

Local Internal Medicine Physician Emphasizes Compassionate Care and Patient Education

As the daughter of parents who emigrated from India to the small Canadian town of Ladysmith, British Columbia, on the beautiful eastern shore of Vancouver Island, Rajvir Shahi, MD, and her siblings learned to appreciate education and community service at an early age.

"My parents really emphasized the importance of education, and they encouraged and supported us in our decisions to pursue careers in 'caring' professions," Dr. Shahi says, noting that her brother is also a physician and her sister is a hardworking, dedicated social worker. "While growing up, I always had an interest in science, which led to my decision to become a doctor. Through my medical schooling and experiences, I discovered internal medicine was the field I was most passionate about."

After earning her Bachelor of Science degree in biology at the University of Victoria in 2008, Dr. Shahi enrolled at St. George's University School of Medicine in Grenada, West Indies, where she received an International Peace Scholarship and earned her medical degree. With her MD in hand, she then became the coordinator of community "pop-up" clinics, as well as a support group coordinator for the Vancouver Infectious Diseases Centre in Vancouver, British Columbia.

"In Vancouver, I led and coordinated an initiative to provide accessible HIV and hepatitis C (HCV) testing to the

underserved population in the city's Downtown East Side," she explains. "We held 'pop-up' clinics at drop-in centers, homeless shelters and soup kitchens. I performed HIV/HCV screenings, assisted in on-site consultations, and provided counseling and support to individuals who tested positive for HIV or HCV."

Following her service in Vancouver, Dr. Shahi completed a three-year residency program in internal medicine at Overlook Medical Center in Summit, New Jersey.

"It wasn't what you would consider to be a 'typical' residency in New Jersey," she notes. "Much of my time there was right in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, and I was on the front lines of treating critically ill COVID patients in the intensive care unit. Still, I fell in love with that hospital in Summit."

While in residency, Dr. Shahi met her future husband, who also is a physician, specializing in interventional radiology. Dr. Shahi and her husband now reside in the Bay Area.

A board-certified internal medicine physician, Dr. Shahi joined WTMF at the Nakamura Clinic in Union City in October 2021. She recently returned after a brief maternal leave of absence for the birth of her son Sajan.

"I'm now back at work and eager to reconnect with my current patients and meet new ones," she says. "Disease prevention is a substantial part of my work with patients, but I also work with patients

who have chronic conditions such as diabetes, high blood pressure and high cholesterol. Additionally, I care for patients who have acute illnesses requiring urgent care. Because of our affiliation with other WTMF clinics and Washington Hospital, I can easily refer patients to OB-GYN doctors, cardiologists and other medical specialists. Ideally, we want to catch health conditions early, so educating patients how to manage their overall health is very important."

Dr. Shahi's current patient base represents a broad range of adult ages and includes a wide range of ethnicities, including people among the Tri-City Area's large South Asian and Latino populations.

"I speak Punjabi fluently, and although not fluent, I do understand Hindi," she says. "My familiarity with my patients' native languages helps me explain their medical conditions and the medications and other treatment options that can help them manage their health."

When she is not working with patients or tending her newborn, Dr. Shahi enjoys exploring the San Francisco Bay Area and other locations in California. "I sometimes still feel like a tourist here, but I love discovering the Bay Area and beyond," she admits. "I also enjoy going home to Vancouver Island, where I can spend time with my family and childhood friends."

'Hip Replacement Surgery Changed My Life'

Patient traveled more than 250 miles for care, says he thanks Washington Hospital everyday

"I started feeling good at six weeks and I was 100 percent after six months." –Joe Cyrek, patient

Joe Cyrek traveled a long way to get his bum hip replaced, but it was more than worth it. He lives in Whitethorn, a small town near Eureka, nearly five hours away. Up until about seven years ago, he was a very physical man who enjoyed surfing, hiking and mountain biking on the North Coast. Even Joe's work in the landscaping and tree removal business required him to use his body. But by December 2021, the pain in his hip had become so severe, he could barely move. Then a friend told him about the hip

replacement procedure he received at Washington Hospital's Institute for Joint Restoration and Research (IJRR). Within a week, Joe was preparing for surgery.

"Hip replacement surgery changed my life and added 10 years to it," he said. "I feel 10 years younger. I thank Washington Hospital every day.

It had gotten to the point that Joe and his wife considered selling the 20-acre ranch they love because Joe could no longer do the physical work it requires.

"I was pretty much done being physical," he added.

Joe first met with Dr. Alexander Sah, an orthopedic surgeon and medical co-director of Washington Hospital's IJRR. "He explained everything to me and I felt confident," Joe said.

Dr. Sah then introduced Joe to his associate, Dr. Bryant Bonner, who would be performing the surgery. Dr. Bonner specializes in some of the most advanced minimally invasive joint replacement

procedures available today, including muscle-sparing anterior hip replacements, complex hip and knee revision surgeries and partial knee replacements. Joe spent one night at Washington Hospital before making the trip back home. He worked with a physical therapist before leaving the Hospital and then met with one in his town a few times. **Feeling Great** "Mostly, I was just happy to be back on my feet," Joe said. "I started feeling good after six weeks, and I was 100 percent after six months." Joe said he is grateful for the care he received at Washington Hospital's IJRR. "It was the epitome of efficiency," he added. "I just can't say enough about that place. I hadn't stayed in the hospital since

in a private room, and everyone treated me so well. They had me climbing up and down stairs the first day."

The institute is located in the Center for Joint Replacement building and features private rooms and lots of natural light. Much of its success is driven by the highly skilled surgeons and a multidisciplinary team of nurses, physical therapists and physician assistants who



Personalis opens new facility in Fremont in fight against cancer

History was made on Tuesday, December 6, 2022 as Personalis opened its new facility/laboratory in north Fremont. Founded in Menlo Park in 2011, the cancer diagnostics/genomics company made waves last month following its partnership with UCSF to use its 'NeXT Personal' biopsy and imaging technology to study tumor-linked DNA, which is crucial in detecting if cancerous tissue is rebuilding even after surgery and chemotherapy.

Originally composed of four locations, the new 100,000 square foot facility located at 6600 Dumbarton Circle near Patterson Ranch marks the company's fifth facility and its first in the East Bay. The new facility features multiple laboratories, two stories, a new kitchen area and gymnasium for its staff.

The grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony featured a keynote address from CEO John West, who emphasized the importance of early cancer detection as well as the significance of setting up a new facility in Fremont.

"Fighting cancer is all about detection. The earlier it can be diagnosed, the faster we can use imaging, biopsies and all of the other tools at our disposal to nip it in the bud before it spreads and does more damage," says West. "What we've found is that more and more of the vital research regarding cancer and treatments is being done here right here in the East Bay which is why we're moving so much of our team up here from the peninsula."

In addition to West, Personalis Board of Directors Chair Karin Eastham highlighted the importance of providing transparent, personalized cancer

information in an environment as diverse and rapidly-expanding as Fremont.

"The pandemic has changed the way we get around the office. While many of us adapted and learned to work remotely, there is still a good portion of things that we must do in person. We're thrilled now to be in a space that gives us enough room to provide personalized research. And with our diverse team, we're proud to say that our board is not exclusively 'male and pale," joked Eastham.

Those in attendance included local leaders such as Fremont Mayor Lily Mei, Fremont City Councilmember Raj Salwan, Fremont Economic Development Director Donovan Lazaro and California State Assembly Member Teresa Keng.

Following the cutting of the "green ribbon" in homage to the company's green and white logo, Senior Vice President of Genomics Lab Operations Dr. Christian Haudenschild, Ph.D. led attendees on a thorough tour of the labs. Dr. Haudenschild pointed out cutting-edge apparatuses such as DNA sequencers, mass spectrometers and genotyping instruments that give doctors a better understanding if cancer is returning, even after remission.

"It's become increasingly important to monitor cancer long after any initial surgery or even after someone has gone into remission," adds West. "With this new facility [in Fremont], we want to get our team the space and the state-of-the-art equipment they need to continue their work and change survival rates drastically."



Ground Squirrels

Ground squirrels have aggravated batches of people. Before I get chastised for picking on the precious squirrels that folks keep feeding peanuts, ground squirrels are not the same as our regular grey squirrels. Ground squirrels group in burrows. They are one of the most destructive burrowing pests.

Once ground squirrels take residence in your garden, it becomes a bastion of people-tripping prime tunnels, some of which can be up to 30 feet long and four inches wide with multiple entrances. Little

soil mounds are nearby. If any plant gets in their way, say goodbye.

You may seldom see ground squirrels above ground, like the grey squirrels scampering in your trees. Their fur is a mottled grey brown, with a grayish yellow underside. Their tails are long. Sometimes you may see them standing on their hind legs, checking for enemies. Enemies include snakes, hawks and some cats. Multiplication can be quite rapid, with emergence in January. Basically, they dig and chomp on almost everything, including garbage, bird eggs, tree roots and sprinkler systems.

Now that you possibly are invaded and depressed, how do you get rid of them? Not so easily. You can try inviting hawks, owls, large snakes, or local coyotes. Remove the hideaway wood and brush piles. Purchase vibrating stakes at the hardware store and place them near the burrow holes. Make a concoction of cayenne red pepper flakes dissolved in hot water overnight, with a dash of dish soap. Spray on plants and around home exterior. Apply daily until ground squirrels sneer. Display fake owls. Consider expensive traps, if legal. Alternatives, which should be professionally done, include fumigation, gas bombs, and

poison bait. These alternatives can be extremely destructive to children and pets.

Because many of you like a fable, I tried to find a ground squirrel one for you. Once upon a Cherokee time, after mankind began killing animals for sport as well as food, the animals had a conference about solutions. One solution was giving the animals the option of inflicting a disease or illness on their human predators. (This is how illness entered the world.) Only the little ground squirrel objected to this. The other animals promptly tried to tear the ground squirrel to pieces, but it escaped. But this is why it has mottled fur.

On a final note, the earliest ground squirrel fossil dates back 30 million years. So, it's best to keep trying. Happy Holiday season.

RETURN OF THE OHLONE OWL

Back in June, this paper chronicled the misadventures of the Ohlone Owl—an impressive student-constructed mosaic installation that was the target of vandalism. Now, after a second grant from the Lytton Center and another semester of hard work and dedication, a new owl has taken wing.

Nadia Nasiri, who was interviewed in June, returned to complete the new owl, along with Shalini Mehta and new team member Sorraya Jehle. Instructor Katherine Frank again oversaw the project.

Frank remarks on the shock the team felt when their earlier work was destroyed. "It was just bizarre. And we haven't had any kind of vandalism like this ever before on campus with an art piece." Security



footage showed a person entering campus late at night, making a beeline for the sculpture, trying to dislodge the owl (even walking away and returning), and then finally knocking the structure over and angrily kicking the owl down two

Knowing someone did this on purpose is a different kind of grief from when a beloved piece blows up in the kiln, or is damaged by the natural elements. However, that didn't alter the team's dedication. "Everyone felt strongly about making this happen," says Frank. Because the tree is great, but it needs the Mama."

However, art student Yashish Desai, who constructed the feet for both versions, maintains that the new owl is a Dad. (According to Audubon society, barn owls can be difficult to sex. However, males tend to have more white in their plumage, while females are more russet. Fathers hunt exclusively for their families during the first few weeks of a chick's life, so seeing one around a nest is likely.)

Improving on their earlier process, this time the team built and fired the wing pieces separately from the body. This made the owl lighter and allowed access to the interior. Threaded rods were installed inside the body, letting the team work on the owl upright in the workshop, and then secure the piece to the tree stump outside. Finally, the wings were attached and grouted in place.

Daddy Owl has a rounder, more quizzical face than the earlier version. While working during the fall, the team had to decide whether to reference photos of live owls, or of the first sculpture. Frank sums up the question as, "Do we want to replicate exactly what that owl looked like before?...When it's so close to the original, it's hard not to want the original back."

Sorraya Jehle recalled that her teammate Nadia Nasiri was adamant that

the new owl preserve the spirit of the original, quoting Nasiri as expressing, "This is not any owl. It's Our Owl."

And now that owl is out in the world for all to enjoy. As with all art, the final step in its creation is a surrendering of control. Frank remarks that for public art, "Of course you can come back and enjoy seeing it, but sometimes you want to covet your own thing. I think that's a huge learning curve, to make something to expand beyond you."

You can see the baby and parent barn owls in front of the art building, near parking lot U. The owl is only one of many art pieces to decorate Ohlone campus. According to Frank, there are plans to start an on-campus Art Walk, where guests can scan a QR code in front of student pieces to hear the artist talk about their inspirations. Hopefully the owl will find many new fans, and no further fowl play.

Postal Service issues

new Christmas stamp

Officials from the U.S. Postal Service recently announced a new Christmas stamp, "Virgin and Child" is available for purchase online and at post offices nationwide.

The Forever stamp features the Virgin Mary holding her infant



child, Jesus. "It's a beautiful piece of art, with particular meaning this time of year," said U.S. Postal Service Organization Development Vice President Jenny Utterback.

Depicting the tender bond between a mother and her child, interpretations of the Virgin Mary with the Christ child take innumerable forms in the Christian art of the Italian Renaissance. This stamp features "Virgin and Child," an oil-on-panel painting from the first half of

the 16th century by an unidentified Florentine artist.

Art historians have long speculated about the identity of this artist and have sometimes associated this painting and related paintings with the names of various 16th-century figures. Scholars now attribute this "Virgin and Child" to a Florentine artist who has been known since the late 1960s as the Master of the Scandicci Lamentation. The name is based on similarities in style evident in a painting called "The Lamentation on the Dead Christ" made for a church in the town of Scandicci, near Florence, Italy.

The "Virgin and Child" painting is in the Robert Dawson Evans Collection at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Postal Service Art director Greg Breeding designed the stamp which is being sold in booklets of 20 and is available at post offices nationwide or by visiting the Postal Store online at usps.com/shopstamps.

2022 Audi Q5 Sportback Quattro: Winter Fun

Some vehicles could be characterized as seasonal; that is, they thrive in certain weather conditions. The Audi Q5 Quattro is one of those—it lives for winter. In a case of wonderful coincidence, I was able to spend a week in the compact SUV at the crossroads of fall and winter that put an exclamation point on this description.

Winters are mild where I live in the San Francisco Bay area, but I decided to put the Q5 in its element by driving up to Lake Tahoe, four hours and 6,000 feet in elevation away from my home. As a bonus, on the way up I encountered a mild winter storm that made the drive a bit more challenging. The Audi didn't mind; it was made for this.

All the Power

At the core of many Audi models is the quattro system. Developed decades ago, and improved over the years, it is a marvel of traction technology that ensures wheels gain a grip that lends the vehicle the power to move forward. When it was first introduced, quattro was a novelty. Since then, many other companies have built similar systems, but Audi remains the benchmark. The slippery Tahoe roads were unforgiving, but the all-wheel drive system kept the Q5 running straight and true, except during a couple moments when I pushed things a little too hard.

The Q5 is one of six Audi SUVs that range from the subcompact Q3 to the large Q8. Besides gas-powered models like the Q5 I drove, this includes all-electric and plug-in hybrid versions as well as a variety of different gas engines.

My Q5 was the 45 model, the midline between the 40 model that has a similar turbocharged four-cylinder engine, and the 55, which is a plug-in hybrid. The 45's 2.0-liter four-cylinder engine puts out 261 horsepower and is mated to a seven-speed dual clutch transmission. On flat land the car can go 0-60 in about six seconds. The car is peppy, but it

showed the limits of that size engine in a 5,000-pound fully loaded car going up the grades to Tahoe.

Handling from the Audi was excellent. Its five-link front and rear suspension is sophisticated and delivers cornering that made the Tahoe drive that much easier. The fuel economy of this Q5 was in the high 20s, which it delivered regularly.

More Options

Like many cars in the luxury field, the Q5 is awash in options. We've outlined the three basic models, but each of those comes in the standard SUV configuration or the Sportback like I had, which has a slight fastback design. Base models are well-equipped, but there are always upgrades.

My Sportback 45 had a base price of \$48,400, but as equipped it was \$61,905. It starts with the Ultra Blue metallic paint for \$595. The Prestige package included an upgraded Bang & Olufsen stereo and a variety of connectivity and comfort technology, but the whole package came in at \$8,700. The black optic sport package was \$2,500, but it included the sport suspension and 21-inch wheels that helped deliver the Q5's superlative road performance.

The end result of this option-heavy package was a compact luxury crossover that could hold its own with any in the segment, but carries its quattro technology as a secret weapon that helps it come alive during the winter.

Something Slightly Different



line-up had a variety of technology offerings. The week after I drove the Q5 I switched to the similar size, but radically different powertrain Q4 E-tron. This all-electric model has a similar exterior size to the Q5, but inside is a midsize because of the electric system's packaging. It also offers a sublime ride, the quattro system, and 265 miles of range. And it's pricing is similar to the Q5.

Scheduled for Dec. 23, 2022-Jan. 2, 2023 (Police, Fire Services Not Affected)



As in years past, the City of Fremont will be implementing a Holiday Closure for many non-public safety City services. Some City offices will be closed from Friday, Dec. 23, 2022, through Monday, Jan. 2, 2023. City Holidays are observed Dec. 23, 26, 30, 2022, and Jan. 2, 2023, while limited City services will be offered Dec. 27, 28, and 29, 2022. City offices participating in the Holiday Closure will re-open for business on Tuesday, Jan. 3, 2023. This closure will not affect police and fire services.

- Afghan Elderly Association will provide limited services. Clients should contact their Health Promoter for additional info.
- The Fremont Police Department and Fremont Fire Department will continue to provide public safety
- Youth & Family Services will have on-call crisis counselors to respond to youth referred from the Alameda County Crisis Receiving Home and Fremont Police Department.
- The majority of agencies at the Fremont Family Resource Center, 39155 Liberty St., will be open to the public. Please visit the FRC webpage at city.fremont.gov/frc for individual agency information.
- · A minimum number of City staff will be available in an on-call status to provide emergency maintenance services such as responding to storm-related issues.
- Regularly-scheduled street sweeping will occur on Dec. 27, 28, and 29, 2022; weather permitting. No street sweeping on City-observed holidays. (We will make every effort to provide service on a different day.)
- The Tri-City Animal Shelter, located at 1950 Stevenson Blvd., will be closed on City-observed holidays Dec. 23, 26, and 30, 2022, and Jan 2, 2023. Online inspection scheduling through Citizen Access will not be available until Tuesday, January 3, 2023, at 8 a.m.
- General email accounts and phone lines will not be monitored during the Holiday Closure. Staff will not be responding to emails received during the closure. Community members should avoid sending any emails during this time.
- The City's Development Services Center/Permit Center will be closed and reopen on Wednesday, January 4, 2023, at 8 a.m.





New ways to display poinsettias this holiday season

Nothing says the holidays like a poinsettia. This year, try some new ways to display this festive plant.

Poinsettias are available in a variety of colors including white, pink, hot pink, yellow, peach, marbled and speckled. These colorful parts of the plant, often referred to as flowers, are actually modified leaves called bracts. The real flowers are small and yellow, appearing at the tip of the stem surrounded by the bract.

Look for new places to display your poinsettia. Place a plant on a side or




serving table. Remove the foil and set the plant in a decorative container. Try a hot pink poinsettia in a white pot or several different colors set in a serving tray, basket, or unique container. Add a table runner, candlestick, bowl of colorful fruit or other decorative touches.

Dress up individual or a group of poinsettias. White poinsettias donned with colorful berries, Chinese lantern pods and bobbles may be all you need for an eye-catching display.

Use poinsettias as a centerpiece for your holiday meals. Place several potted poinsettias in the middle of the table. Cover the plastic pots with greens. Then add some colorful pepper berries, cranberries, apples, or ornaments. Compact poinsettias like the Princettia® poinsettia with its abundant vibrant flowers work well for this application. Your guests will be able to see across the table as they visit over dinner, enjoying the holiday ambience created by these beautiful plants.

Dress up each place setting with a cut poinsettia bloom. Simply cut the flowers off a potted poinsettia plant to the desired length. Place it in a floral water pick, the water-filled tubes used for cut flowers. Tuck the bloom into a napkin, set it in a small bud vase, or add a ribbon to dress it up. They make great party favors for your guests.

Look for other ways to include these in your holiday décor. Even one cut poinsettia flower set among a bowl of silver, gold or white ornaments adds a nice holiday touch. Set a few cut flowers aside







to use as unique package adornments. Just secure the flower, floral pick and all, to the gift with a colorful ribbon.

Use cut poinsettia flowers in a vase like you would other blooms. Even one of these large blossoms puts on quite the display and is sure to brighten even the smallest of rooms.

Combine your poinsettia with a few greens and other flowers. Quickly sear the cut end of the poinsettia stems to prevent sticky sap from leaking into the water. Dress up your arrangement by filling the vase with cranberries, small ornaments, or other colorful adornments.

While enjoying your holidays, a discussion on the proper pronunciation of the plant's name may arise. Some say Poinsett-a and don't pronounce the second i. Others include it and say Poinsett-e-a? You will find both pronunciations in various dictionaries. In other words, either one is considered correct, so no one loses this debate.


These colorful plants are sure to brighten your spirits throughout the holiday season, so be sure to make space for a few poinsettia displays.







Facebook parent Meta threatens to remove news from platform

Facebook parent Meta Platforms Inc. said Dec. 6 it will be "forced to consider" removing news content from its platform if Congress passes legislation requiring tech companies to pay news outlets for their material.

The Journalism Competition and Preservation Act, if passed, would allow news companies to collectively negotiate with social platforms over the terms on which their material appears on their sites. Meta said it would rather pull news from its platforms than "submit to government-mandated

negotiations that unfairly disregard the value we provide to news outlets." The value, Meta said in a

statement tweeted by spokesman Andy Stone, includes "increased traffic and subscriptions."

Meta, which is based in Menlo Park, California, has taken similar stands in the past. Last year, it briefly blocked news from its platform in Australia after the country passed legislation that would compel tech companies to pay publishers for using their news stories. It later struck deals with Australian publishers.

Home Match: A unique way of addressing the housing crisis

Rising costs of living have been on everyone's mind this fall—with food and gas prices reaching unexpected highs. However, Bay Area residents are already used to another staggeringly high price tag on a basic necessity: a safe place to live. One Bay Area nonprofit is seeking to help the vulnerable find stable living situations and stay in their own homes. Started in Marin in 2012, Home Match enables residents to age in place by connecting them with appropriate homemates seeking affordable housing.

Luke Barnesmoore, Director of Strategy at Home Match, notes, "Covid exacerbated the housing crisis that was already rampant in the Bay Area. So, there are more and more people who are in a situation where... they're facing social isolation [and] a [housing crisis.]"

Data from February to August 2022 shows a 35% increase in inquiries, 67% increase



in matches and 233% percent increase in intakes.

The Home Match program was created to aid the elderly specifically. Aging is a significant, but often-overlooked risk factor for adverse outcomes from homelessness. (For example, unsafe environments increase risk of falls, which are more dangerous to the elderly.)

Home Match serves San Francisco, Marin, Contra Costa, Oakland, and the Tri-City Area. There are multiple ways to start an application, depending on the applicant's access to technology. There are phone numbers and emails addresses for each county; application forms can be mailed as a hard copy, or attached to an email as a pdf. Currently services are available in English, Spanish, Mandarin, and Vietnamese, although Home Match hopes to expand language options in the future.

Overall, the Home Match team tries to meet clients where they're at. Barnesmoore

says, "Sometimes we're working with an older adult who's not comfortable using digital technology, and we're going to go meet them in person, go over the application with them, [and] bring [the application] back to the office."

In matching process, the home provider acts as a hub. When asked whether the team spends more time speaking to Home Providers or Home Seekers, Barnesmoore notes "We have one home provider, but we're introducing multiple home seekers to that provider. And they're making the decision of who they want to move in. We'll probably spend more time talking to that one provider rather than each of the five people we introduce them to."

For example, one home provider might meet with several prospective home seekers, and feel a mutual connection with the third person. It's important not to rush clients and to hold out for a match that works for both parties.

Home Match is a long-term solution,

and it takes time to choose a stable match. That means they aren't able to help clients in need of emergency housing. But that doesn't mean they hang up on those people. Barnesmoore explains, "Our services don't just end when someone doesn't end up being successful in our program. We do a lot of work to help people who call us to navigate to other programs that might be more suitable for their particular needs."

Currently, East Bay Home Match offices are in Fremont and Oakland. They do outreach at senior centers as well, hosting tables where people can get information and ask questions. They are open to expanding, but their priority is always to do their best for the people they are already serving. Home Match partners with similar organizations such as "Share Sonoma" and "Hip Housing" (San Mateo) to help out-of-area clients.

Barnesmoore came to his work at Home Match after facing his own periods of housing insecurity during his childhood and adult life. He says, "I come to the work with experience of not knowing where my next housing situation is going to be...and understanding both the emotional turmoil that comes with...not having a stable housing situation."

Barnesmoore concludes, "One of the things I love about working with home match is we're able to keep people from getting into that situation in the first place. We're able to keep people housed. Young folks, old folks, all the way across the spectrum."

As winter approaches, its dark shadow slowly advances over the landscape and this year, peaks on December 21 at 1:48 p.m. (PST). This phenomenon is the result of a tilt of the Earth in relation to our sun. As we travel though space on this highly significant (at least to us) bit of matter, our home planet wobbles, with each hemisphere lining up alternatively more directly toward the sun, our primary source of heat and light. Rotation on the Earth's axis results in day and night, while we call the orbit around the sun a "year". During the year, the northern hemisphere reaches its farthest tilt away from the sun on the "winter

solstice". The shortest period of daylight occurs at that particular moment. Sunlight is sparse during the months approaching and immediately following the winter solstice, but if you miss the warm breezes of summer, travel south to reach the southern hemisphere where the tilt of the Earth results in their summer. If you crave year-round summer conditions, life on the equator might be your style.

Just as the seasons change with the passage of time, so do the political winds at all levels including local. We are experiencing the results of the past election with certification and subsequent installation of those newly and reelected candidates. For all, including those who were not successful in their appeal to voters, vibrancy of their candidacy is a testament to the health of democracy. An ebb and flow of political sentiment is evident when observed over a period of decades but with each challenge to our system, the left/right wobble of policies and personnel seems to undergo a course correction. It may be uncomfortable in its extremes, but with perseverance and

patience, a shift toward moderation, favored by the majority, prevails.

As new council and board configurations begin their work on existing and emerging issues, will they learn from past failures and successes? So far, local politics has avoided extremes and severe political wobbles. Economics and environmental concerns are always an issue, leading to challenges of working poverty, homelessness, traffic, air quality and a host of related problems. As a significant part of a dynamic Bay Area infrastructure and economy, the greater southeast bay area can lead in finding solutions. As we emerge from the winter solstice and daylight increases, will our newly elected and reelected leadership respond with renewed vigor and purpose?

Apple: Most iCloud data can now be end-to-end encrypted

As part of an ongoing privacy push, Apple said Dec. 7 it will now offer full end-to-encryption for nearly all the data its users store in its global cloud-based storage system. That will make it more difficult for hackers, spies and law enforcement agencies to access sensitive user information.

The world's most valuable company has long placed customer security and privacy at a premium. Its iMessage and Facetime communications services are fully encrypted end-to-end and it has sometimes locked horns with law enforcement agencies, including the FBI, over its refusal to unlock devices.

But nearly everything that customers backed up remotely using Apple's iCloud service -- including photos, videos and chats -has not been protected by encryption. That made it far easier for crooks, spies -- and criminal investigators with court orders --

to get at it. No longer. The loophole that law enforcement had for getting at iPhone data will now be considerably narrowed.

Apple, which is based in Cupertino, California, did not immediately respond to requests for comment on the timing of the announcement and other issues. Nor did the FBI immediately respond to an emailed request for

Cybersecurity experts have long argued that attempts by law enforcement to weaken encryption with backdoors are ill-advised because they would inherently make the internet less reliable and more dangerous.

Last year, Apple announced, then withdrew after a flood of objections, a plan to scan iPhones for photos of child sexual abuse.

Where Apple was hesitant about deploying encryption features last year -- it now feels like they've decided to put the gas pedal down," noted Johns Hopkins cryptography professor Matthew Green on Twitter.

Apple's encryption announcement offers what the company calls Advanced Data Protection. to which users of its devices must opt in. It adds iCloud Backup, Notes and Photos to data categories that are already protected by end-to-end encryption in the cloud, including health data and passwords. Not included in the iCloud encryption scheme are email, contacts and calendar items because they must interoperate with products from other vendors, Apple said.

It said Advanced Data Protection for iCloud would be available to U.S. users by the end of the year and start rolling out to the rest of the world in early 2023. In a blog post, Apple said "enhanced security for users' data in the cloud is more urgently needed than ever," citing research that says data breaches have more than tripled over the past eight

Other tech products that already offer end-to-end encryption include the world's most popular messaging app,

WhatsApp, and Signal, a communications app prized by journalists, dissidents, human rights activists and other dealers in sensitive data.

Apple announced a few other advanced security features on Dec. 7, including one geared toward journalists, human rights activists and government officials who "face extraordinary digital threats" -- such as from no-click spyware. Called iMessage Contact Key Verification, it will automatically alert users to eavesdroppers who succeed in inserting a new device into their iCloud via a breach.

In July, Apple announced a new optional feature called Lockdown Mode that is designed to protect iPhones and its other products against intrusions from state-backed hackers and commercial spyware. Apple said at the time that it believed the extra layer of protection would be valuable to targets of hacking attacks launched by well-funded groups. Users are able to activate and deactivate lockdown mode at will.

Visitors to Coyote Hills Regional Park in Fremont will find that 35 trail markers there will include a translation in Chochenyo, the language of the park's First Peoples. The area including Coyote Hills is the ancestral homeland of the Tuibun Ohlone peoples, who have thrived with the land and spoken the Chochenyo language since time immemorial.

"The new trail markers honor a request by the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe to restore original place names at Coyote Hills and integrate them into park signage," said Park District Board Director Ayn Wieskamp. "The new trail markers are also an important interpretive feature that connects to the visitor center's educational programming and Chochenyo language welcome sign.

"We are grateful to the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe and their language committee for their translations and efforts to restore Chochenyo words to Coyote Hills," said Park District General Manager Sabrina Landreth. "The Chochenyo language trail markers help advance the park district's mission of preserving our parkland's rich heritage of natural and cultural resources."

The first five trail markers were unveiled in November, coinciding with Native American Heritage Month. Remaining trail markers will be installed over the next six months.

"Makkin Mak Nommo, which means 'We are still here'," said Monica Arellano, Muwekma Ohlone vice chairwoman and co-chair of the Muwekma Language Committee. "When people see the language and the land, they see the connection and realize that Muwekma are still present, alive, and thriving."

Ohlone People continue to practice their culture and traditions today, including relearning, restoring and re-teaching the Chochenyo language.

While you're at Coyote Hills, drop in on the visitor center's Discovery on Demand program. From 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. every Saturday and Sunday, the naturalist staff will lead a variety of hands-on activities, investigations and craft projects. All ages are welcome; parent participation is required. Programs and exhibits at Coyote Hills highlight the park's natural and cultural history, including the park's Ohlone cultural heritage.

Coyote Hills is located at the end of Patterson Ranch Road off Paseo Padre Parkway. There's a parking fee of \$5 per vehicle; the programs are free. For information, call (510) 544-3220.

There's a free "Woodland Wonderland" program from 3:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. every Friday in November and December at Del Valle Regional Park south of Livermore, featuring a different plant or animal each time.

Coyotes are the topic on Friday, December 16. All ages are welcome; children must have adult participation. Meet at the visitor center. Or you can dis-

cover your artistic talents with "Nature Crafts" from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Saturday, December 17 at the center.

Del Valle Regional Park is at the end of Del Valle Road off Mines Road about nine miles south of Livermore. There's a parking fee of \$6 per vehicle. For information, call (510) 544-3146.

Beautiful views of San Francisco Bay, harbor seals, overwintering birds, and a historic warship will be the rewards of a free, naturalist-led Saturday Stroll from 10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on December 17, starting at Encinal Beach in Alameda.



even able to share "Singing in the Rain" on the big screen for one of his birthdays with his name on the marquis.





Niles Rotary and League of Women Voters learn about Fremont Cohousing project

On December 1, 2022, members of Niles Rotary assembled via Zoom and in person in Anderson Auditorium at Washington West to hear a presentation by the rotary's former president, Sandi Pantages, about Fremont's first cohousing community, Mission Peak Village. She described cohousing as an



innovative form of neighborhood that is planned, organized, and managed by the residents. Plans have been submitted to the city to build Mission Peak Village in Fremont's Irvington district.

"We will own our own individual condominiums in the community," Pantages explained, "and share many common spaces and facilities. There will be a clubhouse, called a Common House, with a large dining area and kitchen where residents can cook and dine together often. The cohousing community will be intergenerational, with ages ranging from

small children to senior citizens. Common areas include work sheds with shared tools, community garden, children's play areas, exercise spaces, and more."

Mission Peak Village has engaged cohousing pioneer Kathryn McCamant of CoHousing Solutions, Gunkel Architecture, and UD+P development partners, Pantages explained. Niles Rotarians John J. Dutra and Rick Jones described their knowledge of the lengthy land acquisition process. The site is within walking distance of the weekly Irvington Farmer's Market and the future BART station.

Two days later, on December 3, the League of Women Voters of Fremont, Newark, and Union City heard a similar presentation as they gathered at Artist Walk and viewed renderings of the development plan. Two League members who are also Mission Peak Village members described the project and how it relates to League housing positions. Among the illustrations was the site plan showing how cars and parking are accommodated along one side of the property, leaving the interior as pedestrian-oriented space to encourage spontaneous interaction among neighbors.

School Wellness Programs are Misplaced

I attended my first year of high school from behind a screen, in near-total social isolation. tudents were loath to unmute their mics or turn on their cameras on Zoom.

Back in person, these isolationist tendencies remain. The pandemic has had devastating consequences for student mental health in California, in the country, and all over the world. Many students attend school as if they were still online, always sitting alone next to a screen when possible.

I hoped that my school would act quickly to address these social and mental health challenges, yet I haven't observed much change. In my junior year, I asked school officials about our school's investments in mental health. They responded by proudly touting their investments in a new social-emotional learning curriculum (SEL), a student wellness center, and an inclusion council. While these investments should be commended, they're also misplaced and poorly executed, and I and many of my classmates have not accessed these resources for three main reasons:

First, lack of exposure: these programs expect their target students, those who are accustomed to isolating themselves because of COVID, to reach out and find those programs. I didn't know that these programs existed at my school until I emailed to ask. The burden shouldn't be on students to proactively find mental health resources.

Second, lack of time: student schedules in the competitive school environment of the Bay Area are already packed, and few students have time to use the new resources. Something has to give. We can't just add more to our plates.

Finally, image: Opting into a social wellness program from the school requires admitting to having a social issue, which can be a tough pill to swallow.

In other words, few of the school's mental health investments have actually reached students like myself. One exception was a mandatory SEL class where the majority of time was spent discussing obvious concepts such as how "thoughts and emotions affect actions," to which students responded with derisive laughter, no doubt spurred on by our own teacher's laughter at the pointless presentations.

I'm a high schooler who wants schools everywhere to improve the mental health of future generations of students in the wake of COVID. I don't want to see policymakers and school administrators celebrating their investments in student mental health with impressive sounding statistics and special 'mental health days', while most of them don't reach their target audience, and what does reach the students is seen as an annoyance and an out-of-season April Fool's joke. Perhaps this dichotomy between what intentions schools have about mental health and what the actual impact of their programs are is best expressed by Mission Alumni Ankush Swarnakar, who wrote that teachers could be "very vocal about things like 'mental health' and 'student happiness,' and yet they chuckled and took joy in student misery, stress and competition." (published at https://siliconeer.com/current/an-open-letter-tomsjhs/)

To that end, I believe that schools should play a more direct role in helping student's mental health, and better implement their existing programs in two ways:

- 1. Ask students for feedback on how effective these programs are, as even well-intentioned investments like SEL must be cut if students consider them pointless.
- 2. Make our existing social wellness programs more accessible to students in daily announcements and advertised on school grounds, but not mandatory like SEL. This provides more opportunities for students to find the help they need but prevents it from being forced onto students who don't need it at all.

While my school's investments have demonstrated their willingness to invest in students' futures and mental health in the wake of the pandemic, I believe that the greater priority of schools ought to be the impact of their investments.

What is your plan for this term?

As the only renter on Council, my top priority for this term is tackling the ongoing housing crisis. The rising cost of rent has a number of side-effects that harm every single resident in Hayward (47% of whom are currently renting). It prevents working people from saving for a down payment; pushes folks into homelessness; and hampers educational outcomes. Hayward must enact policies that stabilize residential and commercial rents, and lower them so residents are not just surviving, but thriving in our city.

I believe Hayward needs to explore new economic models that make us less dependent on volatile market conditions, such as community land trusts, a public bank and incentivizing the formation of worker-cooperatives. These initiatives provide more community control over Hayward's land, finances, and

employment opportunities and have the potential to increase local revenue, which enables our city to hire more staff and provide residents with improved social services. These ideas have been successfully implemented across the world, and I'm excited to help champion them in Hayward.

What is Hayward's greatest

Hayward's greatest asset is its people. Our central location and relative affordability has made it a magnet for folks across the world looking to find a home in the Bay Area and has made Hayward one of the most diverse cities in the country. Part of my emphasis on lowering the cost of rent is to ensure that working families can continue to call Hayward home well into the future. I'm lucky and proud to be surrounded by a wealth of cultures and perspectives, and I view protecting Hayward's diversity as one of my main responsibilities.

San Leandro's New District 1 council member shares her plan

I am incredibly proud of our campaign for bringing mental health, police reform, and housing rights to the center of political conversations in San Leandro. I can't thank San Leandro voters enough for putting their trust in me.

The first thing I'm doing is spearheading a rent stabilization

ordinance to protect the 44% of the population who rents from displacement. I believe that there is a strong desire in the community and among members of our new council to get this done.

I will also be introducing legislation within my first month to increase transparency in how pregnancy crisis centers advertise their services, as part of my commitment to championing full reproductive freedom for every person.

Aside from those two issues, you can expect to see me fulfill my campaign promises to support the creation of a mental health crisis response, a homeless navigation center, building more affordable housing and housing at all income levels, and implementing our climate action plan. There is a lot of work to be done and I'm excited to work in collaboration with the community to make progress on these important issues.

Amid outcry, San Francisco pauses on 'killer police robots'

San Francisco supervisors voted Dec. 6 to put the brakes on a controversial policy that would have let police use robots for deadly force, reversing course just days after their approval of the plan generated fierce pushback and warnings about the militarization and automation of policing.

The Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to explicitly ban the use of robots in such a fashion for now. But they sent the issue back to a committee for further discussion and could vote in the future to let police use robots in a lethal manner in limited cases.

The board voted last week to allow the use of deadly robots in extreme circumstances. The police department said it had no plans to arm the robots with guns but wanted the ability to put explosives on them and use then to contact, incapacitate or disorient dangerous or armed suspects when lives are at risk.

The initial vote thrust the famously liberal city into the center of a debate about the future of technology and policing, with some saying arming robots was a step too close to something one would see in a dystopian science fiction movie. Though robot technology for policing has become more widely available, departments across the country have rarely used it to confront or kill suspects.

Three supervisors who rejected the policy from the beginning joined dozens of protesters Dec. 5 outside City Hall to urge the board to change course. They chanted and held signs with phrases like "We all saw that movie... No Killer Robots."

Supervisor Dean Preston was among them, and

on Dec. 6 he told his colleagues the public hadn't been given enough time to voice their concerns about such a pressing issue. "The people of San Francisco have spoken loud and clear: There is no place for killer police robots in our city," he said in a statement after the vote. "We should be working on ways to decrease the use of force by local law enforcement, not giving them new tools to kill people."

The vote was the result of a new state law that requires police departments to inventory equipment including certain guns, grenades, armored vehicles and battering rams and to seek explicit approval for their use. So far, only San Francisco and Oakland have discussed lethal robots as part of that law. Oakland police wanted to arm robots with shotguns but backed down in the face of public opposition, instead opting for pepper spray.

Some San Francisco officials wanted to proceed with allowing robots to use deadly force in certain cases, arguing nothing substantive had changed to warrant a reversal. But the vote to advance the broader police equipment policy -- including the ban on lethal robots -- passed unanimously. It still allows police to use robots to check out potentially dangerous scenes so that officers can stay back.

"Having robots that have eyes and ears and can remove bombs, which happens from time to time, is something that we want the police department to do while we continue to have this very controversial discussion," said Supervisor Aaron Peskin, who brought forward last week's motion around the use of robots.

The new policy needs another vote to take effect.

School board trustee wins Milpitas council seat

Born in Southern Vietnam, Hon Lien arrived in America by boat in 1979 with 10 siblings. She began working at age 14 to help support her family. Now a successful businesswoman, Hon has been active in local civic and government boards and committees for the past 20 years. A mother of four, Hon has lived in Milpitas since 1999.

Milpitas has five city council seats, one is held by the mayor and the other four are at large seats, Milpitas has no districts. A council member in Milpitas has one vote, and all votes are equal. The mayor's position is ceremonial, there is no power or authority based upon the mayor's position. All of the mayor's decisions are subject to approval of at least three votes of the council.

Council member Lien wants to assure that public safety is the city's first priority and she is committed to protecting affordable housing. Lien said, "Housing is very significant, either we address the lack of housing, at all economic levels, or we force our children to find homes outside of the city."



Homelessness is another of her priorities. "We must model successful programs and implement them in conjunction with other cities in Silicon Valley and our non-profits," said Lien. She is an advocate for the city's plan to develop Main Street and thinks that Milpitas needs to have a vibrant downtown area.

Lien shared, "Milpitas' best asset is our diversity. Few of our neighbors know that Milpitas created the first planned integrated community in the United States when the Ford Motor Company moved their manufacturing from Richmond to Milpitas. Our diversity has been demonstrated by the leaders of our police department, our fire department and the make-up of the city council and school board."

South Bay voter turnout beats statewide numbers

Results of the November 8 General Election were officially certified December 8 by the County of Santa Clara Registrar of Voters.

According to Registrar of Voters officials, the final turnout for the election totaled 550,602 ballots cast, representing 54.55% of the 1,009,422 registered voters. This makes Santa Clara County's turnout higher than the statewide voter turnout at 50.7%.

The official canvass included complete counting of all qualified ballots, including Provisional and Conditional Voter Registration ballots and signature verification updates. A manual tally of 1% of the total number of precincts in these contests were also conducted as part of the official canvass.

"Our staff and volunteers went above and beyond to provide the best voting experience for our voters," said Registrar Shannon Bushey. "I am honored to work with such a dedicated and resilient team."

Fremont plans include Sabercat Trail and Museum Projects

I hanks to continued State funding support, including a recently allocated \$12 million grant, plans are advancing on two exciting projects to expand Fremont's trail network and celebrate Fremont's unique prehistoric history.

Sabercat Trail Extension Project: This project will extend and improve the existing Sabercat Trail located in the Mission San Jose area. The project will extend the trail to the west over Interstate 680 to connect with the Irvington community at Osgood Road. The existing trail will be widened, improved, and extended easterly along Pine Street to connect with Mission Boulevard and Ohlone College. A new interpretive area along the trail will inform the community about the unique paleontological history of the area from 1.9 million years ago.

Irvingtonian Fossil Museum Project: Under the leadership of the Math Science Nucleus, a new museum in Fremont is being planned to create a world-class facility that educates and celebrates the

natural history of the Irvingtonian period, dating back 1.9 million years ago when sabercats roamed the land. Fossils from this period were uncovered starting in the 1940s by local teacher Wes Gordon and his team of paleontologists.

Their efforts brought international recognition to this era of natural history, which was officially designated as the Irvingtonian period, named after the location of the discovered fossils. The museum will house fossil collections held by UC Berkeley and Fremont's Children's Natural History Museum (located at 4074 Eggers Drive). The museum is envisioned to be an educational resource for natural sciences, similar to the Page Museum and La Brea Tar Pits in Los Angeles.
