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Suffer From Chronic Pelvic Pain?

Free Virtual Seminar Provides Information on Causes, Diagnosis and Treatment Options



On September 29, a special presentation combines physical therapy and physician advice on the subject of pelvic pain.

Chronic pelvic pain generally is defined as pain in the lower abdominal area below the bellybutton and between the hips that lasts for six months or more. The ongoing pain can disrupt lives by impacting ability to work and ability to participate in physical activities. It can interrupt sleep patterns and hinder family interactions. All of this can, of course, adversely impact a woman's mental health.

"Chronic pelvic pain can sometimes be a difficult subject for women to discuss with their doctors, particularly if their doctors are not trained in diagnosing or treating chronic pelvic pain," says Jenny-Hahn Tran, DO.

"When women experience acute pelvic pain, they generally will talk with their doctors right away," she explains. "With continuing pain that doesn't have an immediately apparent cause, however, women might feel they are getting the run-around and become discouraged—thinking they'll never find a solution to their pain."

Dr. Tran is a board-certified obstetrics/gynecology specialist with Washington Women's Health Specialists, which is part of Washington Township Medical Foundation.

To help women learn more about the symptoms, causes, diagnostic techniques and treatment options for this disruptive physical condition, Washington Hospital Healthcare System (WHHS) is offering a free online seminar on Wednesday, September 29, at 6:30 p.m. The seminar will be available both through Facebook and YouTube (www.facebook.com/WashingtonHosp and www.Youtube.com/whhsInHealth).

The virtual presentation, "Chronic Pelvic Pain in Women," features Dr. Tran and Rebekah ("Becka") Bisset, a physical therapist on the staff at the Washington Outpatient Rehabilitation Center. Bisset, who holds a doctorate degree in physical therapy, received additional specialized training in pelvic floor physical therapy to help patients experiencing pelvic disorders.

"I know that chronic pelvic pain may be a debilitating condition, and it can be difficult to diagnose properly, sometimes requiring several appointments, examinations and tests," says Dr. Tran. "In some cases, a single medical condition, such as endometriosis, can be the culprit. In many cases, though, the chronic pain may result from a combination of several

different conditions. For example, a woman could have uterine fibroids, a pelvic infection or ovarian cysts in addition to endometriosis. Diagnosing chronic pelvic pain, therefore, is basically a process of ruling out conditions that are known to cause such pain to pinpoint the woman's particular set of circumstances."

During the seminar, Dr. Tran will discuss symptoms of chronic pelvic pain, as well as conditions that can cause such pain and the diagnostic techniques available, including pelvic ultrasound and screenings for various infections to supplement physical pelvic exams.

Dr. Tran notes that in some cases, pelvic pain may be unrelated to gynecological conditions. In those cases, the patient could be referred to specialists who treat those conditions. "For example, if we discover that the pain is due to an ongoing or recurrent bladder infection or to nerve pain causing bladder spasms, we could refer the woman to a urologist," she observes.

Treatment for chronic pelvic pain depends on the woman's diagnosis of the cause of her pain. Dr. Tran will discuss various medications that might be useful

in treating the condition, including pain relievers, hormone treatments such as birth control pills, or antibiotics for infections. She also will discuss other alternative treatment options.

One valuable treatment option for treating chronic pelvic pain that is available through WHHS is physical therapy. "While it is important to find a physician who can identify the causes of chronic pelvic pain, it also is important to see a physical therapist who is trained in this area, because not many physical therapists are trained in treating this condition," says Bisset. "The pelvic floor is related to musculoskeletal aspects within the abdomen and pelvis, so I can recommend specific mobility of the abdomen, hips, pelvis and spine to help alleviate pelvic pain.

"I also work on relaxation techniques that can ease the anxiety that often accompanies chronic pelvic pain," she adds. "In addition, I work with patients on full-body strengthening, mobility and postural stability—all of which can affect chronic pelvic pain."

Children's Poor Posture Today May Create Spine Trouble Tomorrow

Did your mother frequently admonish you to stand up straight with your head up and your shoulders back? Or did she tell you that if you continue to sit with your shoulders hunched and your torso sloping forward, your back would become curved like your old Uncle Martin's back?

It turns out, once again, Mom was right. Ongoing poor posture in children can result in long-term problems with spinal health, putting a strain on the bones, muscles and joints that hold the backbone in place.

"Kids tend to think they are invulnerable, and they sometimes ignore their parents' well-intended advice on standing and sitting up straight," says Washington Outpatient Rehabilitation Center Director Sharmi Mukherjee, PT, DPT. "Unfortunately, poor posture habits in childhood often continue into adulthood, and good posture habits are harder to learn later in life."

Mukherjee, who holds a doctorate degree in physical therapy, notes that one current cause of poor posture among children and teenagers is prolonged work at a computer.

"Kids – and grownups, too – often will slouch when working on a computer," she says. "The COVID-19 pandemic made things worse because so many kids had to deal with virtual classes online for several hours a day. Teaching your kids how to maintain good posture while working on a computer is still important."

When kids sit in front of a computer, parents should encourage them to sit all the way back in the chair with their feet flat on the floor, and their knees bending at a 90-degree right angle at the same

height or higher than their hips. In addition, their eyes should be approximately 18 to 24 inches from the computer screen so they don't lean toward the screen too much, according to Mukherjee.

"A good ergonomic chair or a standing desk could be beneficial," she adds.

"In any event, children should not use a computer or watch television while lying on a bed or sofa."

Another popular activity that can adversely affect a child's posture is playing video games.

"It's very easy for kids to lose track of time while playing video games, and they tend to lean forward and forget about maintaining a good posture," Mukherjee explains. "These games can become addictive. I actually know a teenage patient

who spends hours and hours playing video games, and he has developed a curvature of the spine that is hunched over in a way that is more typical of 80-year-olds."

To reduce the amount of time kids spend playing video games, Mukherjee suggests that parents set a reminder on their kids' phones or watches for when to take a break.

"When the alarm goes off, tell them to go outside to take a walk or to play a physical game instead of video games," she counsels. While participating in sports, some children might become fatigued, which could cause them to lean forward, but sports are not ordinarily a cause of poor posture.

"Toting around a heavy backpack, on the other hand, really can be a source of poor posture, resulting in back and neck

pain," she adds. "Parents should help their kids figure out ways to reduce the weight of their backpacks, perhaps by leaving out books or equipment that won't be needed for a given day. It's also important to emphasize that children should not carry their backpacks using only one strap draped over a shoulder. I highly recommend using both shoulder straps, properly adjusted to fit the child's back."

While most of the patients at the Washington Outpatient Rehabilitation Center are adults, the facility does offer physical therapy for children and teenagers.

"If your child complains of neck, shoulder or back pain, consult your pediatrician to see whether physical therapy might be indicated," Mukherjee advises. "Lately we are seeing more kids with these problems."

During her own early adolescence, Mukherjee says she developed a bit of scoliosis – a type of curvature of the spine.

"No one had told me about the effect of poor posture on the spine," she recalls. "What helped me was that I was a dancer, performing a dance style called Kathak, which is similar to flamenco, with very good body mechanics. So I do believe that being active always helps kids maintain a good posture, and I recommend various stretches and exercises for those who complain about back and neck pain. The old principle, 'a body in motion stays in motion' still rings true."

On September 29, a special presentation combines physical therapy and physician advice on the subject of pelvic pain.

Bisset advises that the duration of physical therapy treatments that is required for chronic pelvic pain can vary widely, from one month to a year or more.

"Everything is dependent on how long the patient has suffered, how severe her pain is, and the specific cause of her pain," she explains. "We need to tailor physical therapy to each woman's case, whether the pain is due to a specific condition or to multiple causes. The age ranges and life experiences of our patients are all across the

board, from young women who have not had children and women who are pregnant or post-partum, to older women who are premenopausal or postmenopausal. This is definitely not a one-size-fits-all approach to physical therapy."

Dr. Tran emphasizes, "I believe that women with chronic pelvic pain deserve compassionate, comprehensive care that helps them find accurate answers to their questions and achieve a better quality of life."

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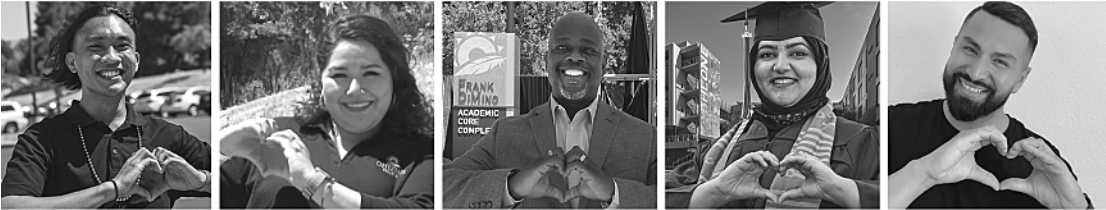

Wendy's to open delivery-only kitchens

Wendy's plans to open 700 delivery-only kitchens by 2025 to meet the growing demand from people who want their fast food brought to them. The kitchens will primarily operate in urban neighborhoods in the U.S., Canada and the United Kingdom, Wendy's said. The hamburger chain will open its first 50 delivery kitchens this year.

Dublin, Ohio-based Wendy's is partnering with Reef Technology Inc., a Miami company that runs 5,000 delivery kitchens in 30 cities worldwide.

In a conference call with investors Aug. 11, Wendy's President and CEO Todd Penegor said Reef will build the locations and hire workers for the kitchens, each of which are expected to see sales of \$500,000 to \$1 million per year. Wendy's will get royalties of around 6% of sales.

Wendy's didn't say who will be delivering the food. But the company has existing partnerships with third parties like DoorDash, Uber Eats and Grubhub.

Demand for restaurant delivery was already growing before the pandemic but surged when restaurants closed their dining rooms last year. Delivery accounted for 3.3% of U.S. restaurant traffic in the year that ended in June 2019, according to NPD Group. That total rose to 8.4% in the year that ended in June 2021.

Wendy's said its digital sales -- which includes delivery and mobile orders for pickup -- hit 7.5% of total sales in the second quarter of this year. That's up from 2.5% in 2019. Wendy's said it decided to expand its delivery-only kitchens with Reef after a successful test in Canada, where it opened eight kitchens late last year.

Wendy's isn't the first fast food chain to explore so-called ghost kitchens, which have no storefront and only prepare food for delivery. In 2019, Chick-fil-A began offering delivery from a DoorDash Kitchen in Northern California.

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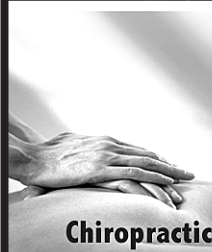
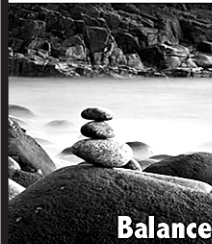
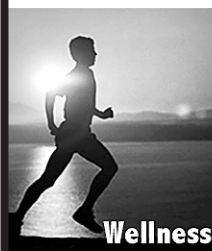

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Meet CyberDog, a new quadruped robot

THE ROBOT REPORT

Xiaomi recently announced the release of a new quadruped robot called CyberDog. The product is designed to meet the requirements of research engineers and hobbyists who want to develop code and applications for a quadruped robot, but don't want to pay for a platform like the Boston Dynamics Spot robot (about 1/10th of the cost of Spot). CyberDog is Xiaomi's first foray into quadruped robotics. The company is hoping that CyberDog fills an important niche in the open-source community, while it learns how to develop, manufacture and support a robotic device.

Act quickly, before they're gone!

If CyberDog looks interesting, you need to act quickly to get your hands on one. Xiaomi is releasing the first 1,000 units of CyberDog at a cost of ~ \$1450 (RMB 9,999). The company is also setting up the "Xiaomi Open-Source Community" to constantly share progress and results with developers around the world. This will be the self-help community that will support developers. It is interesting that CyberDog is about the cost of a new (high end) smartphone.

There's no word on whether this will become a publicly available solution from Xiaomi or what the final street price might be if it does. It is, however, one of the most affordable quadruped robots to be offered from a major supplier.

CyberDog can sense its world

CyberDog has a rich set of features

that will provide developers with a solid platform for developing new applications and pushing the limits for navigation and operations. Its central computer is built around the Nvidia Jetson Xavier NX module, which packs 384 CUDA cores, 48 Tensor cores, six Carmel CPU cores, and two cores dedicated to deep learning. The Jetson processes data from CyberDog's 11 onboard sensors.

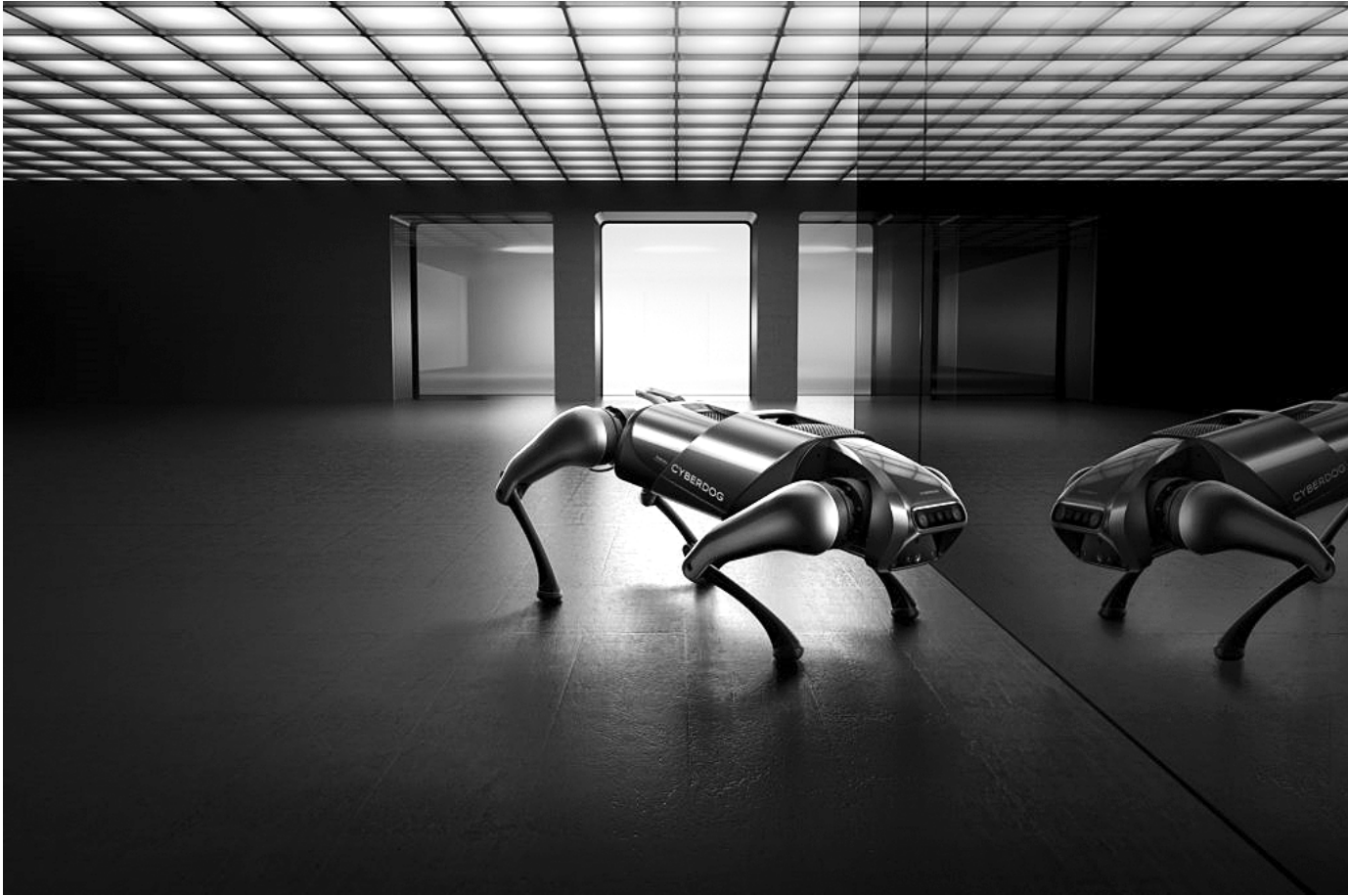
The sensor package includes an

Intel RealSense D455 depth sensor for object tracking and obstacle avoidance, along with six microphones. The robot is capable of moving up to 3.2m/s (~7 mph). CyberDog includes three USB-C ports and one HDMI port, for developers to connect external sensor packages. This might include LiDAR sensors, additional cameras, or other environmental sensors.

This isn't the first foray by Xiaomi into consumer products beyond cell phones. The company also sells electric scooters,

ionic hair dryers, carry-on luggage and home security cameras. However, there currently isn't any way to order a CyberDog from the website. You'll need to follow their blog at <https://blog.mi.com/en/>.

This fish has a human bite

It might be a bit creepy for those who have never seen a Sheephead fish, but angler Nathan Martin was not put off when he reeled one in that he caught recently in Nags Head, North Carolina. According to the Association of Mature American Citizens [AMAC], the Sheephead variety is well known for its mouth full of human-like teeth. Martin's catch was photographed and it went viral when he posted it on Facebook with the hashtag, "#BigTeethBigTimes." Martin said Sheephead fish put up a good fight when they take your bait and its good tasting. The species -- like humans -- are omnivores and needs human-like teeth to chew on clams, oysters and crustaceans.

Airshow stops traffic

Michigan's Army and Air National Guard produced an awe-inspiring show recently on highway M-32 near Alpena, Michigan. It was part of an event that takes place annually and it's called Exercise Northern Strike, reports AMAC. More than 5,000 participants "from various states and countries [converged] at the National All-Domain Warfighting Center for training focused on expeditionary skills, command and control, sustainment and joint integrated fires," according to the sponsors. But it also provided civilians from far and wide to experience a thrilling air show as aircraft displayed their ability to touchdown and take off on a motorway.

What are the odds?

Mark Bodrog and Gabriela Mosquera of Gloucester Township, New Jersey were expecting but they weren't expecting to make headlines when their newborn triplets turned out to be identical. Officials from AMAC said that identical triplets are a rarity with odds as high as one in 200 million. As for these newborns, according to their proud dad, "They're from the same egg, sharing the same placenta with three separate amniotic sacs. It's so rare. There are hardly any case studies on it." He said that before the triplets, Anastasia, Olivia and Nadia, were born the hospital of the University of Pennsylvania chimed in offering prenatal and delivery care. "They said, 'You guys are coming here. We want to do this pregnancy. It's so rare. Highly, highly risky'."

NASA blames Mars rover sampling fiasco on bad rock

NASA is blaming unusually soft rock for last week's sampling fiasco on Mars.

The Perseverance rover came up empty after attempting to collect its first core sample on the red planet for eventual return to Earth. Data beamed back last Friday showed that the rover drilled to the proper depth of nearly 3 inches, and pictures of the borehole looked good. But it quickly became clear the sample tube was empty.

Since then, engineers have determined the rock was not strong enough to produce a core sample, and the small, powdery fragments remained in the hole or ended up in the cuttings pile -- or both. So, the rover is moving on to the next sampling site in its quest for signs of ancient Martian life; it should arrive there by early next month.

Imaging by the rover and its companion helicopter, Ingenuity, show the sedimentary rock should be much better for sampling there, Louise Jandura, chief engineer for Perseverance's sampling campaign, said on Aug. 11.

"The hardware performed as commanded but the rock did not cooperate this time," Jandura wrote in an online update.

"It reminds me yet again of the nature of exploration," she said. "A specific result is never guaranteed no matter how much you prepare." NASA is looking to collect about 35 samples that would be returned via future spacecraft in a decade.

It's not the first time that a Mars lander has run into ground resistance. A German digger on NASA's InSight lander failed to burrow more than a couple feet, far short of its target. The clumping soil didn't provide enough friction for the heat-measuring device, and experimenters gave up in January.

The little helicopter, Ingenuity, meanwhile, is still wowing its team. It's completed 11 test flights, the latest one lasting more than two minutes, and even conducted aerial surveys of Jezero Crater. That's the ancient river delta where Perseverance and its hitchhiking chopper landed in February, following a nearly seven-month flight from Earth. Scientists believe the area would have been prime for microscopic life billions of years ago, if it existed.

Nervous About Going Back to Work?

More and more employers are reopening their work sites and requiring their employees to go back to work. Employers and some employees are understandably gung-ho about in-person work. At the same time, current news about the delta variant is making some people nervous. The push-pull between employer and employee wishes is playing out right now, creating anxiety for those uncomfortable being in close proximity with co-workers and customers. Here are two common scenarios I've observed that are causing stress and anxiety:

#1: Your employer is making public statements about a full return to work. You're nervous about going back to in-person work as well as taking public transit. You would prefer to keep your remote work status.

#2: A work event for staff and customers has been planned, but you do not know who is attending, their vaccination status, how much of the event is indoors, or whether masks will be required. Your boss has billed this as a very important event. What do you do if you are nervous about going?

If you are anxious about going back to work in person, there are several avenues you can pursue. However, none of these avenues are guaranteed. But it is always helpful to know your rights as an employee in California.

First and foremost, note that I'm not a legal expert or employment lawyer. I am not providing legal advice in this article. I am only suggesting some general guidelines or resources to provide a starting point. Each person's situation is unique, and employment laws vary between states and counties. Last but not least, requirements during this pandemic have changed faster than I can write these articles. So be sure to stay updated on the latest developments in workplace requirements.

Here are some things you should know:

Your employer can legally fire you for not showing up for work. California is an "at will" state, which means that an employer can terminate your employment for any reason, as long as the reason is not illegal. For instance, you cannot be fired because of your race, gender, or religion. Likewise, you cannot be fired for complaining about health and safety violations.

The Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) has a General Duty Clause that requires workplaces to be free from danger that could cause bodily harm or death. However, this clause might not afford you protection if your employer has taken safety precautions such as social distancing and hygiene protocols.

Those in the private sector are not typically protected by unions. However, private sector workers can turn to the National Labor Relations Board, a federal agency that enforces the National Labor Relations Act, which "guarantees the right of most private sector employees to organize, to engage in group efforts to improve their wages and working conditions." The NLRA covers most private sector employees, with the exception of government, agricultural, and domestic workers.

Another possible means of protection is the Labor Management Relations Act (LMRA) which protects an employee from being fired if they walk off the job because of "abnormally dangerous conditions." Note, however, that it is not easy to meet the standard for "abnormally dangerous conditions."

Those with disabilities might seek protection under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). If you have an underlying medical condition that puts you at higher risk for contracting Covid, your medical condition might fall under the definition of a disability. The ADA requires employers to try and provide reasonable accommodations for all employees with a disability who request one. Those who are pregnant may find help through the Pregnancy Discrimination Act, which requires employers (with more than 15 employees) to provide accommodations.

Know that you are not alone in your anxiety about going back to work. A recent survey found that 39% of the U.S. adults surveyed would consider quitting if their employers were inflexible about remote work. Younger employees appear to be even more adamant about not going back to the office grind. Almost half of those under 40 reported they would consider quitting if remote work was no longer an option.

This article outlined the major employment laws that pertain to Covid concerns. You do not necessarily have to go through these avenues, however. Often, a solid conversation with a thoughtful boss might get you to the remote work nirvana that you seek. Next month I will provide some guidelines for how to talk to your boss about keeping your remote status. Stay tuned!

Bring the tropics home with seven tropical plant suggestions

Travel plans in the year 2021 have been limited at best. Many opted out for safety, quarantine, and other reasons related to Covid-19. However, some people are enjoying other cultures and places even while staying home. Watching the Olympics has been one way people have been able to enjoy other countries. Some have also learned how to cook international cuisines to help quell their travel bug. Museums, historical, and cultural places throughout the world offer virtual tours. Others are choosing to purchase plants to remind them of far-off places. Tropical plants are among the most popular choices that people purchase to remind them of exotic locations.

Tropical plants that do well in the Bay Area are ones that can tolerate a wide range of conditions. Inside the house on a sunny windowsill might seem like an ideal location for most tropical plants, but air-conditioning in the summer and central heating in the winter create a dry climate that is less than ideal for many tropical plants. Exterior tropical plants also face low humidity, scorching sun, and freezing temperatures in winter. Whether a plant is grown inside or outside, the precise location is crucial to its survival and will depend on the specific plant's needs.

There are many tropical plants available that can survive inside and outside in the Bay Area for a



little while, but many will then die. However, some hardier ones can thrive for many years. Here are some tropical and subtropical species or individual plants worth taking a look at for their striking colors, fragrant smells, exotic fruits or nuts, or lush green leaves. These require only a minimal effort to keep them alive to enjoy year after year.

Bromeliads, as most local nurseries will have at least one species, these are one of the easiest plants to purchase, Bromeliad bract colors include pink, salmon, magenta, fuchsia,

burgundy, yellow, orange, red, purple, and white. The strap-like leaves can be just as colorful. They range from dark green to paler shades of green, grey, purple, burgundy, red, pink, yellow, and silver. Most bromeliads, with rare exceptions, flower once and die, but not before sending out a pup or two that will grow into spectacular houseplants the next year.

Green Orange Spider plant (*Chlorophytum orchidastrum*). Related to one of the most common houseplants, the variegated spider plant, this species is a drought tolerant native to tropical and southern regions of Africa. It has bright orange stems that turn into lush green leaves. Besides looking strikingly exotic, this is a great air purifying plant like its variegated cousin.

Sensitive Plant (*Mimosa pudica*). Native to South and Central America, this fascinating plant can fold its leaves closed when shaken, windblown, warmed, or touched. When touched, the two rows of tiny leaflets collapse like falling dominos. Sensitive plants are sometimes referred to as pantropical weeds. If given favorable conditions they are easy



to care for and keep alive as with most "weeds." Sensitive plants make intriguing and fun houseplants.

Gardenias. These tropical and subtropical shrubs can be found in some of the lushest places on earth, including the Deep South where winters can get colder than in the tropics. Some varieties are suited to growing here. Prolific "August Beauty" produces showy fragrant white flowers that will charm the senses beginning in early spring and into fall.

Plumeria. Plumeria is a genus of flowering plants in the family Apocynaceae. The velvety flowers are possibly the most iconic representation of Hawaii and other tropical islands. If a perfume could represent paradise, it might smell like a plumeria flower. Plumerias are most

fragrant at night when currents of the sweet scent flow throughout the garden. They require little water.

Lemon Guava (*Psidium littorale*). Guavas are considered an exotic fruit so it makes sense that they would not be considered for planting in the Bay Area. However, these small subtropical trees can tolerate a wide range of soil types and do not have high water needs. Frilly white flowers will produce yellow fragrant fruits.

Macadamia Nut (*Macadamia integrifolia*). Hawaii produces arguably the best Macadamia nuts in the world. The trees are often overlooked as potential candidates to be planted in this area because of their iconic association with Hawaii. These trees are native to Australia and New Zealand. They are fast growing, frost tolerant, and require little water when established, making them exotic

additions to Bay Area gardens. They can start producing a large quantity of expensive nuts in only five to seven years.

Water rationing cannot be ignored when growing plants in California. Many of the tropical plants above are drought tolerant or fall into the lower water usage category. Many are also sensitive to the chemicals and minerals found in Bay Area tap water. Watering them with collected rainwater is one of the best ways to ensure their survival and your enjoyment of faraway exotic places.

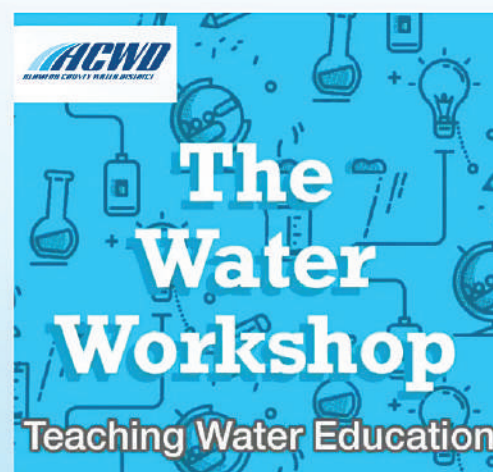

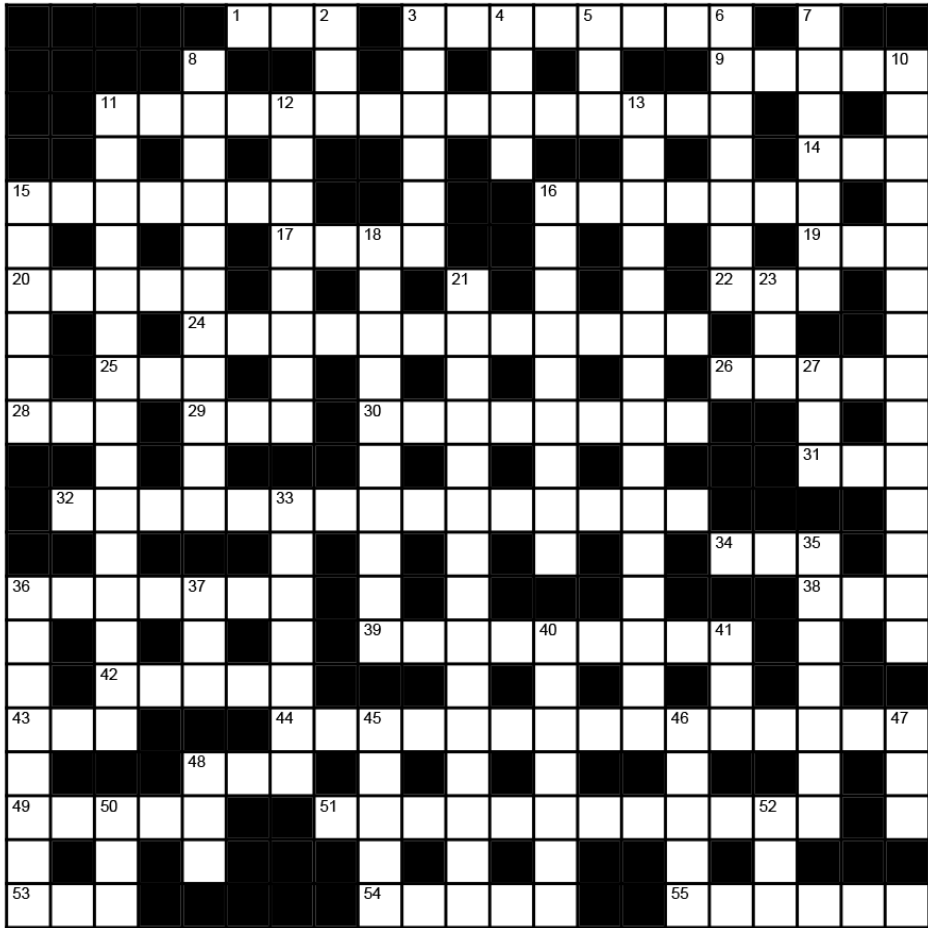

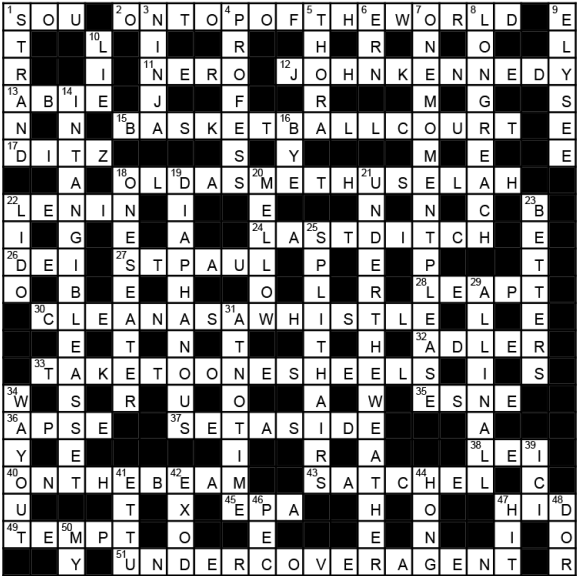

The East Bay Regional Parks are home to a great variety of birds, and watching the avians in action is lots of fun.

"Birding for Beginners" is a good way to start. Naturalist Ashley Adams will offer the introductory program from 8:30 to 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 21 at Black Diamond Mines Regional Preserve in Antioch.

Meet Ashley in the uppermost parking lot at the end of Somersville Road, 3½ miles south of Highway 4.

Reservations are not necessary. Bring your own binoculars if you can (some loaners will be provided). Due to COVID-19 restrictions, masks are recommended and social distancing must be maintained between participants.

The program is free of charge. Black Diamond Mines has a parking fee of \$5 per vehicle when the kiosk is attended. For more information, call (510) 544-2750.

New to following rocket launches? Max Q is a must-know.

KAILASH KALIDOSS, AEROSPACE ENTHUSIAST

We hear a lot of terms during a rocket launch. After all, SpaceX, Boeing, ULA, NASA, and other space agencies have been launching rockets fairly frequently, and the fan-following viewership has been steadily increasing. The term ‘Maximum dynamic pressure’ or Max Q is used in the commentary, and I thought I would explain it in the simplest of terms to our audience.

Usually, Max Q is about a minute and a half into the launch. You hear an excited tone, “We’re approaching Maximum dynamic pressure,” or “We’ve reached Maximum dynamic pressure,” you’re keenly looking for some exciting visual event. Except, nothing happens. The rocket just kept going up. Well, hopefully, it does.

So, what just happened? There were no visible cues, like stage separation, which happens a few minutes later. But Max Q, despite not being visible, is a very important moment during a rocket launch. And also, a high-risk phase.

“Maximum dynamic pressure” is the moment in the launch when the rocket experiences maximum mechanical stress. Which is just a way of saying the rocket is feeling a lot of physical pressure from penetrating through all the air in the atmosphere at a high speed—the most physical stress that a rocket will experience during the entire launch.

Think about the last time you stuck your hand out the window while driving down the road. You felt the pressure of the air hitting against your hand, and it took an effort to keep your hand from snapping back. You can feel this even at moderate speeds. The pressure your hand felt is what we call “dynamic pressure,” and the amount your hand felt depends on two things. The speed of your vehicle, and the air density.

Air density on the surface of the earth is pretty constant, so the only way to affect the amount of pressure

on your hand is to change the speed of the car. Stop the car, and there’s no more pressure on your hand at all. Increase your speed, and the pressure goes up.

But when you’re going to space, the air density is also a factor alongside the speed, because it’s going to go from a maximum air density on the surface of the earth, to effectively zero, no air at all, around sixty miles up at the edge of space. So, we start with zero dynamic pressure when the rocket is sitting on the launch pad because the rocket’s speed is zero. And we end with zero dynamic pressure when the rocket enters space because the air density there is zero.

That means that somewhere during the middle of the launch, the dynamic pressure is going to reach a maximum, as the rocket increases in speed and pushes through the remaining air. If you were to chart the dynamic pressure throughout the rocket launch, it ends up looking like a bell curve. And at the top of this curve is Max Q, the moment of maximum stress on the spacecraft.

Engineers design their rockets to be able to withstand only a certain amount of dynamic pressure, so the rocket

must never exceed the Max Q it was designed for. If it did, the airframe would buckle and the rocket would break apart, likely disintegrating or blowing up. To avoid going past their Max Q value, many rockets are designed to throttle their engines down to 80 or 60 percent of their full power as they approach Max Q, to decrease the amount of dynamic pressure they have to withstand.

They then throttle back up to full power after they’ve made it through most of the atmosphere, and past one of the most dangerous moments of the launch, Max Q. So, the next time you see a rocket launch and they reach Max Q, but nothing happens, you can be reassured that the launch mission is on the right path.

El Salvador Head Coach Hugo Perez Stops By Fremont Rush

Hugo Perez, the Director of Methodology at Fremont Rush and Head Coach of the El Salvador national team, stopped by the pitch this week to run a special practice for our 2011 girls team and share his insights on the game.

Hugo Perez played professionally for the US, Sweden, Saudi Arabia, and his home country of El Salvador. He was inducted to the National Soccer Hall of Fame in 2008 after being named U.S. Soccer Athlete of the Year in 1991. Perez has since gone on to lead the men’s El Salvador National Soccer Team to the quarter final as head coach in the 2020 Gold Cup.

Perez led the 2011 team through an intense training focused around ball control and field positioning. By the time the practice was over, players were on the floor, dripping with sweat. The girls were exhausted, but happy that they got to train with a professional coach.

“It was really hard but so fun! I still can’t believe we were coached by the head of a real pro team,” said Adalia Saha.

When the training was over, I was given the opportunity to talk with Coach Hugo and learn about ways he changed the game for El Salvador. “The biggest thing I’ve tried to change for El Salvador is the mental part. The mentality in how you train, how you play, and, most importantly, to get players to believe in themselves.”

He goes on to talk about the ways he’s taken that mental training to the youth side as Head of Methodology here at Fremont. “First goes to the coaches we have right now, making sure they put the players first and really focusing on them and their abilities, and secondly those coaches have to believe in the philosophy of Fremont Rush and pass it on to the players. There’s a lot of technical stuff here, but more importantly building their confidence in themselves, and once you get players to believe that then the coaches have to be persistent in having them believe in themselves.”

While self-confidence is key in becoming a good player, it’s not the only thing that should be focused on. Ball handling and working at home is something that Coach Hugo stresses to all his players. “The more you practice,



whether it’s at home or at the pitch, the better you become with your feet and the more hours you dedicate, the more it pays off.”

Good players have two qualities, according to Perez. Character and love of the game. Here’s some insight on what character really means to him: “Character has to do with when you’re on the field playing and things aren’t going right or your team is down. That’s when you show what character you really have, showing up for your teammates still and making sure

they are still doing alright, that’s what it’s all about.”

To finish off the interview with Coach Hugo, I talked to him about our eleven Rush core values, asking Perez what he thought the most important value was for him. “Accountability. You have to be accountable, when you start something you have to finish it and finish it the right way.”

The Boogeyman

Constantly faced with significant challenges, daily lives offer unscripted responses that incorporate ingrained responses, assembled over a period of years. Boogeyman lurks in the shadows, waiting for a moment to emerge and in one sense complicate situations, but in another, offer simplistic and easy explanations. A catch phrase, slogan or mantra can identify the Boogeyman as a particular and well-defined adversary, responsible for ill-natured circumstances. Instead of illusive shadows on a wall, a cause of concern and misfortune can be ascribed to something or someone more tangible. It makes no difference that the object of scorn, derision and loathing may be complex and a disparate compilation having little or nothing to do with the misfortune of others. In fact, often those blamed are suffering too.

Misdirection, called “gaslighting”, is often used to manipulate a conversation and inject false information into a discussion of facts and common observations. Reality fades into oblivion as an alternative foundation and premise is established, then used to build a completely different environment. While sometimes employed by average individuals when confronted by unfavorable circumstances, some politicians have elevated and perfected its use to astounding heights. In some political disputes, terminology and verbiage, if carefully examined, have little validity, used to confuse rather than clarify. At least a modicum of precision needs to be observed when engaged in serious discussion or debate. Otherwise, the temptation to create an army of “they” or “others” who become a collective Boogeyman is not only possible, but probable.

One favorite collective term is “government” that usually refers to a particular action, department or agency. If annoyed by the practices or results in a specific decision or circumstance such as border immigration policies for instance, all government is blamed and reviled. This is expanded to become a stain associated with every immigrant, past or present: an impossible position if viewed logically, since very few current residents of the United States can trace their ancestry to Native American roots. Do we validate our rights and value by shades of color, facial characteristics, speech, country of origin or other superficial features? Do we assign Boogeyman status to those who differ in philosophy, training or economic class?

The Boogeyman serves a purpose by alerting us to dangerous situations and helping to avoid them. However, when he/she/it dominates thoughts and actions, negative outcomes are all but assured. The next time you feel the urge to characterize large, disparate groups with a simplistic description, placing wholesale blame and misfortune on all within that assemblage, take a moment to consider whether you are a willing host to the Boogeyman.

19th Annual Independent Watchdog Committee Report to the Public FY2019-20

Measure B and Measure BB Sales Tax Activities

In November 2000, Alameda County voters approved Measure B, which extended the County’s 1986 half-cent transportation sales tax to 2022 and set forth a 20-year Expenditure Plan to enhance the County’s transportation system. 2000 Measure B also established a Citizens Watchdog Committee (CWC) to review all Measure B expenditures for compliance with the Expenditure Plan.

The IWC concludes that 2000 Measure B and 2014 Measure BB tax dollars were spent in accordance with the intent of the two measures during FY2019-20, except as noted on the last page of the full report. However, opportunities for improvement remain.

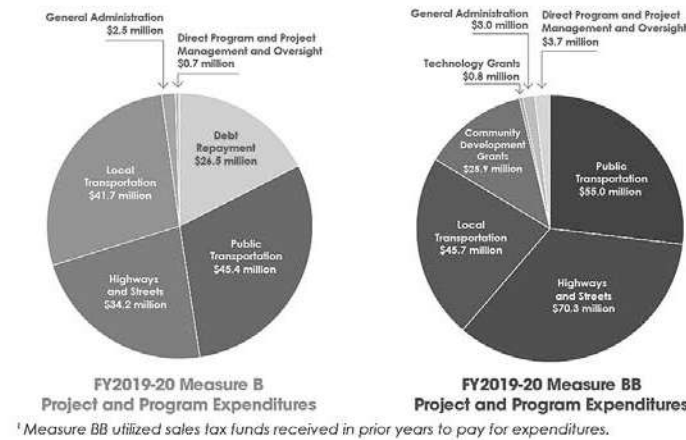
In November 2014, Alameda County voters approved Measure BB, which increased the County’s half-cent transportation sales tax to one full cent, extended the tax through 2045 and set forth a 30-year Expenditure Plan for essential transportation improvements in every city throughout the County.

The 2014 Measure BB established an Independent Watchdog Committee (IWC) that reports its findings annually to the public

to ensure appropriate use of sales tax funds and provides oversight by reviewing Measure B expenditures and Measure BB expenditures and performance measures. The IWC replaced and assumed responsibility for CWC activities in July 2015. The IWC does not opine on other funds the Alameda CTC manages and/or programs. This 19th annual report reviews expenditures and IWC activities during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020 (FY2019-20). The full report is available at www.AlamedaCTC.org/IWC2021Report.

Summary of Revenues and Expenditures

The Alameda County Transportation Commission (Alameda CTC) is responsible for administering the Measure B and Measure BB transportation sales tax measures. In FY2019-20, Measure B revenues for Alameda CTC totaled \$155.4 million, and audited expenditures totaled \$151.0 million. Measure BB revenues totaled \$154.9 million, and audited expenditures totaled \$204.4 million in FY2019-20.¹



Measure B and Measure BB Funded Programs

Alameda CTC allocates approximately 60 percent of Measure B and 65 percent of Measure BB funds on a monthly basis by formula and through competitive grants to local jurisdictions and transit operators for ongoing maintenance, operations and small infrastructure or capital projects.

In FY2019-20, Alameda CTC expended \$86.5 million in Measure B funds and \$106.8 million in Measure BB funds on programs, including local streets and roads, mass transit, special transportation for seniors and people with disabilities, bicycle and pedestrian safety, community development and technology projects.

Measure B and Measure BB Funded Projects

Alameda CTC allocates approximately 40 percent of Measure B and 35 percent of Measure BB funds to capital projects. In FY2019-20, Alameda CTC expended \$34.8 million of 2000 Measure B funds and \$90.9 million of 2014 Measure BB funds on capital projects for transportation infrastructure improvements, such as BART rail modernization and improvements, express lanes, highway and transit improvements, local street and road enhancements, intermodal projects and other local projects.

Independent Watchdog Committee Activities

IWC members performed the following activities from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020.

- Ongoing Programs and Capital Projects Monitoring:** The IWC monitors specific programs, capital projects and issues of concern.
- Independent Audit of Alameda CTC:** The IWC reviews the independent auditor’s plan for the audit before it begins and reviews the draft audited Comprehensive Annual Financial Report regarding Measure B and Measure BB revenues and expenditures.
- Audit and Compliance Report Review:** The IWC members review audited financial statements and compliance reports, including performance measures, received from Measure B and Measure BB direct local distribution (DLD) recipients to ensure expenditures comply with the requirements in the applicable Expenditure Plan.
- Issues Identification Process:** IWC members may request and receive information if they have concerns regarding Measure B and Measure BB expenditures. In FY2019-20, the topics of reallocating Measure BB project funds, City of Oakland local streets and roads performance and performance measure information for the public were addressed using this process.
- Annual Report to the Public:** Each year, the IWC establishes a subcommittee to develop the annual report to the public regarding Measure B and Measure BB expenditures.

California hydroelectric plant shut as water level drops

Drought-stricken California on Thursday shut down one of its largest hydroelectric plants because there’s not enough water to power it.

The six-turbine Edward Hyatt Power Plant was taken off-line after the water level in the Oroville Dam reservoir that feeds it sank to an historic low of less than 642 feet (195.7 meters) above mean sea level.

The reservoir in the Sierra Nevada foothills north of Sacramento was less than a quarter full.

It was the lowest level since the nation’s tallest dam was completed in 1967 and the first time the hydroelectric plant has been idled by lack of water, officials said.

The plant can produce enough power for 80,000 homes and businesses but its shutdown had been expected “and the state has planned for its loss in both water and (electrical) grid management,” said a statement from the state Department of Water Resources.

“Steps have been taken in anticipation of the loss of power generation,” the statement said.

“This is just one of many unprecedented impacts we are experiencing in California as a result of our climate-induced drought,” agency director Karla Nemeth said.

The western United States is in the midst of an historic drought that is emptying reservoirs and contributing to massive wildfires.

Extreme conditions are often from a combination of unusual random, short-term and natural weather patterns heightened by long-term, human-caused climate change that has made the West much warmer and drier in the past 30 years.

Hydroelectricity provides about 15% of California electricity but production has plummeted in recent years. Gov. Gavin Newsom last month signed an emergency proclamation suspending certain requirements so the state could obtain additional power capacity to avoid blackouts under high-demand conditions.

The low water level at Lake Oroville is a far cry from four years ago, when more than 180,000 people were evacuated after heavy winter storms filled the reservoir and its two spillways collapsed. The feared uncontrolled release of massive amounts of water didn’t happen but the state was left with a \$1 billion repair bill.

Bond sale to fund Union Sanitary District infrastructure projects

Union Sanitary District (USD) recently sold bonds to fund \$110 million in capital improvement projects. The goal is to renew and replace aging infrastructure, enhance wastewater treatment processes, and increase resiliency of district facilities to extreme weather events and climate change.

The funds will be applied to USD’s Capital Improvement Program (CIP), which is estimated to be more than \$1.1 billion over the next 20 years. Financing CIP projects spreads these large costs over a period of time to help stabilize rates for customers.

The interest rate on USD’s 30-year bonds is 2.02%. "Prior to the bond sale, the district received new credit ratings," said General Manager Paul Eldredge. This resulted in an upgrade from S&P to a AAA rating, which led to savings from the anticipated interest rate of 2.44%. Over the 30-year life of the bonds, the lower interest rate will save the district over \$17.3 million dollars.

District projects funded by the bonds will include a portion of Phase 1A of USD’s Enhanced Treatment and Site Upgrade Program (ETSU), a component of the largest capital improvement program in district history. Earlier this year, USD was selected by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to apply for a Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act loan with a very low interest rate to fund 49% of the ETSU program. The district’s bonds will also fund additional improvements at USD’s Union City treatment plant and its pump stations in Newark and Irvington.

USD operates a 33-million gallon per day wastewater treatment facility in Union City and provides collection, treatment, and disposal services to a population of more than 356,000 in Fremont, Newark and Union City.

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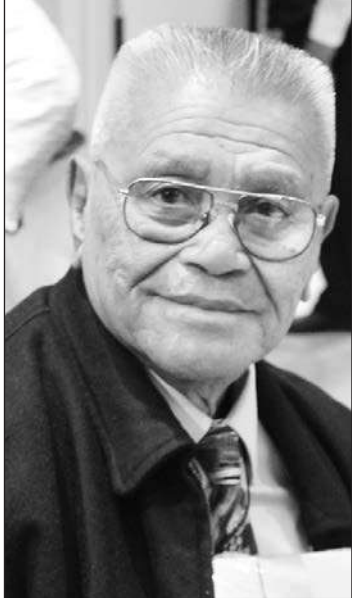

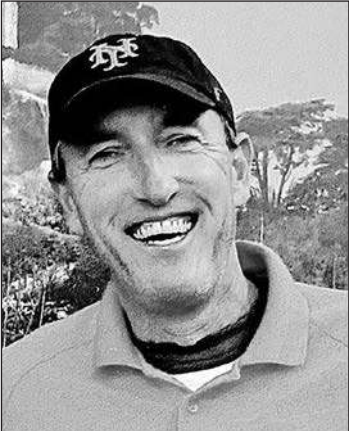
Jeffery Dean Plaskett

Facebook snafu spells trouble for gardening group

Moderating a Facebook gardening group in western New York is not without challenges. There are complaints of wooly bugs, inclement weather and the novice members who insist on using dish detergent on their plants. And then there's the word "hoe."

Facebook's algorithms sometimes flag this particular word as "violating community standards," apparently referring to a different word, one without an "e" at the end that is nonetheless often misspelled as the garden tool.

Normally, Facebook's automated systems will flag posts with offending material and delete them. But if a group's members -- or worse, administrators -- violate the rules too many times, the entire group can get shut down.

Elizabeth Licata, one of the group's moderators, was worried about this. After all, the group, WNY Gardeners, has more than 7,500 members who use it to get

gardening tips and advice. It's been especially popular during the pandemic when many homebound people took up gardening for the first time.

A hoe by any other name could be a rake, a harrow or a rototill. But Licata was not about to ban the word from the group, or try to delete each instance. When a group member commented "Push pull hoe!" on a post asking for "your most loved & indispensable weeding tool," Facebook sent a notification that said "We reviewed this comment and found it goes against our standards for harassment and bullying."

Facebook uses both human moderators and artificial intelligence to root out material that goes against its rules. In this case, a human likely would have known that a hoe in a gardening group is likely not an instance of harassment or bullying. But AI is not always good at context and the nuances of language.

It also misses a lot -- users often complain that they report violent or abusive language and Facebook rules that it's not in violation of its community

standards. Misinformation on vaccines and elections has been a long-running and well-documented problem for the social media company. On the flip side are groups like Licata's that get caught up in overly zealous algorithms.

"And so, I contacted Facebook, which was useless. How do you do that?" she said. "You know, I said this is a gardening group, a hoe is gardening tool." Licata said she never heard from a person and Facebook, and found navigating the social network's system of surveys and ways to try to set the record straight was futile.

Contacted by The Associated Press, a Facebook representative said in an email this week that the company found the group and corrected the mistaken enforcements. It also put an extra check in place, meaning that someone -- an actual person -- will check offending posts before the group is considered for deletion. The company would not say if other gardening groups had similar problems. (In January, Facebook mistakenly flagged the U.K. landmark of Plymouth Hoe as offensive, then apologized, according to The Guardian.)

"We have plans to build out better customer support for our products and to provide the public with even more information about our policies and how we enforce them," Facebook said in a statement in response to Licata's complaints.

Then, something else came up. Licata received a notification that Facebook automatically disabled commenting on a post because of "possible violence, incitement, or hate in multiple comments." The offending comments included "Kill them all. Drown them in soapy water," and "Japanese beetles are jerks."

Whatever prompted it in the first place, a law making it illegal for barber shops to cut hair in New York on Sunday has been repealed, according to the Association of Mature American Citizens [AMAC]. The law, which had been on the books for more than a century, called for a \$5 fine for a first offense, the equivalent of about \$75 in 2021 dollars. And a two-time loser would have been fined up to \$25 and/or imprisoned for up to 25 days. No one seems to know what prompted the law in the first place, but Republican state Senator Joe Griffo, who introduced the bill to repeal it points out that “Barbershops and salons, like all small businesses, have faced significant, unprecedented and strenuous challenges during the coronavirus pandemic.” It’s unlikely a barber would be cited by police if caught plying his trade on Sunday.

Baby boomlet

A COVID-19 baby boom had been expected but it never happened -- at least not on a nationwide scale, reports AMAC. But Andrews Women’s Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas experienced a mini boom recently, delivering 107 newborns in the space of just 91 hours. It’s what can happen when you’re cooped up at home under isolation with a lot of time on your hands such as what has been a fact of life for nearly one and a half years.

Who would have thought that a serving of macaroni and cheese could be so refreshing on a hot summer day? AMAC reports that the Brooklyn-based Van Leeuwen Ice Cream Company churned up a batch of mac and cheese flavored ice cream and it did the trick and got an "overwhelming response.” The folks at Van Leeuwen boasted of its success on social media saying they were sold out in quick time.

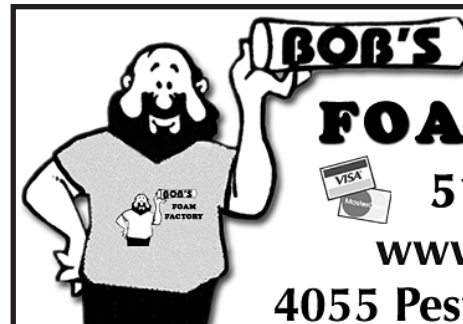

Schools find ways to keep gardening lessons blooming

Like gardening in general, school gardening has become hugely popular during the pandemic, with families and teachers saying its hands-on lessons can be applied to many subjects. Finding the expertise, labor and funding to keep a school garden going can be tough. But some experts and teachers are finding creative ways to make it work.
“Gardens are a great way to get kids outside with a purpose. With gardens, kids get to see a beginning, a middle and an end to their project, with tangible results,” said Susan Hobart, a retired elementary school teacher at Lake View Elementary School in Madison, Wisconsin, who now oversees the school’s large garden with 12 raised beds. “The gardens relax the kids and give them a whole different perspective they wouldn’t have just sitting at desk,” she said.
Each spring, the school’s program gets plant seedlings grown through a training program at a nearby state prison. A church group comes during spring break to prepare the garden for the kids’ return, and over the summer, an AmeriCorps volunteer takes care of the garden. “If we had to buy the seedlings, they’d cost \$3 each and we could never afford that,” Hobart said, adding that, “If you take a look at your relationships and the

community around you and then all the wider networks out there, there are plenty of creative ways to find help.”
Interest in school gardens spiked dramatically when Michelle Obama planted a garden at the White House and invited schoolchildren to help, said Toby Adams, who directs the New York Botanical Garden’s 3-acre Edible Academy in the Bronx, where schoolchildren learn about growing food. There’s been another burst of interest since the pandemic started.
School gardens can teach hands-on lessons in health, science, social studies, and even humanities and arts classes. “Luckily, the big trend now is that there are more and more organizations and support networks, particularly regional networks, to help support school gardens,” said Adams. “And online learning has really exploded since the pandemic. Giving kids the opportunity to move outside, get their hands dirty, and find worms, especially if their teachers are excited about it -- that’s huge,” Adams said.
For schools without space for even a small garden, turning to local botanical gardens and parks can sometimes be the answer. “We are located in the Bronx, which is basically wall to wall six-story apartment buildings. There’s limited space, and vandalism, and it’s hard to find a good place to gather 30 kids, not to mention issues like water access,” said Adams.

“Gardening doesn’t have to be a big patch outdoors. It could be a container garden, a hydroponic garden -- there are all kinds of gardens and ways it can work,” he said.
Hobart suggests finding a Master Gardener program, sometimes offered through universities, since graduates must put in a number of hours of free labor to earn their certification. “It’s taken us 10 years to get here, but we did it,” she said.
Nathan Larson, who leads the Cultivate Health Initiative, a collaborative project involving the University of Wisconsin-Madison and statewide partners to support Wisconsin’s school gardens, said his “aha” moment came when he realized the group was supporting two gardens within 5 miles of each other, and neither knew the other existed.
“It became clear that teachers and parents involved with school gardens felt isolated and didn’t know where to turn for support,” said Larson, who wrote a free downloadable book, Teaching in Nature’s Classroom.
At the national level, two major resources for school gardens are The National Farm to School Network and the School Garden Support Organization Network.
There’s also the National Children and Youth Garden Symposium, organized by the American Horticulture Society to train teachers and others. The symposium is held in a different part of the country each

year; the past two years, it was held online. Life Lab, based in Santa Cruz, California, offers workshops for educators across the country on how to engage young people in gardens and on farms. The Junior Master Gardener Program is a youth gardening program run by Texas A&M University’s cooperative Extension network. Other resources for teachers and others include the National COVID-19 Outdoor Learning Initiative, the Edible Schoolyard Network, Slow Food USA School Garden Network and Big Green.
zRon Finley has been an outspoken supporter of the transformative powers of teaching city kids about seeds and growing. His non-profit Ron Finley Project aims to “change the culture around food.”
Finley recalled being amazed as a boy when he witnessed, as part of a class project in his South Central Los Angeles school, how “a seed literally destroys itself to become food.”
“Having a garden in a school is just as important as any other education,” Finley said. “The act of gardening teaches you where our food source comes from and teaches you to have a reverence for soil. If kids have a reverence for soil, they have a reverence for themselves and respect for this planet. Gardening should be part of the main curriculum. Gardening is not a hobby, it’s a life skill. I see this as one of the most valuable lessons of humanity.”

The young readers edition, announced July 14 by Random House Children’s Books, comes out Oct. 5 and will feature a new introduction by the former president. “The young man you meet in these pages is flawed and full of yearning, asking questions of himself and the world around him, learning as he goes,” Obama writes. “I know now, of course, that this was just the beginning for him. If you’re lucky, life provides you with a good long arc.”
Obama’s wife, former first lady Michelle Obama, released a young readers edition of her memoir “Becoming” earlier this year.

Bus museum opens doors to transportation history

“We have highway coaches, transit buses and a special little bus that’s extremely rare,” said Richard Leijonflycht, president of the museum. “It’s a 1932

Another favorite is a 1958 General Motors transit bus sporting an Art Deco color scheme of white and green with yellow stripes, inspired by city buses seen

Twin Coach from East Bay Transit where it was used to pick up people in the [Oakland and Berkeley] neighborhoods and take them to the Key System train so that they could ride over to San Francisco.” The Twin Coach, under restoration at the museum, is the smallest in the collection with a capacity of 17 passengers.

Because Twin Coach buses are so rare, museum officials said it's unlikely most visitors will have ever seen one in person. "There are only about four that have survived out of about 45 to 50 that were built," explained Tom Shafer, the museum's vice-president and archivist, adding that they were used until the late 1950s.

Their largest bus? “A 40-foot Greyhound Scenicruiser, manufactured by General Motors during the mid-1950s,” Leijonflycht said. The two-level, 45-seat luxury coach offered a comfortable ride for long-distance highway travelers with plush seats and wide observation windows. There were just 1,001 of them built.

But there's a whole lot more to see: big, small, and colorful coaches from various manufacturers and operators including General Motors, Gillig, Fageol, Peerless Stages and others. Leijonflycht said there are 28 buses in the museum's collection with 18 operating coaches in Fremont and the rest at a storage facility in the city of Williams, about 60 miles northwest of Sacramento.

Not to be missed is a colorful and carefully restored 1955 Peerless Stages System coach with an Art Deco paint scheme, topped by a black roof, complemented with dramatic red and yellow side accents.

in San Francisco during the 1930s and 1940s. The bus was acquired by the museum in the early 2000s. From 2006 to 2013, it carried Niles Canyon Railway passengers to trains traveling between Niles and Sunol. Niles Coach Line name is still printed on the outside of the bus.

Finally, a unique feature to see is a cash register used in place of a fare box in one of the museum's Peerless Stages System coaches. According to museum members Ron Medaglia, Peerless dates back to 1917 and for many years operated bus service from Oakland, through Niles, Centerville, and San Jose, and on to Santa Cruz. To accommodate beach-goers, extra buses often ran on weekends.

Some of the museum's coaches have appeared in popular Hollywood movies. The Niles Coach Line bus appeared in the

2014 movie “Jersey Boys” directed by Clint Eastwood. Medaglia, who accompanied the bus on the movie set, said it was a highlight for him to meet Eastwood when he came aboard the bus to look it over.

A vintage S.F. Muni bus, a school bus and three coaches painted as Greyhound buses appeared as backdrops in the 2007 movie "Zodiac" starring Jake Gyllenhaal and set in 1970s San Francisco. The museum received payments from both movie production companies for the use of their buses.
