# Las Posadas tradition carries on

Las Posadas, a Mexican Christmas tradition, will be once again celebrated virtually. Julie Gilson, Fremont Cultural Arts Council (FCAC) President said, "I'm glad FCAC, Old Mission Jose and Mission San Jose Chamber of Commerce are continuing their partnership to bring this annual holiday musical event to the Tri-City area." The yearly celebration will run on Zoom on the nights of December 15 through 23.

The advent season has been celebrated for nine days locally for the past thirty-nine years. As Knuti VanHoven, FCAC board member and driving force behind the event pointed out, "When COVID reared its ugly head last year, Las Posadas, which has always been held in-person, was almost cancelled.

But it survived as members of the sponsoring organizations decided to save it as a Zoom event, still with home-grown entertainment by actors and singers who live or work in Fremont."

Fremont's version of Las Posadas has grown out of the Central American tradition of people assembling on the church steps every evening for nine days singing carols, carrying a beautiful image of the Holy Family. Still singing, the carolers form a procession and walk to a pre-determined local business. There, the leader reads the lines of Joseph from the Bible asking for shelter. The business owner plays the Mean Inn-Keeper who at first turns them away. The owner then relents and invites them inside where they're treated to a party with live entertainment organized by FCAC and refreshments provided by the hosts.

# 'Tis the Season: It's time to get your flu vaccine

The holidays are here and that means that it is also flu season. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), cases of influenza typically begin to rise in October, with the highest number occurring December through February. In the United States, an average of 8 percent of the population is infected with the flu each season. During the 2017-2018 flu season, the worst in recent years, 52,000 Americans died of the flu.

With so much focus on COVID-19 (the death rate for Americans from COVID-19 has been recorded at 730,000), it is easy to forget the importance of protecting yourself from seasonal illnesses. Influenza, a respiratory virus that infects the nose, throat, and lungs, can lead to life-threatening symptoms—or simply feeling lousy and needing to miss work or school. To help avoid the worst outcomes, Washington Township Medical Foundation's board-certified internal medicine specialist Rajvir Shahi, MD, advises that anyone 6 months or older receive the flu vaccine.

Some individuals, she notes, are more vulnerable than others to flu-related complications. "The vaccine is particularly recommended for young children and seniors, pregnant women, and those with chronic health conditions such as asthma, heart disease, lung disease, and diabetes. In addition, anyone working in higher-risk settings, such as long-term care facilities,



should be vaccinated to protect themselves and patients."

Because flu viruses are constantly changing, each year the flu vaccine's composition is a little different. This year, the majority of flu cases diagnosed so far have been the AH3N2 flu virus variant. A whopping 90 percent of those with the variant have been children and young adults aged 5-24 years.

#### For the best immunity, flu shots are needed annually

To be effective, flu vaccines need to be administered annually. Dr. Shahi explains, "There are two reasons why people need annual flu vaccines. The first is that immunity to the flu provided by a vaccine declines over time. The second is that because the flu virus changes, a new vaccine is needed each year to optimize

a person's immunity to the newest flu

The degree of immunity provided by the flu vaccine can differ from person to person. The CDC reports that the flu vaccine has been shown to reduce the risk of having to go to the doctor by 40 to 60 percent, and prevents tens of thousands of hospitalizations each year. One 2021 study cited by the CDC showed that adults who had been vaccinated and still got the flu had a 26 percent lower risk of being admitted to the ICU and a 31 percent lower risk of death than those who were unvaccinated.

"Getting vaccinated is not only about your own health; being vaccinated can also protect the people around you, your colleagues and family," says Dr. Shahi. "Babies too young to be vaccinated, the elderly, and others with chronic health conditions are particularly susceptible to the flu. By getting vaccinated, you are lowering their risk of the flu as well as your own."

#### The flu vaccine cannot give someone the flu

Some people avoid getting the flu vaccine out of a misguided fear that the vaccine itself will infect them with the flu. "One of the top reasons my patients decline the flu vaccine is that they incorrectly believe there is a risk they will get the flu from it," says Dr. Shahi.

# San Ramon Woman Put on Her Stilettos Before Heading to Chemotherapy

Breast Cancer Survivor
Says Dressing Up Made Her Feel Better

Looking good. Local woman fights cancer her way.

Surbhi Pir is on the other side of her breast cancer journey. She finished treatment at the UCSF - Washington Cancer Center in July and after a clean MRI, was declared cancer-free. But she's not the same woman she was when it all started. For her, it was a transformative experience that forever changed her—for the better.

"It was scary, but it was also an opportunity to focus on myself and think about what's really important and what's not, and give myself a little more balance at work," said Pir, who is a senior regional director at a large staffing company. "Now I'm focused on things that are more meaningful for me and my family."

Her journey started in September 2020, when she discovered a lump in her breast during a self-exam, and a diagnostic mammogram confirmed it was cancer. But she didn't feel comfortable with what she was hearing where she was first diagnosed, so she went to see Dr. William E. Dugoni

Jr., a surgeon with Washington Township Medical Foundation and medical director of the Washington Women's Center.

"I knew as soon as I met him that I was in the right place," Pir said. "This guy just instilled confidence in me. Everyone at Washington Hospital was amazing. There's just something special about the people who work there."

She was impressed by the coordination of her care team. Pir said everyone seemed to be working together on her behalf, from the nurse navigator who helped guide her through the process, scheduling appointments and helping her get what she needed, to the doctors, nurses and others who provided her care.

Pir went to all of her appointments dressed to the nines – including doctor visits as well as chemotherapy and radiation treatments.

"I put on my stilettos and dressed like I was going to something fun," she said. "My doctor told me in all his years of practice he had never seen anything like it. It was something I could control. It made me feel good, not like I was sick. I went with full makeup, the whole thing."

#### Seamless Care

Pir said her nurse navigator sat down with her and went through everything so she knew what to expect. Nurse navigators are provided to patients through the Washington Women's Center, which has been accredited by The National Accreditation Program for Breast Centers, a nongovernmental, not-for-profit organization that has been established to identify and recognize breast centers providing quality care in the United States.

She started chemotherapy in November 2020 at the Sandy Amos RN Infusion Center at Washington West. With a view of the beautiful atrium area, it was designed to be patient-centered and features eight private infusion chairs. Her chemo treatments were a success, shrinking the tumor in her breast, she said.

Then in May 2020, she had a lumpectomy to remove any remaining cancer that might be in the margins around the tumor as well as reconstructive surgery. That was followed by radiation treatments in July 2020 at the Washington Radiation Oncology Center.

"I just can't say enough good things about the treatment I received," Pir added. "The coordination made it seamless, which gave me confidence and peace of mind. Everyone was incredibly supportive, kind and caring. There was not one person I came in contact with who I didn't think was exceptional. I'm glad my treatment is over, but I miss the people."

# "Sewing Bees"

When disaster struck back in March 2020, so did the desire to help those in the community. This statement sums up Christ the King Lutheran Church and its "Sewing Bees."

Sewing Bees are church members who have been making a difference in the community for quite some time. For years they have been sewing pillow cases for domestic violence nonprofit

patients and prayer shawls. But with so many people in urgent need of masks at the start of the pandemic, they expanded their generosity. The group was approached by social ministry leader Laurel King with the idea of making masks, and Sewing Bees took on the challenge with open arms.

The first few months started out slow, with supplies scarce and volunteers having to find simple patterns that everyone would be able to follow. Community members began graciously

donating whatever scraps of fabric they could find lying around. This coupled with simple YouTube tutorials got Sewing Bees past their main obstacle.

Putting masks together was a fairly simple process, but still incredibly time consuming. Sewers had to start out by picking up materials, then washing and ironing each individual piece. From there Sewing Bees would cut out fabric and begin the assembly process, adding in nose pieces, elastic ear loops and inserts for a filter.





notes on how to wash and care for the handmade masks.

The group started to take off, sewing masks for a variety of different organizations such as Kaiser, nursing homes, Fremont Police Department, HERS Breast

calling to see how many masks they needed and if there were any specifications," says "Sewing Bee" department asked for black masks them to their kids at home, since at work nurses could only wear

Sewing Bees' largest project hundred masks to local school backpack distributions. "Lutheran Church donated three hundred packs, and in each backpack five masks. Seeing the kids light up as they received a bag with supplies for the school year was truly something special.

Everyone was so kind and I couldn't tell you how many 'thank yous' we received."

Along their journey, Sewing Bees made countless friendships with fellow Church members and others out in the community. They were met with support from everyone and people from all over offered help in any way they could.

"I just want to again thank everyone who helped us. None of it would have been possible without the support of the community and our church, Christ the King Lutheran. We were met with such a large amount of gratitude it was unbelievable. Everyone was so kind and it was wonderful to see what a difference we were making."

As the pandemic winds down, Sewing Bees are too, and production has been scaled back. They donated a total of 9,100 masks over the past two years, and are ready to jump back to their machines and rev up production the moment they are asked.

#### 'Tis the Season: It's time to get your flu vaccine

"But the flu vaccine cannot cause the flu. The type of flu vaccine administered by a shot is made with an inactivated virus, meaning that the virus used in the vaccine is no longer infectious. Similarly, the flu vaccine one receives by nasal spray contains an attenuated or weakened virus that cannot be contracted."

Side effects from the flu shot sometimes include soreness, redness, and a little swelling where the shot was given. Rarely, some may experience a headache, low fever, nausea, muscle aches, and fatigue that might last for a day or two following the shot. In extremely rare instances, a person can have an allergic reaction to the flu vaccine.

#### "I knew someone who got sick after getting a flu shot"

While the flu vaccine does not cause the flu, there are several reasons why someone who has received the vaccine might become ill in the weeks that follow. The first is that it takes about two weeks after the flu vaccine is administered for an individual to develop the antibodies that protect against the virus. In that time period, if a person is exposed to the flu, they will not be protected. Similarly, if someone is exposed to the flu prior to being vaccinated, the vaccine will not be able to protect them. Dr. Shahi says, "There are a lot of reasons why a vaccinated person might still become sick.

In addition to their being exposed to the flu virus before their vaccine took effect, there are other seasonal respiratory viruses they may have contracted, including the common cold."

#### The flu vaccine saves lives

With winter just around the corner, the colder weather means more people will spend more time indoors in close proximity, raising their likelihood of spreading the flu. For the vast majority of people, the flu vaccine is a safe way to reduce the chance of contracting influenza or infecting others with it.

"Simply put, the flu vaccine saves lives. A lot of people don't think that the flu is a big deal, but that isn't true. Every year,

millions of people contract the flu, and thousands are hospitalized or die from it. This still happens despite the ease and benefits of getting vaccinated," notes Dr. Shahi.

One of East Bay Regional Park District's newer parks is the destination for a Saturday Stroll from 10 a.m. to 12 noon on December 11, led by naturalist Michael Charnofsky. It's a flat, three-mile walk at Encinal Beach in Alameda, a beautiful shoreline park with spectacular bay scenery. You'll likely see wintering shorebirds, basking harbor seals and views of the USS Hornet aircraft carrier museum.

This is a free program and registration is not required. Just show up. The entrance road to the beach is on Central Avenue right next to Encinal High School. For information and directions, call Crab Cove Visitor Center at (510) 544-3187.

At Ardenwood Historic Farm in Fremont, Victorian-era Patterson House is all decked out in Christmas finery. Docent-led tours of the house highlight Victorian-inspired decorations and holiday traditions. Free tours are available for visitors and organized groups at various times from Thursdays through Sundays. Check at the Ardenwood train station upon arrival for tour availability. Or you can book large groups and inquire about the weekday tour schedule by calling (510) 544-3289.

Besides house tours, there are lots of other activities available at Ardenwood. # Candlelight Vigil for the homeless

The 8th annual Candlelight Vigil for late members of the homeless community was held Monday, November 29. The event was presented by Abode Services, a homeless assistance organization; St. James' Episcopal Church; and Tri-City Interfaith Council. The Vigil began with a performance of the song "Light a Candle," by Jennifer and Joey Carini, as flames were brought to attendees who stood in a circle around a table of 79 candles. Each candle on the table had the name of a homeless individual who passed away this year. As flames started to burn brightly in handheld candles, speaker Reverend Lori Walton of St. Joseph's Episcopal Church emphasized the significance of having the homeless community members' names on candles "to release their names to the universe in prayer."

After a moment of silence, the names and a description of the 79 homeless individuals from Santa Clara and Alameda County who died were read by Katie Fantin from Abode Services. Descriptions, provided by staff workers who knew these individuals, ranged from witty

one-liners of an individual's love of loud music, to more serious details such as one man's caring nature towards his family.

Director of Communications at Abode Services, Bronwyn Hogan, believed that "hearing something personal about these individuals created a sense of togetherness."

After the reading of names, Reverend Barbara Meyers and Shamsa Rafay, members of Tri-City Interfaith Council, offered prayers from their respective faiths: Unitarian Universalism and Islam. Rafay introduced the idea from Islamic scripture that "Islam emphasizes our individual duty towards neighbors" and stressed how the community needs to feel a sense of responsibility to their neighborhood in order to battle homelessness and poverty.

Several other interfaith members of the community, including members from Hindu, Christian, Buddhist, and Jewish communities, also said short prayers in memory of homeless individuals. Rabbi Zöe McCoon presented a prayer that is traditionally used after someone has died. In the prayer, she asked God that the individuals "experience perfect rest under the


shelter of God's presence," and followed up by singing a traditional Jewish hymn.

The evening ended with Louis Chicoine, CEO of Abode Services, providing an urgent call to action to local communities to address the problem of homelessness in the Bay Area. He emphasized how homelessness can be solved with collective effort, also mentioning that opportunities to volunteer for homeless shelters have increased due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"[Homeless people] have the right to be remembered," Chicoine expressed as he emphasized the current crisis in the Bay Area, an area with uncounted homeless bodies due to the sheer number of homeless people present. Organizations like Abode have been established to help the homeless community and fight against this crisis. Abode's call to action and the prayers from the Interfaith council emphasize one main idea: the only way to solve homelessness is through a strong and united community.

#### **Trash Talk**

This is the eleventh edition of Trash Talk, a column devoted to cleaning up our neighborhoods.

Every time you choose to recycle, you're giving that item a second life to serve a new purpose and save natural resources. Now more than ever, it's important that only the right items, free from contamination, make their way into your recycling bin.

#### **Seasonal Recycling**

#### Wrapping Paper:

Paper is recyclable, so don't just put it in the landfill.

- Remove sticky tape.
- Ribbons and bows are not recyclable, but can be stored and reused next year.
- Recycle most wrapping paper, but not the foil or glitter-decorated type. Those are considered trash.
- Cardboard boxes and cartons can be flattened and put in recycling bins or saved to use again later.

#### **Christmas Trees:**

Consider buying a live tree that you can then plant in your yard. Ours is over 40 years old and about 20 feet tall! If you buy a fresh-cut tree, don't forget to water it. You can use water caught from rinsing vegetables to save water. Instead of using a wooden tree stand, there are bowl-shaped ones you can use that will hold water and keep the tree fresh longer. The important thing is you don't need a fire hazard. After Christmas most sanitation services will pick trees up for free; just follow the instructions for your specific waste management company.

• Trees cannot exceed the limit for length and may need to be cut. Check with your service provider.

- Remove tinsel, lights and ornaments. Trees are going into the chipper.
- Put your tree on the curb the night before your regularly-scheduled pickup.



#### **December 1 through 15**

#### **Driven to success**

America's "second" Revolution -- the Industrial of the 19th and 20th centuries -- was pioneered by inventors, engineers, scientists, and -- Henry Ford -- arguably the most prolific. In 1908, he reset the way in which people traveled with the debut of his Model T, a "simple, sturdy and relatively inexpensive" motor car, according to History.com.

Five years later -- on December 1, 1913 -- Ford transformed his "horseless carriage" into a faster, cheaper machine, and incorporated an assembly line that permitted efficient mass production; up until then half a day was required to build each automobile; now, with the modernized manufacturing methods, only an hour and a half was necessary. Ford was determined to ensure that "everybody will have one."

"By 1920, there were over eight million registrations. The 1920s saw tremendous growth in automobile ownership, with the number of registered drivers almost tripling to twenty-three million by the end of the decade," observed the U.S. History Website.

#### A fond farewell

On December 4, 1783 -- three months after the official end of the American revolution, George Washington threw a party for his officers. It was a bittersweet occasion for the General, who had conducted a six-year battle against the Redcoats to ensure a free American homeland; now, he was traveling to Annapolis, Maryland to resign his commission.

History.com noted that "Observers of the intimate scene at Fraunces Tavern in New York City, described Washington as 'suffused in tears,' embracing his officers one by one after issuing his farewell."

That night, Washington told them: "With a heart full of love and gratitude, I now take leave of you. I most devoutly wish that your latter days may be as prosperous and happy as your former ones have been glorious and honorable. I cannot come to each of you but shall feel obliged if each of you will come and take me by the hand."

#### A legend remembered

The rough and tumble Buffalo Bill Cody of the Wild West gave up his life on the American frontier, but he held on to his six-guns for an 1872 trip to Chicago; on December 11 of that year, he starred in a stage production of "The Scouts of the Prairie." The play was panned by critics, but audiences thronged to see him at the theatre.

By that time, Buffalo Bill was a national folk hero because a dime novel author, Ned Buntline, had portrayed him as "a mixture of incredible fact and romantic fiction," according to the World History Project. His books glorified Cody's life and times, chronicling his role "taming the wild, wild west," in 1,700 volumes.

Cody liked show business so much, that he performed for another decade; then, in 1883, he created Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, about his real-life adventures. It toured the country 30 years, and barnstormed Europe eight times. He died in 1917.

# Tiny homes a big ally in fighting homelessness

Homelessness in Oakland and San Jose has been a long-time concern. Both cities have hit on a unique solution: using tiny home communities to give the homeless access to shelter and a variety of resources as a stepping stone towards achieving permanent housing.

The primary focus of tiny home communities has not only been in providing housing, but using public land for public good. Oakland Council President Nikki Fortunato Bas, who has led advocacy for this project since 2019, states, "We wanted to use a vacant large parcel of land in District 2 productively by putting into place the lessons and feedback we have received from the community and unhoused neighbors regarding our growing homeless population."

A grand opening event for Lakeview Village, a tiny home community that recently opened to house up to 65 unhoused residents in the Lake Merritt area, was held on November 1, 2021. In San Jose, Santa Clara County put up their own interim tiny homes development in early 2021, naming it Casitas de Esperanza, meaning "Little Houses of Hope," at the Civic Center. Both projects have ensured that homelessness is directly addressed through new avenues, beginning with additional amenities that are not currently available in other emergency housing options.

Upgraded amenities have been a priority when constructing these communities. Oakland has partnered with Housing Consortium of the East Bay, a non-profit organization dedicated to

Electricity, heat, lockable doors and windows, foldable beds, carbon monoxide monitors, and several other features are included. Council President Bas states, "We want to improve physical living conditions and not have residents back out on the street." To further support these residents, comprehensive care services have also been made accessible.

Many unhoused are struggling with financial, physical, and mental health issues. Santa Clara County Supervisor Otto Lee states, "We understand that these residents are undergoing a wide range of overwhelming circumstances, which is why we have services like assistance for job placement, medical and behavioral health, credit repair, and other onsite support." Residents not only gain guidance towards finding permanent housing, but obtain knowledge on employment and finances that will boost their long-term stability.

Community councils are also present to support program goals and address challenges. Council President Bas explains, "The community council will be made up of unhoused residents themselves, along with members from nearby neighborhoods, small businesses, and Housing Consortium of the East Bay representatives." Such services create a tight-knit community for residents who may feel isolated and lost. In addition to current resources, future plans are being proposed.

While Pallet Shelters have been commended for their durability and efficiency in set-up, Supervisor Lee hopes to further upgrade transitional housing options. "We requested that the County Administration find vacant or under-utilized sites in San Jose for short-term housing development with safe parking," he states. Expanding homeless community spaces promotes proactive solution-seeking while still working towards long-term solutions that often take years to complete.

In fall 2021, Supervisor Lee constructed a proposal for shipping container homeless

housing units, which are just as mobile and sturdy as Pallet Shelters. "When I remembered serving my Navy time in Iraq, we got to stay in housing units made from shipping containers," he shares. "Not only did I feel safe and had privacy, but I was completely protected from the outside elements and it was significantly better than our tents." If funding is available and approved for unused land, these shipping container-based shelters can be built. Council President Bas also aims to continue utilizing other available parcels of land in developing homeless communities that will get people off the streets and into interim housing.

"The unhoused are also working individuals who simply cannot make ends meet and therefore have to live out of their cars or on the road. We must educate ourselves to ensure that negative notions against the homeless are not formed," Supervisor Lee states. Progress in these projects is significant towards improving the quality of resources for the homeless. Though still needed, congregate settings can be risky during COVID-19.

Council President Bas explains, "We all know affordable housing is a huge priority and we envision placing these residents in permanent housing six months to a year from now. I'm happy that I've been able to work with the city and homeless advocates in trying something new and finding solutions that are at a larger scale." With this in mind, it is no question that these flourishing communities will become a pillar of hope for families and individuals wanting housing stability."

# Quail make 'egg'cellent pets

Raising backyard chickens became popular when the pandemic began. Many feedstores cannot keep up with the demand for chicks and some hardware stores have seen a 40% increase in the sale of chicken wire used for building coops. After a year's experience, some people may continue to raise chickens, while other may think it is too much work even though they will miss out on having fresh eggs. There is an alternative for these people and anyone else who has wanted backyard chickens—but not the workload-or did not feel they had the space. Domestic quail are just as enjoyable, require less work, but still provide eggs.

Bay Area cities have varying permit requirements for raising chickens. Domestic quail generally do not have such restrictions. Domestic quail need less space than chickens and can even be raised on apartment balconies. They require less food, and while male quail do make noise sometimes, it is infrequent and no louder than that of a small wild bird. However, many egg laying breeds only have a life span of a few years while chickens can live beyond ten.

The term "domestic quail" loosely refers to a group of small birds that are raised as pets, for egg laying, for their meat, for their vibrant colors and feather patterns, and/or the pleasant sounds they sing. Some are true quail whereas others are a different species of fowl. The group does not include breeds of wild native and game quail such as the California quail. These birds either have strict regulatory and licensing requirements or are illegal to raise in captivity. Domestic quail are breeds whose evolution has been guided by many years of domestication and breeding.

Appropriate coop size depends on the number of quail. There should be at least one square foot of floor space for each quail. Quail spend most of their time foraging for food on the ground or resting in tall grass or under a small plant. The coop does not need to be more than three feet tall unless it is a walk-in. There should be at least one water and food source, dirt for baths, branches and plant canopy for hiding under, and nesting boxes for laying eggs. Ideally, the coop should be placed in an area that gets full sun provided there are enough shaded spots for quail to retreat to.

A group of quail is called a covey. Quail species raised for egg production fare better when there are at least five to seven

birds in the covey. Some ornamental quail should only be raised in coveys of two. An all-female covey can lead to bullying, so having at least one male will prevent hectoring. Having fewer than five females to one male can result in the females being mated to death. More than seven females to one male can result in a low ratio of fertilized eggs (a problem if breeding is desired). Two males can be in a single run if the one square foot per bird and five to seven females to one male guidelines are adhered to.

It is easy to provide a heathy diet for a covey. A wild bird seed mix is a staple, but edible greens are also an important daily requirement. Quail can eat a wide variety of grains, vegetables, dried insects and fruits. They prefer clean water so the water source should be cleaned daily.

Domestic quail begin laying eggs at six to eight weeks old and can lay an egg a day for about the next year. They will need at least 14 hours of light per day or they will not lay. If they are fall or winter babies, they may need supplemental light in the evening for a few hours. Supplementing their diet with oyster shells or a "developer diet feed" will ensure heathy egg production. Having a secluded quiet place in the run where they feel safe will also promote good egg production.

Since quail have a short lifespan, many people decide to breed their quail to continue the covey. Domestic quail typically are not broody, so hatching the eggs requires an incubator. The price range and number of eggs they hold vary, but if the goal is to replace five to seven quail per year, a smaller inexpensive incubator is fine to use. Search for "hatching quail eggs and brooding quail chicks" on backyardchickens.com as a guide through the process.

Craigslist can be a good place to find domestic quail for purchase because they have been acclimated to the local area. Feed stores such as Close Feed and Supply in Union City have quail depending on availability. Alchemist Farm and Garden in Sebastopol, alchemistfarm.com, sells a variety of quail. They are pioneers of humane breeding and hatching, have a no male kill policy, and provide quail with free-roaming pastures.

The moment quails are brought home you know you made the right choice. Young quail are cute and fun to watch. A few weeks later you will be rewarded with fresh eggs and even after they stop laying, their singing will confirm your choice.



## The James Webb Space Telescope: Ready for launch!

NASA's James Webb Space Telescope is ready for lift-off! As of this writing (November 15), the much-anticipated next-generation space telescope is being carefully prepared for launch on December 18, 2021, and will begin its mission to investigate some of the deepest mysteries of our universe.

The development of Webb began earlier than you might expect – the concept that would develop into Webb was proposed even before the launch of Hubble in the late 1980s. Since then, its design underwent many refinements, and the telescope experienced a series of delays during construction and testing. While frustrating, the team needs to ensure that this extremely complex and advanced scientific instrument is successfully launched and deployed. The Webb team can't take any chances; unlike Hubble, orbiting at an astronaut-serviceable 340 miles (347 km) above Earth, Webb will orbit about one million miles away (or 1.6 million km), at Lagrange Point 2. Lagrange Points are special positions where the gravitational influence between two different bodies, like the Sun and Earth, "balance out," allowing objects like space telescopes to be placed into stable long-term orbits, requiring only minor adjustments - saving Webb a good deal of fuel.


Since this position is also several times further than the Moon, Webb's sunshield will safely cover the Moon, Earth, and Sun and block any potential interference from their own infrared radiation. Even the seemingly small amount of heat from the surfaces of the Earth and Moon would interfere with Webb's extraordinarily sensitive infrared observations of our universe if left unblocked. 
Once in final position, its sunshield and mirror fully deployed and instruments checked out, Webb will begin observing. Webb's 21-foot segmented mirror will be trained on targets as fine and varied as planets, moons, and distant objects in our outer Solar System, active centers of galaxies, and some of the most distant stars and galaxies in our universe. It may observe some of the first luminous objects formed after the Big Bang! Webb will join with other observatories to study black holes - including the one lurking in the center of our galaxy, and will study solar systems around other stars, including planetary atmospheres, to investigate their potential for hosting life.

Webb will observe a wide band of the infrared spectrum, including parts observed by the Hubble - which also observes in a bit of ultraviolet light as well as visible - and the recently retired Spitzer Space Telescope. Webb will even observe parts of the infrared spectrum not seen by either of these missions. Webb will follow up on many of Hubble's observations and continue its mission to study the most distant galaxies and stars it can - and as you can see in the comparison image, its mirror and orbit are both huge in comparison, in order to continue these studies in an even deeper fashion.

# Pioneers' basketball wins big

It was the most points scored by East Bay since posting 103 points in a home win over West Coast Baptist in 2019. The Pioneers' all-time record for most points scored in a game is 149 against Redlands exactly 16 years ago on December 2, 2005.

CSUEB (3-5, 1-1 CCAA) led by as many as 28 points in the first half for its first conference victory of the season.

#### Can California legally require women on corporate boards?

LOS ANGELES (AP), Nov. 30 -- When then-California Gov. Jerry Brown signed the nation's first law requiring women on boards of publicly traded companies, he suggested it might not survive legal challenges.

Three years later, a judge was to begin hearing evidence on Dec. 1 in Los Angeles Superior Court that could undo the law credited with giving more women seats in boardrooms traditionally dominated by men. The California law has spurred other states to adopt or consider similar laws.

The conservative legal group Judicial Watch brought the lawsuit that claims it's illegal to use taxpayer funds to enforce a law that violates the equal protection clause of the California Constitution by mandating a gender-based quota.

"They are creating a classification that either prefers or discriminates against one class or in preference of another," attorney Robert Patrick Sticht said. He said the state doesn't have a compelling government interest to create the mandate. Another conservative legal group has filed a separate lawsuit in federal court claiming the law violates the equal protection clause of the U.S. Constitution.

Betsy Berkhemer-Credaire, CEO of the advocacy group 50/50 Women on Boards, who supported passage of the law. She is confident it will be upheld but said even if it is found unconstitutional that pressure from investors will lead to more women being named to corporate boards. "The train has left the station," Berkhemer-Credaire said. "I don't think it'll be a serious setback."

The law required publicly traded companies headquartered in California to have one member who identifies as a woman on their boards of directors by the end of 2019. By January, boards with five directors must have two women and boards with six or more members must have three women.

Penalties range from \$100,000 fines for companies that fail to report board compositions to the California secretary of state's office. Companies that do not include the required number of female board members can be fined \$100,000 for first violations and \$300,000 for subsequent violations.

Fewer than half the nearly 650 applicable corporations in the state reported last year that they had complied. More than half didn't file the required disclosure statement, according to the most recent report.

No companies have been fined, though the secretary of state can do so, said spokeswoman Jenna Dresner. The state has argued in court papers that it hasn't used taxpayer funds to enforce the law. Dresner and the state attorney general's office declined to comment on pending litigation.

Supporters of the law said it has already had a big impact in California and beyond. Washington state passed a similar measure this year and lawmakers in other states, including Massachusetts, New Jersey and Hawaii, have proposed similar bills. Illinois requires publicly traded companies to report the makeup of their boards. Several European countries, including France, Germany, Norway and Spain, require corporate boards to include women.

Before the California law went into effect, women held 17% of the seats on company boards in the state, based on the Russell 3000 Index of the largest companies in the U.S., according to 50/50 Women on Boards. As of September, the percentage of board seats held by women climbed to more than 30% in California, compared to 26% nationally, said Heather Spilsbury, chief operating officer for the group.

Still, some 40% of the largest companies in California need to add women to their boards to comply with the law. With a deadline approaching, Berkhemer-Credaire said ``there's a lot of scrambling going on,'' though she said she has heard anecdotally that other companies are waiting to see how the court rules.

Adding pressure on the issue, the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission in August approved Nasdaq's proposal that most of the nearly 3,000 companies listed on the exchange have at least one woman on their boards, along with one person from a racial minority or who identifies as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender or queer.

There's no penalty for companies that don't meet the Nasdaq diversity criteria, but they must publicly explain why they could not comply. The Nasdaq rule and a California law signed last year requiring publicly traded corporate boards have a member by January from an underrepresented community -- including Black, Latino, Asian, Pacific Islander, Native American, or someone who self-identifies as gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender -- are also facing lawsuits.

When the California law was proposed, an analysis by the state Assembly noted: "The use of a quota-like system, as proposed by this bill, to remedy past discrimination and differences in opportunity may be difficult to defend." Brown signed it amid the budding #MeToo movement over sexual misconduct.

"I don't minimize the potential flaws that indeed may prove fatal to its ultimate implementation," the Democratic governor said in a letter. "Nevertheless, recent events ... make it crystal clear that many are not getting the message."

Judicial Watch sued in August 2019 and the Pacific Legal Foundation sued three months later on behalf of a shareholder who said the law would force him to discriminate on the basis of sex. The latter case was thrown out by a federal judge, but revived by a unanimous panel of the 9th U.S Circuit Court of Appeals.

Although the California Chamber of Commerce had opposed the law, it didn't sign on to the litigation and no company has joined the legal effort being led in Los Angeles by three California residents. They sued under a provision that allows taxpayers to prevent unlawful government expenditures.

December 7, 1941: President Franklin D. Roosevelt called it, "A date that will live in infamy". The attack by Japan on U.S. naval forces in Pearl Harbor triggered the official entry of the United States of America into World War II. An external, aggressive, malignant force had clearly provoked a response from a nation that had ostensibly remained neutral during the preceding years of conflict between "Allied" and "Axis" forces.

The national seismic shock of Pearl Harbor Day has been followed by many aftershocks of violence and mayhem, some in distant lands and others on the domestic scene. The September 11, 2001 terrorist attack on the World Trade Center was a painful and graphic reminder of foreign threats that can come calling within our borders. Decades later, the attempted coup and

insurrection of January 6, 2021 was a stark illustration that not all challenges to democracy and our way of life arise in foreign lands or with external enemies. The enemy within is an equal, if not greater peril to domestic peace and prosperity.

It may be that each generation needs a warning of the mortal price of our freedoms. Patriotism is not a slogan nor should it include allegiance to an emperor or king. The reality we, the U.S. born, face on a periodic basis is that vigilance and appreciation for a birthright is often neglected while others who must work hard, fight and struggle to attain it, hold it dear - even in the face of native resistance and discrimination. Fear and hatred of "others" has been prevalent throughout our history, but paradoxically, inclusion of outcasts and those fleeing repression have been and remain the strength of our nation.

In a multitude of conflicts, whether declared wars or not, people have sacrificed much if not all for the ideal of a free society that tolerates dissention, civil discourse and open debate. It appears that a cyclical existential crisis is necessary for those who have not experienced the horror and terror of despotic, repressive, authoritarian regimes. Honoring calamitous moments

such as December 7, 1941, can help us to refocus on national unity and purpose. Without a common cause and will to succeed, we risk joining the memories of venerated societies such as ancient Greece and the Roman and Ottoman Empires.

Momentous events may fade from personal memories as generations pass on, but cannot be relegated to a few pages of a history text. A sense of pride in our better selves and recognition of the fortitude that has so far preserved our singular union of states is essential. A sense of unity should not be tarnished by selfish and egotistical grievances that focus on petty differences, misrepresentations and evasions of our past – even if flawed – but rather focus on the strength of our differences, recognizing that increased knowledge, coupled with lack of fear and bigotry, brings wisdom and peaceful coexistence.

# California city apologizes for bulldozing blues community

A California city has apologized to Black and Latino residents and descendants of a tight-knit community that was torn down more than half a century ago.

The East Bay Times reports Sunday that the apology was welcomed by many from the 12-block area known as Russell City in Hayward, which was a vibrant hub for blues musicians until it was torn down to make way for an industrial hub.

"For me, as an African American woman, it's really, really meaningful," said Artavia Berry, a Hayward resident who chairs a city commission that drafted the apology. "It's been a very tearful week for me."

The Hayward City Council issued the apology on Nov. 16.

It's among a number of U.S. cities that have been reckoning with past racial injustices, including the nearby city of San Jose

San Jose apologized in September for its treatment of Chinese residents in the 19th century. The city's thriving Chinatown was burned to the ground in 1887 by arsonists.

Russell City was named in the mid-19th century for a teacher who came to California during the Gold Rush. Initially, Danish immigrants lived there. By World War II, people had migrated to the community from the southern United States and Mexico.

The unincorporated area near Hayward had 1,400 mostly Black and Latino residents, lacked fresh water and had mostly unpaved roads.

But it had a thriving music scene, said Ronnie Stewart, the head of the West Coast Blues Society.

"It wasn't just a little unincorporated town with Blacks and Mexicans and a few others. It had a real function as far as being a contributor to West Coast Blues," Stewart said, recalling how musicians such as Ray Charles played at venues there. "They took the whole damn city. They changed every street name. They tried to erase it."

In the 1950s, Alameda County and Hayward city officials declared Russell City a blighted area and relocated residents despite their protests.

Some questioned whether the apology was enough. Tony Wynn, 67, said she used to visit her great grandfather on weekends on his farm in

Russell City and her mother sang at blues clubs there.

"Yeah, that looks good on paper, but what about money?" Wynn said. "Give us more money than the little bit that you gave my family when we were there. It's not like we could not have said, 'No we don't want to move or sell.' You guys took it over."

City Councilmember Sara Lamnin said she understood the skepticism and added the city is committed to undoing decades of racist policies.

The city is planning public art installations recognizing the eviction of Russell City residents. It may also work with Russell City descendants on plans such as a first-time homebuyer assistance program, according to a city report.



Dear Rusty: How can a foreign company pay into the US Social Security system? I worked in Barbados before I immigrated to the USA and earned a pension there. Dear Angry: Foreign companies don't pay into the U.S. Social Security system, and neither do residents of other countries working in their home foreign country who earns a pension in their home country, U.S. and earns an additional U.S. Social Security pension, will have their U.S. Social Security benefit reduced by a provision Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP). WEP was enacted by Congress in 1983 to eliminate what was viewed as "double dipping" – where someone with an extra pension (such as your US Social Security) had their US Social Security (SS) benefit computed in the same way as a US resident who had no such extra "non-covered" pension. The 1983 WEP rule created a special formula for those entitled to both

WEP reduces the US Social Security benefit of anyone with a "non-covered" (e.g., foreign) pension so that their US Social Security benefit is more consistent with benefits provided to others without an extra non-covered pension. US Social Security is designed to provide a higher percentage of replacement income to lower income workers, and those with an extra non-covered pension enjoy an unfair advantage because their income artificially appears lower than it truly is. WEP was implemented by Congress to correct that unfair advantage. However, like you,

employees in 27 U.S. states) believes it to be unfair and often complain about it to their Congressional Representatives.

For information, there is a legislative bill now before Congress which proposes to eliminate WEP (H.R. 82 – The Social Security Fairness Act of 2021). I must, however, let you know that a bill to either eliminate or reform WEP has been introduced in nearly every Congress for many years, and no previous bill has ever made it past being introduced on the floor of the House or Senate and then assigned to a committee for review, where progress seems

Although you want your money back, I'm afraid I can't offer you much hope that will ever happen. Congress is more focused on other issues, including a much broader reform of the Social Security program to restore it to financial solvency before the SS Trust

Fund is depleted in 2034 (which would require an across the board 21% reduction in all benefits). Whether WEP reform will be part of the corrective measures taken to restore Social Security's finances is anybody's guess. But registering your objection to Windfall Elimination Provision with your Congressional Representative would be a step in that direction.

# **DUI** and license checkpoint planned in Fremont

Officers from Fremont Police Department Traffic Unit will conduct a Driving Under the Influence (DUI) and driver license verification checkpoint starting at 7:00 p.m. Thursday, December 16 and continuing until 2:00 a.m. the next day at an undisclosed location in the city.

Officers will be contacting drivers passing through the checkpoint for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment. They will also check drivers for proper licensing and will try to delay motorists only momentarily. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug-impaired driving. Drivers caught driving impaired can expect jail, license suspension, and insurance increases, as well as fines, fees, DUI classes, other expenses that can exceed \$10,000.

According to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), checkpoints have provided the most effective documented results of any of the DUI enforcement

strategies, while also yielding considerable cost savings of \$6 for every \$1 spent. Based on collision statistics and frequency of DUI arrests, DUI checkpoints are placed in locations that have the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence. Locations are chosen with safety considerations for the officers and the public.

Funding for this checkpoint is provided by a grant from California Office of Traffic Safety, through National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
