# Post COVID Breathing Problems?

# Pulmonary Rehab Can Help

What if you're recovering from COVID–19 but you're still coughing, feeling short of breath going up the stairs, or missing the energy you need to do your daily tasks? What can you do to regain your pre-illness energy?

Washington Hospital's Outpatient Pulmonary Rehabilitation Program offers rehab therapies targeted specifically for recovering COVID patients. "We are seeing patients who didn't have any respiratory issues before becoming sick with COVID," says Respiratory Therapist Sherry Harrington. "Many of these are patients who weren't sick enough to be hospitalized, but continue to suffer from the post-illness effects of the virus. This includes a range of respiratory problems," she notes.

"Too many people believe there isn't anything they can do to get relief from these lingering COVID symptoms," Harrington adds. "But that's not completely accurate; those symptoms can be managed and patients can experience relief by participating in a rehab program like the one we offer."

Typically, when patients come to the pulmonary rehab program, they are tested to measure pulmonary function. This diagnostic tool will measure lung volumes, flows and oxygen diffusion to determine if there are any restrictive or obstructive issues.

The therapists develop individual treatment plans for each patient that includes exercise, education and monitoring. The exercise program includes aerobic exercises, strength training, and specific exercises to improve balance and flexibility.

The education segment includes information about managing the

symptoms the patient is experiencing, the benefits of the specific exercise program developed for the patient, and the need to continue exercising even after leaving the rehab program.

Washington Hospital hosts a chapter of the Better Breathers for Life Club, a support group for those managing chronic respiratory illnesses, including those recovering from COVID. Participants include patients with a variety of lung and breathing issues, such as asthma, chronic bronchitis, emphysema, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), pulmonary fibrosis and other respiratory diseases. Patients recover at varying rates, which is why continuing with the exercise program is essential and participating in the support group can be very helpful.

A physician's referral is required to participate in the Outpatient Pulmonary Rehabilitation Program. The program is approved for reimbursement by Medicare and most insurance companies. HMO's will require pre-authorization for coverage.

"If you're experiencing breathing issues or unusual fatigue following a COVID infection, see your doctor for a referral." advises Harrington. She adds, "Individuals will need to put in the work and it may take time to see results, but a better quality of life will be well worth the effort."

# MAY IS MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH Worry or Anxiety? Know the Difference

What should you do if your worries—those problems that occasionally keep you awake at night — have evolved into anxiety that is affecting your health and well-being? Is there a significant difference between the two? Will your anxiety disappear once the problems you are worrying about are resolved?

According to Dr. Seema Sehgal, a psychiatrist in the Psychiatry and Behavioral Science Department at Washington Township Medical Foundation (WTMF), worrying and feeling anxious are normal and necessary in humans for survival and adaptation—and can actually enhance performance.

"Most of us worry at one time or another about a specific problem or set of problems," says Dr. Sehgal. "Worry is triggered by some specific event, problem, or issue and usually disappears when the situation changes," she explains. "Anxiety is a continuum, with one end being normal anxiety and the other end a full-blown anxiety disorder."

Worry is specific, while anxiety is more diffuse. Anxiety occurs when the worry isn't resolved and it leads to significant distress and impairment. Dr. Sehgal explains, "Anxiety is like being on 'yellow alert.' It's harder to control thoughts and emotions, and the anxiety begins to directly impact work and daily life. Panic is like being on 'red alert.' The body's 'fight or flight' response is engaged and physical symptoms occur including a racing heartbeat, rapid breathing, lightheadedness or a feeling of passing out. We experience worry in our heads and anxiety in our bodies."

"Worry is that thought process that creates the feelings and emotions which are experienced as anxiety. Subtle changes begin to occur in the body including feeling fatigued or irritable, having muscle tension or restless sleep," Dr. Sehgal says. "There are many manifestations of anxiety disorders including generalized anxiety disorder, panic disorder or specific phobias."

Untreated, the problem can progress to the point where the person fears having a panic attack in public and stops going out, begins to isolate his or herself. Severe anxiety can affect a person's ability to function in society.

Individuals often seek help when they realize their anxiety is affecting their



ability to function in the family, at work or in society generally. Family members may notice the individual's suffering and urge them to see a doctor. Dr. Sehgal recommends talking with your family physician if you think you might have a problem dealing with worries or anxiety. She notes. "Often it may take only one appointment to begin to deal with the situation."

Dr. Sehgal continues, "Your primary care physician is the person you see regularly and the one who knows your history and situation. This physician also may be the person you feel most comfortable talking with about your anxiety." If the family physician believes the patient needs additional treatment, the patient will typically be referred to a specialist trained to deal with anxiety disorders.

Treatment differs depending on the particular root of anxiety. "Medication

often helps with symptoms but won't cure the underlying problem," she explains. Anxiety triggers vary from person to person but common ones include losses such as death, divorce or loss of a job; moving away from a familiar environment; or children leaving for college or other transitions in the home.

In children, anxiety can develop when the child feels peer pressure or parental pressure. According to Dr. Sehgal, the fact the child perceives the pressure, even if it doesn't really exist, can be enough to trigger anxiety and its physical manifestations.

If seeing a psychiatrist is indicated, treatment often consists of helping the patient develop skills to cope with their issues both through psychotherapy and through cognitive behavioral therapy. Exposure therapy is particularly helpful in patients with panic disorders or specific phobias, Dr. Sehgal notes. "We take a

patient through a series of anxiety-provoking situations. If a person is fearful of riding in an elevator, for example, we may have the patient first just look at a picture of an elevator, then later look at an actual elevator. Eventually, the patient may be asked just to step in and then out again of an elevator. In the end, the patient may find the fear has dissipated and be able to again ride in an elevator."

While worrying about a specific problem or circumstance is common and natural, when that worry reaches a level of anxiety that impacts your work or daily life, it may be time to take action. Don't hesitate to talk to the person who is most familiar with your health history, your primary care physician.







# Airbnb overhauls site searches with categories of rentals

Airbnb said on May 11 it is overhauling the way that consumers search for rental listings, adding dozens of categories including "chef's kitchens" and "historical homes" to its current listings, which are mostly searched by location.

The company will also let people book split stays between homes and it promised new protections for renters when listings fall short of advertised promises.

Airbnb said the changes will help people find listings that they didn't know existed before and in locations that they had not considered, taking pressure off overtourism in popular destinations. CEO Brian Chesky called it the biggest change to the company's site in a decade.

The changes are being rolled in time for what Airbnb predicts will be a strong summer season for rentals. Earlier in May, the company forecast that second-quarter revenue would exceed \$2 billion, above analysts' previous expectations. Nights and experiences booked in the first quarter topped 100 million for the first time in the company's history.

Visitors to Airbnb's site will see listings organized by 56 categories including proximity to attractions such as a beach, to an activity like skiing or surfing, or by the style of home. The s plit-stay feature will let people book two different homes in the same area on one trip or rent two different places in one category, such as two separate national parks on the same trip.

The San Francisco-based company also said all bookings will include a promise of finding a similar or better home or a refund if the host cancels a booking within 30 days of check-in or the listing falls short of promises, such as having fewer bedrooms than advertised.

# California getting new state park, first in 13 years

California will acquire a sprawling former farm property in the San Joaquin Valley and create a new state park for the first time in 13 years. The park is planned for Dos Rios Ranch, where the San Joaquin and Tuolumne rivers meet southwest of Modesto.

The property will become California's 280th state park and the first new one since Fort Ord Dunes near Monterey in 2009, the Modesto Bee reported. On May 13 Gov. Gavin Newsom earmarked \$5 million for the new park as part of his revised budget proposal for the fiscal year starting July 1.

The nearly four-square-mile expanse featuring willows and valley oaks will be donated by River Partners, a conservation group that's spent the past decade restoring the site. State Parks Director Armando Quintero said on May 13 that the property will serve "a park-poor region" - the San Joaquin Valley -- and help address inequities in access to state recreation sites. "Everyone deserves to have close access to vibrant parks and this opportunity is an exciting one," Quintero said.

Dos Rios could get trails, picnic areas, restrooms and other basics within five years, state parks officials said. Campgrounds could follow within another five years, the Bee reported.

# Directing Change Program Recognizes Local Students

Alameda County, Calif. —The Directing Change Program & Film Contest announced the regional finalists in the 10th annual student contest encouraging young people to create short film and art projects about suicide prevention, mental health, managing through tough times, the impact of the pandemic and heading back to in-person education. Students at Newark Memorial High School and Irvington High School are among the regional and statewide finalists being recognized for their artistic achievements.

The program is part of statewide suicide prevention and mental health efforts funded by county agencies and administered by the California Mental Health Services Authority. The annual art and film contest goes beyond encouraging artistic endeavors to encourage young people to be mindful of their mental health and seek help for themselves and their peers.

In a recently released advisory, the Surgeon General cited youth mental health as an urgent public health issue and called on schools and community-based organizations to support the mental health

of children and youth in educational settings, providing a continuum of supports to meet the social, emotional, behavioral, and mental health needs of children and youth.

'Student mental health has been challenged by the pandemic in ways we could not have imagined. We knew it would be tough, but I don't think anyone anticipated the degree of impact the isolation, stress, and changes had on our students. The Directing Change program provides young people with a powerful platform to share their struggles, victories and insights through art and film. Real transformation happens when students are seen and heard and when we create environments where young people feel supported in reaching out for help," shares Don Collins, Torrey Pines High School Social-Emotional Learning Coordinator, who has been involved with program for the past 10 years.

The pandemic exacerbated many risk factors for suicide and eroded protective factors by isolating children and youth from social and environmental support systems. This increased the need to focus on supporting students through prevention and early intervention efforts. Programs like Directing Change raise

mental health awareness and empower youth to have difficult conversations, look for mental health warning signs, and know when and where to get help.

The program has recently captured the attention of researchers at New York University. "This is a uniquely youth-directed program, in which films are made by youth, for youth. By involving a single student and their advisor, or a single classroom or after-school club, Directing Change has the potential to reduce stigma, open the conversation about suicide, foster youth leadership, and be a catalyst for community-wide change,"says Pamela A. Morris, Ph.D of the NYU Steinhardt School of Culture, Education, and Human Development.

"Our youth filmmakers created unique and educational films, expressing the importance of mental health awareness, while remaining hopeful and reminding their peers they are not alone. Youth are experiencing a time unlike any we've ever been through, and we are grateful that we create space for them to process and express how they feel, while learning valuable coping and suicide prevention skills," said Shanti Bond-Martinez, Senior Program Manager.



# Students, teachers celebrate new Chabot science building

After more than four years of construction, a new life science building is now complete at Chabot College in Hayward. A ribbon-cutting ceremony to formally open the two-story biology and STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) building was held May 17.

"The opening of the new biology building at Chabot is an exciting occasion for our campus community," said Chabot College President Susan Sperling. "The state-of-the-art facility enhances Chabot College's life science programs with technologically advanced and adaptable class-lab environments, therefore providing innovative and unique opportunities to students in STEM fields."

Located on the Chabot College campus in Hayward, the focus of the center is to enhance student learning in science and health disciplines with the addition of new state-of-the-art laboratory space and equipment.

On the ground floor students will find physiology, biology, and

anatomy labs that also offer lab prep and support spaces. Two botany labs, zoology labs with prep spaces, and a greenhouse are on the second floor. Additionally, the building contains group study spaces for students on each level.

The building, which also includes a cadaver room, utilizes natural ventilation and radiant floor heating in the public corridors and group study spaces to lower the project's overall environmental impact.

Additionally, the building structure uses cross-laminated timber framing, adding to the project's warm aesthetic and ecological sustainability.

The project is intended to replace an existing facility, which was built in 1965. Work began on this new project in March 2018 with a design by architectural firm Hanley Elvis Devereaux. Construction was managed by W.A. Construction, Inc. and Vanir Construction Management. Funding for the project, at a cost of \$27,195,188 was provided by Measures B and A.

# Community schools program gets economic boost in Alameda County

A three-year \$12 million contract is on its way to the Alameda County Office of Education (ACOE) to help them transform schools into community schools that offer such resources as medical, dental and mental health services and other services reflective of community needs.

The funding, announced May 18, is from the California Department of Education's California Community Schools Partnership Program (CCSPC) and is part of a \$3.4 billion state initiative for community schools. Under the contract, ACOE will serve as the State Lead Technical Assistance Center for Schools Programming.

ACOE will work with UCLA Center for Community Schooling as its main partner.

Californians for Justice (CFJ) and the National Education Association (NEA) also will be instrumental partners in this statewide initiative.

Alameda County

L.K. Monroe had a vision over
several years for what would
become the agency's Social &
Emotional Learning (SEL)
Department, formed two years
ago and a critical resource during
the COVID-19 pandemic.

Under the leadership of Executive Director
Dr. Nora Zamora, ACOE's SEL Department was awarded a \$3 million CCSPP Community Schools pilot contract in 2021-22, providing the foundation for the Alameda County Community Exemplary Schools for Success project. Under this contract, a five-site consortium across the county was created and led to ACOE's viability as a candidate for the CCSPP Program.

"As a County Office of Education, we are the perfect fit for this contract, given our experience with regional and statewide programs and with community schools. We are excited to lead this work in partnership with others across the state," Zamora said.

# Park It: Swim Season in the Regional Parks

The East Bay Regional Park District will plunge into summer on Memorial Day weekend, May 28 - 30, opening some of its swim beaches and pools. All swim availability is contingent on water quality, particularly the presence of blue-green algae. Here's the current situation:

Swimming facilities with lifeguard service will be open at Lake Temescal in Oakland, Don Castro lagoon in Hayward, Cull Canyon lagoon in Castro Valley, and Castle Rock pool in Walnut Creek. The swim beaches at Quarry Lakes in Fremont and Del Valle Regional Park south of Livermore are currently closed because of algae, but will open once water quality

In addition, there's open water swimming available at Crown Beach in Alameda and Keller Beach at Miller/Knox Regional Shoreline in Point Richmond. Parking is limited, and there is no lifeguard service; you swim at your own risk.

Unfortunately, several swim areas normally open are closed for the season. Shadow Cliffs swim beach in Pleasanton is closed, because of drought-related low water levels. However, the park remains open for other recreation, including fishing from shore. No float-tube fishing is allowed.

Roberts Pool in the Oakland hills is closed for renovation until the spring of 2023. Contra Loma lagoon in Antioch is also closed for the season due to required repairs and maintenance. And Lake Anza at Tilden Regional Park in Berkeley is closed for swimming, due to maintenance needs and ongoing water quality uncertainty

Swim fees vary by facility, though swimming is free for Regional Parks Foundation members. For membership information, visit regionalparksfoundation.org. For specific information about swim area hours and fees, go to ebparks.org/swimming.

Besides swimming, there are plenty of other recreational opportunities available in the regional parks on the holiday weekend. For example, the district's Dumbarton Quarry Campground in Fremont will host a campfire program with songs and stories from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturday, May 28. The programs are free and open to all; registration is not necessary. You don't have to be staying at the campground. There's a parking fee of \$5 per vehicle. Masks are required.

**Dumbarton Quarry** Campground is located at 9400 Quarry Road in Fremont.

For more information, call (510) 544-3220.

There are also drop-in campfire programs from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. every Saturday from May 28 through June 25 at Anthony Chabot Campground on Redwood Road between Oakland and Castro Valley. Parking fees apply.

Next door at Coyote Hills Regional Park, the visitor center will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Memorial Day, with lots of interesting programs planned. Coyote Hills is at the

end of Patterson Ranch Road off Paseo Padre Parkway.

Memorial Day is an admission-free day at Ardenwood Historic Farm in Fremont. Visitors can ride the train, help with farm chores, tour the historic Patterson house, try some old-fashioned lawn games, and stop by the outdoor kitchen. Ardenwood is at 34600 Ardenwood Boulevard, just north of Highway 84. For information, call (510) 544-2797.

"Memorial Day Memories" is the theme of a program from 1:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, May 28 and 29, at Crab Cove Visitor Center in Alameda. Learn how to fold a flag properly, tie a knot, and make a flower to place at the park's Merchant Marine Memorial. During World War II the area that is now parkland was a training center for Merchant Marine officers.

And on Memorial Day Monday, Crab Cove Visitor Center will hold open house from 1 to 3 p.m. with a variety of activities planned. Crab Cove is at 1252 McKay Ave. off Alameda's Central Avenue. There's a small parking lot with a fee of \$5 when the kiosk is attended. For information, call (510) 544-3187.

A family-friendly walk in search of plants and animals is on the schedule from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on Sunday, May 29 at Tilden Nature Area near Berkeley, led by naturalist Anthony Fisher. Meet at the Environmental Education Center, which is at the north end of Tilden's Central Park Drive, accessible via Canon Drive from Grizzly Peak Boulevard in Berkeley. Kennedy Grove in El Sobrante is the venue for a free program in the series, "People of Color: Evening Walks and Talks." # International Conscientious Objector Day

International Conscientious Objector Day is held on May 15 and celebrates those who resist war, especially by refusing to participate in military structures.

In South Korea, over 800 Jehovah's Witnesses have chosen to perform alternative civilian service (ACS) instead of compulsory military duties. Under the current ACS format, these young men are forced to live and work in prison facilities. The republic's 36-month ACS is the longest in the world, twice the length of active military service, and thus considered punitive. Experts inside and outside of South Korea recognize the program violates an international covenant the republic party is to and have been calling on the government for reform.

For example, the commissioner of South Korea's National Human Rights Commission, Mr. Doo-Hwan Song, has stated publicly: "I deeply agree on the need to improve the [ACS] system to meet international human rights standards."

South Korea's ACS first made international headlines when it was introduced in 2019. Prior to that, for some 65 years, South Korean courts criminally convicted and imprisoned more than 19,000 conscientious objectors, mostly

Jehovah's Witnesses. As a result, for decades, South Korea was often internationally censured. However, the criticism has since shifted to the punitive nature of the ACS program, which is twice the length of prison time imposed by the republic prior to the 2019 provision.

According to Amnesty International: "South Korean conscientious objectors were promised a genuine alternative service. Instead, they are confronted with little more than an alternative punishment."

California resident Byung-Ho Son, who served a three-year sentence from 1998-2001, said, "Although I am happy that Korea now allows alternative civilian service, there is definitely room for progress."



Brown's father appealed to the NAACP and presented their case -- Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka -- to the Supreme Court.

On May 17, 1954, the court ruled that separation of the races was illegal. Up until then, black, and white citizens lived under a policy known as "separate but equal," which legitimized segregation rather than condemning it. As History.com described it: "In an opinion written by Chief Justice Earl Warren -- not only was the 'separate but equal' doctrine unconstitutional in Linda's case, it was unconstitutional in all cases because educational segregation stamped an inherent badge of inferiority on African American students. A year later, after hearing arguments on the implementation of their ruling, the Supreme Court published guidelines requiring public school systems to integrate 'with all deliberate speed'."

# **Westward expansion**

In the early 1800s handfuls of adventurous citizens started making their way west. In 1841 70 pioneers left Independence, Missouri for the Oregon Territory; another 100 departed the following year. By May of 1843, the exodus was in earnest when 1,000 men, women and children boarded 100 wagons from Elm Grove, Missouri, and embarked on their westward journey with a herd of 5,000 oxen and cattle.

According to History.com, "The migration of 1844 was smaller than that of the previous season, but in 1845 it jumped to

nearly 3,000. Thereafter, the migration on the Oregon Trail was an annual event, although the practice of traveling in giant convoys of wagons gave way to many smaller bands of one or two-dozen wagons. The trail was heavily traveled until 1884 -- the Union Pacific constructed a railway along the route."

### Heroes remembered

The nation remembers the soldiers, sailors and airmen who perished in all its armed conflicts. The first known vigil honoring its heroes was in an Arlington National Cemetery gathering on May 30, 1868.

In the beginning, Memorial Day was known as Decoration Day. It "was inspired by local observances that had taken place in various locations in the three years since the end of the Civil War," says History.com. There are still those who might prefer to call it Decoration Day, but Memorial Day was declared a national holiday by a 1971 act of Congress.

Now, people are prone to associate the celebration with the opening of summer. That is nothing new. According to an Opinion article published by the Tribune News Service, West Point graduate Meaghan Mobbs wrote that "People have a 'tendency ... to forget the purpose of Memorial Day and make it a day for games, races, and revelry, instead of a day of memory and tears ... No, this is not a recent tweet or a pithy social media caption. It was uttered by a veteran in 1913, who felt the meaningfulness of Memorial Day was slipping through the American conscience."

In her Op-ed, Ms. Mobbs reminds her readers that Congress established a National Moment of Remembrance that was to be observed every Memorial Day at 3 p.m. local time.

# **Alameda County Point in Time Count**

After three years, a new Alameda County Point in Time Count (PIT) was conducted between February 22 – 23, 2022. The comprehensive count, which historically has taken place every two years, is important to better understand and measure the prevalence of homelessness in local communities. Due to COVID, the PIT was postponed in 2021. The preliminary PIT data revealed that Fremont has experienced a 68% increase in homelessness (for a total of 1026 people) during the past three years. Fremont's number represents 12% of the total unsheltered population in Alameda County. A full report with analysis of surveys, conducted during the 2 weeks after the count, will be available later this summer.

People living in cars or vans make up the largest portion of unsheltered homelessness in Fremont. Our local Safe Parking program census was included in the count; the total number of Safe Parking participants only account for 1.2% of the 311 vehicles counted. The increase is likely due to several factors including the widespread impact of the pandemic, lack of shelter beds, and increased housing costs in Fremont. The City's future actions related to homelessness will align with Alameda County's Home Together 2026 Plan, which the Fremont City Council recently endorsed. # **Fremont City Council Approves Permanent Program for Outdoor Commercial Patios**



On May 10, the Fremont City Council approved an ordinance to allow commercial outdoor patio areas made popular by the COVID-19 pandemic to continue operating in Fremont on a long-term basis and authorized the use of \$40,000 one-time funding to offset the \$500 permit fee for businesses that apply the remainder of the calendar year.

The new Outdoor Commercial Patio Program provides businesses with a streamlined and low-cost process to permit their outdoor commercial spaces. Unlike many similar permitting models throughout the Bay Area, Fremont's new program is one-time and tied to the business, removing the need to reapply each year and saving small business owners valuable time and money.

To provide simplicity and ensure reasonable aesthetics are achieved, businesses can choose from a list of pre-approved accessibility designs and vehicle barrier types. In addition, businesses can develop outdoor patios up to 750 square feet.

This program builds on nearly two years of experience with temporary outdoor patios through the City's Pop-Up Patio Pilot Program, which provided Fremont businesses with a free, straightforward permitting process to enable their temporary expansion into outdoor spaces during the height of COVID-19 restrictions. In total, over 70 businesses participated in the pilot, including restaurants, bars, salons, gyms, and tutoring centers.

While developing its new, permanent permitting framework, the City surveyed businesses that had

participated in the pilot program and held multiple meetings with community stakeholders. Recurring themes included: a desire for businesses to have a single, one-time permit application; maintaining flexibility with patio or parklet materials to keep costs manageable while ensuring safety and design aesthetics are met; keeping permit costs low in acknowledgement of the ongoing challenges small businesses continue to face; and making the permit process easy and straightforward.

"At the heart of this framework is an interest in creating greater equity for Fremont's small business owners, two-thirds of whom were born outside of the US and on average, earn below the City's median household income," Mayor Lily Mei said. "While citywide small business revenues have rebounded to pre-pandemic levels, many businesses continue to struggle with the challenges of hiring staff, supply chain shortages, and making up for deficits that occurred during the height of the pandemic, when revenues across Fremont's business districts declined by as much as 55%. The new permit program will help to advance the Council's priority of business district revitalization amidst pandemic recovery."

All business owners who wish to offer outdoor patios, including those with approved temporary patios, are required to switch to the new permanent program. 



recent years she has become a popular workshop instructor. In 2020 she created a Patreon page, where she showcases numerous demo videos.

# Dwarf fruit trees take a big bite out of inflation

The 1866 aphorism "Eat an apple on going to bed and you'll keep the doctor from earning his bread" became the saying we know today as "An apple a day keeps the doctor away." It is probably not literally true but apples are loaded with vitamins, antioxidants, fiber, and minerals, and consuming them regularly does aid in maintaining good health. The average American eats approximately 65 apples per year although this might be changing due to a 24% increase in fruit prices including apples. Growing fruit trees is one way to combat higher prices that are not forecast to go down in the foreseeable future. Growing dwarf or columnar fruit trees is a method that even people with limited garden space can use to benefit and save money.

Dwarf fruit trees are not genetically modified to stay small. Instead, a cutting from a particular fruit tree is grafted onto root stock from a tree that grows a smaller root system. The tree's canopy cannot grow larger than the size the root system can support. Dwarf fruit trees produce the same size and quality of fruit as would a non-dwarf tree of the same variety. Dwarf fruit trees can frequently grow to about eight feet tall when planted in the ground. However, because of the small root systems, they can be planted in pots or other containers in which they may only reach four to six feet tall.

Columnar apple trees are another option for planting in a limited space such as on a patio or balcony, or in a small garden. Columnar apple trees grow upward on a single trunk and produce short upright branches. The canopy will be less than two feet in diameter even at a mature height of 10 to 12 feet. The

unconventional growth pattern was first discovered in a McIntosh apple tree that had a naturally occurring genetic mutation. Since then, breeders have been able to create other cultivars with the same columnar growth pattern. There are also columnar peach, plum, and cherry trees available, but apple is the only true columnar variety.

The following are good dwarf fruit trees options:

"Dwarf Ponderosa" lemon is a hybrid of a lemon and citron. It flowers and fruits together throughout the year. The grapefruit-sized pale green fruits can stay on the tree for months without deteriorating in quality or tart lemony taste.

"Dwarf Meyer Improved" lemon is a lemon-orange hybrid that produces sweet and less tart tasting lemons throughout the winter. It does well and produces fruit when grown inside.

"Dwarf Bearss Seedless" lime yields the same flavorful bright green limes as those from the standard Bearss lime tree (the type found in most supermarkets). A great container fruit tree, it benefits from the protection a balcony or small patio can provide from frost in winter.

"Dwarf Key" lime delivers fruit with a unique blend of sweetness and acidity that is perfect for making desserts, cocktails, and marinades.

"Dwarf Owari" satsuma is the hardiest of all the dwarf mandarin trees. It is a prolific producer of mostly seedless, sweet, easy-to-peel mandarins. The tree will grow to eight to 10 feet tall in the ground but can be pruned or planted in a container to keep it smaller.

Banana "Super Dwarf Cavendish" is an easy plant to grow that will produce fruit

when it reaches three feet. Unlike other dwarf fruit trees that produce normal-sized fruit, the bananas from this tree are harvested when they are about four inches long. Although small, they are big in flavor.

Pomegranate "Nana" is a drought tolerant fruit tree that generates bright orange flowers in late summer which turn into sweet red fruits in the fall.

Mulberry "Dwarf Everbearing" is an abundant producer of tropical tasting fruits. These compact trees more closely resemble a bush and produce several fruit crops per year.

Fig "Fignomenal" produces a surprisingly large number of figs even though its mature height is about 28 inches. The medium-sized brown figs with a deep pink flesh can be harvested all year round.

Fig "Little Miss Figgy" can be a better choice if a larger bounty is desired, although a dwarf tree is preferred. This fig grows to a mature height between four and six feet. It creates deep purple fruits.

Peach "Bonanza" is a self-fertile tree that produces full size peaches on its four- to

six-foot-tall canopy in late summer. It does require a few hundred chill hours of temperature dipping below 45° to produce the delicious full-sized peaches.

Avocado "Wurtz" is the only true dwarf avocado that grows to a mature height of 10 feet tall. Also called "Little Cado" it is a prolific fruit producer from May to September.

Avocado "Day" is the most successful avocado to fruit in a container and/or indoors. It can produce multiple sweet fruits with buttery texture when the tree is only three feet high.

Dwarf fruit trees can take a bite out of the high cost of fruit these days for a small initial investment. Anyone who grows these will still be saving money year after year even after fruit prices come down, which is almost as sweet as the fruit itself.






are pillars in our education community and are well-deserving of this recognition.'

# How we finally viewed a black hole

Black holes were a relatively unknown and hardly visualized phenomenon even a few years ago. That changed recently when the image of the first black hole was published in March, 2021. But even more recently we managed to image the black hole that is in the center of our galaxy, The Sagittarius A\*.

Major credit goes to the human minds involved and research conducted in shaping the one-of-a-kind science instrument called the Event Horizon Telescope, specially designed to observe phenomena such as black holes.

The Event Horizon Telescope was in the news between 2017


and 2021 for visualizing the black hole at the center of M87, an elliptical galaxy fifty-five million light-years away from us. This mammoth of a black hole is one of the biggest that we know of, with a suspected mass equivalent to four billion Suns.

The way we measure a black hole is from its Event Horizon. To put it in a lay person's perspective, an Event Horizon is the point at which not even light can escape the black hole's gravity.

So, why not use Hubble to image black holes? It is one of the best telescopes we have now, right? What about when the James Webb Telescope starts functioning? Isn't that even better? But one thing

we should understand is there are different telescopes that are needed for different applications. The Hubble telescope has indeed looked at M87, but Hubble sees predominantly in visible light wavelengths.

This is not so good for looking through objects, like gas and dust, which block the view. That is why Hubble's view of nebulae and galaxies looks so impressive; it sees all the dust structures and molecular clouds. Black holes, on the other hand, do not produce any light, which makes them extremely difficult to observe. While the Webb Telescope can sneak past dust in more detail using Infrared

wavelengths, the truth is visible light or IR light observations just do not make the cut for observing black holes.

What we can see, though, is the bright material found in a black hole's accretion disk. Space objects that are growing and also possess a high gravitational pull—such as black holes—form accretion disks made up of particles that have too much of their own momentum to be directly sucked in. Instead, the particles spiral in slowly, forming a disk-like field. However, due to the vast amount of material in an accretion disk, observing a black hole is exceedingly difficult in the visible light spectrum.

There are two ingredients in the secret sauce to observing a black hole - using the correct wavelength in the electromagnetic spectrum (in this case radio waves) and using an exceptionally large aperture comparable to the size of the earth. And that is what the Event Horizon telescope is: an array of huge, ground-based radio telescopes throughout the world acting in unison to image black holes. An array provides a much bigger aperture, effectively the size of the Earth, as synchronized telescopes together from all over the planet provide a much

sharper image than a single

telescope could achieve. Black hole research is still in its infancy with recent The Sagittarius A\* only being the second observation made by the Event Horizon Telescope. But things are only bound to become more interesting once the Event Horizon Telescope finds its feet. The future is in decent shape because we would be able to use all our best telescopes, including the Webb and the Hubble, coordinated with the Event Horizon Telescope. For instance, while the Event Horizon Telescope can look closely at the black hole itself, other telescopes can observe the accretion disk, relativistic jets blasting away from a black hole, and the galaxy itself.





# **Torah! Torah! Torah! Chabad of Fremont celebrates** dedication of new Torah on Lag BaOmer

The relatively quiet streets of the Centerville neighborhood in Fremont were bustling on Thursday, May 19, 2022 as the city's Jewish community celebrated Lag BaOmer. The date is of high significance in the Jewish calendar as it marks the anniversary of the passing of Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, who was arguably one of the most influential leaders of the Jewish faith during his lifetime.

"Rabbi Shimon was a major figure in the Jewish faith. He had over 12,000 students and on the day of his passing, we celebrate not only his teachings, but we celebrate this time of renewal," says Chabad of Fremont member Venya Karpelevitch.

Members of the Chabad of Fremont synagogue also used the date to commemorate the dedication of a new Torah (sacred Jewish text) as they led a procession from the home of Rabbi Dr. Moshe Fuss and walked several miles to the Chabad of Fremont temple on Peralta Boulevard. This new Torah was dedicated by community members Bonnie Kellogg and Amit Avivi in memory of Eli Kay, a South African-born Israeli immigrant who was killed in a bombing in Jerusalem in late 2021 and Gavriel Avivi, Amit's father.

"The Torah is our most sacred text which provides a blueprint as to how we live our everyday lives and it is the physical continuity of the Jewish people," says Chaya Fuss, wife of Rabbi Fuss. "Each Torah can only be written by hand which means it takes well over a year just to create a new one. Today is a day where we as

Jews can live loud and proud, to share joy and also show that we are a community of kindness." Despite the importance of the

Torah and Lag BaOmer as pillars of Judaism, the event was a celebration open to all. Many local non-Jews as well as various members of the Fremont City Council were among those who marched and enjoyed refreshments and hors d'oeuvres at the reception in the temple. Once at the temple, the congregation's new Torah found its permanent home and visitors danced to lively music played by local musician Ezzi Hirsch (also

seem, no one member of the Jewish community is ever alone," says Hirsch.

With events such as the recent racially-motivated gun massacre in Buffalo, NY which occurred on May 14 serving as a painful reminder of the Tree of Life synagogue shooting in Pittsburgh in 2018, members of this celebration had words of

encouragement to those facing or who have faced anti-Semitism.

"From a purely secular standpoint I can say that people feel vulnerable and are most vulnerable when they're alone," says Karpelevitch. "Today we've shown that we are not alone and this event is an everlasting light that outshines any darkness.'

# California woman says dog defended her from mountain lion

A woman who was attacked by a mountain lion in Northern California says her dog jumped to her defense and was badly wounded in protecting her. "I will never be able to live up to how amazing and loyal she is to me," Erin Wilson told the Sacramento Bee on May 17.

Wilson, 24, lives in rural Trinity County, about four hours northwest of Sacramento. On May 16, she drove to the Trinity River near unincorporated Big Bar to take an afternoon stroll with Eva, her 2 1/2-year-old Belgian Malinois.

Wilson was on a path with Eva a few yards ahead when a mountain lion lunged and swiped at her, scratching Wilson's left shoulder through her jacket, she said. "I yelled 'Eva!' and she came running," Wilson said. "And she hit that cat really hard."

The dog weighs 55 pounds and was outclassed by the cougar but battled fiercely. "They fought for a couple seconds, and then I heard her start crying," Wilson said. The cougar bit the dog's head and wouldn't let go, even when Wilson attacked the animal with rocks, sticks and her fists, tried to choke it and gouge its eyes.

The cat tried to kick her off, scratching her with its back paws. Wilson said she ran back to her pickup truck, grabbed a tire iron and flagged down a passing car. That driver, Sharon Houston, told the Bee that she grabbed a long length of PVC pipe and pepper spray. Together, the women began beating the lion, which had dragged the dog off the trail.

Houston finally sprayed the animal with the pepper spray and it fled, Houston said. Wilson was treated for non-life-threatening scratches, scrapes and bruises.

Wilson's husband, Connor Kenny, told SFGATE that Eva had two skull fractures, a punctured sinus cavity and severe damage to her left eye. The dog had seizures on the drive to the vet but stabilized overnight. "We are hopeful she will pull through this," Kenny wrote. "She's a fighter, clearly."

The dog was in guarded condition, said a statement from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. Wildlife officers have collected samples from the wounds for DNA analysis and authorities will try to trap the cougar, the department said.

Mountain lion attacks on humans are rare but in such cases the animals usually are killed if they are caught. Meanwhile, Wilson said she hopes Eva will recover. She has started a GoFundMe page to raise money for the vet bills, and she's already planning how to thank Eva: with some new stuffed toys and a steak dinner.

His boyhood desire to contribute to the development of his native country never left him and served as a central driving force and motivation for his determination to achieve financial success. In 2015, Kofi created his private foundation (The Kofi Tawiah Foundation For Good Citizenship) as his long-term vehicle for consistent charitable activity that would continue long into the future as his legacy to engender and support an evolutionary and generational transformation of Ghanaian citizens, so the country can ultimately and permanently realize his boyhood dream and

vision for Ghana.



# San Francisco Conservatory buys record label

The San Francisco Conservatory of Music is buying a record label following its acquisition of a management agency. The school said on May 9 it had bought Pentatone Music, adding to a portfolio that includes Opus 3 Artists, which it purchased in October 2020.

"Bringing Pentatone in-house creates an extraordinary backdrop to explore new ideas for performing, recording and distributing music," conservatory president David Stull said in a statement.

Pentatone is based Baarn, Netherlands, and will have access to the conservatory's recording studio in San Francisco. The label will record a performance of the National Brass Ensemble, of which Stull is executive director. The conservatory announced later that San Francisco Opera music director Eun Sun Kim was replacing San Francisco Symphony music director Esa-Pekka Salonen as conductor.

Large classical labels such as Deutsche Grammophon, Decca and Sony have sharply curtailed new classical recordings in recent decades.

# Have your say about police military equipment

Some items owned and used by Hayward Police Department (HPD) are now characterized as military equipment under a newly enacted state law.

The legislation, AB 481, requires cities to publicly disclose certain types of equipment and material in possession of their police departments and requires city governing bodies to adopt military equipment-use policies for their police departments. They also must review and renew these policies at least annually thereafter.

Before the Hayward City Council meets to develop a military equipment-use policy for HPD, the city will host two online community meetings and an open house to explain the policy and share details about some equipment owned by the police department.

The meetings will be moderated by Hayward City Manager Kelly McAdoo and Chief of Police Toney Chaplin, and are intended to provide community members an opportunity to learn more, ask questions and provide feedback on the types of equipment and material involved as well as on HPD training and policies covering their use.

Online community meetings lasting two hours will be held using the Zoom webinar platform Thursday, May 26 and Monday, June 6. The in-person open house is set for Saturday, June 11 at the HPD North Resource Center substation.

# Human remains found; homicide suspected

Human remains found in March at a construction site on Mission Boulevard in Hayward have now been identified and detectives with the Hayward Police Department are investigating the case as a homicide.

# Ballet Petit Welcomes In-Person Spring Concert

eager to learn. The dancers who have stayed onboard have vastly improved and advanced." With this teamwork and devotion in mind, Peabody is confident that the upcoming spring concert will be a memorable one.

Production preparation was filled with a series of changes. The past 20 years of spring productions have been held at Chabot College, while this year's venue will be Castro Valley Center for the Performing Arts. Together, Peabody's team and dancers adjusted to staging and working around a new school calendar. Unused costumes and backdrops from 2020 have been given a second chance to be displayed on stage. "It's important to go in with a mindset of acknowledging this is different, but knowing that we'll make it work," Peabody states. "It's been unique and the hardest work put in, more than any other spring production we've done." With the assistance of Ballet Petit staff, Peabody has been able to create a storyline that motivated herself and participating dancers.

The creative process has been a fulfilling one for Peabody. The Junior Company (Jr Co), consisting of 15 dancers, will be opening with Peter and the Wolf, a symphonic children's fairytale that incorporates specific instruments tied into themes and characters. Jr Co dancers are 13-18 years old and have been dancing at Ballet Petit since they were three to seven years old. Ballet Petit teacher Miss Patience assigned student dancer leaders, who led their respective groups in changing the 2017 choreography to fit the 2022 cast. Because the number of dancers has grown smaller, patterns need to be adjusted.

Peabody explains, "These dancers missed out on two normal Spring Concerts due to the lockdown; therefore, staff not only allowed but encouraged a greater amount of collaboration in rehearsals. Dancers craved this, as demonstrated by the extensive notes and plans they prepared on their own before meeting for rehearsals."

The second segment of the production, *Once Upon a Night*,

Peabody herself. The cast includes all Ballet Petit dancers, ranging from 4-eighteen years old. Ballet Petit performs story ballets; therefore, little ones are often in scenes with older, advanced dancers. Younger dancers, though not as sophisticated as the older ones, have been watching and learning. They also were encouraged to contribute to the choreography in ways that reflected their experience. Peabody shares, "When I was brainstorming the remainder of the production, I not only wanted to do something the audience would like but also felt obligated to address the artistic experience that our dancers had endured due to the pandemic, as well as their current needs.'

Both pieces in this year's spring production were tailored to meet the dancers where they are today, and to move them forward artistically and technically. This flexibility strengthened the fluidity of both the dance composition and the overall storyline. This year's creation of the spring production has not only been shaped for audiences to enjoy, but for the dancers themselves. Every part of the process has instilled ballet as a creative safe space in Peabody and her students.

"It's been magic. It is such a gift to look at them and realize how much they have put of themselves into this performance," Peabody says. These collaborative efforts will surely shine on stage and carry on in the atmosphere of spring productions yet to come.
