# Newark gets ready for the next big one

BASIC TRAINING CAN SAVE LIVES IN A CRISIS

The official motto of the Boy Scouts of America is the words, "Be prepared." The simple, yet direct message is also indicative of efforts from the City of Newark to ensure that its own citizens in the East Bay become and remain prepared for whatever challenges and calamities life may present.

Founded in March 2023, the City of Newark's Emergency Preparedness Training Program has centered itself around three core principles: being prepared to help one's local community, being prepared to help one's neighbors and being prepared to help the community on a wide scale.

"Emergency preparedness is always essential. And one of the things that we as a city saw, especially during the pandemic, was that not all everyday people and businesses were equipped to respond to what was going on," says City of Newark Emergency Service Coordinator Richard Martinez. "What we've seen since the implementation of this program is a resurgence of interest from the public on how to better prepare

emergencies."

According to Martinez, an incident in which a Fremont resident underwent a medical emergency and ultimately passed away due to inadequate aid from bystanders attempting to help in 2022 was just one of many reminders of the dire consequences that can arise from a lack of emergency

for natural disasters as well as just everyday

preparedness.

"When we think of emergencies we may tend to think of fires or earthquakes, but even just learning skills such as hands-only CPR [cardiopulmonary resuscitation] when a friend or neighbor undergoes a heart attack can make all the difference," adds Martinez.

Those who participate in any number of the program's seminars and workshops can learn essential and potentially life-saving skills such as drawing up evacuation routes for one's home/business, establishing rally points, assembling disaster kits with essential items and administering immediate medical aid—such as the aforementioned CPR—until paramedics arrive.

For Naz Jaladin of the City of Newark's Community Development Department, the number of residents educated by the program rising from 30—at the time of its inception—to now over 300 is a hallmark of progress that certainly will not dissipate.

"Through the use of city-wide announcements and partnerships with some of our local businesses, we've been able to increase awareness of CERT (Community

# Fremont appoints new City Council member

# COUNCIL WELCOMES KATHY KIMBERLIN AS NEW DISTRICT 3 REPRESENTATIVE

Fremont City Council appointed 22-year resident and longtime community leader Kathy Kimberlin as the new council member for District 3 this past Tuesday.

During the council meeting on September 10, Kimberlin was officially sworn into office by the City of Fremont. She is replacing Jenny Kassan, who recently resigned as she helps her husband Vinnie Bacon run for mayor. The passionate newcomer expressed excitement about working alongside currently seated council members.

"I love Fremont," Kimberlin said. "It's not easy to make changes but if we work together we can."

She will serve as council member for approximately two years. Her term is set to end November 2026.

Kimberlin's swearing in follows her departure from her role as Assistant to District 1 Alameda County Supervisor David Haubert. She has also had leadership roles with the Centerville Business and Community Association, Fremont Education Foundation, Fremont Chamber of Commerce, and in 2020 she founded the Tri-City Nonprofit Coalition. Moved by her unwavering commitment to public service, residents took the open public comment section to sing her praises.

"Kathy is a vigorous and enthusiastic devotee of community service," said former Assistant City Attorney for the city Ted Bresler.

Kimberlin received the second-highest votes during the 2022 General Municipal Election, and said she felt the enthusiasm surrounding her last campaign and the impression she left on voters never left. Though she's clashed with some residents on policy issues, she is hopeful her term will bring about a stronger Fremont.

"I ran on building community alongside my neighbors, and I try to do that every day," she said.



# Celebrate "An Evening in Italia" at the 38th Annual Top Hat Gala

Gala Supports New MRI Imaging Technology for Washington Hospital



A trip to Italy via Fremont may soon be in your future when the Washington Hospital Healthcare Foundation (WHHF) hosts its 38th annual Top Hat Gala on Saturday, Oct. 12. Master of Ceremonies Alex Savidge of KTVU will help kick off the black-tie event with an enchanting garden reception at 6 p.m. -complete with Italian-inspired cocktails, followed at 7 p.m. by a delectable dinner influenced by the abundant flavors of Italy. After dinner, guests will be entertained by the captivating voice of world-renowned Italian tenor, Pasquale Esposito, and enjoy a live auction, after-dinner dancing, cozy outdoor lounge and much more in the Grand Tent at Washington West. The gala concludes at midnight.

The first Top Hat Gala in 1986 brought together community members and leaders, business owners, philanthropists and other Silicon Valley partners to financially support Washington Hospital Healthcare System (WHHS) initiatives. In the 37 years since, the Foundation has raised millions to benefit WHHS programs and services. This year will be no different, as supporters from across the region will turn out to help WHHS continue its commitment to bringing high-quality, cutting-edge, academic-level care to Tri-City patients.

For the past 30 years, WHHS focused on its strategic plan to bring specialized care centers for cancer, neurology, cardiovascular, women's health and a full spectrum of other health care services to southern Alameda County. The plan included a level II trauma center, which opened in July. During that time, it contracted for 1.5T magnetic resonance imaging scanner (MRI) services several days a week. As Washington Hospital continued to grow, it became clear the Hospital needed more advanced diagnostic imaging technology, so the Foundation selected a new high-resolution MRI as the focus of this year's gala.

Washington Hospital Healthcare Foundation Executive Director Sarah G. Gemski said funds raised will go toward the purchase of a state-of-the-art, 3T wide-bore MRI machine for Washington Hospital, along with construction of a new comprehensive imaging suite on the ground floor of the Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion to house the unit. The MRI machine will provide both inpatient and outpatient care. The 3T wide-bore MRI has a powerful magnet with double the strength of the current 1.5T MRI machine, offering a greater degree of image quality and detail, and faster and shorter exams. The cutting-edge, high-resolution MRI technology will bring earlier and more accurate diagnoses across a wide range of conditions, improving patient outcomes. The wide bore offers patients a more comfortable exam, while being ideal for claustrophobic and larger patients.

'We are upgrading our imaging capabilities to provide an advanced level of care for the community," Gemski explained. "What we've been using is serviceable, but we are committed to elevating the level of care we provide. This new MRI technology will touch patients across the spectrum, from oncology patients, to seniors, to obstetrical patients. In addition, the new imaging suite will allow patients to be moved smoothly from the machine to recovery rooms without risking transport. It's a very thoughtful design and will be very impactful for patients."

Gala co-chairs Ramin Beygui, MD, FACS, and Sandeep Kunwar, MD, FACS, are personally and professionally committed to bringing the new MRI machine to the Healthcare System. Dr. Beygui is the medical director of Cardiothoracic Surgery at WHHS while Dr. Kunwar is medical director of Washington Hospital's Bell Neuroscience Institute. In addition to better imaging, Dr. Kunwar noted the interventional medicine component of the MRI machine will bring new procedures to the Tri-City Area that patients previously had to leave the community to receive. Surgeries can be performed in the MRI, he said, and in the future the new capabilities will allow WHHS to participate in more clinical trials across multiple specialties.

The case of 22-year-old Gabby Oyler emphasizes the need for a dedicated, 24/7 MRI unit. Lifelong Newark resident Oyler came to the Washington Hospital Emergency Department with stroke symptoms and was fortunate the contracted MRI machine was available that day. It helped save her life. (Read more in the sidebar.)



# Shoulder Replacement Keeps Sonoma Ecologist Active

"My Only Regret is Not Doing it Sooner"





Back to enjoying the outdoors, Stephen Hansen is grateful for his new shoulder.

In addition to managing the Sonoma wildlife preserve he calls home, 76-year-old Stephen Hansen enjoys swimming, cycling 50 to 70 miles a week, cross-country skiing, and playing singles tennis. He heads an extraordinary family of ecologists that work to protect the earth. He and his wife are retired PhD ecologists; his daughter founded a nonprofit organization focused on climate change adaptation; and his son is an environmental scientist with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. For the past several years, Stephen had to deal with pain and loss of mobility in his deteriorating shoulder. Now recovered from his December 2023 shoulder replacement, he is back doing all the things he loves, and his shoulder is pain free.

Stephen is one of many Northern California people of all ages who come to Washington Hospital's Institute for Joint Restoration and Research (IJRR) for a comprehensive range of world-class shoulder treatments and surgeries performed by leading shoulder specialist and orthopedic surgeon John G. Costouros, MD, FACS, FAAOS.

Dr. Costouros' career has been focused entirely on the shoulder, from educating patients and future doctors, mastering surgical techniques, and developing new technologies. In 2004, he was one of the first surgeons to bring reverse total shoulder replacement to the U.S. Dr. Costouros also performs traditional total shoulder replacement and less invasive stemless replacement. He is board certified and fellowship trained, and treats people of all ages and lifestyles including high school and college athletes, as well as local professionals like 49ers, Warriors and Giants players.

When searching for a shoulder surgeon, Stephen was referred to Dr. Costouros by his physical therapist and another surgeon. "Dr. Costouros' practice works like clockwork. During the consultation, he answered all my questions even before I asked them," Stephen said. "I also met with his physician assistant, Kevin Saska, who was wonderful. They gave me a comprehensive booklet describing what to do before and after surgery that was really helpful for my wife and me. At appointments we

always got in right away and it only took two weeks to schedule the surgery."

Depending on the diagnosis, physical therapy can help manage some shoulder problems. Dr. Costouros uses cortisone and other injections to treat conditions like rotator cuff disease, frozen shoulder and arthritis. Surgery is discussed when other treatments fail to resolve pain and loss of function.

"I had been experiencing shoulder pain and stiffness for about eight years and did physical therapy in lieu of pursuing shoulder replacement surgery," explained Stephen. "It wasn't improving, but I kept kicking the can down the road because I heard shoulder surgery can come with unintended consequences. As it turned out, that was not the case at all. Thanks to Dr. Costouros and his excellent team—my surgery went smoothly and was relatively painless. Now my new shoulder works as well as the other one. My only regret is not doing it sooner."

Advancements in surgical techniques have made shoulder replacement less invasive and more bone preserving. Also, anesthesia practices for pain control are improving, allowing patients to go home the same or next day. "I arrived at the Washington Outpatient Surgery Center at 7 a.m. the morning of surgery and left for home at 2 p.m. that day," recalled Stephen. "I stopped taking the pain medications three days after surgery and did physical therapy twice a week as well as at-home exercises 30 minutes per day. After four months of rehab, I went right back to playing tennis with friends and forest thinning for wildfire control on the preserve. I couldn't be happier with my new shoulder and I would highly recommend Dr. Costouros to others who may be putting off their shoulder replacement surgery."



University. The 22-year-old lifelong Newark resident was looking forward to upcoming sorority events, graduation and traveling with friends. But just days before she was to return to school, Oyler woke up to numbness and tingling in her arm, unable to speak. Her mother rushed her to the Washington Hospital Emergency Department, where the triage nurse observed stroke symptoms. She initiated a stroke code, which prompted an initial CT scan, then an MRI. The tests showed Oyler had a previously undetected patent foramen ovale (PFO), a hole in the heart's wall that separates the upper chambers.

All babies have a PFO before birth to allow blood to bypass the lungs and go directly to the brain and body. In most people, the hole closes shortly after birth, but it remains open in 25% of the population. A PFO can cause a blood clot to travel from the right side of the heart to the left, which can lead to an transient ischemic attack (TIA or stroke) if the clot reaches the brain. People who have a PFO and have had an embolic

stroke of unknown cause may be at an increased risk for having a second stroke.

At risk of a second, more deadly stroke, Oyler was admitted to Washington Hospital for treatment of her stroke symptoms and to determine the best course of action to fix the hole. This meant being transported from the Morris Hyman Critical Care Pavilion to the Washington Outpatient Imaging Center at Washington West. The situation presented logistical challenges and testing delays and led to a lot of anxiety for Oyler and

"They told us the first 48 house after a TIA carries a 20% chance of a secondary attack," Oyler explained. "Without further testing, we couldn't know just what my prognosis was. So every time the doctors wanted to check things, I had to be taken from my ICU room by ambulance to Washington West for another MRI scan. Having a dedicated MRI machine right there would have made a big difference."

Once Oyler's diagnosis was confirmed and her stroke symptoms had largely subsided, she was released. After staying home for a day, she returned to Santa Rosa to finish school, and then came home for what she calls her "summer of doctor appointments." In October 2022, Fremont interventional cardiologist Terence Lin, MD, FACC, FSCA, repaired the hole in her heart, giving her a new lease on life. She's philosophical about her stroke and grateful for her good outcome, but notes having a dedicated MRI machine on-site would have made the process easier and faster. These days, she works at a job she loves, enjoys time with family and friends, and stays focused on what is rather than what might have been.

'I was really born twice at Washington Hospital," the now 24-year-old said. "Once in December 1999, when I was born, and again in March 2022, when my life was saved." Gabby is no longer on the medication prescribed following her stroke, the hole in her heart is fixed and as she puts it, "I'm just normal now."

Gabby continued. "Washington Hospital is a special place and I'm incredibly grateful to everyone there for this normal life."

# Qualify for citizenship as a Permanent Resident

Becoming a U.S. citizen is a significant milestone for many immigrants, offering a range of benefits including the right to vote, eligibility for federal jobs and protection from deportation. If you are a U.S. permanent resident (also known as a Green Card holder), you may be eligible to apply for citizenship through a process called naturalization. This article will guide you through the key requirements and steps necessary to qualify for U.S. citizenship.

#### **Permanent Resident Requirement**

The first and most fundamental requirement of U.S. citizenship is that you must be a lawful permanent resident. This means you hold a Green Card, which demonstrates your legal right to live and work in the U.S. Before applying for citizenship, you must meet specific residency requirements:

General Rule: Most applicants must have been permanent residents for at least five years. However, there are some exceptions:

Marriage to a U.S. Citizen: If you are married to a U.S. citizen, you may be eligible to apply after just three years of permanent residency, provided you have been living in marital union with your spouse during that

Military: There are special provisions for those who have served in the U.S. military, which may allow for expedited citizenship.

During this period, you must also have maintained continuous residence in the U.S.

Continuous Residence: You must have lived in the U.S. continuously for five years before applying (or three years if married to a U.S. citizen). Absences of six months or more may disrupt your continuous residence unless you can prove that you did not intend to abandon your residency.

Physical Presence: In addition to continuous residence, you must have been physically present in the U.S. for at least 30 months out of the five years (or 18 months out of the three years if married to a U.S. citizen). Extended absences from the U.S., particularly those longer than six months but less than a year, may require you to provide evidence that you did not intend to abandon your residency.

In addition to physically being in the U.S., there are several more requirements:

Good Moral Character: To qualify for U.S. citizenship, you must demonstrate good moral character. This generally means that you have obeyed the law and have not been involved in any criminal activities or other behaviors that would reflect poorly on your character. Certain criminal convictions, such as those involving moral turpitude, drug offenses or aggravated felonies, can permanently bar you from obtaining

It is important to note that USCIS (United States Citizenship and Immigration Services) reviews your entire history, not just the five years immediately preceding your application. However, demonstrating a clean record during this time frame is crucial.

## **English Language Proficiency**

U.S. citizenship applicants must demonstrate the ability to read, write and speak basic English. Certain applicants may be exempt from the English language requirement based on age and the length of time they have been permanent residents.

50/20 Rule: If you are 50 years old or older and have been a permanent resident for at least 20 years, you are exempt from the English language requirement but must still take the civics test in your native language.

55/15 Rule: If you are 55 years old or older and have been a permanent resident for at least 15 years, you are also exempt from the English requirement but must take the civics test in your native language.

### **Knowledge of U.S. Civics and History**

In addition to the English language requirement, you must also demonstrate knowledge of U.S. history and government, commonly known as civics. The civics test includes up to ten questions, of which you must correctly answer six to pass. The questions cover a range of topics: U.S. government; structure and functions of the government, the Constitution, branches of government and elected officials.

Study materials, including a list of 100 potential questions, are available from USCIS to help you prepare.

#### **Naturalization Interview and Oath** Ceremony

Once your background check is complete, you will be scheduled for a naturalization interview with a USCIS officer. During the interview, you will be asked questions about your application and background, and you will take the English and civics tests. If your application is approved, you will be scheduled to attend an Oath of Allegiance ceremony, where you will officially become a U.S. citizen.

Becoming a U.S. citizen is a complex but rewarding process that requires careful preparation and adherence to the eligibility requirements. By ensuring that you meet the residency, moral character, language and civics knowledge criteria, and by following the application process diligently, you can successfully transition from a U.S. permanent resident to a U.S. citizen.

# Filipinos and allies visit Swalwell's office

# NONPROFIT URGES REPRESENTATIVE TO ENDORSE THE PHILIPPINE HUMAN RIGHTS ACT

Malaya Union City visited Congressman Eric Swalwell's office on August 20, 2024 to talk about the Philippine Human Rights Act (PHRA). The PHRA campaign is one of many ways the organization advocates for the Filipino community.

Malaya Union City was formed in 2020 as the Anti-Terror Law was passed in the Philippines. This law unfairly labeled activists, journalists and anyone expressing dissent towards the government as "terrorists." Those that were "red-tagged" in this way faced harassment and were illegally

The organization was formerly known as Malaya Tri-City but changed to Malaya Union City to reflect the large Filipino population. Roughly one in five residents in Union City are Filipino.

In addition to the PHRA campaign, Malaya Union City is campaigning for workers' rights by advocating for more accessible Assistance to Nationals funds for Filipino migrants in distress and by helping Filipino migrants and dual citizens with overseas voter registration.

The Philippines is one of the deadliest countries for land defenders, journalists and trade unionists. The number of killings under the previous Duterte regime, infamous for its deadly war on drugs, has risen to 30,000. However, since 2016, the U.S. has provided \$550 million dollars in military aid to Duterte and implemented paltry human rights restrictions and oversight.

The Philippine human rights

situation has only worsened under the current Marcos-Duterte administration, which is why progressive Filipinos and allies have continued to call for the passage of the PHRA and a rejection of the Philippine Enhanced Resilience Act

The PHRA would introduce legislation "to suspend United States security assistance with the Philippines until such time as human rights violations by Philippine security forces cease and the responsible state forces are held accountable." PERA seeks to do the opposite by providing more aid to Philippine military forces, which have a long track record of human rights abuses.

Since 2020, Malaya Union City has engaged in legislative work with Rep. Swalwell to urge him to endorse the PHRA. Malaya

successfully got Swalwell to endorse the 2020 and 2022 versions of PHRA. Malaya met with Swalwell's office this year to urge him to endorse the current version.

The visit took place in Swalwell's Castro Valley district office. Malaya Union City members were joined by members of East Bay Democratic Socialists of America, Hayward Community Coalition, and Pilipino American Society for Education.

The group met with Desiree Broom, District Chief of Staff and Foreign Affairs Advisor for Congressman Swalwell's office in Castro Valley and Mallory De Lauro, Senior Advisor/ Counsel in their Washington, D.C.

During the meeting, speakers covered a range of topics. Malaya member Jordan talked about

the human rights situation in the Philippines and corruption under the current Marcos Jr. administration. Member Kristiana talked about the organization's work with migrant Filipinos and how they can benefit from money being redirected towards human rights.

Other topics included the climate of teachers and schools in the Philippines, and the bombings happening in the country. Malaya member Roelle spoke about the journalists who are also being targeted by the Philippine government including Brandon Lee, who survived an assassination attempt by the armed forces in the country.

Their efforts to gain support for the PHRA seemed promising. Members set up a deadline for Swalwell's advisors to respond to their stance on the PHRA. Representative De Lauro said she will relay information to Rep. Swalwell.

"I think it was a good opportunity [to be heard]. I was most inspired by how during this round we were able to bring in more contacts outside of Malaya Union City, especially non-Filipinos who felt compelled to speak on the human rights situation in the Philippines," Jordan said, continuing, "Even though we didn't get a yes or no, we will continue to hold the office accountable and continue to build within the community."



# Self-care at work

Many of us clock in at work, get into a zone of productivity, and forget about attending to self-care during the workday. The end result? We feel exhausted, both physically and emotionally at the end of the long workday. We might even be disgruntled when we come home. Here's the good news—it doesn't take a lot of time to practice self-care during the workday. In fact, most of my suggestions take less than a minute and cost nothing. Incorporating just a few of the strategies below will help maintain your energy and sense of well-being so that you can spend your workday feeling well-balanced.

Let's take care of common misconceptions first. Some might believe it is somehow wrong to take care of themselves while at work. Others think self-care equates to going to the spa or to an ashram. If your boss encourages visits to the spa, go for it! In reality, nothing elaborate is necessary. Rather, self-care means catching a few moments to take care of your basic needs so that you can be your best possible self, both for you and for your employer and customers.

Taking care of your body, mind and spirit has been shown to boost confidence, productivity and happiness. It's not self-indulgent to take care of yourself—think of it as doing all the necessary things you need to maintain a well-functioning body and mind. Without self-care, you are like a cell phone that is steadily going down in battery charge. With self-care, you are recharging yourself in tiny increments throughout the day so that you are not completely spent when you clock out.

Below are my favorite self-care strategies that I utilize myself. Pick one from each category as a start and try to incorporate more as you get used to doing self-care throughout your day.

# Self-Care for Your Body

Have an assortment of healthy snacks at your desk so you can eat nutritiously rather than reach out for that box of day-old donuts in the lunchroom.

Do one minute stretch breaks every 45 minutes or so. If you're staring at a computer all day, your entire body is likely to be scrunched up and lack circulation. Your eyes, neck, and shoulders, hands, and arms are also likely to be strained from having been in the same position for too long. Set a timer for 45 minutes or less and take one minute to stand up, stretch and look near and far. Optometrists will tell you to take an eye break every 20 minutes if you are starting at a computer screen for long stretches at a time.

Whenever possible, walk outside for your breaks. Getting some sun, breathing fresh air, and looking at greenery have all been shown to improve our health, both physically and mentally. Even a brisk walk

around the block can do wonders for your health. So ditch the social media scrolling, get out and get moving!

Move when you can. Sneaking exercise in at work is easier than you think. Take the stairs rather than the elevator. Park furthest away from the entrance so you can get a longer walk into the office. Choose different routes when walking from one room to another.

# **Self-Care for Your Mental Health**

Do a one-minute meditation at work. You don't even have to close your eyes to do this. Take just sixty seconds to breathe in and out intentionally, letting go of any intrusive thoughts.

Whenever someone says a nice thing about you or sends you a compliment, keep a record of it in a separate folder. This will come in handy when it is time for your annual review. This folder will also be a great pick-me-up when you are having a bad day and need a boost of confidence.

Learn to say "No" in a professional way to unreasonable requests.

Consider having a live plant in your workspace. Plants have been shown to improve psychological well-being in a surprisingly number of ways.

Have a wind down routine at work.

Most of us wind down before going to bed

— we might brush our teeth, floss and read a
novel. These rituals help prepare your body
and mind for rest. You can do the same at
work five minutes before the end of the
day. Create a wind down routine that helps
you put the day to rest and get ready for
the next day. For instance, I like to spend
the last five minutes of my day clearing
my desk space, and setting out a folder of
things to do for the next day. This helps me
feel like I have finished off my work and am
prepared for tomorrow.

If you are a commuter, take a pause before entering your home. Take a minute or two to be by yourself, listen to one good song or say a short prayer. This will help center yourself and adjust to life back at

Change out of your work clothes and into something cozy and comfy. This tells your body and mind that you are out of the work zone.

The American poet, activist and writer Audre Lorde said it well: "I have come to believe that caring for myself is not self-indulgent. Caring for myself is an act of survival." In these times of stress and overwork, particularly here in Silicon Valley, take time to maintain your health, happiness and sanity at work.

# Grow some pain relief in gardens, containers

Ease your way through the busy summer season with the help of some pain-relieving and anti-inflammatory garden produce. Add them to your garden or containers or purchase the produce at your local farmer's market.

Refresh and rejuvenate yourself with a cup of mint-infused tea or ice water. Mint also helps relieve headaches and general aches and pain. Contain this vigorous perennial herb by growing it in a container to prevent it from overtaking your garden beds. Take advantage of these benefits year-round by starting a few plants at the end of the growing season. Root a few cuttings to plant and grow in a sunny window.

Add sage tea to your list of favorite brews. Just harvest a few leaves, add hot water and brew a bit of sore throat relief. Sage tea has long been used to soothe scratchy and irritated throats and showed positive results in a 2006 clinical trial. Grow this herb in the garden or a container. It thrives in a sunny spot with well-drained soil. Harvest leaves as needed throughout the season. Regular harvesting encourages more growth for future harvests. Harvest as much as one-third of the plant, to preserve and enjoy the benefits year-round.

You may have used a topical pain relief cream that contained capsaicin. This is the spicy element in chili, jalapeno, habanero and cayenne peppers and is a natural pain-fighting tool often used to help treat backaches, arthritis and muscle pain. Hot peppers are ready to harvest when they are fully colored. Ask friends to share their harvest or purchase hot peppers at a farmer's market if your garden lacks this plant.


Grow and use ginger to help reduce inflammation and combat migraines, muscle pain, arthritis and post-workout or post-gardening soreness. Plus, it helps fight nausea so common during a summer filled with barbeques and celebrations. Grow it in a pot outdoors or sunny window alongside your other indoor plants. Ginger is a tropical plant, but you can find plants or rhizomes, the part you eat, at many garden centers or online plant retailers. Or try rooting the rhizomes you purchase at the grocery store to start new plants.

Sour cherries are credited with managing muscle pain and inflammation. They are loaded with disease-fighting chemicals and antioxidants and help fight inflammation and relieve pain. Growing a cherry tree may not be practical or possible but purchase plenty when they are in season. Juice, dry and preserve them to enjoy their health benefits all year. If space allows, consider planting a sour cherry tree in your backyard. Sour cherries do need a cold period with air temperatures between 34 and 45 degrees to initiate flowering for fruit development. Consult your local extension service for help selecting the best variety for your region. It takes several years for cherry plants to start producing fruit, but watching your tree grow into maturity and bear its first crop is part of the joy of gardening. Just be sure to protect the harvest from hungry birds.

When growing these you'll soon discover it's not just the plants that provide relief. Just the simple act of tending your garden and harvesting can elevate your mood, lower your blood pressure, and start you on the road to feeling better.

# September, month of our equinox

This is the month when our planet wobbles and tilts so that on the 23rd (this year) it faces equally (equatorially speaking) toward the sun. We call it the autumnal equinox in the northern hemisphere, and it signals the beginning, astronomically speaking, of our fall and winter months when the hours we spend looking away from our local star outnumber those spent peering at it. Earth inhabitants who reside in the southern hemisphere, Australians for instance, call this same moment the "vernal" equinox as they head for their summer months. Those guys always seem to always have their own slant on things anyhow, but what can you expect from

people who carry on their lives sticking to our motherball called Earth upside down? (They probably have the same view of us "northerners.")

September holidays and celebrations range from Patriot Day, a solemn remembrance of a shocking international atrocity to celebratory occasions including our local Celebrate Fremont and Newark Days, international Oktoberfest and the Chinese August Moon Festival to zany stuff such as September 19th "Talk Like a Pirate Day" in which we all should address each other with "Ahoy, me hearty" rather than a simple "hello." This is a month of possibilities. Four months left on the calendar, the last third of the year, allows enough time to think and act on significant issues while reminding us that the clock is running quickly toward a new year.

This same month of September marks the revival of many political happenings including elections looming only two months away. With most vacations a memory and city councils back in full swing, the focus for many citizens moves with the seasonal change toward school, workplace and home-related issues. We have plenty to consider in the greater Tri-City area to keep us busy trying to resolve problems of schools, housing, transportation, government funding, etc. etc.

September will host opening salvos of many political campaigns coupled with rising awareness of the public that we are closing in on the next general election. # How to remove pesticide residue from fruits and vegetables



A recent report found that 20% of 59 different produce categories posed significant health risks to consumers despite current pesticide limits.

Dear EarthTalk: What's the most effective way to remove pesticide residues from fruits and vegetables that I buy at the supermarket?

—R.L.J., Kansas City, KS

For many decades now, pesticides have been a vital tool for farmers to ensure that their harvests aren't overgrown by weeds or eaten by pests. As a result, pesticides remain prevalent today, in spite of the many health risks that pesticide residues still pose to people consuming fruits and vegetables. It's worth noting that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has placed limits on the amount of pesticide residue found on produce—called "tolerances"—to ensure that people will most likely not be impacted by harmful "persistent organic pollutants" (POPs) such as glyphosate and atrazine. However, it's still important to make individual efforts to clean produce to further protect your personal health and safety.

A recent report from the American Chemical Society analyzed data provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and found that 20 percent of 59 different produce categories posed significant health risks to consumers despite current pesticide limits. The researchers developed new methods for finding and removing traces of pesticides from produce, as they found that traditional methods of cleaning produce were insufficient. Most notably, the report posits that pesticides go beyond the produce's surface to leach into the food, meaning that washing may not be as effective. Further research is needed to determine the full risks and implications of current pesticide limits. Regardless, all produce should be cleaned thoroughly before consumption.

consumption.

There are varied opinions on the best methods for removing pesticide residues from produce, and no method is 100 percent effective. Rinsing produce is somewhat helpful for cleaning off dirt and germs, but soaking their fruits and vegetables in warm vinegar or salt solutions may be better; however, some sources claim that exposure to these solutions may allow chemicals to form more complex, equally dangerous chemical compounds, so always follow soaking with thorough rinsing. Finally, peeling or boiling produce can be highly effective in removing residues, though you will suffer a loss of nutrients.

Of course, the only way to significantly reduce your exposure to food-borne synthetic chemicals is by buying organic, as organic foods are not grown with the assistance of hazardous pesticides. You might have to pay a little more, but isn't your health and peace of mind worth it?

# CHOOSING THE RIGHT MEMORY LOSS CARE PROVIDER

GOOD CARE INCLUDES ensuring safety and meeting basic needs; it also means finding care providers that treat the whole person and providing an environment that allows the person to feel independent and safe.

# GETTING STARTED: ASSESSING CARE NEEDS

The first step is determining the care needs of the person with dementia. Whenever possible, involve the person living with dementia in care decisions.

How much care a person needs depends on many factors, including how independently they can walk, eat, use the restroom, and bathe. During the early stages, the person with dementia may still live independently, but in the middle stages, 24-hour supervision will be needed. In the late stages, round-the-clock care becomes more intensive. Ask yourself:

**Safety:** Is the person living with dementia safe? What type of supervision is necessary? Does the person require supervision for activities such as cooking or using certain appliances?

**Health:** Does the health of the person with dementia require specialized care? Do they require help with medications?

**Care:** Does the person with dementia need more care than they are receiving right now? Is caring for the person becoming difficult for you? Can you physically manage providing the care needed?

**Social engagement:** Is the person with dementia engaged in meaningful activities during the day?

# CONTACTING PROVIDERS

Once you have a clear idea of the type of care needed, ask others for referrals. Once you have a list of possible providers, call them. Describe your situation and explain what you would like from a care service. Ask questions regarding qualifications,

types of services offered, cost, and hours of availability.

# SCREENING PROVIDERS

After you have gotten referrals and narrowed your options, screen your care providers. You want to find a provider you trust and who interacts well with the person living with dementia. When you interview potential providers, have a list of questions to ask. Here are some basics to get you started:

- Does the care provider offer the specific services the person with dementia needs?
- How are care plans created and reviewed? The family and the person living with dementia, if able, should be involved.
- Is the staff trained in dementia care or have experience in working with someone with dementia? Are those credentials verified?
- Does the agency, service provider or care facility conduct background checks on all staff?
- What is the procedure if the care provider is sick, on vacation or quits?

Ask the care provider for at least three references. Contact the families and ask about their experience, the care the person received and any concerns they had.


For adult day/respite care providers or long-term care providers, arrange a meeting with staff and take time to look around. Are individuals involved in activities? What is your overall feeling about the environment? For in-home help, ask if the care provider can come to your home to meet you and the person with Alzheimer's. Does the care provider interact and communicate well with the person with Alzheimer's?

These are all important parts of finding the right care provider for you or your loved one. •

# WACC Girl's Flag Football Jamboree

The West Alameda County Conference (WACC) held their second-annual girls' flag football Varsity Jamboree Saturday, September 14 at Mount Eden High School in Hayward. Nine WACC high schools competed against each other in preseason scrimmages.

After the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) approved girls' flag football as a new sport for the 2023-24 season, WACC held an inaugural jamboree last year to help teams find preseason opponents.

"Because it was a new sport, everybody was having a hard time trying to get some preseason games," Gary Duran, a jamboree organizer and Mount Eden's athletic director, said. "So, we said, 'if we bring all the schools in, and they can play multiple teams in one day, that would be a great opportunity."

This year, the event returned due to popular demand, with Alameda, Arroyo, Castro Valley, Hayward, Encinal, Mount Eden, Piedmont, San Leandro and Tennyson high schools all opting to participate.

With flag football's novelty as an official high school sport, athletes often have no prior experience. As a result, teams focused on familiarizing players in preparation for the jamboree.

"A lot of girls had fear just trying something new," Mount Eden head coach Ty Tobin said. "[I showed] them the game, using some film from YouTube and Instagram, and some cool moves they can do when they get confident with learning

In addition to gaining exposure, athletes dove into flag football's fundamentals heading into the jamboree.

"A lot of the players are new, but our team learns new things really quickly, so we just went straight into it," said Tyra Drake, a wide receiver on Tennyson High School's (Hayward) team. "Over the summer we ran routes a lot, and did a lot of defensive

During the event, each team played at least three matches - showing their potential, as well as inexperience.

"Arroyo High School had some crazy defense, not going to lie," Kevin Alvarez Garcia, a spectator, said. "But [all the teams] still have to work on the basics, and move on from there.'

Despite the sport's learning curve, many are optimistic about the future of flag football in the WACC and California.

"I think it's one of the fastest growing sports in the area, and I see it becoming a mainstay in fall sports for the ladies' side of CIF," Duran said.

Coaches, players and fans also hope to see more girls participate in ensuing seasons.

"My message to girls is give it a try," Tobin said. "Be okay with being uncomfortable, because through that [discomfort], you're going to find out just how good you really are.


Patty was always the first to volunteer her time and energy



# California Coastal Cleanup Day celebrates 40th anniversary

On September 21, thousands of volunteers across the state will take part in California Coastal Cleanup Day.

Now in its 40th year, California Coastal Cleanup Day has grown to become the country's largest annual volunteer event, where participants remove hundreds of thousands of pounds of trash from the state's beaches, lakes and waterways.

Organized and run by the California Coastal Commission, the event not only reduces litter dramatically, but also provides important data that can be used to affect public policy. As an example, plastic bags were the 5th most common item of trash collected in 1998. This caused the state to ban plastic bags in 2016, and the following year plastic bags disappeared from the top 10 most common items collected.

The movement has spread across the globe. An International Coastal Cleanup managed by the Ocean Conservancy now takes place in almost every state and in over 100 countries, and has become the world's largest volunteer event related to the marine environment.

Join the effort to protect wildlife and preserve our natural spaces by taking trash out of the environment. Volunteer with your family, friends, coworkers, school groups and service clubs.


