food allergy is a medical condition wherein exposure to a particular food triggers a harmful immune response. This response, or allergic reaction, happens because the immune system attacks proteins in the food even though they are harmless, explained Lorie Roffelsen, a registered dietitian at Washington Hospital. More than 32 million people in the U.S. have a serious and potentially life-threatening food allergy, according to Food Allergy Research and Education (FARE).

Symptoms of an allergic reaction can be mild such as an itchy mouth or hives, to more severe like throat tightening or difficulty breathing. Roffelsen said the most serious reaction is anaphylaxis,

which can occur within seconds of eating something you’re allergic to. Your immune system releases a flood of chemicals that cause your blood pressure to drop suddenly and your airways to narrow, blocking breathing. Anaphylaxis requires an injection of epinephrine and if it isn’t treated right away, it can be fatal.

While those eight food items cause the most serious problems when it comes to food allergies, FARE reports that more than 170 foods have been known to cause allergic reactions.

It Can Happen at Any Age

“We don’t know what causes food allergies, but you can develop one at any age—even if you never had any problems eating that food before,” Roffelsen added. “Sometimes kids outgrow their allergic reaction to milk and eggs, but they are less likely to outgrow an allergy to peanuts and tree nuts.”

She said peanut allergies have become much more common in children, with many schools banning foods containing peanuts and tree nuts in school lunches. But now there are new guidelines set by the National Institute for Allergy and Infectious Disease for preventing peanut allergies from developing in kids.

“These new guidelines offer a step-by-step approach for safely introducing peanuts to high-risk infants at 4 to 6 months of age,” Roffelsen said. “This is a paradigm shift.” Discussions with your child’s pediatrician can help determine if they are at high risk for developing a peanut allergy.

Part of Roffelsen’s job is to make sure patients at Washington Hospital are protected from food allergies. Patients are asked if they are allergic to any foods when they are admitted to the Hospital.

She said nearly every food item in the Hospital kitchen has been reviewed for ingredients and coded in a sophisticated computer system, so that food allergens can be tracked. Menus are created for each patient taking into account their specific dietary needs, including any food allergies.

Allergy or Intolerance?

“We also do a lot of educating and talking to patients about their food allergies so we can understand exactly what they are experiencing when they eat certain foods,” Roffelsen added. “For example, if a patient tells us milk causes diarrhea, but eating cheese does not, that’s not a milk allergy. That’s lactose intolerance, which is different. The goal is to provide a safe food

tray, and to give patients as many food options as possible. An allergy takes a lot of things off the menu, but a food intolerance might not.”

It’s very common for people to think they have a food allergy when really it’s something else. If you have a true food allergy, no amount of that food is safe to eat. “You have to completely avoid that food because repeated exposure can make the allergy worse,” Roffelsen explained. “The immune response may become more and more severe with each exposure.”

She encourages anyone who thinks they have a food allergy to see a board-certified allergist to determine if they really are allergic to certain foods or if they have a food intolerance.

“You may find you don’t need to eliminate that food completely,” she added. “But if you do have a food allergy, it could be serious.”

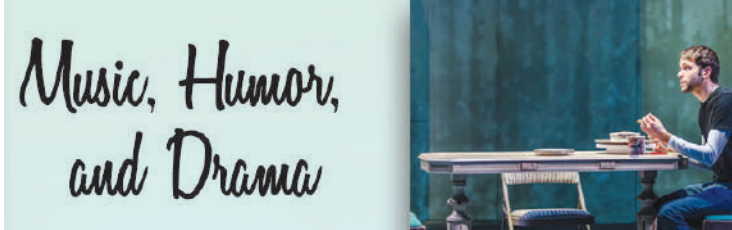

A virtual celebration of music, humor, and drama is on tap Friday, May 14 and Saturday, May 15 when Ohlone College's Department of Theatre and Dance holds its seventh annual Playwrights Festival.

The festival premieres thought-provoking, humorous, and entertaining 10-minute plays and musicals written by professional and emerging playwrights and composers around the country. Some of the themes explored in this year's plays deal with attraction, friendship, family, creativity, self-awareness, change, greed, the environment, guilt, racism, and accountability.

"We started this festival to promote and cultivate new plays that will engage and speak directly to a younger audience. It's great to see a



strong interest in this endeavor," said Producing Director Michael Navarra, of the festival and an Ohlone College faculty member. "It's an exciting production and sells out each year receiving rave reviews."

Many of the playwrights and composers have been published and have had their work produced Off Broadway and at regional theatres, such as Berkeley Repertory Theatre, San Francisco Playhouse, San Diego Repertory Theatre, Marin Theatre Company, La Mama, Geva Theatre Center, Ensemble Studio Theatre, Manhattan Theatre Source, The Flea Theater, Actors Theatre of Louisville, The Eugene O'Neill Theatre Center, and Metropolitan Playhouse.

This year's festival will include two Ohlone student playwrights and composers, David Kautz and Manase Misa, who are also directing and acting in the company. Student Repertory Theatre Company, a class of student directors, producers, actors, and designers at Ohlone, is producing the Ohlone Playwrights Festival, which is being shown online due to COVID-19 regulations.

The festival was inspired by the need to create original material to engage college students and audiences and to reconnect this demographic with live theatre. Playwrights Festival asks playwrights to write directly for the student actors and directors in the class. They are sent videos of their actors being interviewed by the directors, along with several themes the students were interested in. Playwrights then had a month to write their plays with these student actors and themes in mind.

Libraries are thrilled to welcome back visitors



In-person learning programs have also moved to virtual meetings. A County Reads program was held, along with speaker series, storytimes, reading clubs, homework centers, online readathons, and discussion groups. eBooks and other electronic subscription services were also increased. For community members who lack access to electronic devices, additional lending opportunities were created. “We partnered with schools to get devices into the hands of students,” Addleman explains. “The Tech Lending library was a huge impact for students most in need. Because distance learning requires computers full-time, we allowed these items to be checked out for the entire school year.” These adaptations have granted libraries the ability to continue serving the community.

The most consequential change still to come is gradually reopening libraries. Visitors can now enter libraries and spend a limited amount of time indoors, with limited occupancy and hours. Masks must also be worn at all times by anyone over the age of two, and social distancing will be maintained per COVID-19 public health guidance. In the Alameda County system, Albany, Castro Valley, Centerville, Dublin, Fremont, San Lorenzo, and Union City Libraries started participating in a hybrid reopening model as early as March 22. Milpitas instituted limited opening as well. Exceptions include Newark Library due to construction, as well as Irvington and Niles Library due to limited space. In Hayward, the Downtown branch is welcoming walk-in visitors as of May 3. “Visitors can browse shelves, use computers, print, check out books, and ask reference questions. We will have two-hour walk-in sessions. Computer

use is limited to one hour,” Addleman states. Though services are limited, libraries are carefully working towards full reopening and higher occupancy.

Gradual library re-opening assesses not only the safety and comfort of the community but space adjustment and repurposing. Due to the initial in-person closure, additional materials have had to be stored inside and therefore decreased the amount of space usable by the public. In-person programs and community meeting spaces are still inaccessible until further notice. “Meeting spaces sometimes work as double duty space for extra materials or staging pickup services. Staff may have to continue working in the study rooms. In the meantime, we are looking into possible outdoor activities as summer comes, ensuring they are safe, functional, and accessible,” Gomberg states.

Patience and prioritizing the welfare of the community have been key to the remarkable leadership and flexibility of library staff. Community members reentering the library after a year has been fulfilling for librarians to witness. “When people first walk in, we can see their smiles even under their masks. It feels like a weight has been lifted and we have received many words of appreciation. We recognize this has been a transitional time and are always focused on how to serve more community members,” Gomberg says. Libraries are thrilled to welcome back visitors and remain dedicated to providing necessary services to those in need.

The initial lockdown and subsequent social distancing were jarring for both the community and library staff. Hayward Director of Library Services Jayanti Addleman states, “The beginning was certainly a shock. Typically, when a disaster happens, our first goal is to get the materials into the hands of the public. However, with the pandemic, it was the opposite with an unfortunate panic that the books might be carriers of the virus.” Regardless of these circumstances, library staff knew what patrons wanted and immediately began planning to make

books can do so with contactless pickup. Borrowers can search and select books on the library’s website, place a hold, and pick them up when available with no in-person contact necessary. Alternatively, eBooks are also available for those who wish to read from the safety of their homes. A book bundle service, which includes additional items selected by a librarian based on the reader’s genre interest and age, has been used at both the Alameda County and Hayward Libraries. Alameda County Library Division Director Ben Gomberg explains, “Because people could not browse



materials available safely. This required transitioning in-person services to focus on online accessibility for checking out books and learning programs.

The process of borrowing books has undergone considerable but straightforward alteration. Those who wish to check out

books, we thought of a way to replace that serendipitous feeling of discovering new titles. With the book bundle service, we have reached the point of packing 100 bundles daily, and we have given a total of over 30,000. People love being surprised and we love giving our librarians that opportunity to be creative.”



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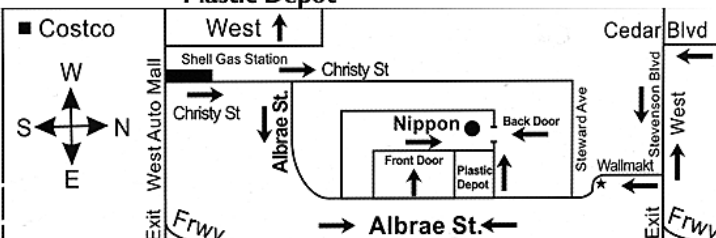
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Honoring Graduates

California trucks salmon to Pacific; low river levels blamed

California officials will again truck millions of young salmon raised at fish hatcheries in the state's Central Valley agricultural region to the Pacific Ocean because projected river conditions show that the waterways the fish use to travel downstream will be historically low and warm due to increasing drought.

Officials announced the massive trucking operation on Wednesday, saying the effort is aimed at ensuring "the highest level of survival for the young salmon on their hazardous journey to the Pacific Ocean."

"rucking young salmon to downstream release sites has proven to be one of the best ways to increase survival to the ocean during dry conditions," Jason Julianne, North Central Region Hatchery Supervisor said in a statement.

California is now in its second year of drought after a winter with little precipitation and it's the state's fourth-driest year on record, especially in the northern two-thirds of the state, according to the California Department of Water Resources.

Illustrating the state's risk of drought, record low reservoir levels led Gov. Gavin Newsom last week to proclaim a regional drought emergency for the Russian River watershed in Sonoma and Mendocino counties.

More than 16.8 million young salmon from four Central Valley hatcheries will be trucked to coastal

sites around the San Pablo, San Francisco, Half Moon and Monterey bays.

Getting the fish transported means taking about 146 truckloads to the Pacific Ocean from four state hatcheries and federal officials will do the same from one hatchery, the San Francisco Chronicle reported.

California's iconic native Chinook Salmon need cold water to survive but dams have blocked their historic retreats to the chilly upper reaches of Northern California's Sacramento River tributaries.

The fishing industry and Central Valley farmers are in a constant struggle over the same river water to sustain their livelihoods, with fish supporters lobbying for higher river water levels and farmers against it so that so they can draw water to irrigate crops.

John McManus, president of the Golden State Salmon Association, which advocates for fishers, told the Chronicle he appreciates the extra effort to save the fall-run chinook amid the drought.

But he said the underlying problem for salmon is that state and federal water officials have allowed too much water to be pulled from rivers and creeks for agricultural irrigation.

"These river conditions are made worse by decisions that put salmon last," he told the San Francisco Chronicle.

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76,000 California inmates now eligible for earlier releases

California is giving 76,000 inmates, including violent and repeat felons, the opportunity to leave prison earlier as the state aims to further trim the population of what once was the nation's largest state correctional system.

More than 63,000 inmates convicted of violent crimes will be eligible for good behavior credits that shorten their sentences by one-third instead of the one-fifth that had been in place since 2017. That includes nearly 20,000 inmates who are serving life sentences with the possibility of parole.

The new rules take effect Saturday, but it will be months or years before any inmates go free earlier. Corrections officials say the goal is to reward inmates who better themselves while critics said the move will endanger the public.

Under the change, more than 10,000 prisoners convicted of a second serious but nonviolent offense under the state's "three strikes" law will be eligible for release after serving half their sentences. That is an increase from the current time-served credit of one-third of their sentence.

The same increased release time will apply to nearly 2,900 nonviolent third strikers, the corrections department projected.

Also as of Saturday, all minimum-security inmates in work camps, including those in firefighting camps, will be eligible for the same month of earlier release for every month they spend in the camp, regardless of the severity of their crime.

The changes were approved this week by the state Office of Administrative Law.

"The goal is to increase incentives for the incarcerated population to practice good behavior and follow the rules while serving their time, and participate in rehabilitative and educational programs, which will lead to safer prisons," department spokeswoman Dana Simas said in a statement.

"Additionally, these changes would help to reduce the prison population by allowing incarcerated persons to earn their way home sooner," she said.

Simas provided the emergency regulations and estimates of how many inmates they will affect at the request of The Associated Press.

Simas said the department was granted authority to make the changes through the rulemaking process and under the current budget. By making them "emergency regulations" the agency could impose the new rules without public comment.

The department now must submit permanent regulations next year. They will be considered a

public hearing and opportunity for public comment.

Kent Scheidegger, legal director of the Criminal Justice Legal Foundation that represents crime victims, said the notion that the credits are for good behavior is a misnomer.

"You don't have to be good to get good time credits. People who lose good time credits for misconduct get them back, they don't stay gone," he said. "They could be a useful device for managing the population if they had more teeth in them. But they don't. They are in reality just a giveaway."

Republican state Sen. Jim Nielsen, who once headed the state parole board, criticized Gov. Gavin Newsom's administration for unilaterally deciding to make the changes.

"He's doing it on his own authority, instead of the will of the people through their elected representatives or directly through their own votes," Nielsen said. "This is what I call Newsom's time off for bad behavior. He's putting us all at greater risk and there seems to be no end to the degree to which he wants to do that."

California has been under court orders to reduce a prison population that peaked at 160,000 in 2006 and saw inmates being housed in gymnasiums and activity rooms. In 2011, the U.S. Supreme Court backed federal judges' requirement that the state reduce overcrowding.

The population has been declining since the high court's decision, starting when the state began keeping lower-level felons in county jails instead of state prisons. In 2014, voters reduced penalties for property and drug crimes. Two years later, voters approved allowing earlier parole for most inmates.

Before the pandemic hit, the population had dropped to 117,00 inmates. In the last year, 21,000 more have left state prisons – with about half being held temporarily in county jails.

Meantime, officials announced in mid-April that they will close a second prison as a result of the dwindling population, fulfilling a promise made by Newsom. California Correctional Center in Susanville will close by July 2022. Officials announced last fall that Deuel Vocational Institution in Tracy, east of San Francisco, will close by this October.

Many Democratic lawmakers and advocacy groups have been calling for further releases or shorter sentences. Californians United for a Responsible Budget, for instance, earlier in April said the state should shutter at least 10 more of its 35 prisons.

SpaceX launches, lands Starship in 1st successful flight

SpaceX launched and successfully landed its futuristic Starship on Wednesday, finally nailing a test flight of the rocketship that Elon Musk intends to use to land astronauts on the moon and send people to Mars.

The previous four tests flights ended in fiery explosions before, during or soon after touchdown at the southeastern tip of Texas, near Brownsville.

This latest upgraded version of SpaceX's full-scale, stainless steel, bullet-shaped rocketship soared more than 6 miles (10 kilometers) over the Gulf of Mexico before flipping and descending horizontally, and then going vertical again just in time for touchdown.

"Starbase Flight Control has confirmed, as you can see on the live video, we are down. The Starship has landed!" announced launch commentator John Insprucker.

A fire at the base of the 160-foot (50-meter) rocket quickly was extinguished, and the rocket remained standing after the six-minute flight. Musk tweeted the landing was "nominal" – by the book, in other words.

Success came on the 60th anniversary of the flight of first American in space, Alan Shepard. And it capped a stunning two weeks of achievements for

SpaceX: the launch of four more astronauts to the space station for NASA, the nation's first nighttime crew splashdown since the Apollo moonshots, and a pair of launches for its mini internet satellites.

Less than a month ago, NASA chose SpaceX's Starship to deliver astronauts to the lunar surface in the next few years. The \$3 billion contract was halted last week, however, after the losing companies – Jeff Bezos' Blue Origin and Dynetics – protested the selection.

Musk said last month that the NASA money will help development of Starship, which is meant to eventually launch atop a Super Heavy booster. He said it has been a "pretty expensive" project so far and mostly funded internally. The first high-altitude test was in December.

"As you can tell, if you have been watching the videos, we have blown up a few of them. So, excitement guaranteed, one way or another," Musk told reporters after the private company's second crew flight on April 23.

Long after Wednesday's touchdown, Starship was still standing tall.

Fuchsia Fancies

I am a fuchsia addict. I have told myself a bazillion times not to buy any more fuchsias. My narrow yard is overfull. Regardless, I have just ordered three more fuchsias. One is short and bushy; one has yellowish leaves; and the other one, a Regia, is supposed to be a vine-like scramble. Just the thought is exciting. There are thousands of fuchsia varieties - some with teeny flowers, such as thymifolia; some with double ruffled flowers, like ballerinas with exotic tutus. Colors galore: pink, purple, red, lavender, white, combinations.

Fuchsias got their moniker from botanist Dr. Leonhard Fuchs. They are mostly from

Central and South America, coming to Britain in the 1700s. The original exotic import, Magellanica, was divided via multiple cuttings. By 1840, courtesy of hybridization, fuchsias grew everywhere including homes where people left openings in their decorative exterior fuchsia collection for window placement.

Just a few years ago, fuchsias began having a bad reputation because of something called gall mite. These almost invisible insects sucked the plants’ life-giving sap, causing distorted leaves. Nothing would get rid of them. But the hybridizers got to work. Nowadays most fuchsias are “gall mite resistant.” Some are labeled this way, and I usually check it out.

You can try growing fuchsias indoors, although I have not succeeded at this. They do need

ample light and cannot be bombarded with house heat. However, it is worth a try. Many fuchsias do splendidly in hanging baskets. I have not succeeded at this either, as hanging baskets dry out quickly, and I forget to water. Fuchsias do need moisture.

In the past, I used to just dig a nice biggish hole in the ground, add a batch of commercial potting soil, water - and anticipate. However, since I am always moving stuff around, I now put my fuchsias in large cheap pots (about \$20) with drainage holes. Sometimes more sun in another area can be beneficial. For example, I recently moved a fuchsia from a semi-shady area to a semi-sunny one, and within a month, it expanded to almost five feet high. Yes, despite publicity, fuchsias do need some sun in our area. You must

water to keep soil slightly moist (do not drown), and occasionally add fertilizer.

As a note, the American Fuchsia Society recommends about a week’s wait when you bring a fuchsia home, so it gets used to your garden ambiance. If you like a fuchsia in someone’s garden, ask if you can have a piece. When home, keep the stem, take off lower leaves, leaving nodes or bumps, and immerse in a semi-sun pot of potting soil where you will remember to water.

Hummingbirds visit my fuchsias most of the day. I have also read that fuchsias provide fairies with a favorite hiding place and... fuchsias are so pretty.

What more can anybody want in post-COVID springtime?

CDC sets rules for trial cruises with volunteer passengers

Cruise lines can soon begin trial voyages in U.S. waters with volunteer passengers helping test whether the ships can sail safely during a pandemic. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention gave ship operators final technical guidelines Wednesday for the trial runs. The CDC action is a step toward resuming cruises in U.S. waters, possibly by July, for the first time since March 2020.

A spokeswoman for the cruise industry’s tour group said the group was reviewing the CDC instructions.

Each practice cruise – they will run two to seven days – must have enough passengers to meet at least 10% of the ship’s capacity. Volunteers must be 18 or older and either fully vaccinated or free of medical conditions that would put them at high risk for severe COVID-19.

The ship operator must tell passengers that they are simulating untested safety measures “and that sailing during a pandemic is an inherently risky activity,” the CDC guidelines state.

Passengers must be examined for COVID-19 symptoms before and after the trip, and at least 75% must be tested at the end.

Restrictions on board will include face masks and social distancing. The CDC will allow guided shore excursions – no wandering about on their own – if tour operators follow certain standards.

Ships must make at least one practice run before resuming regular cruises in U.S. waters, although operators will be able to avoid the requirement if they vouch that 98% of crew and 95% of passengers are vaccinated.

Google says 20% of workers will be remote, many more hybrid

Google says it expects about 20% of its workforce to still work remotely after its offices reopen this fall, while some 60% will work a hybrid schedule that includes about three days in the office and two days “wherever they work best.”

The remaining 20% can change their location to a different Google office. The policy announced Wednesday relaxes the company’s stricter earlier stance.

“The future of work is flexibility,” CEO Sundar Pichai wrote in an email to employees that was also posted on Google’s website. “The changes above are a starting point to help us do our very best work and have fun doing it.”

Most of Google’s 135,000 employees can continue to work from home through September of this year.

For up to 20 days per year, Google employees will also be able to work from any location other than their main office. That is up from a previous allotment of 10 days.

The company based in Mountain View, California, will also continue offering extra “reset” days – days off to help cope with the pandemic.

Google was among the first major technology companies last year to tell its employees to work from home at the onset of the pandemic. Other tech giants, such as Facebook and Twitter, have announced that people can work from home permanently after the pandemic if their jobs allow for it.

Bid to end 'spousal rape' distinction stalls in California

Efforts to end what California lawmakers call an archaic distinction between spousal rape and other forms of sexual assault appear to have stalled for the year.

The two measures would have ended the spousal rape exception in the state’s criminal code, meaning that the rape of a spouse would be treated and punished the same as the rape of a non-spouse.

California is one of 11 states that distinguish between spousal rape and other forms of sexual assault.

Neither bill received a committee hearing before last week’s deadline.

Sen. Dave Cortese pulled his legislation because the Senate Public Safety Committee proposed amendments that advocates felt would contradict its intent. He turned his measure into a two-year bill, saying he and supporters will work on the language before moving forward next year.

His fellow Democrats, Assembly members Cristina Garcia and Evan Low, objected Monday to their version of the bill not getting a hearing in that chamber’s public safety committee.

They called for a hearing even though the deadline has passed. They were backed by California NOW, a gender equity organization, and four progressive district attorneys, including those in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

“Not providing AB 812 a hearing directly contradicts the urgency to modernize our penal code to be line with our values and make clear that no means no,” Garcia said in a statement. “Current spousal rape statutes say that in California, a marriage license allows a spouse to violate both the body and the dignity of a non-consenting spouse with minimal accountability.”

The committee’s chairman, Assemblyman Reggie Jones-Sawyer, also a Democrat, did not respond to a request for comment.

San Leandro names new City Manager

one of the busiest times in my public sector career. However, I'm thankful to be entrusted with this permanent role so that I can continue to support Mayor Cutter and the City Council in the various projects and challenges they will address in 2021 and into the future."

Google gets into sleep surveillance with new Nest Hub screen

Google's next internet-connected home device will test whether consumers trust the company enough to let it snoop on their sleep.

New sleep-sensing technology will be a key feature on Google's latest version of its Nest Hub, a 7-inch smart screen unveiled Tuesday. Like the previous generation, the \$100 Nest Hub can display pictures and video in addition to fielding questions and handling household tasks through Google's voice-activated assistant. It also doesn't feature a camera.

But the latest Nest Hub's new trick may help differentiate it from similar devices, such as Amazon's Echo Show, while also providing a springboard for Google to get more involved in helping people manage their health.

If you allow it, the device will also monitor your sleeping patterns from your bedside, negating the need to wear a fitness device or any other potentially bothersome gadget in bed. The feature, which Google intends to offer for free through at least this year, relies on a new chip Google calls Soli, which uses radar to detect motion, including the depth of a person's breathing.

The Nest Hub is supposed to generate weekly sleep reports with easy-to-understand breakdowns on the length and quality of sleep, how frequently the user gets up at night and snoring and coughing frequency, along with tips developed in consultation with the American Academy of Sleep Medicine.

Google says it honed the technology by studying 15,000 sleeping people over a combined 110,000 nights.

That kind of help may sound appealing to the millions of people who have trouble sleeping. But the feature may also raise privacy concerns – especially

given Google's long history of online surveillance to collect personal details such as interests, habits and whereabouts to help sell the digital ads that generate most of its revenue.

It also underscores Google's obvious intent to extend its tentacles into new areas of people's lives in its relentless quest to make more money, said Jeff Chester, executive director of the Center for Digital Democracy, a consumer and privacy rights group.

"Google's goal is to monetize every cell of your body," Chester said.

The sleep sensing feature will remain free through the rest of this year, but Google could eventually sell it as a subscription service, acknowledged Ashton Udall, Google Nest's senior product manager.

The company may also eventually tweak the feature to work with its FitBit line of fitness devices, which Google took over in January. That \$2.1 billion purchase has raised concerns that Google could use those gadgets to peer more deeply into people's personal health.

Google is emphasizing the privacy protections built into the sleep sensing feature. For starters, users will have to turn it on themselves. The Nest Hub will also have controls that Google says will make it clear when sleep tracking is on and to make it easy to delete data from the device.

All audio will be kept on the device, meaning it won't be sent to Google's data centers, although other sleep information will be provided to generate the analysis and reports. None of the information collected through the sleep sensing feature will be used to sell ads, Udall said.

But Chester is skeptical about that pledge. Knowing an individual's sleeping patterns, for instance, could help Google know when a person is feeling anxious or sick, Chester said, and those insights could influence which ads to show.

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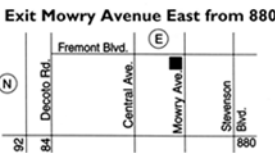

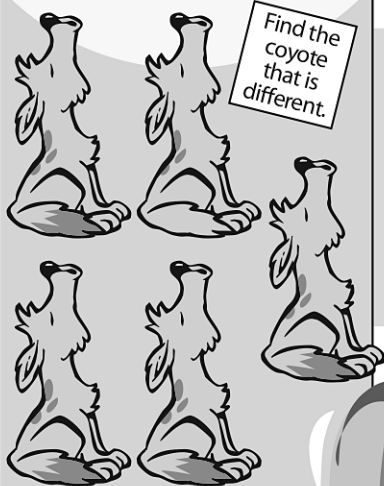

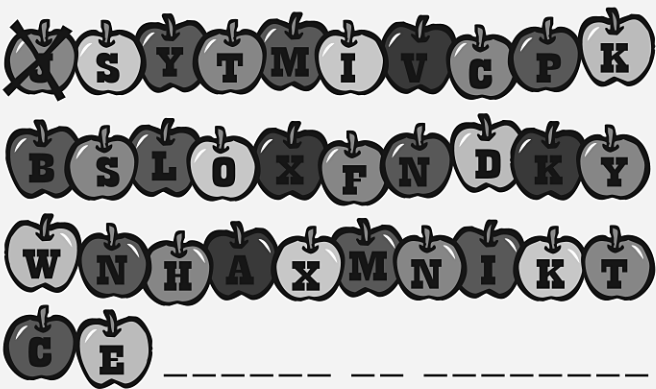

Fremont Housing Navigation Center Shares Successful Six-Month Update



The Fremont Housing Navigation Center (HNC) is proud to announce that in its first six months of operations, none of its participants have returned to homelessness. While operating under reduced capacity because of COVID-19, the HNC served 44 individuals in its first six months (21 of which have transitioned into permanent housing while the rest actively participate in the program). Of the 21 participants who have moved to other housing, eight have been reunited with family and 13 moved into independent or shared housing agreements.

Operated by Bay Area Community Services (BACS) and the City of Fremont, the HNC opened its doors on September 28, 2020 to 25 residents who stayed on average for four months. There have been no significant complaints, serious calls for police service, or visible blight because of the HNC to date.

In addition, BACS has developed new connections with 19 local landlords (12 of which are located in Fremont). The HNC has received monetary donations from the community totaling \$40,346 and many in-kind donations.

With vaccinations becoming more prevalent in the community and the decrease of COVID-19 cases, staff are hopeful that HNC occupancy will increase, possibly to full capacity of 45 residents, within the next six months. To read the HNC six-month report visit www.Fremont.gov/HNCReport.

New Online Residential Express Permits



Get your building permit online!
Residential Express Permits



Residential Express Permits are now available in Citizen Access, the City of Fremont's online permitting portal. Residential Express Permits are building permits for projects within single-family homes and multi-family residential buildings. The process for obtaining these types of permits can now be performed entirely online. If applicants submit all the required information in Citizen Access and pay the permit fees, their Residential Express Permit will be automatically issued. This new process saves time and money and reduces paper clutter. It's a win-win for the City and the community!

Residential Express Permits are available for the following projects:

- **Residential Electrical Upgrades:** This includes residential electrical upgrades including repair, replacement, or new installation of electrical panels, electrical fixtures, and receptacles.
- **Residential Furnace and Air Conditioning Replacement:** This includes residential furnace and air conditioning replacement, including repair and installation of furnaces/heaters, air conditioning units, and ducts.
- **Residential Plumbing:** This includes residential plumbing repairs and alterations, including the installation or repair of water heaters, gas lines, and water lines.
- **Residential Reroof:** This includes residential reroof projects.

To request a Residential Express Permit, please do the following:

- Log in to your Citizen Access account at www.Fremont.gov/CitizenAccess.
- Select "Building."
- Select "Create Application."
- Select "Building/Express."

- Select the type of permit you need.
- Complete the online application form, including uploading and submitting required documents.
- Pay the permit fees, when prompted.
- Retrieve the issued permit and building inspection job card from the "Documents" tab in the record (listed under "Record Info").

This summer, all remaining construction and development permit types will become available for submittal in Citizen Access. These include:

- **Building Permits:** Building; Fire; Solar; and Temporary Permits
- **Engineering Permits:** Encroachment; Grading; Small Cell; Subdivision; and Technical Peer Review
- **Planning Permits:** Homeless Shelter; Historic Evaluation; Home Occupation Permit; Master Sign Program; Preliminary Review Procedure; Project; Sidewalk Dining; and Transportation Demand Management (TDM)

Spice up your garden with curry plants

Plants that have similar characteristics to one another are often misnamed. A Sago Palm is not a palm; Swedish Ivy is neither Swedish nor a type of ivy; and the common houseplant Lucky Bamboo is not actually a bamboo. True curry plants were mistakenly named because westerners thought they were used to make curry powder. However, this mild error is no reason not to grow one at home. They make attractive house or garden plants, have beautiful white flowers, and have flavorful aromatic edible leaves.

Curry powder tends to play the dominant role in flavoring curry sauces in India, Thailand, and other Asian countries. Curry powders are made from a blend of different bold and delicate spices that often includes turmeric, which gives many their yellowish/orange color. Many of these curry dishes incorporate curry leaves as an essential ingredient to give a delicate aromatic background flavor.

Curry leaves grow on small and medium size bushes or a shrub-like tree. There is one main species of curry leaf plant that has three distinct types: regular, dwarf, and gamthi.

Regular curry trees range in size from five to 15 feet high and five to more than 10 feet wide. They are fast growing and are the most cultivated curry leaves. They provide a delicate taste when added to a sauce that can

be compared to a citrus, anise, and/or lemongrass flavor.

Dwarf curry plants have a mature height of about only 12 inches but have the largest leaves of all the three types of curry plants. The leaves have a pleasant aroma when crushed but have a strong bitter taste if eaten. Their soft silver foliage and small clusters of small white flowers in the summer make them attractive ornamental plants for inside or outside.

The gamthi curry plant is the smallest of the three plants with its mature height reaching a maximum of about eight inches. It produces the longest and thickest leaves of the three curry plants. These leaves are the most fragrant, so few are needed to flavor a curry sauce.

Curry plants can be purchased, propagated from cuttings, or grown from seeds. A rooted curry plant can be planted in the ground or in a container. The soil should be well draining, and the plant should be exposed to full sun for most of the day even if it is grown as a house plant. Curry plants do not tolerate freezing temperatures so in areas that get frost, it is best to plant in a container that can be moved indoors during the winter.

Once established, curry plants are semi-drought tolerant and do not require much watering. Curry plants also do not require much fertilizing. A two-inch layer of compost applied in the spring around the base of the plant or a monthly dose of organic liquid

curry berries, which each contain one or two seeds. The flesh of the fruit is edible, but the seed is toxic if consumed. Essential oils from the seeds are used in perfumery.

The curry plant *Helichrysum italicum* is often mistaken for the edible curry plant. It has leaves that have a citrus and lemongrass scent when crushed but are too bitter to be used for culinary purposes. The real curry plant is *Murraya koenigii*. It can more easily be found by looking for one of the three varieties as regular curry leaf tree, dwarf curry leaf plant, or gamthi curry leaf plant.

Once purchased and planted, a curry leaf plant may not be the dominant focal point of the garden, but it will add a pleasant allure to it much like it does in food dishes.

fertilizer or buttermilk while the weather is warm usually provides enough nutrients for them.

Leaves can be harvested throughout the year, however, depending on how cold it gets, curry plants in this area can be semi-deciduous. The best way to harvest the leaves is to cut a portion of the main stem off the top of the plant or off the ends of

larger branches and use those leaves. These will be fresher, and this will also encourage bushier growth of the plant. The leaves should be used the same way that Bay leaves are used by adding fresh curry leaves to sauces, soups, and stews and then removing them before serving.

Clusters of curry flowers produce multiple shiny black

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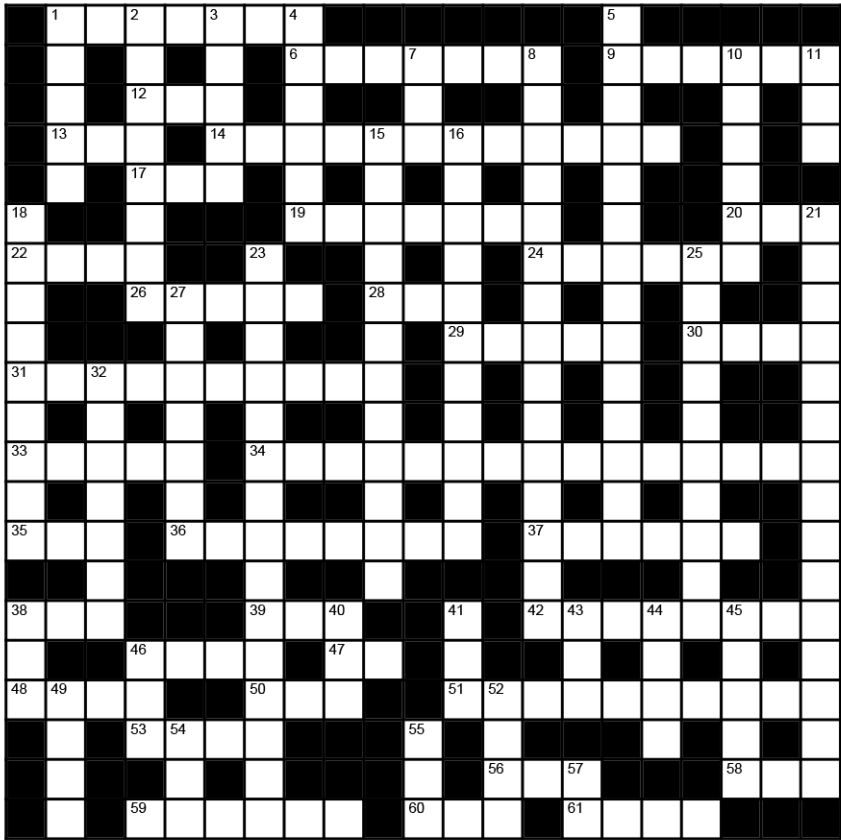

Kia Sorento Hybrid: More for Less

Kia arrived in the U.S more than a quarter century ago, and ever since, the Korean brand has been successfully selling—and even building—cars here. The Sorento, a compact but roomy crossover, is the second largest of six SUVs in the Kia family. The fourth-generation model is debuting for 2021. I briefly sampled the hybrid model; a plug-in hybrid is coming next year.

In the U.S, we love our SUVs, so thoroughly upgrading the popular Sorento is a wise business decision. The new model receives more sharply defined lines outside and an all-new interior. The new face features a more imposing version of the tiger-nose grille, composed of a series of three-dimensional “mouths.” Headlamps are a series of sparkling boxes. Body sides are more folded, and the chunky, twin-bar taillamps evoke a more muscular view from behind. There is a prominent spear-shaped garnish ahead of the

front doors that implies forward motion. An odd-looking raised section pokes up aggressively in the rearmost side windows.

Inside, Kia moves further into a more luxurious look and feel. Kia calls the theme “Refined Boldness,” which offers quilted metal trim, complex and elegant vertical dash vents, and fashionable embossed leather chairs. A little tune plays when you arrive and depart the vehicle, as Kias have done for a while. The turn signals make the tick-tock sound of a fine swiss clock, and you can hear it clearly since it is so quiet inside while you are driving.

My Runway Red test car was the EX model. An S model is also available, but the EX gets a roster of extras, including a panoramic sunroof, handy wireless charging pad, and more electronic safety features including enhanced front collision avoidance for pedestrians and junctions.

A standard gasoline-only Sorento comes with either a 191-horse

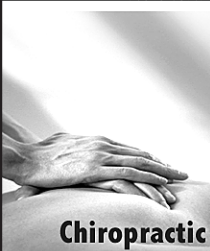
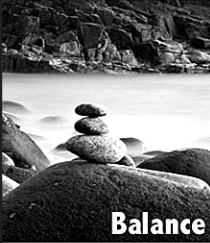
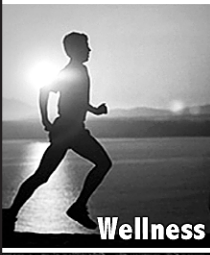

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HISTORY MATTERS

On May 5, 1961, Navy Commander Alan Bartlett Shepard Jr. became the first American in space. It was just a 15-minute mission—memorable to the nation—but too late to outwit the competition. Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin astounded the world when he orbited the earth—once—in the Vistok 1.

Shepard’s Freedom 7 capsule, however, foreshadowed America’s dominance; less than a decade later, the Apollo 11 mission “silenced” the Russians, and catapulted Neil Armstrong, Edwin “Buzz” Aldrin, and Michael Collins to the moon. Shepard was ranked fifth to walk the lunar surface after the Apollo 14 mission.

Grateful American Book Prize recommends “Light This Candle: The Life and Times of Alan Shepard” by Neal Thompson.

The American Revolution was an unexpected victory for the colonists. They won an immense land with a myriad of perks and perils, but the only way to traverse its complex vastness was to join a wagon train. It was a complicated and difficult crossing that many did not survive.

Then, on May 10, 1869, everything changed; two railroads completed the task of laying the tracks from “sea to shining sea”. The presidents of the Union Pacific and Central Pacific railroads met at Promontory, Utah to drive the last spike into the rails of the nation’s first transcontinental railway.

Seven years earlier, land grants and loans from Congress had equipped them with the fiscal flexibility to build, but according to History.com, “In their eagerness for land, the two lines built right past each other, and the final meeting place had to be renegotiated.”

To learn more about how the West was subdued, Grateful American Book Prize recommends “Full Steam Ahead: The Race

to Build a Transcontinental Railroad” by Rhoda Blumberg.

To mollify a newly acquired, undomesticated expanse of land, President Thomas Jefferson determined that a survey was imperative; he selected two explorers—Meriwether Lewis and William Clark—to manage the mission.

America was just over 21 years old, but the Louisiana Purchase transaction suddenly added 828,000 acres, and the equivalent of approximately 15 states. Lewis and Clark started their journey in St. Louis with 55 men on May 14, 1804.

According to History.com, “The expedition traveled up the Missouri River in a 55-foot- long keelboat and two smaller boats. In November, Toussaint Charbonneau, a French-Canadian fur trader accompanied by his young Native American wife Sacagawea, joined the expedition as an interpreter. The group wintered in present-day North Dakota before crossing into present-day Montana, where they first saw the Rocky Mountains.”

They met up with the Shoshone Indians when they reached Colorado, crossed the Clearwater and Snake rivers in canoes, and followed the Columbia River to the Pacific Ocean on November 8, 1805.

Two and a half years later, the expedition returned—in triumph—to St. Louis with thirty-three men. They had mapped out new lands and brought back journals about the Indian tribes they encountered, scientific notes of the flora and fauna they encountered, and a claim to the Oregon Territory.

Report shows progress in helping homeless

After six months of operation, officials from the Fremont Housing Navigation Center (HNC) recently announced that none of the people served by the center have returned to homelessness. The positive statistics were revealed in a progress report released May 3.

While operating under reduced capacity because of COVID-19, the HNC served 44 individuals in its first six months (21 of whom have transitioned into permanent housing while the rest actively participate in the program). Of the 21 participants who have moved to other housing, eight have been reunited with family and 13 moved into independent or shared housing agreements.

Operated by Bay Area Community Services (BACS) and the City of Fremont, the HNC opened its doors on September 28, 2020 to 25 residents who stayed on average for four months. There have been no significant complaints, serious calls for police service, or visible blight because of the HNC.

In addition, BACS has developed new connections with 19 local landlords (12 of which are located in Fremont). The HNC has received monetary donations from the community totaling \$40,346 and many in-kind donations.

With vaccinations becoming more prevalent in the community and the decrease of COVID-19 cases, staff members are hopeful that HNC occupancy will increase, possibly to full capacity of 45 residents, within the next six months.

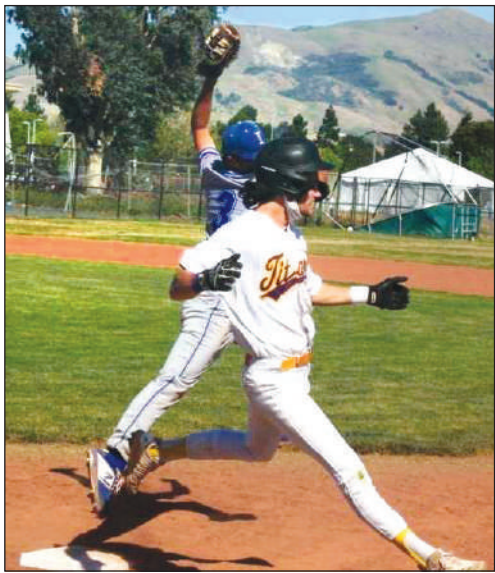

Definition of the term “infrastructure” has evolved over time. Past references described roads, bridges, buildings and the physical framework of a geographical area such as a city, state or country. With the evolution and technical advancement of civil society, the context and organization of how things work and integrate has expanded. While roads, buildings and bridges remain as basic building blocks of commerce and civic life, the infiltration of electronic – virtual or cyber – connectivity has become an immense economic and vital factor in the welfare of daily lives.

Close examination of infrastructure will determine the strengths and weaknesses of all segments of society. Each community chooses to either commit to, defer or reject replacements, enhancements or advancements that require capital investment. When municipalities disclose these decisions, the result is a multiyear action roadmap called a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). This typically balances the budget with civic goals and objectives. Although some elements of the plan may be prioritized as financially speculative, others are firm

commitments, allowing elected representatives and the public to not only review stated municipal goals, but see where and how money is spent.

This document can be daunting since it covers a host of concerns but just as a household budget can either guide or disrupt future decisions, it is important to pay close attention to the use of public monies. For example, Fremont is in the midst of reviewing its 5-year program and authorizing a 2-year capital budget. A presentation at its council meeting on May 21 will reveal the results of council study sessions and staff recommendations followed by public hearings and adoption in June. This is not a trivial decision; proposed Fiscal Year 2019-2024 program amounts to \$220 million. At stake are investments in ongoing projects such as street maintenance, park maintenance and downtown construction as well as one-time expenditures for new facilities and renovations.

It may also be appropriate at this time to consider additional infrastructure needs. A problem for many cities - Fremont included – is intercity transportation. Although the current pandemic has curtailed a significant amount of traffic, old patterns are beginning to reemerge as more facilities open and people feel more comfortable in public venues. Not only is first and last mile travel to and from

mass transportation needed without bikes and scooters, but many trips within city limits could be handled by a fixed rail (trolley?), well-maintained system for shopping, visiting and commuting. For those who are bike/scooter inept or adverse, intracity transportation could remove the need for single occupant auto travel and its attendant impact on traffic and the environment. In a new system such as this, the impact of high-tech electronic systems could minimize cost and maximize efficiency.

As the CIP process proceeds, careful study of the elements addressed, offers opportunities for public comment and revision at hearings; a chance to modify and expand the definition of infrastructure. This debate is occurring at the national level and should also be welcome locally.

Weekend BART track shutdowns coming

Initial work is underway for a large BART construction project in southern Alameda County. Crews will replace critical track components between the South Hayward and Union City BART stations as well as begin the

preliminary work to build a new storage facility at the Hayward Maintenance Complex for hundreds of new Fleet of the Future cars. The work is happening as BART has made the most of reduced service hours over the last year to gain ground on a list of important system improvement projects. The latest project will require a series of weekend track shutdowns between South Hayward and Union City. On those weekends, free buses provided by AC Transit instead of trains will carry

passengers directly between the two stations. There will be no train service between South Hayward and Union City on the following weekends: May 15-16, May 29-31 (Memorial Day weekend), June 19-20, September 4-6 (Labor Day weekend), September 18-19, October 2-3, and October 16-17. On all these weekends free buses will replace trains and riders should plan to add 20 to 25 minutes to their trips. The work will also require BART to reduce service to a single track in the area on select Saturdays and Sundays,

which will cause delays of 15 to 20 minutes. Additional track shutdown weekends are expected in 2022 but specific dates have not yet been determined. This southern Alameda County work comes as BART has focused on advancing infrastructure re-building projects across the system during a time of low ridership and reduced service hours. The work is made possible thanks to Measure RR, which was approved by BART District voters in 2016 and provides \$3.5 billion to rebuild the backbone of the system.

Fremont Unified Board Meeting Highlights

At its May 5 meeting, Fremont Unified School District (FUSD) Board of Education:

- Updated about Return to In-Person Instruction – FUSD expanded its Learning Hub model on April 26 and has approved the full return to in-person instruction for the 2021-2022 school year. In addition to a full return to campus, the district will offer a virtual learning program at both the elementary and secondary levels. FUSD is planning for in-person graduation events, modified to align with state/local requirements. Staff presented information to the Board of Education regarding new developments for its Summer School and Extended School Year programs, virtual learning programs for 2021-2022, and state guidance for schools, graduations, or extra-curricular activities.
- Adopted Resolution 030-2021 – This resolution will support the efforts of FUSD’s commitment to supporting the education of students on human-induced climate change, verse students in climate change and climate solutions, support a school and community wide

effort to develop or adopt a pre-existing comprehensive climate change literacy program. Fremont Unified will also include professional development, create an implementation plan, review existing education initiatives and sustainability programs to coordinate with the climate change literacy program, pledges to share and promote climate change literacy and assist in mobilizing the education community to address the climate emergency.

- Approved Textbook Adoption – The current K-5 Social Studies curriculum, Scott Foresman History-Social Science for California, was adopted in 2006. The current curriculum is no longer available for Special Day Instruction (SDI) classes and will likely be completely discontinued by the publisher soon. The criteria used to evaluate the curriculum was based on information in the following resources: California History-Social Science for California Public Schools, Standards for Evaluation of Instructional Materials with Respect to Social Content which embodies the FAIR Act requirements, and College, Career, and Civic Live (C3) Framework for Social Studies State Standards. After a thorough review, the committee is recommending Social Studies Alive! The adoption materials were available online to the public for review from April 1 through May 5.

Minimum Wage Increase Effective July 1

Fremont’s minimum wage is scheduled to increase on July 1 for both large and small employers. Beginning July 1, large employers with 26 or more employees will be subject to a \$15.25/hour minimum wage and small employers with 25 or fewer employees will increase to \$15/hour. To prevent inflation from eroding its value, the minimum wage for large employers will be adjusted beginning on July 1 by the local consumer price index, while small employers will increase to \$15/hour. On July 1, 2022, the small employer minimum increases to the large employer level. From that point on, both large and small employers will be subject to the same minimum wage increase defined by the local consumer price index. Fremont’s Minimum Wage Ordinance exempts nonprofit corporations. Police DUI checkpoint planned

Hayward Police Department (HPD) officers will be on the lookout for impaired drivers during an upcoming DUI checkpoint planned at an undisclosed location in the city. The checkpoint is set for 8:00 p.m. Friday, May 21 and will continue until 2:00 a.m. the next day. During the checkpoint, officers will look for signs that drivers are under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Checkpoint locations are chosen based on a history of DUI crashes and arrests. The primary purpose of checkpoints is not to make arrests, but to promote public safety by deterring drivers from driving impaired. “The safety of our community is and always will be our mission,” Sergeant Tasha DeCosta said. “We are looking for impaired drivers because driving under the influence is dangerous and puts others on the road at risk.” HPD is reminding the public that impaired driving is not just from alcohol; some prescription medications or over-the-counter drugs may also interfere with driving. People should always follow directions for using medications and read warning labels about driving or operating heavy machinery, which includes driving a car. While medicinal and recreational marijuana are legal, driving under the influence of marijuana is illegal. Anyone that is planning on drinking or taking medications that may impact their ability to drive safely should stay home ride with a designated driver. Drivers charged with a first-time DUI face an average of \$13,500 in fines and penalties, as well as a suspended license. Funding for this DUI checkpoint program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Clipper debuts new digital payment options

Passengers who use the Clipper fare payment card on Bay Area transit systems can now use it on an iPhone and with Apple Pay and can manage the card on a new mobile app.

Officials from the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) said the new options for the card, launched in mid-April, gives riders on 24 Bay Area transit systems a new, contactless way to pay fares on buses, trains and ferries.

Customers can add the card directly through Apple Wallet and load cash value with Apple Pay anytime. Riders also can transfer the value from a plastic Clipper card to their iPhone; Clipper is coming to Google Pay in late May.

“The last year has taught us the importance of contactless fare payment, and this is one more way Clipper is delivering on that promise,” said MTC Chair Alfredo Pedroza in an April 15 statement. “With Clipper’s launch today on iPhone and Apple Watch, we are offering greater safety and convenience to riders, drivers, station agents and transit operators.”

The launch makes paying for and riding public transit easier and safer because Clipper on iPhone and Apple Watch works with Express Mode, which allows riders to quickly tag and pay for rides without having to use Face ID, Touch ID, wake or unlock their device, or open an app. Riders can simply hold their

iPhone or their Apple Watch near the Clipper reader and then board a bus, train or ferry. They no longer need to touch a ticket vending machine or reload a Clipper card at a retailer.

Clipper mobile app, available on iPhone, allows riders to easily manage their Clipper cards and their Clipper account, and to plan transit trips around the Bay Area. Riders must use the Clipper app to buy transit agency passes for use on iPhone or Apple Watch.

“This new fare payment method works on all 24 Bay Area transit services that accept Clipper,” said MTC Executive Director Therese McMillan. “Riders can easily add cash value from Apple Pay and just tag and ride. It couldn’t be more user-friendly, not to mention timely. We’re looking forward to offering the same convenience soon with Google Pay.”

Transit riders who are enrolled in the Clipper START program and those who use cash to load their Clipper cards also can use the Clipper app, but cash payers will need to use a BART, Golden Gate Ferry, or SMART ticket machine or select Caltrain ticket machines to add value to iPhone or Apple Watch.

Police share bicycle safety tips

May is National Bicycle Safety Month and the Fremont Police Department (FPD) is encouraging drivers to slow down when passing bicyclists, and asking bicyclists to be visible, predictable and safe on the road.

“Bicyclists are safest when they act like and are treated the same as drivers,” Lieutenant Ariel Quimson said. “Please share the road with bicyclists and think of them as your closest friends or family. We all want to get where we need to go safely, whether that is in the car or on a bike.”

FPD officials have compiled a list of safety tips for people to follow when they are navigating Fremont city streets.

Drivers:

- Slow down. Give at least three to five feet of space when passing a bike.
- Wait for a safe place to pass when driving behind a bike, especially on narrow roads. California law requires drivers to provide at least three feet of space between a vehicle and bicycle.
- If making a right turn, assume a bicyclist is traveling through the intersection unless they signal otherwise.
- When making a left turn, yield to oncoming bicyclists just as you would for other drivers.
- Look for cyclists before opening a car door.
- Never drive distracted or impaired.

Bike Riders:

- Be predictable, safe, and seen; obey traffic laws, use hand signals, use lights at night (front white light and rear red reflector), and wear a helmet.
- Bicyclists must travel in the same direction of traffic and have the same requirements as any slow-moving vehicle.
- Avoid the door zone: do not ride too closely to parked cars.
- If there’s a bike lane, use it, unless making a left turn, passing, or approaching a place where a right turn is allowed.
- Yield to pedestrians. Bicyclists must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians within marked crosswalks or within unmarked crosswalks at intersections.

Ask Rusty My Social Security Card Is Incorrect – What Should I Do?

Dear Rusty: My sister and I have the same first and last names but are distinguished by our “middle” names. Our last name consists of two family names, which gives us both four, with only our middle names unique. We received two Social Security cards with the same name (middle name excluded), each with a unique number, but with our last name misspelled. So, my questions are:

- Which card is mine, and which is my sisters?
- Is it okay that our last name is misspelled?

I called Social Security and was told to make an appointment online, which I tried but could not because it would not accept my last name. I do not know what to do now and hope you can advise me.

Signed: Confused Sister

Dear Confused Sister: You have not shared your age, but unless you are ready to apply for Social Security, you and your sister have time to correct your last name in your Social Security records. In any case, your Social Security Number is what is used to record your earnings for the purpose of future SS benefits, so you are not losing anything where your earnings credits are concerned. You should, however, get your correct last name reflected in your Social Security records to be sure that your future benefits will be properly paid.

For Social Security purposes, only first names and last names (surnames) are considered your legal name. You can include a middle name if it will help distinguish you from another, but your legal name for Social Security purposes will be your first and last name only. Thus, you should correct your Social Security profile to reflect your correct first and last name and include your unique middle name for personal purposes to distinguish you from your sister. For additional awareness, SS last names are limited to 13 characters. Also, it is not uncommon for many people to share the same first and last name (e.g., John Smith) in Social Security’s records – it is the SS number associated with that name that counts.

Other factors might apply too, such as whether the SS cards and numbers you and your sister now have are new, or if either or both of you have been using those SS numbers for past employment purposes. In any case, those numbers have been assigned to you, so getting your profile to reflect your correct last name is important. It is also important that each of you separately use only one SS card/number (you use one; your sister the other).

To correct your name with Social Security, you should fill out and submit form SSA-5, which you can download/print at www.ssa.gov/forms/ss-5.pdf. Note that the form is used to apply for a new card, get a replacement card, or to change information for an existing SS number. The form includes complete instructions on how to fill it out, and you can submit it via the US Post Office to your local Social Security office, the mailing address for which you can find at www.ssa.gov/locator.

Take note of the form’s instructions for including additional documentation for identification purposes. I suggest that you and your sister both do this separately, each of you taking ownership of one of the SS numbers. When Social Security processes your name change, they will schedule an appointment to discuss any remaining questions they may have. They will notify you via U.S. mail of the date/time of the appointment and the next steps to be taken.

Since all Social Security offices are temporarily closed to public access due to the pandemic, you can do this transaction entirely over the phone if you wish, but you will need to first call for an appointment. If you choose the phone method over submitting form SSA-5, you should call 1-800-772-1213 and request an appointment to correct your name on Social Security’s records. They will send you an appointment notice, at which you will be able initiate the name change process (you will still need to provide them with identification documents via the US mail).

Suspect sought for home invasion

Since the beginning of April, Special Operations Detectives assigned to gun violence reduction, have been searching for 20-year-old Gerardo Landa-Sandoval of East Palo Alto. Robbery Detectives had identified Landa-Sandoval as one of the suspects who attempted to force entry into an apartment at the Mosaic Apartments on 03/10/21. During the incident, a 19-year-old associate of Landa-Sandoval was shot and killed by a resident from inside of the apartment. Landa-Sandoval and several other suspects fled the scene after the shooting.

On 04/20/21, undercover Detectives located Landa-Sandoval near the San Francisco Airport and contacted the San Mateo County Sheriff’s Office (SMCSO) for assistance. SMCSO Deputies were able to detain him without incident. FPD Detectives took custody of Landa-Sandoval and searched his vehicle which resulted in the recovery of a loaded handgun. A follow up search warrant was conducted at his residence and additional ammunition was recovered. Landa-Sandoval was arrested for home invasion robbery, conspiracy, and possession of a loaded/concealed firearm. He was booked at Santa Rita Jail with a bail of \$240,000. The District Attorney’s

Office charged Landa-Sandoval with home invasion robbery in concert while armed with a firearm, and his bail was reduced to \$135,000 at his 04/23/21 arraignment. At a 04/27/21 plea hearing, Landa-Sandoval’s bail was further reduced to \$62,500 which he posted to secure his release. Robbery Detectives have also identified 20-year-old Lajon Harris as another outstanding home invasion suspect from the 03/10/21 incident. Harris is currently wanted on a home invasion robbery warrant and efforts to locate and arrest him have been unsuccessful. On 05/05/21, Detectives conducted a search of Harris’s residence in Stockton with negative results. Detectives are requesting the assistance of

those familiar with Harris to provide information that will lead to his arrest. Harris is known to frequent the areas of Stockton, East Palo Alto, Menlo Park, and San Francisco. A pre-trial hearing is scheduled for 07/22/21 for both Landa-Sandoval and Harris for their involvement in the home invasion robbery which resulted in the death of their associate. 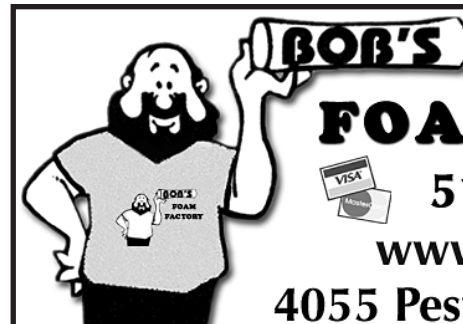

Park It

As the East Bay’s parklands heat up in the summer sun, a great place to cool off is Point Pinole Regional Shoreline in Richmond. Air-conditioned by breezes from San Pablo Bay, Point Pinole has lots to offer. Its 2,400-plus acres preserve and protect a fascinating cultural and natural history.

Here is how to get there. The park has three main entrances - all off Richmond Parkway. One is at the end of Atlas Road, another is on Giant Highway, and the Dotson Family Marsh entrance is at the end of Goodrick Avenue.

The point has a long and colorful history. Its original

inhabitants were the Huchiun Ohlone tribe, who lived in what is now San Pablo, but had a temporary camp at Point Pinole where they stayed while gathering shellfish and other food. With the arrival of Europeans, the land was used for ranching and farming. In the late 1800s there was a Croatian fishing village in the present Cook’s Point Trail.

The most unusual use of the area was dynamite manufacture. Between 1880 and 1960, the point was home to four explosives manufacturing companies. In part this was because public outcry after major production-related explosions elsewhere prompted the dynamite companies to seek out a more remote location for their businesses.

Giant Powder, later bought by Atlas Powder Company,

constructed a company town at Point Pinole. Rail lines crisscrossed the property, transporting product to a railroad station and pier for shipping to customers. Some of the rails were wooden, to reduce the chance of sparking. Eucalyptus groves were planted as a buffer in case of explosions. In all, two billion pounds of dynamite and nitroglycerine were manufactured at the point.

Eventually the introduction of ammonium nitrate as a new explosive cheaper to produce put an end to dynamite manufacture. Atlas Powder closed its Point Pinole operation in 1960 and sold the land to Bethlehem Steel Company. Bethlehem Steel tore down most of the buildings and cleaned up the debris. But it never followed through on its plans for a steel plant. In 1971 East Bay

Regional Park District bought the first properties for today’s park.

All that remains as evidence of the park’s explosive past are building foundations and earthen berms where the dynamite was stored. There is also a black powder press exhibited on the Cook’s Point Trail.

The park offers beautiful views of San Pablo Bay, East Bay shoreline, and Mt. Tamalpais in Marin County across the way. About 12 miles of trails lead along the shorelines and through the eucalyptus groves out to a 1,250-foot fishing pier. The terrain is mostly flat, for those who prefer more mild exercise. No dogs on the pier, please.

A license is required to fish along the shore, but none is needed to fish from the pier.

Possible catches include sturgeon, striped bass, bay rays, leopard sharks, perch, and flounder. Check the rules posted at the pier entrance for size and take regulations.

Lots of nice picnic areas are available in the park. And it is a great locale for birding, along the shoreline or in the groves. An overnight group camp is available by reservation. For the full story, visit the park district website, www.ebparks.org.

Be sure to check the park district website for the status of facilities before your visit to any regional park. Although some visitor centers are now open on weekends, you may need to make reservations online before you go.

Advisory Redistricting Commission
Accepting Applications

County of Santa Clara seeks applicants for 2021 Advisory Redistricting Commission to begin the redistricting effort to redraw the county's five supervisorial district boundaries that occurs after every decennial census. Applications are due no later than June 1 and can be completed online.

Board of Supervisors has established the formation of a 15-member commission to hold virtual public hearings and mapping sessions, collect community input, and recommend to the board updated placement of the supervisorial district boundaries. Every 10 years, the County redraws district boundaries, considering population changes reflected in the census.

"Now is the time for people in our community to participate in a dynamic, exciting public process," said County of Santa Clara Board of Supervisors President Mike Wasserman. "The Advisory Commission members will serve a critical role in gathering community feedback as they develop updated district boundaries and draw mapping that ensures

fair representation."

The redistricting process framework, approved by the Board on April 6, takes into consideration unusual time constraints faced during this decennial census. The U.S. Census Bureau is expected to finish processing 2020 Census data by September 30, which is six months later than the original anticipated date of completion and significantly reduces the timeframe for district map updates.

Taking into consideration the time constraints, the county has developed a six-month redistricting process that includes appointing advisory commissioners in June and July; holding commission meetings beginning in July; scheduling public hearings and mapping sessions in August through October; and conducting Board review and approval in December. Per state law, redistricting must be completed no later than December 15, and be in place before the next election cycle, so that candidates and voters know in which district they reside.

The board approved a three-step

process to ensure appointment of a diverse 15-member advisory commission that includes:

- Five commissioners, one from each supervisorial district, will be randomly selected from qualified applicants and announced on June 9.
- Five members will be nominated, one by each supervisor, from the remaining pool of qualified applications from their respective district and appointed by the board on June 22.
- Ten commissioners appointed during the first two steps of the process will select the remaining five members in July, one from each district, from a pool of applicants residing in each supervisorial district.

Individuals interested in serving as a 2021 Advisory Redistricting Commissioner must meet specific qualifications, which include:

- Must be a registered voter in Santa Clara County
- Must not be an elected official of the county, or a family member, staff member, or paid campaign staff of an elected official of the county
- Must have the ability to serve

A new age dawns for Sun Gallery

to find it especially difficult to recover. Sun Gallery was one non-profit that was struggling, but miraculously managed to keep on shining after the pandemic's effects, even after a fire destroyed part of their facility.

Repurposing the Hayward Recreation Department's main office in 1976, Sun Gallery provided visual art exhibitions and educational programs to Bay Area

artists like Mel Ramos and Nathan Olivera.

Like many other businesses, when COVID-19 spread to the United States, Sun Gallery had to close its doors on March 15, 2020. A short time later, on April 9, local residents heard an explosion near the gallery. While the fires were extinguished before they reached the main building, half of the artwork in the



residents that reflected the diverse cultural populations of Hayward and neighboring communities. Notable events included helping abused women recover from traumas with free art sessions, and a Life to Art exhibit in 2018, with artwork from world-renowned Portuguese-American

gallery's shed was affected by fire and water damage resulting in a total of \$20,000's worth of damages. Fortunately, no casualties were reported.

Because Sun Gallery lost approximately \$50,000 of their usual revenue from



membership fees and programs like field trips, it was difficult to recover from this fire and COVID-19's impact. However, with support from the community including grants, fundraisers and donations from anonymous donors and organizations such as the Hayward Arts Council and Adobe Arts Inc., Sun Gallery was able to recover.

“My mentor used to tell me that people can get through tough times with art,” gallery director Dorsi Diaz reminisces. “The Hayward Sun Gallery is a place that constantly showed me that, and the place has really saved my life so many times. Words cannot fully describe how very grateful I am for all the support the community has given us, since they allowed us to continue doing what we love.”

While activities like birthday parties and field trips are still on hold, current efforts are directed toward polishing the 8th annual Climate Change exhibit, subtitled “A Compassionate Connection,” which opened on April 23 and will

continue to run until June 5. According to the Sun Gallery website, this exhibit focuses on compassion toward all living beings. Admission to this exhibit is free.

Upcoming plans for Sun Gallery include a Pop Surrealist exhibit and an outdoor gold-panning program – “Sunny's Claim” - that focuses on the history of Northern California. Submission dates for their next show have yet to be determined but the gallery is currently inviting volunteers to apply.
