# Obon honors tradition and community

DANCE TO CELEBRATE THOSE WHO CAME BEFORE US

Wearing a colorful Yukata, eating some Japanese food, and listening to music and singing from San Jose Chidori Band, are all parts of celebrating Obon at Southern Alameda County Buddhist Church in Union City. And of course, dancing with Obon Odori! Both joyous and solemn, the festival honors ancestors and departed loved ones. On the evening of Saturday, August 10, the community is invited to join the celebration, and on Sunday morning the church will hold a Hatsubon service for people who have passed away within the last year.

Karen Suyama has been dancing at Obon ever since her parents and grandparents took her to Berkeley Buddhist Church when she was growing up, and she has been an instructor at Southern Alameda County Buddhist Church ever since she moved to Fremont in the late 70s. She studied Buyou, a form of classical Japanese dance, but the simple dances she teaches for Obons are easy to pick up even by those with no dance background.

"Because maybe 75% of the dances are the same as the year before," she says, "It makes it easy to get into the practices and the dances." There are hundreds of Obon dances done at temples across Japan, ranging from traditional to modern. "There's a couple of dances I think I've been doing since I started doing Obon. We've kept those on."

One traditional and popular dance is Tanko Bushi, or the Coal Miner Dance, set to a song about mining coal in the mountains of Japan, with steps pantomiming shoveling coal and pushing a cart. By contrast, in Pokemon Ondo, the steps reflect cute gestures that might be taken by Pikachu or Squirtle.

Including the context helps people learn.
"I try to find a background to the song to make it more meaningful for everybody,"
Suyama says. "And hopefully that helps them to understand the dance and enjoy the story that goes along with it.

SACBC will try two new dances this year. One is Ee Janai Ka, choreographed by San Jose Taiko. "It's not quite as simple as the other dances," Suyama notes. "But that's OK. Sometimes you have to make people think—and move!" It was more difficult for people to pick up at dance practices. "But they were having fun with it and I know they liked it, so that's all that matters."

The other new dance, Lantern Song, was commissioned by The Buddhist Churches of America (BCA) to commemorate the 125th anniversary in 2024. In 1899, two Buddhist ministers from Japan came to San Francisco to teach among Japanese immigrants who were missing the spiritual instruction they had back in their country of origin. This is regarded as the start to what would grow into BCA.

Suyama reflects, "I like the dancing because it helps to remind me that this has been done for a long time. To honor our ancestors. It's pretty meaningful to me because my grandparents and parents were very instrumental in getting me into dance and becoming an instructor. They would always come out and cheer me on." She adds with a laugh, "My grandmother used to always clap, so she would embarrass me."

She continues, "I enjoy doing it every year. It helps to remember everybody who's not here anymore. And that does include my parents, and grandparents, aunts and uncles, everybody."

There are two more upcoming practices the week before Obon, held at the church in the Sangha Hall on Wednesday 8/7 and Thursday 8/8, both starting at 7pm. But you don't need to practice to dance!

# Pawsitive Reviews

THE FREMONT LIBRARY CAN
BARELY KEEP UP WITH DEMAND
FOR DOG MAN

He's part dog, part man, a champion of justice—and the canine hero of the Fremont Main Library's most checked-out book.

Since the beginning of the year, readers have checked out *Dog Man: Twenty Thousand Fleas Under the Sea* more than 420 times—not counting renewals. The kid-friendly graphic novel is the eleventh in an expanding series of 12 from author and illustrator Dav Pilkey, whom parents may remember from his hit series *Captain Underpants*. This series follows a hybrid dog/policeman who takes on villains with a familiar brand of outrageous storylines and potty humor that put Pilkey on the map in the late 90s.

"We cannot keep *Dog Man* books on our shelves," said Kelly Pollard, Children's Librarian at the Fremont Main Library. "I am often digging copies out of the book return bins before they even make it onto the library shelves. Kids get so excited if the book is available when they visit our library."

The phenomenon extends beyond Fremont's shelves. *Dog Man's* publisher, Scholastic, says over 60 million books from the series are in print; the latest *Dog Man* release is also a worldwide number one best-seller. On Amazon, *Dog Man: Twenty Thousand Fleas Under the Sea* holds third place in the "Children's Superhero Books" category across the site. In fact, *Dog Man* books claim spots one through six and eight through ten on the entire list.

So what is it about this furry defender of justice that has captured the hearts of so many? Its accessible format may be just as key as its content.

"These books are especially popular with reluctant readers," says Pollard. "I have had some great conversations with caregivers about the value of reading graphic novels and how when kids find books they connect to, they can learn to love reading."

Pollard also mentions that the books are a hit with kids beyond its intended 8-12 age group. A quick glance at reviews makes it clear that Pilkey tackles serious issues underneath the veneer of absurdity.

"Dav Pilkey is so smart. His plots and humor work on two levels seamlessly," says reviewer darladoodles, who gave the book five stars on the Fremont Main Library website. "There are bits of human nature throughout that we can relate to at any age. It includes themes relating to personal rehabilitation, fake news, persistence, and a chapter entitled 'Cat Cell Culture."

Dog Man is just one piece of Pilkey's success. Two titles from his Cat Kid Comic Club series — a spin-off from a character introduced in Dog Man — also hold a place among the top 10 most popular books at Fremont's library this year. And following in the footsteps of Captain Underpants, a Dog Man movie is underway.

Until then, Fremont fans can check out *Dog Man* books by the dozen — if they're not on hold.

# FREMONT TRANSITIONING TO 100% RENEWABLE ENERGY

AVA COMMUNITY ENERGY TO BECOME FREMONT'S DEFAULT ELECTRICITY SERVICE PLAN

On June 18, the Fremont City Council voted unanimously to request that Ava Community Energy (Ava) change Fremont's default electricity service plan to their Renewable 100 plan. According to their website, Ava —Ava Community Energy—was launched in Alameda County in 2018. Ava is Fremont's electricity provider, and their Renewable 100 plan includes 100 percent solar and wind energy from California. A few cities that Ava is currently serving in our area include Hayward, Newark, San Leandro and Union City along with the unincorporated areas of Ashland, Castro Valley, Cherryland, Fairview,

San Lorenzo and Sunol.

The decision to make Ava the City of Fremont's default service provider aligns with the City Council's priority of environmental sustainability. "In October 2023 council adopted an updated climate action plan that aims to reduce community greenhouse gas emissions by 30% from 2018 levels by the year 2030. The adopted plan included what we call the Game Plan, a list of the highest priority actions to be completed in the first three years of the plan and tonight we are bringing forward one of those actions," stated Dan Schoenholz, Community Development Director for the City of Fremont.

By establishing Renewable 100 as the default service plan for Fremont, the City aims to provide cleaner energy to residents and businesses and achieve the goals outlined in Fremont's Climate Action Plan (CAP). This action is identified in the CAP as a high priority action for helping to reduce community-wide greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions

on July 17, the Ava Board of Directors unanimously approved Fremont's request to change the default service plan. Fremont will become the ninth city in Alameda County to transition to Renewable 100. Fremont customers will have the same service plan

Since 2011, breastfeeding has been celebrated around the world during the month of August. This year's theme-Nourish, Sustain, Thrive-shines a light on why protecting, promoting, and supporting lactation is so important, honors the work organizations are doing to help the global breastfeeding effort, and highlights how individuals and policymakers can contribute to a strong and sustainable lactation field.

While breastfeeding is celebrated in August, the benefits of breastfeeding have a lasting lifelong positive impact on families, notes Abies Lawani, MSN, RN, IBCLC, Staff Nurse II and lactation consultant at the Washington Hospital Birthing Center. Lawani says her team's goal is to support patients in making choices for their new babies.

'We use shared decision-making to support a family's goals, and provide as much education as possible so they are aware of the benefits of breastfeeding," she explains. "Then we offer them as much support as they desire. We are proud of being part of every family's story. The Washington Hospital lactation consultants work hand-inhand with all Birthing Center and NICU staff to provide

the knowledge, support, education and encouragement necessary for breastfeeding success."

#### **Baby-Friendly Care**

Washington Hospital has been designated as a Baby-Friendly Hospital by the World Health Organization (WHO) and UNICEF since 2014. This designation recognizes the Hospital's commitment to providing the highest level of care for infant feeding and mother-baby bonding. The Birthing Center's seven lactation consultants are all registered nurses who have been certified as International Board-certified Lactation Consultants.

Lawani advises that families require active support to begin and maintain good breastfeeding practices. "Some babies latch right away, and others will sometimes have latch difficulties in the beginning," she said. "Some families have taken a prenatal breastfeeding class and others are coming to it with a limited background on the expectations for breastfeeding. Our role is to meet families where they are and build upon prior knowledge. Having a strong support system is key to meeting the feeding goals they've set for themselves and their babies. I tell them to take it one feeding at a time, because every baby and scenario can be different. The first few days are like an orientation to a new job; learning a new skill takes time and practice. As parents gain more experience, they become more confident and independent."

She continues, "If families have questions after discharge, Washington Hospital offers outpatient lactation services at the Birthing Center. "We can meet with them one-on-one, or support them over the phone on our Lactation Advice line for continued guidance."

#### **Bonding Culture**

Promoting mother-baby bonding and breastfeeding is more than just talk at Washington Hospital-it's part of the culture.

"Right after birth, we help facilitate breastfeeding as soon as possible-ideally in the first hour after delivery," she says. "That's the "golden hour." We put baby skin-toskin and then provide assistance through the first latch. Allowing babies to have unlimited skin-to-skin for the first few hours helps with the bonding, milk production, and temperature stability."

Typical changes in one's own body, babies' behaviors, and dynamics of milk supply are all discussed, but babies don't follow scripts, and parents can be surprised by robust feeding patterns.

"For example, the second night babies tend to cluster feed," Lawani explains. "They're feeding nearly every hour. I prepare families with the knowledge that this is what's going to happen, but the demands of a newborn are often underestimated. The second night comes, and families call with concerns that they're doing something wrong. Frequent feeding is normal for breastfeeding newborns, and distinguishing between what is and is not normal leads to increased confidence in caring for their newborn. For many families, this time in a babyfriendly environment is crucial to establishing a successful breastfeeding experience."

#### **Going Forward**

In the past, new moms were told to feed their babies on a schedule, but Baby-Friendly research has shown feeding on cue is much better for both mom and baby. To aid in that, newborns at Washington Hospital Birthing Center stay in the rooms with their moms, who are encouraged to breastfeed responsively. Rooming-in helps the new mom learn her baby's feeding cues.

Lawani said moms are encouraged to breastfeed exclusively for six months, then introduce solids while continuing to breastfeed. Baby-Friendly guidelines suggest continued on page 5



# On a Mission for Health

Union City Heart Health Fair Sept. 7

The mission of Washington Hospital Healthcare System (WHHS) is to improve and maintain the health care needs of Washington Township Health Care District residents through medical services, education and research. A big part of that mission is to identify and assess community health care needs.

Every three years, Washington Hospital conducts a community health needs assessment. In 2023, WHHS identified less favorable heart health outcomes in Union City compared to other parts of the district. To address these needs, the Hospital is partnering with Washington Township Medical Foundation (WTMF) to host a heart health fair in Union City to provide education, screenings, and resources to the community.

#### **Empowering Heart Health**

WHHS Community Outreach Manager Kayla Gupta, MPH, said while the health system is committed to improving heart health for the entire WHHS community, it was important to reach out to Union City residents in particular.

"When we finished the report last year, we saw Union City residents had more Emergency Department visits, hospitalizations, and deaths related to heart disease and stroke than residents of Fremont or Newark," Gupta explained. "We knew focused community health education would help meet people where they live, so we planned this heart health fair to give them access to health screenings, specialized physicians and information on how to live a healthy lifestyle to promote heart health."

According to their city website, more than half of the population of Union City is Asian. The American Heart Association notes that this ethnic group has a higher prevalence of heart disease and greater cardiovascular risk factors than other



groups, and develops coronary artery disease up to 10 years earlier than the general population. They also have a 35% higher chance of dying from a heart attack than the average population. Because of these statistics, Gupta said the heart health fair is a great way to address the needs revealed in the report.

"Events like this are important to our community to provide access and to remove barriers so people can gain insight into their health in an environment that is more comfortable and welcoming," she noted. "The more we can do to bring awareness of heart health and provide connections to resources our community members need, the better."

#### **Information is Power**

The Heart Health Fair will kick off at 10 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 7, at the Nakamura Clinic, 33077 Alvarado-Niles Road in Union City. The four-hour fair will include on-site screenings for blood pressure, glucose and cholesterol, as well as opportunities to speak with cardiologists,

endocrinologists and other health care providers. There will also be fitness classes, a cooking demonstration, and activities for families and children. Local community organizations will be present to connect attendees with additional resources.

In order to lead a healthy lifestyle, it's important to take control of your health. Knowing specific risks for developing heart disease and diabetes can help people be proactive in making healthier life choices. Gupta emphasized the screenings are not intended to replace regular doctor visits. If any concerning results are found, attendees will be encouraged to follow up with their primary care provider. For those without a regular doctor, the event will provide referrals to help them establish care.

"If you already know you have a heart condition, the heart health fair is a good place to get more information or connect with the WTMF cardiology team," she emphasized. "If you don't know anything about your heart health, this is the place and time to find out."

Gupta said the goal of the heart health fair is to create an informative and empowering event, as WHHS strives to create a healthier and more heart-conscious community. "This doesn't replace going to your doctor," she continued. "But people can take the health care information they receive at the health fair to their primary care provider as another important data point. Together, we can continue to make a significant impact on heart health and well-being for our community and beyond."

#### **Fun for All**

The event will feature information and education on the importance of regular exercise and a heart-healthy diet for preventing and managing heart disease and diabetes. In addition to health care providers, representatives from the Union City Family Services team and Union City Recreation Services will be on hand to share resources available to families and individuals.

Beyond health screenings, the heart health fair will include fitness classes. These include Zumba with Lewis Fernandez at 10 a.m. and Fitness Boxing with Michael Quebec at noon. Rock the Bike will have a "pedal powered" smoothie booth, where kids can hop on a "blender bike" and make their own smoothies.

'We will also have local performances throughout the day, including a ukulele group," Gupta shared. "There will be a lot of giveaways, a cooking demo and lots of booths to teach skills to help people live a healthy lifestyle. There's something for everyone. The fair takes place in Union City, but it's open to anyone who wants to learn more about their heart health."

year. For moms who want to supplement breastfeeding with a bottle, or who will have other caregivers taking care of the baby, Lawani and her team suggest supplementing with the mom's own breast milk.

"Considering the lifelong benefits of breast milk, we want our patients to understand all the options to initiate and sustain breastfeeding," she said. "We have hospital-grade breast pumps available here for use during their inpatient stay and resources for local breast pump rental services. If they choose to add formula, we let them know that any amount of breast milk they provide their child is beneficial and the ideal primary food for their baby. We want to make sure we're providing the information they need to make an informed decision about infant feeding."


information to help manage and prevent this chronic condition. We'll also offer public benefits enrollment.







The Disposal Days program allows residents of the City of Hayward to bring up to five cubic yards of household items for disposal to the city transfer station six times per year on the second Saturday of the months of February, April, June, August, October and December. Five cubic yards is about the equivalent of one full bed of an average size pick-up truck. The bi-monthly events will be held regardless of weather conditions at the time.

#### The following items are not accepted at the transfer station:

- Hazardous materials, including paint, motor oil, solvents, cleaners, pesticides, tires and car batteries
- Objects over 75 pounds (except furniture and appliances)
  - Medical waste

- Construction and demolition debris
- Bricks • Dirt
- Concrete

Disposal Days is open to residents of incorporated City of Hayward only, and pre registration and proof of Hayward residency is required. Registration space is limited and typically fills up fast.



options as they do now—Renewable 100, Bright Choice, or PG&E—but they will be enrolled in Renewable 100 unless they select another plan.

The Renewable 100 plan, as the name suggests, is made of 100% renewable energy content and costs 1.6% more than PG&E, while the Bright Choice option is made up of nearly 50% renewable content and costs 5% less than PG&E, explained Environmental Specialist, Allyn McAuley. "The Renewable 100 plan CARE, FERA, Medical Baseline, Direct Access, and customers who have opted out of Ava service to PG&E will not be transitioned to Renewable 100," noted Geneva Bosques, City of Fremont Director


of Communications and Legislative Affairs.

Fremont's transition to the Renewable 100 service plan is anticipated to take place in 2025 for residential customers and 2026 for business customers. Customer enrollment is anticipated by March 31, 2025. "But before that time there is an extensive outreach campaign that will be developed closely between Ava and the City of Fremont. This would include digital outreach events, webinars, email and print notices, etcetera," noted Dan Schoenholz. At that time, customers who wish to select a plan other than Renewable 100 will be able to do so by visiting the Ava website or by calling Ava directly.

# Super grocery store pricing disparity UNBELIEVABLE HIGHER THAN COMPETITORS

Needless to say we've been going through a high inflation rate since the pandemic. And obviously it is affecting our neighborhood grocery store as well.

On a recent visit, I put items including cooking oil into my shopping bag and then was surprised at the receipt. I realized grocery prices have soared nearly 27% since 2020, higher than overall inflation. Yet understand for these price increases has been supply chain disruptions caused by pandemic-related labor shortages, rising fuel costs and droughts.

I feel that the alarming rise in grocery prices has been a record increase in grocery industry profits.

For example, a 40 FL OZ Wesson canola oil I purchased from Store A (name withheld) for \$3.99. Later when I checked Store B (name withheld), the same item was selling for \$4.99, while Store C (name withheld) had a price sticker of \$5.99. I smiled..thank God I saved at least \$2 instantly at Store A. You check it out, these super grocers are ripping us off in the name of inflation. And they are not afraid of pricing disparity either.

Pricing disparity among giant grocers so high-not a nickel, dime or quarter but a dollar or more-is greed and cheating. I am positive customers had reduced their grocery spending to the point that it actually began to threaten Big Grocer's sales and profits.

At this juncture, I believe a state or federal based pricing agency that is affiliated with the Federal Trade Commission should probe what is happening with grocery store

Dear EarthTalk: Why is sea level rising more in some regions—like the U.S. Southeast—than others? Is there a way to reduce sea level rise in certain specific locales?

Sea level rise is a pressing global issue, exacerbated by climate change. And its impacts are not uniform across the globe; some regions experience more significant increases than others. Notably, the U.S. Southeast has seen higher rates compared to other areas. Understanding the factors behind these regional differences is crucial for developing targeted strategies to mitigate and adapt to these changes.

One major factor contributing to

regional variations in sea level rise is thermal expansion. As ocean water warms, it expands, leading to higher sea levels. However, this expansion does not occur evenly across the globe due to differences in ocean temperatures and circulation patterns. Warm currents can cause more significant sea level rise in certain areas by bringing heat from one region to another. The melting of ice sheets in Greenland and Antarctica contribute to global sea level rise, but its impact is not evenly distributed. Indeed, the gravitational pull from large ice masses affects sea levels regionally. As ice sheets melt, the gravitational attraction decreases, causing water to move away from these areas and leading to higher sea levels elsewhere. This redistribution of water can result in significant regional differences.

Engineering solutions like seawalls, levees and other physical barriers can provide immediate protection against rising sea

levels. These are designed to prevent flooding and protect infrastructure. However, they also present challenges, including high costs and potential ecological impacts. Strategic urban planning and land use can significantly mitigate the impacts of sea level rise. Sustainable development practices, including equitably relocating people, structures and infrastructure away from vulnerable coastal areas—as well as the wholesale redesign of coastal communities—are essential. These strategies can help reduce vulnerability and enhance resilience. For example, some coastal cities are redesigning urban spaces to allow for natural water flow and creating buffer zones to absorb floodwaters.

Effective policies at local, state and federal levels are crucial for addressing sea level rise. Governments can implement regulations that promote sustainable practices, fund infrastructure projects and support community adaptation efforts. To effectively

combat sea level rise, it is essential for individuals to engage with local governments and advocate for policy changes. By supporting research and development, communities can better prepare for the impacts of rising seas.


Lawrence's accomplishments stood out to Bank of America. For one, he founded Step Into Sports (https://www.stepintosports.org/), a service-oriented sports club that gets high school and grade school youth moving

through athletics to help create a more balanced school experience. His efforts have grown to be a Fremont citywide movement that has reached over 3,000 youth, helped by hundreds of student volunteers in 2023. Due to his fluency in Mandarin, Lawrence has acted as a private tutor since seventh grade for elementary and middle school students in China on a variety of subjects. He also tutors math at Irvington on a volunteer basis. Lawrence was born in the U.S. and lived in China for the first few years of his life, and he plans to study economics in college.

"The program is absolutely fascinating. The opportunity to collaborate with 300 other like-minded peers and mentors has not only broadened my perspectives but also strengthened my commitment to making a positive impact in my community," Jia commented. "I truly believe that programs like this are essential for empowering future generations, and I hope that every student gets a chance to experience such an inspiring journey where they are challenged, inspired, and supported in such dynamic environments."









# August Night Sky Notes

SEEING DOUBLE

#### By KAT TROCHE

During the summer months, we tend to miss the views of Saturn, Jupiter and other heavenly bodies. But it can be a great time to look for other items, like globular star clusters such as Messier 13, open star clusters such as the Coma Star Cluster (Melotte 111), but also double stars!

#### What Are Double Stars?

If you have seen any movies or read any books that refer to having two suns in the sky, that would be a double star system. These star systems typically come in two types binary and optical doubles. Binary stars are two stars that are gravitationally bound and

orbit each other, and optical double stars only appear to be close together when viewed from Earth, but in reality, are extremely far apart from each other and are not affected by each other's gravity. With a small telescope, in moderately light polluted skies, summer offers great views of these stellar groupings from the Northern Hemisphere:

#### **Double Double:**

Also known by its technical name, Epsilon Lyrae, this multiple star system appears as one star with naked eye observing. But with a small telescope, it can be split into "two" stars. A large telescope reveals Epsilon Lyrae's secret – what looks like a single star is actually a quadruple star system!

A gorgeous double star set-one blue, one yellow-in the constellation Cygnus.

#### **Polaris**

While technically a multiple star system, our North Star can easily be separated from one star to two with a modest telescope.

#### **Mizar and Alcor**

Located in the handle of the Big Dipper, this pair can be seen with the naked eye.

Aside from looking incredible in a telescope or binoculars, double stars help astronomers learn about measuring the mass of stars, and about stellar evolution. Some stars orbit each other a little too closely, and

things can become disastrous, but overall, these celestial bodies make for excellent targets and are simple crowd pleasers.





# Mocktails for summer

REFRESHING FOR EVERYONE!

As our society's relationship with alcohol is always changing, the mocktail is something now enjoyed by adults more than ever. While you can order most drinks off of a bar menu "virgin" style, the reality is that aside from alcohol, syrups and harsh citrus juice make up the majority of the remaining ingredients. Oftentimes, this makes for an overly-sweet (or tart!), unpleasant drink. A trend on the rise, restaurants and bars are more commonly featuring designated mocktail selections, made with high-quality mixers, soft beverages and occasionally zero-proof liquor.

So, what makes a great mocktail? In my opinion, something light in body but deep in flavor. Something with a sophisticated taste that would not be confused with a typical soda. Additionally, muddled fruit with herbs, including savory ones, take things to the next level.

One of the keys to achieving great flavor is through using a high-quality syrup. Right here in Alameda County, Torani is producing some of my very favorite syrups to use. My favorite style is Torani Puremade,

which is offered in dozens of flavors with no artificial ingredients or coloring. My favorite: Puremade Galaxy. The level of depth of flavor makes its taste difficult to explain, but Torani has described the notes as "raspberry, rum, and mineral." I highly recommend checking out this and other Puremade syrups-you'll never go back!

So, drink up, enjoy and stay cool for the rest of the warm days ahead!

# **Mint Julep Mocktail**

- 1/4 cup water
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh mint leaves
- 2 cups crushed ice
- ½ cup prepared lemonade
- fresh mint sprigs, for garnish

# **Directions**

Combine water, sugar and a tablespoon of chopped mint in a small saucepan; cook and stir until mixture has boiled and sugar has dissolved. Remove from heat and set aside to cool for about an hour; strain out mint

leaves. Fill two cups or frozen goblets with crushed ice. Pour 1/2 of the lemonade into each glass and top with a splash of cooled sugar syrup. Garnish each with a mint sprig and a straw. Serve on a silver platter.

# Mai Tai Mocktail

- 3 ounces orange juice
- 1 ounce lime juice (or juice of 1/2 lime)
- 1 teaspoon fine sugar
- 1 tablespoon orgeat syrup (almond syrup)
- 1/2 ounce grenadine

# **Directions**

Combine all ingredients except crushed ice in a shaker half filled with ice. Shake well. Strain into an old-fashioned glass half filled with crushed ice. Garnish with a slice of fruit and a drink umbrella.





# Swiss National Day

CELEBRATING THE 733RD ANNIVERSARY OF SWITZERLAND!

Every August 1st Swiss nationals, expatriates and fans of Switzerland gather to celebrate the birth of the scenic nation. Landlocked high in the European Alps, the welcoming country of Switzerland is home to myriads of mountain peaks, glacial lakes and sweeping meadow vistas. August 3rd several hundred Swiss and Swiss enthusiasts gathered at Newark's Swiss Park to indulge in the culture, food and comradery.

The lively event provided a full day experience of all things Swiss. Vendor booths offered Swiss wine and whiskey tasting. Fondue pots, Swiss books and music, traditional clothes and other wares from Switzerland were sold. Bratwurst, spaetzle, pickled cabbage and other Swiss delicacies were served.

Heidi Campini, brightly clad in the red and white colors of the Swiss flag, proudly

shared tales of her youth in Switzerland. "We celebrate August 1st with bonfires and fireworks at parties on the lake or in the mountains.'

Yodeling, alpenhorn blowing, rock climbing, Tochino music and other Swiss pastimes were practiced and shared at the festival. The Golden Gate Boys' Choir carried the flags from each Swiss region in a parade through the event grounds. The well shaded outdoor venue offered a comfortable grassy environment with ample seating.

In 1291, Austria was threatening invasion of the Alps. Three original cantons or statelike regions in the Alps united to fight the Austrians. One German speaking canton, one heavily French influenced and one closer to Italy united to defend their mountain territory. The coalition successfully thwarted the Austrian invasion. The union became the country of Switzerland, now comprising 26 Alpen cantons.

Switzerland has a long history of dairy farming and milk product exports like cheese and chocolate. After the California Gold Rush of 1849, many Swiss farmers emigrated to California. The lush central valley, and temperate pastures in the lower Sierras were reminiscent of home and ideal spots to relocate the Swiss farming tradition.

Swiss clubs exist all over the state to preserve Swiss identity and culture for the descendants of California's Swiss Dairy farmers. The Stanislaus County Swiss Club, located in Jory's Grove, was founded in 1921. The founder's grandson, Phillip Jory and his wife attend the festive Swiss National event in Newark each year. "It's just a wonderful

The Swiss Heritage Mobile Museum shared the rich history of the mountain nation. Switzerland Tourism's booth showcased the country's vibrant communities and offered travel options. The Swiss model

train exhibit, William Tell crossbow game and a cornhole competition kept kids amused. Swiss Clubs from across the state sold flags, t-shirts and displayed captivating antique photos of Swiss family dairy farms in California.

Debra Marty from Fremont was in attendance representing the Bernese Mountain Dog Club of Northern California. She brought 10 of the fabled canines, known for their life saving water keg collars and devoted companionship. "Our 10 year old, Geeta, has been petted all day long here, she

# Firefighters continue battling massive wildfire in California ahead of thunderstorms, lightning

Firefighters made progress Saturday against California's largest wildfire of the year ahead of expected thunderstorms that could unleash fire-starting lightning and erratic winds and erode progress made over the past week. Dry, hot conditions posed similar threats across the fire-stricken West.

"We're not completely out of the woods yet, but we're looking very, very good," CalFire official Mark Brunton said in a video update Saturday. "This is moving at a very fast pace."

Containment of the Park Fire, now California's fourth-largest wildfire on record, was at 27% as of Saturday afternoon. Brunton said the relatively milder weather the last few days allowed firefighters to build containment lines.

But hotter weather, fuels and terrain will continue posing challenges for the estimated 6,500 firefighters battling the fire, which has spread over 626 square miles (1,621 square kilometers) since allegedly being started by arson in a park in the Sierra Nevada foothills east of the Sacramento Valley city of Chico. For comparison, the city of Los Angeles covers about 503 square miles (1,302 square kilometers).

Suppression crews will also start removing damaged infrastructure in some areas Saturday. People living in the rural communities of Cohasset and Forest Ranch were told they could start returning home Saturday afternoon.

The fire originated at low elevations, where it quickly burned through thick grass and oaks, destroying at least 567 structures and damaging 51 so far. As it has climbed higher, the vegetation has changed to a greater concentration of trees and brush, Cal Fire said.

The fire's push northward has brought it toward the rugged lava rock landscape surrounding Lassen Volcanic National Park, which has been closed because of the threat. The area remains one of the biggest challenges for firefighters, Cal Fire officials said Saturday afternoon. The smoke has also prevented firefighters from deploying helicopters and other aircrafts the last few days.

"There's a lot of really steep drainages in that area," CalFire spokesperson Devin Terrill said. "It takes a lot more time to access those

After a brief respite, firefighters are now bracing for treacherous conditions of hot and dry weather, along with expected thunderstorms with potential thunder strikes and gusty winds.

The collapse of thunderstorm clouds can blow wind in any and all directions, said Jonathan Pangburn, a fire behavior analyst with Cal Fire. "Even if there's not lightning per se, it is very much a safety-watch-out environment for our firefighters out there," Pangburn said.

The Park Fire is among almost 90 large fires burning across the western U.S. Evacuation orders were in effect for 22 of the fires, according to the National Interagency Fire Center.

Crews made progress Saturday against three major fires burning in Colorado near heavily populated areas north and south of Denver, with containment figures improving and some evacuation orders lifted. One of the fires was being investigated as arson. About 50 structures had been damaged or destroyed, about half of them homes, and one person was found dead in a burned home earlier in the week.

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office is investigating a blaze threatening hundreds of homes near the Colorado city of Littleton as

Karlyn Tilley, a spokesperson for Jefferson County Sheriff's Office, said the investigation is ongoing, and investigators are using a dog specially trained to sniff out sources and causes of fires. Tilley said just because they suspect the fire was human-caused doesn't mean it was intentional.

Firefighters were making good progress on the fire despite the steep, rocky terrain and blistering heat, and no houses had been burned, officials said.

The cause and origin of a fatal blaze west of the town of Lyons was being probed by the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, with specially trained fire investigators from the agency helping local authorities, agency spokesperson

Crystal McCoy said. The area blackened by that fire remained relatively unchanged after it burned five houses.

The largest of the Colorado fires, west of Loveland, grew to 14.9 square miles (38.5 square kilometers) after previously burning 49 homes and other structures. Its cause is under investigation.

Scientists say extreme wildfires are becoming more common and destructive in the U.S. West and other parts of the world as climate change warms the planet and droughts become more severe.

# University of California president to step down after 5 years marked by pandemic, campus protests

The president of the University of California announced Wednesday he would step down after five years of leading one of the nation's largest public university systems through the coronavirus pandemic, labor strikes and campus protests.

Michael V. Drake, the first Black person to serve in the role in the system's more than 150-year history, said he would step down at the end of the 2024-2025 school year. He called serving in the post "the honor of a lifetime."

"I am immensely proud of what the UC community has accomplished," Drake said in a statement. "At every turn, I have sought to listen to those I served, to uphold our shared UC values, and to do all I could to leave this institution in better shape than it was before. I'm proud to see the University continuing to make a positive impact on the lives of countless Californians through research, teaching, and public service."

Drake began the role in July 2020, just months after the pandemic began and as racial justice protests had erupted across the country in the aftermath of the murder of George Floyd. In the years since, the university system has seen other high-profile demonstrations, including in 2022 when thousands of graduate student workers went on strike for higher pay and earlier this year when students set up encampments to protest the war in Gaza.

As president, Drake secured a budget increase from the state of 5% annually over five years to help the university system increase enrollment and make its colleges more accessible to underrepresented students. He helped create plans to reduce tuition rate increases and offer free tuition for Native American students who are citizens of federally recognized tribes.

The University of California enrolls nearly 300,000 students and is the second-largest university system in the state behind California State University, which enrolls more than 450,000 students annually.

Before he became president, Drake spent decades working in higher education, where he served as chancellor of the University of California, Irvine; led The Ohio State University; and chaired the National Collegiate Athletic Association. He is a physician who trained at the University of California, San Francisco, before becoming a professor of ophthalmology at the university's school of medicine.

Democratic Gov. Gavin Newsom lauded Drake's tenure as president, saying he "has led

with grace and vision."

"On behalf of all Californians, I thank President Drake for his leadership, for growing our UC system, and for paving a brighter path forward for our state," Newsom said in a statement. "His legacy of service in higher education has undoubtedly helped us grow the next generation of extraordinary California leaders, and it's been an honor to work alongside him."

Information about our communities and in anything even close to this world, young and impressionable readers were constantly assured that it did exist and any possible danger would be assuaged by authority figures... mom, dad, fireman, policeman, etc.

Along came the 1960s, filled with rage and a completely different view of how authorities handled their responsibilities. The façade of a harmonious, gentle society was shattered as societal factions staked their claim to reality. Information - factual and contrived - moved faster and faster. The pace of both phenomena has only increased since then.

Connections in communities at large have often evaporated as challenges to personal interaction with community members, and even business associates, have declined, reduced to computer screens and lines of text, emojis, memes and images. Brutal reality (or fantasy) has replaced idyllic simplicity, both skewed toward extremes of an unrealistic utopia or disastrous dystopia.

In addition to a fractured social structure, the COVID pandemic accelerated isolation within our communities. Prior to its outbreak, gatherings, festivals, sports and celebrations were numerous and well attended. Not only did arts and civic organizations bring people together, so did various protective services. Safety fairs, k-9 competitions, motorcycle competitions and fire suppression skills were on display on an annual basis.

The general population was able to mingle with administrative and line personnel, one-to-one. This is a tremendous mitigating

factor when relying on the same people in a stressful crisis. As the impact of the pandemic has lessened, some major fairs (e.g., Festival of the Arts, Newark Days, etc.) have returned along with concerts and fine arts exhibits. However, we are a long way from pre-pandemic activity levels.

Although efforts of law enforcement to stay connected with the general public have continued through programs such as Coffee with Cops or School Resource Officers, these are limited in scope and while valuable, fail to reach much of the population. We need augmentation by more positive and personal connections. So far, our communities have avoided some of the lurid headlines of others that have suffered grievous tragedy and loss of life, but closer relationships with authority figures under positive circumstances is a powerful protective measure. I am not suggesting a fanciful, kumbaya moment with a Dick and Jane patina, but I do believe personal connections can mitigate differences that lead to misunderstanding and serious consequences.

The result will not be a series of colorful, simplistic pictures with sentences to match or the dark, despair of hopelessness, rather a realistic understanding and connections with others serving in a variety of capacities to ensure a vibrant, healthy and safe community.

# Humanoid development speeds up

NVIDIA ADDS TOOLS IT SAYS WILL ACCELERATE DEVELOPMENT OF HUMANOID ROBOTS

In July at SIGGRAPH in Denver, NVIDIA Corp. announced research and offerings for simulation, generative artificial intelligence, and robotics. The company said it is providing a suite of services, models, and computing platforms to enable robotics and AI designers "to develop, train, and build the next generation of humanoid robotics.3

"The next wave of AI is robotics, and one of the most exciting developments is humanoid robots," stated Jensen Huang, founder and CEO of NVIDIA. "We're advancing the entire NVIDIA robotics stack, opening access for worldwide humanoid robotics developers and companies to use the platforms, acceleration libraries, and AI models best suited for their needs."

The company presented 20 research papers at SIGGRAPH. Rev Labaredian, vice president

of Omniverse and virtualization strategy, said in a press briefing that NVIDIA has been working on graphics research since 2001, so its connection to graphics, simulation, and robotics is well-established.

#### **NVIDIA NIMs help develop** digital twins

Not only can simulation help design robots and their environments, but it can also be applied to training production systems, said NVIDIA. Its NIM microservices are prebuilt containers using NVIDIA inference software, now offered as a service. The company claimed that they can reduce model deployment times from weeks to minutes.

'The time to apply generative AI is now, but it can be daunting," acknowledged Kari Briski, vice president of generative AI software product management at NVIDIA. "Enterprises need a fast path to production for return on investment."

"Two new AI microservices

will allow roboticists to enhance simulation workflows for generative physical AI in NVIDIA Isaac Sim, a reference application for robotics simulation built on the NVIDIA Omniverse platform," the company

The MimicGen NIM generates synthetic motion data based on recordings of teleoperation using spatial computing devices such as Apple Vision Pro.

The Robocasa NIM generates robot tasks and simulation-ready environments in NVIDIA's OpenUSD Universal Scene Description framework for developing and collaborating within 3D worlds.

Available now, NVIDIA OSMO is a managed cloud service that robotics developers can use to orchestrate and scale multistage workflows across distributed computing resources, whether on premises or in the cloud.

"Developing humanoid robots is extremely complex — requiring an incredible amount of real data, tediously captured from the real world," said Alex Gu, CEO of Fourier. "NVIDIA's new simulation and generative AI developer tools will help bootstrap and accelerate our model-development workflows."

The company said robotics developers including 1x, Boston Dynamics, ByteDance Research, Field AI, Figure, Fourier, Galbot, LimX Dynamics, Mentee, Neura Robotics, RobotEra, and Skild AI have already joined its early-access program.

Boston Dynamics and NVIDIA have a long history of close collaboration to push the boundaries of what's possible in robotics," said Aaron Saunders, chief technology officer of Boston Dynamics. "We're really excited to see the fruits of this work accelerating the industry at large, and the early-access program is a fantastic way to access best-in-class technology."







# East Bay Regional Park District receives notable AAA rating

Moody's Rating Service and Standard and Poor's (S&P) Global Ratings have awarded the East Bay Regional Park District with AAA ratings, with a stable outlook, for its history of responsible fiscal management and strong financial position. The AAA ratings allow for lower debt service rates, which creates cost savings that can go toward essential services such as park operations, maintenance, and police and fire protection services.

The East Bay Regional Park District consists of 73 Regional Parks spread out over 126,000 acres in Alameda and Contra Costa counties. East Bay Regional Parks are a valuable public resource that protect natural habitat and provide safe and healthy outdoor opportunities for all.

"The AAA rating is very rare for government agencies and shows that taxpayer funds are being spent wisely and efficiently," said Park District General Manager Sabrina Landreth. "The ratings recognize the Park District's long history of strong fiscal management, solid funding base, and robust financial reporting and transparency."

According to Moody's, "The rating incorporates the district's very strong balance sheet reserves, supported by sound fiscal policies and a multi-year trend of surplus operations. The district's debt, pension, and other post-employment benefits (OPEB) burdens are modest."

Moody's also says the Park District is in a "very strong fiscal position."

According to S&P, their AAA rating reflects the Park District's "High-quality management policies and practices, including the maintenance of a five-year forecasting model and adherence to a minimum reserve policy of 32 percent of annual revenue," and "Available reserves that are far above our very strong threshold."

"Maintaining our AAA rating is very important," said Park District Assistant General Manager for Finance and Management Services, Deborah Spaulding. "It allows the Park District to obtain better financing terms, so we have more funding for improving parks, fire protection, and protecting habitat."

The AAA ratings were received in conjunction with the issuance of up to \$39.5 million in bonds to improve the Park District's Peralta Oaks North building. The Park District purchased the Peralta Oaks North building for \$14.4 million in 2019 to house its Public Safety Division and administrative staff. The building is directly across the street from the Park District's main headquarters. The Park District has developed renovation plans for the building, which the bond funding will support. Significant ADA and seismic upgrades are needed. The building will serve as the new headquarters for the Public Safety Division, including the District's Police, Fire, and Lifeguarding services, and provide additional administrative office space.



In addition to his wife, Dhami is survived by his four loving children,




