

# Artist and educator to present MAIZ Art Exhibit

Starting September 17, Studio 11 in Union City will host "MAIZ," an art exhibit dedicated to the role of corn in the Americas. Curating the exhibit is 30-year-old artist, Oscar Barragan.

Barragan teaches art and Spanish at St. Clement Middle School in Hayward. "Art has always been in my blood," says Barragan. "My teachers always told me to follow my passion." And he did. While a student at James Logan, Barragan took Advanced Placement classes in art and painting. After graduating, he attended the California College of Fine Arts.

He acknowledges the generosity of his community: "It was difficult, but they helped me a lot; if I hadn't taken part in community events and participated in service organizations, [such as PUENTE, a program for first generation children of immigrants] I wouldn't have been able to afford a private institution."

Though the future of many art graduates isn't guaranteed, Barragan was fortunate. "Within a month of graduating, I was lucky enough to get a job as a teacher; first at Our Lady of the Rosary, until they closed, and then here at St. Clement for the last seven years."

Initially simply grateful to be earning a living, he soon realized he had more to give than just his art. As a mentor he could provide a platform upon which young artists could build.

"You can see natural talent, even at an early age," he says. But art education for Barragan is more than developing talent through the introduction of skills and processes. "It's deeper than that; it's about problem solving and teaching young artists how to communicate with the world."

Learning to work with our hands is still important. "Technology is a helpful tool, but using




it a lot could discourage kids from using their own ingenuity to solve manual problems. What once seemed common sense for an older generation is being lost when we let technology do it for us; the techniques of art are dependent on dexterity and problem-solving."

Then there's art as history. Barragan believes that with the right education, students will be inspired to connect what they are doing and feeling to artists past and present and their roles as translators of communal experience.

From his youth, Barragan related to the surrealists Salvador Dali and Juan De Chirico, known for their realistic depiction of unreal continued on page 15

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## Washington Hospital's Top Hat Gala Welcomes Back Guests for In-Person Event

#### Proceeds Will Help to Purchase Equipment for Future Trauma Center at Washington Hospital

The Top Hat Dinner Dance will be held in person this year for the first time since the pandemic required the event to be held virtually. Washington Hospital Healthcare Foundation's annual gala supports programs and services that improve patient care. The format this year will feature a strolling dinner rather than the formal sit-down style. There will be a number of delectable dishes to choose from as well as roving entertainment such as stilt walkers and a magician. It will also include an outdoor garden lounge with fire pits where people can enjoy the night air. The 36th Annual Top Hat Dinner Dance will be held on Saturday, Oct. 8, from 6 to 11 p.m., in the Grand Tent at Washington West.

"We're really looking forward to being back in person," said Sarah Gemski, executive director of Washington Hospital Healthcare Foundation. "We're still maintaining COVID-19 regulations and are limiting the number of guests to 400. Everyone is required to show proof of full vaccination or a negative COVID test."

This year, funds raised through the Top Hat Dinner Dance will support Washington Hospital's future Adult Level II Trauma Center. It will be used to purchase life-saving equipment and technology needed for the state-of-the-art trauma center, which will be housed in Washington Hospital's Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion.

Washington Hospital Healthcare System was approved by the Alameda County Emergency Medical Services Agency to become the next designated Level II Adult Trauma Center in the county in the next five years. This has been a goal the Hospital has worked toward for more than two decades, according to Gemski.



When people experience traumatic injuries, it's critical that they are transported to a facility with special equipment and highly trained medical professionals who can quickly deliver life-saving care. The new Trauma Center will be able to provide that much needed care for Tri-City residents.

#### **Dinner, Dancing and More**

In addition to the amazing savory dishes once again prepared by McCalls Catering of San Francisco – one of the Bay Area's preeminent caterers for more than 40 years – the gala will include a hosted cocktail reception and a dessert wall. There will also be dancing to music

provided by a DJ, as well as a live auction, raffle, and fund-a-need as in years past.

"It will be a fantastic evening with something for everyone," Gemski added. "The event will also help to raise critical funds that will be used to purchase advanced imaging and diagnostic technology for the Trauma Center."

Attendees will hear from Kimberly Hartz, CEO of Washington Hospital Healthcare System, about the exciting new plans for the Trauma Center, as well Top Hat Co-chairs Dr. Brian Smith and Dr. Aaron Barry, both anesthesiologists with Vituity.

First held at the Top of the Mark in San Francisco, Washington Hospital Healthcare Foundation's Annual Top Hat Dinner Dance has grown into a highly successful event that provides a fabulous experience for participants while raising significant funds to benefit the local community. Since 1986, Top Hat has raised nearly \$4 million to support many incredible programs and technology for the Hospital.

The Foundation plays a key role in ensuring Tri-City residents have access to the most advanced medical care available today. It was established in 1983 as a separately incorporated nonprofit organization to enhance Washington Hospital Healthcare System by raising public awareness and securing financial support.

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## Hayward Woman Regains Mobility After Delicate Spine Surgery

"I understand I am a walking miracle."

Desiree Gaines Munoz didn't know how close to becoming paralyzed she was when she went to Washington Hospital last April. Her legs were weak and she could barely feel them, but she thought she was suffering from a vitamin B deficiency. Instead, she had an overgrowth of bone in her vertebrae that was crushing her spinal cord. Now, after a nine-hour surgery and months of rehabilitation, she is back on her feet.

"It was a very complicated case," said Dr. Rajiv Saigal, a neurosurgeon with Washington Township Medical Foundation who performed the spine surgery. "She has made a remarkable recovery."

Munoz agreed, "I understand I am a walking miracle. I had the best care – and I mean the best."

The former nurse believes it all started about 20 years ago when she fell while getting out of the shower at her local gym. Soon after that, she started having back pain.

"It felt like I had a bulge on my lower back," Munoz explained. "Around 2006, my husband and I had just started dating and he encouraged me to see a chiropractor, who said it was arthritis. Fast forward to 2020, and that's when I noticed some strange things happening."

Munoz experienced several incidents where she stumbled or fell without any apparent reason – one time while holding her grandson. Fortunately, neither of them was injured.

"For the last couple years, it's been difficult to walk due to the back pain," she added. "I started having to use a walker just to go to the store. I took pain meds and slept with ice packs to deal with it."

Then last April, she fell while getting out of her car. "My leg just gave out," she said. "I couldn't feel my right leg. My husband helped me into the house. Then I fell again on my way to my bedroom. I literally had to crawl to my room. I could see my legs behind me, but I couldn't feel them. I told my husband he needed to take me to urgent care the next day. I

talked to my nutritionist and she said it was probably a vitamin B deficiency."

#### Long Road to Recovery

"Instead of getting a vitamin B infusion, I was admitted to the hospital," Munoz recalled. "I was told that my vertebrae was crushing my spinal cord. It was quite a shock. If I had waited much longer, I would be paralyzed."

Normally, the spinal cord is protected in the spinal canal by the surrounding cerebrospinal fluid, vertebrae, discs and ligaments. In Munoz' case, the spinal canal was narrowed and her spinal cord was compressed by a ligament that had converted to bone, Dr. Saigal explained. In 2009, Munoz had received radiation to treat breast cancer, which could have possibly caused the ligament to become bone, he added.

"The bone had to be removed from the spinal cord using micro instruments and high-resolution microscopic vision equipment," Dr. Saigal said. "It was a very delicate surgery. With this degree of bone formation, it's as complicated as it gets."

After the surgery, Munoz recovered at Washington Hospital for three weeks before going to a rehabilitation center, where she spent a month regaining her strength and learning how to manage.

"I'm grateful for the care I received," she said. "I've worked with neurosurgeons before, and Dr. Saigal is the nicest one I've come across. His bedside manner is wonderful."

Munoz is looking forward to spending more time with her four grown children and six grandchildren, and she would like to get back to work. "I want to go back to school and get my master's degree and teach," she added. "They need more nursing instructors, and I'd like to do that."

Dr. Saigal joined the neurosurgery team at Washington Township Medical Foundation and the Bell Neuroscience Institute last year and specializes in minimally invasive techniques, spinal deformity, spinal tumors, spinal cord injury and degenerative spine disorders. He also serves as an associate professor in the Department of Neurosurgery at UCSF and conducts research there that could eventually improve surgical outcomes for spine patients.



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


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## Milpitas launches lantern festival

## **Community leader receives** award from BSA for lifesaving work

No one really considers the importance of safety training until something goes wrong, but safety is always on the top of the list for Pamela Isom. Because of her first aid training and participation in the BSA (Boy Scouts of America) community,

she is being honored with the Distinguished Citizen Award of 2022.

Pamela Isom is the CEO and founder of ICE Safety Solutions, a company that offers corporate and group safety training through classroom settings and advanced virtual reality tools. Clients include Coca-Cola and Golden Gate Warriors.



Born and raised in the Bay Area, and later adopted with her twin brother by a Japanese mother and a Black father from the southern United States, Isom says her diverse background helps her relate to customers and has been instrumental in making her business a success in the multicultural Bay Area community.

Her passion for safety training started at one of her first jobs, lifeguarding. Thanks to this training, she was able to help save her father's life when he suffered heart failure. Years later, she decided to focus again on CPR training, and her business was born.

A corporate client whose son was a scout asked if Isom would be interested in teaching a group of scouts CPR First Aid for their Merit Badge. A few years later, in 2019, Isom had the idea to deploy a Virtual Reality (VR) based CPR First Aid training to create a more immersive and interactive experience. This led to more and more scout first aid classes. The younger generation enjoyed her interactive way of training, and learning from mistakes in a safe environment helped them become more confident.

Isom feels that both boys and girls should be involved with scouting because life skills gained as a scout can make a positive impact in high school, college, career, and the rest of scouts' lives.

When asked what she likes the most about her job, Isom stated that she loves that she can empower someone to get over the fear of emergencies ranging from choking to an earthquake or fire.

## Proposed county animal welfare ordinance

Back in 2019 the Alameda County Board of Supervisors banned the children's cruel "mutton busting" event. Kudos for that! Now they're back with a proposal to ban the non-sanctioned, brutal and blatantly sexist "wild cow milking contest." (See the many YouTube videos if in doubt.)

One of these frantic cows jumped the fence at the 2014 Rowell Ranch Rodeo, suffering a broken neck and prolapsed eyeball. She required euthanasia, leaving an orphaned calf. Another suffered a broken leg at the 2004 Livermore Rodeo, also euthanized.

This new proposal would ban "wild cow milking," and also the use of flank straps, spurs and non-release ropes,

allowing "breakaway" calf roping only. Be aware that every animal welfare organization condemns rodeo due to its inherent cruelty. For the majority of the animals, the rodeo arena is merely a detour enroute to the slaughterhouse. Even Cesar Chavez was an outspoken critic. (See video:

www.buckingtradition.com).

Most of rodeo is bogus from the git-go. Ranch hands never routinely rode bulls, or wrestled steers, or rode bareback, or barrel raced, or practiced calf roping (terrified BABIES) as a timed event. Nor did they put flank straps on the animals or work them over in the holding chutes with painful "hotshots," kicks and slaps. Some "sport!" Indeed, rodeo is not a

"sport" at all. That term denotes willing, evenly-matched participants. Rodeo does not qualify. Rather, it's a bogus, macho exercise in DOMINA-TION. Rodeo has had its day and now -like those Confederate statues -- belongs in the dustbin of history.

Let your county supervisors hear from you: Alameda County Board of Supervisors, 1221 Oak Street, Oakland, CA 94612. Better yet, attend the September 20 hearing and be a voice for the animals. Thanks for caring.

#### **SpaceX launches 46** satellites into orbit from California



A SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket streaked across the California sky as it carried 46 Starlink satellites into orbit the evening of Aug. 20.

The rocket blasted off from coastal Vandenberg Space Force Base at 10:40 p.m. The satellites were later deployed from the rocket's second stage.

Starlink is a space-based broadband internet system with hundreds of satellites in low Earth orbit. The Falcon 9's reusable first stage successfully touched down on a seagoing landing platform in the Pacific Ocean. It was the seventh flight of the booster.





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
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

## 2022 Toyota RAV4 Prime: The Swiss Army knife of cars

Hold on, because this is one of those analogies that is quite sharp. Okay, enough puns. The 2022 Toyota RAV4 Prime is a plug-in hybrid compact crossover, but my premise is that it really is the Swiss Army knife of cars. Check this list of the many faces of this amazing car.

#### Electric vehicle/fuel-efficient vehicle

If you're on the fence about an electric car, but definitely are looking for a fuel-efficient car, the RAV4 Prime gets 38 mpg in hybrid mode (three mpg less than the non-plug-in RAV4 model), but can also go up to 42 miles on electricity alone. Most commuters and errand-runners should be able to run on electricity most of the time if they have home charging.

You'd better have home charging, as I found in my week driving around Washington State in the RAV4. Over the first few days I stopped at three different charging locations shown on my PlugShare app. Only one of three was functional. I had better luck at my second hotel, which had rows of free chargers on each floor of the parking garage. I never used another drop of gas the rest of the trip.

#### **SUV/crossover**

The RAV4 is a tried-and-true design that can haul five passengers and loads of equipment in its 33.5 cubic feet of storage behind the second row of seats. Fold down those seats, and you more than double it to 69.8 cu. ft. to fill. This model can handle the kids going to camp or a major trip to

#### 4WD/off-road capable

While no Jeep or Bronco, the RAV4 is designed to handle some mild off-highway activities. It has 8.2 inches of ground clearance with the XSE's standard 19-inch tires. Clearance for the SE model with 18-inch tires is a shade less. Off-road is another area where the electric drive mode can help with its instant torque, particularly with the RAV4 two-motor set-up which adds power front and rear to augment the 2.5-liter four-cylinder gas engine that's at the heart of the car.

On the highway it is a stable driver with the 18.1 kilowatt-hour battery hidden low on the chassis, providing more stability than you would expect cornering at speed in a 4WD model.

#### Power to spare

The base engine brings 177 horsepower and 165 foot-pounds of torque to the party, then the electric motors adds more pulling power so the total system has 302 hp. The


RAV4 Prime will pull you from 0-60 in less than six seconds, but also can tow up to 2,500 pounds, enough to handle most small trailers or boats.

#### The latest tech

Nothing is skimped in the technology department. Standard tech includes Toyota's Safety Sense 2.0 system of the pre-collision system, adaptive cruise control, lane departure alert, lane tracing assist and road sign assist. The RAV4 safety package also includes eight air bags and a package of traction control and anti-lock brakes among other technologies. Optional safety tech includes parking assist and blind spot monitoring.

#### The price

Here's where it all comes home. The versatility and great technology of the Toyota RAV4 Prime come at a cost. Our test model in XSE trim had a base price of \$43,625. With options and the delivery cost, it ended up at \$50,731. Prime

The East Bay Regional Park District is participating this month in the 38th annual oastal Cleanup event, a two-pronged effort to remove trash and debris from shorelines throughout California.

"We truly could not do what we do without such amazing, dedicated fosters who provide immense care and love for animals in need."

## Teen-led backpack drive scales up impact

In 2021, a team of five Fremont high school juniors led a backpack drive to equip 547 students with new supplies as they returned to school after over a year of oft-disrupted virtual learning. This year, the team has grown to eleven, and, under the banner of a formally registered non-profit, Connecting for Education, they have again partnered with local churches, businesses, community organizations, and corporate sponsors to pack and donate 896 new backpacks with supplies for students with demonstrated

"We saw a lot of unmet needs last year," says lead organizer Jessica Cheng, "so we were able to serve those schools again, as well as two additional school districts this year." From May to August, the team spent their summer fundraising, reaching out to potential sponsors, and pursuing cost efficiencies to support as many students as possible. In the end, they earned the support of nine churches; local businesses Banter Bookshop, King Noodle, and Staples; diasporic organizations Taiwanese American Federation of Northern California and North American Taiwanese Women's Association -Northern California Chapter; and corporate sponsorship from Macy's, who provided both supplies and a cash donation.

"We really understand and support what Connecting for Education's mission is," says Grace Wu, president of NATWA-Northern California. "Many of us are mothers and

grandmothers who want our own children to have everything they need to do well in school. For the students in our community without the same kind of access or resources, of course we're going to do what we can to support their success. We're grateful to Jessica and her team for coordinating this initiative. We know it makes a difference."

As students themselves, the organizers were also particularly empathetic to the social and emotional impact of having - or not having - the right supplies: "We know what types of backpacks, from specific styles to popular characters, would give students just a little extra confidence or joy. We wanted to do what we could to make sure that all students could start off the school year equally engaged equipped, and excited for the year ahead."

The backpacks and supplies, worth an estimated value of over \$31,000, were directly delivered to the community's most vulnerable through City of Fremont's Family Resource Center, Davis Street Community Center in San Leandro, and 18 local elementary schools in Union City, Newark, Hayward, San Leandro and San Lorenzo.

Cheng, now a high school senior, hopes that Connecting for Education can continue to scale up and serve as a sustainable infrastructure for student-led mutual aid beyond her own tenure. "There are freshmen, sophomores and juniors on the team this year," she says. "We all have experienced and understand what goes into a project like this. As long as there are students in need, I hope we can teach and pass down this practice of supporting them and each other."


### The Summer Triangle's Hidden **Treasures**

September skies bring the lovely Summer Triangle asterism into prime position after nightfall for observers in the Northern Hemisphere. Its position high in the sky may make it difficult for some to observe its member stars comfortably, since looking straight up while standing can be hard on one's neck. While that isn't much of a problem for those that just want to quickly spot its brightest stars and member constellations, this difficulty can prevent folks from seeing some of the lesser known and dimmer star patterns scattered around its informal borders. The solution? Lie down on the ground with a comfortable blanket or mat, or grab a lawn or gravity chair and sit luxuriously while

You'll quickly spot the major constellations about the Summer Triangle's three corner stars: Lyra with bright star Vega, Cygnus with brilliant star Deneb, and Aquila with its blazing star, Altair. As you get comfortable and your eyes adjust, you'll soon find yourself able to spot a few constellations hidden in plain sight in the region around the Summer Triangle: Vulpecula the Fox, Sagitta the Arrow, and Delphinus the Dolphin! You could call these the Summer Triangle's "hidden treasures" - and they are hidden in plain sight for those that know where to look!

Vulpecula the Fox is located near the middle of the Summer Triangle, and is relatively small, like its namesake. Despite its size, it features the largest planetary nebula in our skies: M27, aka the Dumbbell Nebula. It's visible in binoculars as a fuzzy "star" and when seen through telescopes, its distinctive shape can be observed more readily - especially with larger telescopes. Planetary nebulae, named such because their round fuzzy appearances were initially



thought to resemble the disc of a planet by early telescopic observers, form when stars similar to our Sun begin to die. The star will expand into a massive red giant, and its gasses drift off into space, forming a nebula. Eventually the star collapses into a white dwarf - as seen with M27 - and eventually the colorful shell of gasses will dissipate throughout the galaxy, leaving behind a solitary, tiny, dense, white dwarf star. You are getting a peek into our Sun's far-distant future when you observe this object!

Sagitta the Arrow is even smaller than Vulpecula – it's the third smallest constellation in the sky. Located between the stars of Vulpecula and Aquila the Eagle, Sagitta's stars resemble its namesake arrow. It too contains an interesting deep-sky object: M71, an unusually small and young globular cluster whose lack of a strong central core has long confused and intrigued astronomers. It's visible in binoculars, and a larger telescope will enable you to separate its stars a bit more easily than most globulars; you'll certainly see why it was thought to be an open cluster!

Delicate Delphinus the Dolphin appears to dive in and out of the

Milky Way near Aquilla and Sagitta. Many stargazers identify Delphinus as a herald of the fainter water constellations, rising in the east after sunset as fall approaches. The starry dolphin appears to leap out of the great celestial ocean, announcing the arrival of more wonderful sights later in the evening.

Want to hunt for more treasures? You'll need a treasure map, and the Night Sky Network's "Trip Around the Triangle" handout is the perfect guide for your quest! Download one before your observing session at bit.ly/TriangleTrip. And of course, while you wait for the Sun to set - or skies to clear - you can always find out more about the objects and science hidden inside these treasures by checking out NASA's latest at nasa.gov.

#### What's in a name Every occupation has a vocabulary of its own;

Meteorologists down south in 1870 are said to have come up with the term when describing particularly heavy downpours. More recently, just a couple of years ago, a meteorologist in Texas, Reed Timmer, dreamed up the term "Gorilla Hail" when he reported a particularly nasty hail storm. ## Help available for water bills

Alameda County Water District is offering a Help on Tap assistance program that provides a \$40 credit to residential customers who need help paying their bimonthly water bills. To participate in the program, customers must file an application and show their total household income does not exceed specific levels.

#### **Household size:**

- 1-2: people: \$54,000 or less
- 3 people: \$61,650 or less
- 4 people: \$68,500 or less
- 5 people: \$77,600 or less • 6 people: \$88,950
- For each additional person, add

Proof of income is required for approval. Typical ways applicants can prove household income is by providing their most recent tax return, Social Security statements, consecutive payments, proof of unemployment or similar documents. Proof of enrollment by the applicant in Medi-Cal, CalFresh, CalWORKs, or SSI/SSP will be considered as qualifying for the Help on Tap program. Those who are eligible for the program will be approved for a three-year period, then will need to re-apply.



## 2022 Building **Code Adoption**

Every three years, the State adopts new building, residential, electrical, mechanical, plumbing, energy, historical, fire, existing building, and green building codes (known as the California Building Standards Code). Earlier this year, the State released the 2022 California Building Standards Code (https://www.dgs.ca.gov/BSC/Codes), which will become effective on January 1, 2023. All construction and development projects submitted to the City on or after this date will be required to comply with the new code.

As part of the update, the City will be proposing local codes/ordinances for adoption that differ from the State code. On Tuesday, September 20, from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., the City will host an informational meeting about these local code changes. ## **Rail Fair** returns to highlight railroad history

Ardenwood Historic Farm in Fremont hosted the 22nd annual Rail Fair over Labor Day weekend. A 1910 steam locomotive, turn-of-the-century railroad equipment, vintage rail cars and model trains of all sizes were displayed. The event offered train rides on the property's own 1.5 mile narrow-gauge rail. Old time fiddlers and quartets provided live music all weekend, and the antique Patterson family farm house opened its doors for walking tours narrated by docents. Food and special treats were offered at the Farmyard Café as well as fresh lemonade

in the shade of ancient eucalyptus trees.

More than 2,500 guests from all over the Bay Area endured record heat to attend. Kids were able to visit goats, cows, rabbits and other farm animals; use classic washboards and wringers; and play farm games. Tables for children offered dozens of wooden mini trains to play with, provided by San Jose's Golden State Division of the Toy Train Operating Society.

In 1880 the South Pacific Coast Railroad (SPCRR), a narrow-gauge track that steamed south across the marshes and farms of Alameda and Santa Clara Counties, wound through mountains and forests until it reached the ocean at Santa Cruz. Today the SPCRR is the Society for the Preservation of Carter Railroad Resources, a non-profit corporation operating the Railroad Museum at Ardenwood Historic Farm Regional Park. SPCRR, the Museum, and Ardenwood sponsored the Rail Fair.

The South Pacific Coast Railroad carried lumber, fruits, vegetables and other goods from the Santa Cruz Mountains and Santa Clara Valley to build and feed the



growing Bay area cities. Their trains brought commuters, travelers, and tourists from small farm towns and logging camps to urban areas. The Railroad maintained its fleet of locomotives, baggage cars, passenger cars, box cars, flat cars and cabooses from shops in Newark, California.

Engines and cars wrecked in the Santa Cruz Mountains arrived in Newark on flatcars and returned to service under their own steam after repairs made by the renowned Carter Brothers. Their machine shops turned out logging disconnects, flatcars, boxcars, coaches, baggage cars, cabooses, cable cars, and street cars. This was Newark's first industry. It spawned a foundry, hotels, homes and even a church.

The Railroad Museum still restores equipment from those bygone days. Train car restoration efforts are usually performed in work yards at the end of the Ardenwood Train line, but on interpretive days repairs are performed in front of park visitors using hand tools and 19th century techniques. At Rail Fairs and other special events costumed brakemen and drivers operate the branch railroad and tell stories; blacksmiths shape iron and steel into box-car parts; carpenters construct mortise and tenon joints and repair cars; laborers lay track; and mechanics tend the journal-boxes and brake-gear on the cars. Using an 1885 flatcar as a picnic car, the Ardenwood Train operates three days a week, recreating the original SPCRR's Centerville Station.

The rest of the year, Ardenwood Historic Farm offers a glimpse into life on a family farm between 1890 and 1930. Step back in time to explore the remnants of the once vast estate of George and Clara Patterson, whose family farmed the land for over 100 years, beginning in the 1850s.

## **Spectacular wins at USATF National Junior Olympics**

Mike Exton, long-time running coach and founder of East Bay-based California Grizzlies Running Club, has two reasons to be proud lately: club runners Ava Padilla and Charlene Evangelista. Both 12 years old, Ava and Charlene blazed to the top places for their age group at the USA Track and Field (USATF) National Junior Olympics Championships held in Sacramento this summer. Charlene placed second place in the 3000 meters nationals with 10:25.79. Ava rocked nationals with spectacular first-place finishes in all three of her events.

She finished the 3000 meters at 10:25.28, the 1500 meters with 4.48.52, and clocked the 800 meters with 2.16.39.

Coach Mike, a retired teacher at Parkmont Elementary in Fremont, founded California Grizzlies Running Club about six years ago. The club is part of the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) and USA Track and Field (USATF), and has about fifty runners from ages seven to 14.

"When did I know they had potential?" Coach Mike beams when he starts talking about Charlene and Ava. "So, here's Ava's first practice. I just had her run a mile...she runs different than anyone I've seen. Powerful.'

Coach Mike continued, "You can tell she's athletic the second you see her, but that doesn't

mean [someone's] a good runner. It wasn't until I saw her running...Wow. She's going to be unbelievable." Coach Mike is equally proud of Charlene. "She's shorter than most of the runners, but she's very athletic. She's on an elite soccer team ranked fourth in the country."

When asked about his training methods, Coach Mike remarked that he keeps it simple. "I just want all my runners to become as fast as possible. And so, all my practices are geared towards that. "It was three or four miles for Ava and Charlene, three or four days a week." He added that he doesn't have to do much to motivate his runners. "That PR [personal record] is their motivation. They all want to beat their PR."

Charlene Evangelista, a seventh grader from Cupertino, discovered long-distance running through cross-country sports. She started training with Coach Mike in May 2022. Charlene said, "I started my first track meet. I ran the mile, and then he knew I was good at long distance. So, he chose the events, and then he helped me get better at those." When asked whether she was nervous during the competition, Charlene replied, "My goal was

just to stick with Ava and on the last lap; I would try to pass around her. In the beginning, I was nervous, but when I started running, I was mentally strong." Charlene said her soccer helps with her running. "I'm defense. So, I have to run back and forth."

Charlene is looking forward to the USATF Nationals for cross-country in December (held in Texas). Her proud mom added, "I just want her to enjoy the sport and do the best steps she can."

Ava Padilla is also a seventh grader from San Ramon joined in March 2020. "I ran some cross country at my school. It was only two practices and a meet, though. I just knew that I liked it...and I was good at it. So, I wanted to sign up for a team."

When asked about her early track meets with Grizzlies running club, she said, "I was nervous, but I knew I could win it. I just knew it was going to be hard because there were people coming from all over and they're all going to be competing against me."

On training with Coach Mike, she commented, "I think he's the reason why I was able to win the nationals. He always knew what I should be doing for training and races. He's an amazing coach."

Ava is not short of cross-training activities. "I play basketball. And I'm a black belt in martial arts, and I dance the Hula and Tahitian." She pointed out, "Martial arts and Hula really helped me for running—the discipline, and [the mindset] to never give up and always work hard even if no one's watching.'

Ava's father, Lance, also noted that Ava is always motivated. "She demands a lot from herself." Lance has already begun reviewing the winning college track running times and concluded that they're all reachable for Ava. With unwavering confidence, Ava chimed in, "Yeah. Totally."


When asked where she wants to take her running, Ava confidently declared, "Olympics!" Quickly adding, "To podium in the Olympics!"

# Create works of art with flowers

Preserve a few memories of this summer's garden or create gifts to share with family and friends. Pounding flowers onto fabric or paper is a fun and easy way to preserve the beauty of garden flowers.


Use watercolor or other rough surface paper when pounding on paper. Purchase ready to dye (RTD) or prepared for dying (PFD) fabric or prepare the fabric yourself. You'll find supplies and directions at most craft stores.

Prepare a space for pounding flowers onto paper or fabric. A large cutting board

or piece of wood will protect the furniture below. Or better yet, move this project outside onto the sidewalk or other surface that can't be damaged by pounding. Cover the surface with wax paper and secure with masking tape to prevent flower color from soaking through onto the cutting board. Cut the fabric to size and secure it or the paper to the board with masking tape.

Gather a few of your favorite leaves and flowers. You will have great results from thin, brightly-colored petals and leaves. Consider starting with rose, daisy, geranium, petunia, and pansy petals, although any flowers and leaves can work. Remove or reduce the size of the large





Once your design is set, cover with several layers of paper towel or another sheet of watercolor paper. Taping leaves and petals in place on fabric helps reduce the risk of petals moving during the pounding process. Gently tap the leaves and flowers in place using the flat side of a hammer. Next, evenly hammer from one side of the design to the other, making sure to hit every part of each plant.

Lift the paper covering and remove crushed flowers and leaves from the paper along with the tape from the fabric. Allow your design to dry and carefully brush off any remaining plant pieces. Set the design on fabric using an iron set on the hottest setting without steam. This sets the colors but will not make fabric washable. Preserve the bright colors of your works of art on paper with a UV protective acrylic spray. Be sure to read and follow label directions and apply in a well-ventilated area.

Pounding flowers is a fun project for all ages. It is a simple way to transfer a plant's natural dye onto paper or fabric to create works of art, greeting cards and more. For more gardening projects visit MelindaMyers.com.





**Alameda County** expands

Monkeypox (MPX) virus transmission continues in the Bay Area. As of September 7, there have been 198 reported MPX cases among Alameda County residents and 4,140 cases in California. Although anyone can get MPX, most local cases reported to date are mainly among gay and bisexual men, and other men who have sex with men.

To reach more residents with MPX vaccine who are part of communities most impacted by the local epidemic, Alameda County officials on September 8 announced that eligibility is expanded to include all gay and bisexual men, trans people or any man who has sex with men or trans people. Groups previously eligible for vaccine will continue to be eligible. The vaccine must be given before symptoms start.

Additionally, anyone who received a first dose of the MPX vaccine at least 28 days ago should now get their second dose. If more than 28 days have passed since a person received their first dose of MPX vaccine, they don't need to restart or add doses to the vaccine series.

"Expanding eligibility for the MPX vaccine was made possible thanks to increased vaccine supply," said. Dr. George Ayala, Deputy Director, Alameda County Health Care Services Agency's Public Health Department. "The vaccine is safe and, if you are a gay or bisexual man, trans person, or any man who has sex with men or trans people, we encourage you to get vaccinated and get your second

doses." Newly eligible Alameda County residents or those who need their second dose should contact their health care provider or visit a community event or clinic operated in partnership with Alameda County. Visit mpx.acgov.org/vaccine for vaccination locations.

Today, mistakes can become the focal point. Getting dirty and messy has become my

National Hispanic Heritage Month begins September 15, and Barragan was chosen by Susana Peinado of Union City's Youth and Family Services to come up with a theme for an installation. A recent trip to Oaxaca had impressed Barragan with that community's veneration of and creativity with corn. For him, this was the unifying element linking the indigenous communities of the Americas: maize, the native grain, ancestor of today's corn.

Not only was its development by Mesoamericans a testament to their ingenuity and resourcefulness, but today corn is also the focus of important discussions, from the state of native lands to the controversies surrounding GMOs and the health effects of corn syrup in thousands of consumer products. "Corn is what connects everyone with roots on this side of the world," says Barragan, "it's flowing through our blood, our veins."

#### What does the future hold?

"I see myself still teaching, and I think it's important we teach all the arts. I'll be an advocate for that because we need it, especially in lower income communities. I think it's a unique and irreplaceable outlet for young students to express themselves."

## Carrots

I have never seen a purple or violet carrot. Apparently purple carrot seeds are available, and you can plant them now. However, when cooked, purple carrots turn brown. There are two types of purple carrots. One is beet colored with silvery-gray leaves. The other is a very dark violet with a yellow core. If you manage to grow them, enjoy the rosy pink flowers.

The earliest semi-edible carrots came from Afghanistan. They were used as medicine. Ancient Greeks brought the violet carrot back from India, following the adventures of Alexander the Great.

As you may already know, carrots started out as whitish skinny things with a bitter taste. Hybridizers created orange, red-orange, yellow, red and scarlet varieties and managed to get rid of the bitter taste. The original orange was a pale orange, courtesy of Dutch scientists in the 1700s. The Dutch sent boatloads of fruits and vegetables across the English Channel. "Carrets" came to America with our earliest European pioneers. Carrots were used to feed livestock as well as people. Colonists wanted their butter to have a healthy orange-yellow color. So, carrot juice went into the butter churn.

A fun tale: You may have heard about the "Trojan horse" methodology. There was an ongoing war between the Greek cities of Sparta and Troy. The warrior leader Ulysses wanted to sneak soldiers into Troy. But the Trojans were extremely alert. Ulysses built a huge wooden horse with a hollow center. He hid some of his best soldiers inside. The wooden horse was left at the Trojan fort gate. The Trojans were quite suspicious, but not a sound came from the horse. The soldiers had been given carrots as a medicine to stop their stomachs from rumbling. The wooden horse was pushed inside Troy. In the dark of night, out

came the Spartan warriors. That took care of Troy. Today, when people are suspicious of gift givers, they use the phrase "Trojan horse."

I made a fun little decoration out of carrot tops. Cut one-inch off the top of a few big carrots. Place the batch in a small bowl



with some water. Many will sprout feathery leaves for a while.

And internet news to me: baby carrots are just pieces of a full-grown regular adult carrot, cut into two-inch fragments by a machine. Once cut up, another machine rounds off the edges, so that the carrots end up looking like the ones you buy at the grocery store. Wow!





## Cohousing group to reveal its design concept

Mission Peak Village, Fremont's first cohousing community, will celebrate several months of collaboration with Gunkel Architecture and the submittal of its project plans to the city with an event to be held Saturday, September 17. The event, "Mission Peak Village: Cohousing by Design," takes place at Fremont's Downtown Event Center and will showcase both the cohousing concept and how the group intends to implement it locally.

"The housing crisis prompts us to take a fresh look at how we house ourselves," says Fremont resident and Mission Peak Village member Caroline Harris. "Our lifestyle should be more sustainable and less costly and isolating. The cohousing concept provides a way for us to live in modest-sized individual homes and share the kinds of facilities, such as guest rooms, that are underused in many of our current homes."

Cohousing — "collaborative" and "housing" — is a concept that reverses the customary development process. Instead of building condominiums first and offering them as a finished product, cohousing involves the future buyers right from the beginning. The residents purchase the property, select the consultants, architects,

and development partners, and then collaborate on laying out the kind of place they want to live in.

"Our train is actually leaving the station now," observes Mission Peak Village co-founder Jane Mueller. "The most daunting task was to secure the land to build on. We found an ideal spot, we have a stunning design, and we are now truly on the way to our destination."

Mission Peak Village envisions an intergenerational condominium community of 32 private residences, with the clubhouse or "common house" providing a large kitchen and dining room for occasionally eating meals together and entertaining. They intend the common house to be used daily and function as the community's living room. In workshops with the architect, Mission Peak members allocated space in the common house for a children's playroom, quiet office space for working remotely or doing homework, space to accommodate overnight guests, and areas for exercising, doing crafts, and playing music. The buildings are clustered around a large interior courtyard and a spacious community garden. Green building design was a high priority.

For expertise in undertaking this project, in addition to Gunkel Architecture, Mission Peak Village has engaged cohousing pioneer Kathryn McCamant as advisor and experienced cohousing developer UD+P as development partner.

"Our current membership includes former Peace Corps volunteers, members of Tri-City Ecology Center, volunteers from the Washington Township Museum of Local History, and League of Women Voters members," says Harris, herself the chair of Tri-City Ecology. "Our youngest member turns nine this year, and our oldest is about 80. We hope to add more to our roster before the end of the year, continue to the next level of design together, and already be a close-knit community of neighbors by the time we move in."

Mission Peak Village: Cohousing by Design is on September 17 in the Liberty Room at the Downtown Event Center & Plaza in Fremont. Space is limited, so pre-registration is requested on the community's website: www.missionpeakcohousing.org.

Labor Day was created to give recognition of the efforts and accomplishments of the American work force. Since the 1800s, various states have adopted the celebration and now it is celebrated as a national holiday. For citizens in the Greater Tri-City area, this holiday break can also serve as a time to take stock of their community.

The unofficial end of summer, Labor Day signals the beginning of school and a return to work days sans family vacations. This is a good time to not only refocus on serious matters but to reset thinking about important issues of our cities. We have had a break from city council sessions that seemed to embrace a rush to infill all possible available space for development. This hiatus also offered a good opportunity to take a breath and observe the results. How does approved

development fit into the grand plan for our communities? Much of this is spelled out in General Plans that, although modified over time, give a good representation of community goals. Slogans such as Fremontís istrategically urbanî are fine, but what does this really mean and how does it fit into the ultimate vision for a city?

Some debate about the wisdom of frantic development activity will probably surface in political campaigns but such rhetoric can lead to an assessment that swings toward one extreme or another. Development is not a single, monolithic entity, rather a multitude of projects. These range from large, multistory residential and/or commercial proposals that are designed to enhance an area, infill of residential lots to do the same for neighborhoods versus those that create bizarre aberrations.

It is important to separate developments advocated by local citizens, directly affected by the impact of increased traffic, noise and population from other proposals with a different agenda. If developments are supported primarily by distant companies and interests focused on warehousing workers without regard to local economic and

community effects, this may not be in synch with a cityís well-being. Can both efforts align? Of course, they can, but not without close scrutiny and modification by our leadership. Creation of living spaces that are small, expensive and encourage ñ require - multiple occupants in spaces designed for one or two persons is ultimately counterproductive. Those living here know that this situation is already widespread in single family homes and apartments. We do not need more of this.

During this election season, voters should ask those running for office how they view growth in their communities and how that aligns with the character and wellness of the community they seek to serve.

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### **Bay Area Public Service Award** honors founders of Jenny Lin **Foundation**

The murder of Jenny Lin, 14, in her own home in Castro Valley in 1994 devastated the family and shocked the community. Despite persistent efforts of police and the doubled reward of \$200,000 for information that would lead to the conviction of the assailant, Jenny's case, to date, remains unsolved.

Throughout these years of grief and pain, Jenny's family and the community have worked through her namesake nonprofit to help foster a safer and caring community and to embrace Jenny's passion for music. By turning a nightmare around into some positive, resourceful and inspirational experience for the public, Jenny's parents John & Mei-lian Lin, founders of Jenny Lin Foundation, received the Jefferson Award in the Bay Area.

For almost three decades, Jenny Lin Foundation has run youth enrichment programs, seminars, fairs, exhibitions, and workshops to educate the public about safety. The Foundation was also instrumental in the development of Children's Memorial Grove (atop Fairmont Ridge) and the bronze statues displayed at Hayward City Hall and Lake Merritt to honor young violence victims of Alameda County.

As a tribute to Jenny, who was a role model and leader in music and academics, officials of Alameda County designated the Jenny Lin Teen Room in Castro Valley Library in 2010. In addition, the Foundation launched a project where books on the subject of safety were donated to various branches of Alameda County Library. Each year in Castro Valley, where Jenny attended school, the Foundation presents scholarship awards to one promising young musician, and one 8th grader with academic and musical achievements. About 30 students in each category have received the accolade.

Additional scholarships are given out at the Foundation's summer program, which is offered free of charge to eligible middle and high school students. In 2022, musicians in Band, Orchestra, and Choir met at Creekside Middle School three times a week for four weeks and put on a concert in July at Chabot College Performing Arts Center. Close to 200 musicians joined in the summer fun.

To commemorate Jenny as an accomplished violist, her family and friends have donated a prized viola to the Castro Valley Unified School District to be loaned to a promising violist for a year. At the



25th anniversary of Jenny's passing in 2019, Jenny Lin Foundation commissioned a piece of music (Richard Meyer's "From Darkness, Joyful Sounds Are Born") that features a viola solo.

The Jefferson Awards for Public Service, the most prestigious and longest-standing public service awards in the United States, honor "ordinary people who do extraordinary things without expectation of recognition." When the tragedy had befallen the family 28 years ago, Jenny's parents chose to set their mind to helping build a safer community so that children would stop falling victim to violence.

John & Mei-lian Lin value the Jefferson Award as an exceptional platform to recount Jenny's legacy, in which they find solace. Meanwhile, they look forward to bringing the murderer to justice soon and ultimately finding closure for all.

- 4. Poll taxes, a prerequisite for voting which were designed to limit voting by African Americans and poor white populations, were permitted until 1962.
- 5. The purpose of the Voting Rights Act passed by Congress in 1965 was to prohibit states from setting policies and practices that created unnecessary difficulties for voting among African Americans and other targeted groups.
- 6. In 1971 the 26th Amendment was passed to assure all citizens 18 years of age and older had the right to vote.
- 7. In June 2013 the Supreme Court upheld the Voting Rights Act, prohibiting states from enacting barriers to voting.

  Constitution allowed states to determine who could vote and frequently state legislatures restricted voting to white Christian males who owned property. Our nation continues to struggle with equitable voting rights because the U.S.
  Constitution, while providing some standards such as voting age, allows the states to continue to have great latitude in setting voting regulations.
- 2. True. Following the Civil War the 15 Amendment was passed to assure men had the right to vote, regardless of race. However, in the decades that followed, many states, particularly in the South, used a range of barriers, such as poll taxes and literacy tests, to deliberately reduce voting among African American men.

- 5. True. Included in the provision were requirements of states and jurisdictions with a historical pattern of suppressing voting rights based on race to submit changes in their election laws to the U.S. Justice

Department for approval (or "preclearance"). This provision was remarkably effective in discouraging state and local officials from erecting barriers to voting, thus increasing opportunities for voting by minority communities.

7. False. In its June 2013 ruling in the case, Shelby County v. Holder, the U.S. Supreme Court gutted the Voting Rights Act. Because of the Court's decision, states and localities with a history of suppressing voting rights no longer were required to submit changes in their election laws to the U.S. Justice Department for review (or "preclearance").

Because of this court decision, states and jurisdictions are again trying to erect barriers to voting such as reducing polling locations, and establishing new voter identification laws. Fortunately, this has galvanized voting rights organizations, including the LWV, to protect and advance voting opportunities.

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
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

### Animal welfare at the rodeo

Reportedly, Alameda County Supervisor David Haubert's September 8 "Rodeo Town Hall" has been canceled for reasons unknown and will be re-scheduled.

Supervisors Richard Valle and Dave Brown are presently co-sponsoring amendments to the county's 1993 rodeo ordinance, which outlaws "horse tripping" and "steer tailing," and requires on-site veterinary care at all rodeos. A board hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, September 20.

The proposed amendments would outlaw the non-sanctioned, brutal, sometimes fatal (and blatantly sexist) "wild cow milking contest." Also banned would be "tie-down calf roping," allowing "breakaway" roping only. The amendments would further ban the rodeo's use of spurs and flank straps, worthy goals all. Most of rodeo has little to do with either ranching or agriculture.

Here's hoping for a few editorials and articles in the local media in support of these humane proposals. The animals (and we) deserve better.

B.J. Bunting, a resident of Fremont, CA passed away on December 26, 2021 at the age of 94, His memorial service is on September 24th at 1 PM, which will be held at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church located at 38451 Fremont Blvd in Fremont, CA. B. J. is survived by his children: Jim Bunting and spouse Debi, Lee Bunting, and David Bunting. Also survived by his two grandchildren: Crystal Bunting and Arianna Bunting and 5 great grandchildren. He was predeceased by his wife Dorothy Lee and granddaughter Julie Bunting Ballardo. He was married to his wife Dorothy for 62 years.

B. J. Bunting was a fourth generation Californian and a relative of 5 pioneer families of Fremont- Overacker, Shinn, Emerson, Bonner, and Tyson families. His relatives moved there in 1853. His roots go all the way back to the American Revolution and beyond. He was a descendant of President Monroe.

B. J. and his wife Dorothy built their own home on Bunting Lane with the help of his brothers and their families. Here they raised their 3 children. They lived there until the property was sold in 1981 and moved to the Irvington district in Fremont.

When B. J. was young, he rode a pet cow "Pretty" bareback to the school in Niles and in the Niles Pet Parade. He went to Washington High School and joined the Merchant Marines. B. J. worked for the Western Pacific Railroad and after WWII, he worked for the Southern Pacific Railroad and retired in



1988. In addition to working for the railroad, B. J. was an Alameda County Reserve Deputy Sheriff in 1952 and served 6 years. He was a Fremont Police Reserve for 14 years. He was active in the local historic society and was a past president of that organization. Also, he belonged to several other local organizations.

B. J. Bunting loved to hunt, fish and garden. Even at age 94, he worked daily in his vegetable garden, often sharing his harvest with friends, neighbors and members of the church. He was a caring and compassionate man. He had many talents and special abilities. He was a friend to many and will be greatly missed.


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

## Lack of bicycle parking

Fremont lacks abundant, secure bicycle parking where people buy groceries. More people bought car-replacers during the gas price hike.

If you think people in Fremont should be able to do more than recreational riding, please ask for better bicycle parking. If Fremont city councilmembers want to encourage more bicycle use, there must be safe bicycle parking where people buy groceries.

The road diets and green paint have been applied, and some bicycle pathways have been raised. If the city is serious about encouraging people to travel from A to B – and not just from A to A – we need bicycle parking at B.

Trader Joe's at the Hub has one U rack. KimCo properties is responsible for that rack -- KimCo properties has made a choice for the public.

In 2017, 2018, and 2019 the organization Bike Fremont produced a survey of bike racks for the city. They are available online. Their conclusion: Every year almost no change and always too few. I am not affiliated with Bike Fremont. When I emailed them, they said: "KimCo basically ignored us when we contacted them directly."

Property management companies lack motivation to change. Only through enforceable changes to Fremont's municipal code will privately-managed properties install better bicycle infrastructure.

City councilmembers Jenny Kassan and Raj Salwan have already responded positively to the idea of required, ample, secure bicycle parking at grocery store locations. In an email, Raj Salwan wrote: "I will ask our staff to work on increased bike parking, especially at our shopping and retail destinations." Likewise, Jenny Kassan wrote: "I agree! Thank you for bringing this up."

If we want better bicycle parking where we buy food, we must hold these councilmembers to their word and encourage all councilmembers to act. https://www.fremont.gov/government/mayor-councilmembers

The transit hubs in Fremont have plentiful, secure bicycle parking. BikeLink is a simple, safe, inexpensive program with bike lockers around the Bay Area. Fremont needs more of these lockers. If you write to city council members, please refer to BikeLink.

Privately-managed properties that contain basic amenities should not be allowed to ignore the public.

## **Union City police chief address**

#### **SUBMITTED BY** Union City Police Department

In a letter to the community, posted on the Union City Police Department's Nixle page on September 7, Chief Jared Rinetti shared details about gun violence in the city and a six-point plan for reducing violent crime.

Dear Union City Community,

As your Police Chief, I want to share some concerning trends regarding gun violence in Union City that involve murder, attempted murder and assault with a firearm. This increasing trend in violent crime is being reported across the Bay Area and nationwide. It is important to me that I share up-to-date crime data and the steps we are taking to prevent these crimes in our community.

#### Crime statistics over the last 12 months in Union City:

- There have been five homicides.
- Attempted homicides and assaults with a firearm are up about 63%.
- Approximately 70% of firearms seized in these violent crimes are "ghost guns" or not registered to the offender.
- 45% of the offenders in these violent crimes are residents of Union City; roughly 55% are not
- Nearly 75% of the offenders committing these violent crimes range from 12 years old to 29 years old, 45% of the offenders were 12 - 19 years old and 28% of the offenders were 20 - 29 years old.
- These violent crimes stem from a wide range of circumstances with no specific associated factor, such as gangs, drugs, domestic violence, etc. The one commonality is the use of a firearm.

This violence is unacceptable. I would like to share our strategies that are being implemented to reduce violent crime in Union City:

- Targeted Operation Plans: We are using targeted operation plans and deploying additional resources based on crime data. The plans use investigative leads, unmarked plain clothes enforcement, and direct marked patrol for high visibility crime prevention. Targeted operation plans have been effective in identifying and apprehending offenders committing crimes in Union City.
- Enhanced enforcement of illegal firearms: We have increased staffing in our Investigations Unit to prioritize investigations and seizures of illegal firearms. Our objective is to seize illegal firearms and arrest offenders who are illegally manufacturing, selling, distributing and possessing firearms. We are collaborating with our local and federal partners as over half of the offenders committing firearm crimes in our community are from outside our jurisdiction.
- Collaborating with Criminal Justice **Partners:** We are working with our District Attorney's Office, Juvenile Probation Department, California Superior Court of Alameda County, and other criminal justice partners to address violent crimes specifically involving juvenile offenders. We support rehabilitation for juvenile offenders that can take place in a secure environment where education, counseling, mental health treatment and other

important life skills can be provided. Our goal is to identify and reduce the number of repeat violent offenders, juvenile and adult, committing crimes.

- Safe and secure firearm ownership: We are finalizing a Safe and Secure Firearm Ownership program. The program provides information and safety equipment for residents who own firearms. Information includes literature on laws and best practices for firearm ownership, storage, etc.; offers free cable locks to safely store firearms; and will include City Council consideration of a new ordinance to enhance the safe storage requirements of firearms in Union City.
- District policing: We are transitioning to a district policing service model. We believe smaller patrol districts will improve our ability to interact and understand the needs of the community. This will include assigning a District Policing Manager, Patrol Lieutenant, whose information will be easily accessible to our residents on our website. This plan will increase patrol accountability, improve early identification of emerging criminal and community problems, and foster increased communication and information sharing with those we serve.
- Community Oriented Policing and **Problem-Solving unit (COPPS):** We are re-establishing a COPPS Unit. The Unit will coordinate neighborhood watch and crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED), and other quality of life service programs. These programs enhance police community partnerships which improve communication and our response to community needs. The formation of COPPS Unit is dependent on resources and is forecasted to start in June of 2023.

To be at our best we need your continued partnership in public safety. I ask for your help with the following two requests:

- Continue to be our eyes and ears in the community. Report emergencies to 911 and non-emergencies to (510) 471-1365. If you have information about a crime(s) and wish to remain anonymous, please use the link at the bottom of the page titled "Anonymous Tips" where you can share information.
- Follow us on one of our social media sites. Updates and further details on the above strategies will be provided through social media. Use the link at the bottom of the page to receive alerts and stay abreast of public safety updates in Union City.

I would like to recognize and thank all the men and women of the Union City Police Department. Our employees go above and beyond during some challenging work conditions. I appreciate, value and take great pride in leading an organization of such incredible men and women.

## **New Fremont** ordinance targets street racing and sideshows

At its Tuesday, September 6 meeting, the Fremont City Council adopted an ordinance aimed at curbing illegal street racing and sideshows. The ordinance, introduced to the council by the Fremont Police Department, prohibits promotion of the events and spectators from attending them.

In a statement released September 8, city officials said vehicle exhibitions and street racing have been a recurring concern for the health and safety of motorists, pedestrians, and residents in the city. They added that these activities have caused fatal collisions, property damage, and traffic congestion, creating a public nuisance. Illegal speed contests, exhibitions of speed, and sideshows pose a clear danger to the residents of the city and the motoring public traveling on the roadways within the city.

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# Accessory dwelling bill moves ahead

After clearing the California Legislature in late August, a bill to help homeowners build an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) on their residential property is on its way to Governor Gavin Newsom for his consideration.

The focus of the measure, authored by
Sen. Bob Wieckowski
(D-Fremont) is to streamline requirements and fees for ADUs which would allow homeowners to provide additional, and generally more affordable housing on their property.

"California has made substantial progress in eliminating burdensome requirements and excessive fees that for years prevented homeowners from building a cottage in their backyard or converting their garage," Wieckowski said. "Still, some obstacles remain. This bill addresses them and will enable more families to proceed with building their own units for their children, rental income, a caregiver or an aging senior."

SB 897 will prohibit a local agency from denying a permit for an unpermitted ADU built before 2018 unless there is a health and safety violation. The bill is supported by numerous affordable housing organizations, business associations, rental housing proponents, and building and senior associations.

The concert is free, but donations are encouraged. All donations will go toward the Mission Restoration Fund. Those planning to attend should visit: mission225.org/music-and-






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
