

Do You Know the Signs of A Stroke and How to Prevent One?

Stroke Expert to
Present Free Seminar on
Stroke Awareness



The statistics are staggering. There are 795,000 strokes every year in the U.S. and one person dies of stroke every four minutes. Stroke is the leading cause of serious, long-term disability, but the good news is 80 percent of strokes are preventable and most are treatable when detected early. You are invited to learn the risk factors of stroke, and how you can prevent it from happening to you.

On Wednesday, Nov 2 at 3:30 p.m., neurointensivist and co-medical director of Washington Hospital's Stroke Program will present a live online seminar called, "Stroke Awareness: Risk Factors and Prevention." To watch it on Facebook, sign into your account then go to facebook.com/WashingtonHosp. Or you can watch it without an account on YouTube by going to YouTube.com/whhsInHealth.

Those watching on Facebook will be able to submit questions during the seminar. YouTube does not have this option, but all viewers can submit questions in advance via email to CommunityOutreach@whhs.com. If you cannot watch it live, the seminar will be available beginning the next day at YouTube.com/whhsInHealth.

There are two types of strokes, also called brain attacks. Ischemic strokes occur when blood flow to part of the brain is cut off due to a blood clot or an artery that has become narrowed from plaque buildup. Hemorrhagic strokes, which are the less common of the two, happen when a blood vessel breaks causing bleeding in the brain.

Strokes are medical emergencies and it is said "time is brain," so it's important to call 911 immediately if you or someone else is displaying signs of a stroke. Do not try to drive yourself or someone with stroke symptoms to an Emergency Department. EMS professionals know how to treat stroke patients and can call ahead so the Stroke Team is ready on arrival.

So what exactly are the symptoms of a stroke? There are 6 telltale signs that are easier to remember by using the acronym "BE FAST."

BALANCE – Is the person experiencing a sudden loss of balance or coordination?

EYES – Are they having a sudden change in vision or trouble seeing?

FACE – Ask them to smile. Does one side of the face droop?

ARMS – Ask them to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

SPEECH – Ask them to repeat a simple phrase. Is their speech slurred or strange?

TIME – If you observe any of these signs, call 911 immediately.

Dr. Rose will thoroughly explain each of these symptoms and show illustrations so you will be able to determine if someone truly is having a stroke. Quite often it is a family member, not the stroke victim, who recognizes the signs of a stroke and calls 911, so it's

important that everyone know how to know these signs. Even children who may be home alone with a family member can identify the signs if they know them and save a life by dialing 911.

CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY

Since strokes can be deadly or have devastating permanent outcomes like paralysis and problems with thinking, awareness, memory, or speech to name a few, it is good for everyone to know how strokes can be prevented. While some risk factors are uncontrollable, like age, gender, heredity and race, others are very much in our control. They include managing your hypertension, controlling your weight, eating well and not smoking. Dr. Rose will discuss these and other stroke risk factors in detail, since prevention is the best way to avoid having a stroke.

Washington Hospital is the designated receiving center for strokes in Southern Alameda County and a certified Primary Stroke Center. This means stroke patients receive the best and fastest possible testing and treatment from the moment they arrive in the Emergency Department to the time they leave the Hospital to continue their rehabilitation.



Think Pink is a fun and informative evening that brings people together to learn about ways to prevent breast cancer and improve overall health. In keeping with Washington Hospital's commitment to safeguard the health of the community, the event will be limited to 250 attendees, and masks will be required except while eating. "Think Pink" refers to the familiar pink ribbons associated with National Breast Cancer Awareness month in October. The event is scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 13, from 5 to 7 p.m. in the Tent Atrium at Washington West (located in the parking lot at 2500 Mowry Ave. in Fremont).

Attendees come in their favorite pink attire and enjoy the opportunity to meet with those who are currently in



treatment or who have completed their treatment journey. Clinical staff enjoy seeing former patients and meeting their friends or family members. There will be a photo booth, special giveaways, and drawings for gift baskets. It is an event that blends education with fellowship to provide hope.

To create a welcoming ambiance, the venue is decorated with special lighting, fresh flowers, and pink linens on the tables. Victoria Leiphart, MD, a board-certified gynecologist who recently retired from the medical staff of Washington Hospital, will once again serve as emcee of this year's event. Guest speakers at the program will include:

- William Dugoni, Jr., MD, a general surgeon with Washington Township Medical Foundation and medical director of the Washington Women's Center. Dr. Dugoni will provide an update on services offered at the nationally accredited breast center
- Jesse Alexander, MD, a radiation oncologist at Washington Radiation Oncology Center. Dr. Alexander will talk about radiation treatments for breast cancer
- Bogdan Eftimie, MD, a hematologist-oncologist and medical director of the USCF Washington Cancer Center; and Andrea Barker, MSW, LCSW, an outpatient social worker for oncology patients at the UCSF Washington Cancer Center. The duo will discuss various topics related to cancer survivorship, as well as quality of life and general health issues for women recuperating from breast cancer


"Think Pink is a great opportunity for women to learn more about taking care of themselves and to talk with experts in breast cancer diagnosis and treatment," says Washington Hospital's Community Outreach Manager Kayla Gupta, who is teaming up with Washington Women's Center Coordinator Christine Mikkelsen, RN, and other staff at Washington Hospital to organize the event.

Gupta notes that in addition to presentations by the guest speakers, the event will feature a health fair with booths focusing on various services offered at Washington Hospital, including:

- The UCSF Washington Cancer Center, an affiliation between Washington Hospital and UCSF Health that provides oncology patients with access to the latest cancer research, technology, and treatment options
- The Sandy Amos RN Infusion Center, which provides a comforting environment for patients who require chemotherapy infusion
- The Washington Hospital Service League, which will provide information about volunteering opportunities

Think Pink participants also can speak with representatives from various outside organizations, such as the Women's Cancer Resource Center, as well as the HERS Breast Cancer Foundation.



Local student appears on TODAY show

On August 18th, local Fremont student, Heeya Das, was featured on the TODAY show to participate in a pre-college discussion panel with Robert Frank, editor-in-chief at the Princeton Review and author of



"The Best 388 Colleges." Das was among few highschoolers nationwide to have an opportunity to first-handedly voice her concerns about topics concerning her age group. Alongside TODAY show hosts Hoda Kotb and Jenna Bush Hager, Robert Frank answered questions ranging from AP tests and internships, to receiving financial aid.

Upon this opportunity being presented to Das's high school, BASIS Independent, administrative staff selected Das to represent their school; she was the only student from her school to be chosen. Along with a few other students around the country, Das submitted a video question for Frank to answer during his featured segment on the TODAY show.

Das asked about "the increasing importance of AP test results with the rising popularity of colleges going test-optional." As fewer colleges and

universities place value on standardized tests, such as the SAT and ACT, students have had to shift focus towards other key activities such as AP tests and internships. Frank responded saying two main benefits AP classes pose are helping students receive college course credit and boosting GPA.

Although Das only had a brief segment on the show, getting an opportunity to participate in this special feature transformed her view on the college admissions process. Das says that "the show changed [her] perspective on AP classes as [she] realized that the results are not as important as the fact that they show your desire to learn and further your knowledge." Das also had an opportunity to reflect on past internships she has done and "realize exactly how much [she] has learned from them."

Not only was Das able to look back on experiences she has had with pre-college activities, such as internships and AP classes, but she also was able to realize other important factors when choosing a college. "Rather than going to an Ivy League because you can, it is better to carefully sort through your options and find the best choice for your personality, goals, and financial capabilities," she says.

Going forward, Das hopes to use what she learned during this discussion not only as a guide for college, but also as a valuable experience to look back on when speaking with accomplished professionals, asking insightful questions in brief amounts of time, and listening thoughtfully to get the most out of every experience.

On top of usual concerns surrounding the college application process, the lingering effects of the pandemic will also contribute to a more muddled college pathway for students. However, with students like Das able to voice their doubts and questions on huge platforms, the hope is that teenagers feel that they have a guide when managing their high school careers and beyond in the way best suited for







High stress and low stress jobs

Let's take two people, both of whom believe in their work, like their colleagues, and are satisfied with their pay. One is a police officer; the other an accountant. Who experiences more stress? It would come as no surprise to you that police officers experience a lot more stress at work than most others. Day in and day out, they have to be ready to handle unexpected and potentially dangerous situations in a professional manner. They often have to deal with the worst of human behavior. On top of everything, they leave each morning with the awareness that they might get hurt or even killed in the line of duty. (This article comes out just in time for Thank a Police Officer Day on September 17, 2022).

Police work consistently appears on annual surveys of the most stressful jobs in America. Other high stress occupations include firefighters, airline pilots, event ordinators, surgeons, and lawyers. Note that some of these jobs come with high compensation, but the high pay comes with a high price of work stress.

First, the bad news: According to surveys done by the American Psychological Association, more than half of Americans report that their work is a significant source of stress in their lives. Sadly, there is a long list of factors that contribute to stress on the job:

- Bad bosses
- Tight deadlines
- Constant crisis mode at work
- Excessive travel
- Lack of career advancement
- Dealing with the publicToxic work culture
- Physical demands
- Poor environmental conditions
- Work hazards
- Risk to one's life

If you are in a high stress job, don't despair. You can take steps to take charge

of your happiness at work, perhaps seeking support from trusted friends or a therapist. Be sure to check out my tips for creating happiness at work from my article last month – these tips will help lower your stress and increase your happiness at work, without having to switch jobs.

Here's more good news: There are jobs which are less stressful on average, with higher than average job satisfaction. Studies show that the following jobs (in no particular order) have been ranked as less stressful:

- Wind turbine technicians
- Pharmacy technician
- Accountant
- AudiologistTenured professo
- Tenured professor
- Optometrist Occupational therapist or assistant
- Physical therapist
- Actuary
- Statistician Massage therapist

- Diagnostic medical sonographer
- Compliance officer
- Hairstylist
- Medical records technician
- Civil engineers
- Jeweler
- Operations research analyst

These jobs range in pay scale as well as in the level of education required. One factor they have in common is that they all possess a degree of autonomy. I have yet to hear of a 100% no stress job. (If you are working a no-stress job, please contact me!) However, there definitely are jobs with far lower levels of stress than others. If you are hoping to have a lower stress job, you might want to consider one of the above.

A high schooler's journey to help homeless single women

Homelessness is an issue that affects everyone. There are shelters across the US that try to help the homeless population. However, more than 85% are mixed-gender. Most shelters group women without children in the same category as homeless men, which can leave single women vulnerable to abuse. Therefore, many homeless women prefer to "rough-sleep" on the streets or find alternate arrangements, even if those are exploitative. In this setting, they cannot access resources such as support groups, counseling, and other services provided at the homeless shelters.

A high school senior in Fremont, Ananya Dua first came to learn of the seriousness of the homeless issue for women when she joined the California Youth Crisis Line for volunteering in her high school freshman year.

To Dua, "it soon became more than that." She talked to teens from a myriad of backgrounds and experiences. She remembers one call with a runaway teen who told her, "I sleep on the streets; it's safer this way." The interaction shattered Dua's perception of a homeless shelter being a safe haven. In 2019, Dua decided that she would help the "best [she] could." "I set out to tackle the circumstances and ask difficult questions about privilege, access, and inequality in society."

Upon research, Dua found that homeless single women would benefit from being connected to appropriate resources to find a way out of homelessness. To address the plight of single homeless women, Dua registered a think tank Project Her Home (PHH) in 2019 with the help of Radhika Shandilya, a transitional housing worker, and Dr. Ruschelle Leone, a professor of psychology and gender studies at Georgia State University. As Dua dived in to help this segment of the homeless population, she recalls that the facts she had read about homelessness "were simply statistics to me before I started Project Her Home."

Dua explains that PHH fights gender-based violence and housing insecurity among homeless women. The organization has fifteen youth members and an extensive




advisory board with professionals and transitional housing workers. The organization's youth leaders research leading social justice issues and struggles among homeless women. For Dua, her biggest achievement for the organization and for her personally was the recognition she got when her organization received grant funding from Hershey's, Matt's Kindness and Power of Youth Challenge, and the Peace First organization.

Dua takes pride in her organization's app, also called PHH (patent pending), which connects women to women-only shelters, violence prevention resources, menstruation hygiene, health care services, and other nformation. PHH App is available on Google Play Store (Search for "Project Her Home.") When users or other members of the organizaion share new resources through comments or on the website, Dua adds the resource to the App. Dua explains important features of the App for which women and youth have often expressed their gratitude:

- "Keep Me Safe" supplies women with self-defense and disease prevention tips and videos. It has an SOS button that instantly connects them with 911 if they are in a dangerous situation. The app also sends 911 a text with current location information.
- The app connects users with credible and safe women-only shelters near their location. It also provides a map with the location of various resources and directions to reach them. The app is currently established in 33 shelters across the US in 13 states. Through these partnerships, the app helps women navigate their way out of homelessness.
- The app features a self-care toolkit that has been developed by professionals to help with mental health. It guides women on meditation and mindfulness activities as well as helps them incorporate positive affiliations and navigate ups and downs through the embedded journal feature.

Homelessness continues to be a critical societal problem. As we become aware of the issues and individual struggles of homeless members in our communities, we can strive to help them in multiple ways. Dua implores teenagers and other youth to "become active changemakers and find solutions through innovation and creativity to social problems."

Fremont students named National Merit Scholarship semifinalists

In September seniors from each comprehensive high school in Fremont Unified School District (FUSD) were named as National Merit Scholarship Program semifinalists for 2023. In all, 169 FUSD students were among the approximately 16,000 semifinalists named nationally, representing less than one percent of high school seniors nationwide.

For the second year in a row, Fremont garnered the second-highest number of semifinalists among California cities at 170 (169 from FUSD schools and one from Fremont Christian High School) – trailing only San José.

High school juniors were screened for the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program through the 2021 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®); semifinalists are the highest-scoring entrants in each state. Each comprehensive high school in FUSD has six or more semifinalists: Mission San Jose High School placed 81, American High School placed 41, Irvington High School placed 33, Washington High School placed eight and Kennedy High School placed six.

After submitting applications demonstrating their academic record, community service, leadership, employment and honors/awards received, these FUSD students may join other semifinalists nationwide competing for over 7,000 scholarships worth nearly \$28 million. Semifinalists must also have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT® or ACT® scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test.

Students will be notified if they advanced to the finalist level in February 2023, and National Merit Scholarship winners will be selected from these finalists. The 2023 National Merit Scholarship winners will be announced in four nationwide news releases between April and July 2023.

Tesla runs out of battery, leaving local family stuck for hours

Renewable. Smart. Supercharger. Range. Grid. These are some of the first words that come to mind when describing electric vehicles (EVs). As more and more people start feeling the direct effects of climate change, EVs have renewed hope for a world with cleaner air, flourishing ecosystems, and fewer natural disasters, with Tesla leading the EV revolution. In its 2021 Impact Report (tinyurl.com/3hbeahty), Tesla stressed the safety of the vehicles as the top design priority, but for Jeany P., her two daughters, and her husband, Tesla failed to meet its promise.

While coming home from Las Vegas in their Model 3 Tesla in late July 2022, Jeany and her family felt lost on what to do when a flood, which she described as "like a river," barricaded the road. When they arrived at 3:30 p.m., two trucks were trapped in the middle of the water, and for the next few minutes, they watched as cars failed and succeeded in driving through waist-level water. Jeany expressed the dilemma, "When there is water in front of me, and some drive successfully and some get trapped, what decision should I make?"

To make matters worse, there was a charging station only 15 miles away across the blocked road, but out of the twelve other Teslas at the flood, only one had just

enough battery to reach the station. Even more, Jeany recounted that their Tesla could not detect the water in front of them and repeated the instruction, "Go straight to the next charging station." After manually calculating the battery percentage and mileage, they realized their Tesla did not have enough battery to return to the previous station and were "sure the car would be dead in the middle of the desert" if they tried.

After assessing the situation, they sought roadside assistance through the Tesla app, "hoping it could guide [them] to a real person," but were disappointed to find the menu offered solutions to generic problems, such as a flat tire. They ultimately decided it was not worth the risk to cross the flood, and for the next six hours, they nervously waited until their towing car arrived at 9 p.m.

Despite the harrowing experience, when asked what she would like to say to current Tesla owners or anyone

considering going electric, Jeany replied, "I think for commuting in places that have plenty of charging stations, it is definitely a good car. If we're driving in the Bay Area, we don't have to worry too much." Jeany's response highlights the main issue: There is not enough charging infrastructure to keep up with the demand.

According to Fuels Institute's 2021 EV Consumer Behavior Report, "70-80% of charging occurs at home or at a workplace parking lot" (tinyurl.com/5tzyd27a). However, as EV sales continue their exponential growth, more ports are now necessary, especially for those who lack personal parking places, live in remote areas like the desert, or consistently go on longer trips requiring multiple recharges. In fact, a Forbes article by Nives Dolsak and Aseem Prakash states, "Assuming 35 million EVs by 2030, the U.S. will need to build about 50,000 DCFCs [Direct Current Fast Chargers] and 1.2 million Level 2 ports. This means that 380 EV charging ports will need to be installed



each day over the next nine years!" (tinyurl.com/5x4c9ner).

There is the worry that technology is advancing faster than society can adapt, but regarding the EV revolution, it appears technology and its accompanying infrastructure needs to expand. Jeany and her family's ordeal paints a picture of the current landscape of EVs, including its problems and potential. Without the proper infrastructure to support the movement, there will always be EV range anxiety and fear of a situation like Jeany's, no matter how many times Tesla and other EV companies get the highest rankings from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS).

The future of EVs show incredible promise of a healthier and happier world – a world without worries of air pollution – leaving EV companies, the federal government, and community leaders with a tremendous responsibility to help make an automotive society possible. Until then, however, the question for consumers remains, "Would you buy a Tesla?"

How to get rejected in the first five pages

Getting through the book contest judging process isn't easy for the writers or judges like Tish and Scott Davidson, who experienced the importance and power of "the first five pages" recently while reading over 160 entries in a contest for small press and independently published books. They'll be sharing what they've learned with members and guests of the Fremont Area Writers on Saturday September 24.

"The first five pages of the entries we judged ranged from the ridiculous to the sublime. Those first pages were crucial because a book has to grab and keep your attention. Most judges will read five pages, but if there are glaring mistakes in that short space, we have to move on to the next entry," Scott explained.

"We chose to cite mistakes we came across that we personally learned from, because it's easier to see errors in other people's writing than it is in your own," Scott explained. "And once you become alert to common problems, you can use that knowledge to improve your own work."

"What I've learned as a judge has taught me a lot, improving my own writing," added Tish. She writes on medical issues and history for audiences ranging from elementary school to adult, and has just signed a contract for her seventeenth traditionally published book. Her newest book for adolescents, Hormones: Your Questions Answered, (ABC-CLIO, an imprint of Bloomsbury) was released in July, and Medical Firsts: Innovations and Milestones that Changed the World is scheduled for publication in early 2023 by the same publisher.

Over the past 25 years, Scott Davidson has had a non-technical column, "The Last Byte," in IEEE Design & Test, been on the editorial board of two journals, and done contest judging for science fiction books.

In their talk the Davidsons will focus on the most memorable mistakes they've come across, including lots of examples. "By looking critically at the work of others, you will get a good idea of how to write to get your book rejected in the first five pages." Tish smiled. "And then you can go out and do just the opposite!"

Landmark decision ends fossil fuel subsidies for new buildings

Members of the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) voted September 15 to end subsidies connecting new buildings to the gas system effective July 1, 2023.

CPUC officials said this first-in-the-nation decision will help California move toward all-electric construction and reduce the state's reliance on fossil fuels. Additionally, it will provide bill relief to California gas customers, who have been paying an estimated \$164 million each year for

gas line extensions. Additionally, the ruling will avoid increasing emissions from homes and buildings -- which are already responsible for roughly a quarter of the state's greenhouse gas emissions.

"This decision helps California transition to a decarbonized future for its homes and buildings," said Jose Torres, California Director at the Building Decarbonization Coalition. "By ending gas subsidies, it will be more affordable to build all-electric homes while also making homes safer and healthier for all Californians. This vote is a monumental step in the fight against climate change."

The decision comes on the heels of key actions and investments for building electrification in California this year. In July, Governor Newsom set new climate targets for three million climate-ready homes and six million heat pumps by 2030 and seven million climate-ready homes by 2035. Following this announcement, state legislators approved a \$1.4 billion investment in the California budget to decarbonize buildings and expand access to efficient, life-saving cooling for households, prioritizing low-income and environmental justice communities. The state's investment along with the CPUC's decision will help California meet Governor Newsom's climate targets.

The workshop is designed to prepare workers to enter and succeed in registered Apprenticeship Programs associated with a particular trade or craft union. These programs provide a combination of classroom instruction and on-the-job training, including paid employment.

They also serve to support goals for hiring Hayward residents and Hayward Unified School District graduates on city construction projects under the city's Community Workforce Agreement with the Building and Construction Trades Council of Alameda County.

In turn, graduates of registered Apprenticeship Programs are certified as journey-level workers in their trade or craft, and can then work from union hiring halls in Alameda County, across the region and state, or anywhere in the United States.

A hive of activity in East Bay Parks

Gyms provide an opportunity for someone to work out on expensive equipment without having to purchase it themselves. Other places make the investment in equipment or machines for hobbyists as well. Pottery studios have kilns, small commercial kitchens have appliances for making baked goods, and there are shops with equipment and storage casks for making wine. Soon the East Bay Regional Parks will provide space for those who want to try out beekeeping but can't do this hobby at home.

The Park District's Board voted in July to approve a program that would allow people to keep beehives on park property. The application process, fee, and available locations are currently being developed with a tentative goal of having the program fully operational around the beginning of 2023. This program, by providing the land to place a beehive on, will make beekeeping accessible to anyone who does not have the space to house a beehive. Although the program's launch date is a few months away, there are still things new beekeepers can do to prepare for starting their own hive.

New and veteran beekeepers benefit greatly from joining local beekeeping clubs or by taking apiary classes. Fremont-beeks@googlegroups.com is a great way to get information from local beekeepers or 'beeks' about bee issues in the immediate area. Alameda County Beekeepers Association (ACBA) (alamedabees.org) is a long running club that holds monthly meetings, often with presentations by expert speakers. The \$10 yearly membership fee grants entry into a



Google forum for advice, access to the club's extensive library, low-cost honey harvesting equipment rental, and mentorship opportunities. BioFuel Oasis (biofueloasis.com) is an urban farming shop in Berkeley that holds regular introductory beekeeping classes, honey harvesting classes, and hive inspection classes for a reasonable price.

Anyone interested in keeping a beehive, whether at home or in an East Bay Regional Park, will need their own hive and other equipment. There are many different styles of beehives. Most beekeepers use Langstroth hives that consist of stacked boxes and removable frames. The lower boxes' frames are usually where the queen lays her eggs, while upper frames are where bees create and store honey. Removable boxes and frames make it simple to inspect for problems and easy to expand hive space in the summer and limit space in the winter.

Many experienced beekeepers are most comfortable working their bees with a full bee suit, but some feel OK wearing jeans and beekeeping jacket with just a mesh veil. The extra protection of a full body bee suit is recommended for beginning beekeeping since it can raise confidence. Investing in a pair of beekeeping gloves is worthwhile. They are elbow length, allowing for plenty of overlap with the bee suit's or bee jacket's sleeves, and are well ventilated.

Beekeeping involves more work than just harvesting honey. The hive will need to be opened periodically to inspect for mites and diseases, for anti-swarming measures, and other reasons. A bee brush and hive tool will make opening and closing the hive easier and safe for the









bees. A frame grip will make it easier to hold a frame with one hand, especially as it can weigh around 10 pounds when full of honey. A smoker is essential for calming and distracting the bees when the hive is open.

Finding beekeeping equipment is not difficult. There is no shortage of help from experienced beekeepers in clubs. They may have spare clothing or equipment that they would be willing to sell. Dadant & Sons (dadant.com), America's oldest and largest manufacturer of beekeeping supplies, has a huge online store. Some local feed stores



sell beekeeping equipment. Sam's
Downtown Feed and Pet Supply in
San Jose has one of the larger selections of
beekeeping equipment.

There are differing opinions about whether or not a queen and the other bees used to start a new hive should be from local bees or from bees bred elsewhere. The choice might come down to availability and price. BioFuel Oasis, listed above, sells small colonies of 1,000 bees, with a queen bred for mite, resistance for around \$100. 2023 nucs, short for nucleus colonies, go on sale in November with pickup dates in spring 2023. Members of ACBA can be placed on a bee sharing list, which will eventually offer them a colony of local bees acquired from catching a swarm or split from another member's hive. Although there is no fee except club membership, it is hoped that eventually the beneficiary of the shared bees will reciprocate.

Beekeeping is an enjoyable hobby that has tremendous positive effect on the local environment. Soon everyone will be able to enjoy the sweet taste of beekeeping thanks to the good will of the East Bay Regional Parks.

45 Years on, the Voyagers are still going strong

In the late summer of 1977, two unmanned spacecrafts, Voyager 1 and Voyager 2, lifted off from Cape Canaveral, Florida atop Titan-Centaur rockets. Voyager 2 launched on August 20, 1977, followed by Voyager 1 on September 5, 1977. Both probes traveled to Jupiter and Saturn, with Voyager 1 moving faster and reaching them first. Together, the probes unveiled much about not only the solar system's two largest planets, but also their moons. The time of launch was planned such that all the planets in Voyager's path were in perfect alignment. This is something that occurs only once every 176 years. The spacecrafts were in position to visit all four of the outer planets, making it a grand slam.

Voyager 2 also became the first and only spacecraft to fly close to Uranus (in the year 1986) and Neptune (in the year 1989), offering humanity remarkable views and insights into these distant worlds. Now traveling uninterrupted through interstellar space, the Voyagers have been enduring for 45 years and are set to do so forever until the power runs out. Each Voyager is powered by a radioisotope thermoelectric generator containing plutonium, which gives off heat that is converted to electricity. As the plutonium decays, the heat output decreases, and the Voyagers lose electricity.

To compensate, the team turned off all nonessential systems and some once considered essential, including heaters that protect the operating instruments from the frigid temperatures of space. All five of the instruments that have had their heaters turned off since 2019 are still working, despite being well below the lowest temperatures they were ever tested at.

However, over the years, the Voyager team has grown familiar to overcoming challenges that come with operating such mature spacecraft, sometimes calling upon retired colleagues for their expertise or perusing through legacy documentation written decades ago. Most of the technology has also become obsolete in the course of time.


Recently, Voyager 1 began experiencing a communication issue that caused status information about one of its onboard

systems to become jumbled. Despite this, the system and spacecraft otherwise continue to operate normally, suggesting the problem is with the production of the status data, not the system itself. The probe is still sending back science observations while the engineering team tries to fix the

problem or find a way to work around it.

In the event the spacecraft encounter alien intelligence, both Voyagers also carry a copper phonograph record a message celebrating the sights and sounds of Earth. These unique discs contain photographs of everyday life as well as voices offering greetings in 55 languages. There are also animal noises, the music of Beethoven and Chuck Berry, a baby crying, laughter, rain, and a heartbeat.



Positive West Nile Virus Mosquitoes Found in **Milpitas**

The County of Santa Clara Vector Control District has confirmed the presence of West Nile virus-positive mosquitoes in a small area of Milpitas (ZIP code 95035). Weather permitting, this area will be treated to reduce adult mosquito populations with the use of truck-mounted equipment on Wednesday, Sept. 21, starting around 10 p.m. and concluding a few hours later.


The District's mosquito management program largely focuses on preventing mosquitoes from reaching the adult biting stage by proactively targeting immature stages of mosquitoes found in standing water. When a mosquito with West Nile Virus (WNV) is detected, however, the District takes the added step of conducting adult mosquito control treatment to reduce the mosquito population in the area,



When the legendary center fielder for the Detroit Tigers passed away in 1961 Cobb's biographer, Al Stump, wound up with his dentures. Karen Shemonsky purchased them at auction in 1999 for \$7,475, telling the New York Post: "This is such a thrill to me to now own a piece of baseball history." This time around, the auction house, SCP, described Cobb's choppers as being "well-preserved."

Riding the wake

The first time around, "Wakesurfer" Lori Keeton set the Guinness world Wakesurfing record for going at it for eight hours straight; that was in 2021, says AMAC. She outdid herself this time around, breaking her record behind a motorboat for 15 hours, although her goal was to keep Wakesurfing for 24 hours. For those new to the sport, Wakesurfing involves riding a surfboard behind a motorboat without the benefit of a tow rope. Jury duty payment bill signed into law

A new bill that will allow jurors to be reimbursed for using public transportation to fulfil their civic duty was signed into law September 15 by California Governor Gavin Newsom. The measure, co-authored by Assemblymember Alex Lee (D-San Jose), also will create a pilot program to increase juror compensation, so it does not become a financial hardship to serve on a jury.

"The right to a trial by jury applies to both criminal and civil cases, but jury trials can't be held unless people are able to perform their civic duties," said Lee. "By expanding reimbursement options for taking transit and increasing juror pay, we can have juries that are more reflective of our communities leading to better outcomes and better experiences for the jurors."

Currently, jurors can only be reimbursed for traveling in passenger vehicles at the rate of \$0.34 per mile one-way, and there is no mechanism to compensate jurors for taking public transit. This disadvantages Californians who do not own a car, are unable to drive, or prefer other modes of transportation. By allowing jurors to be reimbursed for taking public transit, jurors are given more options as well as an incentive to take public transit, which will encourage greener ways to travel, and expand access to Californians without cars to fulfill their civic duties.

Currently, the state pays its jurors at much lower rates when compared to the federal court system. Jurors who serve on federal juries in California receive \$50 per day, with the potential to increase to up to \$60 per day after serving 10 days. However, California currently only pays jurors \$15 per day (starting on the second day of service). While studies have shown that diverse groups deliberated longer and considered a wider range of information than homogeneous groups, the high cost of living in California makes it nearly impossible for working families to make ends meet on the current low payment of \$15 per day.

Other co-authors of the bill were Assemblymembers Marc Berman (D-Menlo Park), Cristina Garcia (D-Bell Gardens), Eduardo Garcia (D-Coachella), Adrin Nazarian (D-Van Nuys), Mark Stone (D-Monterey Bay) and Senators Josh Becker (D-Peninsula), Josh Newman (D-Fullerton), and Scott Wiener (D-San Francisco).

Lee represents the 25th Assembly District which includes the cities of Fremont, Newark, Milpitas, San Jose and Santa Clara. Anniversaries of two highly significant events of our nation are observed in September; one a terrorist attack on U.S. soil in 2001 and the other, much older and fundamental to the republic. On September 17, 1787 this nation declared its values and structure when 39 delegates to a Constitutional Convention signed a document that, while open to interpretation and revision, has stood the test of time and challenges from within and outside our borders. Citizenship of the United States of America began that day and its value for those who receive it through birthright or naturalization has been a beacon of hope and stabilization for the world at large ever since.

Strife and divisiveness are not new to our shores and probably will never be eradicated through words and reason. However, the Constitution gives direction and a sense of order to the chaotic processes of democracy. Knowledge and understanding of the principles at the core of the document give it strength and

durability. If it becomes a dogmatic, ritualistic, inconsequential figure of speech without context or substance, our system will fail. The Constitution's birth was derived from a group of people who risked everything to find a better way of life and break free from tyranny and injustice of birthright and autocracy. Not perfect by any measure, this group nevertheless had a vision of something better than their current circumstances and did the best they could to memorialize this in writing and practice.

Liberty, freedom and "inalienable rights," detailed in the United States Constitution are not simply slogans or empty promotions. Many have sacrificed, some their lives, to continue the great experiment of democracy. It is up to each generation to continue that struggle and work toward a better, stronger and more efficient political and social system. Currently, at all levels of our society, divisive speech and action have gained a strong foothold on political and social life. It is time to turn toward our founding principles, rather than fear, extreme rhetoric and emotional frenzy. As the political season heats up and we move closer toward the November mid-term elections, candidates need to be clear about their views of important issues. We remain a strong and resilient nation that, through its trials and tribulations, has continued to welcome newcomers and honor our citizens through birthright or obtained citizenship.

September hosts a celebration of this commitment in what began in 1940 as "I am an American Day." President Harry Truman signed it into law in 1952,

honoring all American people, especially recent naturalized citizens of the United States. Although originally established in May, through efforts of Ohio resident Olga T. Weber, the date was changed to coincide with the signing of the United States Constitution. In 1953, President Dwight D. Eisenhower approved the change and "I am an American Day" became "Citizenship Day," moving to September 17.

An additional highlight of the Constitution, through efforts of Louise Leigh, is the observance of simultaneous "Constitution Day" when federal agencies provide employees with educational materials concerning the Constitution and educational institutions that receive Federal funds are encouraged to hold constitution-related programs for students. Constitution Day is an important part of our cultural heritage recognizing the rights and liberties protected by a written Constitution.

September is a special month, in which we are reminded of the value, responsibility and honor of American citizenship. In the coming months of political frenzy and obstreperous posturing, this is a moment to appreciate and take stock of our heritage and commitment to common goals of a just society with freedom from autocracy, fear, hypocrisy and dishonesty.

The new SMART service launched September 12. Rides can be scheduled from various locations within Milpitas, to one of the following hubs:

- Milpitas Transit Center
- Alder VTA light rail station

The cost per ride is \$2.50 for adults and \$1.00 per ride for youth, disabled, and low-income people. Milpitas SMART provides service from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Mondays through Fridays using minivans with ADA access. Maximum wait times are between 10 and



Blast off!

On September 17, 1976 America's inaugural space shuttle, the Constitution, was scheduled for lift off, but then according to the National Air and Space Museum -- it was "rebranded" the USS Enterprise after "President Ford reportedly received thousands of petition signatures from avid Star Trek fans across the country."

Subsequently, regular exploration of the heavens did not resume until the USS Columbia took off in April of 1981 from Cape Canaveral, Florida. Its two solid-rocket boosters put the capsule into orbit for a two-day shakedown mission, and a "glider-like" return to Edwards Air Force in California.

Keep on fighting

When the Revolutionary War started in 1775, the British navy was believed to be – unbeatable -- until John Paul Jones, a bold, young, senior lieutenant in the newly established Continental Navy, "distinguished himself in actions against British ships in the Bahamas, the Atlantic Ocean and the English Channel," according to History.com.

Then, on September 23, 1779, Commander Jones -- while aboard his vessel, the Bonhomme Richard -- sighted two British warships on the eastern coast of England: the HMS Serapis, and the HMS Countess of Scarborough:

"After inflicting considerable damage to the Bonhomme Richard, Richard Pearson, the captain of the Serapis, asked Jones [to strike] his colors, the naval signal indicating surrender. From his disabled ship, Jones replied, "I have not yet begun to fight." After three more hours of frenetic fighting, the Serapis and the Countess of Scarborough surrendered.

A peace treaty

During the Revolutionary War, the Continental Congress dispatched John Adams to France "as minister plenipotentiary in charge of negotiating treaties of peace and commerce with Great Britain," according to History.com.

By late in 1782, "The tide of the war was turning in America's favor" and Adams returned to Paris in October of that year along with John Jay and Benjamin Franklin. Their mission was to negotiate a peace treaty between the American colonies and Great Britain and to put an end to the rebellion. It took almost a year but eventually, in early September of 1783 both sides signed the Treaty of Paris ending the American Revolution and formally recognizing the United States as an independent nation.

Adams was a Founding Father, America's first vice president under George Washington, and the country's second president. The Grateful American Book Prize recommends "The Treaty of Paris: The Precursor to a New Nation" by Edward J. Renehan Jr.



Advocate for Alzheimer's

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

A recent Gallup Poll revealed the low approval rating of Congress: 17%. That is abysmal given the polarized environment Capitol Hill has become in recent years.

What is often not reported, however, is the humanity of our elected officials. I had the privilege of attending the Alzheimer's Association Impact Movement Advocacy Forum in Washington DC this past spring. Shortly after my father, Quan Trieu, was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease in 2019, I became a volunteer advocate to contribute to the movement and give voice to my father and others impacted. I, along with 700 other advocates donning purple sashes from all around the country, engaged in the most basic American civic duty by meeting with members of Congress. I met with my representative, Congressman Swalwell (CA–15) and his legislative aide, Lucas Lam, to share my father's story

Victor (Vic) G. Hernandez

March 24, 1926 - September 13, 2022 Resident of Fremont/Folsom

Vic passed away peacefully at the age of 96. Born in Fresno, Vic was #6 of 12 siblings. His family settled in Irvington (now Fremont) in 1932. He attended Irvington Grammar School and Washington High School. He was known as a hard-working, dedicated husband, brother and loyal friend. At 18, he entered into the Army and served in WWII in the 128th Infantry Regiment from 1944-1946, where he saw combat in two South Pacific campaigns.

After the war, he attended San Jose Tech where he began his career in auto body repair and painting. In 1954, Township Body Repairs was established in Fremont and remained in business for 42 years!

On December 11, 1955, he married his greatest love, Christine Martinez (1932-2012) after meeting in San Jose. They settled in Fremont and were married for 57 years. They had three children, Victor Rene, Charles Anthony (deceased) and Diane (Patrick) and later three grandchildren, Julia (Albert), Connor & Griffin.

Vic was a proud, active Charter Member/Past Exalted Ruler of Fremont Elks Lodge #2121, member/commander of Veterans of Foreign Wars, Native Sons of the Golden West, and



Alameda County Sheriff Reservist (3x pistol marksman champion). He loved sports and participated in softball, bowling and golf throughout his life.

and to advocate for legislation designed to support those with Alzheimer's and the people who care for them.

Congressman Swalwell leaned forward and asked three of the kindest questions: what was my father's name, how my father is doing, and what can he do to support folks like my father. That interaction was so genuine, empathetic, and revealed the humanity of what I believe is inherent in our lawmakers that polling doesn't tell -- beyond the image we see on television during committee hearings or in reelection campaign commercials. I would have loved to have my father present, an 87-year-old man born in China but has spent half of his life here in the States, so he can witness democracy at work, and more importantly, see and feel the community of care that extends beyond his family, even with his limited English proficiency.

My family and I do what we can to maintain his quality of life and find ways to bring joy even if he cannot express it verbally. My father would have been humbled knowing that there are advocates out there working to promote public policy designed to increase awareness, improve treatment options, and find a cure for Alzheimer's. Representative Swalwell was present and engaged -- the same

characteristics that my family and I try to demonstrate in our care of my father.

A few weeks ago, I attended a townhall Congressman Swalwell hosted in Union City and was so impressed with the range of questions constituents posed to him, and the depth of his familiarity and passion in his responses. While there, I ran into his legislative aide, Lucas Lam, who I met in the spring, and was able to follow up with him about one of the bills that we discussed -- NAPA (National Alzheimer's Project Act) Reauthorization Act, which supports coordination of federal planning, programs, and other efforts to address Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. A few days later, I received word that Congressman Swalwell signed on to co-sponsor the legislation. I was beyond thrilled -- and deeply grateful. Thank you, Congressman Swalwell, for representing our family and community so that we can take care of each other and live lives of meaning and dignity -- and for supporting the Alzheimer's Association's priorities.

Park It:

As noted in the last column, this is the mating season for tarantulas, those large, furry spiders that inhabit many of the regional parks and other open spaces. When the weather turns cooler in the fall, male tarantulas venture forth from their burrows in search of females, who await in silk-lined underground boudoirs. You are most likely to see a tarantula in late afternoon or early evening, after the heat of the day.

When the male finds a burrow and senses that a female is within, he taps on the entrance with his pedipalps, the spider's front-most appendages. The female emerges, and they mate, the male using his tibial spurs to ward off the female's fangs. It isn't easy being a male tarantula. After mating, the female can sometimes kill the male as a source of protein for herself and her offspring. Even if she does not, males generally do not survive long after mating. Males live for seven to ten years; females can live as long as thirty.

Tarantulas also must guard against tarantula hawks, a variety of wasp. The wasps can paralyze the spiders with their sting, drag the still living but helpless victim to the wasp burrow, then lay eggs on the spider, upon which the wasp larvae will feed when they hatch.

Tarantulas can bite. It's venomous, but not enough to harm humans. Besides their fangs, tarantulas' other defense is irritating hairs on their backs, which they can propel towards attackers using their forelegs.

To see a tarantula in captivity, stop by the visitor center at Del Valle Regional Park south of Livermore or the Environmental Education Center at Tilden Nature Area near Berkeley. If you see one in the wild, please do not pick up or otherwise disturb the spider. Despite their size and appearance, they are easily injured. Moreover they are slow moving, harmless, and an important part of the natural world.

Another furry creature of interest is the beaver. And you can find out all about them in a couple of programs at Big Break Regional Shoreline in Oakley. First of all, there's a naturalist-led "Bashful Beavers" craft program from 12 noon to 2 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday, September 24 and 25, at the Big Break visitor center.

And one of the park's interpretive student aides will lead a walk in search of beaver sign from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. on Sunday, September 25. The big, flat-tailed rodents are often shy and hard to find, but their presence can be detected by gnaw marks on trees and other evidence.

Both programs are free, and registration is not necessary. Big Break is at 69 Big Break Road off Oakley's Main Street. For information, call (510) 544-3050.

"The Things of Nature/The Nature of Things" is a program series at the Tilden Nature Area near Berkeley, with naturalist Anthony Fisher. Anthony will lead a walk through the Nature Area from 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, September 25 in search of plants and animals with which we share the planet.

The program is free and reservations are not needed. Meet at the Environmental Education Center, at the north end of Tilden's Central Park Drive. For more information, call (510) 544-2233.

'Slithering Serpents" are the stars of Family Nature Fun Hour from 1:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Saturday, September 24 in Doug Siden Visitor Center at Crab Cove in Alameda. Drop by the center and meet some live snakes to see how they live and eat. The program repeats at the same time on Sunday.

The ethnobotany garden at Coyote Hills Regional Park in Fremont contains a variety of native plants that were used for food, medicine and tools by the Ohlone Peoples. 

California General Election 2022 quick facts

PROVIDED BY STATE OF CALIFORNIA DIVISION OF ELECTIONS

How do I register to vote? To register to vote in California, you must be:

- A United States citizen and a resident of California
- 18 years old or older on Election Day
- Not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony
- Not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- Registration for Nov. 8 General Election ends Oct. 24.

If you are eligible, you can register to vote or update your registration online at registertovote.ca.gov. If you would like to fill out a physical form, voter registration applications can be found at post offices and libraries. You must re-register to vote if you move, change your name, or change your political party preference.

Need to check your voter registration status?

To check your voter registration status, you can use the "My Voter Status" tool at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov. Or call Voter Hotline at 1 800 345 VOTE (8683).

Need voter information in a different language?

Statewide voter information is available in 10 languages. Visit www.sos.ca.gov/elections/voting resources/voting california. Contact your county elections official to see what languages local information may be available in.

What if I miss the voter registration deadline?

If you miss the deadline to register to vote 15 days before an election, you can still go to your county elections office, vote center, or polling place on or before Election Day to complete the conditional voter registration process (often referred to as "Same Day Voter Registration"). Conditional registration for Nov. 8 General Election: Oct.25-Nov.8.

When will I receive my ballot?

For Nov. 8, 2022 General Election, counties will begin mailing ballots by October 10, 2022.

Can I track my vote-by-mail ballot?

Yes! Where's My Ballot? allows voters to track and receive notifications on the status of their vote by mail ballot. Sign up at wheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov.

What if I need a replacement ballot or need an emergency ballot?

If you did not receive your vote by mail ballot or you have lost or destroyed your original vote by mail ballot, and you are unable to vote in person at the polls, you may apply in writing for a late vote by mail ballot. This application will need to be provided in person to the county elections official by you or your representative. The late vote by mail ballot application can be found at elections.cdn.sos.ca.gov/vote by mail/pdf/late vote by mail application.pdf.

How early can I vote?

Your county may offer early voting locations before Election Day. For a list go to vote.ca.gov. For the November 8, 2022, General Election, ballots will be mailed to every active Californian voter by October 10, 2022. To ensure your vote by mail ballot is counted, it must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by your county elections office no later than 7 days after Election Day.

Is my vote secure?

Yes. Every vote must be cast on a paper ballot or have a voter verified paper audit trail. Voting equipment used to cast and count ballots must be certified for use in California and kept offline. Elections officials conduct post-election audits, including a manual tally of a sample of ballots.

How do I find out if my ballot has been counted?

You can find out if your vote was counted and if not, why not at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov. Vote by mail ballots must be postmarked on or before November 8, 2022, and received by county elections offices no later than November 15, 2022.

Hayward enacts water use restrictions

In response to a reduced water supply and the Governor's call for a state-wide reduction in water use, Hayward City Council implemented Level 2 Water Shortage measures on June 28. A Level 2 Water Supply Shortage exists when the city determines that a water supply shortage or threatened shortage exists and a consumer-demand reduction is necessary.

With a focus on limiting outdoor water use, the new requirements prohibit:

- Application of water to driveways and sidewalks.
- Decorative fountains or ornamental water features that do not recirculate water.
 - Irrigation during and within 48 hours after measurable rainfall.
 - Irrigation leaks and faulty sprinklers.
 - Use of non-essential water for commercial and industrial use.
- Use of water that results in flooding or runoff into gutters or streets.

Cohousing, get to know your neighbors BEFORE you move in

Forging a connection with neighbors requires working and socializing together. That is what is happening within the Mission Peak Village cohousing group in Fremont, even though they don't yet live in the same neighborhood.

To cultivate the community feeling craved by most humans, it is essential to deepen relationships beyond the superficial "How's the weather?" level. Establishing common interests begins those deeper, more satisfying relationships. Sharing the tasks of daily living is a wonderful way to lighten workloads and become part of a larger, more intimate community. Over the past few years, members of Mission Peak Village have already:

· discovered common interests and had fun through recreational activities such as hiking and picnicking

- learned how to make decisions using consensus
- helped one another with childcare
- collaborated on errand-running
- shared their garden produce
- cooked for the group with monthly potlucks (before COVID prompted them to move their events online)
 - carpooled to interesting local events
- brought meals to members undergoing medical
- · navigated city permitting requirements celebrated holidays and important community
- milestones helped a member with her book launch
- collaborated to spread the word about their cohous-

These are a few of the activities that have facilitated relationship-building among Mission Peak Village members even before moving into their new homes... and throughout a time when health and safety dictated that we meet only via Zoom. Nevertheless, relationships begin to deepen as soon as a potential member signs on as a Mission Peak Village Explorer. Trust builds as the network of cohousers work together to incorporate new members.

Networking continues as they join to design the buildings (i.e., common areas and individually owned units). The expertise of cohousing consultants provides greater knowledge of how to advance such a large building project. Members' know-how in different a reas culminates in better decisions than if those choices were undertaken alone. When the group encounters unanticipated obstacles, solving the problems by determining what's best for the community creates a bond.

Actions speak louder than words! Once the cohousing project is built, working closely with one another ensures the well-being of the group and is a wonderful way to foster cooperation. Cohousers pool resources like lawnmowers, clothes washers, and cars to lower living costs. They also share duties such as periodically making a meal in the common dining hall or gardening and weeding in the shared outdoor areas.

Working for the good of a group is not for everyone, but those who have become part of a cohousing network of sharing rarely decide to leave the inimacy of the community. Members of the 180 cohousing projects in existence in the U.S. and the 140 in the planning stages desire the benefits that this cooperative way of living brings and wouldn't live any other way.

Hayward Area Shoreline Planning Agency

Snowy Plover, Black Skimmers and other threatened shorebirds thrive among the pickle weed and eelgrass marshes of the Hayward Shoreline. 3,150 publicly owned shoreline acres have endured commercial salt production, biosolids filtration and other environmental stress for

decades. In the early 1900's the shore's central beach was Hayward's first landfill. By the 1920's natural recovery of the tidal zone assisted notable growth in the Bay's oyster population and cultivation. Remaining fragments of glass and porcelain were ideal habitat for the pearl producing mollusk.

Roughly 8 miles of shoreline offer more than 20 miles of foot paths and biking trails as well as navigable waterways for kayaking and fishing. Established in 1970, the purpose of the Hayward Area Shoreline Planning Agency (HASPA) is to coordinate planning activities and adopt and carry out policies for the improvement of the Hayward Shoreline for future generations. HASPA is a joint powers agency consisting of representatives from the City of Hayward, East Bay Regional Parks District and Hayward Area Recreation and Parks District.

Climate change has precipitated an inevitable flooding threat to the low-lying Hayward Shoreline. Sea level rise is expected to consistently inundate and eventually overtake the wetlands within the next 25 years. The present focus of the 3 member HASPA team is to implement a long-range Shoreline Master Plan that outlines comprehensive remediation efforts for Hayward's most important natural community asset. Master Plan efforts should return the public shoreland to wetlands, marshes

and protected uplands.

The 240-page Master Plan was funded through a Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant from the California Department of Transportation (CALTRANS). Plan components include public engagement, assessment and feasibility studies and adaptation measures to prepare for and mitigate rising tides. Erosion protection, storm and waste water management, trail improvements and an interpretive center highlight a wide range of Master Plan project aspirations. The cumulative effort would require an estimated \$1.5 billion over the next two decades. Public input has endorsed construction, continued landscaping and relocation of at-risk infrastructures. Concerns have included a preference for cessation of structure building in the wetlands and skepticism over the actual impact of sea-level rise.


