Bay Area sparkles for the season

ORGANIZATIONS AND RESIDENTS START LIGHT-CENTRIC ACTIVITY

With the clocks turning back, the Bay Area has much less evening light. Luckily, events coming up for November and December celebrate lighting things up! (But not actually setting things on fire. Not in this dry fall.)

Locals driving up Mission Boulevard in the evening might see Niles Canyon Railway's Train of Lights cross the railroad overpass. The cars are decorated for the holidays inside and out. Tickets sell out as soon as they go on sale in October. Learn more at www.ncry.org.

Oakland Zoo has implemented a plan-ahead pricing and block ticketing system for its animal-themed lantern festival Glowfari. Currently, tickets are available for dates through Nov. 27, and prices change depending on the dates and times. After the zoo closes, animatronic animal lanterns light up the paths of the zoo in elaborate scenes. This year's themes are the Nile, barnyard animals, mountain animals and dinosaurs. www.oaklandzoo.org

The East Bay has two light parades through downtown streets: Castro Valley's on Nov. 9 (www.edenareachamber.com), and Niles' on Nov. 29 (www.niles.org). Both involve floats and marchers from local schools and community organizations. Niles will also have a tree lighting ceremony.

The historical homes of Hayward Area Recreation and Park District (HARD) are showing off for the season too. Tour the lighted and decorated Mt. Eden Mansion on Dec. 3, McConaghy House on Dec. 4 and Meek Mansion on Dec. 5. www.haywardrec.org

Local cities are having their annual downtown tree lightings in early December. Fremont will hold their Holidays at the Plaza on Dec. 6 (www.fremont.gov) and Hayward's Light Up the Season will take place Dec. 7 (www.hayward-ca.gov).

Local deaf school's future is uncertain

LOW WAGES AND UNDERFUNDING COULD MEAN RELOCATION FOR HUNDREDS OF LOCAL DEAF STUDENTS

The California School for the Deaf (CSD) in Fremont has long been a sanctuary for hearing-impaired students throughout Northern California. But after more than 160 years of supporting the region's deaf children and their families, the school now faces the threat of closure.

Teachers, staff and alumni gathered in CSD's Kloppe Theater on Tuesday, October 22 to voice their concerns about the school's future, citing issues such as low wages, aging facilities and dwindling enrollment. American Sign Language teacher Ty Kovacs warned that without state intervention, around 400 local deaf students could lose what many of them consider their second home.

"We have built a culture of community. Being deaf is normal here, and everyone signs," Kovacs said. "What we are facing is a cultural genocide."

A first-year teacher's salary after taxes at CSD is around \$2,750 a month, compared to the state average of just over \$4,000 a month, according to the California Department of Education. Data published on Apartments.com reveals the average rent for a one-bedroom apartment in Fremont is \$2,430, 88% of the take-home pay for a beginning teacher at CSD. To survive, many CSD staff commute over 100 miles to Fremont or live in their vehicles.

Those who still can't make ends meet are searching for employment elsewhere. Since 2017, the school has lost 272 staff members. More than 45 employees have transferred

to the California School for the Deaf in Riverside, the sister school to CSD Fremont, because wages are the same while the cost of living is lower. This migration has fueled conversation about a possible relocation of the Fremont campus to cheaper areas of Northern California, namely Sacramento. But many have built their lives in Fremont and are not ready to uproot.

"I acted on this stage, so I feel torn about relocation," alumna Jacinda Baldwin said as she passionately signed to attendees. "This is home for me."

With the community divided on whether or not resettlement is the solution, it's unlikely a decision will be made soon. If they do go through with the move, staff and families could feel less squeezed financially: comparative data on BestPlaces.net reveals the cost of living in Sacramento is 45.2% cheaper than in Fremont. The median home cost is the biggest factor in determining this cost of living difference, with this cost being 68% less expensive in Sacramento than in Fremont.

CSD school nurse Karen Brungess believes the relocation discussions are unnecessarily complicating the situation. What she truly wants—and what she believes is the key to resolving the issue—is a salary increase. Since joining the school in 2014, Brungess has witnessed many nurses leave for better-paying opportunities elsewhere. Now, with only three full-time and two part-time nurses, the school has turned to the community to fill in the gaps and deliver essential health services to students on campus.

"We can't recruit and retain," Brungess said. "People will show interest, find out the pay and then say no thank you."

As difficult as it can be working in an understaffed environment for low wages, Brungess stays because of her commitment to the students. She finds joy in watching the kids learn and grow. She says if the state can more adequately fund the CSD, it would be the "perfect" place to work.

Cuts connect cultures around the world

PAPERCUTTING EXHIBIT OPENS AT OLIVE HYDE ART GALLERY

The word "cleave" is a contronym—a word with opposing definitions—meaning both to separate and to connect. Olive Hyde's current exhibit "Connecting Cuts" explores this paradox through the medium of papercutting, showing how this one art form brings together people and cultures. Artists on display come from around the Bay Area, across the States and from China.

Papercutting is exactly what it sounds like: intricate designs created by carving shapes in positive and negative space into paper. The form is represented in cultures around the world, such as Indonesia, Poland, Germany, Mexico, China and Japan. Bay Area residents likely saw some examples of paper picado banners for Day of the Dead celebrations.

Guest curator Bianca Levan explored different art forms and music growing up, but none of them presented the chance for self-expression she was searching for until she stumbled upon papercutting. She remembers thinking, "This is the most beautiful thing I've ever seen! I'm gonna give that a try!" She continues, "My first papercutting was with a box cutter and a paper bag, and instantly I was just Oh sh— there's something here."

Some artists layer different colors of paper, or even turn the sheets into 3D art, but Levan prefers to work in 2D black and white. The process has a meditative quality. "You start off with this black piece of paper, or this question, and you don't know what it is. Then as you sit there and start to carve away different pieces, it kind of reveals an image. At the end of it I don't necessarily have an answer, but there is something about sitting with the question and working through them while I'm papercutting that helps ground me."

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Palliative Care Program Helps Patients Suffering with Serious Illness

Services Help with Pain, Coordination of Care, Stress, Family Concerns, and More

November is National Hospice and Palliative Care Month, a time to acknowledge those who suffer from serious illness and end of life, and the families and loved ones who care for them.

People sometimes confuse palliative care with hospice care, since they both provide services to the seriously ill. Palliative care patients are provided with curative medical treatment that isn't limited to a specific time frame or diagnosis. Palliative care helps patients manage symptoms for a variety of illnesses for as long as possible. Hospice provides comfort mostly at the end of life.

Washington Hospital Healthcare System provides a Palliative Care Program that includes a wide range of services and coordination of care. Krishna Suri, DO, a board-certified internal medicine doctor, takes a special interest in palliative care. "Palliative care aims to be a resource providing quality symptom management and adept guidance of care," he emphasizes.

The Hospital's Palliative Care Team (consisting of doctors, nurses, social workers, nurse practitioners, spiritual care coordinator, and other specialists) works with patients' primary care providers to assess their needs and develop a plan of care, according to Dr. Suri.

How Palliative Care Helps

The program includes helping patients and families:

- Navigate the health care system
- Identify goals of care



- Address complex symptoms and difficult treatment choices
- Ensure that preferences for medical care match goals and values
- Receive psychosocial, emotional and spiritual support
- Anticipate and plan next steps as a disease progresses

Working with a team that understands the needs of those suffering with serious illness can help foster communication, encouraging families to discuss important issues and, if needed, arrange for counseling. Discussions often include complex pain, depression, anxiety, fatigue,

shortness of breath, constipation, nausea, loss of appetite, and difficulty sleeping.

"My philosophy of care has always been, 'Care does not end at the prescription,'" Dr. Suri explains. He likes to spend time with his patients and their families to understand their comprehensive needs and support systems. "Getting to know my patients and their loved ones is what drives me," he says.

Who the Program Helps

"Palliative care isn't just for cancer patients, as many people sometimes believe," Dr. Suri notes. In addition to cancer, the program can help a wide variety of patients, including those suffering from:

- Congestive heart failure
- Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease
- Kidney failure (end-stage renal disease)
- Dementia
- And other chronic illnesses

Living with serious illness can be debilitating and overwhelming for patients and families. The Palliative Care Team can provide an extra layer of support to relieve stress by providing psychosocial, emotional, and spiritual support for patients and families.

According to the National Hospital and Palliative Care Association, studies show that palliative care significantly improves patients' quality of life. It can ease the burden on families, and make a patient's experience with a health care system less stressful and traumatic.

Each year an estimated 56.8 million people, including 25.7 million in the last year of life, need palliative care, according to the World Health Organization, yet only about 14% receive it. Dr. Suri concludes, "As their health care needs evolve, families need relevant patient-centered guidance to navigate transitions in care that are unique to their values and preferences."

How to Get Palliative Care

To request services from the Palliative Care Program, a patient or family member should ask their physician for a referral. The Washington Hospital Palliative Care Team can offer support to patients and their families 365 days a year, both during their stay and after discharge. 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Hayward Hills Man Elated After Swift Recovery from Varicose Vein Surgery

Patient Lauds Rakesh Safaya, MD, as a ‘Miracle Doctor’

Kurt Dowling, 67, of Hayward Hills has seen many doctors over the years, but none impressed him as much as Rakesh Safaya, MD, a vascular surgeon with Washington Township Medical Foundation.

The manager of Deens Electronics in Fremont, a family business, is very grateful after an easy recovery from varicose vein surgery. He was amazed by how smoothly it went. “Dr. Safaya is a miracle doctor,” Dowling says with a smile.

“I was dealing with varicose veins for 15 years and finally decided to do something about it,” recalls Dowling, who works closely with his grandson at Deens and is a hobby pastry chef. “I liked Dr. Safaya right away. He was sincere, honest, intelligent, humble, and very professional. It’s obvious he cares deeply about his patients and has a great attitude.”

Same-Day Procedure

In July, Dr. Safaya operated on Dowling at Washington Hospital in a same-day procedure called a saphenofemoral ligation with multiple stab phlebectomies, a minimally invasive procedure to remove varicose veins. Dowling recalls: “Afterwards, they wheeled me out of the Hospital and I stood right up. No pain; no medication, just an aspirin. I was up on my leg the next day.”

He was referred to Dr. Safaya by his primary care physician, after feeling that his enlarged bulging veins were unsightly. “I was wearing compression stockings, and the veins were still bulging and popping out of my leg. Now, I have no more veins bulging and I’m walking normally.”

In fact, a week after surgery, Dowling was feeling well enough to be active, including standing in the kitchen to

bake pastry and cheesecake for family and friends, and posting his creations on social media. He attributes his swift recovery, in part, to overall good health and a healthy lifestyle.

New York- and Houston-Trained, Board Certified

Dowling had met with Dr. Safaya four times before committing to the vein procedure. He methodically researches his doctors online, and likes to get to know them. He was impressed by Dr. Safaya’s training at the Bronx Lebanon Hospital in New York City, and Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas; and by his vast experience; and certification by the American Board of Surgery. In speaking with family and friends about his upcoming surgery, he soon learned that Dr. Safaya was well known in the community.

“I like to do research and spend time with any doctor I’m considering. Dr. Safaya has been in practice for years, and I appreciated his intelligence and attitude,” Dowling notes. The key to successful surgery is trust in the doctor, according to Dowling, something he quickly developed with Dr. Safaya. “He spent a lot of time explaining the procedure. Some doctors want to rush you out of the office.”

What Causes Varicose Veins

Varicose veins are a common condition caused by weak or damaged vein walls and valves that keep blood flowing toward the heart. Weak or damaged valves and vein walls can cause blood to pool and even flow backward. Problems can occur, mostly in the legs, when blood pressure increases inside the veins.

Varicose veins are caused by age, pregnancy, being overweight or obese, sitting or standing for long periods, smoking, taking contraceptives or hormone replacement, leg injury, or inactive lifestyle. People with a family history of varicose veins may also be at risk. Untreated varicose veins are usually not serious, but can cause inflammation, swelling and blood clots.

Dowling doesn’t know what caused his varicose veins, but suspects that working as a maitre d’ earlier in his career, and being on his feet a lot, may be to blame. From 1984 to 1997, he worked at several upscale Sunset Boulevard, Beverly Hills, restaurants serving the rich and famous. “I’ve served Marlon Brando, Raquel Welch, Clint Eastwood, Dolly Parton, Mike Tyson—you name ‘em,” Dowling says as he rattles off a list of restaurant clientele. It was during this time that he first became interested in pastry making.

He advises others suffering from varicose veins to consider the surgery. “I would recommend the surgery as long as you’re a good candidate. After it’s done, you’ll feel good about yourself.” He continues, “Dr. Safaya is a great surgeon. I’d put a star next to his name. I don’t say that about just any doctor.”

“If that one thing changes, people would be falling over themselves to work here,” Brungess said. “It’s a beautiful place.”

Aselefech Tiku agrees. So much so, that she lives in her car and commutes from Stockton to be a counselor to high-school girls. Having been in this role for 22 years, Tiku has been a key activist for students and staff at CSD, facilitating collaborations with unions and going to the capitol to be a mouthpiece for her colleagues. But years of ignored efforts have left Tiku exhausted.

“I believe the state doesn’t see us or listen to us,” she said. Tiku is anxious thinking about the future of her workplace. But most of all, she fears for the futures of the children.

“If we’re not here, where will the students go?”

Disposing of problem plant debris

You’ve probably read that you should remove and dispose of pest-infected and diseased plant material to reduce these problems in next season’s garden. This is not as easy as it seems. Most compost piles do not heat up and maintain hot enough temperatures to kill weeds, weed seeds, disease organisms and insect pests. In many locations burning is not allowed and it negatively impacts air quality. So, what’s a gardener to do?

Start by calling your local municipality and asking about disposal options. Many communities allow you to dispose of invasive plants in the garbage after

placing them in a clear plastic bag labeled invasive.

Solarization is an option for managing weeds. Place small amounts of plant debris in clear plastic bags. Then place the bags in a warm sunny location before composting. For larger quantities, set the problem plant debris on a sheet of plastic and securely cover it with a two- to six-mil clear plastic tarp. Plastic helps create a greenhouse effect, trapping heat while blocking access to water. Seeds will sprout and then seedlings and other plants are killed by the high temperatures and lack of water. It is most effective when the days are long and hot enough to kill plant insect pests and diseases.

Most plant pathogens are killed when moist soil remains at 145°F for 30 minutes, 160°F for bacteria, and 180°F for weed seeds.

If battling jumping worms, the University of Maryland has found creating a solarization package is effective for managing them in soil, compost and mulch. Spread a sheet of clear plastic on the ground. Place a six- to eight-inch layer of mulch, compost or soil on the plastic tarp, leaving enough excess to wrap and completely and securely cover the enclosed material. On a sunny day, the material inside can reach 150°F. Research varies on the number of days needed to kill the jumping worms. Several university sources recommend

three or more days of at least 104°F or 105°F to kill the eggs, cocoons and adult jumping worms.

Burying diseased material can help reduce the source of future infection of some diseases. Dig a hole, fill it with plant debris, mix it with soil and then cover it with an inch or two of disease-free soil. Speed up the decomposition of buried material by shredding it before burying it. Avoid growing plants susceptible to the disease in that location the following season.

Remember to disinfect your pots, stakes and tools that may have housed or touched diseased plants. Disease-causing organisms can survive on these items, increasing disease risk in

next year’s garden. Soak pots for 30 minutes in a 10% bleach solution, rinse with clear water and air dry. Store in a clean location. This is much more effective with clay and ceramic pots than plastic. Consider rotating plantings as you would in the garden and changing display areas when using plastic containers if you do not want to dispose of them.

Disinfect garden tools by dipping them in a 70% alcohol solution using rubbing alcohol or something similar for at least 30 seconds. Or you can spray your tools with a disinfectant spray containing about 70% alcohol.

Investing time in prevention will result in

fewer problems and better results in next year’s garden.

Conference discusses restorative power of native plants

Doug Tallamy, ecologist, inspirational speaker and best-selling author of *Nature's Best Hope*, will be the keynote speaker at the conference “Nature's Best Hope” which will take place at Santa Clara University on Sunday, Nov. 17. Tallamy points out that we are all focused on the climate crisis—as we should be—but that even if we could solve the climate crisis today we would still have a real and accelerating biodiversity crisis. North America has lost three billion breeding birds in the last 50 years, and insect numbers are in drastic decline nearly everywhere. The U.N. predicts that one million species will go extinct in the next 18 years. “These losses are not an option if we humans wish to continue happily on this planet,” Tallamy says, “for it is plant and animal diversity

that creates the stable and productive ecosystems on which we depend. We are at a critical point of losing so many species from local ecosystems that their ability to produce and provide the oxygen, clean water, flood control, pollination, pest control, carbon storage, etc.—the ecosystem services that sustain us—will become seriously compromised.” He points out in a clear and engaging way why we must—and how each of us can—successfully address the biodiversity crisis at the grassroots level. Tallamy's message that every property owner must improve the ecological integrity of landscapes under his or her control by adding native plants and restoring habitat around our homes, offices or place of worship, in local parks and wherever else we can weed and plant, has resonated with many in the Bay Area. Bringing Back the Natives Garden Tour

founder and conference coordinator Kathy Kramer pointed out, “Compared to 20 years ago native plant gardens, nurseries and designers can now be readily found. Having a native plant garden really is the way to bring nature home: In my own garden in San Pablo I have seen 40 species of birds, and 16 kinds of butterflies, skippers and moths. SNOWBALLS FROM SPACE

If you spotted comet C/2023 A3 (Tsuchinshan-ATLAS) in person, or saw photos online this October, you might have been inspired to learn more about these visitors from the outer Solar System. Get ready for the next comet and find out how comets are connected to some of our favorite annual astronomy events.

Comet Composition

A comet is defined as an icy body that is small in size and can develop a "tail" of gas as it approaches the Sun

from the outer Solar System. The key traits of a comet are its nucleus, coma, and tail.

The nucleus of the comet is comprised of ice, gas, dust, and rock. This central structure can be up to 80 miles wide in some instances, as recorded by the Hubble Space Telescope in 2022 – large for a comet but too small to see with a telescope. As the comet reaches the inner Solar System, the ice from the nucleus starts to vaporize, converting into gas. The gas cloud that forms around the comet as it approaches the Sun is called the coma. This helps give the comet its glow. But beware: much like Icarus, sometimes these bodies don't survive

their journey around the Sun and can fall apart the closer they get.

The most prominent feature is the tail of the comet. Under moderately dark skies, the brightest comets show a dust tail, pointed away from the Sun. When photographing comets, you can sometimes resolve the second tail, made of ionized gases that have been electronically charged by solar radiation. These ion tails can appear bluish, in comparison to the white color of the dust tail. The ion tail is also always pointed away from the Sun. In 2007, NASA's STEREO mission captured images of C/2006 P1 McNaught and

its dust tail, stretching over 100 million miles. Studies of those images revealed that solar wind influenced both the ion and dust tail, creating striations—bands—giving both tails a feather appearance in the night sky.

Coming and Going

Comets appear from beyond Uranus, in the Kuiper Belt, and may even come from as far as the Oort Cloud. These visitors can be short-period comets like Halley's Comet, returning every 76 years. This may seem long to us, but long-period comets like Comet Hale-Bopp, observed from 1996-1997 won't return to the inner Solar System until the year 4385. Other types

include non-periodic comets like NEOWISE, which only pass through our Solar System once.

But our experiences of these comets are not limited to the occasional fluffy snowball. As comets orbit the Sun, they can leave a trail of rocky debris in its orbital path. When Earth finds itself passing through one of these debris fields, we experience meteor showers! The most well-known of these is the Perseid meteor shower, caused by Comet 109P/Swift-Tuttle. While this meteor shower happens every August in the northern hemisphere, we won't see Comet Swift-Tuttle again until the year 2126.

Today is Election Day and many who did not vote early are heading to the polls to cast their ballot. Despite all the hoopla over the presidential race, state ballot measures and propositions, there are important contests on the local scene as well. A spirited contest for mayor and council seats in Fremont and many other cities; public organizations (i.e. water districts, sanitation districts) are now open to voter discretion. For example, citizens are being asked to approve significant bonds (indebtedness) for a variety of causes. As individuals, most of us carefully consider something like a 30-year mortgage on a home; we should carefully consider public debt as well.

To those who cast their ballots, a “well done” is appropriate. But, the election does not end the

matter of government, it is just the beginning.

Electing officials who appear to agree with a voter does not automatically translate into everything that voter wants to accomplish. Our government, especially at the local level, relies on public input to help guide votes during an official’s term of office. It is the responsibility of each community to support or, if in disagreement, nudge officials in a different direction. Activism is not just a word; it is the bedrock of a representative democracy.

Without citizen involvement, corruption is not only possible but more likely due to indifference except from those with selfish interests. Economic considerations are not always a bad thing, but without the active participation of citizens, few checks and balances

exist. A glaring, extreme example from the past is the transgression of those elected to office in Bell, California. Without oversight monetary discipline was discarded and corruption rampant. Citizen oversight of government is essential.

In some cases, people elected to lead their community have decided that once in office, they can do as they please or simply support a voting bloc. This defeats their purpose of true representation and listening to constituents. Those elected hold a special place in our government and promise to reflect what is best for their neighbors. This promise is one that should be constantly monitored throughout their tenure.

Election Day is not the end...It is the beginning.

Culture wars fuel a resistance

PARENTS, STUDENTS
AND TEACHERS COME
TOGETHER TO HALT
THE CHAOS ROILING
SCHOOL BOARDS AND
COMMUNITIES

Residents of the tiny East Bay town of Sunol, California like to say that it used to be a tight-knit community. Bordered by chaotic commuter roads, just over a hill from Silicon Valley, the census designated place (population 920) abuts a wilderness preserve and vibes like a rural haven.

Horse ranches dot the rolling hills; families join 4-H, and civic life revolves around the K-8 Sunol Glen School, the town’s lone school, with about 270 students.

But more than a year ago, this prosperous country town lost its peace and it has yet to find it again. Friends have become enemies, heads have rolled and more than three months after a hard-fought close school board recall election, neighbors remain suspicious and resentful of each other. Signs for competing candidates hang on fences. A new election in November will pit familiar antagonists against each other all over again.

It turns out that even a secluded enclave where everybody knows everybody is no refuge from the nation’s culture wars.

Sunol’s fight started like many others: with a gay pride flag. A few parents complained about a pride flag flying outside the school. One month later, after a chaotic meeting, the Sunol Glen Unified School District voted 2-1 to ban all banners but government flags. That vote came after a parent threatened to sue the district for displaying what he called one “special interest” flag (pride) over another (say, the Gadsen “Don’t Tread on Me” flag). This argument, used in other pride flag bans, seemed reasonable to some. To others, in Sunol and well beyond it, it announced that the culture wars had arrived.

Before Sunol, a pride flag ban was unheard of in deep blue Alameda County. Not to mention the vote came only one month after a neighboring district,

San Ramon Valley Unified School District in (also deeply blue) Contra Costa County, beat back efforts to curtail Pride events. Somehow, far-right groups such as The Heritage Foundation and Moms for Liberty, its close ally, had managed to rebrand the flag — at least to conservatives. To them, the rainbow banner created in San Francisco in 1978 represented not inclusion but special interests that may impede religious liberties. This even in the cradle of the Pride movement.

After Sunol, residents of Alameda and Contra Costa counties, who had begun monitoring the anti-LGBTQ+ parental rights groups disrupting local school board meetings, decided to band together. About 150 organizers — parents, teachers, students, and concerned citizens — first met in April (after many Zoom meetings) with one overriding goal: to stop the chaos roiling school boards and rending communities. In short, to avoid another Sunol.

Several months in, the bicounty coalition Lift Up Public Schools, or LUPS, has more than 250 members and hundreds of allies in affiliated groups. It monitors a dozen school board elections in Contra Costa County and two dozen school board elections in Alameda County, all to be decided in November. Volunteers do everything from canvassing and making calls to hosting forums and sharing information on relevant events and groups, all while accelerating a national movement.

More and more communities are tackling and knocking out the parental rights groups. In the last year, their endorsed candidates have lost more races than they’ve won, even in conservative districts. Pride flag bans are facing a backlash, with those who pushed for them sometimes being recalled — again, even in conservative districts. Republican Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis, who codified Moms for Liberty’s positions against mentioning race or gender in schools (as with the state’s so-called “Don’t Say Gay” law), has acknowledged that widely unpopular book bans have gone too far.

As for Moms for Liberty, which still calls itself a “nonpartisan” grassroots group, it has ratcheted

up culture war conspiracy theories that are inspiring a groundswell of opposition, said Liz Kelly Mikitarian, founder of STOP Moms for Liberty.

Moms for Liberty, which says it has 130,000 members in 48 states, is pushing easily disproved notions (repeated by Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump on the campaign trail) that public schools are a pipeline to secret sex change clinics performing forced gender reassignments on children.

“They’ve doubled down on the most bizarre conspiracies,” said Mikitarian, a retired kindergarten teacher (and disaffected Republican) who founded STOP Moms for Liberty in Brevard County, Florida, in 2022 in the same school district where Moms for Liberty was born in 2021.

As the election season has heated up, so has STOP Moms for Liberty, she said. The unfunded social media-driven movement has grown to at least 25,000 members in 46 states, according to Mikitarian.

She added that it has grown so fast that it has had to create organizing structures — a membership director, diversity director, senior advisory team and national advisory board. It is also partnering with two allies, Democracy and Education and the School Board Integrity Project, on a national school board project.

The Contra Costa County chapter of STOP Moms for Liberty has become the national organization’s most active, Mikitarian said. Beyond strong leadership, she said, the group has been organizing with committed partners it keeps finding and joining with for the cause. “It’s a model for how grassroots organizing can be done,” Mikitarian said.

In the Bay Area, where the backlash against the parental rights groups is robust, LUPS works closely with the Alameda County and Contra Costa County chapters of STOP Moms for Liberty, PFLAG of the San Ramon Valley and the American Association of University Women.

These groups, with hundreds of members apiece, have their own school board projects. They also share information, support actions and join with other groups — some established, some, like LUPS,

springing up to tackle numerous school board elections, including Sunol’s upcoming school board election, the result of its July 2 recall.

Erica Dahl, a LUPS founder who also founded the Contra Costa County chapter of STOP Moms for Liberty (with 280 members), said the group attracts volunteers because it is not merely protesting the “extremists.” The Contra Costa Chapter also shares information, supports work outside LUPS territory and outside the Bay Area and continues to grow partnerships to outlast the election cycle. “We wanted to do more than play Whac-a-Mole,” she said.

Underscoring the growing pace of the movement, Dahl, a teacher of deaf and hard of hearing children in Alameda County, also leads the California state chapter of STOP Moms for Liberty, with five subgroups (Contra Costa, Alameda, Yolo, Shasta and Placer counties) and the Western region (Nevada, Washington, Wyoming, Oregon and Alaska).

Among the many volunteers who’ve made the election a full-time job, Ogie Strogatz, a long-retired community volunteer in Contra Costa County, helped found LUPS as a member of an East Bay chapter of the American Association of University Women. She had committed to attending and monitoring every one of her local school board meetings and found something “exciting” about bumping into other community members doing the same, she said.

Once the coalition was formed, and the groups began to grow and coalesce, Strogatz was able to skip a meeting to attend a protest or hold a forum or do candidate interviews — in other words, to participate in other important components of the movement, she said.

“The idea of really good organizing is that you broaden and deepen the variety of people who are willing to speak out,” she said. “The metaphor in organizing is that it’s like being in a choir and holding a really long note. You can take your breath and know that the rest of us are holding it.”

Of course, the results of all these efforts won’t be clear until November. As with the presidential election, both sides are working furiously and assuming nothing.

“We are solely focused at this point on three things,” Mikitarian said. “That’s helping people to hold their current school boards accountable, restoring more sanity on these school boards and really focusing on Project 2025, the conservative playbook largely written by Trump’s former aides and confidants.”

She won’t predict what will happen this election.

Dahl was also circumspect. Since the fate of the school board wars depends partially on who wins the presidential election, it is hard to claim victory just for having momentum, she said.

Still, from the ground, “It feels like we can do this,” Dahl said as she headed out to another school board meeting. “It feels like we’re winning.”

THE PACIFIC BUS MUSEUM'S LATEST ACQUISITION IS A 100-YEAR-OLD COACH WITH A STORIED PAST

The Pacific Bus Museum is thrilled to welcome an old friend back to Northern California. In Sept. 2024, we acquired Peninsula Charter Lines #216

from the Museum of Bus Transportation in Hershey, Pa. The return of this coach back to the Bay Area to become part of the Pacific Bus Museum's fleet, represents a homecoming for this coach that was operated in the San Francisco Bay Area from 1926 until 1949. Bus #216 (serial 10465) was built in 1924, the last of an order (206-216) for the Pacific Electric Railway. It had a standard Fageol body and a 4-cylinder Hall-Scott engine (50 serial

483) and 4-speed Brown-Lipe transmission. After its short service with the Pacific Electric Railway in Los Angeles, in 1926 four Fageols (213-216) were sent north and leased to fellow Southern Pacific Railroad subsidiary, Peninsular Railway (PRY). PRY needed these buses to provide replacement bus service as a result of street improvements that forced abandonment of some of their trolley service. At the end of the lease, the

ownership of #216 was transferred and repainted into Peninsular dark red with gold-leaf lettering. In 1933, #216, along with sister #215, passed to Floyd Pearson (Palo Alto Transit Co.) and subsequently to John Demeter and Frank Knapp (Palo Alto City Lines) in 1941 and ran in city service until 1949. This bus was preserved by its successor Peninsular Transit Lines and restored in 1989 by Mike Demeter,

then the owner-operator of Peninsula Charter Lines out of East Palo Alto, Calif. It was converted to the 6-cylinder Hercules JXB gasoline engine with a distinctive Diamond T manifold mated to a manual transmission it still has today. In 1990 #216 was featured in a Pacific Bus Museum charter trip to celebrate its restoration. During its time in Palo Alto, just 16 miles across the bay from the

museum in Fremont, it was seen multiple times in the Redwood City Parades and was on display for the 1992 Bus Bash in San Jose. Mike donated the bus to the Museum of Bus Transportation in Hershey Pa. where it became one of the gems of their collection until the Pacific Bus Museum acquired it in September of 2024. #216 is a remarkable survivor and the Pacific Bus Museum is thrilled to bring this 100-year-old bus home to Northern California!
